The harvest of King Cotton hit its peak this week with The Slatonite's bale survey Monday morning showing a total of 33,201 bales being ginned in Slaton and the surrounding area.

**Slaton Soldier Wounded In Vietnam Action**

A Slaton soldier, Staff Sgt. Phill Rampy, has been slightly wounded in Vietnam, according to a telegram sent to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas L. Rampy Jr. of 940 S. 19th St.

Following is the telegram received from the Army:

"The Secretary of the Army has asked me to inform you that your son, Staff Sgt. Phill A. Rampy, was slightly wounded in Vietnam on Nov. 18 as a result of hostile action. He received a fracture wound to the neck. He was on night location when the area came under hostile mortar attack. He was treated and hospitalized in Vietnam. Since he is not, repeat not, seriously wounded, no further reports will be furnished."

than 9,000 bales since last Wednesday as ideal weather cooperated with local farmers to produce optimum harvest conditions.

The survey revealed good turnouts in most areas, with a notable exception at Acuff Co-Op Gin. Hall and bad weather took a heavy toll of cotton in that area, and Acuff reported only 3,400 bales ginned this week. McClung Co-Op counted 950.

Other reports: Slaton Co-Op 11,046; Farmers Gin 2,050; Posey Gin 1,393; Wilson Co-Op 3,412; Gatzki 1,350; Hackberry 2,000; Wayside 3,300; Basinger 445; Union Co-Op 3,855.

The three Cotton Classing Offices of the USDA in this area classed 145,000 samples of new crop cotton last week ending Friday, Nov. 22. This brought the total for the entire season to 486,000. 263,000 samples had been classed on the South Plains this time last year.

Predominant grades were SLM, MID LT SF & SLM LT SP. Those 3 grades represented 68% of the total classed. The average staple length from the South Plains area last week was 1-inch.

Micronaire readings by per-

centages were: 3.5 - 4.9 56%, 3.3-3.4 17%, 3.0-3.2 29%, 2.7-2.9 12%, and 2.6 and below 1%.

The average Pressley test, which is the breaking strength of the fibers, for the Lubbock area was 83,000 pounds per square inch, for the Lamesa area was 83,000 pounds, and for the Brownfield area was 85,000 pounds.

Prices reported to the Consumer and Marketing Service of the USDA at Lubbock ranged from \$7.50 to \$12.50 per bale over the Government loan value for White grades, and \$8 to \$14 per bale over the loan for Light Spotted grades in the 3.5 and 4.9 micronaire range.

Average cottonseed price paid to producers was \$49 per ton.

Others who came close with just four misses included Kelly Sparkman, Joe Gatica, Kenneth Winchester, Chester Williams, Buford Duff, Joe Sparkman, Stanley Miles and Pete Williams.

The Well Child Conference and Immunization Clinic will be held in Slaton next Thursday. It is held monthly on the first Thursday.

