City Council Requests Information from White River Municipal Water District

Charles Hardin and Bo Jackson, Post representatives on the White River Municipal Water District board of directors, met with the Post City Council at its regularly scheduled meeting Monday, March 6 at 7:30 p.m.

Hardin said that he and Jackson were "here to represent Post" and that they would be willing to find answers to questions, provide information and do whatever was necessary to keep the doors open between Post and the White River Municipal Water District.

With litigation not an impossibility between the city of Post and WRMWD, as legal counsel for the City of Post, Harvey Morton, could not take part in any discussion with the WRMWD board representatives, but Mayor McCrary said, "The city would be responsive to anything to settle the differences between Post and the White River Municipal Water District, but answers to questions are necessary before any attempt could be made to settle differences."

Jackson reported that he would be attending a meeting of the WRMWD Board Thursday evening and would discuss the

problem with the other members at that time.

In other business conducted Monday night, SPAG representative Mike Pettigo, addressed the council on the 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System.

Even though the county commissioners have elected not to participate in the program, as the only incorporated city in Garza County, Post could still acquire the 9-1-1 system, but only those living inside the city limits would get the service.

If the county had participated in the program, the 9-1-1 exchange would have been located in Post, but with only the city involved, the exchange would be located in Lynn County and calls from Post would go to the Lynn County Sheriff's Office and would then be relayed back to Post for ambulance service, the sheriff's office or the fire department.

Pettigo said, "Post would receive the same service, in the same time frame; routing the calls to the Lynn County office wouldn't affect the service."

Council members voted to continue the city's on-going interest in the 9-1-1 program.

Bill Mueller, representing Rocker A, asked the council for a permit to drill within the city limits on the east side of Post.

Approval had been given in 1998 for KoKo Oil to drill on the site after Rocker A had farmed out the acreage to the Lubbock company, and that company did not carry through with its plans.

Since the request had been previously reviewed and approved, the council requested that Rocker A bring a copy of the initial agreement with KoKo to the City Manager Bob Turner.

After checking that the Lubbock firm did not live up to the farm-out agreement, approval could then be issued to Rocker A to drill.

In other action, Judy Bush was unanimously appointed to serve as election judge again this year.

The council agreed to readvertise for bids on a garbage truck and the bids would be opened on the

Friday prior to the next City Council meeting in April.

Main Street Project Manager Melissa Cunningham, in her monthly report, asked the council to vote that a trust account set up at the First National Bank become officially a part of the city record.

The trust account, started with the \$5,000 General Foods donation to the landscaping project, was set up at the request of GF as an on-going account for landscaping funds, a Post scholarship and

Founder's Day.

Also reported on were Main Street Project's monthly Leadership Coffees, the April Cleanup Campaign in conjunction with a PMA sidewalk sale, and a May appearance by South Plains College's "Country Caravan."

Present at Monday night's meeting were Mayor McCrary; City Council members Irene Fry, Larry Waldrip, Jan Crawford, Jack Alexander and Larry Mills; Wanda Wilkerson; Bob Turner; and Harvey Morton.

American Cancer Society Plans for April Crusade

"Contributions to the American Cancer Society in Texas represent one of the best returns on the dollar that I know of," said Chita Hataway, Chairman of the 1989 fund-raising Crusade in Garza County.

Contributions raised in 1985-86 were invested during this fiscal year (September 1, 1987 - August 31, 1988) as illustrated:

Cancer research, 37 percent; public education, 30 percent; patient services, 24 percent; professional education, 10 percent; Crusade (fund-raising) 13 percent; and program development/administration, five percent.

"This 119 percent expenditure reflects increased research spending in Texas by the national American Cancer Society," Chita said. "This means that contributions to the Society are more valuable than our contributors may realize."

The American Cancer Society is currently sponsoring research

investigations in 10 major Texas hospitals, medical schools and universities totaling more than \$7.8 million and, because so much promising research is taking place in Texas, the national American Cancer Society allocates additional funds to the state.

"Programs that help people are our priority. We keep a tight control over our administrative costs and keep them within acceptable limits, as this breakdown indicates," Chita commented.

American Cancer Society volunteers deliver patient service programs like Reach to Recovery, support groups, transportation to treatment centers; provide education programs for the public - including films, pamphlets, teacher resources and the Great American Smokeout; and professional educational programs and materials for the medical community.

