Necking Party On Street Costs Man \$12.70 in Court

"Necking" is expensive when practiced on the streets of Sweetwater, a young man riding with a young woman in an automobile bearing a Roscoe tag learned Tuesday night, after Chief of Police Johnson, on foot, had overtaken the car, and escorted the young man to corporation court. The young woman was driving the car, a coupe, slowly through the business section of the city. Though the car was traveling slowly, the young man was going at a high rate of speed. Chief Johnson caught sight of the "giraffe party," and while he was endeavoring to get a line on the principals, the car circled the 100 block on Oak street, and the Chief did a short and snappy dash up the middle of the street, overtaking his prey. The young man enriched the city treasury \$12.70, while the young woman waited outside in the coupe. The court informed the man that it believed a charge of assault with attempt to murder would not be out of place, as he was apparently about to smother the young woman. As the coupe left Sweetwater, the occupants were parked as far apart as possible.

TROOPS WILL NOT SET EDITOR FREE

Carl Magee, Sentenced for Contempt of Court, Spends Night in Jail, Although Pardon.

SHERIFF REFUSES PARDON Denied Right of Governor to Pardon Direct Contempt—Adjutant Request Use of Troops.

By The United Press. LAS VEGAS, N. M., July 22.—Governor James Hinkle today refused to order National Guard troops to free Carl Magee, editor of the New Mexico State Tribune, in jail here for contempt of court, as requested by Adjutant General Skipworth.

The Governor said that the case must now go to the Supreme Court to be decided, but he indicated that he would release Magee on bond pending the action of the higher court.

Magee was sentenced yesterday, and the Governor issued a pardon which the Sheriff refused to recognize, holding that the Governor could not pardon direct contempt. Magee spent the night in jail.

The Supreme Court will be asked to rule on whether the Governor may pardon in cases of direct contempt. The Governor gave the pardon to the Adjutant General, who presented it to the Sheriff. When the Sheriff refused to honor it, Skipworth appealed to the right to use State troops to release Magee, but the Governor refused to sanction the request.

Judge Young of Post Here. Judge Arthur Young, accompanied by his son, Phillip Young, of Post City, is in Sweetwater where he will probably receive medical treatment at a local sanitarium. He is the father of Mrs. Dalton Moore of Sweetwater.

EASTLAND JAILER DIES OF WOUNDS

Farmer Kills Instantly in Gun Battle at County Jail—Blame Mistaken Identity.

CATCHES MELON THIEVES

Brings Trespassers to Jail, Missed Train Home—Shooting Starts When Deputy Draws Gun.

By The United Press. EASTLAND, Texas, July 23.—One man is dead and another is believed to be dying as the result of a gun battle thought to have been caused by mistaken identity. John Hennessee, deputy sheriff and jailer, was shot twice with a shot gun loaded with buck shot, and died instantly. C. Q. Davis, farmer living near Ranger, was shot once with a pistol, the bullet entering his body above the heart.

Davis was taken to a hospital here, where it was said that he would probably die.

The shooting occurred at the county jail at about one o'clock this morning. During the night Davis had apprehended some persons in his watermelon patch, and brought them to the county jail. He missed his train to Ranger, and went back to the jail.

When he reached there and asked entrance, Mrs. Hennessee aroused her husband, who went to the door armed. When he reached the door, he drew a pistol, and ordered Davis to put up his hands.

Then the shooting started. Hennessee was struck once in the left side of his head, once in his left side, and in the left arm. One bullet struck Davis.

Burial in Mississippi.

The body of Mrs. J. G. Tatum, accompanied by her husband, J. G. Tatum, was transferred from the Santa Fe to the T-P train here Wednesday morning enroute from Post City to Brookville, Miss., where the remains will be buried in the family cemetery. Mr. Tatum is a ranchman near Post City and has visited recently in Sweetwater.

HOME DESTROYED

Fire at Baker Residence Early Wednesday—Flames Raze Structure Before Aid Arrives.

Fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the home of R. D. Baker, one mile south of Sweetwater on the Lake Trammell road at 4 o'clock Wednesday morning. The blaze started in the attic and was burning through the roof when the family was awakened by the smoke and rushed to safety.

One of Baker's daughters turned in the alarm at the Owens Refinery, but the house was practically burned down when the department arrived. A small quantity of household goods was saved.

The loss was estimated at \$2500, and was partially covered by insurance.

PITTSBURGH PLUS IS HELD UNFAIR

Federal Trade Commission Orders U. S. Steel Corporation to Abandon Price Fixing System.