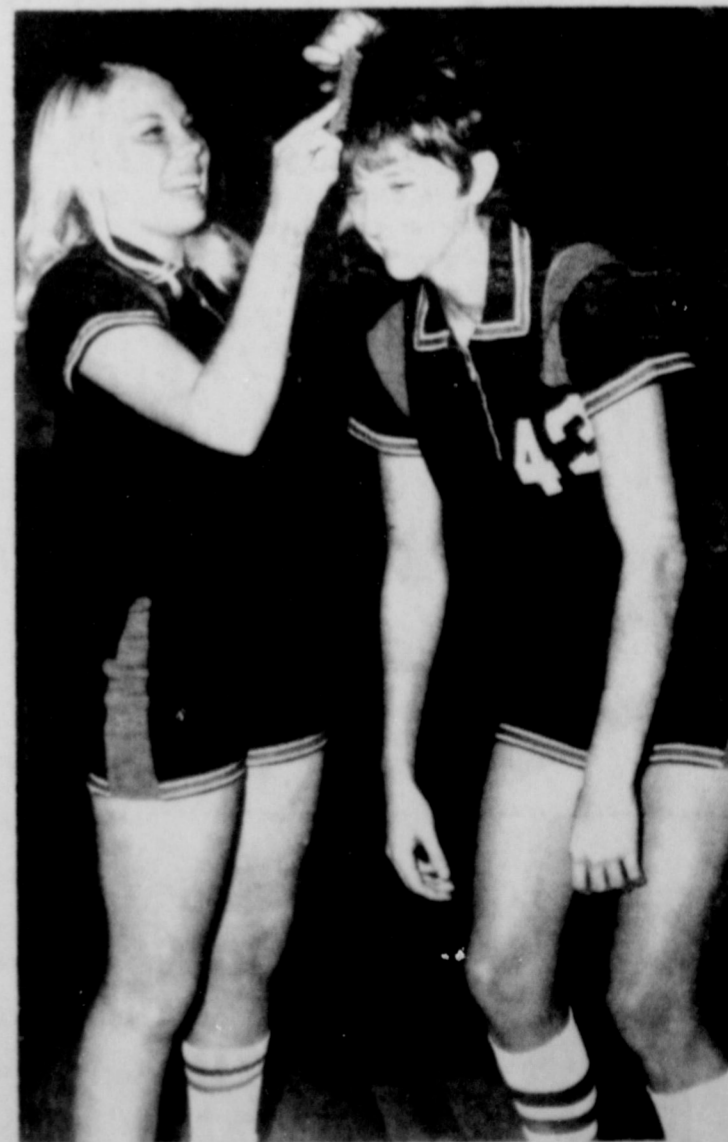
The immunization will be from 1:30 - 3 and is for those not under the care of a physician. There is no charge.

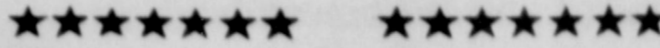

New crop citrus fruits, many from the Texas valley area, are adding holiday spirit to local markets, reports Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist.

Grapefruit supplies are increasing and price is decreasing. Oranges, tangerines and tangelos are on the market. Green-skinned Fuerte avocados are beginning to come in with more reasonable prices, according to Mrs. Clyatt, a specialist with Texas A&M University. Since the new crop is large, avocados should be plentiful this season.

Due to limited supplies, apples are not inexpensive but occasional bargains are in sacks of smaller apples. Most of these are the right size for eating out of hand and are as flavorful as the large fruit.

Mrs. Clyatt reports best vegetable buys in carrots, celery, cabbage, cauliflower, turnips, rutabagas, broccoli, sweet potatoes and dry onions.

Beef supplies are ample, but she expects no price changes in the near future. Chops and rib roasts are currently featured. Figured on a cost per serving basis, boneless roasts often cost no more than the bone-in roasts and are easier

to serve.

Turkey prices are up a bit as demand increases. Fryers are featured in many markets as good protein choice.

Egg prices are on the upward trend again as holiday baking and extra cooking gets underway, however, good values in large size grade A eggs are available, Mrs. Clyatt says.

**Deviled Eggs**  
(Makes 16 halves)  
8 hard-cooked eggs  
1 tablespoon sweet relish  
2 tablespoons tomato ketchup  
2 tablespoons mayonnaise  
1 teaspoon prepared mustard  
Salt and pepper

Cut eggs lengthwise; remove yolks. Mash yolks, blend with remaining ingredients. Refill whites with this mixture. Chill.

