Britian Blames Argentina

By The Associated Press ideas for a peaceful settlement on the Falkland Islands conflict. It also published its own proposal and blamed Argentina for failure to resolve the conflict.

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withdrawal of all armed forces to at least 150 miles from the Falklands within two weeks; appointment of an interim U.N. administrator who would function "in consultation" with the islanders' legislative and executive councils, including two representatives of the small, resident Argentine population; and talks on the long-term future of the islands, "without prejudice of the outcome," with a target completion date of Dec. 31.

Britain said the draft agreement "represented the furthest (it) could go in the negotiations," and that Argentina's reply "amounted to a rejection."

Perez de Cuellar called Mrs. Thatcher late Wednesday night to make a last-minute appeal for peace and made a similar appeal to Argentine President Leopoldo F. Galtieri in Buenos Aires.

There's nothing like a streak of rough weather to get the public's attention. People in and around Snyder have had one eye on the sky and one ear cocked toward the emergency warning sirens practically 24 hours a day for the past two weeks.

They also have been raising a lot of questions. In fact, our "Ask Us" contacts have swung heavily to weather-related topics recently, even crowding out—for the moment, at least—the tax appraisal office as the most popular topic of the community. There are no answers for some of the questions, of course. If we knew, or could find someone who could tell us, when is the best time to get out on the road to avoid tornadoes, whether a six-inch concrete enclosure is tornado-proof, or how close you have to be for a tornado to harm you we would put it in headlines.

What is safe in one tornado may not be in another, we are told. And one can hit any time, anywhere.



There are some tendencies and statistics that may offer encouragement, however. We do know for a fact that May is the leading month for tornadoes in Texas, which should mean an improvement in the situation next month, but perhaps not much. If there is such a thing as a "tornado season," it is April, May and June. Records for the past 30 years show a total of 567 in April, 939 in May and 508 in June. The figure drops sharply to 198 in July.

But no month is immune to tornadoes, and the most ever to occur in a single month was 124 in September of 1967. September is not one of the tornado leaders, but in 1967 it set the single-month record when Hurricane Beulah hit the Texas Coast near Brownsville and spawned 115 funnels.

The most tornadoes recorded in May for a single year was 65 in 1969. We haven't seen any totals so far this year, but if the trend continues, 1982 may be in the running for a record.



When extreme weather situations are discussed we are reminded of the story of the elderly lady who was recognized as a weather prophet in her small community. Neighbors consulted her before killing hogs, planting crops, etc., and she always seemed to have the correct answer.

So, a Methodist Sunday School teacher called one day to inquire about the weather prospects for a certain day when a class planned to have a picnic. Without batting an eye, she assured them that they could count on perfect picnic weather.

But on the appointed day, it came a flash flood. One of the elderly lady's relatives chided her about the prediction. "Why did you tell them it would be a pretty day when you knew all along it was going to rain?"

"Well, I don't think it hurts them Methodists to get soaking wet once in a while," she retorted.

HOUSTON (AP) — A grandmother who refused to plea bargain will be arraigned next month on a charge she illegally possessed the marijuana found growing in her garden.

Laura Clark, 82, was ordered Wednesday to appear for arraignment on June 4.

Police, acting on a tip, said they found five plants growing in Mrs. Clark's backyard garden. They said the woman willingly showed officers the plants.

"I haven't used it," Mrs. Clark said Wednesday. She has previously told reporters she brewed an ointment of alcohol and marijuana and rubbed it on her arthritic joints. "I was going to use it when it got old enough."

Early Elections Expected

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Elections in November, three years ahead of schedule, were predicted today for Israel after Prime Minister Menachem Begin squeaked past another attempt to vote him out of office.

Begin on Wednesday defeated the seventh no-confidence motion of his 10 months in office by a vote of 58-57 in the Knesset, the Israeli parliament, despite the defection the day before of two members of his Likud Bloc to the opposition Labor Party.

