Revenue Sharing budget finalized

The Mitchell County Commissioner's Court Tuesday finalized the Revenue Sharing budget for the 16th Entitlement period.

The total amount of Revenue Sharing funds to be received is \$149,836. County Judge Bill Carter explained.

The commissioners had conducted two public workshops prior to Tuesday's public hearing and approval.

The final budget shows that \$64,536 will be spent for public

safety with \$5,000 going for the Colorado City dispatcher, \$29,000 for the Mitchell County Ambulance Service, \$20,000 for rural fire calls, \$10,000 for a sheriff's car and \$536 to Crime Stoppers of Mitchell County.

A total of \$53,000 will be spent for public transportation which includes emulsion, seal coating, hot mix and coldlay for county roads.

Under the health category, \$3,000 is allocated with \$2,000 for

Colorado City for its landfill and \$1,000 to the City of Loraine for its landfill.

A total of \$9,300 was allocated for social services for the aged or poor with \$7,500 going to the Wallace Senior Citizens Center and \$1,800 to the Mitchell County Child Day Care Center.

The final \$20,000 is targeted for capital improvements.

Wolves face Gatesville for bi-district

In 1984, the Colorado City Wolves ended a six year drought by entering the state basketball playoffs as the district champions.

Last year's brief appearance, which came to a conclusion after a 53-37 loss to the Kermit Yellow Jackets in a bi-district game at Midland's Chaparral Center, must have made the Wolves even hungrier because one year

later they're back in the playoffs for an even rarer second consecutive time.

The Wolves, who last Friday, dropped a 64-62 spine tingler to Crane in the district's championship tilt, are the 7-AAA runners-up and are scheduled to play 8-AAA champion Gatesville in a bi-district game set for tomorrow (Friday) at 8 p.m. in San Angelo Lake View's gym.

"They're quick, shoot well and have pretty good depth," said

Colorado City coach Mike Hart of the Gatesville Hornets. They have a couple of 6'2" and 6'0" players that play like they're 6'4."

The Hornets, 18-8 on the year, posted a 9-0 district mark enroute to a second consecutive district championship. The tenth game was canceled earlier in the season due to weather.

Gatesville competed in district 16-AAA last year and also made an early exit from the

playoffs--losing to Brownsboro in first round action.

The Hornets graduated no starters from the 1984 season--losing only a few quality substitutes--and return at least three hoopersters than can slam (dunk).

Senior forward Charles Mayberry, last year's district MVP, is a 6'0" standout that leads the team in scoring (16) and rebounding (10). Ball handling is handled mostly by 5'10" senior Mike Hollingsworth.

The big man for the Hornets is 6'3" Carl Cowdy--another all-district player.

Other players that have alternated starting assignments are 6'0" junior guard Kenny Moore, junior Kevin Clark and senior forward Darren Poe--described as a good shooter.

The Hornets have been outbounded only twice this year--both times by AAAAA schools.

School district to join in asbestos lawsuit

The Colorado Independent School District board of trustees, in a split vote, Monday decided to join in a suit against makers of asbestos materials in order to help protect the school district against future liability if asbestos materials are found to have been used in CISD buildings.

Supt. Charlie Useton explained that a suit filed in Beaumont names as defendants all makers of asbestos and that all school districts in Texas are plaintiffs in the suit unless individual school districts decide not to be a party to the suit.

By becoming a party to the suit, Useton explained that the school district may be able to recover part of the costs it incurred in 1979 when materials thought to be asbestos were covered in the middle school, Kelley Elementary and Wallace School by either painting with special paint or covering or removing ceilings.

Useton said that asbestos was used in many buildings constructed in the 1950s as insulation and for acoustic ceilings.

He further explained that in 1978-79, schools became concerned because asbestos was determined to cause cancer. Officials from the Texas Education Agency inspected CISD buildings and reported that "we did not have anything that was dangerous," Useton said.

