Robert R. Chambers, 82, of Cross Plains, died at his home here Saturday morning at 11:55 p.m. in a Brownsville hospital after an illness of several weeks.

Chambers was a brother of J. B. Chambers of May, Texas, and a brother-in-law of the late J. B. Chambers of May, Texas.

He was also a member of the Cross Plains community.

He had been a resident of Brownsville for 58 years.

Funeral services were held Sunday at 10:30 a.m. at Wolf Church, near May, Rev. W. R. Anderson officiating.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary R. Chambers; two sons, Nor-

ris Chambers of Fort Worth, Texas; S. Chambers of Cross Plains; and three daughters, Mrs. Deana Chambers of Brownwood; three sons, Rep. W. R. Chambers and

roy of May; nine grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

His survivors were nephews.

50 First Graders Start School Monday Morning

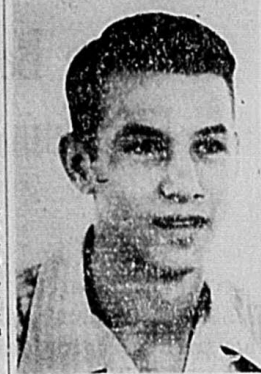
Fifty local students experienced one of the biggest days of their lives Monday. It was their first at school.

Local Farmers Will Get Over \$600,000. From Peanut Crops

A peanut crop expected to bring over \$600,000 will begin moving to market here in another week or 10 days, the Review was told by local buyers Monday morning.

Protracted wet weather would delay movement of early nuts but likely aid maturity of late crops.

Prices this year will be from \$6 to \$8 per ton higher than last year and a yield of about the same size is anticipated for the Cross Plains trade territory. Last year 2,917 tons were handled by local buyers.

Government graders will again headquarter in Cross Plains and the procedure of selling will be the same as in 1949. At least four buyers will be in the market here.

Recent rains have been a boon to peanuts and farmers are jubilant regarding prospects. In some localities, though, the rains have been so abundant that farmers have been unable to keep the weeds from hindering vines. A larger than normal hay crop is forecast.

4 LOCAL MEN HOME FROM FISHING TRIP IN MEXICO

A fresh water lobster brought here last week by Bill and Russell Calhoun, Neal and N. L. Dillard, from the San Diego river, 15 miles south of Villa Acuna, in Old Mexico, attracted much attention in town Tuesday morning.

The lobster, which resembled an overgrown crayfish, had forearms 11 1/2 inches long, on the end of which were giant pinchers.

The Cross Plains men also brought home a 25 pound catfish.

Murders And Gunfighting Were Common Occurrences At Cottonwood In Early Days

Few frontier communities saw more gunplay in the early days than did Cottonwood which once had two saloons and a half dozen mercantile concerns.

Andy Hudson, 80, and H. L. Breeding 84, long time residents of this section, got together one day recently and reminisced of the early days and tragedies which ravished the Cottonwood locale. They point out that some of the shooting probably took place at the shooting range, but to-escaped their recollections but-together they were able to recount

nine murders in the little community which never had 400 people.

First man to die from gunshot was Gabe Starr, who was slain by Bill Heyser. He was killed at a dance and his grave is the second in the Cottonwood cemetery, the first having been made for an infant sister of Mr. Breeding and Mrs. Minnie Shuford, a short while before.

Second and third men killed at Cottonwood died almost instan-

aneously. They were Jule Haggler and Wash Bowen. They were shot by a man named Moss, who had come to Cottonwood from the Indian Territory. The trouble started around a saloon and the shooting took place on Cottonwood's Main Street, which was then several hundred yards east of the present site.

Cottonwood's next murder was also a double barreled affair. Two merchants, named Franks and Jones, had a difference and set-

led the dispute with pistols. Both were fatally shot and died only a few minutes apart. Franks and Jones were buried in the same grave in the little Cottonwood cemetery.

Still another double death was to be experienced in the bustling little town. A man named Vaughn fatally stabbed Jim Champion. Vaughn then took to the woods and after a couple of days ended his own life with a gun.

Lots Of Threats But Little Rain

A protracted wet spell which moved in with the second day of September and remained for an extended stay had yielded little water up to Tuesday at noon, the Review learned in a check-up with S. P. Bond, official government observer here.

Bond's readings which are taken each morning at seven o'clock were as follows: Sunday .12, Monday .25 and Tuesday .06.

County Post Offices To Lose About \$29,328.48 This Year

For taxpayers of Callahan County the \$558,000,000 deficit of the Post Office Department in the Federal fiscal year which ended June 30 will mean approximately \$29,328.48 in terms of general Federal taxes, according to releases here today by the Council of State Chambers of Commerce.

