



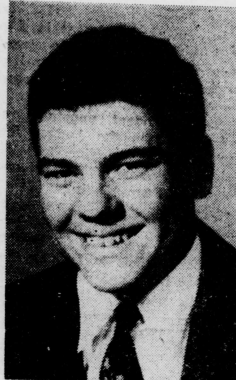

Playing the various parts in the play are the following seniors: Martha Johnson plays the leading role as "Ginger", who goes out for the high school football team. Butch Freeman will play the part of "Tommy Green", "Ginger's" boy friend. "Jeannie Carol", who is "Ginger's" 16-year-old sister, is played by Vaneta Lowery. Carol Birdsong will play the part of "Joan Carol", "Ginger's" 18-year-old sister. Annita Kirkham and James Byerly will play "Agnes and Howard Carol", the parents of the three girls. 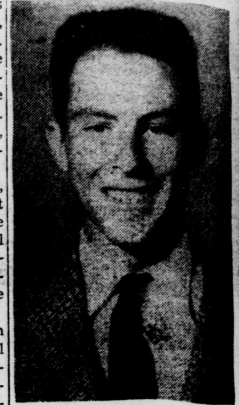

When it comes to eating, Dwayne prefers jumbo shrimp with french fries, salad, tea and banana pudding. Then top the evening off by taking a ride in

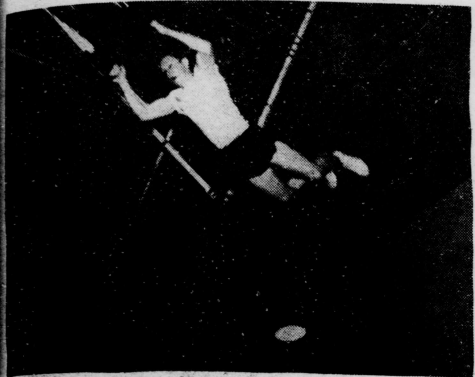

# JONES, DEAN, PHILLIPS WIN ON FITNESS TEST

The P. E. classes of all grades from the fourth through the high school level have just completed an individual physical fitness test and in the high school Jerry Jones won first place with 302 points based on 11 events, James Dean won second with 244 points, third place was held by Mike Phillips with 243 points, fourth place was captured by Sammy Shipman with 239 points, and in fifth place was Robert Taylor with 232 points.

These tests were given over a period of several days with two events being given each day and one on the final day. The average score for the Fourth and Fifth Grade boys was 192 points, the Sixth, Seventh, and Eighth Grades have not finished their tests and the average score for the high school was 172 points. This average was obtained by adding up all the points that the boys competing made and then dividing by the number of boys that took the test.

**VERY VERSATILE**  
Following is a list of the events that the boys did and where their points were given to them: pull-ups — one point for each pull-up, no time limit; push-ups — one point for each push-up, no time limit; rope climb — hand over hand, 20 points if climbed all the way to the top; sit-ups — one point for each five sit-ups five minute time limit; 50 yard dash — 6.5 seconds and under — 20 points, 6.6 to 6.9 seconds 15 points, 7 to 7.5 seconds — 10 points, 7.6 to 8 seconds — five points, and over 8 seconds received no points; 100 yard dash — 12.5 seconds and under — 20 points, 12.6 to 13 seconds — 15 points, 13.1 to 13.5 seconds — 10 points, 13.6 to 14 seconds — five points, and over 14 seconds received no points; standing broad jump — one point for each six inches jumped.

Shot put — one point for each foot thrown; sargent jump — one for each inch jumped; suspension — one point for each five seconds suspended; and coordination test — 20 seconds and under — 20 points, 20.1 to 20.5 seconds — 15 points, 20.6 to 21 seconds — 10 points, 21.1 to 22 seconds — five points and over 22 seconds received no points. This test consisted of jumping over a gym horse, walking across the parallel bars with their hands, turning a backwards and forwards somersault, circling a chair twice and then returning to where they started from.