AWAIT CORPORATION MOVE

U. S. Steel May Fight Decision—System Based on Price Plus Freight Rate From Pittsburgh.

By The United Press. WASHINGTON, D. C., July 23.—A saving of \$30,000,000 annually in the cost of steel to the farmers of eleven Western States was promised by the Federal Trade Commission today when it ordered the U. S. Steel Corporation to abandon the "Pittsburgh Plus" system of price fixing of steel.

The attitude of the U. S. Steel Corporation, controlling fifty per cent of the steel industry of the country regarding the Commission's decision is awaited with great interest, especially as to whether the decision will be contested in the courts.

"Pittsburgh Plus" provoked one of the bitterest fights ever before the trade commission. The system which the decision outlaws is that by which the steel corporation and each of its subsidiary plants fixed the price of steel outside the Pittsburgh district.

The price formula follows: The base price at Pittsburgh plus what the freight charge from Pittsburgh would be. This meant that wherever the field purchase was made, the buyer paid the Pittsburgh price plus the freight rate, even in case the delivery was made to a nearer point.

The reasons for the trade commission's action are: that the system is an unfair method of competition; it is in violation of the federal commission act; price discrimination in violation of the Clayton act; it is contrary to public interest; it is not based on the law of supply and demand, the price fixing system succeeds the old "steels pools."

Among the most important effects of the abandonment, the commission declared, will be the strengthening of field centers.

PARLEY MAY FAIL

Grave Doubt of Settlement of Reparations Question as Plenary Session Opens.

By The United Press. LONDON, Eng., July 23.—The shadow of former Premier Poincare hovered over the Allied Reparations Conference as the plenary session convened at 3 p. m. with grave possibilities that another effort to settle the reparations question might fail.

The situation was admittedly critical as the Allied representatives gathered for the meeting, but the delegates continued to do their utmost to harmonize the diverging viewpoints, hoping for a lasting decision and not a precarious compromise.

Suit Case, Struck By Auto, Explodes, Blows Man to Bits

LOS ANGELES, Calif., July 23.—One man was blown to bits and another was probably fatally mangled in an explosion which occurred at Vernon Avenue and Long Beach Boulevard, when an automobile driven by Mrs. Markory Watts struck a suitcase believed to have contained nitro-glycerine.

The victims of the explosion had not been identified following the blast. Tonight and Wednesday, partly cloudy, probable showers in West.

Mrs. Robertson Improving. Many friends over the city will rejoice to learn that Mrs. F. G. Robertson is somewhat improved today, according to Mrs. George Sparks, her nurse, the crisis is safely passed, though she is yet seriously ill. Unless some unexpected complications occur, she will be on the road to recovery in a few days. She was in a critical condition for 48 hours, till about 4 o'clock Monday afternoon, when a change for the better took place.

DEMANDS DEATH IN FRANKS CASE

State's Attorney Makes Dramatic Plea For Gallows in Trial of Youthful Slayers.

DEFENSE COUNSEL ROUSED Objects to Calling Crime "Atrocious"—Father of Robert Franks Takes Stand.

By The United Press. CHICAGO, Ill., July 23.—A dramatic plea for hanging was made by State's Attorney Robert E. Crowe as he concluded a bitter arraignment of Nathan Leopold Jr. and Richard Loeb, for the slaying of Robert Franks, school boy.

Crowe, speaking of the killing as one of the most atrocious crimes in Chicago's history, in the name of the people and the State demanded death. Clarence Darrow, chief defense counsel, sprang to his feet at the conclusion of the appeal, and took issue to the characterization of the crime as "atrocious."

The two attorneys started a sharp wrangle, and were halted by Chief Justice Caverly, who ordered Darrow to make a plain statement, and Crowe to keep the peace.

Leopold and Loeb, squirming under the fire of Crowe's examination, regained their composure as Darrow outlined the case of the defense. They whispered to each other as Richard Franks, father of the slain boy, took the stand.

Keeping his eyes from the slayers of his son, Franks testified, identifying articles of clothing worn by Robert.

LABOR OKEHS BOB

Minnesota Convention Urges Support of La Follette by American Federation of Labor.

By The United Press. FAIRBAULT, Minn., July 23.—Organized labor of Minnesota will support La Follette for president and Senator Wheeler for vice president, according to the decision of the delegates to the State Federation of Labor convention.

The delegates, after defeating attempts to endorse the Communist candidates, adopted a resolution urging the American Federation of Labor to support the Progressive ticket.

The Communists attempted to substitute an amendment to endorse William Z. Foster and Ben Zittlow for the high offices. They were maneuvered into the position where they could not withdraw the amendment, and were defeated by the record vote of 185 to 16, and the out and out Communist in the convention were recorded.

