## Four West Texas Areas Draw Probes

Four West Texas counties have drawn sites for exploratory tests.

American Quasar Petroleum Co. intends to drill No. 1 J. H. Healey as a 21,500-foot searcher in Ward, nine miles northeast of Barstow.

Drill site is 660 feet north of southwest corner of section 31, block 18, ULS, thence 660 feet west to location in D. T. Johnson survey 45, three miles northeast of Fusselman gas production in the Quito multi-pay field.

**Gaines Explorer**

Discovery Oil Corp., Houston, will drill No. 1 Jones Heirs, et al, an 11,350-foot venture in northwest Gaines, one location southeast of the depleted opener of the Jones Ranch, South (Devonian) oil field.

It spots 1,535 feet from north and 1,225 feet from east lines of section 10, block A-7, PSL survey, eight miles west of Denver City.

The Jones Ranch, South opener, Forest Oil Corp. No. 1-A E. H. Jones was completed April 4, 1963, to pump 221 barrels of 41.9-gravity oil daily, through perforations at 11,263-11,273 feet.

**Terrell Project**

The Terrell County wildcat is Coastal States Gas Producing Co. No. 1-A G. K. Mitchell, a scheduled 10,500-foot test, 23 miles southwest of Sheffield.

It spots two miles west of the K-M (Ellenburger) gas field and 2 1/2 miles southwest of the Little Canyon (10,000 Strawn) gas area.

Location is 1,380 feet from north and 2,120 feet from east lines of section 29, block 1, CSD&RGNG survey.

It also is 1 1/2 miles southwest of C&K Petroleum Co. No. 1 G. K. Mitchell, which flowed gas at the rate of 5.2 million cubic feet per day, when drilling reached 9,205 feet. It is now drilling below 8,900 feet in shale in a sidetracked hole.

**Crosby Try**

Noel Swain Jr., Lubbock, will attempt to re-open the Ha-Ra (Clearlick) pool of Crosby County, with the re-entry and cleaning out to 4,385 feet, at No. 1 Naomi Pierce, a former producer in the field, seven miles south of Lorenzo.

Location is 660 feet from south and west lines of section 1051, block 1, H&OB survey.

The field, originally opened in 1957, at one time had two wells.

## Two Eddy Strikes Assure Production

A Morrow discovery has been assured in Eddy County, N.M., and the opening of Strawn gas pay and extension of Morrow pay was assured in an Eddy field.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1-A Malaga, Morrow gas prospect, four miles northeast of a recent Morrow discovery, flowed gas at the estimated, daily rate of 1.9 million cubic feet daily, for 24 hours.

Flow was through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations at 12,310-12,318 feet and 12,652-12,658 feet, natural. Tubing pressure was 900 pounds. Testing continued.

Drilled to 13,170 feet, and plugged back to 13,062 feet, it has 5 1/2-inch casing set on bottom.

# Inflation Continues Unabated

## Food, Fuel Costs Cited In Increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — The pace of inflation quickened in February with food and fuel prices pushing the cost of living up 1.3 per cent, the second biggest monthly jump since 1951, the government said today.

The Labor Department said last month's rise sent consumer prices 10 per cent

marked the first time since 1948 that the United States experienced double figure inflation.

It was the highest 12-month increase in the cost of living since consumer prices rose by 10.2 per cent in the 12 months ending January 1948.

Nearly half the February increase was attributed to higher food prices with the price of beef raising 7.5 per cent, the sharpest jump since a 9.6 per cent increase in June 1947. Gasoline and other energy items were responsible for about a fifth of last month's increase in prices.

The Consumer Price Index climbed last month to 141.5 of its 1967 average, meaning that it cost consumers \$141.50 to buy the same amount of retail goods and services that \$100 bought in 1967.

While consumer prices continued their sharp rise, real spendable earnings of workers dropped another six-tenths of one per cent in February and were down 4.5 per cent from a year ago. This was the largest decline over a year since the government began keeping that statistic in 1964.

The February price report showed inflation holding a firm grip across the economy. Food prices rose 2.5 per cent; non-food commodities, 1 per cent, and services seven-tenths of 1 per cent.

