More Lights, But Seal Sale Lagging

More bulbs are lighted on Hettie Wallace Branch, Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Walker, Mr. and Mrs. Leslie A. Keith, Dr. and Mrs. Joe Terry.

Goal for Mitchell County TB Seals this season is \$2,000. Eighty-two per cent of each dollar given in the seal sale remains right here in Mitchell County for TB case finding and rehabilitation, health education and medical work within the county. Twelve per cent goes into statewide program benefitting all counties and the remaining 6 per cent is channeled to national headquarters for medical research and other nationwide projects.

So far the 1960 sale has brought in only \$1,107.47 — more than \$231 below last year's pace.

Phone Rate Boost, Water Project Before Council

Proposals Listed At Monday Meeting

City Council Monday night will face these 2 major money matters affecting the pocketbooks of the municipality and its residents.

1. Whether to plan for all, part or none of a \$385,000 water plant and distribution improvements program suggested by consulting engineers.

2. What to do about a request by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company for a phone rate increase for Colorado City.

Definite answer for either question may not come Monday night, but both questions will be on the council agenda.

Preliminary report of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper—consulting engineers of Lubbock—was presented to councilmen last month by S. C. Cooper.

And the report proposed a \$385,855 improvements program in a priority system of work for the water plant and distribution.

Councilmen have discussed the report since then and final recommendations will be placed on the council table Monday night.

A water improvements program will require a city bond issue of 1 of 3 types—either a revenue type supported entirely by water department revenues (if the city could call in previously issued bonds at a reasonable figure), or a combination type issue supported by both water revenue and property tax revenue, or a tax bond issue supported entirely from tax revenue.

The phone rate request has been in the making quietly for several weeks. Although not publicly announced by Southwestern Bell, it will seek base increases in both residential and business phone rates.

Current base rates are approximately \$10 for business and \$5 for residential. Southwestern Bell's proposal likely will seek increases of about \$1 per month for business base and about 50 cents monthly for residential service base.

UNDER BRUCELLOSIS CONTROL

Here Are New Rules For Cattle Removal

Here is a point-by-point look at the requirements governing removal of cattle from livestock markets in brucellosis (bangs) Certified Counties or counties in the Process of Certification.

Since tests are under way now for Mitchell County for the process of certifying Mitchell as a Type 2 Control county, these regulations apply to Mitchell County now.

"These rules are very important to livestock owners in Mitchell County as failure to comply with them could jeopardize the brucellosis status of the county," R. G. Garrett, executive director of Texas Animal Health Commission, informed the Colorado City Record.

"These rules are necessary to prevent Mitchell County from being re-infected as a result of infected livestock moving through the livestock markets," Garrett added.

Following are the requirements governing removal of cattle from livestock markets:

After cattle are purchased and before removal from livestock markets, it shall be the joint responsibility of the purchaser and the livestock market operator to have all cattle, subject to brucellosis tests or vaccinations, tested or vaccinated.

1. All cattle — except steers, spayed heifers, calves under 8 months of age and official brucellosis vaccines under 30 months of age — leaving this market to premises in any county in which Type II Brucellosis Work is being conducted or has

been completed, will have to comply with the following:

(a.) Cattle originating in a Modified Certified Brucellosis County or Certified Brucellosis Free Herds and accompanied by a health certificate, when kept separate and apart from other cattle in clean pens used for that purpose ONLY, can move without further tests.

(b.) Cattle from other than Modified Certified Counties accompanied by official health certificate showing negative to brucellosis test within 30 days, kept separate and apart from other cattle in clean pens used for that purpose ONLY, can be moved directly to owners premises, under quarantine, retested in not less than 30 nor more than 60 days, and, if negative, released.

(c.) Cattle that don't comply with Paragraph a or b must be negative to a brucellosis test before leaving the livestock market. They can then be moved to owners premises, under quarantine, retested in not less than 60 days, and, if negative, released.

2. In the event laboratory facilities are not available in the town where the livestock market is located, the livestock market will be required to furnish space and install necessary brucellosis testing equipment required under regulations of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

3. The veterinarian, before conducting and certifying to results of brucellosis tests at the livestock market, shall be specifically approved to conduct such tests.

He was born in Arkansas Dec. 15, 1879. He was married to Nellie Dickinson in McCollough County Feb. 20, 1908. She died in August of 1929. Powell was a retired farmer and had lived in Colorado City since 1941.

Services were conducted at the Kiker and Son Chapel with Rev. R. B. Murray of Big Spring, officiating. Burial was in the Colorado City Cemetery under direction of Kiker and Son Funeral Home.

Powell is survived by 2 sons, W. T. Powell and L. R. Powell, both of Colorado City; 4 daughters, Mrs. W. E. Perry

COUNTY DEEP TEST

Standard Oil to Test Ellenburger

A deep test oil wildcat will be drilled 4 miles north of Colorado City.

Site for the 7,800 foot prospect — first deep test for the county in long time — has been staked as Standard No. 1 Dell Barber.

It will drill for a test in the Ellenburger at a location 1,800 feet from north and 900 feet from west lines of Section 18, Block 26, T&P Survey.

