Prison time certain for sex offender

*DA's office says probation no
longer an option for Lubbock man*

A Lubbock native faces up to 20 years in prison after being found guilty in 118th District Court Thursday of sexual assault of a child.

District Judge Robert H. Moore III is awaiting the results of a pre-sentencing investigation before determining prison time for McKinley Haskins,



Haskins

24, of Lubbock.

Haskins pleaded guilty before Judge Moore Aug. 16, 2006, to the sexual assault of a 14-year-old Big Spring girl.

At that time, the court deferred on a final finding of guilt, placed Haskins on 10 years probation and fined him \$2,500.

Assistant District Attorney Robin D. Orr said two motions to adjudicate guilt were filed against Haskins this year.

BSISD superintendent:

Legislative session important for what it did not accomplish

Big Spring's public school superintendent is more thankful with what the Texas Legislature didn't do than anything it accomplished this year in the area of education.

A few days after the Legislature wrapped up its biennial session in Austin, Michael Downes, superintendent of Big Spring ISD, talked about some of what he saw as the high and low points of the lawmakers' efforts.

In all, Downes believes those efforts, to put it mildly, could have been worse.

this session were the bills that did not pass," Downes said. "There was some very bad legislation introduced. Fortunately, those bills either died in committee or on the floor

of the House or Senate."

Downes applauded the death of bills that would have allowed private school participation in University Interscholastic League activities and shuffled public money into school vouchers.

As for bills that did pass, the one with the most significant impact on local schoolchildren was Senate Bill 1031, which replaces the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) standardized test with end of course tests in high school beginning with the freshman class of 2011-2012.

GASOLINE PRICES 'SAG'

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas retail gasoline prices sagged this week after 16 straight weeks of gains, according to a weekly price survey released today.

According to the AAA Texas gasoline price survey, regular-grade gasoline retailed for an average of \$3.05 per gallon in 11 Texas cities, 3 cents less than last week's average. The national average dropped 4 cents to \$3.19 per gallon.

"Despite the recent decreases, gas prices are almost a dollar higher today than what they were 16 weeks ago when prices averaged \$2.072 a gallon," said AAA Texas spokeswoman Rose Rougeau.

Suzuki leads Mariners to 9-5 win over Rangers

SEATTLE — Ichiro Suzuki extended his hitting streak to a career-high 24 games and the Seattle Mariners held on to beat the Texas Rangers 9-5 on Thursday night.

Suzuki went 3-for-5 with two RBIs and Kenji Johjima, Adrian Beltre and Yuniesky Betancourt all had two hits for Seattle. The Mariners' first 11 hits of the game were singles.

Gerald Laird hit a three-run

homer and Frank Catalanotto had a two-run double for Texas, which lost for the eighth time in nine games to fall a season-low 16 games under .500. The Rangers lost a team-record 20 games in May.

Texas slugger Sammy Sosa struck out four times and remains stuck on 598 career homers.

Suzuki led off the bottom of the first with a base hit to center field. His hitting streak is the longest in the majors this season and tied with Joey Cora (1997) for

the best streak in team history.

Jose Guillen reached on a one-out single off Vicente Padilla (2-8), who then walked Raul Ibanez to load the bases. Richie Sexson followed with a two-run single and Johjima's base hit made it 3-0.

Beltre, Betancourt and Suzuki all had run-scoring singles in the third and Jose Vidro drove in a run with a groundout to extend the lead to 7-0.

Cha Seung Baek (3-2) sailed into the fourth before Texas broke through for five runs

against the Mariners starter. Catalanotto doubled in Sosa and Mark Teixeira and Laird hit his third homer of the season.

Baek gave up five hits and walked two in 6 1-3 innings. He was replaced after he hit Kenny Lofton with a 3-1 pitch with one out and Brandon Morrow then walked two straight to load the bases.

But the standout rookie responded by striking out Sosa and getting Catalanotto to ground out to extend his scoreless streak to 16 1-3 innings.