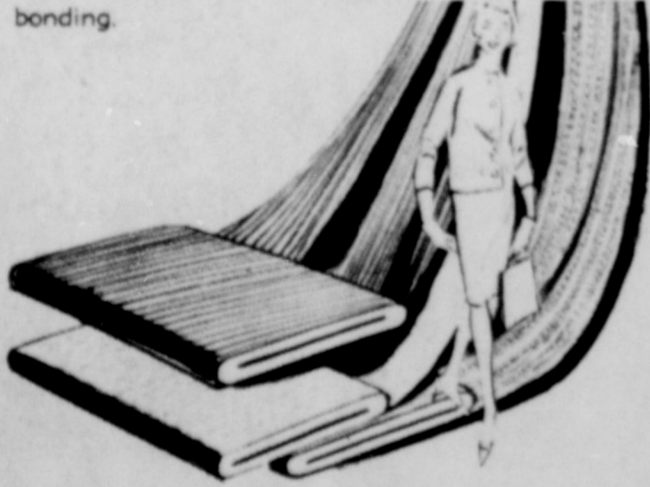

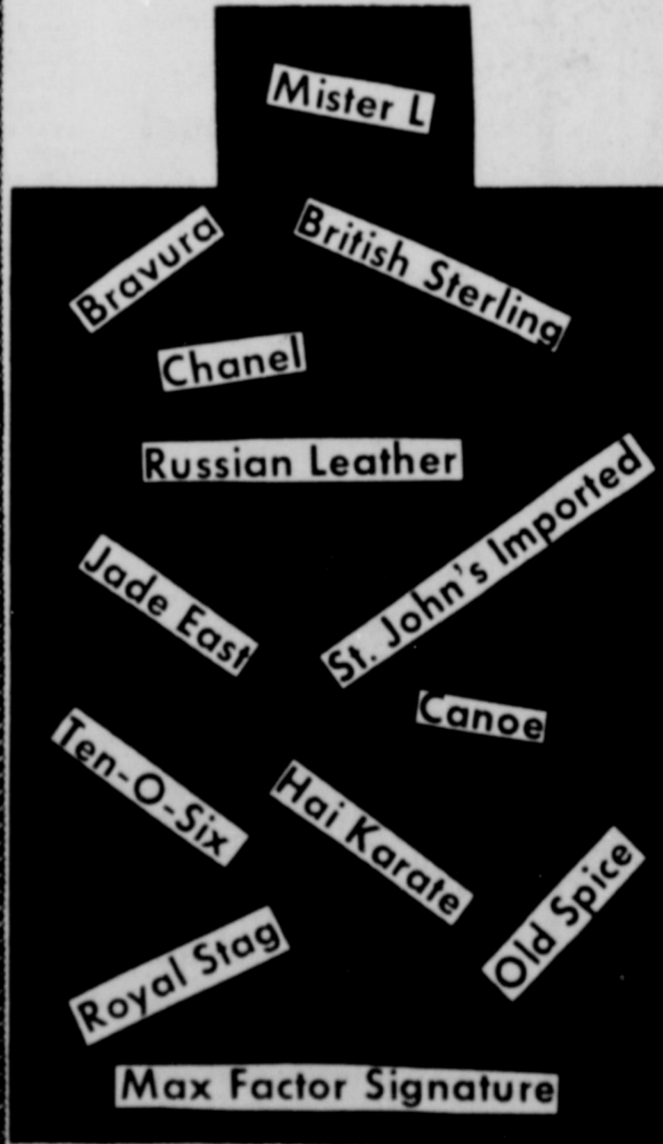

FAMILY POT LUCK

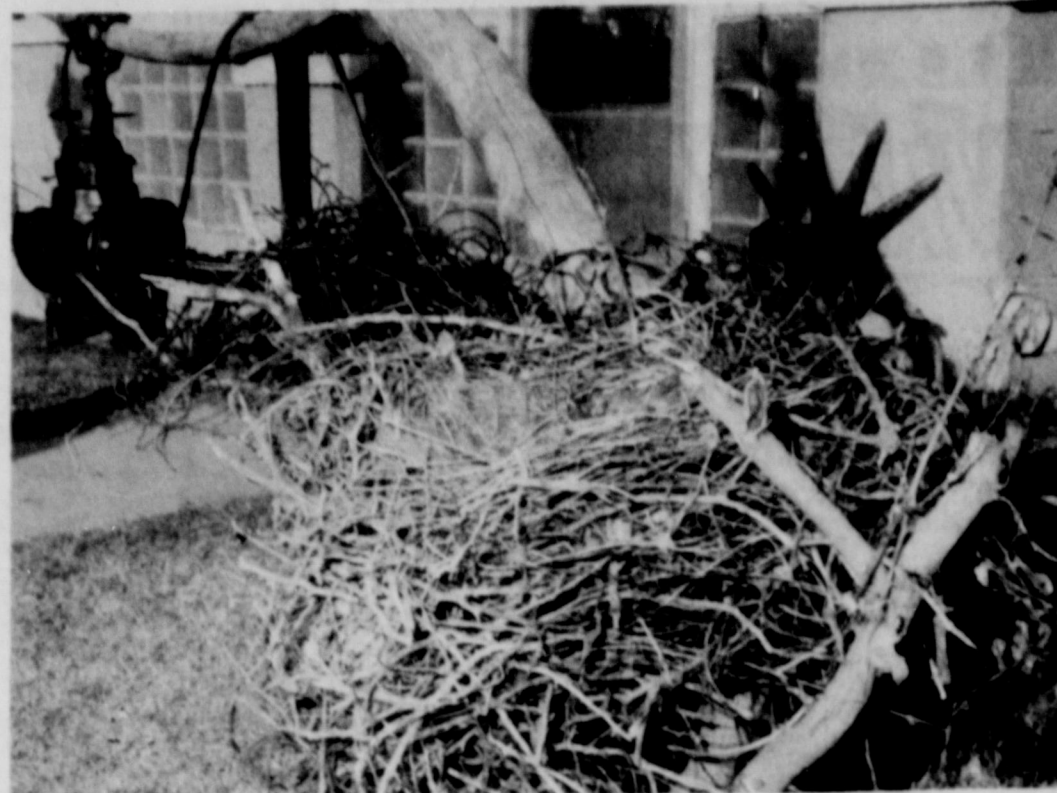

## Period Begins For Inspection Of Vehicles

The 1969 vehicle inspection period began Sept. 1 in Texas according to Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"More than six-million vehicles are expected to receive the compulsory inspection prior to the April 15, 1969 deadline," Speir said. Inspections may be performed at any of the almost 5,500 vehicle inspection stations in Texas, each of which displays the official vehicle inspection station sign. Texas law requires inspection of the brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the vehicle, steering (including power steering) and wheels and rims (not to include removal of the wheel from the vehicle) on all motor vehicles registered in the state. Special inspection provisions apply to trailers, semi-trailers, pole trailers or mobile homes having a loaded gross weight in excess of 4,000 pounds.

**ITEM:** Sweet peppers, often called "Bell peppers" because this is a leading type shaped like a bell, have more tang when mature but still green, more sweetness when completely ripe and red.

**ITEM:** Statistics indicate that teenagers spend about \$13 billion of their own money each year and that 15 to 18 per cent of that amount is spent on clothing.

Before laying linoleum, put it out in the sun for 6 or 8 hours. This makes it pliable, prevents wrinkling and cracking.

**ITEM:** Chlorine bleaches are safe on white and colorfast cottons and linens, white nylons, polyester, and acrylics. However, they must not be used on silk, wool, acetate, or most resin-treated fabrics because chlorine will damage these fabrics. Use a chlorine bleach only as needed to whiten the wash.

# America's Farmers Can Meet Challenge

Today one farm worker in the United States provides the food for himself and more than 42 others," said John G. McHaney, Extension economist at Texas A&M University, in commenting on National Farm-City Week, Nov. 22-28.

It is estimated that the last third of this century will add another 100 million Americans to today's population. But McHaney feels that through the combined efforts of all those associated with agriculture, the challenge to provide an agricul-

tural abundance for this expected large population increase can be met. The United States has had a strong agricultural economy for many years, and through efficient agricultural production has been able to release work-

ers to other industries in order that they might produce the other needs and wants of our people, he explained. Farmers and ranchmen today look to machinery and fuel producers for their power rather than raising work animals

and feed as they did years ago. This is only one example of how people in towns and cities are handling more of the jobs that once were done on the farm or ranch. These people are also a part of the agricultural industry, he emphasized.

Annual value of total agricultural production in Texas, he said, exceeds either the total manufacturing payroll, the total construction awards, or the total retail trade payroll. The efficient agricultural industry has been the foundation

of our economy and has helped Americans to have the highest level of living in the world. And, concluded the economist, National Farm-City Week is a good time for recognizing the achievements of agriculture and those who are a part.

Only one major provision of the 1969 cotton program - whether or not there will be a mandatory diversion feature - remained in serious doubt following the meeting of USDA's Cotton Advisory Committee meeting in Washington November 8.