SHIFTS BLAME IN MCLEARY DEATH

Youth Who Confessed Now Says Pal Did Actual Killing After Officer Had Given Them Ride.

SAYS OFFICER WAS ROBBED

Man Sought For Murder Forced McLeary From Car, Fired Twice Into His Head, Boy Claims.

By The United Press. NASHVILLE, Tenn., July 23.—Frank Harrell, 22, confessed slayer of Major Samuel H. McLeary, war hero, today repudiated his confession and accused Mortimer H. King, Columbia, S. C., of the murder.

Harrell, following his arrest last night, confessed, police said, that he and King slew McLeary after he had offered them a ride in his car. Today authorities said that he accused King, declaring that the latter forced McLeary out of the car, placed a gun at his head, and fired two shots.

Harrell pleaded with King not to kill McLeary, he said. "King robbed McLeary, and threatened to kill me if I opened my mouth," Harrell said.

D. F. JOHNSON ILL

Brownwood Postmaster, Father of Donald Johnson, Suffers Stroke.

Mr. and Mrs. Donald Johnson have gone to Brownwood in response to a message stating that Mr. Johnson's father, D. F. Johnson, Brownwood postmaster, and Past Grand Master of the Masonic Lodge of Texas, is not expected to live.

Mr. Johnson suffered a stroke of paralysis while down town, and was taken home in a critical condition, the message stated.

HAMILTON TO RETURN

Elected Assistant Cashier of City National Bank.

Dr. P. R. Hamilton of Farmersville, formerly of Sweetwater, was elected assistant cashier of the City National Bank at a recent meeting of the board of directors of that institution. Mr. Hamilton will assume his new duties September 1.

Dr. Hamilton was formerly a Sweetwater resident and still owns property here. He and his family have a large circle of friends in the city who will be glad to welcome his return to Sweetwater.

WAR VET RADIO EXPERT

Able to Move Only Head, Devises Own System.

By The United Press. LOS ANGELES, Calif., July 23.—Ever since the World War, Owen Myers, disabled veteran, has been unable to move any portion of his body except his head.

But despite that handicap, he has come to be known as one of the leading radio experts of the section. He has had arranged a system of mirrors by which he directs work of installing radio equipment and it has become the absorbing interest of his life.

Radio enthusiasts, knowing of his tragic handicap, visit his bedside. He is always willing to explain intricate details of radio work and derives pleasure from talking about his hobby.

Myers is a victim of shrapnel wounds, which resulted in a disease known as arthritis, depriving him of ability to move any muscles except those to his head.

BALDWIN, Kas., July 23.—The Baker University endowment campaign which was started two years ago, raised \$1,600,000, it was reported here this week by Rev. C. B. Zook, district superintendent of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The campaign ended July 16.

WHEELER DEFAULTS

Action of the Senator from Montana in accepting the nomination to double team it with Senator R. M. La Follette on a so-called progressive ticket is not calculated to enhance Senator Wheeler's character in the eyes of the Democratic party that he deserted nor the Republican party which he is opposing. For any strength developed by the so-called Progressive Party must come from the ranks of the Republicans; Senator Wheeler is not the man to draw any from the Democracy outside of his own state of Montana possibly. And Montana has been in the Republican columns quite as often as Democratic. So far no one has deserted his party and got away with it—not even so noted a man as Theodore Roosevelt.

Senator Wheeler, astute a politician as he undoubtedly is, must have thought public sentiment in Montana justified his action from a political standpoint. In the course of time he will doubtless find out his error.

It is to be hoped that some day the Middle West, which has hoped to achieve remedies from economic ills through political measures, will also find the error of their ways. It would seem almost as if North Dakota, with its costly experience with the Non-Partisan League, had already acquired sufficient education along that line.

VOTE SATURDAY

With the number of poll taxes paid exceeding the total for the last primary in Nolan County by several hundred, a large vote is expected in the county Saturday when the preliminaries in the 1924 election race are run.

Contests in the county this year have attracted less than average attention. While there have been no particularly hot races, the candidates have been active in seeking the support of the voters. Most of the races have been made quietly, as a shortage of community picnics and candidates speakings has cut stump oratory to a minimum.

In spite of the apparent lack of interest in many sections of the county, political dopesters predict that one of the largest votes on record will be polled in the primary. The fact that voters intend to cast their ballots for some one is seen in the way in which they flocked to answer the call for poll tax payments.

Vote Saturday. If you are to be away from Sweetwater, cast an absentee ballot now with the County Clerk. If your favorite candidate loses because you and other of his friends failed to cast your ballots for him, you will have only yourself to blame.