Troy dashes Bulldogette hopes

More experienced Trojanettes take 11-1 semifinals victory

AUSTIN — Coahoma's Bulldogettes hadn't won a Class 2A state softball title since 1998. The thought coming into the 2007 state softball tournament was that this year's team was the one to end that drought.

Unfortunately, the Bulldogettes' dry spell continues, as they were routed by Troy's Trojanettes, 11-1, in the semifinal round of the Class 2A state tournament at The University of Texas' McCombs Field Thursday in Austin. The game was called in the sixth inning on the 10-run mercy rule.

"Troy hit the ball like no team we've played all year," said Coahoma head coach Tracy Tadlock. "We didn't make many mistakes defensively. They just hit the ball and that should be apparent to anyone with a pair of eyes. They were easily the best team we've seen this season."

The Bulldogettes drew first blood by scoring their only run in the first inning. Krista Kerby led off the game by drawing a walk. Shelbi Paige moved her to second by placing a sacrifice bunt down the first-base line.

Senior Ami Martinez gave Coahoma runners on the corners after singling to center field, moving Kerby to third. Kerby would cross the plate courtesy of a Janice Gonzales' two-out double to right.

The Bulldogettes wouldn't get another hit in the game and had only one more batter reach base.

Freshman pitcher Heather Newton started the game in typical form, retiring the first nine Trojanette batters she faced. However, Newton didn't fair as well the second time that the Troy lineup saw her.

Troy Michelle Ege

evened the score in the bottom of the fourth inning with a sacrifice fly to deep right field, allowing third baseman Catherine Snow to score. The Trojanettes would take a 2-1 lead in the inning, when the next batter, McKenzie Sickler, drove in Desi Rauch with a single.

Troy would continue its onslaught in the fifth inning, amassing four runs on five hits and one Coahoma error. Three of the five Trojanette hits in the inning went for extra bases, including a triple by Shelby Sheppard that scored two runs.

With a 6-1 lead heading into the sixth inning, the Trojanettes added five more runs. The game ended following a Rouch single to right field, allowing Ege to score the game-clinching run.

Ege pitched a no-hitter over the final six innings of the game. She baffled Coahoma's lineup with a change-up that the Bulldogettes couldn't solve.

"She had a good change-up. We haven't faced a pitcher who could do that to us all season," said Tadlock. "Troy had seven seniors starting. Experience was a huge factor in the outcome."

Martinez is the only senior leaving a Bulldogettes squad that finished the season 31-7. She will be attending Howard College on a softball scholarship in the fall.

"This team has a lot of heart. We came out and fought," said a tearful Martinez following the game. "We did the best we could and never gave up. These girls are going to be really good. It's just so hard to leave them."

Tadlock notes that it's Martinez's leadership by example and attitude that Coahoma will miss the most.

"Ami is kind of like the

team mom. She always keeps everyone so relaxed and feeling good about themselves," he said. "She's been a great attitude leader and someone is going to have to really step up to replace her. We're going to miss her presence in the dugout and off the field more than on the field, even though she was one of our top hitters this year."

The Bulldogettes will return nine starters next season. Thursday's experience is something Tadlock hopes will just

make them better.

"We're young and we're going to get another shot. Maybe with a year or two more of experience, these girls will be doing what Troy is doing," he said. "It was my first year with them and even with the great athletes we had, it's hard to overcome the changes that comes with having a new coach. To lose like this leaves a bad taste in your mouth, but life can make you bitter. Instead of hanging our heads, we need to

come back next year, work hard and give ourselves another chance."

Troy will face Aubrey's Lady Chaparrals in the Class 2A championship game Saturday. The Lady Chaps defeated Pattonville Prairiland's Lady Patriots, 4-3, rallying from a 3-0 deficit in the seventh inning.

Tennessee's Abbott no-hits Lady Aggies at CWS

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Monica Abbott threw her 23rd career no-hitter and struck out 16 to break the single-season record and help Tennessee open the Women's College World Series with a 2-0 victory over Texas A&M on Thursday night.