The Nixon administration has said it expects inflation to continue its sharp pace throughout the first half of the year before beginning to ease during the final six months. Director John T. Dunlop of the Cost of Living Council said Wednesday that February's surge in food prices would be followed by more (See INFLATION Page 2A)

## Rassman Called 'Super Citizen'

Emil C. Rassman, prominent Midland attorney, civic leader and president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, today noon was termed a "super citizen" at an all-civic luncheon given in his honor in the American Legion Hall.

The luncheon, attended by more than 200 persons from Midland and other cities across the state, highlighted an "Emil Rassman Day" observance pro-

claimed by Midland Mayor Ernest Angelo Jr.

The function was sponsored by the Midland Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with the Midland Downtown Lions and Rotary clubs, which met jointly for the occasion. Rotary President John Tyler presided, and W. H. "Bill" Collyns, Reporter-Telegram editor and vice president of the West Texas Chamber, was master of ceremonies. Frank Marlow is the Lions Club president.

Rassman, in addition to his West Texas C. of C. assignment also is serving as president of the Texas State Chamber of Commerce; member of the Board of Regents of Texas State Senior Colleges; director State Bar of Texas; chairman of the Board of Executors of the Permian Basin Petroleum Museum, Library and Hall of Fame, and director and former president of the Midland County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

He is a trustee of Stratford College; a former member of the Board of Education of the Midland Independent School District; a former director of the Midland Chamber of Commerce; former Jaycee member and officer; past president of Midland Optimist Club; former chairman of United Fund; a past president of the Midland County Bar Association; former executive committee member of Buffalo Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America; a 32nd degree Mason and former president of the Midland Scottish Rite Association.

A Midland resident since 1948, he was selected as Midland's "Outstanding Young Man" of 1951. Later that year, he was named by Texas Jaycees as one of Texas' "Five Outstanding Young Men."

## Man Charged In Attempt To Kidnap Princess Anne

LONDON (AP) — Ian Ball, a 26-year-old unemployed Englishman, was brought into court today and charged with attempted murder during an attempt to kidnap Princess Anne from her car in the heart of London Wednesday night.

Ball, lean-faced and bearded, stood stiffly in the dock at the Bow Street Magistrate's court, handcuffed to two detectives. He spoke only once during his 60-second appearance, saying in a London accent: "I want to apply for legal aid."

The court ordered him held for another hearing on March 26 on the charge of attempting to murder Princess Anne's personal bodyguard, Inspector James Beaton.

Beaton was one of four persons wounded as the would-be kidnaper fired repeatedly at the royal limousine. The others were Anne's chauffeur and a policeman and a passing journalist who tried to intervene. Beaton and the policeman were

reported in serious condition.

The 23-year-old princess and her husband of five months, Capt. Mark Phillips, were not hurt. But police experts said the holes left by one of the bullets fired into the car indicated it passed between them, missing them by inches.

A police informant said it was believed 11 shots were fired by the assailant. Experts were studying two revolvers found at the scene. They said five shots had been fired from one and six from the other. Authorities said earlier only six shots were fired.

Police also found in the white Ford that Ball rented for the evening a typewritten ransom demand addressed to Queen Elizabeth II, Anne's mother, along with three pairs of handcuffs, a driver's license and envelopes addressed to two companies.

## Kissinger Doesn't Expect Arabs To Reimpose Embargo

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger today said he does not expect the Arabs to reimpose their oil embargo against the United States and that he does not hold the Soviet Union responsible for the outbreaks of fighting between Israel and Syria in the Golan Heights.

At a news conference in advance of a trip to Moscow, Kissinger said, "Both of us have an obligation to contribute to peace and both of us are ex-

changing ideas on this subject."

Most of the Arab oil countries announced last Monday in Vienna that they would lift the embargo against shipments that they had imposed during the Middle East War because of U.S. support for Israel.

Kissinger said it was his understanding that the embargo could be reimposed only by unanimous vote and that he did not consider such a reversal likely. Arab oil ministers are scheduled to meet in Cairo on June 1 to review the situation.

## LATE NEWS FLASHES

MORRILTON, Ark. (AP) — Three persons were jailed today after being arrested in the alleged abduction of a Texas prison parolee. The parolee, 52-year-old Carroll Spillers, was in a Little Rock hospital in fair condition with two bullet wounds in the head and one in the stomach.

