LIER WEARS GLASSES FOR HIS DISGUISE

NEED OF GASOLINE IS FATAL TO COLONEL'S SCHEME TO HIDE

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 3.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh and his bride, who was Miss Anne Morrow, went to sea for their honeymoon. In a new 38-foot motor boat, the Mouette, they have been cruising in Long Island sound, since their marriage at Englewood, N. J., a week ago, probably tying up in some quiet harbor along the Long Island shore each night.

Just at present it is believed the Mouette is off the tip of Long Island and heading for Boston in a leisurely way.

Admits His Identity
On Saturday afternoon a new boat with a tall, light haired young man at the wheel, put in at Block Island for gas and oil, and Captain Louis Rounds of the Elizabeth Ann gave him a helping hand to tie up in the pilot house there was an exchange of seafaring and other talk, and the yachtsman admitted to Captain Rounds that he was the Colonel.

The Mouette was supplied with necessities, and Colonel Lindbergh took on a barrel of water as well as a short stay he left for a cross country trip which would have brought the craft to Montauk Point.

Colonel and Mrs. Lindbergh eluded everybody a week ago this afternoon when they departed from the house of Ambassador Dwight W. Davis at Englewood. Since then the air and the land have been

STORMS RAKE WEST TEXAS
HASKELL COUNTY HARD HIT BY TORNADO; NO LIVES ARE LOST

(By Associated Press)
ABILENE, June 3.—The Abilene Reporter today said reports indicated property damage running into hundreds of thousands of dollars had been caused Sunday from wind, hail and rain storms in scattered districts of West Texas.

Heavy damage was inflicted along the southwestern and western borders of Haskell county, the newspaper said reports compiled by its staff indicated. In the Center and Plainview communities, houses were destroyed by a tornado which raged for fifteen minutes. A strip from Judo to Rule in Haskell county was riddled by hail stones as large as baseballs, the paper said, with crops destroyed on 20,000 to 30,000 acres. Small livestock, chickens and birds were killed.

C. O. LANEY DIES

SCURRY COUNTY HAIL HEAVY

TEXAS FLOOD WATER DROPS AS END SEEN
TERRIFIC RAINS OVER KANSAS, MISSOURI, ARE REPORTED

HOUSTON, June 3.—Residents near the mouth of 40 Texas streams today watched the crest of flood waters pass or awaited the passage tomorrow or Wednesday. The spacious lowlands along the Gulf were expected to prevent serious damage.

Houston worked to remove flood wreckage as Buffalo Bayou, the stream that caused the flood here, returned to its banks at almost all points. The most serious menace the city faced, low water pressure

STUDENTS IN SCORES HERE FOR SUMMER

TECH VACATION PERIOD SCHOOL WILL DRAW 1,000 BELIEF

With the halls of the institution crowded with students and each train and bus bringing more into the city, indications were this morning that the present summer session of Texas Technological college would be the greatest in the history of the institution.

Registration was well under way this morning in an orderly fashion, students being required to register in alphabetical order.

Officials, although reticent on enrollment figures, were inclined to believe the enrollment would be over the thousand mark. No figures on the enrollment were obtainable at noon today.

Many are Graduates
Dean James M. Gordon, in charge of the arrangements for the summer session, reported that a larger number of graduate students were enrolling than ever before in the school's history. A number had already made application for master's degree work today, he said.

Registration will likely continue throughout tomorrow, officials in charge said.

Included in the list of registrations were many students who were present last summer while a goodly number of students from the long session were back again. Several hundred new students are expected to swell the attendance over 1,000.

Class work will be started on schedule Wednesday, it was stated. Classes will begin at 7 o'clock each morning.

A search of the country near the lake was ordered for the boy.

DOCKETS ARE CALLED HERE
FOUR COURTS TO BE IN SESSION HERE DURING WEEK

Courts will hold the spotlight of activities in the Lubbock county courthouse during the next three or four weeks, terms in two tribunals having been under way this morning, while two others were to have begun this afternoon.

Judge James C. Wilson, of the Lubbock division of the United States court, Northern district of Texas, called the docket and set cases in the court this morning. One petition on bankruptcy, that of the claim of the First National bank of Hollis, Oklahoma, against Emory Gee, was heard. Equity and bankruptcy cases will be heard this week. The criminal cases were set for next Monday.

Judge Clark M. Mullican of the 99th district court calls his docket this afternoon at 1:30 in criminal cases, having recessed this morning for the opening of the federal court.

Pharr Calls Court
Judge Homer L. Pharr, of the 72nd district court, is to call his docket this afternoon also. Civil cases are to be heard this week in his court.

Judge Robert Beap, called the docket in the county court this morning and set cases for the week. Criminal cases will be heard in the court next week beginning Monday.

The federal court hearings will be held on the second floor of the court house while the criminal trial of the 99th will be held in the district court room on the third floor. Judge Pharr is to call the docket in his office this afternoon and will likely hold his hearings in the county court room while it is not being used for county court.

