STIRRING UP HATRED

Dulles Sharply Lashes Red Leaders On India Speeches

WASHINGTON (U)—Secretary of State Dulles today sharply assailed Soviet leaders for what he termed stirring up an atmosphere of hatred and prejudice against the West on their visit to Asia.

Dulles told a news conference that remarks by Soviet Premier Bulganin and party chief Nikita Khrushchev appeared to be a move to encourage use of force by India against the Portuguese colony of Goa.

Such remarks by Soviet leaders, who are now in Burma, show no great desire to lower tensions with the West, he said.

Dulles added that to this extent the anti-Western criticisms have damaged what survives of the friendlier East-West relations

growing out of last July's summit meeting.

The secretary stressed that the United States wants both India and Portugal to settle their dispute over Goa peacefully, without resort to force. India's Prime Minister Nehru, he said, certainly shares this view.

Dulles said the main purpose of a statement he issued Friday with Portugal's foreign minister — one which aroused angry reaction in India — was to lessen the emotionalism built up by Russia's leaders by their comments on Goa.

Dulles said he feels these Russian statements were designed to create an atmosphere which would provoke use of force in the dispute. These Soviet statements were an attempt to inject prejudice and hatred into the controversy, he declared.

On other matters, Dulles said: 1. The West will hold Russia fully responsible for rail and barge movements from West Germany to Berlin, regardless of the Soviet decision to give East German communists the right to license barge trips to the divided city.

2. The United States is considering the Philippines, Ceylon and possibly Japan as sites for an atomic energy pool center to serve friendly Asiatic countries.

3. Intelligence reports show Red China, while building up a ring of airfields near the Nationalist islands of Quemoy and Matsu, has yet to make the preparations that would be necessary prior to launching an attack in the area at this time.

4. Nationalist China has not informed the United States yet whether it will follow an American example and avoid use of the veto in considering U. N. membership for Communist-backed Outer Mongolia. The United States remains opposed in principle to use of the veto in considering applications for membership in the international organization.

5. The United States continues to feel very strongly that Israel

and its Arab neighbors should settle their Middle Eastern dispute peacefully to prevent an arms race from developing.

6. Prime Minister Eden's scheduled Jan. 30 meeting with President Eisenhower is a normal development of close British-American cooperation. No agenda has yet been agreed upon but the two leaders will talk about most matters of common concern.

7. He has no reason to change his view that the Republican party has set an example the Democrats might well follow as to foreign policy comments during a presidential election campaign.

GM Extends Retail Pact To Five Years

WASHINGTON (U)—President Harlow H. Curcio announced today that General Motors is immediately extending its sales agreement with its retail dealers from one year to five.

The president of the nation's largest manufacturing corporation announced this major policy change as a Senate Judiciary Anti-trust and Monopoly subcommittee resumed public hearings on GM operations. The committee is making what it calls a case study of the huge industrial firm.

Curcio said the 17,000 GM retail dealers throughout the nation were receiving telegrams announcing the policy change.

The one-year dealership agreements previously had been sharply criticized as one-sided by former and present GM dealers in testimony at the hearings.

Sen. O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.), acting chairman at the GM inquiry, immediately congratulated Curcio for what O'Mahoney termed "a compliance with a suggestion I made."

But O'Mahoney said the longer term agreements did "not relieve" other complaints on GM policies. The senator said GM could still cancel sales agreements without cause.

As a result, he said, some 20 states have passed special laws "to protect dealers who have invested large sums of their own funds."

Some former dealers have told the senators of abrupt cancellations after long dealings with GM, on GM complaints of unsatisfactory volume and other grounds. They have complained of pressure to take models and accessories they did not want.

More than 20 GM vice presidents and executives accompanied Curcio to the Senate committee hearing today as they did last Friday.

Prisoners To Start Terms At Huntsville

A "carload" of prisoners and escorts left here today for Huntsville.

Making the trip in one automobile were nine prisoners and three escorts. Sheriff Jess Slaughter said Paul Linder's "three-seater" Cadillac was jammed.

One of the prisoners, a juvenile, was to be left at Catesville en route to Huntsville. He is Ramon A. Velarde, who was committed to the State School for Boys after a hearing in Juvenile Court last week. He was accused of a part in the theft of articles from the Tommy Pool auto about two weeks ago.

Other prisoners, charges on which they were convicted and length of prison sentences, were John Oakley, possession of marijuana, two years; Nester Martinez, burglary, five years; Jimmie Johnson Jr., burglary, three years; Jimmie Johnson Sr., burglary, three years; B. H. Smith, defrauding with worthless check, two years; Robert Watson, second offense DWI, three years; Willie McGuff, burglary, three years; Johnny B. Johnson, burglary, three years; The Eastman, assault with intent to rape, five years.

Taking the prisoners to Huntsville were Deputy Sheriff Tommy Cole, Juvenile Officer A. E. Long and Linder, whose car was hired for the trip.

Weaver Testifies In Washburn Trial

Describes Wife's Death By Bomb

WACO (U)—The husband of Mrs. Harry Weaver testified today that Harry Washburn was the first suspect he named after the wealthy ranch woman was blasted to death in "a terrible explosion."

Washburn, 39, of Houston, is on trial for murder, charged with planting the auto bomb that killed Mrs. Weaver last Jan. 19 in San Angelo. The trial was transferred here when a jury could not be selected in West Texas.

Weaver, testifying in a shaking voice, said he rushed to a window to see "an immense cloud of smoke" covering the driveway of his mother-in-law's home in San Angelo.

The graying, stocky witness said he rushed outside and found his wife "badly mutilated"—slumped in the front seat of her shattered car. There was a "dead stare" on her face, he said.

"I thought she was dead and I didn't touch her."

Weaver said a policeman came up and asked him if he had any idea what happened.

"I guess a bomb went off," he said he told the officer.

Weaver said he then told the officer about Washburn, his former son-in-law, and suggested that all plane departure schedules be checked.

Weaver testified earlier Washburn appeared at the Weavers' ranch home 19 miles north of San Angelo in 1951, and threatened to kill both of the Weavers. He also demanded \$20,000, the witness said.

Weaver said he talked Washburn into accepting a check for \$5,000, saying a check for \$20,000 could not be cashed if both the Weavers were dead. He said the couple promised to pay Washburn \$500 a month if he would spare their lives.

Weaver said the incident was reported to officers. He said he later saw Washburn in Houston and told him:

"I never want you to come to our ranch again. If anything happens to us they'll pick you up before the next morning."

He said he later received more threats in phone calls and letters. On cross examination Weaver identified himself as an archaeologist and architect. He said he was not a graduate of any school of architecture.

Big Four Formally Recognize Austria As Neutral Nation

WASHINGTON (U)—The United States, Britain, France and Russia today formally recognized Austria's "perpetual neutrality."

Secretary of State Dulles delivered a note stating this recognition to Austrian Ambassador Karl Gruber, and the State Department said identical notes were being delivered to the Austrian government by the other Big Four countries.

Dulles' brief note took cognizance of a law passed Oct. 26, by Austria's Parliament after the Big Four agreed to grant Austria its independence. This law pledged Austria to "perpetual neutrality" and vowed the Austria never would join any military alliance or permit foreign military bases on its territory.

Weaver, the first witness, was still on the stand when the court recessed at noon.

Weaver testified he and his wife were asleep in their ranch home 19 miles north of San Angelo early on April 23, 1951, when they were awakened by Washburn.

The Houston man stood by their bed with a pistol in each hand, Weaver said.

"Get out of bed," he quoted Washburn as saying. "You are going to write a letter for me."

Weaver told the court that Washburn had a typewritten letter in his hand and handed it to Mrs. Weaver, 51, an attractive civic and social leader.

It was a "suicide note," Weaver said—testifying before television cameras in what may be the nation's first televised court trial.

He said Washburn demanded that Mrs. Weaver rewrite the note in her own hand.

"You do exactly as I tell you or I'll kill you both," Weaver said Washburn demanded.

The defendant stared straight at his former father-in-law without any show of emotion.

Weaver testified calmly with his hands clasped in his lap.

Weaver said Washburn also demanded:

"You're going to write me a check for \$30,000 and some other checks."

After Mrs. Weaver had copied two lines of the note Weaver said Washburn remarked:

"Mrs. Weaver, I ought to kill you now because you stopped giving me \$250 a month."

Weaver said his wife had been giving Washburn and her daughter such payments before their divorce in 1951.

Weaver said that at one point Washburn raised the blind of the bed room and said:

"I'll look to see if my men are still out there. If anything happens to me they will come in and kill you."

Weaver said he once tried to reach a pistol he had hidden in the room but Washburn saw him and warned: "Don't try. I've got it here and will kill you with it."

Eleven men and one woman were seated the first day of the trial, in contrast to a September session at San Angelo where attorneys were unable to pick a jury in a six-day effort. The trial then was shifted to this Central Texas city.

Defense attorneys questioned jurors closely about their views on circumstantial evidence on which the state indicates it will base its case.

Video Gets First Murder Trial

WACO (U)—Television's first real murder trial was on the air today. KWTX-TV began televising the Harry Washburn trial with the first witness.

One television camera is being used. It is in the balcony of the courtroom.

News director Bill Stinson said the telecast was made from existing lights only, but the quality of the picture was excellent. He said courtroom spectators paid little or no attention to the camera crew.

Several civic classes in Waco schools watched the first telecast.

CONFESSION DENIED

Suspect Due Quiz In Slaying Of Boys

PONTIAC, Mich. (U)—Authorities today questioned a 23-year-old Michigan man arrested on a traffic violation charge in connection with the October slaying of three Chicago boys.

Police Chief James Parker of nearby Holly, who arrested him, and two state police detectives said there was no evidence to link Owen Robert Moser of Fenton, Mich., with the slaying.

Moser is held in Oakland County Jail on a charge of possessing an

unregistered firearm. Parker said he found the gun in Moser's car when he arrested him on the traffic charge Saturday.

Parker said Chicago police were "mistaken" in reporting he had told them Moser had signed a statement admitting the triple slaying and added, "I don't know where they got that idea."

Moser has admitted he was in the Chicago area about the time the boys disappeared, and he has admitted picking up two or maybe three boys and taking them for a ride," Parker said. "We think he may know more than he's telling, but that's all he has told us."

The three boys — Robert Peterson, 14, John Schuessler, Jr., 13, and his brother Anton, 11 — disappeared Oct. 18. Their bodies were found in a forest preserve ditch Oct. 18.

Parker said Moser admitted living in a rooming house in Homewood, Ill., 25 miles south of Chicago, and working in a coffee shop there from January to mid-October, when he left for Fenton, Mich.

State Police Detectives Charles Leif and Melvin Kaufman said he specifically denied any connection with the triple slaying.

C-City Chamber Manager Dies

COLORADO CITY — Walter Frank Craddock, 65, manager of the Chamber of Commerce here, died of a heart attack at the Root Memorial Hospital in Colorado City at 5 a.m. Tuesday.

Mr. Craddock had been executive head of the Chamber here for the past two and a half years, coming here from Hillsboro.

He was born June 6, 1890, in Middleton Tenn. and was a member of the First Methodist Church and the Lions Club in Colorado City and of the Masonic Lodge at Denton.

Mr. Craddock had married the former Lela Williams Oct. 7, 1913 in San Marcos and he is survived by her; by one son, W. F. Craddock Jr., Las Vegas, Nev.; a daughter, Mrs. James P. Jones, San Antonio; two sisters, Mrs. W. S. Kerr, Hereford, and Mrs. Clifford Jacobs, Pullman, Wash.; and two grandchildren.

Funeral arrangements are pending at Kiker & Son Funeral Home.

Lauhon Enters Innocent Plea

GALVESTON (U)—Ellis Lauhon Jr., pleaded innocent today to murder charges of slaying three members of a Dickinson family.

Judge Donald Markie set trial for Jan. 23.