Also in doubt, according to committee member Donald Johnson, is just how "major" that provision may be. Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., believes that the results from retaining this year's five per cent required diversion would be little or no different from those obtained by doing away with mandatory diversion.

"There is not much to choose from between the two alternatives," he said, "whether you look at it from the standpoint of producer income, government cost or total cotton production."

If mandatory diversion were retained producers would get about 11.26 cents per pound times the projected yield from five per cent of their allotments.

Abolishing mandatory diversion would eliminate this portion of producer payments, but the law would require an increase in price support payments made on the domestic portion (65 per cent) of allotments, which actually would make the producer's total payment slightly higher.

At the current parity rate, price support payments with a five per cent mandatory diversion would be made at the rate of 13.99 cents per pound of pro-

jected yield. Without mandatory diversion this payment would have to be raised to 14.72 cents per pound.

In terms of cotton production, the information gleaned from USDA's computers as well as from others in the industry would indicate that eliminating the five per cent mandatory diversion would increase 1969 production by only about 150,000 bales.

"And this amount of increased production is totally insignificant when you are looking at an expected crop of 12 or 13 or 14 million bales," Johnson said.

"It would not be substantial enough to affect either total supplies or market prices."

From a government cost angle, USDA calculates that elimination of the mandatory diversion feature would increase total direct payments by only about \$2 million, again a minute figure beside the expected overall cost in excess of \$700 million.

Other provisions of the program for 1969, almost certain to materialize, include a price support loan at 20.25 cents, the same as this year, but no voluntary diversion payments.

This year, producers were offered a payment of six cents per pound on projected yield from up to 30 per cent of their acreage allotments.

"Voluntary diversion payments were made in 1966, 1967, and 1968 as an incentive for producers to plant fewer acres," Johnson explained, "but with the disappearance of the

### More Cattle In Texas Feedlots

There were 1,007,000 head of cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in Texas on November 1, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is 34 percent above a year ago and 11 percent above the 907,000 on feed a month ago.

Placements into Texas feedlots during October totaled 282,000 head. These placements, from Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Nebraska.

Acres and production estimates for the world indicate an average yield per acre of 314 pounds, up from 299 pounds in 1967-68.

The U.S. crop is to be harvested from an estimated 10,318,000 acres, giving a per-acre yield of 508 pounds, compared with 447 pounds last year and a five-year average of 500 pounds.

On the consumption side, foreign free world cotton use in 1968-69 is expected to expand by about 400,000 bales while U.S. consumption is expected to drop below the 9 million bales used by domestic mills in 1967-68.

**Washington Leads Team  
Offensive Statistics**

Senior fullback Richard Washington claimed much of the offensive leadership in statistics for the 1968 Slaton Tiger football season.

Washington was the leading rusher, pass receiver, kickoff returner, and scorer. The swift fullback was far out front in rushing yardage with 872 in 180 carries. His average of 4.8 yards a carry was also tops. Junior halfback Larry Moore was second in rushing with 461 yards on 102 trips, followed by Nick Farrell with 260 in 59 carries. Both averaged better than 4 yards a trip.

Washington hauled in 17 passes for 375 yards. Next in line was Randal Partain with 8 catches for 87 yards. Quarterback Jimmy Williams had 544 yards passing but wound up with just 60 rushing yards after

losses from trying to pass. Washington and Moore was 1-2 kickoff and punt returns. Washington led in kickoff returns with 18 for 290 yards, and Moore returned 13 for 234 yards. In punt returns, Moore had 5 for 109 yards and Washington 8 for 90.

The Tiger fullback also led in pass interceptions with 3, while Williams and Morris Dixon had 2 each. Big Randal Choate led in fumble recoveries with 4, while Partain and Roy King had 2 each.

Dixon finished with a fine 34.5 yard punting average with 53 kicks in 10 games. Washington scored eight times to lead the scoring with 48 points. Farrell was next with 24.

As a team, Slaton averaged 240 yards a game with 186 from rushing and 54 passing.

The opponents averaged 332 yards a game with a 241 mean on running and 91 passing.

Washington was also the rushing leader last season, getting 901 yards in 9 games. The fullback carried only one time against Sweetwater this season, so his 872 yards were comparable to last year.

