Getting people to trade at home is one of the biggest problems of small business men here and everywhere. Their problem might not be quite so big if they set a good example. Business people are sometimes the worst offenders when it comes to trading at home, especially when they need a job of printing. You would be amazed if you knew the total amount of printing that leaves Lorraine every year for various reasons. We will admit that there are some jobs of printing we can not handle economically because we do not have the equipment for it. But if every business in town would give the local printer all of his printing it wouldn't be too long until the local printer could equip his shop better and hire more people. The same thing would apply to other local business firms—if they got the business of the community in their line they could soon expand and have a better selection. It takes cooperation of all concerned to make a better town.

FARM MEASUREMENTS
Present plans of the County ASC are to delay starting full performance until July 2, due to late planting and excessive rains in some areas of the county. Two or three ASCS crop reporters will begin measuring farms that are ready within the next few days. Crop reporters will measure cotton, feed grain crops, diverted acres and all soil bank base crops on Conservation Reserve Farms.

IT'S THAT TIME OF THE YEAR
College Station, June 21—Few arenas do a better job of whetting jaded summer appetites than those coming from a backyard barbecue. The backyard chef has a wide array of meats available but because of very favorable prices, F. Z. Beamblossom, poultry marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, suggests broilers.

In addition to the broilers for chicken-quing, the specialist says you'll need to plan a complete menu. Potato salad or corn-on-the-cob go good with chicken and a mixed green salad, an appetizer tray, sliced bread or rolls and a beverage will make for eating suited to the taste of just about anyone, adds Beamblossom.

The sauce used during the chicken-quing process is mighty important. If you don't have a favorite recipe, the specialist suggests you pick up a copy of MP-312, "Let's Have a Chicken-que" from your county extension office and try the one he likes. The publication also contains other information which outdoor cooks can use to advantage.

Included is a discussion of grills and barbecue pits. Hints on cooking, including starting charcoal fire and heat requirements. Beamblossom, in the publication, also calls attention to safety hints which can help make the affair even more pleasant and enjoyable, including the tools you will need to do a first class job.

And this final reminder from the specialist, don't cook the chicken too fast. Allow plenty of time for the job and when it is finished, you'll put a product on the table that you and your guests will enjoy and discuss for weeks to come.

PLANS ANNOUNCED FOR LEGAL STUBBLE MULCH CONTEST

College Station—Plans are complete for the second annual National Stubble Mulching Contest, reports Jack Barton, extension soil and water conservation specialist. The contest will be held June 27-29 in Wichita Falls, under the sponsorship of local radio station KWFT and soil conservation districts in that area of Texas and Oklahoma.

Subtle mulching, which greatly reduces both wind and water erosion, is a year-round way of managing plant residues on cropland, explains Barton. Harvesting, seedbed preparation, planting and cultivating are all done so as leave adequate residue from the previous crop on top of the soil until after the next crop is seeded.

The stubble keeps the wind from disturbing the soil and the rain from compacting it. There is less runoff because the soil takes water more rapidly, and that which does run off is slowed down by the mulch, thus reducing erosion. As the mulch decays it adds valuable organic matter to the soil, points out Barton.

Primary objectives of the contest are to stimulate interest in and wider use of stubble mulching and to generate more support for the programs of local soil conservation districts. Any person 18 years of age or older on January 1, 1962, who owns, operates or resides on a farm and whose principal income is from farming is eligible to enter the plowing contest. There is no limitation on entrants in the judging contest. Cash and other awards will be given to the first five places.

Persons interested in the National Stubble Mulching activities should contact Earl Sargent, National Stubble Mulching Contest, P. O. Box 1860, Wichita Falls, Texas or their state extension conservationist. Barton says that Texans can also get information from their local county agents.

Certificate Of Merit Awarded Don Williams

Don Williams has been presented with a Certificate of Merit in Farm Mechanics, awarded by the Thor Research Center for Better Farm Living, Huntley, Ill., for showing the greatest farm mechanics ability among the graduating seniors of Lorraine High School.

Nell C. Hurley, Jr., founder of Thor Research Center, a non-profit farm research organization located in northern Illinois, established the Farm Mechanics Award to honor the member of each senior high school class deemed most outstanding in his proficiency to apply farm mechanics to the effective use of farm shop equipment and tools in the maintenance of farm machinery and in building projects improved farm living and operating efficiency. The selection is made by the student's vocational agriculture teacher, Raymond Holt.

Recognition of outstanding high school vo-ag is part of the Thor Research Center's program for honoring leading vo-ag teachers, outstanding agriculturists, and others who have contributed to farm progress. The Center also works closely with schools, colleges, 4-H Clubs and Future Farmers of America groups in seminars and is the site of a Model Farm Shop which features more than 2,500 tools.

The Thor Research Center devotes much time to the study of new methods in mechanization of the farm. Hurley, board chairman and president of Thor Power Tool Company, founded the non-profit center in 1956.