Lauhon is charged with shooting Mrs. Ruby McPherson, 42; her mother, Mrs. Zola Norman, 63; and a son, George McPherson, 12, in the McPherson home June 22.

After his capture in Mexico and return to Texas, Lauhon was questioned by officers as saying he shot the three because he was afraid they might turn him over to Air Force officials for being AWOL.

Officers said Lauhon was picked up by Mrs. McPherson at Beaumont as she was returning from Sulphur, La., where she had visited her husband, an oil field worker.

The airman stood impassively as Markie ordered a venire of 350 for a jury.

Sainburg Quest Still Fruitless

The hunt for Dr. Frank Sainburg cooled today, after the Big Spring surgeon and two children dropped out of sight in New Mexico.

Officers here still believe the fugitive from a Longview contempt of court order had gone west from Hobbs, N. M., where he was last reported. With Sainburg were his son, Philip, and his wife's daughter, Mary Jean Nance. Both youngsters are four years of age.

Dr. Sainburg is accused of kidnapping the boy from Ithaca, N. Y. The little girl left Big Spring with the doctor last Friday while her mother, Mrs. Connie Sainburg, went to Longview to pick up her infant son, Alfred Nance, who had been staying with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Neal Smith. When Mrs. Sainburg reached Longview, she was taken into "protective custody" at the Longview jail where she was still held today.

Smith reported in Longview that Sainburg threatened Sunday that he would never see his granddaughter again if Mrs. Sainburg wasn't released and charges against Sainburg dropped.

William Murphy, FBI agent in Dallas, said federal authorities have not entered the alleged kidnapping case because there "is no federal process involved." He said the Justice Department does not consider kidnapping charges to be under the Lindbergh law where a parent is involved, "unless there is some very unusual circumstance."

Maneuvers Fatal To 32

FT. POLK, La. (U)—Exercise Sagebrush, America's military rehearsal for an atomic war defense, killed 32 of the 140,000 servicemen taking part in the huge maneuvers.

Fighting in this country's biggest war games since World War II ended Sunday night.

The Army said most deaths came from car, truck and tank accidents. Military vehicle accidents killed 15 men, while civilian traffic crashes killed another seven. Two drowned and a helicopter crash killed two more.

The United States has been backed into an awkward position in the United Nations in the dispute over Outer Mongolia's claim to U. N. membership. The dispute could be part of a process to make the whole Chinese representation question blow up in American faces.

Nationalist China, in the U. N. seat claimed by the Chinese Communists, threatens to veto a package deal on the admission of U. N. members because that package includes the Mongolian People's Republic, a Soviet satellite.

The United States opposed the Mongolian application too. But now the United States is in the position of having to try to persuade the Nationalists not to veto in the Security Council a deal which a majority of U. N. members want to go through. Such use of the veto would be ammunition in the Communist campaign to drive the Nationalists out of the U. N.

The United States got off one hook by deciding to abstain in the vote on Outer Mongolia's application. It got onto another hook with the Nationalist Chinese threat.

The government of Chiang Kai-shek recognized the Mongolian People's Republic in 1946, shortly after the Chinese Republic and the Soviet Union signed a treaty of friendship and nonaggression. But the next year Mongolian troops invaded the Chinese province of Sinkiang, China, protesting to the Security Council, accused the Russians of instigating an aggression. After that the Nationalist Chinese changed their minds about supporting Outer Mongolia for U. N. membership.

The picture has become extremely complicated. In 1946 the United States backed a package deal which would admit Mongolia. The Soviet Union blocked it. Now the Soviet Union supports a package deal which the United States reluctantly accepts.

The Soviet Union is making proposals for the point that the United States found Mongolia qualified for membership in 1946. But this propaganda does not mention the Nationalist switch. That might provoke discussion of the 1947 invasion.

Some diplomats seem puzzled about the United States attitude. But it seems possible that Outer Mongolia, once a source of friction between China and both Czarist and Communist Russia, could well be that again between Peking and Moscow.

The Mongolian People's Republic, 31 years old last week, is a creation of Soviet Communists but the way was paved by Czarist imperialism. It is even more a satellite of Moscow than — say — Bulgaria.

Lying between Soviet Central Asia and China, it is a landlocked area more than twice the size of Texas. It has little more than 100,000 people, 85 per cent of them nomadic herders.

The country long was a target of Russian imperial ambitions in northern Asia. Long before communism took over, Russia was colonizing areas which once were Chinese and now are Soviet republics in Central Asia.

After the Russo-Japanese war in 1905, the Russians agreed with the Japanese on recognizing special Russian privileges in Outer Mongolia. Once entrenched, the Russians fomented an independence movement and Czarist troops moved in.

After the Russian revolution, Soviet forces seized control of the Nationalist movement there. In 1924 the country was proclaimed a people's republic, first nation to pattern itself on the Soviet model. A Soviet-Chinese conference that year agreed the Russians would withdraw their troops, but the Russians stayed and next year crossed into China's Sinkiang Province. This set off events severely damaging to Chinese-Soviet relations.

By 1940 Soviet influence was entrenched in Outer Mongolia.

'CRACKER JACK'

Texas Air Units Join U.S. Alert

Texas Reserve, Air National Guard and Air Force pilots were participating Tuesday in a surprise nationwide defense alert to check radar tracing and interceptor practice defense under winter conditions.

Military sources were close-mouthed about the alert, called "Cracker Jack."

"We can't make any further statements on the alert," said Brig. Gen. William Nuckols, commander of the 33rd Air Defense Division at Tinker AFB, Oklahoma City.

The alert at 4 p.m. (CST) caught some reservists in heavy home-bound traffic.

At Hensley Field in Dallas, F80 Shooting Star pilots of the 448th Fighter-Bomber Wing were about

to leave for home when the alert came. The 448th is a reserve outfit commanded by Brig. Gen. Jerry Davidson and numbers about 750 men at full strength.

The alert for Hensley began with a call up system by phone for reservists, and by informing others coming to training classes at 6 p.m. by 8 p.m. The Air Force asked radio stations to broadcast Tuesday the alert to reach other reservists, who had not been contacted.

The alert will last for not more than four days, Air Force officials said.

In many areas of the nation, the alert included the operation of ground observers corps, out in Dallas too many of the training classes were "too new" to be considered operational yet.

serve, National Guard, Navy and Marines, plus Canadian forces and some 400,000 members of the Ground Observer Corps.

The test was being run under a blanket of virtual secrecy, but fragmentary information indicated that interceptor jets on the East and West coasts scrambled skyward minutes after the mock attack—planes of the U. S. Strategic Air Command—were detected heading their way.

Directing the operation was the Air Defense Command, headquartered at Colorado Springs, Colo.

Officers said the main purpose of the drill is to check on the effectiveness of radar tracking and interceptor defenses under winter conditions.

The Air Defense Command said there will be no disclosure of specific numbers of men and planes involved.

In New York, a spokesman for the Eastern Defense Command at Stewart Air Force Base said mythical enemy attackers swept "in force" from over the Atlantic.

He said the first wave of "attackers" was met by personnel who normally man the all-weather jets based along the Eastern Sea Board.

In Washington state, an operations officer with the 25th Air Division at McChord Air Force Base said interceptors throughout the area were "real fast" in getting into the air.

From O'Hare Field near Chicago came word that the alert—which was sprung with only long-range and general advance warning—caught "virtually no pilots... unaware."

The volunteer ground watchers—whose job it is to scan the skies for planes that might get by the radar undetected—apparently were responding with varying degrees of effectiveness.

Ike, Eden May Seek Improved Mid-East Action

WASHINGTON (U)—President Eisenhower and British Prime Minister Anthony Eden undoubtedly will give top priority to arranging better cooperation in the critical Middle East when they meet here Jan. 30.

Western relations with Russia in the wake of visits by top Russian leaders to India, Burma and Afghanistan, and in advance of their projected visit to Britain next spring, also are due for sweeping review.

But joint British-American moves to avert war between Israel and its Arab forces promised to get primary attention.

At present, British-American policies, while both aimed at persuading Jews and Arabs to settle their dispute peacefully, are somewhat conflicting.

Eden, coming here at Eisenhower's invitation, has offered to serve as mediator in the Middle East quarrel, calling on both sides to agree to permanent boundaries. He proposed that the 1947 United Nations partition plan be used as a starting point for talks.

Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles have carefully avoided endorsing the Eden plan, mainly because it has aroused angry opposition from Israel.

In its war with the Arabs, Israel seized more territory than was awarded to it under the U. N. partition plan. It contends that the Western Powers sanctioned the present frontiers in 1950.

Egypt and other Arab nations have hailed Eden's negotiation offer as pointing the way to talks which could end the threat of hostilities in the region.

Eisenhower and Eden are expected to agree easily on the need for a solid, united front against Russia in Europe as an aftermath to the failure to settle any East-West problem at the Geneva foreign ministers meeting.

Even though Britain recognizes Communist China and the United States does not, there seems little prospect that this difference will alter their present close cooperation in the Far East.

'Minor Changes' Seen For Bracero Treaty

Sen. Langer To Push Probe Into Dixon-Yates, Ike Campaign Link

WASHINGTON (U)—Sen. Langer (R-ND) said today he will press his demand for a public investigation to show whether backers of the now-repudiated Dixon-Yates contract contributed to President Eisenhower's 1952 campaign fund.

In a surprise move yesterday Langer demanded that a Senate Antimonopoly subcommittee on which he serves subpoena Postmaster General Summerfield, who was Republican national chairman in 1952; Sherman Adams, top White House aide; Stephen A. Mitchell, the 1952 Democratic national chairman, and others.

His request was in the form of a handful of resolutions filed with the subcommittee at a public hearing. It is investigating what Chairman Kefauver (D-Tenn) termed "a criminal side" of the contract negotiations.

Kefauver said Langer's resolutions might be considered by the three-member subcommittee today but probably any decision would have to be passed on by the full Antimonopoly subcommittee.

He said that Dec. 16 had been tentatively set for a resumption of his group's public hearings.

At issue is a contract negotiated at Eisenhower's orders and under which utility firm headed by Edgar H. Dixon and Eugene A. Yates would have sold electric power to the Atomic Energy Commission for the Tennessee Valley Authority to replace TVA current consumed at atomic installations.

The 107-million-dollar contract between AEC and the Dixon-Yates group was canceled after the city of Memphis, Tenn., one of TVA's big customers, announced it would build its own power plant.

Then last month the AEC repudiated the contract entirely on a legal opinion that "there is a substantial question as to whether there were material violations of law and public policy."

Langer proposed that Summerfield be asked about any utility contributions to the 1952 Republican campaign fund made with "the Dixon-Yates contract in mind."

Adams should be asked, he said, about any Dixon-Yates contributions to his earlier campaign for governor of New Hampshire, and "in all fairness," Mitchell should be asked about possible Dixon-Yates contributions to the 1952 campaign of Adlai E. Stevenson for president.

He proposed also that all officials of the First Boston Corp., a New York financial firm which arranged financing for the Dixon-Yates contract, be called to tell "of the part played by them, if any, in the last Republican and Democratic election."

Langer acted after both AEC Chairman Lewis L. Strauss and Budget Director Rowland Hughes had declined to tell the subcommittee whether they had discussed matters concerning the contract with White House officials.

But Hughes contended "there was nothing phoney, or dishonest, or any conspiracy with anybody."

Ralph H. Demmler, chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission from June 1953 until May 25, 1955, testified at last night's subcommittee hearing that he had attended three conferences at the White House relating to the Dixon-Yates contract.

He said, however, that no one in the executive branch of the government sought to influence the SEC's decision in passing on the financing arrangements for the contract.

He said he had pointed out to AEC officials, including Strauss, the financing problems they faced under the Holding Company Act.

He maintained that his action in advising a "sister agency" of government was "entirely proper."

