OPEN LETTER FROM

PROF. LEON H. DURST

Zurich, July 12, '16.
19 Plattenstrasse.

Dear Clarence:
Quite a lapse of time has passed since last I wrote, but it would have been useless to attempt breaking so many lines of censorship. On my way to this "Isle of Peace" I myself, became censored not a few times and can now appreciate what a helpless letter is up against. However, it may be to the letters advantage that it can't "cuss." I was held up by Barons, Burgermeisters, Officers of more different colored monkey jackets than I can ever name privates, wounded, widows and orphans, all of whom were equally anxious to know what the deuce I was doing invading their country in these times. I began to really believe I was the guy who started the fireworks over here in Europe. I am at least playing a roll in the war—that is the blooming American getting there. When I dropped into the Alps the people said, "Yes, that explains all, he's an American—isn't it wonderful how these Americans go just where they want?" I suppose there is some sort of juice in us that's not in others, but it may be simply that other peoples aren't darn fools. Let's hope the stuff isn't 'bug juice.'

I didn't come from Constantinople on the Balkan—aug—the fast train between there and Berlin—as it is used now for military purposes only. I took a conventional train to Lom Palanka on the Danube in northern Bulgaria via Sofia. While in Sofia we had the experience of seeing a few bombs fall near us from French aeroplanes. That was not so exciting because we had seen often England birds laying eggs over Constantinople. At Lom Palanka we took a most wonderful boat trip up river to Orsovia in southern Hungary. We passed through the famous and beautiful "Iron Gate." The ever flush Danube in seeking an outlet to the sea breaks its way through a gap in the mountains of northern Leovia and southern Hungary. Had the river not broken through these high mountains the wonderful Hungarian plain would today be a vast lake.

Twenty years ago few ships attempted to make their way against the turbulent waters which rush so madly through this narrow pass, and those that did attempt it were almost invariably doomed to destruction against the numerous rocks and other hidden obstacles in the uncharted waters. But of more recent years the Hungarian Government has made this 2 mile strip navigable by building a canal just to the side around all dangers. Of course the tremendous force of the mad waters could be checked but little by the indirect cut, but no rocks are encountered in the smooth channel. Even on the banks of the new canal puffing engines stand waiting to help any boat whose own power is insufficient to make headway.

Then came Buda pest, Vienna and Salzburg. The latter place is ranked with Constantinople and Naples as one of the three most beautiful cities of the world. We had a chance to drink in its beauty as military authorities invited us to stick around for a ten days. At the end of 7 days I got through seeing the city and put up a snail to the Baron in charge. I told him I had a passport that is perfectly good—if he doubted its validity he could telegraph to Washington

or to any U.S. Embassy in Europe, for I am registered all over the land, and enquire about me, and I would pay for the telegram but he would pay my hotel bill if I stayed longer for all my money was in Switzerland. He gave me my riding documents and I rode on to Munchen, stayed overnight and next day crossed the beautiful lake Constan into peaceful little Switzerland. I then drew a long breath and was a new lad. The first time in a neutral land for two years.

I find Switzerland to be all that's claimed for it and then some. For the past month I've been studying in the University here.

In August the snow will have melted from the foot ways and I shall walk perhaps 400 miles over passes, under ledges, beside rushing waters and water falls—from ice fields into green pastures as hundreds do every year here. America doesn't walk enough. I'm one who loves it.

I shall send other lines about this country later. My best wishes for your continued success and my regards to all Kimble.

MAN WHO KEEPS COOL

Not since the dark days of our domestic war has the President of United States been confronted with more serious problems than those with which present National Chief Executive has had to deal, yet none of his predecessors since the passing of Abraham Lincoln has maintained a more admirable equipoise in the face of crises whether foreign or domestic.

Repeatedly attempts have been made to stampede the President to this or that action, but without success. As with other Presidents, powerful interests have intimidated coercive pressure, only to find that the man at the head of this Nation's affairs was too well fortified with facts relative to the matter at issue to render himself vulnerable to such tactics. If not informed relative to any proposed measure or policy, he has calmly and firmly declined to act precipitately upon the advice of others. Whenever his official endorsement has been given it was with the understanding that he waived no personal responsibility.

Nor is President Wilson to be swerved from his conception of the high responsibilities of his office by popular outcry. This has been frequently demonstrated in his steadfast imperturbability when jingoes have clamored for prompt resentment of anything having the appearance of insult to our National dignity.

This attitude of the President, from the lack of other plausible criticisms of the administration, caused the Republican leaders to center upon it as the main point of attack in the preparation of campaign political content. They would show that the President was allowing the National emblem to be trailed in the dust because of his inactivity in relation to the Mexican situation.

Almost coincidentally with this organized attack by the political opposition occurred the incident at Columbus, N. M. It was one justifying military action. The Administration immediately did what the situation warranted.

The political guns of Elihu Root and Henry Cabot Lodge were spiked, Roosevelt's rantings were rendered meaningless and even Bryan approved of the movement. What is more important, the average thoughtful citizen, in analytically reviewing the situation, was brought to a better appreciation of the fact that the man at the helm of our ship of state has a clear mind and a cool head—Oklahoman.

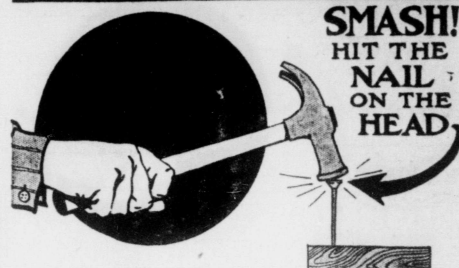