Governor Price Daniel announced Tuesday that Texas had closed 1961 traffic safety year with the highest rating it had ever received for such a program and tied for third place among the eight "big-traffic" States with which it is grouped by the National Safety Council.

The Governor said Texas scored an 84 out of a possible 100 for its overall efforts to solve its traffic safety problems during 1961. It had been announced earlier that Texas' 2,314 traffic deaths last year was the second lowest traffic toll since 1949, and that the mileage death rate—the number of deaths for every 100 million vehicle miles traveled—was 4.8, lowest in Texas history. The Texas record was 6 per cent below the national death rate of 5.1.

In the "big-state" traffic standings for 1961, the National Safety Council report showed, Texas tied with Illinois and Ohio with 84 points each for third place. California was first with 86, Michigan was second with 85. Other "big-traffic" states include Indiana, New York and Pennsylvania.

If you've ever been "hooked" by a fisherman, you know what I mean.

Fortunately, more fish are caught than people.

Most of these painful injuries could have been avoided if a few simple safe rules had been followed," said Homer. "Experts have studied this needless injury problem for years and offer numerous suggestions to help fishermen derive pleasure instead of pain from America's greatest participant sport."

Homer Circle, PR man for James Heddon's Sons of Dowagiac, Michigan-makers of the famous Heddon Fishing Tackle—sends us some interesting facts on this subject.

"Every year," says Homer, "doctors are called upon to extract barbed hooks from various parts of people's anatomy. It may be an eye or an ear, the face or a neck, hands, arms, legs, back or rump."

Guess he's trying to find out if we have any readers!

Anyway, it's a beautiful multi-colored printing job with as many tips on fishing as there are items listed in the catalogue.

Now—back to the safety tips we promised. Here's how to keep from latching onto a fishing buddy or getting yourself seriously involved in a hook:

1. Learn the simple over-head cast—never toss a plug side-arm with your fishing companion nearby. And, always know where your partner is!

2. If your lure hangs on a surface snag don't try to jerk it loose with your rod. That bent rod can propel the lure so suddenly and so fast you won't have time to duck! Instead try to shake it loose gently or row in and remove it by hand.

3. While playing a fish always keep the bend of your rod away from your head and your companion. Again, a suddenly released lure with an assist from a bent rod could propel its hooks into the skin you or your partner love so much!

4. It's safer to land a fish with net or gaff. Don't grab a fish with your hand unless you are experienced in the right technique. Always play the fish until he turns belly up. If larra, beach it. And never reach into the mouth of a toothed fish. A pair of long-nosed pliers can save you lots of trouble.

5. Remember... the only lure that should be out of your class 1 tackle box is the pop at the end of your rod. Too often loose lures in the boat end up in a fisherman's seat!

Finally—remember that a good fishing partner is an invaluable asset. Study him, watch him carefully and if he proves cautious, courteous and thoughtful of you he is a rare companion. Let him know your appreciation by trying to outdo his act.

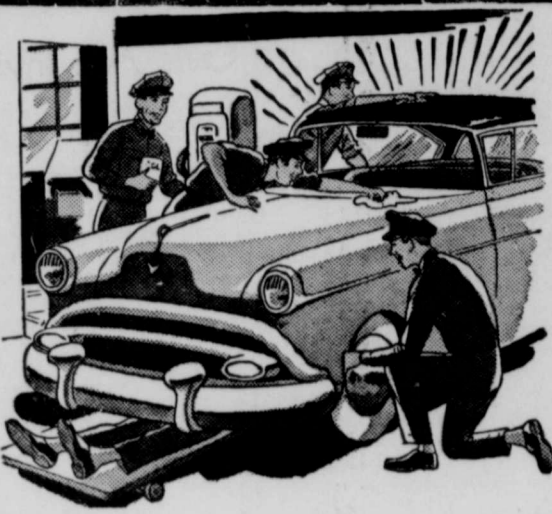

GET BAGWORMS EARLY

College Station, June 14—Bagworms are now occurring in rather large numbers on trees and other plants in many parts of the state. This insect is a general feeder and can cause serious damage to certain trees, especially evergreens, points out C. F. Garner, extension entomologist.

At this time, the worms are small and can be successfully controlled by proper spraying or dusting of the plants with insecticides. It is important to apply chemicals early enough to control the worms before they be-

come too large and cause serious damage, adds Garner.

He suggests a check of all plants around the home, especially evergreens for the spindle-shaped sacks which may be hanging from the twigs, leaves and branches.

The following insecticides are recommended for bagworm control. Malathion (50% emulsifiable concentrate 1 to 1½ ounces per 5 gallons water), Toxaphene (60 percent emulsifiable concentrate, 2½ ounces per 5 gallons water), or lead arsenate (2½ to 3 ounces per 5 gallons water).

In addition to these materials there are several brands of combination sprays (two or more insecticides combined together) on the market which will give good control of bagworms as well as other pests. One of the common combination sprays contains malathion plus DDT. Combination sprays and other insecticides can be purchased from any store or business establishment which handles household or agricultural chemicals, says the entomologist.