SIGHTING ANOTHER PERIL

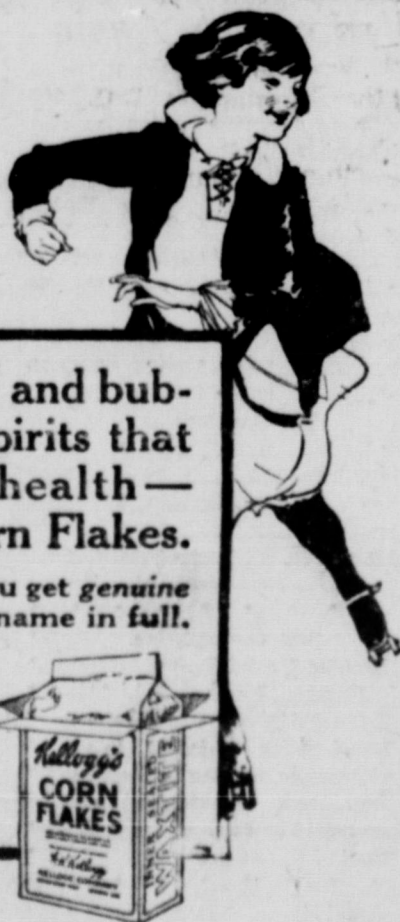

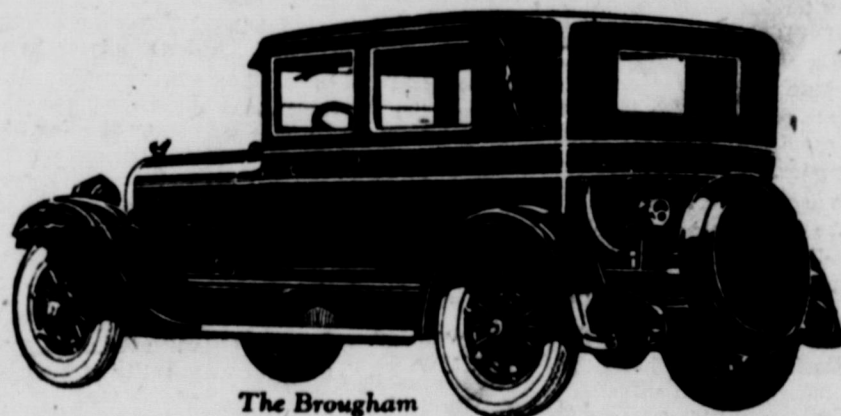

The State Board of Medical Examiners, Co-operating With the State Medical Association of Texas, Announce the Beginning of a Campaign of Public Education on Medical Subjects.

The medical profession has long recognized its obligation to the public in respect to the spreading of a more general knowledge of interesting and vital facts concerning public health.

There are many important facts relating to the cause, prevention and cure of disease that the public should know and does not know. It is felt that the public mind has been confused and misled by the numerous fads in medicine, and that it is not realized that there is a vast difference between theory and scientific fact.

In order to present positively known facts and to clarify the atmosphere as to theory, thus providing you with the means to protect the health of yourself and your loved ones, the legalized medical profession of Texas is entering upon this campaign.

Within the next few days addresses of extreme interest will be made from as many platforms as possible, by numerous well-known physicians, and covering a variety of public health subjects in a most illuminating manner. These speakers are thoroughly informed and capable of presenting their subjects in a manner that will be both interesting and entertaining. There will be no paid propagandists.

The practice of medicine, as such, is a matter of prime importance, in that upon it rests the foundation of public health. It is clear that the first efforts in the prevention of the spread of disease depends upon practicing physicians. If the existence of contagion or infection is not discovered early by competent diagnosticians, the opportunity for immediate and effective prevention is lost. A physician operating solely upon some theory of the cause of disease, disregarding all the known facts of medicine and allied sciences, is jeopardizing the lives of the public.

An educated, qualified medical profession is the first bulwark of defense against disease. The public should demand protection through a set standard of educational qualifications of all who would practice the healing art. The Medical Practice Act of Texas is designed to protect the public in exactly this manner. If this fact were generally understood public opinion would not permit the flaunting of this law as at present in the case. This law does not concern itself with and requires no examination on the theory or method of practice. Applicants are examined only on the fundamentals of medicine; the facts that have been developed through long years of study; facts which are subject to absolute proof. Practitioners of "sectarian" medicine of whatsoever type may come before this board for examination and receive license if they have the necessary schooling and can pass the fair examination.

The contention is for an educated, honest medical profession and a public informed on the facts of medicine, that it may protect its health and its life.