White Parents Ask Children's Entry In Negro Schools

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A white college professor and his wife have asked U. S. District Court to order two Negro public schools here to enroll their son and daughter as pupils.

Robert W. Rempfer, an associate mathematics professor at predominantly Negro Fisk University, and his wife filed an amendment yesterday to an integration suit before Federal Judge Elmer D. Davis.

The couple sought admission for their son, Richard Fleming, to Washington Junior High and for their daughter, Jean Trudy, to Pearl Elementary.

The amendment was to a suit filed Sept. 23 by relatives of 21 Negro children, seeking admission for them to attend White Elementary, Junior and Senior High Schools.

Gore Tells Lighter Side Of Red Troubles

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Leroy Gore, former weekly newspaper publisher and longtime foe of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), says his unsuccessful attempts to visit Russia during a European trip were frustrating, "but they had their lighter moments."

"Many of the Russians I met felt sorry for me," he said in a telephone interview yesterday from his home in Sauk City, Wis.

"They thought that Joe McCarthy had me exiled from the United States, and I couldn't go back."

Gore founded the "Joe Must Go Club" in Wisconsin which in 1954 campaigned to force a recall election of Wisconsin's junior Republican senator. The recall campaign failed to gain the required number of signatures on petitions.

Gore said he decided on trying to visit Russia while touring the Midwest with the Soviet farm delegation this summer. He applied for a visa July 28.

"I had a little passport trouble," he said. "The State Department didn't want to give me one until I had my visa. But Sen. Wiley (R-Wis.) straightened that out."

Gore, a Republican who says he's now thinking about running for Congress himself but won't decide for a month or so, said officials at the Soviet Embassy in Washington suggested he pick up his visa in Europe to save time.

"It wasn't at Amsterdam," he said, "so I went on to Copenhagen. I waited there a month and American consular officials broke some sort of precedent by sending a bluntly worded query to Moscow asking for information on my visa. The Russians didn't give me any reasons. They just didn't say anything."

"All the Russians I met, 50 or so, seemed very disappointed that I couldn't get to visit their coun-

try. But apparently it was one of those cases where I learned more about the country from not being able to visit it than I would have on a tour."

Gore said he gained the impression that the Soviet hierarchy is made up of "queer, very frightened people."

"It seems to me obvious that they are afraid of getting too many Americans in their country, talking to their people."

What about the Soviet opinion of Sen. McCarthy, as told to a widely known anti-McCarthy newspaper?

"They looked at me and smiled kind of shyly," Gore said, "and told me that they couldn't really hate a man who's spent so much time telling the world how big and strong and smart they are."

COLLEGE GETS TAB FOR 'PAINT JOB'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The University of Southern California has sent a bill for \$533 to its crosstown rival UCLA for damage caused when someone dumped blue paint on USC bandmen during the school's annual football game last month.

The paint was dumped from atop a Coliseum tunnel as the band passed below. Said UCLA Dean of Students Byron Atkinson yesterday.

"The only clue that UCLA had anything to do with the half-time prank is a Bruin rosters cap."

The Associated Students at UCLA, where school colors are blue and gold, say they'll pay only if proof is given.

Arguments Due On Security Testimony

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court hears arguments today on the constitutionality of a law aimed at compelling witnesses to testify in national security cases under a grant of immunity from prosecution.

This first challenge to the validity of the 1954 immunity law was raised by William Ludwig Ullman, a former Air Force major and one-time Treasury employee who has figured in congressional investigations of alleged Communist spy activity in the government.

Ullman, 47, was convicted of contempt of court and given a six-month jail term last March after he twice had refused to testify be-

fore a New York federal grand jury. U. S. Dist. Judge Edward Weinfeld had granted him immunity from prosecution in connection with anything he might tell the grand jury, which was looking into wartime espionage in Washington.

Ullman appealed and in April the U. S. Court of Appeals in New York unanimously upheld the constitutionality of the immunity law. The court also affirmed Ullman's jail sentence, but he has remained free in \$5,000 bond pending the outcome of his appeal to the Supreme Court.

The immunity law applies to witnesses before grand juries, the courts and congressional committees. It provides that when a witness is reluctant to testify for fear of self-incrimination he may be directed to speak with assurance he would be immune from prosecution as a result of anything he might say. Continued refusal to testify when in grounds under the law for contempt proceedings.

In refusing to answer questions before the grand jury, Ullman contended the government was invoking the immunity law as a device to entrap him into a perjury charge.

Trial Postponed In 'Frosty Orange' Case

BEAUMONT (AP) — The trial of 10 persons charged with conspiracy and mail fraud in operations of the Orange Frosty Corp. of Orange was postponed yesterday by Federal Judge Lamar Cecil. Asst. U.S. Atty. Jack King said the trial will probably be reset for May.

TO CANCEL INVITATION

Britons Suspect Red Chief's Bitter Words Are Deliberate

LONDON (AP) — Britons suspected today that Nikita Khrushchev is deliberately making himself obnoxious in Western eyes in order to force British authorities to cancel his invitation to visit London next spring.

That could be one explanation why Communist party boss Khrushchev and Soviet Premier Bulganin have turned their tour through India and Burma into an occasion for bitter denunciations of West in general and Britain in particular.

During the Geneva summit talks last summer Prime Minister Eden invited the two Russian leaders to visit London. Plans call for them to come in April.

The supposition now gaining widespread ground here is that the Russians are not eager to make the visit but want the British to call it off. Diplomats, news analysts and men in the street have a dozen conflicting suggestions of the reason.

A Foreign Office spokesman declined comment on Khrushchev's latest jibes, saying: "The pattern of these speeches seems to be

becoming pretty clear, and I do not think they call for day-to-day comment from me."

But the British-Russian word war over the touring Soviet leaders' statements continued across the Iron Curtain. Pravda, former Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill and British Minister of State Anthony Nutting all were heard from.

Addressing a rally of Young Conservatives at Woodford, England, his parliamentary constituency, the 81-year-old Churchill said he thought the British government should "seriously consider" canceling the projected visit of Khrushchev and Bulganin to Britain in April. He qualified this by saying Britain should not "take any violently rapid decision" on the question.

Referring to anti-British remarks by the two top Russian leaders, Churchill termed their current Asian tour an "exhibition — there is no other word."

"It certainly has been a surprising spectacle and one which Her Majesty's government will no doubt study carefully before they allow

it, with suitable variants, to be repeated here," he said.

Prime Minister Eden extended an invitation to Khrushchev and Bulganin at the summit conference in Geneva last July. No specific date has been set.

Churchill cautioned his audience that the behavior of the Soviet leaders "must not lead us to suppose that Russian power and capacity are not growing in many other directions."

Mitchell Tells Unionists Labor Has A 'Political Responsibility'

NEW YORK (AP)—Secretary of Labor Mitchell said today organized labor has both a duty and responsibility to speak out with a "loud and clear" voice in politics.

Mitchell's remarks prepared for the convention of the merged AFL-CIO indicated, however, that he expects labor support to be given to Republican party policies rather than to those of Democrats.

His speech, like one delivered by President Eisenhower yesterday to convention delegates via a long-distance hookup from Eisenhower's Gettysburg headquarters, said labor unions have a right to deal in political issues.

Eisenhower said that in such expression the rights of minorities in unions having "differing social, economic and political views must be scrupulously protected and their views accurately reflected."

The President and his labor Cabinet officer appeared to be answering, in part at least, the expressed fears of some Republicans that unions are taking too active a political role. The speeches also signaled an administration effort

to vie actively with the Democrats for the labor vote in the 1956 campaign.

Gov. Averell Harriman of New York, a potential candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination next year, said in another speech prepared for the convention today that "we need more, not less, participation by working men and women in American political affairs."

Harriman saw "a glorious opportunity" to increase national production by 50 per cent in the next decade and thereby improve living conditions. But "to get this expansion, we must have wise and progressive policies," he said.

"It is up to labor to make its voice heard to be sure we have those policies," he added.

Mitchell said AFL-CIO leaders have denied they will "try to control the votes of union members" but will keep members informed on political issues. Nobody, he said, can object to that kind of political activity.

He said he expects the 16-million-member labor federation to sup-

port Eisenhower administration labor policies.

Eisenhower's address was hailed as a "very fine message" by AFL-CIO President George Meany. Walter Reuther, former CIO chief now an AFL-CIO vice president, said, "It refutes completely the Goldwater line."

Reuther referred to Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz.), chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, who has spearheaded a Republican group critical of union political activity.

Goldwater has charged the AFL-CIO plans "slush-funds" to capture control of the government through the Democratic party. He has said the AFL-CIO has no right to endorse a presidential candidate.

Both Meany and Reuther have told the more than 1,400 delegates to the founding AFL-CIO convention that they intend stepped-up political activity but are wedded to neither party.

Mitchell said that combining the AFL and CIO should lead to improved labor-management relations. He expressed hope that the AFL-CIO and industry could reach a "live-and-let-live" agreement to reduce strikes and make for smoother collective bargaining.

President To Be Made Life Member Of CAP

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower, first U.S. president to hold an airplane pilot's license, will be made an honorary life member today of the Civil Air Patrol, the Air Force's civilian auxiliary.

Narcotics Agents Locked In Constant Battle With Pushers

Editor's Note — By the most conservative estimate, dope is costing Americans something like 300 million dollars a year. But that doesn't include the deadly toll in shattered, twisted lives, in crime associated with the craving for drugs. Here's the story behind plans for a congressional probe of the whole problem, first in a series of three stories.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—Federal agents were puzzled. They had reason to suspect that Pon Wal, smiling, 64-year-old operator of the Fragrant Flower Garden Shop in San Francisco's Chinatown, was peddling the white death called heroin.

But how?

Day after day, U. S. Treasury agents watched Pon Wal delicately moving among his flowers. Customers were few. None were known addicts. None was of a type to arouse suspicion.

Pon Wal knew he was being watched. He nodded and smiled blandly at the agents as they passed his shop. Occasionally, in plain view of the T-men, he wrapped an expensive orchid corsage or a dozen roses and summoned a commercial messenger boy to deliver the package.

Agents stopped the messengers and searched them. Nothing. They examined the packages. Nothing. One morning, as fog swirled through Chinatown, the agents again went through the routine of intercepting a messenger and examining the box of flowers.

"Roses, nothing but roses," one of the federal men growled. Then he gave a low whistle.

Tiny flecks of white powder had spilled down the stem of one of the roses. Cunningly attached to the stem was a thin green capsule. The T-man wet his finger, touched it to the power, tasted it and grimaced.

"Heroin—pure heroin. Let's go!"

Thus, through long surveillance, federal operatives found the evidence needed to arrest Pon Wal and eight confederates in a multi-million-dollar narcotics ring that

had been smuggling heroin into the United States from Red China.

Locked in a constant battle of wits with international dope smugglers, agents of the Federal Narcotics Bureau and the U. S. Customs Service share the almost impossible task of trying to keep illicit drugs—opium, heroin, cocaine, morphine and marijuana—out of this country.

Drug addiction is a blight that the government estimates costs \$50 million dollars a year, while twisting and wrecking the lives of thousands of the victims it has "hooked."

Harry J. Anslinger, chief of the Federal Narcotics Bureau, calls the habit "murder on the installment plan." It ravages body and soul, reducing its victims to a zombie-like existence of living death. That's the human side.

Financially, it is a devastating drain on the nation's economy. Here's why: The narcotics bureau estimates that the country has 60,000 addicts—a figure that other sources say is far too low. Even using the government's figure, this still adds up to a whopping 330 million dollars a year just to buy drugs.

That's because federal authorities say it costs an addict \$15 to \$20 a day to satisfy his craving, or a minimum of around \$5,500 a year. But this isn't the whole story.

The average addict can't hold a job, particularly one that pays that kind of money. So he steals. And since a thief seldom gets more than a quarter of the value of stolen goods when he sells it, it means that the theft bill tops 1 1/4 billion dollars every year.