He said the schools were given three choices--remove the asbestos, cover it with protective covering or completely enclose it.

Although the suspected areas were never tested, Useton said that as a precautionary measure, a dropped ceiling was put in the middle school band hall at a cost of \$1,936 and that the ceiling in the choir room at middle school was removed at a cost of \$71.65.

He said special paint was

ordered and covered some areas at Kelley Elementary and Wallace Center.

"We never did run any tests on it, but we did what we were told to do to seal it off," explained Useton.

The trustees decided not to be included in a suit filed in Philadelphia against bankrupt John Mansfield Co. but entered the Beaumont suit on the advice of school district attorney Tom Rees.

By entering into the suit, Useton explained that the district will have to pay from \$500-\$100 for testing suspected areas to determine if there is any asbestos.

Board member Billy Bridgford voted against joining the suit, saying "I think you're just asking for trouble," adding that "we should leave well enough alone."

Useton said he thinks the district has "done everything we possibly can at this point" and had no recommendation about joining in the suit.

In other business, the board called a trustee election for April 6 to fill three positions--two for three-year terms for the positions presently held by Bridgford and Joe Kirschbaum and one to fill the unexpired term vacated by Dr. Pat Thomas.

No action was taken following an executive session in which evaluations of athletic director Tom Ramsey, business manager Geneva Findley, principals Jerry Reynolds, James McLean, Dell Riley and Bobby Lemons, administrative supervisor Dr. Walter Bingham, transportation supervisor Coy Adams, cafeteria director Christine Cocley, music-band supervisor Bill Shipp, community education director Barbara Gray, Plant A supervisor Erna Lou Burt and maintenance supervisor Charlie Edwards were conducted. The board will take

action on the matter at its March meeting.

Mrs. Findley reported that the \$29,220.26 held by the District Court for the Valero lawsuit has been received from District Clerk Bill Erwin. Of that amount, \$22,401.35 was applied to delinquent taxes and the balance applied to the interest account. The money is for undisputed 1977 and 1978 taxes and that the other half of the tax bill is still not resolved.

Useton presented a financial report on football and volleyball receipts. The budgeted amount for volleyball receipts was \$1,200 with \$1,771.16 actually received. The budgeted amount for football was \$23,100 with the actual amount received \$29,388.66.

Useton also presented information on lunchroom receipts at the middle school since the closed campus took affect. He said that in January before the closed campus, the cafeteria served an average of 232 and the average collected at the snack bar each day was \$96.70. After the closed campus, the average number served daily has been 233 and the average collected at the snack bar has been \$161.04.

In his report on the six weeks period ending Dec. 20, Useton said that there was a 95.29 percent attendance rate based on an enrollment of 1,425. That compares to a 94.99 percent attendance rate for the same period last year based on a 1,424 enrollment.

In other business, the board: --amended the 1984-85 budget to reflect changes in how the computer will accept the revenues and or expenditures for immediate needs;

--approved a contract renewal with McCreary, Veselka, Beck & Allen, P.C. as delinquent tax attorneys;

--approved Western National Life as an annuity company for

Quorum fails to show

A special meeting of the city council of Colorado City never took place Tuesday night after a quorum of the council failed to materialize.

Mayor Elmer Martin along with council members Jessie Munoz and Robert Hoback were present for the meeting which was called to consider among other things a sewer line in the Monticello Addition, to award a bid on a telephone system, to consider designs for a proposed new fire station and to conduct a budget workshop.

However, council member Dee Hearn called in sick and Tom Lovell was out of town. Don Bennett was unable to attend because of a conflict with work.

Although a quorum was not present, mayor and two other

council members did hear presentations from representatives from two telephone companies as well as a presentation by an architectural firm. They were unable to take any action because of lack of a quorum.

J. W. Hicklin addressed those present about the possibility of leasing Fisher Park at Lake Champion from the city and requested to be placed on the next council agenda.