Volunteers keep costs down and enable the American Cancer Society to conduct and impressive array of local programs and services in communities throughout Texas.

At this time Post Cares is in need of donations of canned meats, beans, flour, sugar and shortening.

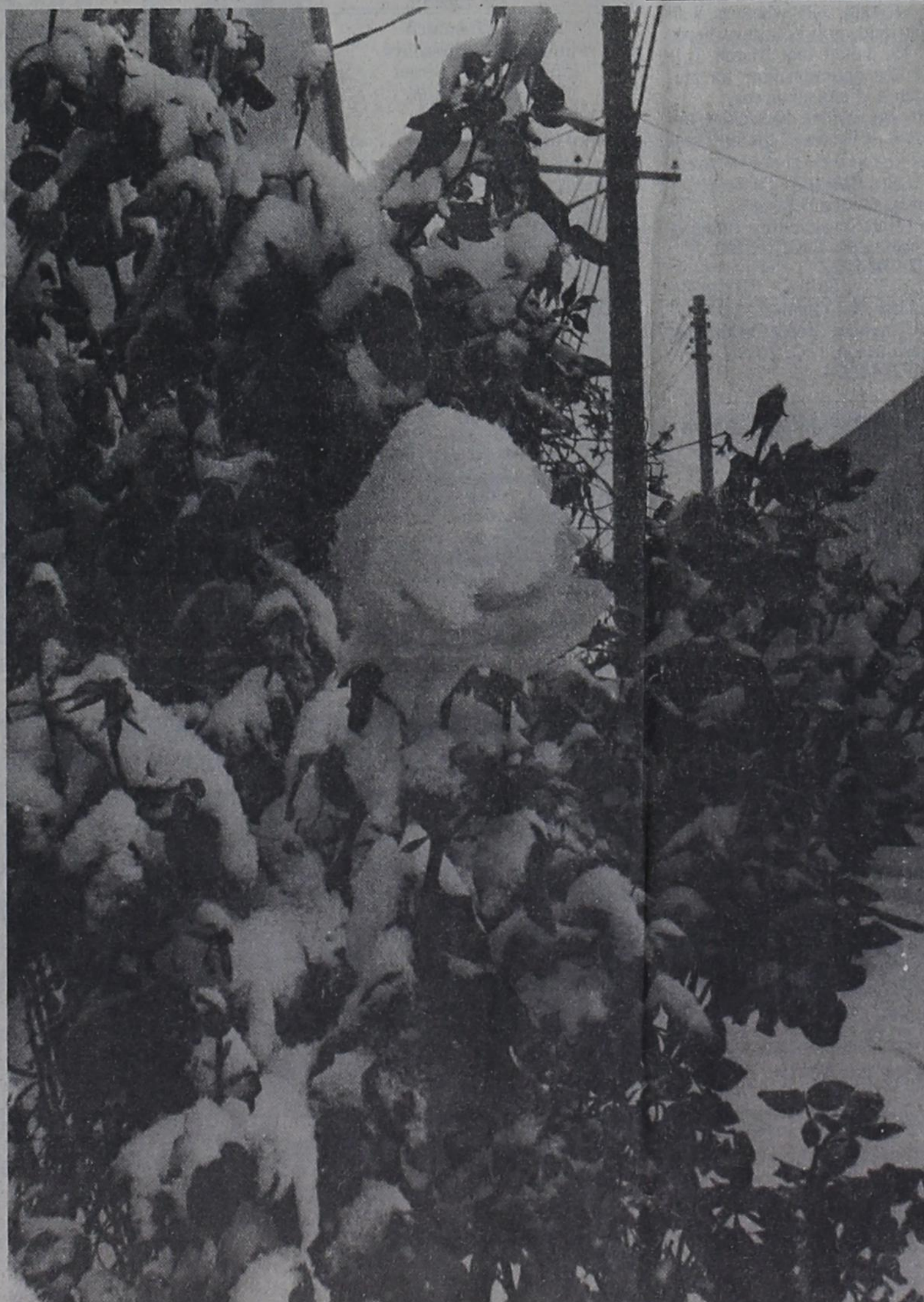

Bovaird Acquires Snyder Inventory, New Manager

The Bovaird Supply Company has merged 10 Mid-Continent Supply Company oilfield stores into its existing nine-state, 40-store and office service network.

