## REVIVES FADED LAWN

Lawns get a tired look late in summer and can be stimulated and made fresh, according to experts of the United States Department of Agriculture, by a light top dressing, composed of 2 parts good loamy soil, one of well-rotted manure, fine-comminuted, or any good compost in which soil predominates, with 1-2 pounds of sulphate of ammonia or nitrate of soda, for every 1,000 square feet.

The mixture should be applied evenly, and will result in quick stimulation and new green growth. A mixture with a good proportion of soil is strongly urged, especially when the chemicals are used, as they will burn the grass when used too liberally on the lawn. If the grass is watered after the fertilizer is applied it should be thoroughly and liberally done.

## NEW BREED OF POULTRY

Lamona is the name given to a new breed of poultry that has been developed at the Experimental Farm of the United States Department of Agriculture at Beltsville, Md. It has been named by Secretary Wallace after the originator, Harry M. Lamona, senior poultryman of the Bureau of Animal Industry. It is a white fowl with red ear lobes that lays a white-shelled egg. White Plymouth Rock, Silver Gray Dorking, and White Leghorn were the breeds used as foundation stock.

The fowls are larger than Leghorns, with long, deep bodies, well feathered, and comb and wattles of medium size. The new breed is not ready for introduction and neither eggs or fowls can be secured. When a sufficient stock of birds has been raised, specimens will be sent to State agricultural colleges and experiment stations to test their adaptability to different sections and conditions.

## Ordinance No. 152

An Ordinance to be known as Ordinance No. 152 forbidding trespass in, on, and injuring, the equipment and fixtures and fittings on the sewage disposal grounds and providing for a penalty.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Hereford:

Sec. 1. If any person hereafter shall throw rocks or any other missile or thing at, or shall in any way injure or attempt to injure any equipment, fixtures, or fittings attached to or used in connection with the sewer disposal plant of the City of Hereford, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any sum not to exceed two hundred dollars.

Sec. 2. If any person shall loiter or linger or loaf on or trespass upon the Sewer Disposal Grounds of the City of Hereford, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any sum not to exceed two hundred dollars.

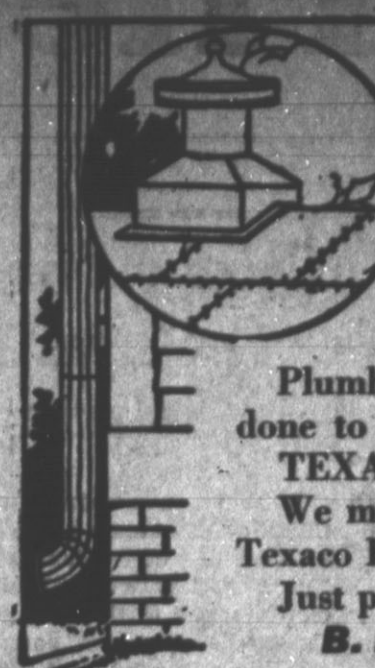

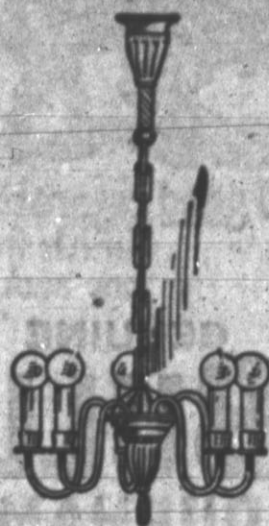
Following this number was a round table discussion of the topic, "Women in Practical Politics," in which many hints and suggestions along the line of local politics and political measures of special interest to women were brought out.

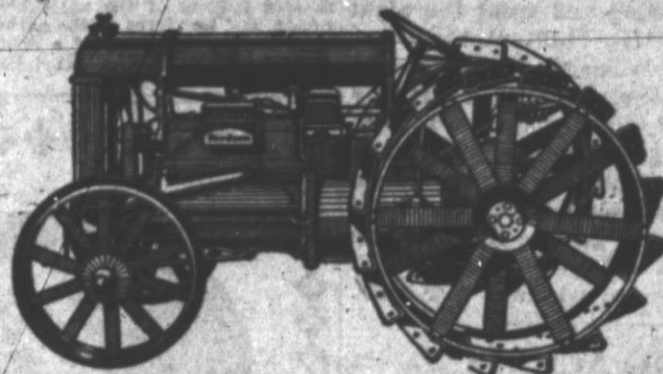

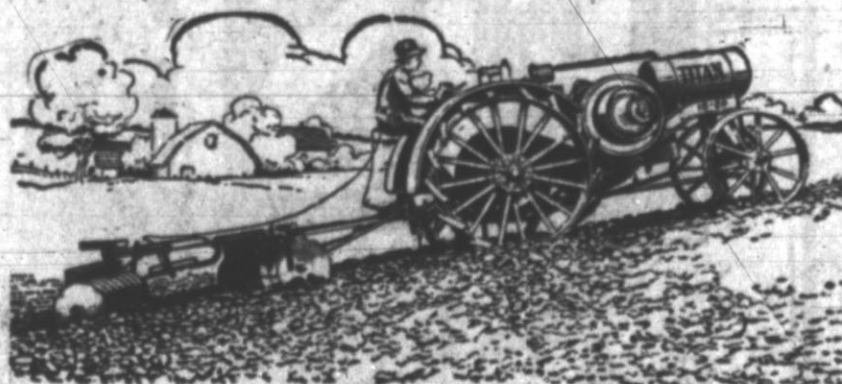

**Ordinance No. 153**

An Ordinance to be known as Ordinance No. 153 prohibiting the construction and maintenance of oil and gasoline storage tanks north of the railroad right of way in the City of Hereford. Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Hereford:

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful hereafter for any person, firm, or corporation to construct, maintain, or operate a storage tank for gasoline, kerosene, or any kind of oil, with a capacity of more than 550 gallons, in any part of the City of Hereford north of the right of way of the Pecos and Northern Texas Railway Company, or of the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Company.

Sec. 2. Any person who shall hereafter construct, maintain, or operate either as owner, or employee, any storage tank of a capacity of more than 550 gallons in the City of Hereford north of the right of way of the Pecos and Northern Texas Railway Company, or of the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Company, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any sum not to exceed two hundred dollars.

Sec. 3. It shall be unlawful hereafter for any person, firm, or corporation to construct, maintain, or operate a storage tank for gasoline, above the surface of the ground, with a capacity of fifty gallons and not exceeding 550 gallons, in any part of the City of Hereford.

Any person who shall hereafter construct, maintain, or operate above the surface of the ground any storage tank for storing gasoline, with a capacity of as much as fifty and not exceeding 550 gallons, in the City of Hereford north of the right of way of the Pecos and Northern Texas Railway Company, or of the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Company, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any sum not to exceed two hundred dollars.

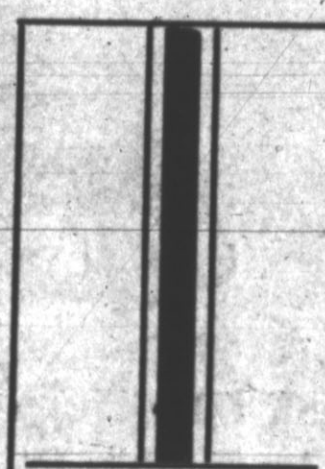