STOCKHOLM (AP) — Swedish police say a French-speaking gunman broke into the Belgian embassy in Stockholm today and took a female employe hostage. An ambulance was sent to the embassy in downtown Stockholm. But it is not yet known if anybody has been hurt. Police said there also is a possibility that the man has a bomb.

# Storms Roam Across Texas

Damaging tornadoes and wild thunderstorms marked the arrival of spring right on schedule in parts of East and far West Texas during the night, but you had to look at the calendar to tell it wasn't really winter over the north half of the state today.

A sharp chill reached deep into the state. There were snow flurries in the Panhandle-Plains sector and freezing weather reached as far south as Abilene behind a cold front which was shoving into the Lower Rio Grande Valley by early this morning.

Midland has a slight chance for more rain this afternoon, tonight and Friday, according to the National Weather Service at Midland Air Terminal.

Chance of rain both days stands at 20 per cent. Heavy rains pelted parts of Midland Wednesday, bringing up to 4 inch downtown and 3 inch in North Midland. The National Weather Service recorded an official 1.4 inch during the day Wednesday, bringing the March total here to 8 inch and the total for the year to date to one inch.

Cold weather will continue for the area today and tonight, with a high this afternoon in the middle to upper 40s and an overnight low near freezing. Friday won't be quite so cold, with a high in the middle 60s.

Skies will be partly cloudy both days. Winds will be southeasterly 5 to 15 miles per hour. One of the twisters damaged several homes and felled trees on top of cars in the west part of Beaumont, but authorities said there were no injuries.

"We suddenly saw sparks flying," said Beaumont policeman Lynn Snowden. "It looked like

transformers blowing up around us and behind us. The wind started coming up and wood and tin started to fly over us."

"The (patrol) car blew sideways a couple of times. You started wondering what you did wrong lately. Everything was taking place 10 to 15 feet above the ground and it lasted for a minute."

Snowden said he learned later the sparks came from static electricity generated amid the tornado.

State police reported another twister hit ground seven miles north of Lufkin but there was

no word of injuries or damage. Truckee Mike Owens said the wind knocked his vehicle off the road near Zavalla but he escaped harm.

Accounts of still other tornadoes, none apparently causing any serious damage, came from San Augustine, Pineland, near Nacogdoches and between Center and Tenaha. They dipped down while a tornado was in watch for a sector 120 miles wide centering on a line from northwest of San Antonio to just east of Lufkin, the Associated Press reported.

Light snow—not enough to whiten the ground—fell from

around Lubbock into New Mexico this morning, and occasional flurries appeared late Wednesday near Amarillo, Dalhart and other points in the Panhandle.

Rain was mixed with the snowflakes in part of the Lubbock area, and it was drizzly at Wink. Scattered showers fell in the Abilene vicinity, where some of the rain froze as it hit the ground, and moved on toward the east near Mineral Wells.

In a usually dry part of far West Texas there also were thunderstorms with small hail at Presidio and between Alpine and Marathon during the night.

## Texas Politicians Beneficiaries Of Dairy Co-op Contributions

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Texas politicians have been beneficiaries of dairy contributions which came from corporate funds of a milk cooperative, according to a special report quoting a co-op lobbyist.

Federal law prohibits political contributions from corporations.

The so-called Wright Report, which was commissioned by the board of directors of Associated Milk Producers, Inc., lists six contributions which lobbyist Bob Lilly said he made in 1968 to Texas candidates.

Lilly made a number of political contributions by checks from personal bank accounts."

Although the report does not say the contributions were illegal, it describes a complicated arrangement by which Lilly was reimbursed out of his co-op's corporate account for the contributions.

The 1968 contributions which appear to be illegal co-op contributions funneled through Lilly's bank account were:

- Jan. 25, \$500, John White campaign fund.
- March 18, \$800, Mutscher speaker campaign.
- June 14, \$500, Mutscher campaign fund.
- Sept. 23, \$1,000, Crawford C. Martin campaign.
- Sept. 19, Orval Stater, Bob Boydston for insecticides.

trustee, \$100 for Mutscher appreciation dinner.

—Oct. 3, \$2,000, Graham Purcell campaign fund.

White, Texas agriculture commissioner, and the late Crawford Martin, who was then Texas attorney general, filed campaign reports with the Texas secretary of State in 1968, but the reports do not list any contributions which Lilly described.

