H. H. Barron, Pioneer Resident Died Friday

Dawson County lost another prominent pioneer in the death of H. H. Barron, who passed away at 7:45 o'clock last Friday morning, May 29, in a Big Spring hospital.

Mr. Barron suffered a stroke last Thursday night while in Big Spring. He was rushed to a hospital where he passed away.

Holman Hartsfield Barron was born on February 16, 1875, in Bell County. In his early life he moved to Grimes County, where he married Miss Valettie Guerrant, and to this union seven children were born, of which five survive.

In the fall of the year of 1905, Mr. and Mrs. Barron moved to Dawson County. This being the year the county was organized. Mr. Barron has had a part in the growth of both the county and city. Upon arriving in this section he purchased land, part of which he still resided on. In the fall of 1906, he made his first crop in Dawson County. The first years of Mr. and Mrs. Barron's residence here were not easy ones, but they did not give up, and as other pioneers won out, Mr. Barron was known throughout this section as an excellent farmer and business man.

Throughout the years he has been a constant worker with the Masonic Lodge, serving two consecutive terms from 1908 to 1910, as master of the lodge. He was the only man in Dawson County to hold a life certificate in Blue Lodge work.

Mr. Barron was a firm believer in his friends, he would never let a friend down. He always spoke out for what he thought right, and friends seeking advice always found his judgement to be the best.

Funeral services were held at 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon, May 30, at the First Baptist Church, with the pastor, Rev. E. F. Cole officiating, assisted by Rev. Berry Baker and Rev. Willie Lee. Burial was made in the Lamesa Cemetery with the Masonic Lodge in charge.

When turned to the State Highway Department for acceptance, Highway 15 from the overpass east to the Fisher County line will be a modern roadbed—oil surfaced, asphalted and covered with the necessary blanket of chat.

Motorists of Scurry, Fisher, Borden and nearby counties have expressed a considerable amount of enthusiasm the past several days over this part of Highway 15—especially since it will close a gap, that has proved "tough going" in bad weather for many years.

In western Fisher County, Cage Brothers and L. A. Turner, contractors, are reported to be making progress with dirt work on the 11-mile strip of Highway 15 from the Scurry - Fisher County line eastward to asphalt five miles west of Roby.

Cage Brothers have considerably more equipment on the western Fisher County job than was used on any Scurry County construction job, and are expected to finish dirt work sometime next week. Oil surfacing and asphalt coat are expected to follow as soon as possible.

In Borden County, McKnown & Son, contractors on the 30.2 mile length of Highway 15 across Borden County, were said Wednesday to be pushing oil surface work between the Dawson County line and Gail. McKnown & Son have placed oil surfacing on the East-West Highway from Gail east to the Scurry County line, and will finish the same type of work from Gail west to the Dawson line in the near future. Service Men Can Vote In Texas Primary

E. B. Germany, chairman of the executive committee of the state Democratic party, ruled today that soldiers and sailors are not disqualified from participating in the Democratic primary.

"The Democratic party is not restricted by the federal statutes except that they must not practice fraud in any way," Germany said. "The party is the sole judge of its membership and there is likewise the sole judge of the qualifications for voters in the primary. The Democratic party has a right to permit anyone to vote who is a citizen of the United States, and of the State of Texas."

Can Vote Absentee
"Therefore, there is no restriction against soldiers voting, by means of absentee ballot of necessity."

"I am sure the entire executive committee will uphold me in this interpretation." Germany's statement came in response to proposals by James V. Allred and Dan Moody, candidates for the United States Senate, that soldiers be granted the right to vote in the primary.

Civil Service Exam For Postal Work Open

The United States Civil Service Commission announces open competitive examination for the position of Letterer and Gainer, \$9.84, \$9.36, \$8.88 per diem, for employment with the U. S. Naval Air Station, Corpus Christi, Texas.

The minimum age limit for this examination is 20 years. There is no maximum.

Competitors will not be required to report to any place for a written examination, but ratings will be based on information in the application, subject to corroboration.

Big Spring Gets Second Flying School To Date

Big Spring is likely to become quite an aviation center since in addition to being designated for the location of a U. S. Bombardier School to cost in excess of \$5,000,000—a second flying school has been designated to be established north of Big Spring for pre-primary flight training. Art Wintheiser who has been conducting the Big Spring Flight Service for training pilots for CAA at the municipal airport is to be instructor while Lieut. W. E. Grass is to be commander and Lieut. Arthur L. Batten is to be adjutant. Fields are now being prepared on the M. L. Hamlin ranch near Luther and on Mrs. Mildred Jones' section just west of Ackery and training is to begin on June 1. The first group of students will be housed at a local hotel until dormitories can be built and Mr. Wintheiser is on a deal to purchase a hanger.

As we understand it non-commissioned officers of the U. S. Army are to be given 30 hours of flight training and then are transferred to the Glider School north of Lamesa for further training.

Col. Sam L. Ellis who is to be commandant of the Big Spring Bombardier School arrived in Big Spring last Monday and is maintaining an office at the City Hall for the present. Policy Of Work Or Fight Is Adopted By U. S.

By FANCIS M. LE MAY
Associated Press Staff Writer

WASHINGTON —Apparently aiming at complete mobilization of this nation's labor resources, Manpower Chief Paul V. McNutt announced a "work or fight" policy for all workers refusing "suitable employment" in war plants.