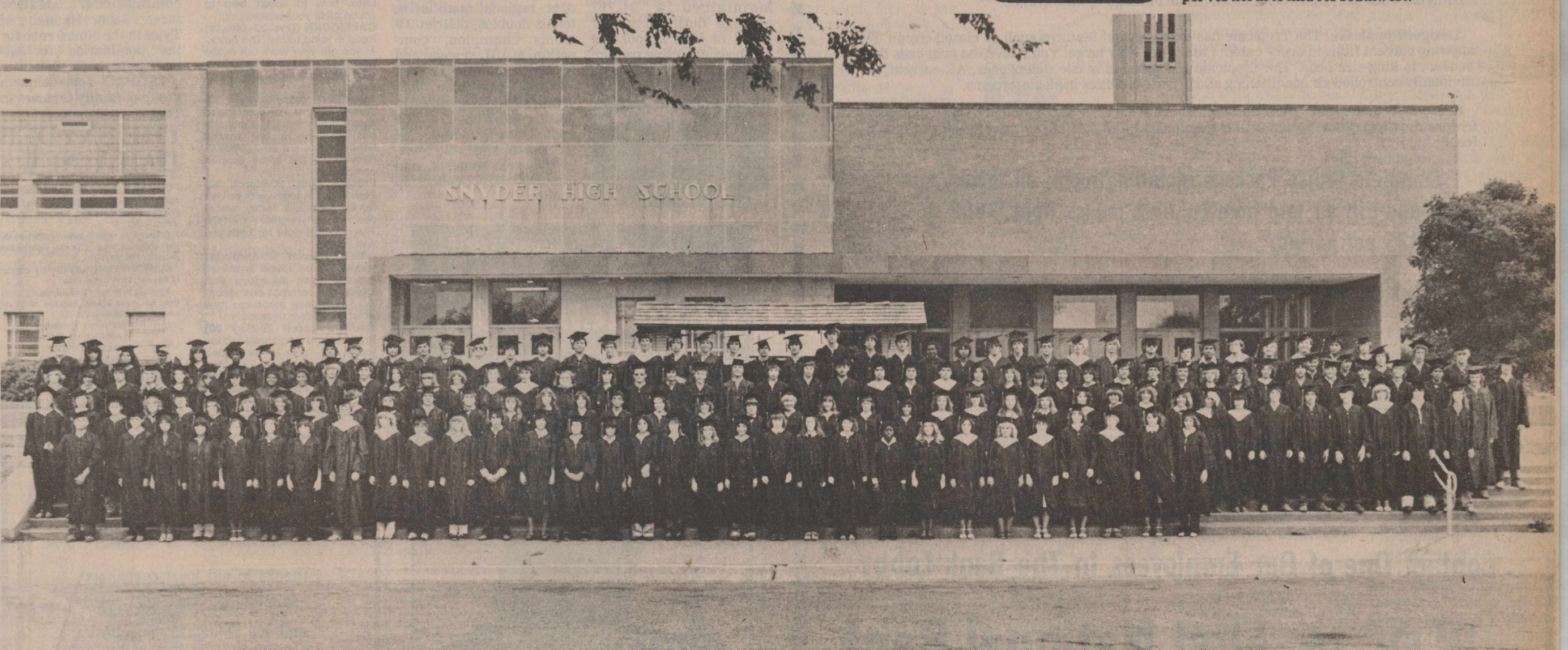
Q.—Which year holds the rainfall record in Snyder, and how much was it?

In Spite Of Death Threat...

Hatch Vows To Continue Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Senate Labor Committee is vowing to pursue allegations linking Labor Secretary Raymond J. Donovan to union payoffs and organized crime figures — despite an

anonymous death threat to a committee investigator.

Sen. Orrin G. Hatch, R-Utah, disclosed that a committee investigator got a call warning him "to lay off" Donovan, the subject of a special prosecutor's investigation in New York City and a continuing Senate committee probe.

Hatch, who declined to identify the staff member, said "there's no proof that it could be attributed to anybody. But, basically it

was to lay off Mr. Donovan."

"It was a serious call. It was a threat," said Hatch, adding the matter had been referred to the FBI. The senator also said, "I've had some minor threats in this matter, but I don't consider them significant."

One labor committee source, who declined to be named publicly, said the anonymous caller warned that if the investigator did not back away from the Donovan probe, "...your wife will end up in a pine box."

The labor secretary said through a spokesman late Wednesday that he would not comment on the death threat.

Spokesman Vernon Louviere reiterated Donovan's position that he will not talk publicly about the allegations against him while the case is before a special grand jury

in Brooklyn, N.Y. Hatch's disclosure of the death threat came on the same day that the Utah senator and committee members said they were

Looking Into New Funds

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Dallas County Commissioners Court may establish a self-insurance fund for county officials and employees, but may not collect money from employees to cover their dependents, Attorney General Mark White held Wednesday.

Collecting contributions is the same as collecting premiums, White said, and the commissioners cannot do this because they are not authorized to engage in the business of insurance.

His opinion was requested by Criminal District Attorney Henry Wade of Dallas.

outraged by instigation of a counter-investigation of the labor committee. That probe has been launched by Schiavone Construction Co., the New Jersey firm which Donovan served as executive vice president before joining the Reagan administration.

Donovan is under investigation by special prosecutor Leon Silverman on an allegation that in 1977, while with the Schiavone company, he was present at a Long Island City restaurant luncheon at which a \$2,000 payoff was made to the head of Local 29 of the Blasters Union.

Since Silverman opened his investigation early this year, new allegations by FBI informants have been made, including an assertion that Donovan had business and social ties to several reputed organized

crime figures.

The labor secretary denied allegations of union corruption and links to mobsters during his confirmation hearings, but has refused to discuss the case in recent months. He testified May 12 before the federal grand jury in Brooklyn.

Meanwhile, Hatch said his committee will continue to look into the allegations against Donovan. But he also said that no new hearings will be held until Silverman completes his investigation.

"It's the special prosecutor's job," he said. "I'll wait for his report."

Hatch said he was "personally offended" by the counter-investigation of his committee by the New Jersey construction company.