Starting this year, this test will be given each year and a chart will be kept on the younger boys to see how much improvement they have made and what field they need to work the most in.

In the next issue of this paper there will be a picture of the three winners in the high school division.

#### SPEECH II CLASS TO GIVE 1-ACT PLAY

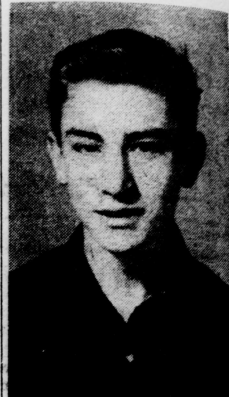

The pants are only to hold the pads in place and for modesty, because after you get on these pads you have the average of two suits of clothes.

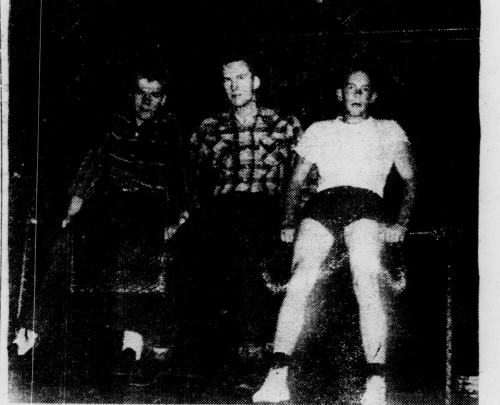
The jersey is only a place to put a number to let the fans know who is on the field in

In the summer of 1956, Dr. Amos arranged an audition for him with Fred Waring. He was accepted and has been with the Waring organization ever since.

The Waring organization's headquarters is located at Shawnee, Ok. The Delaware, Pennsylvania. It was there in the summer of 1957 that the Pennsylvania substituted for the Gary Moore Show on television. While doing the show the group would arise at 5 a.m. practice until the show began at 10 a.m., and then practice eight hours more after the show.

On the average the Pennsylvania practices about eight hours a day. Mr. Kidd states that Fred Waring is a task master and a perfectionist, but that he is a very fine man and a great musical leader.

After the war, Mr. Wilkinson was assistant coach at Oklahoma for two years under the head coach, Jim Tatum. When Tatum left in 1947, Mr. Wilkinson took over as head coach.

Since he took over as head coach at Oklahoma, Mr. Wilkinson's teams have either won or tied for the Big Seven Conference championship. He has had three national football champions.

Last year Oklahoma lost just one game — against Notre Dame — and finished the season rated as the second best football team in the United States.

Much of Mr. Wilkinson's success has been due to his recruiting ability. He has been able to obtain top-flight football players from all the surrounding states, especially Texas.

Part of the reason for this success in recruiting is because most boys want to play on a winning, nationally recognized team. Besides this fact, the University of Oklahoma is one of the nation's finest educational institutions.

Dan Anderson, Crane High football coach, who has played under Mr. Wilkinson, says he expects the Oklahoma coach to be in Crane some time next week.

### J. McKee, Teacher Has Knee Surgery

John McLean, science teacher of CHS, underwent a surgery on his knee Thursday, April 3, in the Crane Memorial Hospital. Dr. Robinson, a bone specialist from Kermit, was the surgeon.

A recent study of the home room programs in C. H. S. revealed that the programs are taking an upward swing in educational subjects.

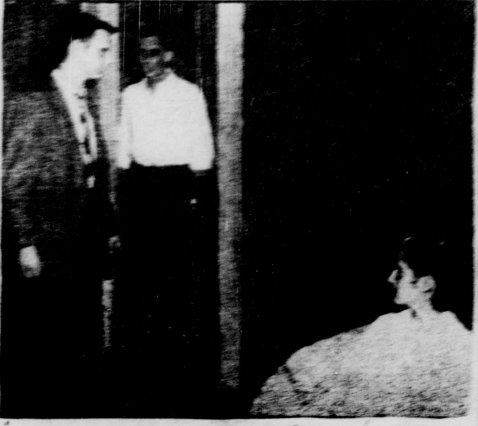