Profits of such immensity have a terrific attraction for mob lords like Charles (Lucky) Luciano, who was deported several years ago, or the late Waxey Gordon, who exploit dope to build up criminal empires.

For dope is cheap—to start with. U. S. Customs Commissioner Ralph Kelly says an ounce of 100

per cent pure heroin, the most habit-forming of all drugs, can be purchased in Hong Kong for \$60. One ounce contains 437 1/2 grains. But by the time it reaches the addict, it may have been cut to 5 per cent purity, or one twentieth its original strength. For one grain of this diluted heroin, the addict pays \$1 in Washington, D.C. As Kelly says:

"That means the original ounce of heroin, costing \$60 in Hong Kong, will be sold to addicts in Washington for \$8,750—a tidy profit of 14,600 per cent."

The vastly inflated price of dope is a tribute to the job the narcotics bureau, and police in big cities, are doing to hold down smuggling and peddling. But no authority has any illusions about enforcing an air-tight defense.

Officials say they sometimes lie awake nights thinking what might happen if international traffickers could find a major breach and exploit it long enough to flood the country with dope from Red China.

In pre-Communist days, China executed 1,000 dope peddlers a year in efforts to stamp out opium addiction. But only recently, Communist China offered to sell 500 tons — a million pounds — of heroin on the open market.

Anslinger says he is convinced the Reds are trying to unload vast quantities of the poison in this country in return for American dollars needed to strengthen the wobbly Peiping regime.

Anslinger's agents concentrate on breaking up dope rings inside this country. The Customs Service has the responsibility of stopping smuggling, and it's an enormous task.

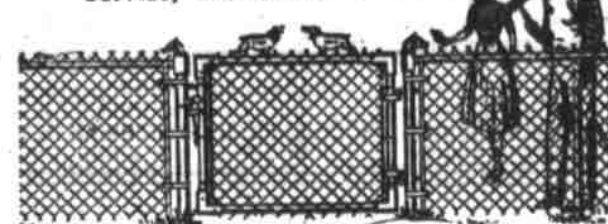

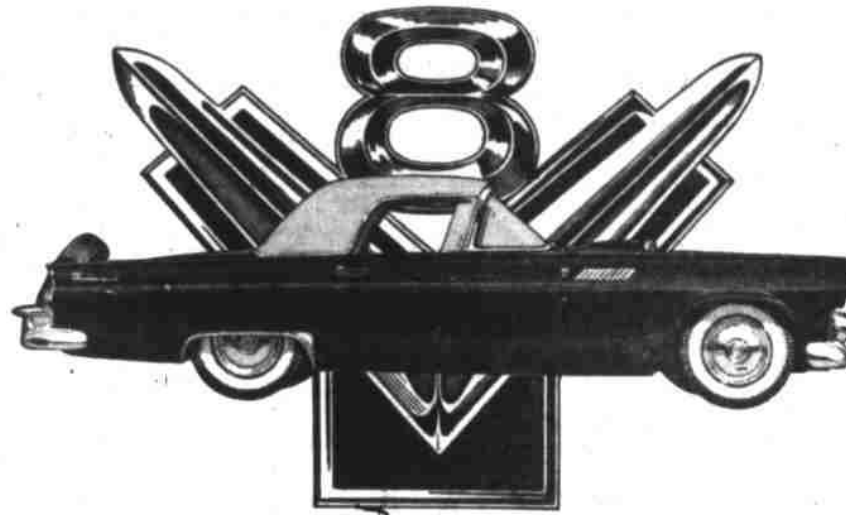

Reds Charge 'Distortion' Of Architect's Criticism

MOSCOW (U.S.)—The Soviet Foreign Ministry has accused The Associated Press and the New York Times of "gross distortions" in dispatches concerning recent official criticism of Russian architect Alexander V. Vlasov.

Leonid F. Ilyichev, head of the Foreign Ministry's press department, called Richard K. O'Malley of The AP and Welles Hangan of the Times to his office. He said they had stated falsely that Vlasov had been fired and deprived of his medals.

"Such behavior is incompatible with the normal state of affairs," Ilyichev told the two newsmen, "and can only compromise the American agencies and papers represented by the correspondents."

He warned that "adequate measures" would be taken if there were similar future occurrences.

The dispatch from The AP's Moscow bureau Nov. 9 quoted a decree by the Russian government and Communist party as saying Vlasov had been fired as Moscow's chief architect and stripped of his decorations. The next morning the Soviet Academy of Architecture was asked if the Vlasov named in the decree and who lost his job was the Russian architect then touring

the United States. The reply was affirmative.

The Times was one of the newspapers which published the AP dispatch.

The decree was the first public indication that Vlasov was no longer Moscow's chief architect. But the text of the decree showed Vlasov was criticized only in the preamble and that he was not among the architects specifically mentioned in the decree as having been stripped of their medals and identify him as a "former" chief architect of Moscow.

Lipstick Nightcap Prelude To Disaster

SAN FRANCISCO (U.S.)—Albert Goudal, 33, who claims service in Indian, Spanish-American War and Mexican campaigns, came to San Francisco Hospital as a traffic casualty.

Knocked down by a car, he had a broken arm, a black eye and lipstick prints on his bald head.

Explaining the lipstick, he said, "I was just having a nightcap in the neighborhood tavern."

Integrated Classes Resume At Catholic Church School

ERATH, La. (U.S.)—Integrated religious classes resumed at a Roman Catholic church without incident yesterday and church officials felt the "most important step has been taken."

The Church of Our Lady of Lourdes was rocked last week by the excommunication of two women after the beating Nov. 16 of Mrs. Lula B. Ortemond, who teaches one of the integrated religious classes in this pro-segregation area.

A church spokesman said there were fewer Negro students than usual yesterday, but added it was expected since they feared reprisal or intimidation.

The Most Rev. Jules B. Jeanmard, bishop of Lafayette in southwest Louisiana, made the decree of excommunication last week. He lifted it Thursday, saying he had learned that the two women repented their act.

Mrs. Ortemond has filed assault and battery charges against two sisters, Mrs. Etta B. Romero and Mrs. Lota B. Menard, identifying them as her assailants.

Negro Boycott Of Alabama Bus Line Continues Today

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (U.S.)—A boycott which cut Negro patronage of city buses by about 85 per cent yesterday was in force again today and showed signs of continuing even longer.

Police investigated a report by Manager J. H. Bagley of the Montgomery city bus lines that a small-caliber rifle bullet struck the rear of a bus last night in a Negro district.

A hymn-singing Negro throng estimated by police at 5,000 shouted approval last night when spokesmen urged them to continue the boycott in protest to segregated transportation facilities.

The issue was brought to a head by the arrest Thursday of Mrs. Rosa Parks, 42, who refused to move to the rear of a bus. She was fined \$14 yesterday for violating a state law requiring Negroes to sit in the rear of buses. Later she was released in \$100 bond after announcing she would appeal the fine.

The crowd at the mass meeting last night shouted approval of a resolution which said the boycott would continue until bus patrons are no longer "intimidated, embarrassed and coerced."

Negro spokesmen said a "delegation of citizens" is ready to meet

with city and bus line officials in an effort to develop a "satisfactory and equitable" program.

They did not indicate if they might settle for anything short of an outright end to segregation in city buses.

Despite a cold drizzle throughout most of yesterday, thousands of Negroes who normally ride the buses refused to board them. They either stayed home from work, walked or caught rides in jammed Negro taxis.

'Sea Serpent' Washes Ashore

VENICE, Calif. (U.S.)—A marine "what-it" washed ashore yesterday. It is 16 feet long, has a head resembling a snake's, a fin tail, and, when it was alive, perhaps a week ago, must have weighed about 800 pounds.

Old-time mariners and lifeguards say they think it is a sea serpent. "I've lived around the ocean for 18 years," said Norman Bishop, former lifeguard, "and I've never seen anything like this thing, whatever it is."

Another Cold Day Outlook For Most Parts Of U. S.

Another cold day was the outlook for most of the nation today. The coldest weather was in most of the upper Mississippi Valley and the higher elevations of the Rockies.

It was 16 degrees below zero in Fraser, Colo., and -15 at Grantsburg and Wausau, Wis. Temperatures were below freezing from southern New England through eastern Kentucky, across

northern Arkansas into southern New Mexico and northward around most of Nevada and the eastern sections of Oregon and Washington.

It was chilly in much of the Southland with readings in the 40s in most areas except for 50s along the Gulf Coast and near 70 in central and southern Florida.

Snow fell over scattered areas, with heaviest amounts in the West.

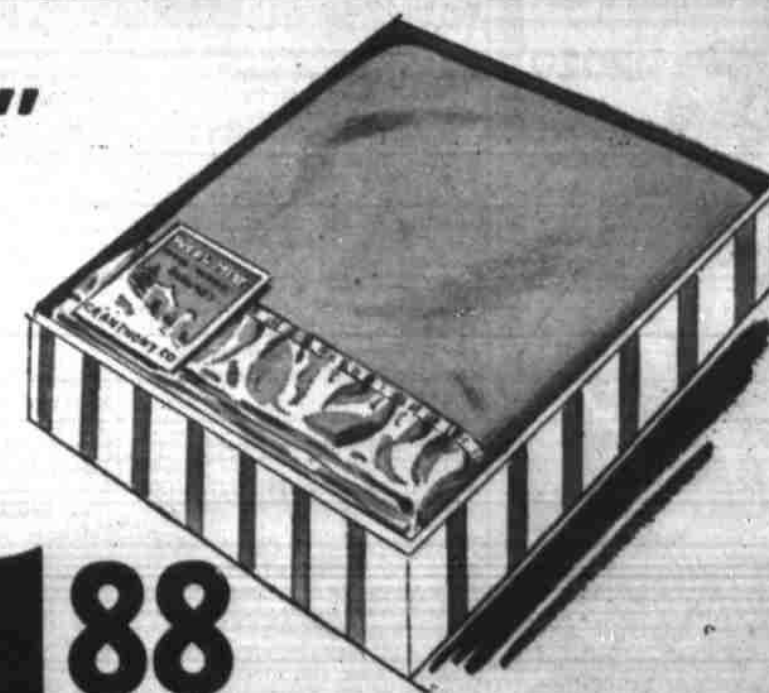

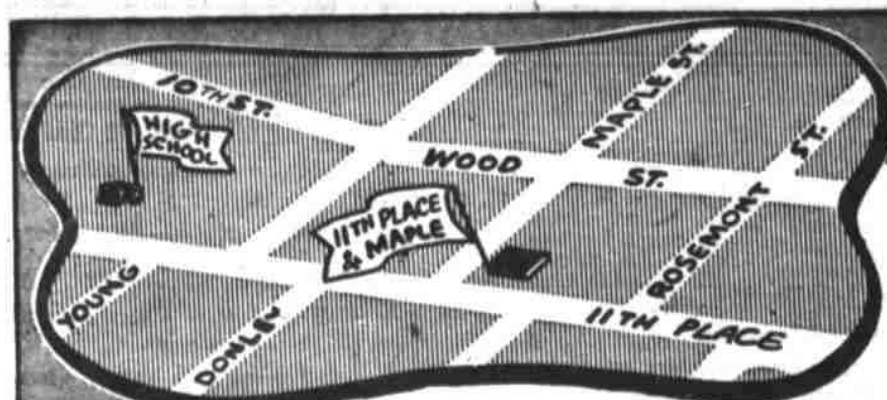

Good Appearance Can Come With Some Study

HOLLYWOOD—Some people insist you have to be born with a fashion sense but singer Jill Corey of CBS-TV's "The Johnny Carson Show" doesn't believe this.
"I used to have terrible taste," Jill told me when I visited her in her studio dressing room. "I liked everything fancy and I wore all the wrong clothes."
I admired Jill's simple wool sheath dress. "I would say that you've improved a lot," I remarked.
"My older sister is one of the top models in New York," Jill told me. "She has taught me a lot about choosing my clothes. She made me realize that you don't have to plan your wardrobe and limit your colors. If you don't have a system, none of your outfits will be in harmony."
"She stressed the importance of simplicity," Jill continued. "She told me to be sure and check myself in a full-length mirror before I went out and see what I could make more simple. We all have a tendency to overdress, I suppose."
"She advised me to change my hair style, too. I used to like a lot

of curl around my face but at her suggestion I cut my hair and I must admit it's more becoming this way. I don't think I'll ever let it grow long again.
"I think every girl would profit by just bringing out her individuality. The only way to do this is by trial and error. I'm always experimenting with myself. I've done this ever since the first time I saw myself on the screen. I wanted to run but I curbed the impulse and staved and made notes instead of all the things I wanted to change. It's quite different seeing yourself from all angles instead of face to face in a mirror."