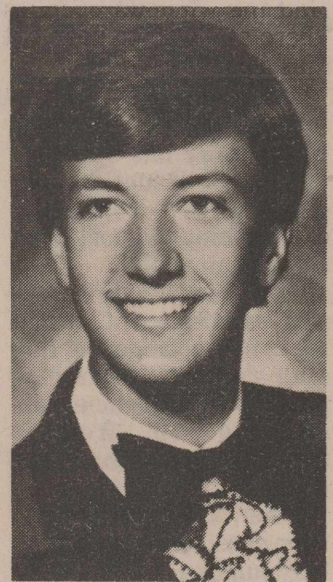
Rotan school board will honor the seniors and their parents at a reception in the high school library following the baccalaureate program.

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No Injuries In Pampa Twister

By The Associated Press Damage was estimated at \$3 million in the wake of turbulent weather in the Texas Panhandle that spawned at least six tornadoes near Pampa.

There were no reports of injury and the bulk of the damage was to a building under construction that was flattened east of Pampa.

Shirley Muns, information officer for Pampa's Civil Defense organization, said, "We were sitting in the center of town and could see them pass overhead. It was like the cloud was just over us and they were popping down."

One of the twisters leveled a truck terminal, maintenance and storage facility being built east of Pampa by Halliburton Co., an oil field service company.

Harold Tomlinson, construction coordinator, said construction was 80 percent completed. He estimated the damage at more than \$3 million.

Department of Public Safety officer Robert Wilson said he pulled his cruiser behind a cattle trailer near Pampa to protect the car from hail, but a twister picked the trailer up and slammed it on his cruiser.

Damage was also reported at several farmhouses and a commercial feedlot 12 miles east of Pampa suffered extensive damage.

The tornadoes hit between 5:40 p.m. and 7:30 p.m., Ms. Muns said.

She said the downtown area was not hit, though winds overturned a few cars, damaged trees and knocked some bricks from an elementary school and a school system business office.

Thunderstorm activity continued early today across northern sections of the Panhandle.

Skies were partly cloudy over the rest of the state.

Early morning temperatures were in the 60s in the Panhandle and higher elevations of Southwest Texas and in the 70s elsewhere.

Here's the Answer

Q. — There are a lot of outside noises in our neighborhood that we would like to keep out of our house. It isn't too bad in the winter when the windows usually are closed, but gets very annoying in the warm weather when the screens are in place and the windows open. Is there any way to keep out this noise?

A. — This is a difficult problem to solve for the very reason you mentioned — noise can't be stopped if there is nothing in the way to stop it. You can only hope to make it less annoying once it gets into your rooms by having soundabsorbing materials there, such as drapes, rugs and upholstered furniture. These things keep the noises from bouncing around, but the overall effect is likely to be less than you want.

Q. — We have old plastic laminate on the countertop around our kitchen sink. Some time ago a bottle of glue was spilled on it. I wiped it up, but never got around to really cleaning it well. When I finally did, I discovered that none of the conventional cleaners could dislodge the hardened glue. Is there anything I can use that will soften the glue and enable me to get it off?

A. — You can get it off with lacquer thinner, but I recommend its use only

with strong caution, especially in a kitchen. Be sure no pilot light is on and that there is no other open flame. Also, there must be plenty of ventilation.

Q. — I found an old kitchen cabinet made of wood in our attic. It is in good condition structurally, but the white paint finish on it looks kind of messy. It has such a good design that we are thinking of using it in the living room if the wood is of good quality. Is there any way of finding out before we go to the trouble of taking off the old finish?

A. — None that I know. But you need not completely strip the cabinet to make that determination. Use paint remover to take off the finish on the top of it. When you do and decide it is wood that is pleasing to the eye, you can go ahead with the rest of the cabinet. However, be prepared for the possibility that a cabinet with a good top may have a lesser quality wood on the sides. After the finish is off, you can stain it, seal it and finish it with a clear finishing material. Should the removal fail to take off some of the coloring, try sanding and then, if necessary, bleaching. The

bleaching will produce a uniform lightness which then can be stained to a desired tone. All of this is based on the assumption that you do not want to repaint the cabinet. If you do, then the staining and bleaching are not necessary.

Q. — We have an old bedroom bureau which we would like to clean. The finish is in good shape. We finished it with varnish a few years ago, but left it in the basement and it is kind of dirty. Can we clean it with lacquer thinner?

A. — No. The thinner may act as a remover. Use denatured alcohol, which will clean but not disturb the finish. Alcohol will act as a remover on shellac.

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Celtics-76er Contest Resolved Early Again

BOSTON (AP) — The Boston Celtics and Philadelphia 76ers usually fight furiously to the bitter end. Recently, the end has come long before the final buzzer.

Just 10 days after burying the 76ers by 40 points and only three days after being crushed by 25, the Celtics walloped Philadelphia by 29 Wednesday night to stay alive in the seesaw series of the National Basketball Association playoffs.

Boston's 114-85 romp slashed the 76ers' lead in the best-of-seven Eastern Conference final to 3-2. Game Six is Friday night in Philadelphia.