EDISON, FORD, DOLLAR AMONG MANY SIGNING URGE TO PUBLIC

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, June 3.—A "Message to the American people," urging that "prohibition be given an honest trial," and bearing the signatures of Henry Ford, Thomas Edison, Captain Robert Dollar, J. C. Penney and 20 other men prominent in business and industry, was published today.

The message quoted the plea for law observance in President Hoover's inaugural address and invited Americans, "Whatever their previous opinions and social practices, and particularly those in business and professional life, to join with us in following the President. Let us unite to give the Eighteenth Amendment an honest chance for complete enforcement."

ESCORT BEATEN AND ROBBED, VICTIM'S CONDITION SERIOUS AS WIDE SEARCH IS ORDERED

HOUSTON, June 3.—A 25-year-old girl was in a hospital in a serious condition today, and a wide search was being made for two negroes who attacked the girl and her male companion here last night while they sat in an automobile on Polk avenue. The girl was in such a serious condition that an operation was performed to save her life.

Her companion, H. S. Skinner, 25, also was at the hospital suffering from severe lacerations about the head, received when he tried to protect the girl. He said he was struck with a pistol. Both the man and the girl were bound and gagged during the attack.

Blacks Steal Car
The negroes, after robbing Skinner of \$3.50 and attacking the girl, drove away in Skinner's automobile. It had not been located this morning. A motorist heard cries from Skinner and the girl and called police.

According to the story told police by Skinner, the attack took place about 9 p. m., last night.

We went to church Sunday night," Skinner said. "After the services we drove out Polk avenue to a point back of the Hughes Tool company and parked the car to talk a while. We had not been there five minutes when two negroes walked up, both holding pistols. They also had flashlights. They forced us to get out of the machine and go with them into the woods about a block from where the car was parked.

Beaten With Gun
"In the woods, I started to put up a fight, and one of the negroes struck me several times on the head, stunning me. When I came to my senses, I was bound and gagged. The negroes had gone."

"I struggled and got to my feet and found the girl bound and gagged and moaning. We both arose to our feet, and the negroes came rushing back and struck me sev-

Capital Chat

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Congressional leaders expect to bring their plans for a summer recess closer to realization this week by fulfilling at least two of the administration's pre-vacation requirements.

Spurred by the crash of wheat prices below the dollar level, they expect enough export debenture advocates in the Senate to join with administration supporters in voting for eliminating that plan from the chamber's farm relief bill to permit final enactment of the legislation in time to offset this year's crops.

Talk Special Rule

On the House side of the Capitol, one hour was allotted today for the discussion of a special rule intended to expedite consideration of the bill to provide for the 1930 census and reapportionment of its membership. A vote on the bill is expected in time to enable a conference committee to begin—and possibly finish—Negotiations for adjustment of differences which may develop between the two chambers over this legislation, including probably a rejection by the House of the Senate provision to place the 100,000 census enumerators under civil service.

That will leave the leaders with only one major problem to dispose of—the fixing of a date for Senate action on the tariff bill. Afterwards, they can move with administration approval for a short recess or a long one. That question has been put aside pending clarification of the legislative situation, in view of the opposition to an all-summer vacation expressed by several influential senators.

Debuture Up Again

Return of the export debenture issue to the Senate this week was regarded as certain in view of the progress of the joint conference committee working to bring the farm bills passed by the Senate and the House into conformity. It has been taken for granted since the negotiations were resumed after the deadlock over the debenture issue that the Senate group would yield on that point and recommend elimination of the proposal to their chamber, which voted it into the legislation over the opposition of President Hoover by a majority of three.

While the House was called upon to begin discussion of the census-reapportionment bill today, the Senate still had before it the proposal of Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, looking to governmental regulation of commission merchants dealing in perishable farm products, with the resolution of Senator Nye, republican, North Dakota, provision of the immigration law ready for consideration next.

Is Hoover Plan

The Nye resolution intended to carry out the last of the five recommendations placed before the special session by President Hoover, who

Such an order was issued, and the Supreme court today disposed of the whole controversy, instead of merely answering the questions and sending the case back for action by the Court of Appeals.

Justice McReynolds delivered the opinion of the court which was unanimous except that Justice Stone, who was attorney general during some of the oil lease litigation, took no part.

Pointing out that the defense contended the evidence failed to show the detectives had established contact with any of the jurors, the opinion said "we cannot accept this view."

It would destroy the power of courts adequately to protect themselves—to enforce their rights of self-preservation, it continued. "Suppose, for example, some litigant should endeavor to shoot a juror while sitting in the box during progress of the case. He might escape punishment for contempt if some quick witted attendant quietly thwarted the effort and kept the circumstances secret until the trial ended."

ATHENS, GREECE, June 3 (AP)—Admiral Paul Kondouriotis was re-elected President of Greece at a joint meeting of the Senate and Chamber today, receiving 259 votes out of a total of 306.