The well was completed with daily potential of 310.1 barrels of 47 gravity oil with perforations between 5,584 and 5,591 feet. Gas oil-ratio was 1,770-1 and total depth was 6,100 feet with casing set to 6,092 feet.

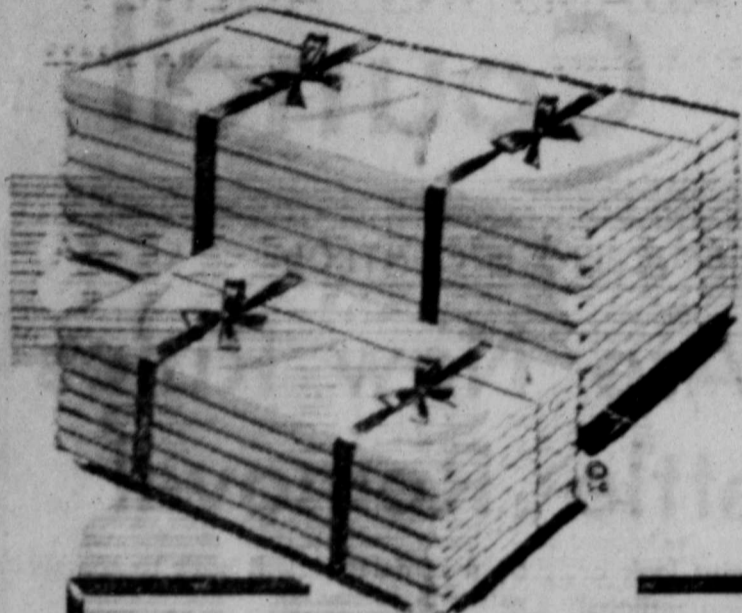

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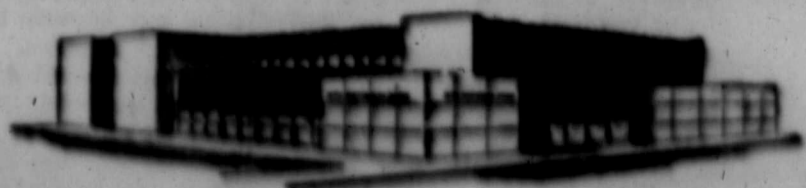
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Reception Honors Jr. High Coaches and Team Members

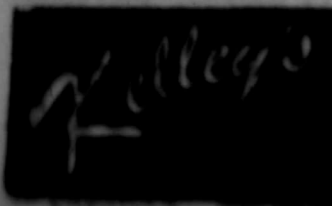

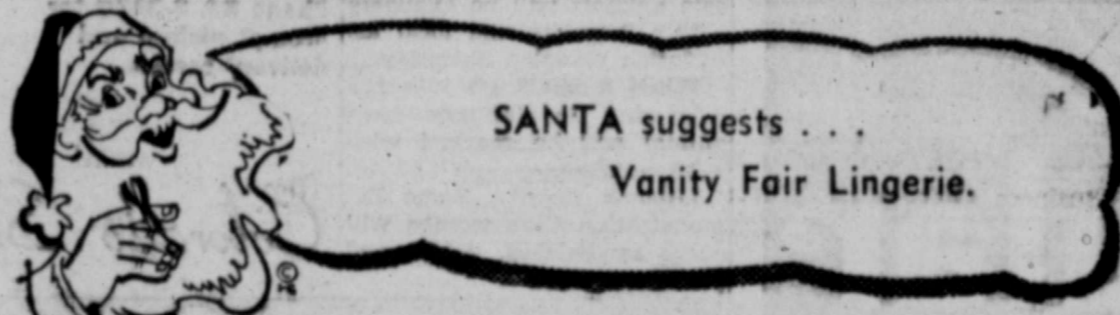

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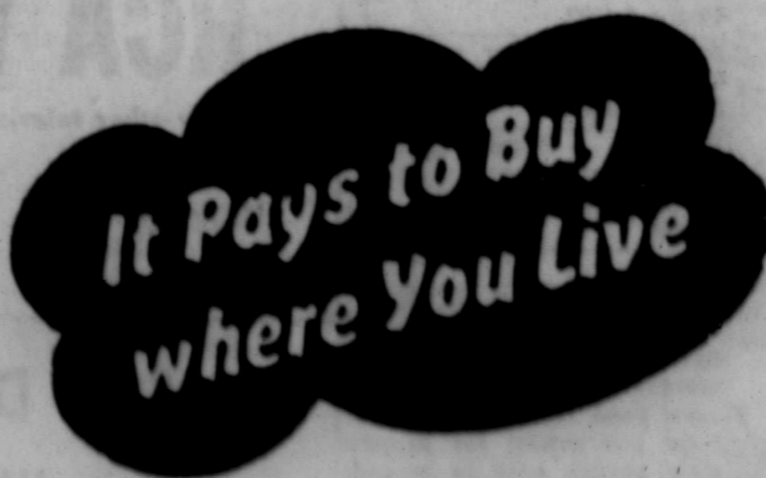
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