"This game was over in the latter part of the third period," said 76er guard Andrew Toney, who canned just six of 20 field goal attempts after hitting 14 of 21 in Sunday's 119-94 Philadelphia victory.

Boston had 85 points through three periods, the same amount Philadelphia had in four.

On Sunday, the 76ers had 85 points after three quarters, just nine fewer than Boston had for the entire game. In the Celtics' 121-81 triumph that opened the series, they scored their 81st point with 4:39 left in the third period.

Why have the teams been taking turns routing each other?

"With two great teams like this, all it takes is one little letup in one area and you're going to capitalize," said Boston center Rick Robey. "Tonight we played defense and were able to capitalize. The last two games we didn't play well and they capitalized."

"It shows the capability of both clubs to make adjustments and come back after a low point," said Celtic M.L. Carr.

The nearly 21-point average margin of victory is particularly unusual for the 76ers and Celtics. In last season's Eastern Conference final, when the Celtics clawed back from a 3-1 deficit to eliminate the

76ers, three games were decided by two points and two others by one.

Boston has outscored Philadelphia by 34 points in the current series but still is just one loss away from being foiled in its attempt to successfully defend its NBA title.

"It's not like income averaging," Carr said.

"You don't add up the points and the team with the most points wins."

Philadelphia Coach Billy Cunningham agreed.

"The point spread doesn't mean anything, just a win," he said.

The Celtics got that Wednesday night with a rejuvenated team defense and by using the two days

off to adjust their offense to the absence of playmaker Nate "Tiny" Archibald, who dislocated his shoulder in Saturday's third game.

Robert Parish's 15 points led Boston to a 33-22 lead after the first quarter, and the closest the 76ers came thereafter was nine points.

Watson Lists His Atlanta Favorites

ATLANTA (AP) — It didn't take Tom Watson long to reel off his list of favorites in the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Golf Classic.

Watson, the defending champion, tossed out the names of Lee Trevino, Andy Bean and Larry Nelson before getting to the player generally regarded as the favorite in the \$300,000 event that begins today over the 7,007-yard, par 72, Atlanta Country Club course.

"I think you've got to watch Tom Watson," he said Wednesday.

"I feel like the Watson of old," he said. "I'm playing real well right now, hitting it longer than ever. I haven't been this excited about my game in a long time."

This will be Watson's fifth appearance in the 14th Atlanta tournament, and his record here is outstanding, with the exception of his first start in 1972, when he tied for 56th place.

Watson, who has two Masters and three British Open championships, was second in 1975 and 1978. He won last year over Tommy Valentine on the third hole of a playoff.

"I think the scores will be pretty low," Watson said. "There is no rough to speak of. I think 15 or 16 under par will win it."

The four-time PGA player of the year said he sees little chance of anyone breaking the tournament record, a 23-under-par 265 posted by Bean three years ago.

Most of this season's top performers are skipping this tournament, with only five of the top 15 money-

winner in the field of 156 — No. 2 Watson, No. 5 Larry Wadkins, No. 6 Scott Hoch, No. 8 Bean and No. 15 Danny Edwards.

Former PGA and Masters champion Ray Floyd had a 67 during Wednesday's pro-am, which could signal his comeback from a hand infection that has hampered his performance since the start of the season.

Floyd said of the hand ailment, "It cantered back into the rest of my game. I had numerous problems with my swing and I've been trying to get it back ever since."

"My rhythm was off," he said. "My timing was off. Right now, I'm hitting the ball well."

The Atlanta Country Club layout has undergone extensive changes since last year's tournament, with Jack Nicklaus supervising the rebuilding of all greens on the back side.

"I like the changes," Watson said.

"The greens had severe slopes before that really weren't necessary," Floyd said.

Bradshaw Won't Strike

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Terry Bradshaw of the Pittsburgh Steelers says he will "lead the parade" across the picket line if the National Football League Players' Association calls a strike this season.

"I don't want to strike. I want them to settle it, and if they call camp tomorrow I'm going in," said Bradshaw, in town for the

Steelers' annual quarterback school.

"Gene Upshaw (president of the association) would just have to write me a letter and tell me how disappointed he is," Bradshaw added.

Bradshaw said he has read newspaper articles quoting other players who are definitely willing to strike to back demands for

salary scales and a share of the gate.

"I'm happy with what I'm making," said Bradshaw, who reportedly makes in excess of \$300,000 per year. "I'm under contract to play football, and I don't think it's right for them to force us to strike."

"I think people ought to be able to sit down and work things out," said Bradshaw, who thinks the

labor movement has "priced themselves out of jobs."

During the 1974 strike, Bradshaw initially honored the picket line. He later quit the strike and reported to camp.

"I originally stayed out just to be one of the boys," he said. "I didn't want to stay out at all."

But while Bradshaw was out, Joe Gilliam was off to a good start in the Steeler preseason camp.

"It got to a point where I was losing my job, and I had to shuck all those other ideas and get on in," he said.

He said he would cross the picket line from the start this season.

"I think there will be a lot of people go in, and I'll lead the parade," he said.

If he were a betting man, would Bradshaw bet there was going to be a strike?