Great Britain Turns Eyes To Baldwin's Next Move

MACDONALD WILL HEAD LABOR GOVERNMENT, VOTERS DECIDE

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, June 3.—Great Britain is awaiting the next move of Stanley Baldwin before shaping its policy for what was generally felt to be a labor government headed by the former Premier Ramsay MacDonald.

The prime minister spent the weekend at Chequers court, official country place of British leaders, and was believed to have conferred with leaders of the conservative party.

No Report Given
What took place in these conferences could not be learned. It is not known particularly whether MacDonald would resign immediately, or choose to reorganize his government and fight it out before an election when that body meets June 26, hoping with liberal help to carry off a vote of no confidence. There was no secret that those members of his cabinet who survived today's cataclysm at the polls were divided as to the proper course. Austin Chamberlain, foreign minister, believed his party leader would carry on as long as possible. Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer, believed the proper and dignified thing would be to resign at once and let the laborites have their day.

Opinion Is Divided
Public opinion too seemed divided. There was a tendency in the press to favor immediate resignation and formation of a labor government.

There was as much mystery as to whether either tactic or support would be shown David Lloyd George, liberal chieftain, to the labor or conservative parties. It appeared that he and his followers, with apparently full realization of the important role they may play as holding the balance of power, were awaiting Mr. Baldwin's move and would remain as silent as possible to their intentions.

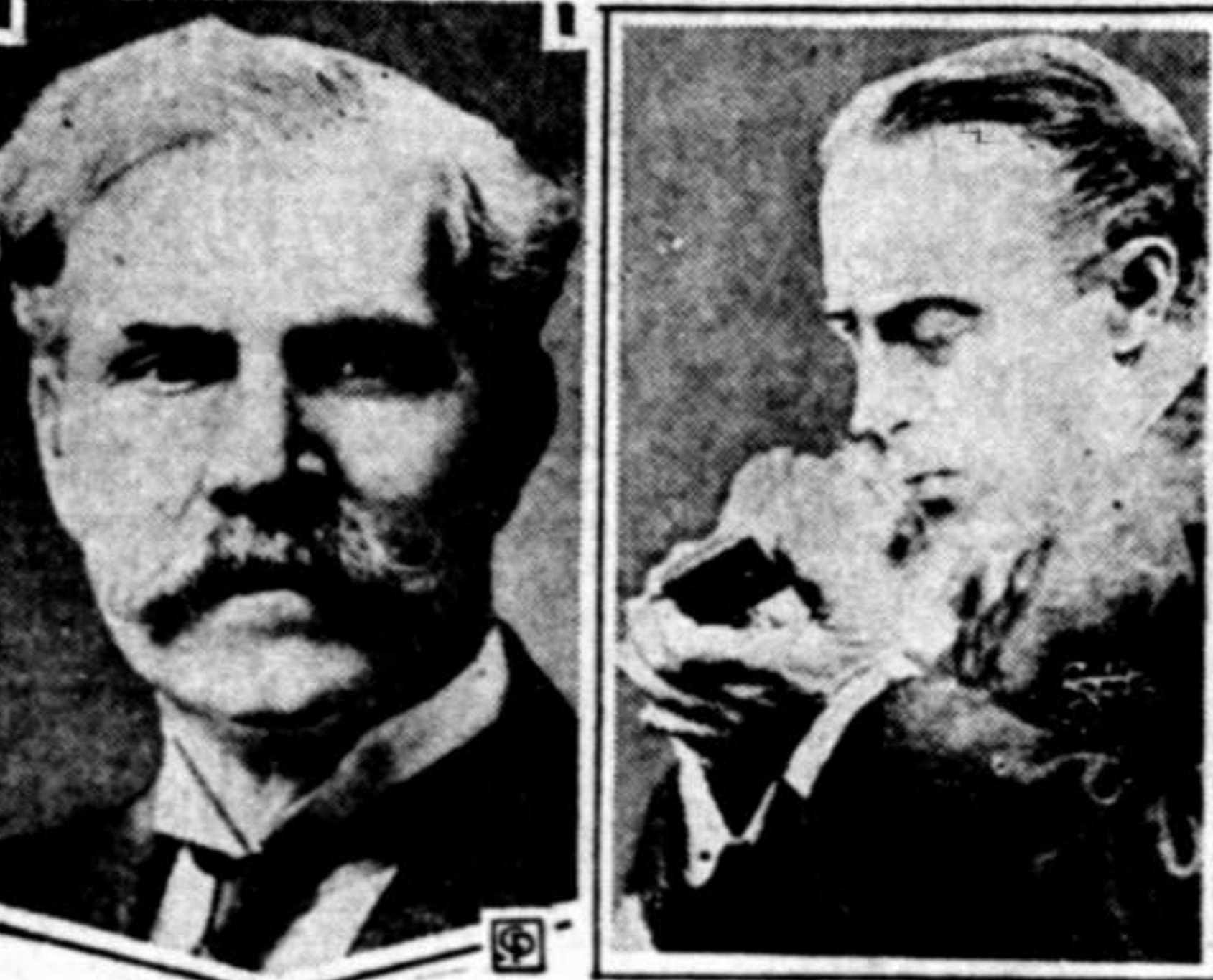

When a player has approached his tenth season in the major leagues, it may be assumed, with all fairness intended, that he is nearing the end of his career.

