### Texas Declares Quarantine

Fort Worth, Texas, Nov. 28.—The Live Stock Sanitary Commission of Texas promulgated an order Tuesday declaring a quarantine against the importation of cattle, sheep, goats, other ruminants, swine, fowls or any hoofs, horns, hides or skins of any live stock from the states of Missouri, Kansas, Iowa, Nebraska or Illinois. The order becomes effective Nov. 29.

The quarantine is declared as a precautionary measure pending further investigation of suspicious cases of foot and mouth disease. This order will remain in force until further notice.

The Commissioner's Court was in session here Friday, Dec. 1. Among other proceedings were the following: The bonds for the county officials for the coming two years were approved. Chas. Schreiner has donated to Kimble and Kerr counties, land for Ferrville and Noxville roads of third class, and said road, as outlined, was adopted by Kimble county. Oscar Latta was authorized to contract for a room 14x16 and a porch 8x16 to be added to the County Jail. Several acts were allowed.

The paper is a five little sheet devoted to news, views and work of the Methodist church, and to the advancement of Christianity in this section. The publication will appear monthly. 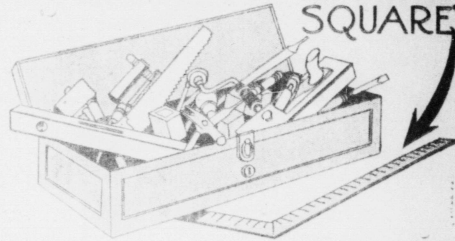

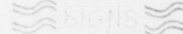

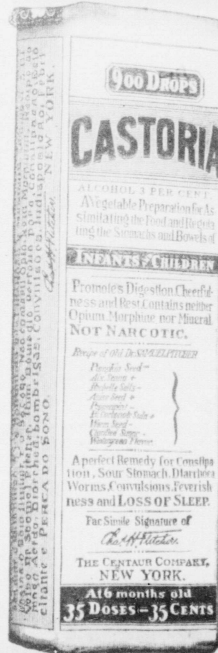