The far-reaching policy brings to bear the full force of the draft law to reinforce the drive for workmen in the plants turning out materials for victory.

"If a worker refuses to accept suitable employment in a war industry without reasonable cause," McNutt said, "it would of course be the duty of the United States Employment service to report the circumstances to the selective service system for consideration in connection with any request for deferment on occupational grounds."

The action recalled similar measures of the first World War, when provost marshal announced that every man of draft age after July 1, 1918 "must work or fight."

Today's announcement followed closely a "freezing" of essential workers in critical war industries to their present jobs, in a move to stop "pirating" of labor among war plants through competitive wage bidding.

To Few Occupations

McNutt said today this policy probably would apply immediately only to a few critical occupations in a small number of war plant areas where manpower conditions are particularly critical.

He emphasized that no restrictions would be placed upon the freedom of a worker to work where he chooses, except that he would be expected to get any new job requiring a critical skill only through the federal employment service.

In the event an employer engaged in "pirating" and failed to discontinue such methods of obtaining skilled workers, after a warning from the employment service, the hiring agency would report the case to the Manpower commission, the WPB, the War and Navy departments, and other authoritative agencies for "appropriate action," McNutt said.

WEANED PIGS CAN BE FATTENED QUICKLY ON GOOD RATION

Weaned pigs can be forced to about 100 pounds weight cheaply and quickly if they are put on such a ration and have access to a self-feeder filled with:

Ground threshed grain—60 lbs.
Finely ground oats—15 lbs.
Wheat gray shorts—15 lbs.
Tankage—5 lbs.
Cottonseed meal—5 pounds.
Limestone flour—1 1-2 lbs.
Salt—1-2 lb.

When pigs reach 100 pounds in weight then put in dry lot, and give grain and protein supplement in a self-feeder.

First Glider Cadets Arrive; Training To Begin Soon

Actual training of glider pilots will get underway at the Lamesa Glider School sometime this week, according to Peter K. Wilson, official of the school. Gliders will be shipped in by rail and will be assembled here. The planes that will be used in operating the school will be flown in.

The first student pilots arrived Sunday and others will arrive within the next few days. Twelve students will be trained during June.

A number of military personnel have arrived, also a large number of army trucks and jeeps are here to be used at the school, with more arriving each day. Offices of the army and school have been temporarily opened in the old Ford Motor Company Building.

Younger Engineering Company of San Antonio have the building contract and will probably start moving material to the glider field today, Monday. They have 60 days to complete the project. The site has been grubbed and cleaned off, and this week will be rolled, preparatory for actual training.

Until housing facilities are completed at the glider field student pilots will live in the Burnside home, here, which will be later a home for army officers.

The Lamesa Glider School is located on two sections of land 7 miles north of Lamesa.

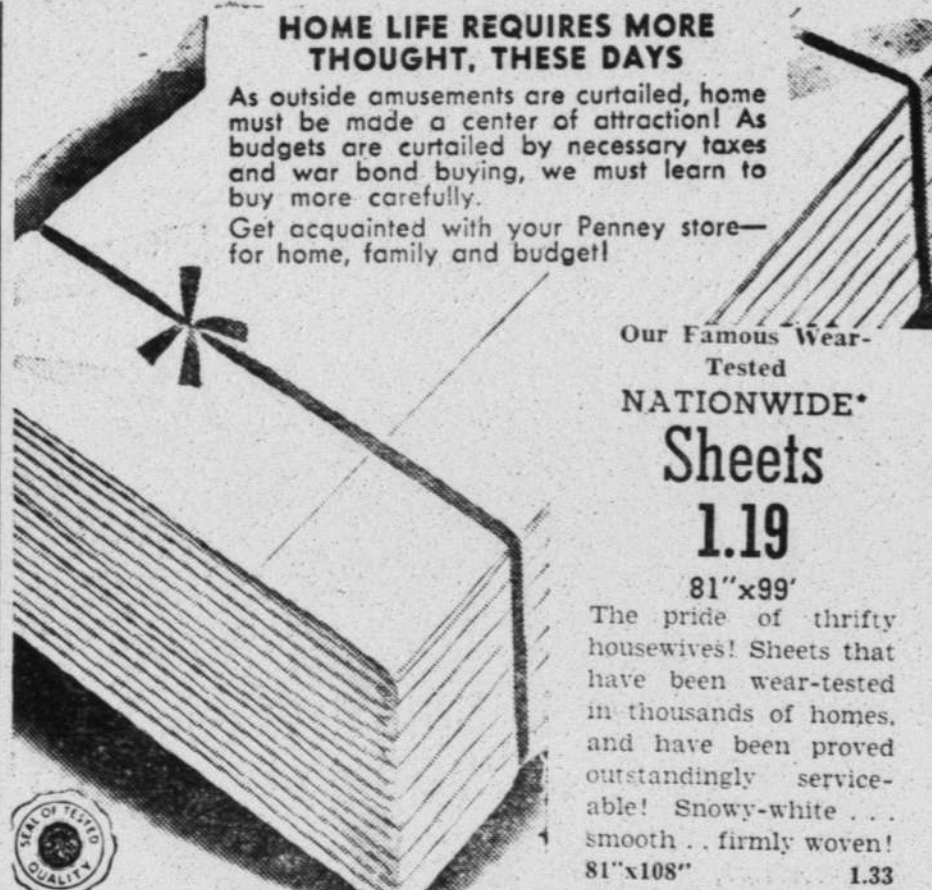