It may be noticed that there are comparatively few regular performers who have been in there day in and day out for more than 10 seasons.

The observation seems especially true of shortstops as a careful check reveals that only Walter Greber of the Red Sox, Dave Bancroft of the Robins and Rabbit Maranville of the Braves are campaigners of more than a decade. And it isn't a dirty crack to say that they're about through.

He Hit Well
It was whispered during the 1923 campaign that little Joe Sewell, who was in his ninth campaign for the Cleveland Indians, was slipping.

It was said that those short, stocky legs which had carried Sewell around through a streak of 835 successive games were slowing up, that many base hits were being made around Sewell which a few years back he might have fielded for outs.

There was nothing wrong with his batting mind you, but—well, a faster man at shortstop seemed necessary.

It seemed, according to the gab, that Sewell was nearing the end, but that was in 1923 and before the little Alabama whammer was shifted from shortstop to third base in the rebuilding process of the Indians under the new millionaire owner.

Likes Third Base
Joe likes third base enough to say that he wishes he had been playing it all his career.

It isn't that he believes third base easier to play than shortstop for he doesn't compare the two spots except in this way:

"They're both hard!" And there seems new life in him. With less territory to guard at his left, he is showing flashy form in going to his right and in on slowly hit balls. And he has been fielding in a manner that has won praise around the American League.

He has caused the prediction to be made that the Indians would need to worry about a third baseman for a few more years.

May Best Scott
With the new life in the majors gained from the shift, there exists a reasonable possibility that Sewell will break the record of Everett Scott for play in consecutive games.

Scott, when he was taken out of the lineup on May 5, 1925 had played in 1907 consecutive games.

