State jail construction to begin

Construction on the 900 bed state jail facility is expected to begin this week as Texas Department of Criminal Justice project managers, their staffs and contractors will move their trailers to the site this weekend.

Charter Builders Incorporated of Dallas won the contract from TDCJ and have already hired their sub-contractors.

This will be the sixth prison constructed by Charter for TDCJ. The project manager for Charter is Charlie DeVoe.

Contractors will once again be hiring a local labor force, as they did when construction on the

Wallace Unit began.

TDCJ Construction Program Coordinator Robert Frick said the building cost of the jail was approximately \$16 million.

Originally, the Colorado City site was designed to be an 1,100 bed unit, with 200 of those beds designated for women offenders.

In order to stay within the state's budget, this site and two others eliminated the women's facility, Frick said.

The planned facility is made up of nine buildings arranged in a campus configuration on slightly more than 29 acres of land adjacent to the Wallace Unit.

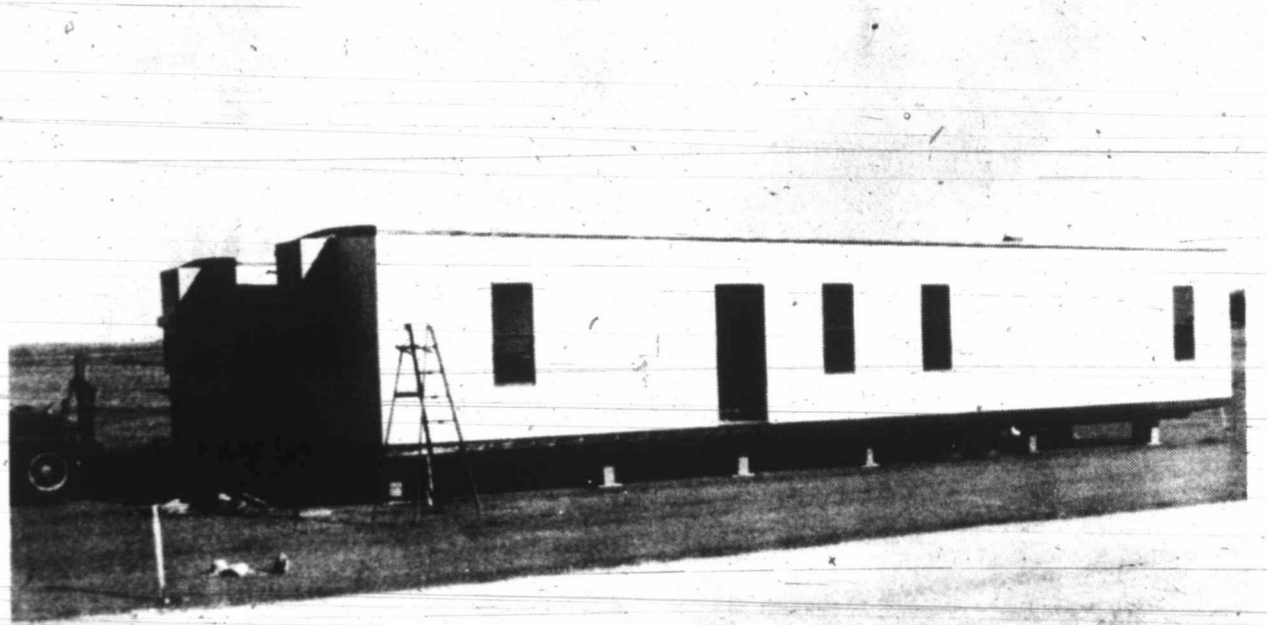
The facility is expected to house class four felons from the surrounding area who have received a maximum sentence of two years in the state jail.

The site will provide dormitory type rooms, an educational building, a cafeteria and kitchen facility and a laundry room.

According to Frick, the site will be completed by August 11.

Additionally, the completion date for the Wallace Unit's new industry building has been set for April 16. Construction on the facility began October 17.

The building will be used as a manufacturing facility for prison uniforms.

Phone lines down last week

SWBT investigates system crash

According to a representative of Southwestern Bell Telephone, a cut line may have been what caused the local 9-1-1 system to crash Wednesday afternoon. Additionally, lines throughout the county experienced difficulty.

Colorado City Police Chief David Montgomery said there were numerous problems occurring simultaneously.

The fax line at Nobles Construction Co. received calls from persons dialing 9-1-1, Colorado City residents could not call out of the city and all Westbrook numbers registered a busy signal when dialed.

The problem began Monday when the 9-1-1 system failed, resulting in two delayed ambulance calls.

Lines were back up Tuesday, but there was a delay of 18 seconds for 9-1-1 calls from Loraine.

SWBT Representative Pat Estes said there may be several reasons why Monday's problem occurred.

Early speculations were that equipment glitches resulted from the change to dialing "1-915" to reach areas where simply dialing "11" used to be sufficient.

Wednesday when lines went down the only way anyone could

call out of the city was through mobile phone hook-ups.

Estes said he felt Wednesday's occurrence was the result workman from another unnamed company accidentally cutting a line.

SWBT is currently working to find out why Loraine residents are experiencing a delay when dialing 9-1-1 and why the system went down Monday.

"Because they can't tell us what happened, we have no guarantee that it won't happen again," Montgomery said.

The police department has put together an emergency plan of action should the system fail again.

Perkins gives update on Col-Tex Refinery site

Members of the City Council received an update on the status of the remedial investigation into the Col-Tex refinery site.

FINA's Senior Environmental Specialist Diane Perkins presented the report to the council saying that two-fifths of the investigation was complete.

She explained that although the source of local drinking water, the Santa Rosa Sandstone aquifer, has not been affected by potentially hazardous substances, the alluvium

and a shallow ground water table not used for drinking water just above it have been impacted.

However, according to Perkins, the Col-Tex site is not the only threat to ground water in the area.

"The Colorado River has crummy water," she said. "When the river reaches flood stage, monitoring wells closest to it have the highest concentration of chloride and sulfates."

The further away the well from

What to do if 9-1-1 fails

A 9-1-1 system failure may happen at any given time on any day for numerous causes outside the control of the Colorado City Police Department. The police department may or may not be immediately alerted to a system failure by integral system alarms. The first notification may be by a citizen or other agency reporting system failure.

The best response citizens within our 9-1-1 area can make upon discovering a 9-1-1 system failure is to call the police department on its main business telephone line,

728-5294. This response is best because it is another telephone which will put a citizen in touch with the Public Safety Answering Point. The police department has the capabilities to dispatch or page law enforcement, fire protection, emergency medical services and utility repair services.

Should there be telephone failure within the police department or an overload of calls making the main business line unavailable, the next best alternative would be to have citizens call regular business lines of whatever emergency agency is

needed:
•Mitchell County Ambulance, 728-3483;
•Mitchell County Hospital, which has a disaster plan that can be initiated, 728-3431;
•Colorado City Fire Department, which has the capability to page and dispatch Westbrook, Loraine and Colorado City Volunteer Fire Departments, as well as Mitchell County Ambulance, 728-3131; and
•Mitchell County Sheriff's Office, 728-5261.

The Col-Tex site has been broken down into three different areas: the North Pond, Col-Tex II and the Tank Farm Area. A work plan for each area has been submitted to the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Committee for review.

The old refinery site covers about 200 acres north and south of business I-20 west of town.

Refinery operations began in 1928 and continued under various owners until 1968 when operations were moved to a refinery in Big Spring.

By 1971, all major refinery and tank farm structures were dismantled with the exception of some large tanks which were leased for storage in the early '70s.

The overall cleanup is expected to cost several million dollars.