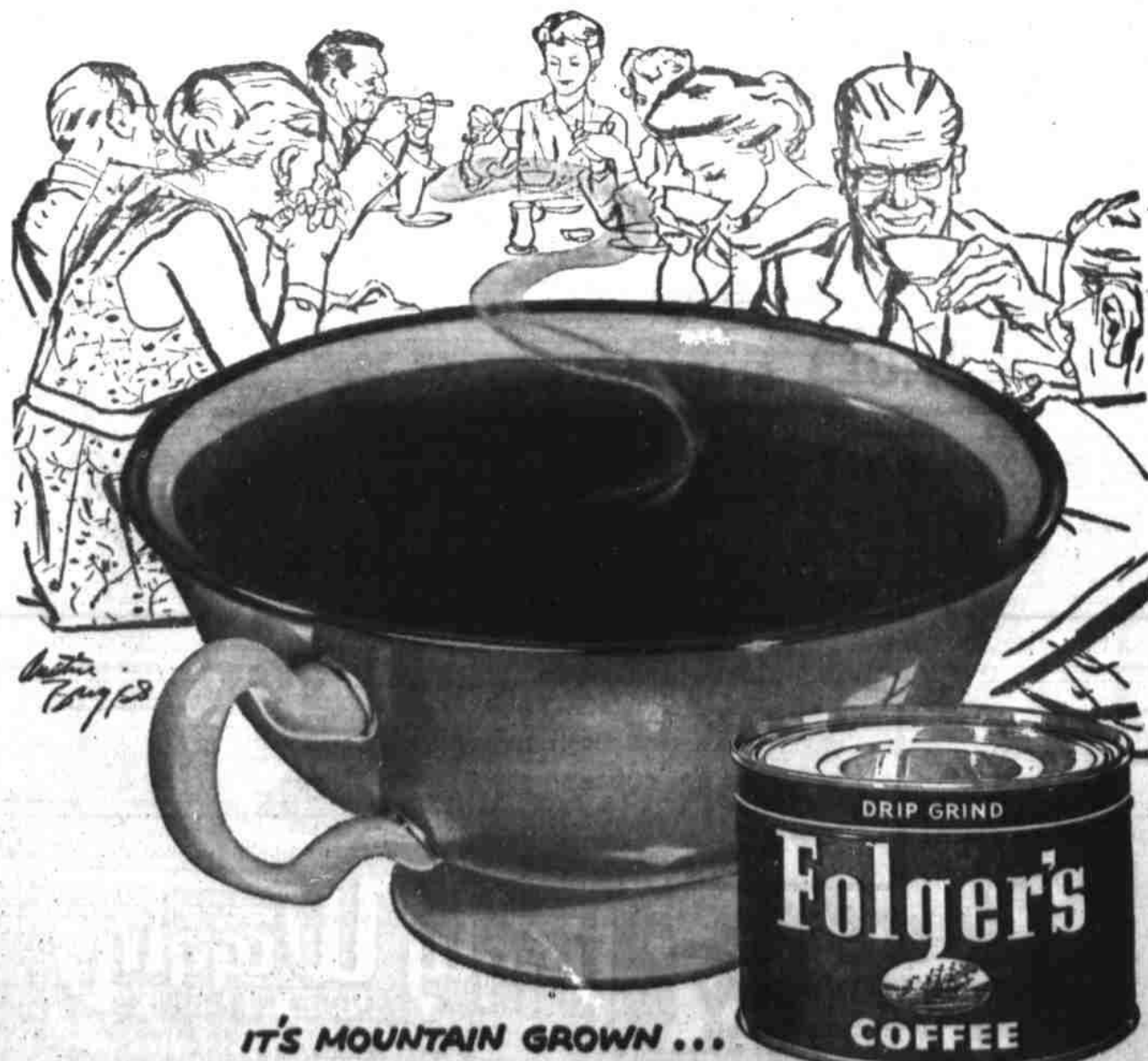

Insurance Firm's 'Honesty' Praised

Some 65 stockholders and charter policyholders heard Leland Martin of Odessa tell how Oil Industries Life Insurance Co. had grown to its present size based on one word—honesty. The occasion was a dinner at the Settle Hotel Monday night.

Martin, regional manager of the company, in recounting a bit of history of the company in its short 15-month history, said that the record was little less than astounding.

B. F. Everett is in charge of the district office here and he handled arrangements for the dinner.

Dan Eddy Expert On Separating Man And Money

Dan Eddy is probably Texas' top expert on separating a rich man from his money, as many learned during the last charity fund drive.

He's certainly the only one who gets thanked for it and every day is asked by more and more rich men to show how it should be done.

Eddy, 34, is a brash, loud, fast-talking Dallas native, grandson of one of the city's early-day saloon keepers.

He's forever climbing into a plane for a flight to Dalhart or Navasota or Athens or some other small city.

When the plane lands he hits the ground running and within a few hours has thrown a shock into every rich or important man in the county.

His message—spoken with the zeal of a crusader and the cunning of a huckster—runs like this:

"You asked me to come here. And I'm here to tell you that this thing is going to work only if you put your heart into it, become a part of it. And you are a part of it."

"All men owe a debt of gratitude to their community, and especially those with wealth, a business position, the leaders. You are the men to whom the people look for leadership."

"You can retire from business but you can't retire from your community."

Then he tells them how to organize a Community Chest or United Fund. He comes back in about two weeks. They're supposed, by that time, to have their organization set up.

Then he tells them how to get the money.

Most of the money, he makes clear, must come from the wealthy business leaders—very often the people he is talking to. Eddy thinks the people don't appreciate these men whose assets are not only in dollars and cents but also in leadership.

There's no charge for Dan's service. He serves in no official capacity when he helps set up a Community Chest or United Fund. Why does he do it?

In the first place, he does have a job. He's a Salvation Army man—state service unit director, state campaign director, public relations director, associate director or disaster relief operations.

Salvation Army is one of the many beneficiaries of Community Chest and United Fund drives.

"And once you have a Community Chest or United Fund," Eddy points out, "your Salvation Army fund-raising costs in that city are over. You no longer need to go back each year with money and manpower to raise funds for the Salvation Army. You've got the very best men in town doing it for you."

But it's more than that. Eddy, who sometimes hurts feeling with his impatient "do-it-now" drive, is thinking of people whose troubles surpass hurt feelings.

As a Salvation Army man, he's seen first-hand the hungry, sick, weary and down-hearted. He was there when rising flood waters forced the poor of Tampico to fight with rats for high ground.

He saw the stunned people of Waco after the big tornado. He saw the mud swept over the homes and bodies of Piedras Negras when Rio Grande waters tumbled into that Mexican border city. He sees the alcoholic down-and-outers on the streets of Dallas, Houston and San Antonio.

"People are our greatest asset," says Eddy. "Help people to help themselves, that's the Salvation Army philosophy. And when it's people involved, you don't worry about which agency gives the help. You just get the job done."

Dan has helped set up Community Chests this year in Dalhart, Dumas, Brownfield, Eastland, Gainesville, Sulphur Springs, Carthage, Athens, Palestine, Comroe, Navasota, El Campo, Del Rio, McKinney and Durant, Okla. Altogether he has helped organize 53 Community Chests in Texas.

Eddy goes to a city on his mission only if the directors of the Chamber of Commerce formally ask him. He demands that much evidence of the sincerity of the project.

Then he goes with a willing heart—and a loud voice.

Ike, Aides Meet On Defense Fund

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP)—President Eisenhower met with top military and financial advisers today for just about final decisions on next year's defense budget.

Secretary of Defense Wilson and Budget Director Rowland Hughes flew here from Washington.

They were accompanied by Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and W. J. McNell, Pentagon comptroller.

Wilson indicated the 1956-57 defense budget is about in final shape but told newsmen when they asked if this was the final meeting on the subject:

"I can't ever be sure of that."

Top officials have said the new defense budget will run about the same as the present spending rate—about \$44 billion dollars a year.

Wilson has said price increases may force it a little higher.

Details, in terms of divisions, air wings and the like as worked out in a succession of top-level meetings, still are subject to the President's approval.

'Natural-Born' Chemist Finds Use For Cotton Waste Product

MEMPHIS, Nov. 26 (AP)—A "natural-born" Memphis chemist has found some very useful jobs for a waste product.

This tar-like substance was the waste left after everything possible had been extracted from the oil. It used to be a thorough nuisance.

For years, big plants had to bury the waste to get it out of the way. It wouldn't float away, couldn't be burned—wouldn't even rot.

Now Joe Dabney, 45, whose chemical know-how is without benefit of formal training, has turned the gum into a roofing material that has withstood 5,000-degree heat and 80-below-zero cold.

Dabney, a stocky, black-haired man, has kept his new process secret and set up a firm to market it. The formula, he said, is known only to three other men.

He "cooked up" his first batch of the compound five years ago in an old lumberyard building at Jacksonville, Fla., with kettles, mixers and tanks.

His creation was a thick liquid which, when sprayed or mopped on and dried, would firmly bond aluminum foil. Using this as the basis for a light, fireproof roof, he sought a fire test from the Navy.

Although dubious, the Navy gambled a thermite bomb—hot enough

to burn through tank armor plate. The experimental roof came through in good shape. Inspectors found the wooden sheath underneath was only scorched.

Soon the one-time waste product was being used in roofing, insulation, as "armor plate" to protect runways from jet blasts, and in interior fireproofing.

It was the Air Force that determined that Dabney's concoction,

which he named "Aluma-Life," also shrugs off intense cold.

In the frigid Arctic, the intense cold was causing roofing materials and caulking compounds on Air Force buildings to crack and flake.

In a cold test chamber at the Air Force equipment laboratory at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dabney says his compound passed every check.