Robert Cox asked that the city consider placing a sewer line in the Monticello Addition and the mayor said a committee would be appointed to work with Cox and other property owners on the request.

Gene Moses and Jerry Reid of Advanced Telephone Systems of Big Spring addressed the council members present

and demonstrated another phone system that would cost less than the one the pair presented to the council last week.

Liz Montagna with AT&T also made a presentation on a proposed phone system for city hall and the police department.

John W. Gary and his son Lonnie of Gary Company Architects of Big Spring and Lubbock also made a presentation along with a slide show in their bid to become the architects for the new fire station. Lonnie has a separate office in Lubbock and his father has been a Big Spring architect since 1958. They showed a sample of the buildings they have designed, including the new First Western Savings building in Colorado City.

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Cook's Corner 'Company's coming' spurs nurse to prepare favorite Mexican dishes

When Matt Beinbauer was a little girl, her mother worked in the field.

At the age of 10, she could fix eggs and things like that.

"I remember trying to make tortillas once. They didn't work out too good, because I didn't get them round."

But practice makes perfect and now she can whip up a batch of tortillas whenever she wants them.

"When my mom worked in the fields, she did get in the kitchen and I watched her real close. So I guess you could say I learned to cook from my mother."

The only thing that Mrs. Beinbauer had to learn to fix were desserts.

"I really had to learn to fix desserts all by myself. I don't keep too many sweets around the house, but during the holidays I will fix sweets quite a bit."

Mrs. Beinbauer doesn't use a recipe for her Mexican dishes. She likes to try new recipes, but sticks mainly to the recipe when making it for the first time.

She likes to cook and her favorite things to make are Mexican soups.

Mrs. Beinbauer likes to cook a lot of food, so she cooks quite a bit when company is coming over.

"I like to fix Mexican dishes when company is here, because they make so much. Usually, just for Amy and me, we just eat on the run, because of our different schedules."

"I don't really cook a lot for us but I do like to cook for a bunch of people. It just takes better for a whole lot than just one or two."

Mrs. Beinbauer is an RN and works in the surgery department at Root Memorial Hospital. She has a daughter, Amy, who is a junior at Colorado High School.

her recipes with RECORD readers.

RED ENCHILADAS
10-12 red dry chili peppers, (Barkes), stems and seeds, removed and washed
2 pounds ground Chuck
20-24 corn tortillas
1½ pound Longhorn or cheddar cheese (grated)
1 large onion chopped
One clove garlic and garlic powder

Cumin, salt and pepper to taste

In large pot, bring water to boil. Add clove of garlic and washed peppers. Cover and cook till peppers are soft. Discard water and clove of garlic. Place peppers in blender, puree, adding enough warm water till peppers are consistency of tomato sauce. Strain to remove seeds and pepper skin. Place sauce in saucepan or large bowl.

Set aside. In frying skillet, place hamburger meat, chopped onion, garlic powder, salt and pepper. Cook over medium heat until meat is done, but not browned. Drain excess fat, set aside. In another skillet, add oil, heat till hot. Add corn tortillas one at a time, turning once till softened, dip in chili sauce, place in long baking dish, spoon meat mixture, roll and place seam side down. Continue till all meat mixture is used. Top enchiladas with remaining chili sauce. Top with grated cheese. Bake at 350 degrees till bubbly.

CHOCOLATE POUND CAKE

1 cup oleo
½ cup Crisco
3 cups sugar
5 eggs
½ teaspoon baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons cocoa
1 cup milk
3 cups flour
1 teaspoon vanilla
Cream oleo, shortening and sugar. Add eggs one at a time. Mix dry ingredients and alternate with milk. Add vanilla. Bake at 325 degrees for one hour and 10 minutes. Bake in greased and floured bundt or tube pan.

