THERE'S NO place like home absolutely no place.

That's our solemn opinion after a week of vacationing. First, we went over to Possum Kingdom Lake and put up at Costello Island. It's a 300-acre island surrounded by the lake. You get there by telephoning for the owner, Bedford Jones, to come after you in his big motor boat.

The island is equipped with cabin accommodations for some 20 families. The cabins are new and built of stone. They're attractive and comfortable. You eat at the island cafe, where the food is wonderful.

Mr. Jones, a Dallas architect, has been working on his camp for three years. He has a fleet of motor boats, a nice dock, and a good sandy swimming beach—when the water isn't too high. He plans to stock the island with deer soon, for the grass is plentiful.

The island has deer and quail hunting in the fall. It has an airport, if you want to fly over. They have a barge if you want to bring your car.

AND THEN WE went to Fort Worth. When we started on the trip, we decided to do what the children — our son is 5 and our daughter is 7 — wanted to do. After Costello Island, we spent an entire day at the zoo in Forest Park, Fort Worth, looking over all the animals and riding every ride there. The day included a swim, hot dogs, peanuts and popcorn, and numerous other items.

WHILE AWAY, we dropped in on the Naval Air Station, Dallas, to see if we could find out what the boys thought of our status as reserve pilot. Nobody knew anything. Everybody was busy and had little time for visitors.

THEN WE dropped in on a show who is a pretty big wig. He thinks the government's hydrogen bomb plant will be built at East Texas at Jasper, between Austin and Beaumont. He says the 150,000 acres of land will be needed.

We asked him what kind of industries a city like Cisco could attract. He pointed out that our town is far too small to expect a big industry, like a General Motors assembly plant which is expected to locate in Texas because we lack the accommodations, housing, water, and so forth.

He suggested that the best deal for small towns was to seek ranch operations of big industries — sub-contractors for the big boys.

TALKED TO another fellow, who was considerably amused at the way some people are hoarding and buying up things. He's a man in a position to know and he told us flatly that "there will be no shortages in the foreseeable future."

ONE OF THE things that impressed us most everywhere we went was the fact that Cisco is the coolest place in Texas — particularly at night. If you don't believe it, take yourself a trip to about any place in the state.

Plans for Spring Livestock Show Discussed at Meet

At a meeting of the directors of the Cisco Livestock Show Association Thursday at 3 p. m. in the Chamber of Commerce building, plans for the annual Eastland County Livestock Show to be held in the spring were discussed.

Tentative plans call for holding a three day show, probably in April. The first two days will be devoted to the stock show with the third day being used for the horse show events.

Bulletin to Aid Cotton Selling

AUSTIN, August 17 — U. S. cotton merchandisers can gain valuable background information for their buying from a new U. S. Texas Cotton Merchandising Laboratory report.

The bulletin presents details on the grade and staple lengths of cotton produced in the U. S. during five seasons, 1944-45 through 1948-49.

The report, compiled from U. S. Department of Agriculture data, gives grades and staple lengths by state and USDA crop reporting district. The information is presented according to season and to five-year average.

"By consulting our background bulletin and our confidential reports on current sales, merchandisers can now take much of the guesswork out of marketing 1949-50 cotton on a spinning-value basis," Dr. A. B. Cox, cotton marketing professor, explained.

The bulletin, "Cotton Grade and Staple Length, United States," may be obtained from Cotton Merchandising Research, University of Texas, Austin 12, Texas. Receipt of confidential, current production reports must be based on the subscriber's supplying his corresponding confidential production information, Dr. Cox said.

Football Drills Slowed by Rains

Conservation To Be Taught This Fall in Schools

AUSTIN, August 18 — The subject of conservation and its indispensability to all phases of human progress will be taught for the first time in many Texas schools this fall.

This broadening of the vital resource-use education program is a direct result of workshops conducted in Texas senior colleges this summer by E. T. Dawson, supervisor of wildlife conservation education of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission.

Dawson, upon conclusion of the summer schedule, said more than 3,000 teachers have participated in planning for resource-use education. The extent of this routine and the rapidity of its growth since this work was begun in 1946 is shown by the fact that the summer workshop programs have increased from one the first year to 24 during the past summer.

Dozens of calls are received daily for literature to supply the teachers for the school year to come. Well over 1,000 packets of material have been distributed within the past two months.

The education supervisor said the subject is taught in grades 1 through 12 but that emphasis is made on the grades of 1 through 8. The success of the statewide program has been facilitated by the cooperation of the State Education Agency. A main factor in this advancement, Dawson remarked, has been through the efforts of the directors of resource-use education in the State Dept. of Education. This official coordinates the efforts of administrators, supervisors, teachers and all others interested in teaching conservation to young Texans.

Rising Star Schools Will Open Sept. 5

Rising Star schools will begin the 1950-51 term on Tuesday, Sept. 5, according to an announcement this week by Jay Koonce, president of the board of trustees. Supt. Sam Jones said a full slate of teachers will be on hand for the opening.

Registration will begin on Thursday, August 31, with senior classmen registering during the morning and juniors during the afternoon. Sophomores will register Friday morning, Sept. 1, with freshmen signing up during the afternoon.