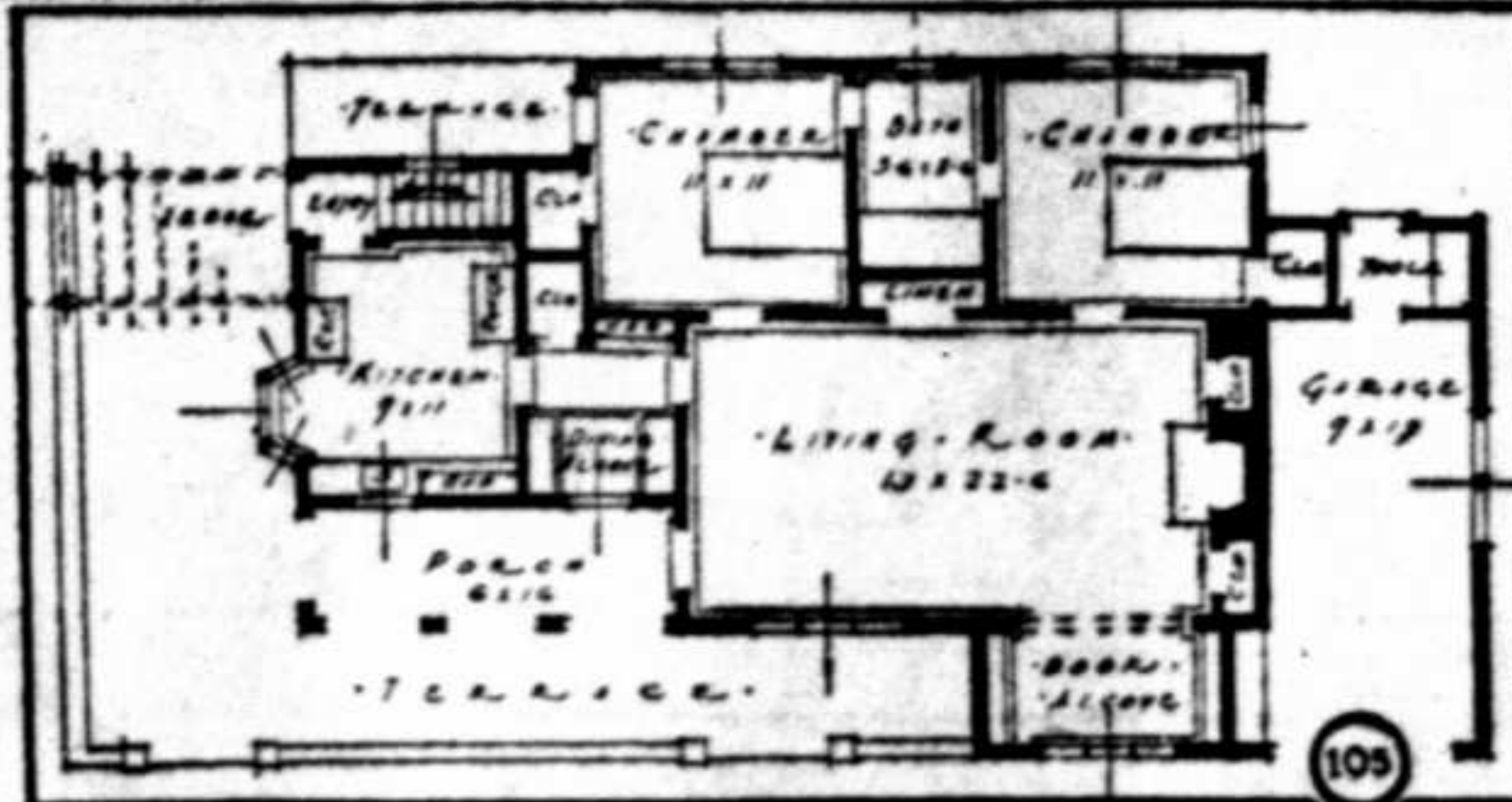
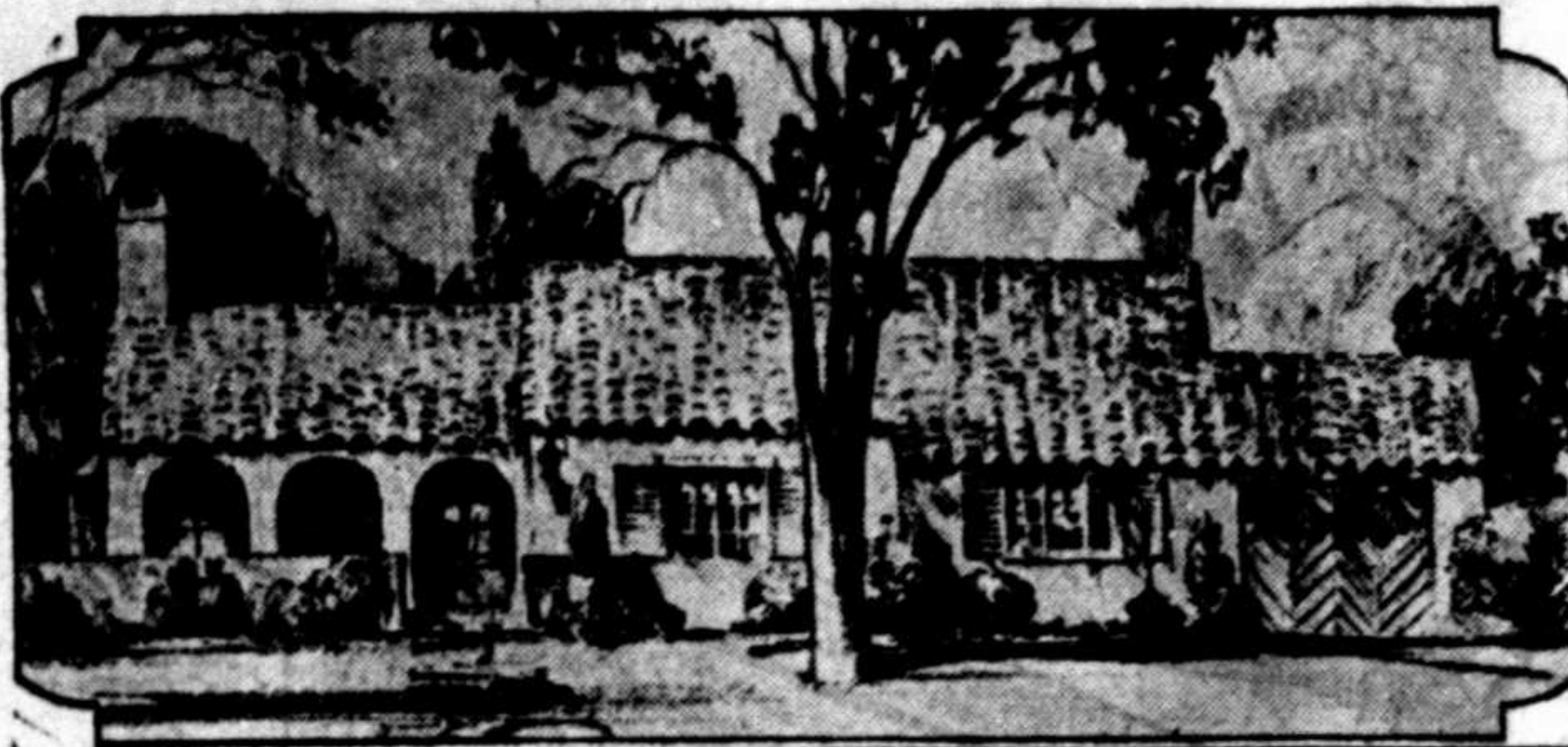

are on a level. There are a dining room, many closets, a modern bath and a garage.

