Baptist Debt Is Paid In Full

The last remnant of debts owed by the Baptist General Convention of Texas will be wiped out, with the burning of final notes, at a convention board meeting here April 6, it was announced Wednesday afternoon by Dr. W. W. Melton, executive secretary, as he left for the annual midwinter meeting of Southern Baptist State Secretaries, in West Palm Beach, Florida.

More than 2400 Texas Baptists churches participated in the victory debt-paying campaign last fall, Dr. Melton said, and this resulted in raising \$365,000 of the \$400,000 needed to wipe the slate clean of debts on the general convention as such. These debts had been steadily reduced from \$2,000,000 (two million dollars) a few years ago to \$100,000 at the start of last fall's campaign.

B. J. WATERS FUNERAL IS HELD AT COUNTY LINE

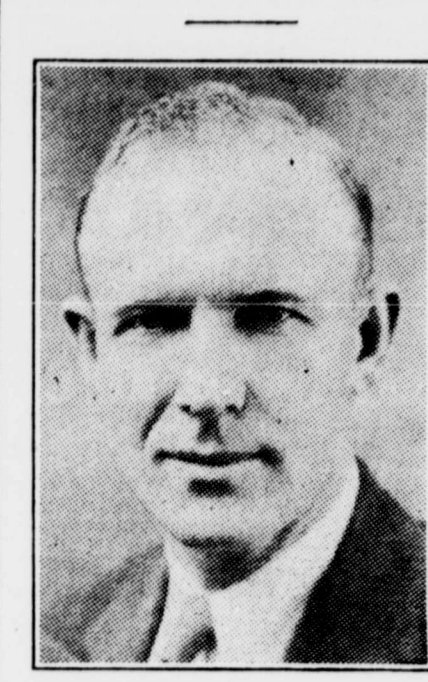
VALIDATION STAMP LEFT OFF SOME RATIONING BOOKS

If not, the books are not any good to you and you should return them to the officials in charge of registration in your community for the valid stamp. Grocers cannot sell foods if the books do not have the stamps, and they are urged to watch for such books, and instruct the owners to go to their local school superintendent to have the official stamp attached.

Farm Youth of U. S. Looks to Tomorrow

TOMORROW'S farmers and farm homemakers are second to no school group in their enthusiasm for investing in War Bonds and Stamps to make sure their future is secure. Through the Schools At War program they are investing what they save and earn in War Stamps and Bonds.

THE MEN IN SERVICE WRITE HOME

Dear Buford:

I just got a copy of the Abernathy Weekly Review. The Review is just like a long letter from home. I get it on Wednesday of each week. The paper is one way in which the men in service can find out where their friends are stationed. I am beginning to like California. The climate isn't quite like it is in Texas and the weather changes all at once. Saturday afternoon it was hot. The sun was shining and it was like a spring day. And, all at once, it began to rain and it has been raining ever since. I guess you are having West Texas sand storms in Abernathy now. I'm now working in the officers' mess hall. Everyone from a second lieutenant to a colonel eats here. I wait on tables. I don't go on hikes with the company or I don't drill. The reason I was put on the officers' mess was because I had already had the drilling. So you can see what little Home Guard drilling I got surely did help me. I work three hours a day and the rest of the time I am off. I see a lot of Weldon Crow. When we first came to this camp, Weldon and I were in the same company. "L." We both moved from "L." He is in "F" company and I am in Headquarters company. He and I talk about Abernathy a lot.

I have been swimming in the ocean

three times. The ocean is the largest body of water I have ever seen. It is a lot larger than the lakes around Abernathy. I was quite a thrill the first time I saw it from a train. The sun was setting across the waves and it was a beautiful sight. One I will never forget. There are two beaches close to the camp. Pismo Beach is a town on the ocean shore. It has a wonderful beach.

You can swim, go boating, fishing, surf boat riding, play in the sand, dig for clams, etc. That is one place where you can do almost anything. I will say so long for now. Tell the people of Abernathy hello. Thanks for sending me the Review, and tell Mrs. Hurst thanks, also. Your brother, Pvt. Walter L. Rutledge, Hdq. I owe you a very deep apology for not writing more than I have, but for the first time in the last 4 or 5 months things are beginning to settle down and take up some of the regular old routine duty. I am sorry about the picture but we are quarantined and have been for the last 2 1/2 weeks. We only have two more weeks to go before we get out and as soon as possible I will have a picture made and send it to you.

You may be interested in knowing that when I arrived and reported to duty in the 751st F. A. Bn., all we had in the whole battalion was about half enough officers and three-fourths of the non commissioned officers and then they sent us about

Rationing Calendar

RATION BOOKS

War Ration Book No. 1—Used for sugar, coffee and shoes.

War Ration Book No. 2 — Blue stamps now being used for rationed processed foods. (See chart in your grocers' stores.)

Mileage Ration Books — Books A, B and C used for passenger car gasoline; E and R books for non-highway uses; D for motorcycles; T for trucks, pick-ups and commercial vehicles.

RATIONED ARTICLES

Sugar — Stamp No. 11 in Book 1 good for 3 lbs. until midnight, March 15. Stamp No. 12 good for 5 lbs. until the end of May.

Coffee—Stamp No. 25 in Book 1 (for those 14 years old or older on the date book was issued) good for 1 lb. until midnight, March 21.

Shoes—Stamp No. 17 in Book 1 is good for 1 pair of shoes through June 15. (This stamp can be used by others in the same family living in whose name the book is issued.)

Meat — Voluntary share-the-meat program sets limit at 2½ lbs. per person per week. Meat will be rationed under point system in few weeks.

Processed foods — Blue A, B and C stamps (48 points) in War Ration Book 2 good for purchase of rationed processed foods until midnight, Mar. 31.

MILEAGE RATIONING

Gasoline — Value of each coupon in A, B and C books is 4 gallons. The OPA ration board office is in second second 8 coupons in A book are good floor, county courthouse.

until midnight, March 21. Those who think they are eligible for supplementary rations should see W. A. Richter, Abernathy, or Mrs. Cliff H. Foraker, Tuesday afternoons or all day Saturdays, at city hall, Hale Center, or county board, Plainview.

Tire Inspection — All A book holders must have first official tire inspections by March 31. Subsequent inspections for A book holders is to be once every 6 months. B book holders must have second tire inspection by June 30. C bookholders must have second tire inspection by May 31, and second official tire inspection for T book holders must be made 60 days from Feb. 28, or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.

Tires — If official tire inspection recommends a tire replacement, apply to local ration board for tire ration certificate. Tires will be rationed to all on basis of tire inspections and county quotas available, most essential mileage to come first. Recaps can now be secured without rationing certificates.

OTHER RATIONING

Eligible purchasers needing new automobiles, bicycles, typewriters, rubber footwear and other commodities on which sales might be restricted, should see their local ration board or local community ration adviser.

Farm machinery — See your county agent for ration certificates to buy certain rationed equipment, and also, certain kinds of building materials. Hale county farm ration board headquarters is in agriculture building, courthouse square, Plainview.