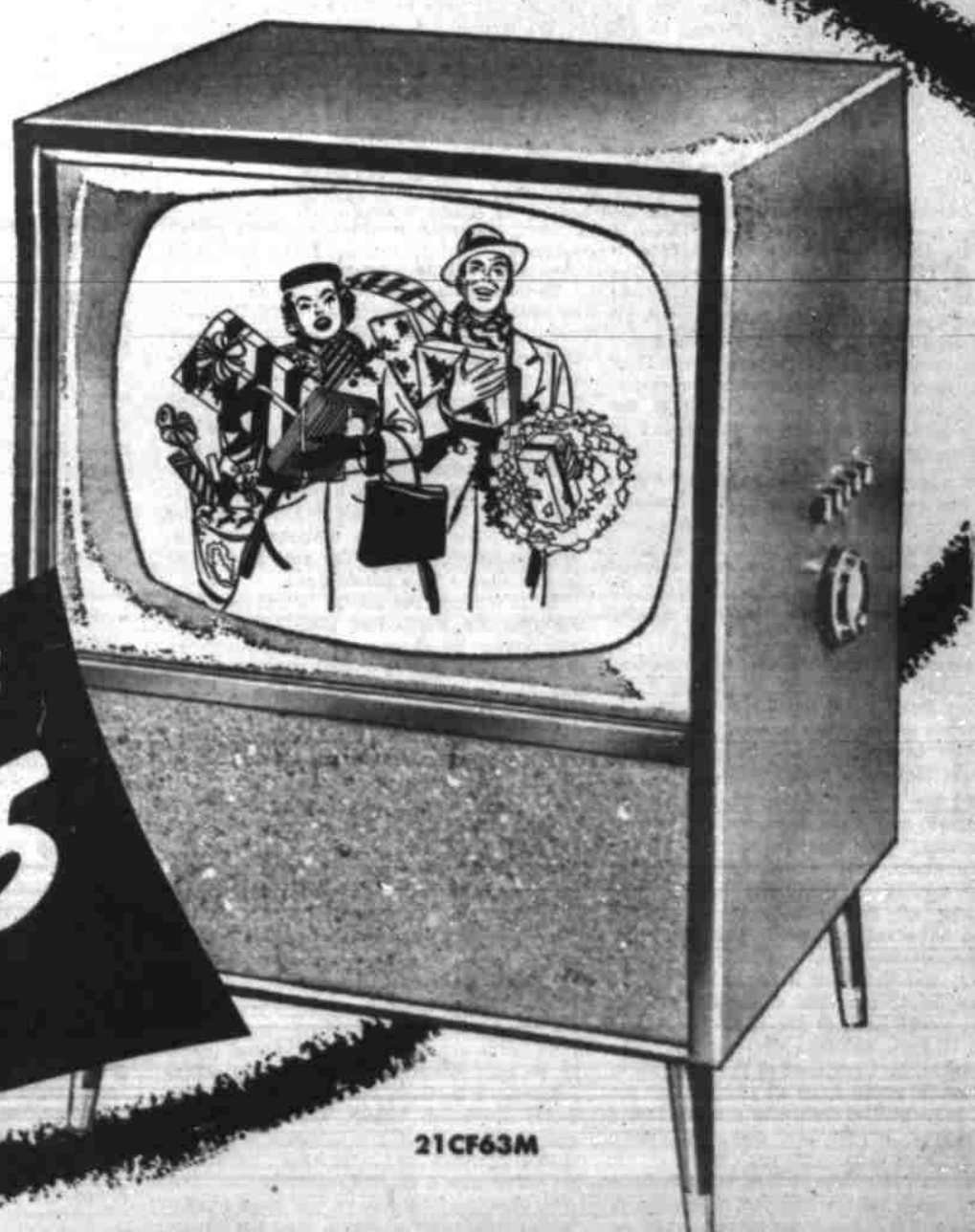

Editorial

Despite Excesses, It Hurts

The provocative speeches of Nikita Khrushchev, who has been laying them in the aisles in India and Burma, are beginning to get under the skin of our State Department.

For one crack made in India the Communist general secretary drew a rebuke signed jointly by the U. S. and Portugal. The Russian had told a huge crowd of applauding Indians, in effect, that India should simply reach out and grab off little Goa, a part of India that has been Portuguese territory for hundreds of years. This naturally went over big with India, which had been making gathering-in gestures at Goa ever since she gained her independence.

All the same, Khrushchev's intemperate speech must have made even Nehru pause, and left a bad taste in the mouths of Burma and other small nations; for it made all too evident that Russia believes in and practices the policy made famous by the gal in the song, "What Lola Wants, Lola Gets."

Thus from the mouth of the bull Bolshevik himself, Russia is being pictured

to the small nations of Asia for exactly what she is — a ruthless, rapacious imperialistic power, with no consideration whatever for any other nation large or small.

The State Department thinks this sort of thing will do Russia more harm than good among Asiatic nations, and while this may be slightly on the optimistic side, it may be right.

But unfortunately it may also make the Asiatics fear Russia more than ever, and thus become putty-like in Russia's hands. The Communists are old hands with the technique of terrorism, and it is just possible that Khrushchev knows exactly what he's doing, and that our State Department's belief that he will be hoist by his own petard is the worst kind of wishful thinking.

As of now, in spite of the vitriol being poured out in Asia by Khrushchev against the United States in particular and the West in general, and perhaps because of it, our cause is being harmed. Many Asiatics have been wanting to hear just what Khrushchev is saying.

Licenses For Dreamers

This is the time of year when credit cards, along with calendars, holiday greetings and similar year-end mementos, begin to arrive in numbers.

A perennial credit card drifted in the other day bearing the signature of an old San Antonio, New Mexico, boy who made good in the hotel business — Conrad H. Hilton, who got his actual start at Cisco. Brother Hilton promises to take care of us anywhere from Istanbul to Los Angeles.

While one seldom has occasion to make use of a credit card, they do come in handy at times; but with most of us, an old dreamer of wide excursions and unrestricted mind's eye exploration, they serve as memory-joggers.

With a pocket full of credit cards, for instance, one may dream all day of far and entrancing places. To riffle through them is itself a fascinating business. Here's a railroad, with connections to all parts of the country, offering to sell

us a ticket and accommodations any old time we say so — and pay for them later. That's the trouble with credit cards — pay day's a-coming. Or if railroads are too slow for your taste, you pick up a card from an airline or two and take the wings of the morning to the uttermost parts of the earth — all on tick.

The gasoline people are old hands at credit-carding, and it is comforting to know you can travel anywhere in the country and have your personal check or signature honored without quibble, and we'd be disappointed and somewhat miffed, no doubt, if one of the companies failed to send us our annual card. What's the matter with them — ain't our credit any good any more?

So, you can get out these cards every once in a while and dream of far places, and luxuriate in thoughts of new scenes, plush hotel suites, fast airplanes, comfortable trains, and thousands of filling stations at your beck and call.

We wouldn't miss them for anything.

The Voting Device On Ford Stock

From one point of view, Henry Ford II and his brothers made a generous gesture in authorizing the Ford Foundation to put voting stock of the Ford Motor Co. on the market. The Fords owned all the voting shares. They, alone, had a say in the management of the company. They were under no legal compulsion to reclassify the stock so that 60 per cent of the voting rights would inhere in buyers of the Foundation's shares.

Nor was this legal gesture necessary to sell the Foundation's stock. No broker's dinner hour these days is safe from an importuning telephone call: "How about putting me on your list for Ford stock?" The offering shapes up as a sell-out in this bullst of all bull markets — vote or no vote.

Some weeks ago, a Ford vice president was asked if the stock would be listed on the New York Stock Exchange. He replied in effect: "We wouldn't want Ford to suffer in any way by comparison with General Motors or Chrysler."

"But the Exchange doesn't list nonvoting stock and Ford Foundation stock is non-voting," was the rejoinder.

"We know, and we're studying that." The upshot of the study was a plan whereby all shares sold to the public would have voting rights. Shares held by the Foundation would continue to be non-voting. And the Ford holdings of 6,480,675 shares, or 12 per cent of the outstanding stock, would have 40 per cent of the vote. Even if Ford holdings declined to 2,700,000 shares, or 5 per cent of the total stock, the family would have 40 per cent of the vote. If its holdings were to slide to 1,500,000 shares, or 2.8 per cent, its voting power would drop to 30 per cent.

Because the public shares were to have voting rights, Keith Funston, president of the New York Stock Exchange, said he would recommend listing to the Board of Governors. Funston was under practical pressure. Were trading in Ford stock to go to the receptive American Stock Ex-

change, Funston would have been under severe criticism from commission-conscious members of his own board.

The American Stock Exchange makes no pretense of maintaining ethical standards on corporate voting. It deals in stocks that have voting rights as non-voting privileges. On the other hand, the New York Stock Exchange for many years has refused to list shares of companies which are controlled by minority stockholders through legal stratagems.

And the Ford plan is a legal stratagem. The voting plan doesn't really alter the power of the Fords. A management controlling 30 per cent of the vote is virtually unbeatable in a proxy fight.

What's more, the device is unnecessary. Suppose the Fords had gone all the way and given all shares an equal vote, the Foundation's shares included. So long as the Ford company remained a money-maker, the Foundation would have no choice but to support the Fords as managers. The Foundation wouldn't want to run an auto company.

Or, suppose only the shares owned by the Ford family and the public were granted votes on a share for share basis. The Fords, with their control of the proxy machinery plus their stock holdings, would be dominant.

Beyond that, the voting device doesn't do justice to the managerial achievements of Ernest T. Breech, chairman, and Henry Ford II, president, of the Ford Motor Co. They have performed a postwar miracle in winning a clear second place in the auto industry. They've rebuilt plant, redesigned the line, reorganized the company, developed young, aggressive managerial aids. Such management needs no voting gimmick to sustain itself in office. Its performance is prodigious.

If, at some future date, the Ford family loses its managerial touch, then the voting device becomes a deadweight, a burden, to investors in the company — to the Fords, themselves, as investors. It would perpetuate poor management in office.

Hollywood Review

Dancer Spurns Russ Show

HOLLYWOOD — Margot Fonteyn, generally acclaimed the world's greatest ballerina, has no great yen to dance in Russia.

Here as the top star with the Sadlers Wells Ballet, Miss Fonteyn indicated she would not join the move of Western cultural attractions to Russia.

"I think it would be rather frightening to perform ballets in the place where they originated and are cherished," she remarked.

But wouldn't that present a challenge? "Perhaps," she laughed. "But I'm not particularly interested in challenges." She has danced in most of the major cities of Europe and North America and has some interesting observations on differences in audiences.

"It's amazing, but the so-called hot-blooded countries are less demonstrative than the Anglo-Saxon countries," she remarked. "I believe the response is due to the amount of ballet they have been exposed to."

"In Italy, for example, the audiences can be very cold. That's because the ballet is in poor shape there. It's odd, because Italy was the center of the ballet a hundred years ago. But now they are more interested in opera."

Audiences in England and the United States react differently, she said, and in some ways she prefers them here.

"In England, they wouldn't think of applauding during a performance," she remarked. "You dance through the whole ballet wondering if they like it. They applaud at the end. But they're fully prepared to stay and clap indefinitely."

"Here, they applaud for everything — when a dancer appears on the stage, during a routine and after it — whenever they see something they like. I must say it's very satisfying to the dancer; it sort of encourages you on. The only time I don't appreciate it is when I'm in a mood ballet like 'Sylphides' where applause would interrupt my thought."

Labor Party May Yet Be Formed

WASHINGTON — Leaders of the newly merged AFL-CIO pool the ideas they will try to form a labor party or capture one of the existing political parties.

Nevertheless, that time may come. The weakest spot in labor's political front—from the standpoint of its ability to use its utmost strength—is that the union leaders cannot order their members how to vote. But the AFL-CIO isn't going to spend all its energies directly in

politics in the years immediately ahead. It will try to organize millions of workers not now in unions. The bigger the AFL-CIO, the more potent its political weight.

Until they get a lot bigger than they are now—and test their power with the two present political powers—the leaders of the AFL-CIO are not likely to try for a labor party.

Nehru Likes Independent Position

NEW DELHI — Just past his sixty-sixth birthday, Prime Minister Nehru, on whom the fate of his country rests to an extraordinary degree, shows himself serenely confident that India has chosen the right course in staying free of the two great power blocs.

In an interview with this reporter he talked frankly of world events, his serious expression broken now and then by a quick and friendly smile.

To the question whether the visit of Russian Premier Bulganin and Communist party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev and the big reception given them here had in any way altered India's foreign policy, Nehru replied:

"Not in any way whatsoever."

"There was a sequence of events which led to this visit. For a year or more I had been asked to visit Moscow. Finally, a date was set and I went there in May. I asked them to come here and so this time was fixed for the return visit."

Nehru is well aware of the interpretation put on the Soviet leader's visit by his critics in the United States. He says that he sees nothing incompatible with his friendship for America in the fact that the Bulganin-Khrushchev team has returned his visit and he adds:

"When I went to the United States I wasn't against anything. I went because I was invited and because I wanted to go."

