JURY COURT WILL CONVEY NEXT MONTH

The spring term of the District Court will convene in this city on Monday, April 1st, for a two week's session. This is the first time that this court has had a two week's term of court and it will take the full term of the cases now on the docket. There has been much commotion during the past few days over summoning for Petit Jury service of twenty-one women. This is the time in the history of this court that women of the fairer sex have been called for this duty. Several attorneys have expressed opinion that women are not eligible for jury service in this state. In the case of State vs. Harper, appealed from the Criminal Court of the County of Ochiltree, reported in the 23rd issue of the Southwestern Reporter on page 940. As we understand this Harper was indicted by a grand jury composed of ten men and two women. The case was reversed by the court, the opinion holding that women were not eligible for jury service and that they could not serve as jurors until a change was made in the constitution. The opinion also stated that all jurors must be qualified electors but that qualified electors are not necessarily eligible jurors. As to whether the women will have to serve, cannot say but they have been called to appear by Sheriff J. S. Taylor. The Jurors as selected by the Commission composed of C. E. Jones, W. D. MANY NEW BUILDINGS TO BE ERECTED HERE

From all appearances Perryton is on the verge of a big building year and our local contractors will probably have plenty of business this summer. However, we don't want to be misleading, so right now we say to the outside builder, don't rush to Perryton when you read this article and expect to get plenty of work for we are amply supplied with good contractors and builders who live here year after year, pay taxes and lend their support to the upbuilding of the community. They are the ones that are entitled to the work and they are the ones that will get it.

The City Aldermen are still figuring on the City Hall proposition. The building will be used for a fire station, jail, city clerk's office and a council room. The city owns a lot on the east side of Main Street but it has not been definitely decided as to where the building will be erected.

The Masonic Lodge is also considering very strongly the erection of a building this summer. The building which they now have is entirely too small.

There is considerable talk of combining the City Hall and the Masonic Hall, the city using the first floor and the Masons occupying the second. We see no reason why this would not be an ideal combination. Both parties would not doubt be able to get larger and better quarters than they would if the buildings were erected separately.

Contractor M. R. Todd is building a new modern home for G. T. McLarty.

Contractor Ed Birt has just finished a new home for C. B. Rogers.

The new Bradbury Produce Co. building is now well under way and will be completed in a few weeks.

Wichita parties are figuring with the Perryton Mercantile Co. and the Farmers & Stockmen State Bank on putting a hotel over the building now occupied by these firms.

Mrs. F. A. Edwards is figuring with contractors on the erection of a modern residence.

There are a number of other building propositions being contemplated which we are not at liberty to publish at present but from the information that we have we feel sure that much new building will be done here this year.

PERRYTON FIRE RECORD AMONG STATES BEST

Do you know that Perryton has one of the best fire records of any city of the state of Texas and as a result we are getting better insurance rates every day. We now have the maximum credit of 15 per cent for low fire loss. The loss ratio for the year of 1923 was only .023 of the net premium paid. Every citizen owes it to himself and his neighbor to help keep this loss to the present low figure. Our city council has done everything possible in their power to put the city water supply and fire department in shape to comply with the fire insurance board's requirements. Watch the little things, keep the trash piles cleaned up, inspect your wiring and flues occasionally, take very precaution possible and our fire loss will be cut to the minimum.

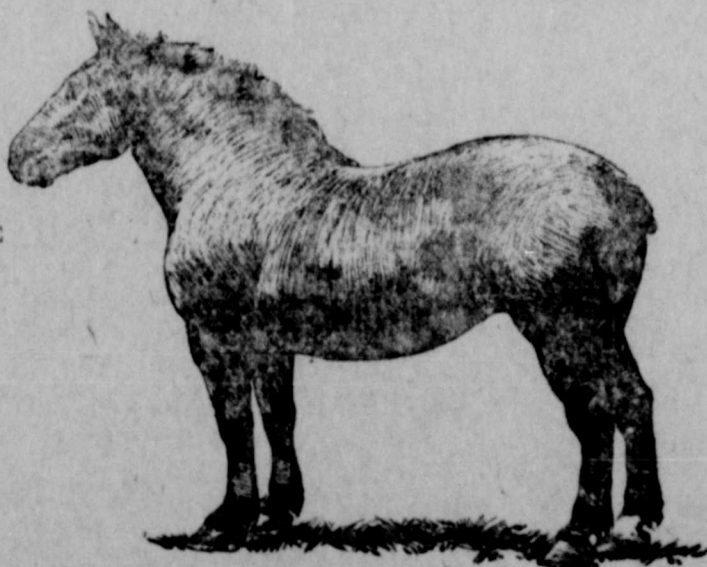

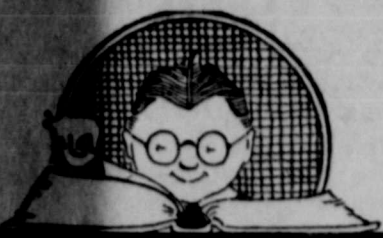

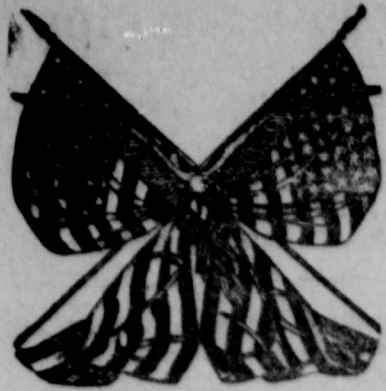