COCONUT POUND CAKE

2 cups sugar
1 cup Crisco
½ teaspoon baking powder
2 cups flour
1 can coconut
½ cup milk
5 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon coconut extract
Cream sugar and Crisco. Add eggs one at a time. Alternate milk and flour. Add flavorings. Bake at 300 degrees until done about 1½ hours in a greased and floured bundt or tube pan.

GLAZE

1 cup sugar
½ cup water
½ cup oleo
1 teaspoon coconut extract

Miss Kathy Anderson, who is a speech therapist at the Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center in Big Spring, showed slides and shared her experiences on a trip

to Moscow, Minsk, Leningrad, Kiev and Helsinki, Finland. She was one of a select group of Americans invited to the Soviet-American study of speech pathology. They attended classes, lectures and toured several cities. They saw the usual tourist sites including the Kremlin, Lenin's tomb and Red Square and were allowed to visit Tolstoy's home. Near Kiev they saw the cemetery where 30,000 Jews were lined up, shot and buried in one day.

Miss Anderson reported that they found all religions to be persecuted, both Jews and Christians. Although there are a few churches and synagogues, those who attend are closely watched by KGB and are not allowed good jobs or privileges and are not allowed to discuss their beliefs outside the church building. If a person asks to leave he is immediately out of a job and is treated as an outcast.

There are many Jews who were on the tour who had friends or relatives living in Russia. One group was carrying medicine and other necessities to others in Russia who could not get them there because they were Jews.

They visited museums showing western art and plays and dances depicting the U.S. as a monster ready to destroy Russia. They found just as they left that their tour guide was working with the KGB. In spite of this, Miss Anderson said she was able to make friends with three young Jews who spoke English and leave them with two New Testaments.

She said although she went to Russia hoping to visit and worship with Russian Christians, she found the Jewish people were the ones she had an opportunity to meet and worship and share with, and through this she saw a different view of Russian attitudes and the general oppression there.

The hostess served Russian tea and chocolate brought from Russia by her son Larry, cherry cheese pie, fruit and cheese dip and Valentine candies and nuts.

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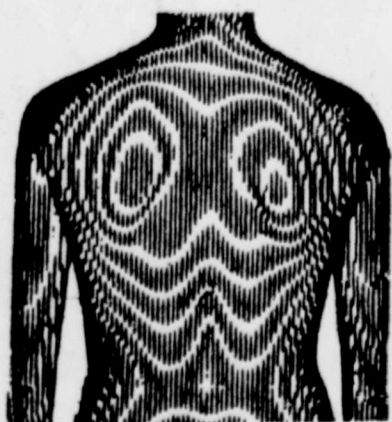

Generic vs. private label store brands

Plain-label and store label food products save money. But they don't always provide the quality shoppers want. Perhaps that's why the popularity of both generic and private label store brands varies greatly by product category.

Consumers accept some kinds of generic food products more than others. For example, sales marketing data shows that people buy more generic frozen juice than frozen potatoes. Generic juice now has five percent of the total juice market.

Shoppers are also selective about which products they buy under store brands. They buy almost 71 percent of their frozen vegetables under store labels, versus 26 percent under advertised brand names and one-half percent under generic labels. Store brands also account for 67 percent of the frozen fruits and 44 percent of frozen juice.

Despite the success of some store-label and generic food products

brand name products still have more than 60 percent of the sales in most product categories.

Perhaps one reason why generics haven't captured more of the market is the variation in products. Generics are often made to the retailer's specification so there can be quality differences from store to store.

The differences in generic food products are most pronounced where there are several ingredients, or relatively complicated processing, such as peanut butter or mayonnaise. The quality of generics may be more uniform among single ingredient foods, like canned fruits and vegetables.

Generic food products, even when sold under a store's own label, are usually C quality as measured by the USDA's A to C grading system. The A grade usually is sold under an advertised brand name, and the B grade as the store's regular private label.

Breadmaking to be taught

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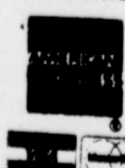