The study explained that this figure is Callahan County's proportion of Texas' share of the overall loss sustained by taxpayers through the failure of the Federal Government to run the Post Office within its income.

The Council's study showed that except for a few scattered years the Post Office has been

doing business at a loss for 60 years. Since the end of World War II these losses were found to total \$1,758,044,299 which means roughly an extra tax of \$12 for every man, woman and child in the United States.

Support for an effort in Congress to cut \$28,017,000 off the \$555,000,000 postal deficit expected this year was urged in the study. It recalled that in expectation of this cut Postmaster General Donaldson in April ordered such economies as a reduction from two to one in the number of mail deliveries daily in residential areas, fewer mail box collections, etc.

But the House of Representatives recently voted against these economies, etc. Whether they will stick remains up to the Senate.

In addition to this 28 million dollar saving, the study urged the Hoover Commission recommendations for putting the Post Office on a business-like basis be carried out.

Finding the Post Office and the Bell Telephone System comparable in size, number of employees and the nature of their services (communications), the study observed that the private enterprise operated at a profit and paid Federal, State and local taxes last year totaling \$346,144,000. It also pointed out that the Bell System acted as tax gatherer for the Government, collecting from subscribers and other users \$445,000,000 last year in Federal excise taxes on telephone calls.

30 YEARS AGO September 17, 1920

Meritt Dill of the Hilburn oil field has bought the north half of the J. J. Simpson farm from M. E. Wakefield and will move to the same for a home.

Bluford Webb and Andy Hudson shipped a car of 80 hogs to the stock yards at Fort Worth this week. The hogs were in good condition, and would average about 150 pounds. This was the first car shipped from this place in twelve months or more.

Messrs. M. E. Wakefield and C. C. Neeb are figuring on a franchise from the city to lay pipe lines for furnishing gas to the town. They state that their idea, at present, is to give the proposition a try out. Only the main streets of the town will be served, and if it proves profitable, they will enlarge the system later.

25 YEARS AGO September 18, 1925

F. M. Gwin, secretary of the Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce, arranged an attractive oil field exhibit at the county fair at Baird, and many favorable comments were passed on it.

15 YEARS AGO September 6, 1935

A well that is expected to open a new pool was brought in early Sunday morning on the Armstrong tract, eight miles southeast of here. The pay was struck at 1,405 feet in the Cross Cut sand. Production has been estimated at 20 barrels per day.

Defying an intermittent deluge of rain, J. T. Hammett, Philpott ace, celebrated his nineteenth birthday Sunday by defeating Sam Conner one up for honors of the Eastland Country Club invitation tournament.

The completed check on all cotton plantings in Callahan County for the year 1933 shows 30,829 acres. There are a total of 1228 farms which have made application for tax exemption certificates.

Cross Plains schools will open Monday morning at nine o'clock, with initial exercises for students and patrons in the high school auditorium. The faculty of 19 teachers was complete, with one exception, and this vacancy is expected to be filled by the end of the week.

10 YEARS AGO September 6, 1940

A new Ford agency was opened in Cross Plains this week. The establishment, to be known as the J. D. Motor Co., is housed in the building formerly occupied by Charlie McCowen.

A complete remodeling process is being completed on the interior of the Ideal Barber Shop on South Main Street. A new floor covering has just been laid and all fixtures and walls painted snow white.

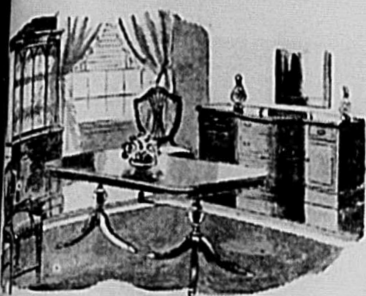

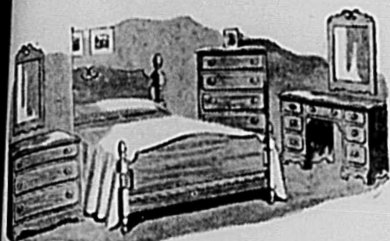

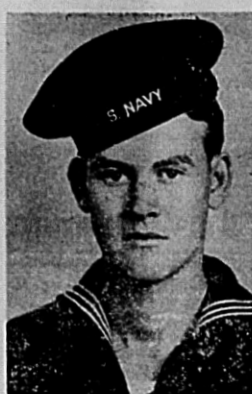