The 6-foot-3 Abbott (47-3) broke the strikeout record of 663 set by Southern Mississippi's Courtney Blades in 2000. Abbott finished the game with 665.

Earlier, Washington's Danielle Lawrie threw the first no-hitter in four years in the World Series, leading the Huskies to a 3-1 victory over DePaul. Also, Northwestern beat Arizona State 2-0, and defending champion Arizona beat Baylor 2-1 in nine innings.

On Friday in the double-elimination tournament, Tennessee

will face Arizona, and Washington will play Northwestern.

India Chiles and Shannon Doepking had RBI singles for Tennessee (60-6) in the seventh inning off Amanda Scarborough (26-9).

Texas A&M (46-13) loaded the bases with one out in the first, but Abbott got the next two batters on a fielder's choice and strikeout to end the inning. Texas A&M had only one other baserunner, in the fifth when Scarborough led off with a walk.

Kristie Fox homered on the first pitch of the ninth inning to push top-seeded Arizona (45-12-1) past a Baylor team making its first appearance at the World

Series.

Fox's 15th home run of the season went just over the extended arm of Baylor left fielder Tiffany Wesley and inside the foul pole to send the Wildcats into a celebration at home plate.

Fox also scored the Wildcats' other run after doubling to lead off the fourth inning. She moved to third on a single by Jenae Leles and scored on Laine Roth's groundout.

Eighth-seeded Baylor (50-15) came right back to tie it when Kirsten Shortridge scored on the second of consecutive passed balls by Arizona catcher Callista Balko in the top of the fifth.

Lawrie (30-11), a member of the Canadian national team, struck

out nine and became the first pitcher in world series history to allow a run in a no-hitter.

It was the second no-hitter of Lawrie's college career, following a perfect game against Utah Valley State on Feb. 26, 2006.

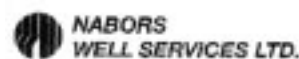

SUBJECT: School credit by examination without prior instruction.

Big Spring ISD offers examinations for credit without prior instruction for each primary school grade level and each secondary school academic subject as approved by the Board of Education. Students in grades K-12 may be accelerated by taking advantage of this provision. There will be no charge for the administration of the examination. If a parent requests an alternative examination, the District may administer and recognize results of a test purchased by the parent or student from Texas Tech University or the University of Texas at Austin.

The District shall accelerate a student in grades K-5 in the following manner:

1. The student scores 90 percent or above on a criterion-referenced test for the grade level to be skipped in each of the following areas: language arts, mathematics, science and social studies;
2. A District representative recommends that the student be accelerated; and
3. The student's parent or guardian gives written approval of the acceleration.

The District shall accelerate a student in grades 6-12 in the following manner:

The student scores 90 percent or above on a criterion-referenced test for acceleration for the applicable course. If such credit is given, the District shall enter the examination score on the student's transcript.

Procedures to allow a student not six years old at the beginning of the school year to be placed initially in the first grade are as follows:

1. Scores on readiness test(s) and/or achievement test(s) that may be administered by appropriate District personnel;
2. Recommendation of the kindergarten or preschool the student attended;
3. Chronological age and observed social and emotional development of the student; and
4. Other criteria deemed appropriate by the principal and Superintendent.

A student planning to take an examination for acceleration is required to register with the principal or designee of the school in which he is assigned at least 30 days prior to the scheduled testing date. Testing dates for 2007 are:

Elementary, Grades K-5, August 1-3, 2007;
Secondary, Grades 6-12, July 25-27, 2007.

Feds give initial OK to Kickapoo Tribe

AUSTIN (AP) — The U.S. Department of Interior has given preliminary approval for the Kickapoo Traditional Tribe of Texas to expand casino gambling at its reservation near Eagle Pass.

The decision would allow the Kickapoo casino, which is now limited to poker and bingo, to add a range of games including blackjack, keno, roulette, dice games and simulcasting of off-track parimutuel betting on horses or dogs. Slot machines would remain illegal.

The 500-member tribe has been fighting for more than a decade over its right to offer a wider array of games at its casino, and the process isn't complete.