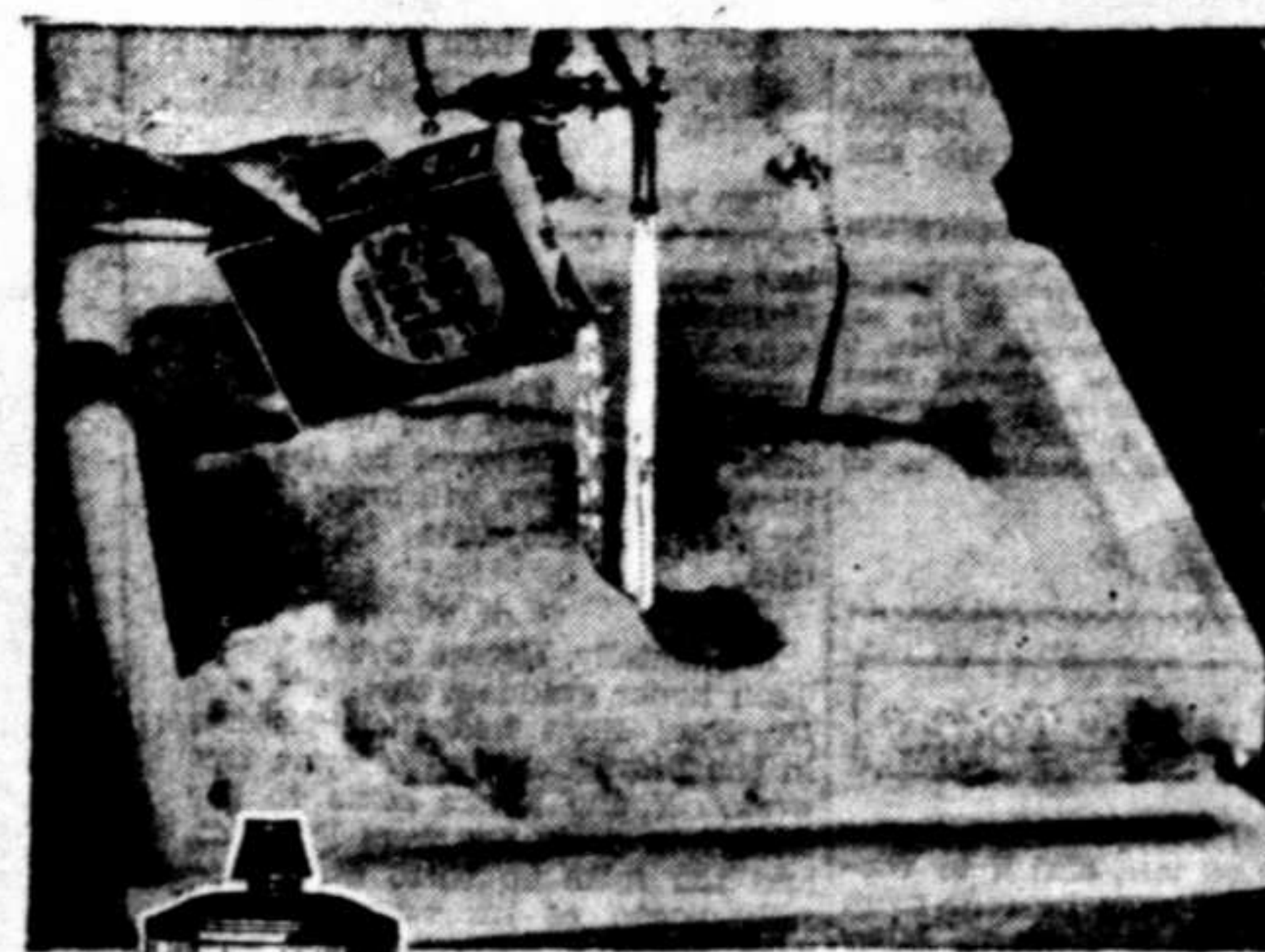

A Responsibility

A bulletin from the federal Bureau of Education points out that nearly all the states in the union are now providing by law specialized education for crippled children that gives them a chance to lead independent lives when they grow up. This, of course, is in addition to physical and medical care.

This kind of work was, until recently, considered purely a private matter. Special training for crippled children began as a charitable enterprise, and it was not until Minnesota passed a law providing for this kind of training at state expense in 1907, that people began to realize that the public at large owed the crippled child a definite responsibility.

The crippled child needs sympathy and medical treatment, of course, but above all he needs training that will enable him to surmount his handicap and make his own way in the world. It is highly encouraging to note that this is being done on a large scale.

Youth And Parents

After a Chicago schoolgirl of 14 admitted having been on wild parties where liquor was served, the perplexed city authorities hit upon the expedient of putting her mother on trial, accusing her of contributing to the girl's delinquency.

Here is something new in jurisprudence, indeed. And while the ins and outs of this particular case may not be quite clear, it does seem as if this method of treatment has a good deal to recommend it.

Despite all the talk about "wild youth," and the temptations of the modern age, and the like, the plain fact remains that parents who are on to their job can still keep their youngsters in a normal, healthy environment at home.

