GLAD TO HEAR IT.—The Galveston Dispatch is convinced that the Chataanooga, Mobile and New Orleans railroad will be completed at an early day in Houston.

THE citizens of La Grange have held a railroad meeting and organized a committee in each precinct to raise \$100,000 in bonds to pay for the Chataanooga Railroad Company when the road is finished to their town.

SAILING UNDER BARE POLES.—The Houston Telegraph flies at its mast-head, the naked name of Jack Hamilton. Why don't you hoist the Austin Republican ticket Mr. Webb?

THE Austin Republican is the only one of the Democratic papers in the State that dies a fall to Jack Hamilton's kite. The Republican publishes what it calls a full "Republican State ticket."

IT HURTS.—A great cry is being raised over the State because the Republican party has harmonized and left out of its platform many issues about which good Republicans might honestly differ.

THAT lively democratic organ the Austin Republican, is striving very hard to make it appear criminal in General Davis to accept the nomination of the re-organized and harmonized Republican party. Davis ought to have pleased the democrats by refusing to be a candidate.

MISOMERS.—In the city of St. Louis, the leading Democratic paper is called "The Republican" and the leading Republican paper "The Democrat." Is it Texas we have a Democratic paper calling itself "the Austin Republican."

CAMPAIGN FALSHOODS.—It will be necessary, as the canvass proceeds, for the so-called Conservative party to use a great deal of falsehood and slander in order to blacken the good name of the Republican ticket. We can heartily recommend the Confederate newspaper of this city as being perfectly reliable in this respect.

The Republican Platform as adopted at Houston.

The first work after organization of the Republican State Convention, was the adoption of a platform, which will be found in another place in our paper. The prominent features of this platform are: 1st. The endorsement of the Reconstruction Acts of Congress, including the 14th and 15th amendments to the Constitution. 2nd. A welcome to those who served in the late rebellion, but who now co-operate with the loyal men in reconstruction. 3rd. An affirmation in favor of paying the National debt. 4th. In favor of Internal Improvements and immigration, and against the use of forceful terms towards strangers. 5th. Recommendation that the Constitution be ratified. 6th. A warning to the people of the insidious design to surrender the State to the disloyal. 7th. Endorsement of Gen. Grant and Congress. Such, in brief, are the main points of the Republican State platform. The disturbing questions which have caused a great diversity of opinion among Republicans, were left out of the platform, and the standard bearers of the party put into the field without the weight of a side issue to retard their career.

It was confidently hoped and expected by the enemies of the Republican party, that a platform with planks favoring a division of the State, as in the disfranchisement, and against the adoption of the Constitution, with a mixed ticket, would be the result of the labors of the Convention.

That all these questions were left to take care of themselves outside of the platform of a party which claims to stand upon a national basis, proves that the Convention was impelled by an earnest desire to harmonize and consolidate the party, and the only fault that can be found with this platform, by the enemies of the Republican party, is that it is broad enough to hold every loyal man in the State.

We invite a careful reading and an unprejudiced judgment of this platform. It is the only party platform now presented to the consideration of the people of Texas; upon it stands the Republican State ticket, and pledged to it is the party which alone can give us reconstruction and peace.

HON. M. C. HAMILTON. — Mr. Morgan Hamilton does not approve of the platform adopted at Houston by the Republican State convention, because it recommends the ratification of the Constitution, and has written a letter refusing to serve on the State Executive Committee. In a private letter to the editor of this paper, Mr. Hamilton says: "I shall vote for the ticket and against the Constitution." As the canvass advances, we hope Mr. Hamilton will deem it best to give the party his active support. At least the charge of the Republican party keeping up a family quarrel, can no longer be made, and Judge Hamilton, the Democratic candidate for Governor, will have no further cause for his tirades against his brother.

OUT of the twenty or thirty weekly newspapers that are published east of the Trinity river in Texas, only one (Jimplicute) floats the Jack Hamilton colors. If Colossal Jack is the "People's Candidate" over this way, we can't see it! — Bonham News.

DAVID Kilton, who died near Cleveland recently, at the age of eighty years, served for three years in the war of 1812, in a company of light dragoons, under Captain Butler, father of General B. F. Butler. His principal service was upon the Canada frontier, in the vicinity of Lake Champlain.

THE whistle of the locomotive will soon be heard in Persia, where an English company has recently obtained from the Shah the exclusive right for a term of years to build railroads throughout his empire. The first road constructed will be from Teheran to a place called Ray, distant only about six miles from the capitol, where its richer inhabitants spend a part of the year, and the cost of which will not exceed £100,000.