The tribe must still negotiate with Interior Department officials about the details of regulating the games. Also, the State of Texas has sued to challenge the federal agency's rules that would allow the tribe to

offer more games.

Coffee-tossing robber strikes stores

DALLAS (AP) — A coffee-throwing robber who hurls hot java at cashiers is wanted for at least seven North Texas robberies, police said Thursday.

The suspect is a 29-year-old man who has given cashiers minor burns since the string of daylight robberies began May 23, Dallas police spokeswoman Jamie Matthews said. Convenience stores in the Dallas suburbs of Addison and Mesquite have also been hit.

Surveillance footage from one of the robberies shows the suspect paying for the cup, then quickly tossing the coffee on the clerk before reaching over the counter and taking all the cash from the register.

The clerk falls down while the suspect, wearing sunglasses and a hat, runs out of the store.

The latest MTA alleged 13 probation violations, including failure to report changes of address and being lax in registering as a sex offender.

"The judge found that (Haskins) had violated the terms of his probation and found him guilty (Thursday)," Orr said. "We're now awaiting the results of the pre-sentencing investigation before the judge determines punishment."

Having been found guilty of sexual assault of

a child, Haskins is no longer eligible for probation. The crime carries a punishment of up to 20 years in prison and a possible fine not to exceed \$10,000.

The date for Haskins' sentencing has not been set, officials said.

While Downes supports replacing the TAKS, he believes the bill was modified in a way that will hurt education.

Currently, high school students must score a 70 average on the four core study areas — English/language arts, mathematics, science and social studies — to advance and/or graduate.

Under the new bill, however, students must score at least 70 in each of the

core areas.

"The new state expectations are unrealistic to students," Downes said. "It doesn't consider the needs of individual students."

Also passed by the Legislature was a pay raise for teachers. Again, it was not all it seemed, Downes said.

Lawmakers passed a \$425 annual pay raise for teachers, nurses, counselors, librarian and diagnosticians. However, based on the state's funding formula, which ties money for the raises to a

school district's Weighted Average Daily Attendance, BSISD will only be able to afford to pay its teachers an extra \$362 a year.

Another bill requires districts to provide a minimum number of minutes of physical education in elementary and middle schools, as well as establish a physical education accountability system statewide.

Downes believes this is a good idea — as far as it goes.

"It will require additional manpower and time," he said, "and the state is

not providing any funds to help us."

Now, each day Chase strikes a pose on the front porch as if to let everyone know, "Alas, world, it is I, Chase the Verminator. Fear not!"