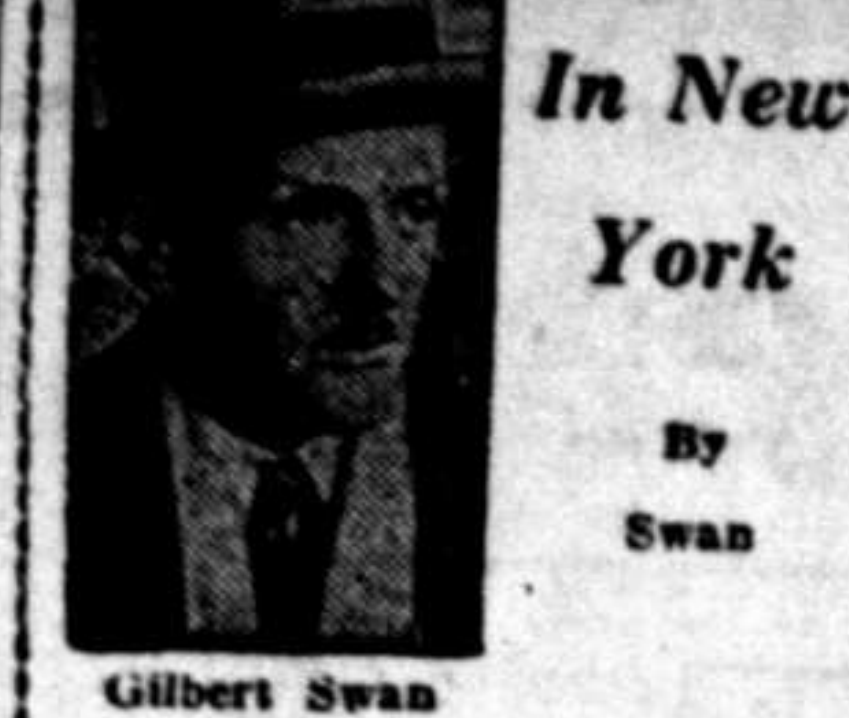

Diet and Health

COMBINATIONS OF FOOD EACH DAY SHOULD HAVE ALL REQUIRED ELEMENTS

By LULU HUNT PETERS, M.D., Author of "Diet and Health" and "Diet for Children"

"Can you tell me of any gastrointestinal reason why fish and milk should not be served at the same meal? The belief that illness follows the eating of these two foods at the same meal, I have encountered before in southern hospitals, but never in a northern institution, so I have come to think that it is peculiar to the south. I have never been taught in my classes in dietetics not to serve these two foods together, and I myself know no reason why the presence of one would hinder the digestion of the other. I am at present dietitian in a school of boys from 8 to 18, most of whom are underweight, and the nurse in charge, a southern trained girl, has objected to fish ever being served at a meal where milk is given. I thought perhaps the advice of some well-known authority might have some weight in changing her opinion."

MRS. D.

There is no scientific reason why fish and milk should not be served together at the same meal, Mrs. D. The only point to be thought of is that both these foods are protein foods, so the rest of the meal might be low in protein. But there is not much danger of growing boys getting too much protein, anyway. It is the principle necessary for growth and repair. Boys and girls need a lot of it. More, in fact, in proportion than do adults.

This milk and fish combination bugaboo is on a par with a lot of other combination bugaboos, and there is no scientific basis for them. The chief thing to remember about "combinations" is to see that the day's combinations have all the elements that are needed by the body. But in any one meal, one may take different foods, as he prefers them. If he finds certain combinations disagree, that is his problem, not that of all others.

Feble old people and feeble babies are markedly benefited by oil rubs. They can be accompanied by massage, in different degrees, depending upon the feebleness. The massage increases the circulation, as you know, and gives a stimulus to the weakened musculature, all this helping to improve the general condition.

MISSISSIPPI RIVER SAID TO BE DANGEROUSLY HIGH

By MAJ. GEN. EDGAR JADWIN, Chief of Army Engineers (Edgar Jadwin was born at Honesdale, Pa., Aug. 7, 1863. He studied at Lafayette college and was later graduated from the United States Military Academy and the School of Application in engineering. He was promoted through the ranks of the office of chief engineers, with the title of major general, in 1922. He was stationed at the Panama canal during four years of its construction and served in France during the World War where he supervised engineering work over 160,000 men. He has been awarded the Distinguished Service Medal.)

Conditions along the Mississippi in some spots but have been repaired without serious effects. Moreover, there has been some trouble with breaks in local levees on the upper river.

At Cairo, Ill., one of the most vulnerable spots on the river, the water has reached a level of 52.2 feet. The flood level there is 45 feet, while the city itself, with 15,000 population, is entirely surrounded by a levee. Should it give way, the entire area will be flooded. The flood control program provides for the construction of a spillway at this point, to lessen the flood menace.

We have closed all the gaps along the river and strengthened the weaker places in preparing for a possible flood. Only about one-tenth of our entire \$325,000,000 flood control program has been completed, and adequate protection against a flood has not yet been provided.