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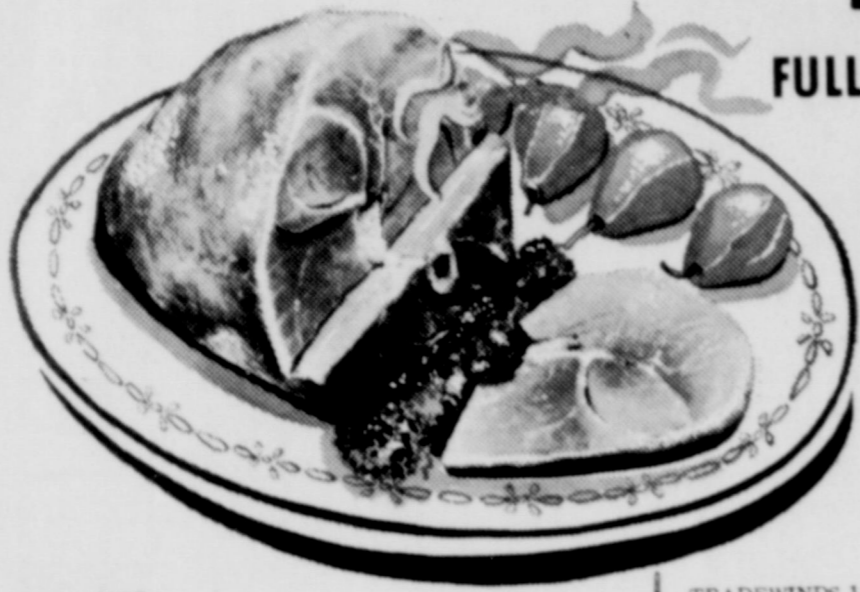

The victory for Coach Ernie Davis' crew gave them a 4-6 won-lost record in the tough 3-AAA race, good for 7th place in the 11-team district. Most sports observers had relegated the Tigers to the bottom of the ladder.

Washington and Williams closed out their SHS grid careers with fine performances against Levelland, Washington ripped off 131 yards on 31 carries, while Williams hit 7 of 11 passes for 118 yards and one score.

Standout jobs were turned in by other seniors, too, in making the last game a victory. Randall Choate and Brent Lamb, on one side, and Roy King and Randall Partain paved the way for most of Washington's big gains. Junior back Larry Moore also did a fine job blocking.

Brice Hill, who went both ways as a guard and linebacker, perhaps turned in his best game of the season. He was one of the outstanding defensive players. Guard John Petty and center Dennis Rushing completed the offensive line. Ronnie Romines and Allen McDonald also filled in at tackle spots on offense.

Romines, Lamb, Pettigrew and backs Hobby Chapple and Morris Dixon were key seniors in the defensive lineup, too. Romines had one of his best games of the year.  
Several juniors made prospects look good for next year. End Robert Englund turned in another top defensive game, making several "saving" tackles, and regulars Moore, Farrell and McDonald were impressive again, as was junior guard Ronnie Howard.

Williams had his best night of

the year throwing. His 7 of 11 completions and 118 yards were highs for the season. Sophomore quarterback Terry Mosser got a taste of varsity action in the closing seconds, as did sophomores Alan Fondy and Ted Dixon. Of the three, Dixon played the most as a defensive linebacker and turned in a fine job.

**FIRST QUARTER**  
Slaton took the opening kickoff and moved down the field with authority before a 15-yard clipping penalty stalled the drive on the Lobo 7-yard line. The Tigers kept the ball 16 plays before Levelland took over on its 21.

The teams exchanged punts, then another Tiger threat was hit with a 15-yard penalty. Larry Moore returned a punt 32 yards to the Lobo 33, but the penalty erased the run and put Slaton back on its own 30. The Tigers were stopped on a 4th-and try at the Lobo 49.

**SECOND QUARTER**  
Levelland then marched the 51 yards for their only score. Justin Lane led the Lobos on the drive and broke for the touchdown from 17 yards out. The kick was wide and Levelland led by 6-0 with 2:58 left in the first half.