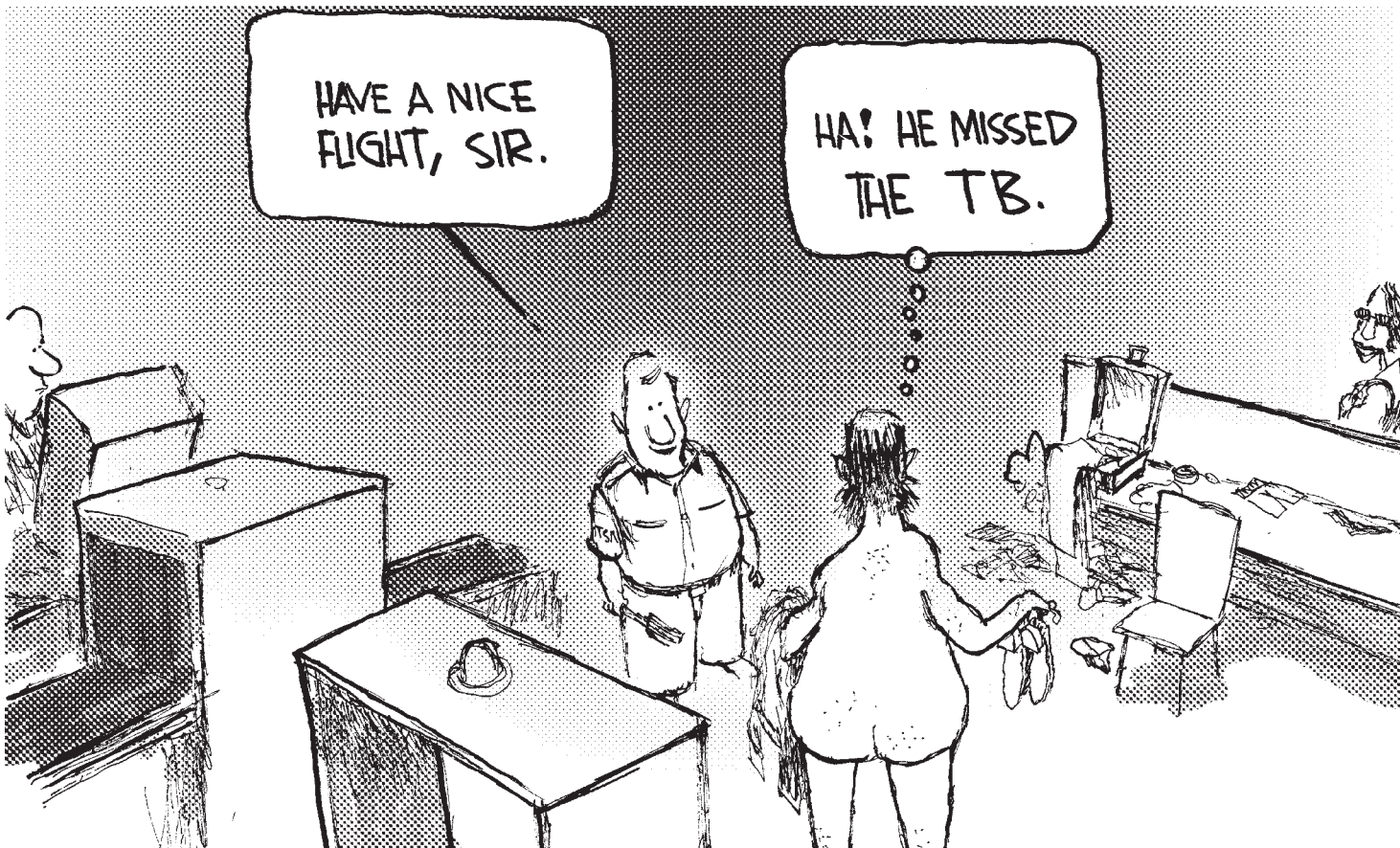
And then he bounds down the steps and runs into the world searching for squeaky varmints.

Army masses armor in possible push against militants in refugee camp in Lebanon

TRIPOLI, Lebanon (AP) — Under the cover of artillery barrages, dozens of Lebanese army tanks and armored carriers moved toward a Palestinian refugee camp in northern Lebanon Friday in pursuit of Islamic militants holed up inside.

The artillery bombardment sent clouds of white smoke rising above the Nahr el-Bared camp where Fatah Islam militants have been hanging on in a 13-day siege by the Lebanese army. The shelling also ignited fires in the camp that spewed black smoke. The militants have barricaded themselves in residential neighborhoods of narrow, winding streets and apartment buildings.

About 50 armored carriers, battle tanks and military vehicles from elite units massed at the northern edge of the camp and drove toward the forward-most positions, according to AP Television News crew at the scene.

There was no confirmation that the army units were making a final push to take over the camp, or were just advancing to grab territory and isolate the militants in pockets. But a significant decrease in shelling, accompanied by a rise in machine gun fire from armored carriers and exchanges of automatic rifle fire, suggested the troops were already engaging the militants.

British reporter kidnapped in the Gaza Strip says in videotape that he's been treated well

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip (AP) — Kidnapped British reporter Alan Johnston appeared Friday in a videotape posted on an Islamic militant Web site, saying his captors had treated him well, denouncing Israel and blasting Britain's Mideast policy. It was the first sign of life from him since he was abducted almost three months ago.