"Yes, if I were a betting man," he responded.

"I think it will be nasty and everything else, and everywhere we go there will be a lot of trouble."

There is also the possibility that NFL owners, threatened with a possible strike once the regular season begins, might close training camps?

"If they do that I'll demand to be paid because I want to work," Bradshaw said.

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Committee Oks Grain Elevator Bill; Some 'Scared' In Ohio

CINCINNATI (AP) — Although Congress is piecing together legislation to help farmers cope with grain-elevator bankruptcies, the failure of one such storage company has "put a scare into a lot of farmers around here," a grower says.

At least 30 farmers in southwestern Ohio, southeastern Indiana and northern Kentucky have \$500,000 worth of grain stored in elevators of the Cincinnati-based Queen City Grain Inc., which filed two weeks ago for protection under Chapter 11 of federal bankruptcy laws.

"Before the season started, we were told that most farmers would be lucky to break even," said Sarah Hale, who with her family operates Greenacre Farms and Hale's Farm Equipment in Lebanon, Ohio. "Now we're looking at a \$40,000 hole." That represents the amount of grain from their 2,400 acres stored at Queen City Grain.

On Wednesday, after months of inaction, the House Judiciary subcommittee on commercial law endorsed a bill that supporters say would speed determination of who owns the grain in bankrupt elevators. Sponsors of the bill say it would give farmers with clear title the flexibility to market their grain.

Other lawmakers, led by Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., say the measure is "watered down" and "meaningless" because it sets no definite timetable and leaves farmers to divide up an elevator's assets with other creditors.

Missouri farmer Wayne Cryts focused national attention on the issue when he was jailed in April for contempt of court by a bankruptcy judge in Arkansas — Cryts had refused to reveal who helped him remove soybeans from a bankrupt elevator last year.

Cryts was allowed out of jail this week to testify and lobby in Washington, and on Wednesday he urged a House Agriculture subcommittee to take action on the matter.

Cryts said such bankruptcies cost many farmers their livelihoods.

"I hope we're able to pass legislation so that this injustice to the American farmer is not continued," he testified. He was to return Friday to his cell in a Russellville, Ark., federal detention center.

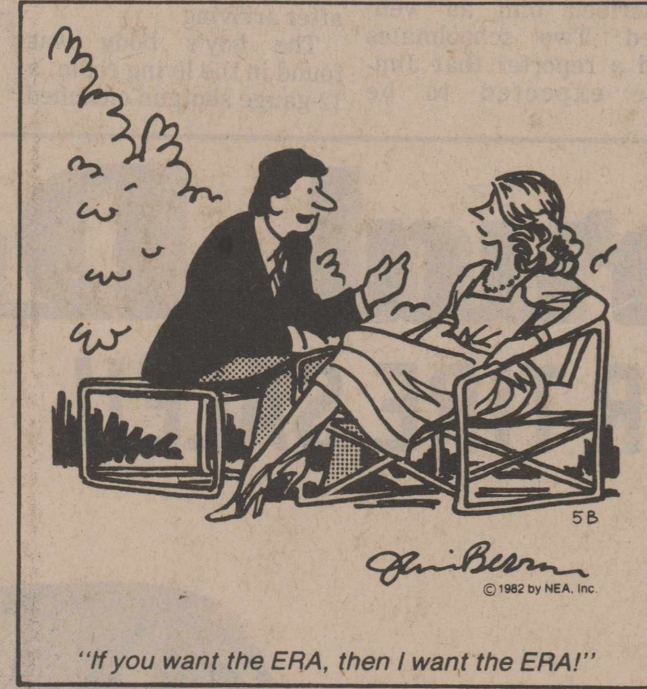

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For Spanking Him...

'Nice Little Fellow' Shoots Parents; Kills Self

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — A 12-year-old boy described as a "nice little fellow" was so angry about being spanked for riding a motorcycle without permission that he shot and killed his mother, wounded his father, then killed himself, authorities say.

Jimmie Mathis armed himself with a pair of shotguns, then confided to a neighbor boy that he was "going to shoot his parents for spanking him," said Clark County Sheriff Frank Kanekoa after the shootings Tuesday.

Police said Wednesday that Jimmie, scheduled to be named crosswalk "patrolman of the year" at

his elementary school, used a 12-gauge shotgun to kill his mother, Darlene Mathis, 36, and himself and wound his father, James H. Mathis, 32, at their home in Hazel Dell north of Vancouver.

The boy "seemed like a nice little fellow," said an adult neighbor. "He was friendly. He would always wave. It's unbelievable."

A neighbor boy said he was in the Mathis house Tuesday evening, saw Jimmie with two shotguns and a machete and heard him say "he was going to shoot his parents for spanking him," according to a sheriff's report.

"...as the Mathis parents drove up on their motor-

cycles, the neighbor left the Mathis residence through the rear door and as he went home, he heard what sounded like gunshots," the report said.

The father, wounded in the back, told authorities in a brief interview that the attacker was his son. Mathis was reported in good condition Wednesday at Bess Kaiser Hospital in Portland, Ore., with superficial head and chest wounds.