Grammar school students will register the opening day.

Annual Huff Family Reunion To Be Held

More than 75 people were expected in Cisco this weekend to attend the annual Huff family reunion. Visitors from all parts of Texas and from Colorado, New Mexico and other southwestern states as well as all parts of Texas were expected.

The group has made reservation at the Daniels Hotel, which will be the center of operations.

Plans for New School For Negroes Talked

Tentative plans for the establishment of a high school for Negroes in Eastland County have been announced by Carl Elliott, county school superintendent.

Early plans call for the establishment of the high school in Eastland to serve Cisco, Eastland and Ranger, with the students being transported to the school by bus. At present there are three general schools, one located in each of the three towns, with one teacher in each school. Under the present plans an additional teacher would be employed for the Eastland school to care for the high school group.

Elliott stated that final plans could not be made until emergency approval for the additional teacher had been received from the state board.

There are only 65 colored students of school age in the county, Elliott said, and he reported that only 40 to 50 were expected to enroll this fall. He said that he planned the best possible school for colored children, when the final details could be arranged.

GYM COMPLETION AWAITING ARRIVAL OF STEEL BEAMS

Railroad Commission Authorizes Increase in Daily Oil Allowable

An increase of 161,293 barrels per day in the West-Central Texas oil allowable by the Texas Railroad Commission at its monthly hearing in Austin Thursday cheered area oil men who joined others from the state in requesting an increase to take care of present needs and an addition to the storage for war use.

The increase for this area was included in an overall increase for the state of 202,836 barrels, which will bring the state production to an all-time daily production record of 2,836,720 barrels.

The producing days were increased from 21 to 22 in all areas

except East Texas where the days were increased to 21. In the flush Scurry County field allowable production days were increased to 22.

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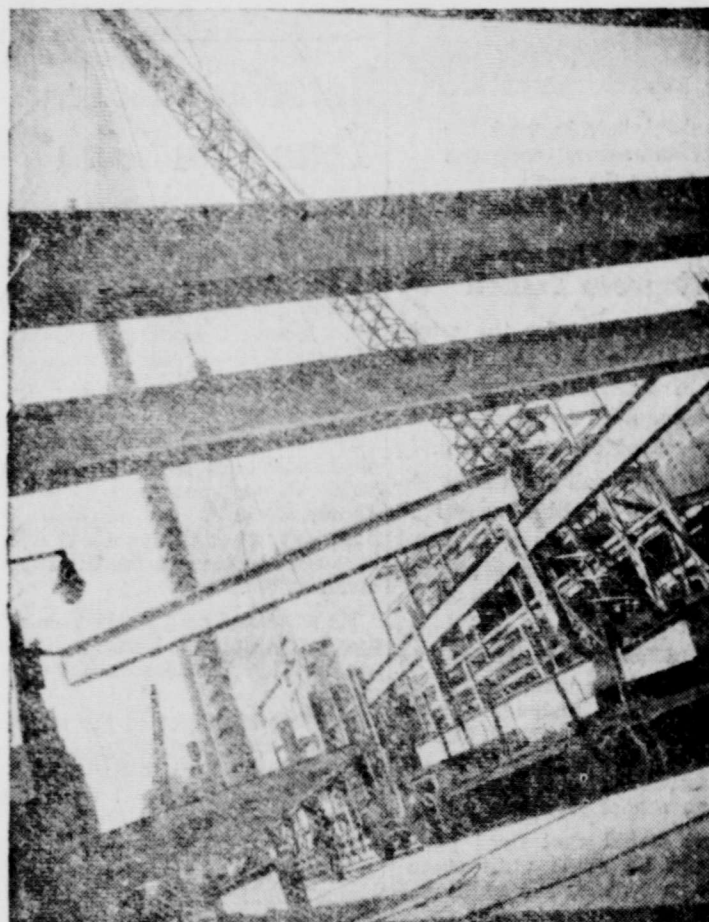

OPEN SEASON - NORTH ZONE: Sept. 1 to Oct. 15, both days inclusive. Shooting hours, one-half hour before sunrise to

SOUTH ZONE: Oct. 20 to Dec. 3, both days inclusive, except in Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Dimmit, LaSalle, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kenedy and Willacy counties where mourning doves may be hunted only on Sept. 15, 17, and 19, from 4 p. m. until sunset, and from Oct. 20 to Nov. 30, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

BAG LIMIT: Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession.

McMULLEN COUNTY: State law Nov. 1 to Dec. 15. Federal law, Oct. 20 to Dec. 3

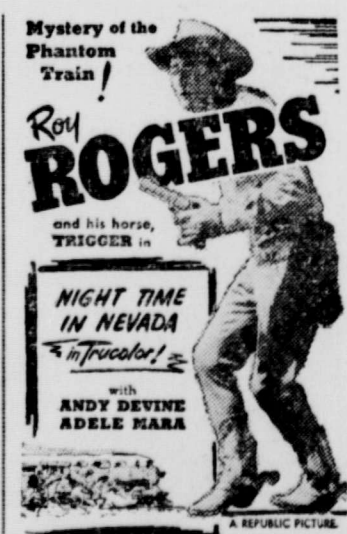