Nehru revealed that about two months before President Eisenhower's illness, the President had invited India's Prime Minister to come to Washington. There followed an exchange of letters which ended shortly before the President's heart attack.

The President did not entirely close the door to the possibility of such a visit.

"I believe he was really interested," the Prime Minister said, "and then came the tragedy of his illness."

How great a tragedy this was we may know only in the retrospective view of history. But there are some indications of what it has meant to the discontinuity of American foreign policy.

A few days after the President's heart

attack Nehru received a message from Chou En-lai, premier and foreign minister of Communist China, expressing his concern that the President, as a convinced advocate of peace, had been removed from the world scene. This was the unofficial line of the Russians at the last Geneva conference and, while it may be merely an alibi for their refusal to negotiate, there are those with expert knowledge of the Soviet Union who believe it was a factor.

Nehru talked specifically about the Baghdad pact which includes Turkey, Pakistan, Iran, Iraq and Britain in a defensive alliance on Russia's southern rim.

"What the Baghdad pact did was to invite retaliatory action," Nehru said. "It split the Arab states and that seems to me unfortunate."

"It seems to me that the support of the peoples concerned in these countries and their feeling about the arms being supplied from the outside must be considered. Where reactionary dictatorial regimes exist it's quite possible that the people may feel that these arms are meant to subdue them. The stability of such a regime—I shall name no names—must always be uncertain."

Economic and social reform in his own country is as great a preoccupation with Nehru as peace in the world. The two are, of course, for him inseparable goals. One program close to Nehru's heart is to raise by gradual means the pitifully low standards of the three-fourths of the Indian people who live in the villages.

With peace and the hope of achieving reforms in his own country through democratic means so closely intertwined, Nehru is, for the months ahead, obviously seeking to maintain the status quo in Asia and the Middle East. He says he is confident there will be no meeting of the Asian-African powers in Cairo in February or March as had been reported. Such a meeting might inflame present antagonisms. The proposal for a meeting in Cairo was made without prior consultation with four of the five Colombo powers, which were the inviting powers for the Bandung conference of last spring.

Television And Radio

Longer Shows In Offing

NEW YORK — The trend of television programming in 1956 now appears fairly well defined. It will be a year when the program of 90 minutes and longer is commonplace.

This, it seems to me, is a healthy development for both the industry and the viewing public. As far as the industry is concerned big programs — in concept as well as length — are a strong answer to the proponents of pay-se TV. A public that already has a variety of feature-length entertainment on its TV screens is not likely to enjoy the prospect of paying to see unknown quality feature-length entertainment on the same set.

Some observers believe that the networks' bitter opposition to pay-se TV has inspired the trend to bigger programs. The motive is unimportant. What matters is that the public is benefiting with a variety of more imaginative programs, than it saw a year and more ago.

Within the 90-minute format television has demonstrated it can hold both the lazy or I-only-want-to-be-amused audience and the alert or let-me-think-about-this audience. It's demonstrating its holding power weekly with a variety of 90-minute programs that would have been amazing a few years ago.

For Star Jubilee (CBS-TV), in presenting Noel Coward and Mary Martin as the only performers in a 90-minute period, uncovered a huge audience eager to be amused. Edward R. Murrow's See It Now pulls a big audience that wants to think about it. NBC-TV holds these diverse au-

diences in equally diverse 90-minute formats.

Now Robert E. Kintner, president of ABC, has placed his network on record as following the trend begun by NBC and CBS. "It is my guess," he says, "that next season will see many one-and-a-half and two-hour programs in the daytime and nighttime on a regular basis. . . . There is nothing sacred about the half-hour and hour timing of programming."

Great length or size is not necessarily a virtue in any branch of the arts or entertainment. But greater time means greater freedom for experimentation to many of television's first-rate artists. The fact the viewing public has clearly demonstrated it likes and wants more big-size TV programs is a challenge to the industry and its best talents.

Audited Report Shows Herald Circulation At All-Time High

Preliminary figures released by the Audit Bureau of Circulations of Chicago show the net paid circulation of The Herald to be at an all-time high. This reflects a growth of the newspaper along with Big Spring and its area.

The Herald's total net paid circulation for the third quarter of 1955, according to the publishers' statement of Sept. 30, was 9,420 daily and 9,280 Sunday. This represents a gain of 14.4 per cent for daily circulation and 9.08 per cent for Sunday circulation over the same quarter of the preceding year.

The figures were arrived at this week by James R. Kelly, field auditor for the Audit Bureau of Circulations. He is one of the crew of field men for ABC who drop in on

unannounced dates for a thorough inspection of The Herald's circulation records, and the newspaper's net paid circulation figures are according to his findings on a rigid accounting procedure.

ABC is an independent accounting concern of which major newspapers and magazines are members, and do their own auditing to provide information and protection for the advertiser, the reader and the publication. It guarantees circulation figures and accredits the newspaper's figures following the ABC audit.

The penalty for refusing to make circulation records available to ABC auditors — or for failure to follow rules established by ABC as to sales methods and pricing — is suspension from the Bureau.

The Herald, along with other leading newspapers, is glad to have the opportunity to secure a certified appraisal of its circulation figures in a manner calculated to show advertisers just what they are getting for their money.

STATE ALSO WINS CIVIL SUIT

Giles Pleads Guilty To Bribe Charge, Gets 6 Years In Pen

CRYSTAL CITY, Tex. (AP)—Former land commissioner Bascom Giles yesterday was sentenced to six years in prison after pleading guilty to agreeing to accept bribes while head of the state veterans land program.

The sentence will run concurrently with other terms totaling six years assessed after his conviction at Austin and San Antonio on other charges stemming from the aid program for ex-G.I's.

The guilty plea in District Court was to agreeing to accept two bribes of \$36,000 and \$8,000.

Giles still faces trial of another indictment here charging he agreed to take a \$15,000 bribe. Also pending are nine felony indictments at Austin in connection with Giles' administration of the 100-million dollar program.

Under it, the state bought land for resale to veterans at low interest rates on long-term notes.

The guilty plea here was to agreeing to accept bribes from J. Paul Little, Crystal City attorney and using his office and influence to favor Little in land deals involving some 1,400 acres in Dimmitt and Zavala counties.

Little's trial on a charge of offering a bribe is set for March 12, 1956.

Preceding yesterday's guilty

plea, the state won a \$33,000 civil recovery suit based on charges that Giles had accepted bribes totaling \$59,000.

Giles paid \$10,000 to the district court clerk and attorneys said disposition of the third criminal charge against him would be held up pending final settlement of the civil judgment.

The money was the first Giles had paid the state in its effort to recover funds it claims were lost by his using his office to "unjustly enrich himself."

Attorneys gave notice of appeal of the two bribery cases and Giles was freed under \$4,000 bond. He also is appealing his two previous criminal convictions.

To shorten proceedings after the civil suit was disposed of, attorneys for both sides agreed to use the same evidence in the criminal trial.

The state sought to prove that transactions between Giles and Little and others started here Nov. 24, 1953, for deals in which land was bought by the state for resale to veterans.

The state attempted to show that \$59,000 of the money paid for land went to Little, his Zavala County Abstract Co., and to an attorney-trustee in Crookston, Minn. In a deposition from Carl O. Whistler of Crookston, one of the

trustees, he said the former commissioner bought a tract of Minnesota land in Red Lake County for \$82,500. Payments of \$36,000 and \$23,000 were traced to show they coincided with drafts issued by the Zavala County bank and charged to the account of Little's Zavala County Abstract Co.

The \$36,000 was paid in three \$12,000 drafts and others totalling \$15,000, the state alleged.

The defense presented a deposition from Coy B. Henson, Austin real estate dealer.

Libyan Oil Deals Told

HOUSTON (AP)—Subsidiaries of three American oil companies told of agreements yesterday with Libya for oil exploration concessions on about 35 million acres.

The companies are Continental Oil, Ohio Oil and Amerasia. Their wholly-owned subsidiaries are Continental Oil Co. of Libya, Oasis Oil Co. and Amerasia Petroleum Corp. of Libya.

Included in the concessions are over 7 million acres in Tripolitania, 14 million acres in Cyrenaica and 13 million in Fezzan.

Each of the three companies is entitled to participate to the extent of one-third interest in all concessions obtained by any of them or their Libyan subsidiaries.

Mom, Hemmed In By Geology, Eyes College

DALLAS (U)—Mrs. Herbert Stanley is threatening to enter college because she's tired of dusting rocks. If she's going to dust them, she wants to know what she's dusting.

She's a little weary of her husband and five children informing her, when planting shrubs, that she's planting them in "black ash" that is residual soil from Austin chalk which is a cretaceous formation. She wants to find out what they're talking about.

If she carries out her threat, she'll study geology.

Her husband and four of the children are geologists and leave the rock samples around for her to dust. A fifth, Eddie, 14, is a high school and expects to study geology.

Each child, Mrs. Stanley explains, was taken by her husband on hikes when they were small and told about rocks they found. That set their interests toward geology.

Stanley is an independent geologist and "will drill for anything," says Mrs. Stanley. The youngest geologist, Donald, who received his degree last spring, works with his father.

Ann, the only child away from home, is a stratigrapher, or expert on rock strata. She works for the Atlantic Refining Co. in Casper, Wyo.

Peggy is a geologist for Larson and Thomas in Dallas. "I get out in the field during weekends to inspect the drilling," she says.

Herbert Jr., a former Marine, supervises "mud sniffing" for Atlantic Refining. Herbert explains that "this means the chemical logging process to detect hydrocarbon particles in drilling mud or fluid signifying the presence of gas and oil."

"Back in the old days, you actually grabbed a handful of mud and sniffed it," his father explained. "Now they do it with the machine."

All the geologist children got their degrees from the University of Texas. The father is a Stanford graduate of 1917.

Individual Cuts Urged In Income Tax Reductions

WASHINGTON (U)—The Committee for Economic Development said today individual income tax rates should get "first priority" in any tax reduction permitted by a balanced federal budget.

While all income tax rates should be cut next year, the CED said in a tax policy report, "a relatively greater percentage reduction should be made in the middle and upper brackets where extremely high rates are seriously interfering with the incentive to take risks and with the supply and mobility of investment funds."

The CED is a nonprofit economic research and education organization with headquarters in New York.

If the federal budget situation permits, the CED said, there should be some reduction also in corporate income and excise or sales tax rates.

Predicting its tax suggestions on a balanced federal budget, the CED assumed that taxes can safely be cut by three to four billion dollars next year, "although the actual figure may turn out to be more or less than this."

The Budget Bureau estimated last August there would be a \$1,700,000,000 deficit in the current fiscal year which ends next June 30. But last month Budget Director Rowland Hughes said it looks now as though the budget can be balanced both in this and the next fiscal year. However, he declined to predict whether balancing the budget would mean a tax cut.

Mercury Drops To 22 Degrees Today

The mercury dropped 10 degrees below the freezing points here last night, hitting 22 degrees this morning at 6 a. m. But the low was still two degrees above the previous minimum for this date.

In 1903 and also in 1910, the temperature dipped to 20.

The mercury was below the freezing level from 8:30 p. m. Monday until 9:45 this morning. Abilene reported a low of 24 as did Amarillo, while farther east at Fort Worth, the mercury reached 32.

The weather gauge is expected to climb this afternoon and tonight with a high of 60 forecast by the weather bureau. Tonight's low is expected around 35.

HOUSTON (U)—Voters choose five councilmen today in a runoff election, a sequel to the Nov. 19 election in which former Mayor Oscar Holcombe snored under Mayor Roy Hofheinz.

Four councilmen who tried to impeach Hofheinz last summer are opposed by Hofheinz-backed United Citizens Assn. candidates. A former councilman, George Marquette, is running as an independent against a UCA candidate, Le-

roy Williams, president of the AFL State Federation of Labor.