Jimmie was in the sixth grade at Hazel Dell Elementary, where both students and teachers described him as well-liked. Two schoolmates told a reporter that Jimmie expected to be

disciplined and said he wasn't going to take it quietly.

"He wasn't going to stop (shooting) until he killed everyone," said a schoolmate.

Clark County Chief Civil Deputy Robert Songer said Mrs. Mathis was found dead, face-up, on the front porch of the family home.

The wounded father fled to a neighboring home and called police. Deputies who surrounded the house and evacuated surrounding homes at 7 p.m., said they heard a single shot from the house shortly after arriving.

The boy's body was found in the living room, a 12-gauge shotgun clenched

in his fist. A 20-gauge shotgun leaned against a table nearby, and ammunition was scattered on the kitchen floor, officers said.

Neighbor children had varying views of the boy.

"He was weird. He was always doing crazy things," said Tina Forgie,

12. "You know, he'd jump off the (playground) bars."

"He was funny. He joked a lot. He was a very nice person," said Jeff Stewart, a friend.

Needs headache help

DEAR DR. LAMB — Please help. My sister, age 61, has been suffering with headaches for many years. She lives on Excedrin which is the only thing that relieves them. They are not considered migraines.

She has been examined by neurologists, had an allergy work-up done, eyes examined, seen an ENT specialist, a chiropractor — nothing has helped. She was told they are tension headaches and was given Valium. She does not feel tense but frequently feels a burning sensation in her nose, mouth and throat.

She gets a headache almost every day, even when walking in the morning. She's now considering acupuncture. Please give us your opinion. She's at her wits' end and doesn't know where to turn next.

DEAR DR. LAMB — My wife wakes out of a deep sleep every so often with terrible pains because of cramps in the toes, feet and shin. She walks the floor to get rid of the spasms and pain. What else can she do? Can I help her by massaging the affected areas?

DEAR READER — This is a common complaint. One reason it occurs at night is that the body temperature falls at night. That is part of the 24-hour cyclical change in body temperature. When a muscle gets cool it is more likely to contract and cramp. The legs are the farthest from the heart and apt to be the coolest.

Some years ago many of my readers wrote in that they got benefit from heavy wool socks — to the knees. The point is to keep the feet and legs warm. Prevent the excess nightly cooling.

— Also it helps to stretch the muscles, such as the calf, that tend to cramp.

Sophia Loren Goes To Jail

CASERTA, Italy (AP) — Sophia Loren spent her first night behind bars in a private, pink-walled cell with a private bathroom and a black-and-white TV set. But her guards said she woke up today to the

same breakfast of coffee, milk and bread served the inmates in the other nine cells.

The 47-year-old film star returned to her native Italy Wednesday to begin serving a 30-day sentence for tax evasion handed down in July 1980. She had said that September that she would return and serve her sentence as soon as she fulfilled her "work obligations."

Miss Loren left Geneva, Switzerland, one of her residences, and entered Italy for the first time in two years. She was met by police at Rome's Leonardo da Vinci Airport as soon as she stepped off the plane.

She said she was innocent of the charge that she failed to file a tax return in 1963. The problem, she said, was caused by her tax specialist, now dead. But she said she decided to return home "to see my mother, my country and my roots."

After nearly being knocked down by the crowd of photographers and reporters at the airport, Miss Loren and her sister, Maria Scicolone, were ushered into an unmarked police car and driven to the three-story women's prison at Caserta, 20 miles north of Naples.

The jail is an 18th century convent with flowers on the balconies and a staff of six nuns and eight male guards.

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
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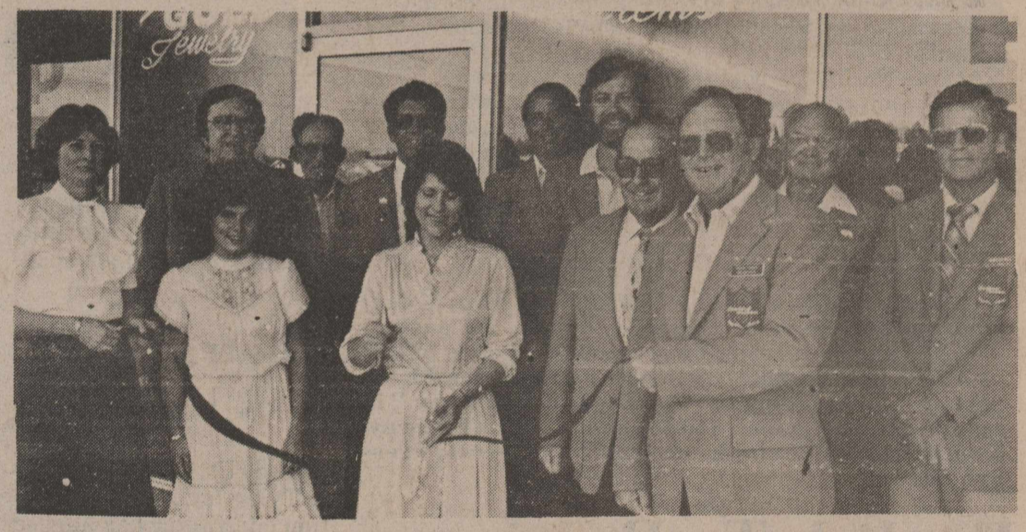

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Baby Is Born With Tiny Tail

BOSTON (AP) — The birth of a child with a tail is a rare glimpse of "the relation between human beings and their primitive ancestors," a doctor says.