About 20,000 officers and enlisted men of the corps of engineers are stationed along the river with orders to keep close watch on the situation. The corps is co-operating with the Mississippi river commission and with local flood boards to the fullest extent.

In the flood control work and reconstruction since the 1927 flood, approximately \$25,000,000 has been expended.

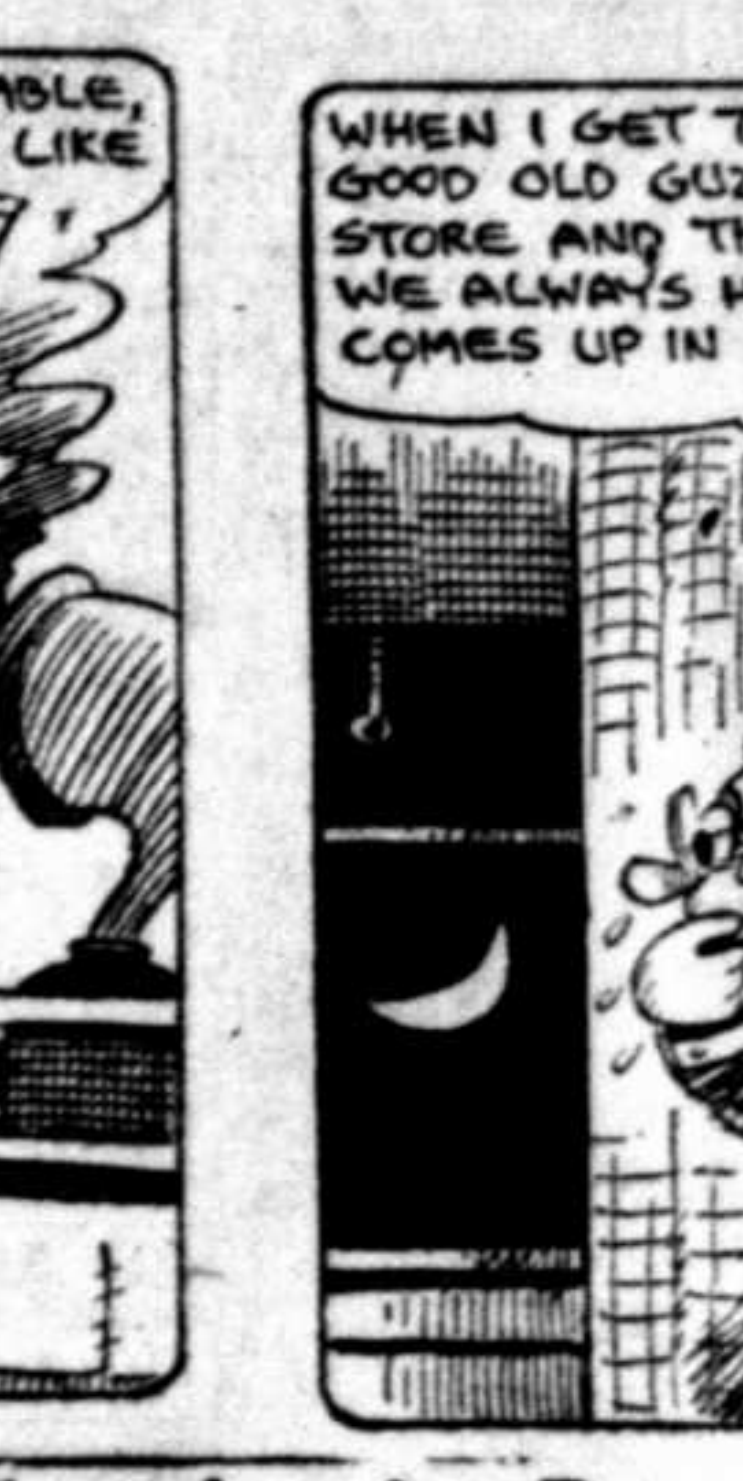

Storm Damage Heavy

KANSAS CITY, June 3 (AP).—Terroring rains, hail and wind caused damage amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars in Kansas and Missouri yesterday.

A severe rain and wind storm at Los Angeles to Kansas City, landed five minutes before the storm struck and was demolished. The plane, valued at \$75,000, was on the second flight of the new Kansas City-Los Angeles line.

Windows are Shattered

Windows in buildings in Wichita's business district were shattered and trees were uprooted in the residen-

tial section. Scores of persons were injured slightly.

Reports indicated heavy rains and hail with strong winds swept the southern half of the state. Near Hartner a house was blown from its foundation. It was feared the wheat crop may have been damaged considerably.

Coldbursts Fall

Flood damage in northwest Missouri already amounting to thousands of dollars, was increased by rains of cloudburst proportion. Many bridges were washed out and railroad and bus service was paralyzed. Thousands of acres of farm land have been flooded by rains to-talling 11 inches since last Friday and are believed to be unfit for cultivation.

Water was five to 10 feet deep in more than 50 homes in Pattonburg, near St. Joseph, Mo.
