JIM RUNS ROADS TO GET VOTES

(By Associated Press)

BURNET, Tex., May 31.—A patrol system for maintenance of highways as recently adopted by the State Highway Department is to give worth to an army of employees in order to build up a machine to aid James E. Ferguson in his race for the re-election of his wife is sought by Ferguson, Attorney General Dan Moody, candidate for governor, declared here today.

Moody, speaking before a large crowd, renewed his attack on the Ferguson administration's highway policies and on Fergusonism in Texas.

61 MUSICIANS OFF FOR CONCHO CAMP

The crowd which enjoyed the concert was one of the largest gathered on the city's playground in many moons.

WARSAW, May 31.—Marshal Pilsudski, head of the successful military coup, today refused the presidency of Poland to which he was elected by the Senate and Chamber of Deputies sitting as a national assembly.

Pilsudski based his refusal on the grounds of conscientious scruples against the existing constitution. He recommended the election of Prof. Dziejowski of Vilna University, or Director Mosciecki, professor of chemistry in Lemberg University.

PARIS, May 31.—The International Woman Suffrage Alliance today voted 123 to 49 not to admit the National Women's Party of America to membership in the alliance.

The National Women's Party is opposed to sex discrimination in industry while the Suffrage Alliance believes in the special protection for women in industry.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 31.—The 500-mile automobile race was temporarily halted today because of sudden showers of rain after the drivers had covered a distance of 175 miles. The races were resumed after a delay of an hour and ten minutes.

MAN CONFESSES IN BOMB CASE

MUSKEGON, Mich., May 31.—As a Bartlett, age 28, of Blue Lake township, and constable of that precinct, has confessed to sending the bomb that killed August Krubaech and daughter, Janet, and the girl's fiancée, William Frank, last Thursday.

The details of the confession will not be revealed until after Bartlett is arraigned for trial tomorrow, according to R. G. Dunn, state prosecutor, who made the announcement that the man had confessed to the crime.

MRS. J. W. COPELAND DIES AT WINTERS

News of the death of Mrs. J. W. Copeland one of the pioneer women of Winters, and wife of a former mayor and business man of that city, was received in Ballinger Saturday. Mrs. Copeland died at 6:00 o'clock Saturday morning as the result of a relapse and complications coming after a severe attack of influenza.

Mrs. Copeland was the mother-in-law of Roy Bledsoe, a barber of Ballinger, and whose wife died several years ago. The three children of Mr. Bledsoe had been making their home with their grandmother at Winters, and Mr. Bledsoe went to Winters last week to be at Mrs. Copeland's bedside. The funeral was held at Winters Sunday.

OLFEN CROPS ARE IN GOOD CONDITION

P. W. Yost, of the Olfen community, was in Ballinger during the week-end and stated that the web worms and cut worms were not bothering the cotton and young feed crops in that community, and that there were very few grasshoppers.

The crops, however, do need rain, Mr. Yost said. Grain is nearly all cut in that that section and has been shocked the Olfen man stated. The crop is believed to be one of the best ever grown and hail and rain can do little damage now.