The 7-pound baby was born with a slender, tapered, 2-inch-long tail. The child was transferred to Children's Hospital Medical Center in Boston shortly after birth, and doctors there removed the growth.

Dr. Fred D. Ledley said the "well-formed caudal appendage" was located on the baby's lower back near the end of the spine. He said it "was covered by skin of normal texture and had a soft, fibrous consistency." It had hair and nerves but no bone or cartilage.

Such cases have been reported throughout history, Ledley said, but few have been documented during the latter part of this century.

In a report in today's New England Journal of Medicine, Ledley wrote that the tail "represents a striking clinical confrontation with the reality of evolution."

He noted that humans diverged from their most closely related tail-bearing primates 25 million years ago. But he said human genes still contain the information necessary for tail formation.

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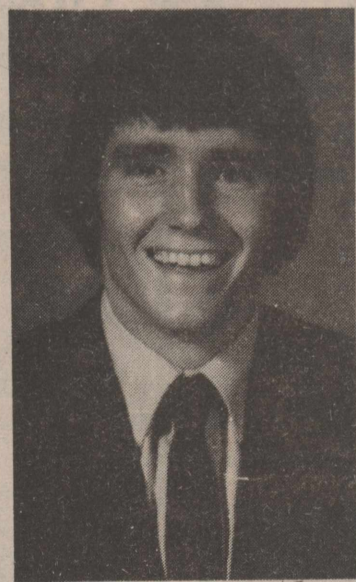

Figures Play Role In Hobbyist's Free Time

BISBEE, Ariz. (AP) — It might have started with the Vikings. Richard Dohe has traced his family tree back to a small seaport town in medieval Norway.

Perhaps it was watching Errol Flynn in the 1950s classic, "Robin Hood," a film he has seen more than 50 times. Or it could stem from the only comic strip Dohe read avidly as a child — Prince Valiant.

Whatever the impetus, one thing is certain: Richard Dohe has been obsessed with tiny figures ever since he bought some miniatures in a Chicago hobby shop 15 years ago and began changing them to suit his own tastes.

At first he was content to study the dress of the period and paint the figures he bought in stores.

But soon this wasn't enough, and he set out with a homemade scalpel to reshape the positions of the figures before he painted them.

"It wasn't that the storebought figures were poorly made, it was that many times I liked the figure but not the way it was standing or the position of an arm," he said. "So I simply started changing them to the positions I did like."

It was inevitable that Dohe soon began to sculpt his own figures. Today, the collection of miniatures he has designed and sculpted numbers close to 15,000. Many stand less than an inch high, and most are from the medieval and mythological worlds.

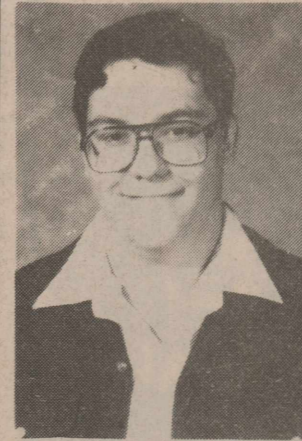
There are dragons and dwarfs, characters from J.R.R. Tolkien's "Hobbit," monsters and demons from other worlds and — of course — Vikings.

"Most people still believe that the Vikings were always at sea and ran around wearing helmets with large horns protruding out the sides," he said. "In reality, that type of helmet was only used on special ceremonial occasions and was not designed to withstand the rigors of life at sea."

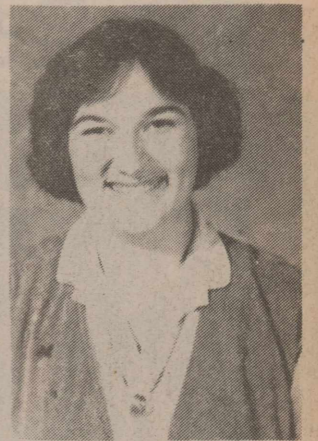
A miniature begins as a formless stick or lump of plastic: it is created by using a special electrically heated scalpel that is drawn across the plastic to melt and mold it into shape.