Hofheinz charged the Holcombe machine has started meeting secretly with Oscar and has agreed to fire (Jack) Heard as police chief.

Wagner, Legend In Baseball, Death Victim

PITTSBURGH (U)—John (Honus) Wagner, 81, all-time great shortstop who became a legend in his lifetime, died in his sleep today.

Members of the family were at the bedside when he passed away at his suburban Carnegie home, only a few miles from Forbes Field, where he achieved lasting fame with the Pittsburgh Pirates.

"He just slipped away," a member of the family said.

Wagner had been in poor health several years. Two months ago he slipped and fell in his home. He had been bedfast since and went into a coma about 10 days ago.

The family said his death was the result of complications from the infirmities of old age.

Wagner, sometimes called the greatest player in baseball history, was a handy-legged barrel-chested Dutchman. He finished a 21-year major league career in 1917 with a lifetime batting average of .329. His final public appearance was last April 30 at Schenley Park, outside Forbes Field, for the unveiling of a bronze statue in his memory. All he could say, as he wiped a tear from his cheek, was: "How about that!"

That was a typical remark. Honus would brush aside praise for his records. And those records are legendary. They go like this:

He played more games than any other major leaguer in history—2,785. He had the most times at bat—10,427. He made the most total hits—3,490. He made the most one-base hits—2,431, the most doubles—648, the most triples—250. He batted 300 or better for 13 consecutive years and led the National League in hitting for eight years.

He stole six bases in a World Series—another record.

Wagner was one of the first players elected to Baseball's Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N.Y.

He was a coal miner at 12 and later he joined an older brother in the barbering business.

He began his baseball career when another brother, Al Wagner, got him an offer of \$35 monthly to play for a Steubenville, Ohio, ball club.

After his retirement as a player, Wagner operated a sporting goods store in Pittsburgh for several years. In the '30s he returned to the Pirates as a coach and served until the club put him on pension in the winter of 1951.

San Francisco Again Tops In AP Basketball Poll

Free-wheeling San Francisco, bidding for a second straight NCAA basketball championship after soaring out of virtual obscurity a year ago, gained an overwhelming vote of confidence today from the nation's sports writers and broadcasters.

The Dons, first in the Associated Press preseason poll, were again rated the nation's No. 1 team.

They won both their games last week and stretched their winning streak to 28.

San Francisco's 43 first-place votes gave them almost a 500-point edge over second-place Kentucky. The Dons collected 1,023 points, figured on a basis of 10 for first, 9 for second, etc. Kentucky pulled in 847, North Carolina State 550.

Kentucky, with a 1-0 record, and N. C. State, with a 2-0 mark, each gained seven first-place votes.

The defending Big Ten champ and 1-0 to date, pulled 10 first-place votes, but fell down in the other listings to finish fourth, just two points behind the Wolf-pack.

Utah, Alabama, Dayton, Illinois, Duquesne and Brigham Young round out the top 10. Only the Illinois have yet to make a debut and



Sam Boyd Gets 3-Year Pact

WACO, Tex. (U)—Sam Boyd, who said "I'm the luckiest son-of-a-gun that ever lived to get this job," took over as head football coach of Baylor University, his alma mater, today.

He succeeded George Sauer, who retired from coaching but will continue as athletic director. Boyd was given a three-year contract at an undisclosed salary.

In a move so sudden it left Boyd virtually speechless, the Athletic Committee of the university yesterday voted unanimously to elevate Boyd from end coach to head coach and to meet Sauer's request that he be relieved of part of his dual job as coach and athletic director.

Dr. W. R. White, president of Baylor, said Sauer made the request prior to the football game with Southern Methodist Nov. 19. But it had been a well-guarded secret.

Boyd, 41, was a star end on Baylor teams of 1936, 1937 and 1938, and the passing combination of Billy Patterson to Sam Boyd wrote bright history in Golden Bear gridiron annals. In 1938 he caught 40 passes from Patterson.

He became Baylor freshman coach in 1950 and in four years compiled a record of 16 victories in 20 games, having an undefeated team in 1953.

Sauer, who has a five-year contract starting next year, was coach of Baylor for six seasons, showing a record of 38 victories, 19 defeats and 3 ties.

Hartack Set Down At Florida Track

MIAMI, Fla. (U)—The glitter was gone from Tropical Park today as Willie Hartack began an enforced vacation that may last into the new year.

Willie's sensational saddlework was a big attraction during the first seven days of the 43-day Tropical Park meeting when he rode 18 winners, 11 seconds and 5 thirds. No other jockey approached that record.

The performance sent Hartack's total winners for the year to 404 and made him the second rider in American turf history to crack the 400 mark. Willie Shoemaker did it in 1953 with 495.

Tropical Park stewards joined Hartack with a 10-day suspension effective today for allowing his mount to drift wide during the sixth race Friday. The young rider—said it is uncertain when he will return to the saddle.

JOHNNY HICKMAN, Leveillard football coach:

Sugar Ray Boasts Mental Edge In Olson Encounter

CHICAGO (U)—Sugar Ray Robinson, the 35-year-old challenger, may be the underdog, but he has some psychological advantage in his middleweight title bout with champion Carl (Bobo) Olson Friday night.

Youth prevails for Olson, who has an eight-year age edge at 27, a factor making him a 3-1 favorite.

Yet Robinson approaches the fight knowing he twice whipped the balding underdog from San Francisco and also that his domestic scene is tranquil.

Olson has been training for his fourth title defense with his wife seeking a divorce, certainly a disturbing circumstance although the stoical Bobo doesn't know it. Robinson is here with his wife and 6-year-old son.

Furthermore, Olson still has to convince a lot of experts that Archie Moore didn't hurt more than his jaw with a third-round knock-out in Olson's abortive attempt to capture the 175-pound crown.

Olson has had two 10-round victories over a pair of journeymen pros, Jimmy Martinez and Joey Giambra, since that blasting by Moore. Bobo looked anything but impressive against Giambra, taking a close decision.

Olson's loss to Moore at New York last June 22 was only the second time in his career he has been knocked out. The other time was by Sugar Ray, who halted Bobo in the 12th round of their first meeting at Philadelphia Oct. 28, 1950.

Blake Van Leer And Governor Are At Odds

ATLANTA (U)—The governor of Georgia and the president of Georgia Tech were at odds today after a decision by Georgia's Board of Regents to permit Tech to play Pittsburgh in the Sugar Bowl.

Pitt has a Negro player on its squad.

The office of Gov. Marvin Griffin charged President Blake Van Leer of Tech failed to consult the governor before accepting the Sugar Bowl bid for Jan. 2.

Ben Wiggins, executive secretary to Griffin, also said the governor felt Van Leer failed "properly" to handle students who staged a riot early Saturday in protest against Griffin's request that Tech be pulled from the Sugar Bowl.

Van Leer replied that he had informed Griffin Nov. 26 that Tech intended to accept a Sugar Bowl invitation if it was offered. He declared the governor said that was "fine."

Concerning the student demonstration, Van Leer said: "I suppose I get paid for being the goat on things like that."

The Tech president promised to investigate the demonstration and expressed "deep regret" at the action of Tech students who participated.

The verbal tiff came only a few hours after the Board of Regents yesterday rejected the governor's request to remove Tech from the Sugar Bowl on the racial issue.

The board at the same time set up a racial policy for athletic teams that are members of the university system of Georgia. It provided:

1. That in out-of-state games Tech, Georgia and other units of the university system can play racially mixed teams in those states which permit integration. In states where laws require segregation, Georgia teams will play on a segregated basis.
2. That in the state of Georgia itself there will be no mixed teams or mixed audiences.
3. That "no contract or agreement shall be entered into for an athletic contest in any state where the circumstances under which it is fulfilled are repugnant to the laws, customs and traditions of the host state."

Howard County Cotton Men To Vote Tuesday On Quotas

Cotton growers of the county will go to three voting boxes next Tuesday to vote either to continue marketing quotas on the 1955 cotton crop or not. The vote is sponsored by the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation office.

The three voting boxes will be the ASC office in the court house, the Planters' Gin at Knott, and the Planters' Gin at Luther.

Marketing quotas cannot be continued in effect without the approval of at least two-thirds of the cotton growers voting in the referendum. If the quotas are approved, price support at a level of between 75 and 90 per cent of parity for the '56 crop.

But if the quotas are disapproved, cotton acreage allotments without marketing quotas will remain in effect, but price support to eligible growers will be limited to 50 per cent of parity.

Letters notifying the cotton farmers of the election are now being sent, setting out the possibilities of the vote and also urging the farmers to vote. Voting hours next Tuesday are from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m.

Any farmer growing cotton in the county during the past season is eligible to take part in the vote. In addition to mailing letters urging

Girls Face Grand Jury In Strangling

AKRON, Ohio (U)—Over the objections of a weeping step-mother, Juvenile Court Judge Russell W. Thomas yesterday bound five teenage girls to the grand jury in the strangulation of a matron at the Summit County Detention Home.

The woman was the stepmother of 15-year-old Muri Cain, one of the five girls charged with first-degree murder by Prosecutor Alva J. Russell. Court attaches said Judge Thomas had her removed from his court after she became hysterical. Sending the case to the grand jury means the girls will be tried as adults and could be sentenced to death if convicted unless a jury recommends mercy.

Judge Thomas' alternative was to hear the case in Juvenile Court, which can try only a general delinquency charge.

The girls overpowered Mrs. Eula Bonham, 59, last Nov. 27, bound her and stuffed an ammonia-soaked rag in her mouth in an escape from the detention home.

Three of the girls later surrendered and two were captured. One of the defendants, Shirley Shingler, 14, is the youngest person ever bound to a grand jury for murder in Ohio, Prosecutor Russell said.

The other defendants are Ruth Beichler, 17, Margaret Nicholson, 15, and Mrs. Zelda De Cost, 16.

Noted Actor In Critical Condition

HOLLYWOOD (U)—Buster Keaton, 60, the comedian with the deadpan expression, lay in critical condition today in a veterans' hospital, suffering from a gastro-intestinal ailment.

He has been hospitalized since last Saturday. A hospital official said a hemorrhage had been stopped but Keaton has been in a coma part of the time.

Born in Piqua, Kan., the comedian went into vaudeville and came to Hollywood in 1917, rising to stardom in the silent movies. In recent years he has been a guest star on many television shows.



Uncle Ray: China's Population Endangers Future

Among the nations of the world, China ranks first in population. Figures made public the past year placed the number of people at 601 million.

That figure may be a bit high, but it seems safe to state that China has at least two and a half times as many people as Russia, and three and a half times as many as the United States of America.

Q. What about the area of China? A. Counting Tibet and Manchuria as parts of China, the area is about the same as that of Canada. Most of the people in China live in the section which used to go under the name of China Proper.

Q. Which are the four largest cities in China? A. Shanghai, Peking (or Peiping), Tientsin and Chungking. Canton, Wuhan and Nanking are other very large cities.

Q. Is it true that there are so many Chinese that they could make a circle around the earth? A. Yes. Using the latest population figures, it appears that the Chinese — each a yard behind the one in front — would make a line 340 thousand miles long. This line would stretch around the earth 13 times at the Equator!

On another plan, the Chinese might be ranged in 46 million rows, one yard apart, with 13 persons in each row. If these people could use a solid bridge to march around the globe at the Equator, the procession would be continuous.

Yes, China has many people — too many. If the population keeps growing, the people will burst the limits of their national boundaries.

Q. What are the chief deserts of Asia? A. The Arabian Desert, the Gobi, Takla Makan, Kizil Kum, Kara Kum and the Dasht-i-Lut.

The Arabian Desert has parts with special names, including the



Scene in Gobi.

Red Desert, the Syrian Desert and the Dahna. The Gobi covers the greater part of Mongolia, and Kara Kum is the "Desert of Black Sand."