There was no way to tell when the video was recorded, and it was not clear why his captors chose this time to post it. The British Broadcasting Corp. journalist, who has been covering the Palestinian territo-

ries for three years, has a reputation for objectivity, and it seemed likely he was reciting what he was told to say.

The videotape appeared on the Al-Ekhlaas Web site, frequently used by Islamic militants. It bore the logo of the Army of Islam, the shadowy Palestinian group that had been believed to be holding the 45-year-old reporter.

Johnston looked fit and calm during the three minutes he spoke.

Iran promises to come clean on past suspicious nuclear activities

MADRID, Spain (AP) — Seeking to evade new U.N. sanctions, Iran has pledged to end years of stonewalling and provide answers on past suspicious activities to the U.N. nuclear monitoring agency probing its atomic program, an official said Friday.

The offer, which the official said was made Thursday by top Iranian nuclear negotiator Ali Larijani to EU foreign policy chief Javier Solana, falls short of the concession sought by the international community — a promise to freeze Iran's uranium enrichment activities.

Iran refuses to consider such a freeze but the U.N. Security Council insists on it, and past meetings between Solana and Larijani have made little progress on resolving the deadlock.

Larijani's overture and the decision by Solana to treat the Iranian offer seriously, thus reflected mutual recognition that the talks needed to advance on other issues or face the risk of collapse.

Still, U.N. and other officials, who demanded anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss the issue, said any decision by Iran to fully cooperate on clearing up past activities would represent a

major concession.

Quarantine of Atlanta attorney infected with tuberculosis raises legal questions

ATLANTA (AP) — The case of a jet-setting tuberculosis patient might soon shift from the hospital wards to the courts. The patient, Andrew Speaker, an Atlanta personal injury attorney, could sue the federal government for being quarantined on the basis of federal regulations that some scholars see as unconstitutional.

Or Speaker could be sued by fellow airline passengers, especially if any caught the disease from him — which some legal scholars say is much more likely.

"He may be personally liable if someone contracts TB" from being near him on his recent flights to and from Europe, said Peter Jacobson, a University of Michigan professor of public health law.

Contract Bridge

Bidding Quiz

You are South, both sides vulnerable.

The bidding has gone:

North	East	South	West
1♥	Pass	1♠	Pass
2♣	Pass	?	

What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?

- ♠AJ86 ♥Q5 ♦AJ9 ♣Q643
- ♠Q8643 ♥95 ♦J3 ♣KJ72
- ♠AKJ543 ♥Q963 ♦94 ♣87
- ♠KQJ9842 ♥A ♦J7 ♣865

1. **Three notrump.** With a sound opening bid facing an opening bid, a game contract must be reached. Given your balanced distribution and all-around strength, notrump appears the most feasible game. If partner's distribution is such that he prefers a suit contract, your hand is sufficiently flexible to support such an effort.

The important thing is to avoid bidding only two notrump or raising to three clubs, either of which would permit partner to pass with a minimum opening bid. Invitational bids of this sort are reserved strictly for hands where there is doubt whether a game should be reached. In this case no such doubt should exist.

2. **Pass.** At the other end of the spectrum are those hands where the

previous bidding indicates game is very unlikely. Partner's two-club rebid may be based on minimum values or a moderately good hand, but even in the latter case, your hand is nothing to get excited about. Partner's failure to jump to two notrump wipes out any chance of a notrump game, while a game in clubs is too remote to be seriously considered. A raise to three clubs might easily result in getting the partnership too high.

3. **Four hearts.** You should be perfectly willing to play in a game at hearts, and you can get that message across to partner by jumping to game in that suit. It is not necessary to rebid your excellent spade suit, since a heart contract is surely playable whether partner has spade support or not. Rebidding spades can only confuse the issue. You can also jump to three hearts, provided your partnership plays that bid as forcing.

4. **Four spades.** Lacking a satisfactory fit for either of partner's suits, and holding a powerful suit that requires no support from partner, you can deliver both messages in one fell swoop by leaping to four spades. The four-spade bid is mildly invitational to slam, a contract you should not fear if partner decides to carry on.