EVOLUTION CASE UP FOR HEARING

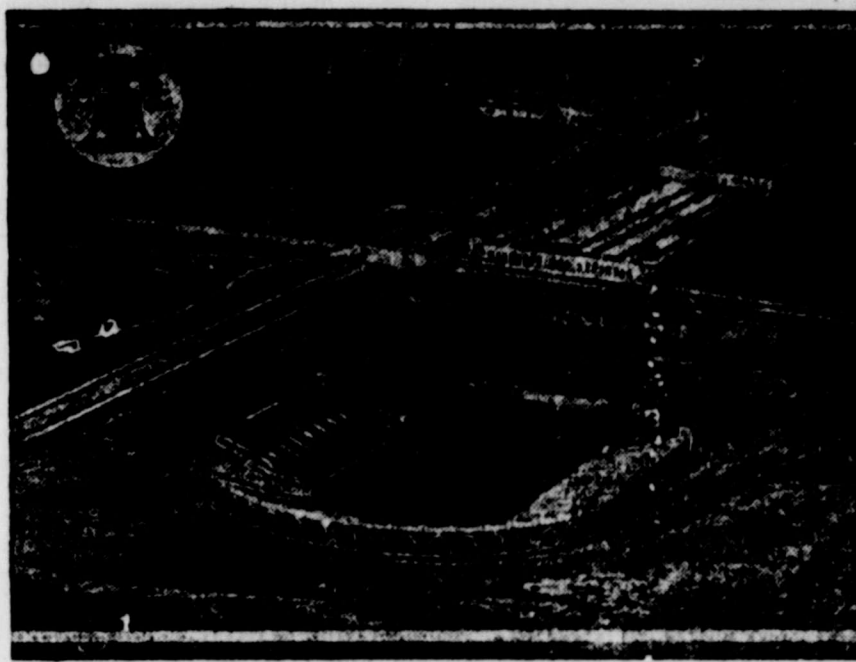

REFUSES TO CALL SPECIAL SESSION

AUSTIN, May 31.—Gov. Ferguson will not call a special session of the legislature to validate the district road bonds which it is believed were affected by a ruling of the United States Supreme Court a short time ago, according to a letter written by the governor to J. A. Kemp, chairman of a state-wide committee which has been working for the validation of the bonds. Mrs. Ferguson wrote Mr. Kemp at Wichita Falls that she would not call the special session before next September or October.

The primary campaign is given as the reason for postponing the calling of a special session.

The office formerly occupied by the sheriff will be remodeled into a ladies' rest room.

The improvements being done at the court house include lavatory conveniences in the grand jury room and also in the new rest room.

NEW YORK, May 31.—Mrs. Thomas Hughes and her four children; Joseph Nolan, age 65; and Mrs. Smith, the aged widow of a policeman, burned to death today when fire destroyed the old Taft Hotel in Brooklyn.

BALTIMORE, May 31.—Three persons were burned to death today when fire destroyed the home of Dr. Aaron Ember, eminent Egyptologist of Johns Hopkins University. The dead are Mrs. Regina Ember, Dr. Ember's wife; their six-year-old son, and a white woman, a maid in the Ember home.

Dr. Ember was seriously burned before he was rescued from the roof of the blazing house. The dead were all trapped in their bedrooms and cut off from escape before the fire was discovered.

J. J. CROCKETT DIES AT WINTERS

News of the death of J. J. Crockett at Winters was received in Ballinger about noon Monday. The death message did not give details, but stated that Mr. Crockett died Monday morning.

Mr. Crockett formerly lived on the Bruee farm South of Ballinger before moving to the Winters country. He is well known in Runkles county and has many friends who will regret to hear of his death.

FLOWERS PLACED
ON GRAVES SUN.

A large crowd gathered in
Evergreen Cemetery at 5:00 o'-
clock Sunday afternoon to wit-
ness and take part in the mem-
orial services held under the
direction of the American Legion
Post No. 8. Weather conditions
for the outdoor service were ideal,
and the impressive ceremonies
were carried out as scheduled.

The outdoor audience was called
to order near the liveoak grove
on the North side of the ceme-
tery, and the program began
with a brief concert by the band.
Rev. E. W. McLaurin, com-
mander of the Pat Williams Post,
American Legion, was master of
ceremonies. Rev. Alvin O. Rue,
pastor of the Eighth Street Pres-
byterian Church, led in the invo-
cation.

Dr. Alvin Swindell, pastor of
the First Baptist Church, was the
principal speaker of the occasion,
paying a tribute to those who
gave their lives for American
freedom. Dr. Swindell empha-
sized the day as one of apprecia-
tion in honoring those who died
for worthy causes, and he also
spoke of the occasion as a day of
dedication in which the manhood
of America is dedicated to that
which is pure, noble and good.