Of the 10 acquired stores in Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas, Mississippi, Louisiana, New Mexico and California, Bovaird will assume the function of eight with existing Bovaird facilities and keep open those former Mid-Continent stores in Enid, Oklahoma and Canadian, Texas.

Bovaird told former Mid-Continent customers that the seven-state merger of functions is further

evidence of its commitment to provide services and inventories to field operations of domestic oil and gas companies.

Ray Bohannon, newly appointed Bovaird manager in Post, said that the local operation had combined the inventory of the Snyder store with the Post store's inventory and that the Snyder facility is now closed.

Bohannon, who was recently transferred to Post from Midland, said, "Our plans for Bovaird, locally, are to stay in business, make a profit and continue to serve the customers."

New Information on Alcohol Drug Abuse

The Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse has presented startling new information on the extent of alcohol and drug use among children and adolescents in Texas.

The data, part of the Commission's 1988 Survey of Substance Abuse Among Secondary School Students in Texas, was unveiled at a meeting convened by the Commission in Austin to coordinate the efforts of health and human service, education and criminal justice agencies and organizations to address the myriad of needs brought to light by the survey results.

Among the more significant statistical findings of the study are:

- * 76% of all Texas secondary school students (86% of seniors) have used alcohol during their lifetime, with 43% (58% of seniors) reporting use within the last month.

- * The average high school senior who drinks alcohol consumes an average of 41 alcoholic drinks per month, of which 31 were beer.

- * About 12% of seniors have attended class while drunk at least once during the last school year.

- * Use of inhalants is higher among younger students than among seniors. For example, 28%

of seventh graders reported using inhalants as opposed to only 17% of seniors. This pattern of use is radically opposed to the norm, and suggests that many young inhalant users may drop out of school before reaching the twelfth grade.

Of those seventh graders who use inhalants, 31% reported their first use at age 10 or younger.

"The data from this historic youth survey holds powerful implications," said TCADA executive director Bob Dickson.

"Implications that call for coordination among not only the chemical dependency and education

fields, but among all other systems in Texas that are impacted by this generation of youth that are growing up without the benefit of sufficient education and treatment services."

Dickson added that the data was presented first to the directors of these other agencies to emphasize the need for continuing cooperation and commitment from all involved.

Texas Farmers, Ranchers Remember 1988

Many Texas farmers and ranchers will remember 1988 as the year of the "big drought." But, more importantly, it was a year of contrasts - one that boasted large doses of both "good and bad."

The drought would have been even more devastating had it not been for reasonably good soil moisture over much of the state at the start of the crop season. Sparse rainfall during the growing season impacted heavily on crop and forage production in many areas, and

those dry conditions continued through the year.

As 1988 drew to a close, rainfall deficits were prominent in many locations, particularly in southern, southwestern, central, eastern and coastal regions. Some locations logged amounts of rain that were only 40 to 50 percent of normal. A good example was College Station, which annually receives just over 39 inches of rain. It came up more than 21 inches short for 1988.

Drought Only Part of Story

The drought was only part of Texas' agricultural history in 1988. Strangely enough, while the traditionally high-rainfall areas were suffering, the normally arid areas

of western Texas and the plains were having a rare year of surplus rain.

Amarillo, for example, finished the year with about six inches more rain than its yearly average. Plainview logged more than seven inches of above normal rain while Fort Stockton and El Paso had "wet" years with rainfall of about three inches above average.

With that kind of scenario for the state, 1988 tested the mettle of most farmers and ranchers. Crop planting got off on schedule in most areas although some farmers waited for rain to plant. In many southern counties, though, those rains never came and crops languished. Some corn and sorghum did not yield enough to pay for harvesting costs, so farmers cut the crops for hay or silage or turned their fields over to cattle to salvage the remnants.

Green Grazing for Cattle

In a few cases, withered crops provided the only "green" grazing that cattle had during the course of the year. Others had to be satisfied with prickly pear one ranchers burned off the thorns. This lack of forage on pastures and ranges in many areas caused sizeable reductions in cattle herds and also limited hay production.