Farrell was downed on the 6-yard line on the next kickoff. A 16-yard run by Washington, and a 16-yard run by Farrell got Slaton started on the long drive. Then, with seconds left, Williams hit 3 of 4 pass attempts to move the Tigers to the Lobo 12.

Williams hit Partain for 13 yards, Moore for 5, and Partain again for 18 to move the ball to the 12. Time was called with one second left and Pettigrew came in to try the field goal. The ball was placed on the 20, and Pettigrew kicked it

high and true for the 3 points. Slaton had picked up 10 first downs to only 5 for Levelland, and the Tigers had the ball for 36 plays to only 18 for the home team but Levelland led by 6-3. Washington had most of his yardage in the first half, carrying 21 times for 101 yards.

**THIRD QUARTER**  
Levelland took the second-half kickoff and drove to the Tiger 32, where a 4th-down try failed. The Tigers moved out to midfield and punted. Levelland made a first down, then had to punt to the Tiger 31.

The Tigers then took the lead with a 5-play drive that covered the 69 yards. Four plays netted 11 yards, then Williams found Washington open down the middle on a pass play. The Tiger fullback hauled the loss in at the Lobo 35 and dashed to the end zone.

**FOURTH QUARTER**

Washington pulled down a 14-yard pass from Williams on the next play, however, to put the ball on the Lobo 27. Moore and Washington got good gains, then Farrell cut across left tackle from 3 yards out to go over standing up. The kick was wide, but Slaton led by 15-6 with 3:28 left in the game. Levelland moved to the Tiger

The Wall Street Journal, in a recent article, stated that one large South Carolina mill is converting from 100% cotton to polyester - cotton blends. This mill group, which has been using about 20,000 bales of South Plains cotton per year, has gone from 24% blends in 1965, to 60% in 1969.

To you, the producers, who have worked so hard and spent so much to furnish the kind of cotton the market demands, this must be discouraging news.

It certainly is to us.

Why is this happening? What can be done to slow down the loss of markets for our cotton?

The mills say, it's because of the lack of a stable supply of usable cotton at reasonable prices.

The supply situation can only be solved by realistic legislation, which will allow increased production when the market can absorb it.

We believe you, as producers, have done or are doing all you can to produce usable cotton within the limits imposed by Mother Nature.

As to price, we once again urge you to sell for the free, consuming market whenever possible. If a reasonable price is not available, use the Form A loan until the market improves. Form A proved itself last year to be the most valuable mechanism for selling your equities.

BUT SELL IF AT ALL POSSIBLE. KEEP YOUR COTTON MOVING. A BALE SOLD TO AN INDEPENDENT MERCHANT IS A BALE USED, AND THIS IS THE BEST INSURANCE YOU CAN GET THAT COTTON WILL STILL BE AROUND NEXT YEAR.

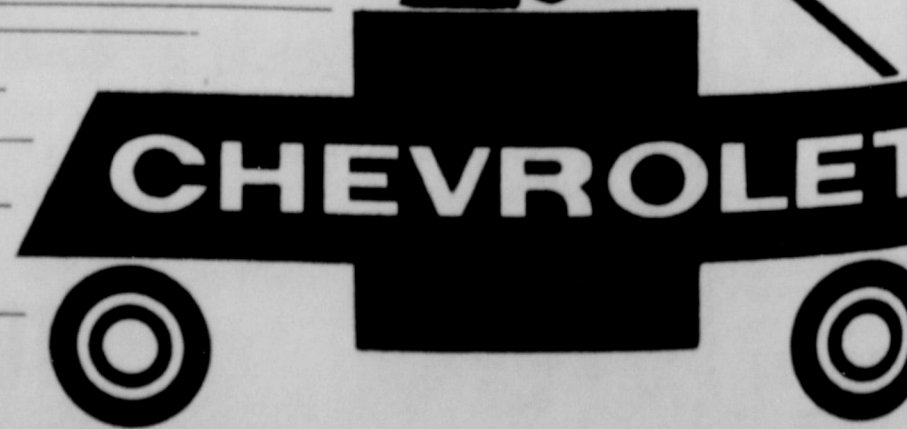