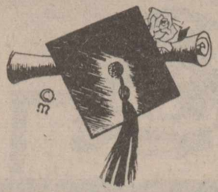

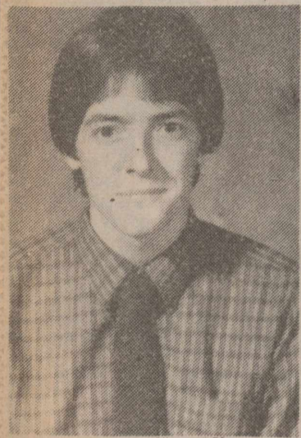

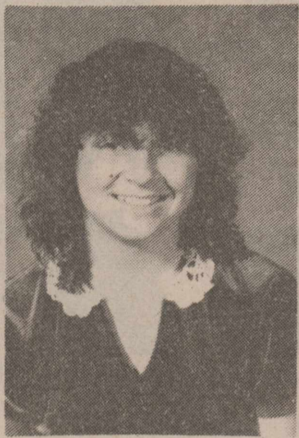

Chances are you've read or at least heard of a Book Creations Inc. novel, whether it was assigned in a high-school history class, pulled from the rack of a local library or drugstore, or noticed on a list of current best sellers.

It is here, in a cluster of Tudor-style buildings on a 20-acre wooded estate, that the germs of 236 novels that have sold 65 million books during the last 10 years were born in the fertile minds of 66-year-old Lyle Kenyon Engel, his wife Marla, and his son George, 40.

Their current series include "American Patriot," "Saga of the Southeast," "Taming of the West" and "Richard Blade."

The Engels, wealthy transplants from New York City, call themselves book producers. They claim no one has produced more best sellers. In their home and office just paces

away, they dream up tomorrow's best sellers.

"It's an accidental, freaky part of our nature," that they are so successful with plots, George says.

"You can't analyze it — it's something intangible. My father, he had a football injury when he was 12 that affected his leg. He was in and out of hospitals so he read and read."

"He read everything — James Fenimore Cooper, Alexandre Dumas, Charles Dickens, Shakespeare, the Bible. That gave him something that the publishing world calls 'a sense of everyman.' Now, he can think up story ideas anywhere. He gets a lot driving down the Taconic Parkway to New York City," George says.

Lyle Engel, a dapper, buoyant survivor of New York's advertising and publishing world, says he could write his own novels. But he won't.

"If I did, I'd have to give up all the novels I do every year — I do maybe 50 or 60 a year," he says.

BCI keeps a stable of 80 writers scattered across the world, under contract

to write the novels Lyle and his family outline. Most of the writers, some of whom are supposedly quite well known, use pseudonyms, at the Engel's prompting.

"We use pseudonyms for many reasons," George says. "If an author is very prolific, he can write a book in six weeks. People are wary about too many books by the same writer in a short time. Also, if a writer dies or becomes incapacitated in any way, we can continue to write the book or series using another author and the same pseudonym."

The use of pseudonyms was crystallized for the Engels when John Jakes, the writer of the enormously popular "Kent Family Chronicles," upped and called it quits after the eighth book.

When Jakes' first eight books topped the 35 million copy mark, and he had three best sellers in one year, he wanted more than the standard 50-50 royalty split the Engels arrange with their authors.

When the Engels said no, Jakes left. There are no

bitter feelings, the elder Engel says, but he adds that he feels Jakes owed it "to the people out here" to continue the saga of the Kent family past the turn-of-the-century mark detailed in the eighth book.

George adds, "We could have continued the series with another author if we had used a pseudonym."

The Kent Family Chronicles, originally titl-

ed the "American Bicentennial Series," came out of the nation's celebration of its 200th birthday. The first volume, "The Bastard," is now past its 40th printing.

The action-packed novel, spiced with sex and rather vague history, and sprinkled with violence and politics, is similiar to many BCI publications. It's proved a winning for-

mula. "It's a good read," Lyle says. "It's full of action from the first page. People today expect action, they get it from the TV, from movies. You take a classic like "A Tale of Two Cities" — you have to read halfway through before you know what's going on. "The modern reader gets bored. He wants action on the first page."

Italian Artisans Use Ancient Brick Method

ORVIETO, Italy (AP) — Handmade bricks and tiles produced by a small group of artisans here are selling like hot cakes as demands increase throughout Italy for quality building material needed to restore historic monuments, churches and squares.

"In Rome alone, our tiles were used in restoring the Colosseum, the Pantheon and St. Peter's Basilica," says Salvino Bernasconi, the 77-year-old scion of a family that

has earned its living making bricks for generations.

He says the restorers choose their bricks or "mattoncini" for the resiliency, color and beauty that match the old tiles. Factory-made bricks, he says, are inferior and the idea of using mass-produced material in artistic places seems repugnant to many people.

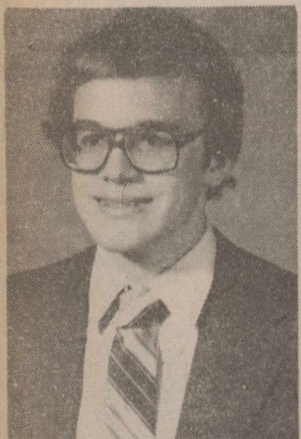
The bricks produced by 12 families in nearby Castel Viscardo are hand-

made according to traditional techniques handed down from father to son since Roman times.

"Next time you go to the Colosseum, look around and see if you can pick out the new ones — you probably can't because they almost look alike," Bernasconi says with a grin.

Early this year, nearly 80,000 bricks were used to replace the eroded surface of the beautiful Piazza del Campo at Siena in the hills of Tuscany.