Because of extremely short supplies in many counties, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service initiated a weekly report to monitor the volume of "for sale"

hay on a county-by-county basis to help hay-deficit producers. Generally, enough hay was produced in Texas to meet demands, but distribution proved to be a major concern. Hay surpluses abounded in many western areas as well as in some north central and northeastern counties.

As far as crop production is concerned, yields as a whole were only slightly off average levels. Of course, averages can be misleading - and certainly were in 1988. Some crops in South Texas yielded next to nothing while bumper yields were the norm over much of western Texas and the plains.

Somewhat higher market prices took some of the pain away from farmers who experienced low yields although cotton prices were down some due to large supplies. Also, participation in government programs provided farmers some security.

Time to Begin Battle Against Summer Weeds

Whether it's a golf course or your home lawn you care for, now is the time to begin fighting those summer annual weeds, says a turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Annual weeds live only one season and reproduce from seeds which have been lying dormant during the winter months. The seedling stage is the weakest part of the weed's life cycle and that's the time to attack it, said Dr. William Knoop, Extension Service turf specialist at Dallas.

"Really, our weed control season starts now with our application of a pre-emergence herbicide," Knoop said during a seminar here for professional groundskeepers and commercial lawn and turf maintenance operators. Almost 100 persons attended the course, one of five being conducted across the state by the Extension Service.

The mild winter experienced this year may allow annual weeds to germinate earlier than usual, Knoop cautioned. "It wouldn't surprise me to see a lot of annual weeds germinate in March," he said.

"We are at the time we should be applying pre-emergence herbicides," Knoop said, whether to an athletic field, golf course or home lawn. He noted that March 1 is usually the optimum time for pre-emergence of annual weeds.

"Pre-emergence herbicides are 99 percent effective," the turf spe-

cialist said. "The problem is, we often miss the application date."

Pre-emergence herbicides consist of a granular or liquid impregnated with a chemical. The chemical combines with soil particles to form a layer at the surface of the soil. As the weed seedling emerges through that layer, the chemical kills it.

Any user of herbicides should carefully follow instructions on the label of the material, Knoop stressed. Care also should be taken to be sure the herbicide is applied evenly and placed properly.

One the weed plant is up, pre-emergence herbicides aren't effective. At that point contact herbicides may be used to kill the green tissue of the weeds.

Smart and Martin wrote letters of complaint and praise to 51 companies and found that people in the companies are relaying the letters to others who can make a difference. So it appears that letters from consumers really do have an impact on the decisions of the company.

The study pointed out that it is to a firm's advantage to respond to consumer complaints and praise because the market for consumer products is highly competitive and in many cases it is less costly to retain customers than to obtain new ones.

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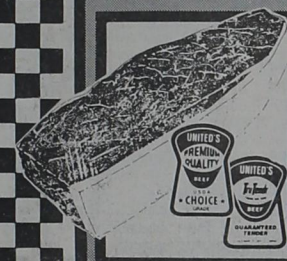
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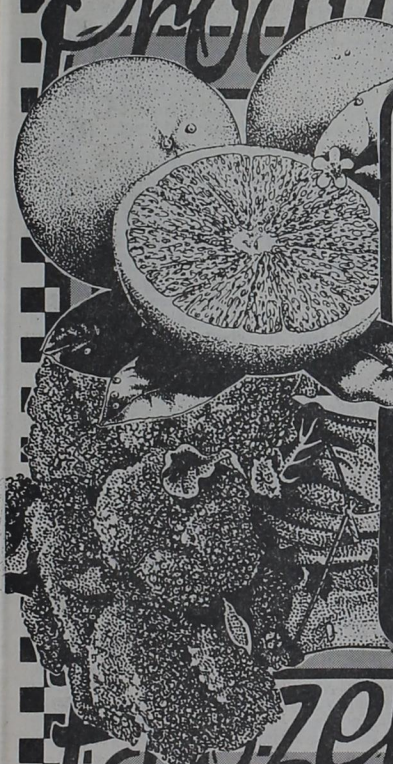
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Varsity Track Teams Travel To Roosevelt Saturday

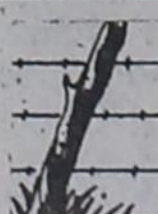
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