Sprays are preferred over dusts and the label instructions should be followed for mixing and using insecticides, cautions Garner. Several different types of hand sprayers are available which can be used for applying the sprays. The common types are the compressed air sprayers, trombone sprayers and garden hose attachment sprayers.

Insecticides are poisons and should be handled with caution. Follow safety directions listed on the label and keep children and pets out of the treated area. After spraying, wash the grass to remove the chemical residue, advises Garner.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Are World War II veterans still eligible for GI loans?

A. Yes, for ten years after discharge from active wartime service plus one year additional for each 90 days of that service. However, in 1952, may a World War II veteran's eligibility expire before July 25, 1962, nor continue after July 25, 1967.

Q. A friend has recently been discharged from a VA hospital because of "MHB". What do those letters mean?

A. They mean "maximum hospital benefit." In other words, in the opinion of hospital officials, additional time in the hospital would bring about no further improvement in the patient's condition.

Q. Where can lists or rosters of the old Civil War regiments be found today in the event that one wished to look up the record of a relative?

A. Most of the Civil War records have been turned over to the National Archives of the United States, Washington 25, D. C. You may write to them for information of this type.

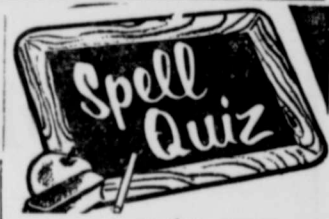

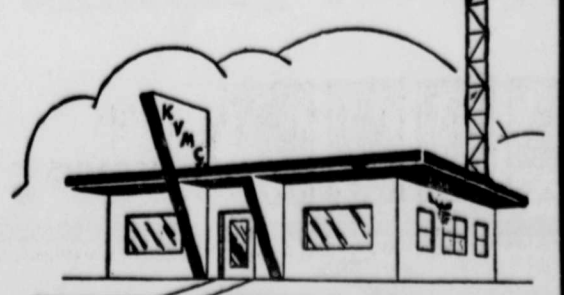

Mitchell County farmers are reminded that quality premiums for hard wheat placed under the 1962 price-support program will be based on sedimentation tests this year instead of on protein tests used in previous years.

The sedimentation test is a part of the Department of Agriculture's effort to increase markets for U. S. wheat and to increase returns to producers on the basis of quality. While pro-

tein tests show the protein content in a specific lot of wheat, the sedimentation test better reveals the quality of wheat gluten, and this factor is more reliable in identifying wheat for production of better flour for commercial bread baking.

According to Orrison J. Linam, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, the sedimentation tests will be made through the ASCS county office on all farm-stored hard red spring, hard red

winter, and hard white wheat which is put under price-support loan from this year's crop. Settlement with farmers on 1962 crop farm stored wheat delivered to the Commodity Credit Corporation under the price-support program also will be on the basis of sedimentation value.

Producers who take out loans on warehouse-stored wheat will be offered price-support loans on the basis of sedimentation values recorded on storage documents by the warehouseman.

The Chairman explained that premiums under the price-support program are provided on hard wheats with sedimentation values of 40 or above on the quality scale. This is the wheat preferred for commercial bread baking. Premiums will be 3 cents per bushel for wheats testing 40, 41, and 42; plus 1 cent per bushel for each additional point of sedimentation value up to a maximum of 25 cents per bushel, which will apply to wheats with a sedimentation test of 64 or above.

The premiums will be added to the basic county or terminal loan rate to determine the specific 1962 support loan rate. Hard wheat with no test or testing below 40 will be supported at the base rate, with discounts or premiums for other factors.

Mitchell County's basic minimum price support rate for Grade No. 1 wheat is \$1.99 per bushel.

SCREW-WORM PRODUCTION FACILITY TO BE DEDICATED
College Station-Formal dedication of the new sterile fly production plant at Mission, headquarters of the Southwestern Screwworm Eradication Program, was scheduled for Saturday, June 16.

The new plant, located at Moore Air Force Base, is designed to provide 50 to 75 million sterile flies per week. With production beginning in mid-June, the first flies from the new plant will be released in early July.

"We are very pleased with construction progress at the Mission plant," Marvin J. Bridges, executive director, Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, said. "We will have fly production underway ahead of the date we originally hoped construction would be completed."

"Early completion of the plant will be a tremendous boost to the program since we will have the sterile flies required to cover the wide area necessary for eradication in the Southwest."

"Completing a 'cash' construction program of this type would

not have been possible except through the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, using funds contributed by individual livestock producers and sportsmen from all over the Southwest."

Release of flies produced at the temporary plant at Kerrville has been increased to over 20 million per week. This, along with last winter's cold weather, has significantly retarded normal build-up of native screwworm populations. The increased production at the Mission plant will provide sufficient sterile flies to give added impetus to the eradication program.

The program is a joint effort of the Texas Animal Commission, the Southwest Animal Health Re-

search Foundation, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.