"Taps" were sounded follow-
ing the address of Dr. Swindell,
and the decoration committee
chosen from the American Legion
Auxiliary, placed flowers on the
graves of forty-nine veterans who
rest in Evergreen Cemetery, and
the committee then visited the
Old Runnels cemetery and decorated
two graves in that city of the
dead.

There was a scarcity of flowers
one year ago and the committee
was forced to use evergreen as
an adornment then with which
to decorate the graves, but there
were flowers in profusion for the
services Sunday, and the floral
committee experienced no trouble
in supplying all the flowers
needed for the occasion.

It was stated that the American
Legion had checked the cemetery
as systematically as possible in
an effort to mark the graves of
all war dead, including Civil
War veterans, but if there were
any overlooked the Legionnaires
will appreciate it if their atten-
tion is called to those overlooked
in order that they may be marked
on the plat of the cemetery and
proper record made for future
use.

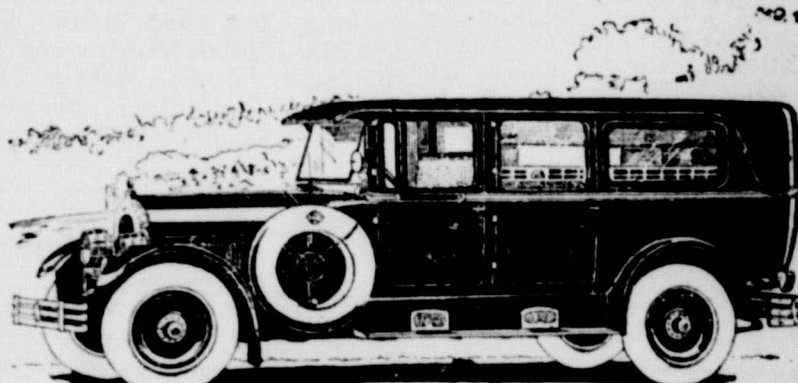

Vancouver Island Salmon Rise to a Lady's Bait



Guides and fishermen on Van-
couver Island like to take visiting
ladies out fishing, because they say
they bring luck. One Scotchman
who operates a launch used for
trotting salmon declares it is be-
cause the fish are gentlemen in
the waters roundabout Campbell
River, and so they come up to a
lady's bait. At any rate, true it
is that an American woman, who
goes up to Campbell River each
year with her husband, always
gets more fish than he does. And

a little Canadian girl, who had
never fished in her life before,
caught an eight pound salmon ten
minutes after she started trolling.
Not only is the fishing excellent
roundabout Campbell River, but
excellent catches are made at al-
most every spot on Vancouver
Island where the spoon or fly
drops. And the fishing season
lasts practically until November
30. Trout fishing, of course, is
best in the rivers and lakes round-
about Cowichan. The waters of
Cowichan Lake itself teem with

game trout, and, if fishing should
suddenly weary the sportsman, he
will find that the forests bordering
its shores harbor enough feathered
and furred game to satisfy his
fonddest expectations. Then, when
the time has come to call his ef-
forts to a halt for the day, a com-
fortable hunting lodge is waiting
to accommodate him.

Shawigan Lake is a lovely
sheet of gleaming water which
teems with fish. It is near by
Victoria than Cowichan, and is a
little more sophisticated than
Cowichan scenery. Strathcona
Lodge, on its edge, makes a good
central headquarters for fisher-

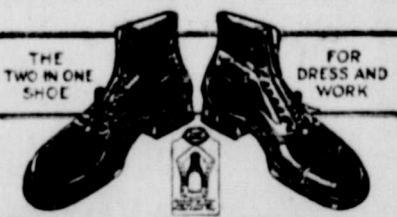

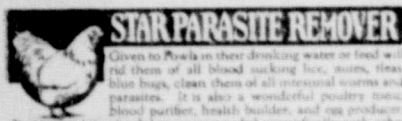