Former State Rep. Gus Mutscher was unopposed in 1968 and was not required to file such a report.

White, longtime agriculture commissioner who ran unopposed in 1968, said that if Lilly made a contribution from co-op (See MILK MONEY Page 2A)

# Minimum Wage Bill Okayed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House has passed legislation raising the minimum wage from \$1.60 an hour to \$2 this year for most workers covered and to \$2.30 for all by 1978.

The bill, approved Wednesday 375 to 37, also would increase by 7 million to 56.5 million the number of workers covered by the minimum wage laws.

The bill is a modified version of one President Nixon vetoed last year. However, he is expected to sign this one if it is finally approved after adjustment with a similar Senate-passed measure, although it does not meet all of his earlier objections.

For most workers covered by the minimum wage, the minimum would increase to \$2 this year and then in two steps to \$2.30 in 1978.

Other nonagricultural workers brought under coverage in recent years would have a \$1.90 minimum this year, reaching \$2.30 in 1977, while covered agricultural workers would have a \$1.60 minimum in 1974 and reach \$2.30 in 1978.

Coverage would be extended to some 5 million federal, state and local government employees; to domestic service employees and some categories of employees of chain stores.

Overtime provisions would be extended to 9.5 million persons, including government employees other than police and firemen.

The bill does not contain an across-the-board lower minimum wage for young persons, one of the provisions sought by the administration. However, it does permit full-time students to be employed part-time — not more than 20 hours a week — at \$1.60 an hour subject to regulations intended to assure that they do not displace adult workers.

# GM Cancels Plans For Shutdowns

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors has canceled plans for one-week shutdowns at seven plants, citing a "brightening" sales outlook following its second worst sales period of the year.

GM Chairman Richard C. Gerstenberg, announcing the change in plans Wednesday, affirmed the auto giant's optimism that car sales would pick up now that the Arab oil embargo has ended.

The action will keep 27,000 workers on the job. Some had been scheduled for one-week furloughs Monday, others for one-week layoffs starting April 1. Thousands of other GM workers are on indefinite layoff and thousands still face temporary layoffs in the next few weeks, the company said.

"We are beginning to see increasing evidence that our business is getting better," Gerstenberg said.

He said GM dealers are reporting increased interest in new cars and noted that used car wholesale prices had firmed. He called that "a first step to improved new car sales."

Gerstenberg offered no figures to indicate an end to the 37 per cent sales decline which has plagued GM this year.

GM, with 39,500 workers now on one-week layoffs because of plant shutdowns, still will close eight plants and idle 30,200 workers next week. Five other plants employing 17,600 are due for week-long closures starting April 1.

Some 65,000 hourly employees representing 15 per cent of GM's total U.S. workforce of 220,000 are on indefinite layoff.

Gerstenberg said GM's current sales outlook indicates that virtually all workers temporarily idled this month will be back on the jobs by mid-April.

Ford and Chrysler, which together have more than 15,000 workers on temporary layoffs this week and plan to idle 16,200 more at six plants next week, had no immediate reaction to GM's announcement.

Industrywide, sales are down 27 per cent from 1973 levels.

GM, more dependent on large car sales than other domestic makers, has been hit particularly hard by the market swing to smaller automobiles.

GM facilities affected by the shutdown cancellations are at Tarrytown, N.Y.; Buick assembly and Fisher body plants in Flint, Mich.; Oldsmobile assembly and Fisher plants in Lansing, Mich.; and assembly plants in Arlington, Tex., and Framingham, Mass. All assembly big cars. The Tarrytown plant was to have closed next week. The others were set for closure the following week.

# Medicare Bill's Co-Author Dies

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP) — Former congressman Cecil R. King, 76, a veteran Democratic legislator whose greatest achievement was co-authoring the Medicare Bill, died Sunday of a stroke, a family spokesman said Wednesday. He was elected to Congress 13 times from the 17th District of California, retiring in 1968.

## Chicken Curry In Pineapple Shells

Melt: 1/4 cup shortening  
Add: 3 small chopped onions  
1 clove garlic, minced  
1 stalk celery  
1 tart apple, sliced  
Cook for 8 minutes, occasionally stirring. Stir in: 1/2 cup flour  
1/4 teaspoon curry powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
Cook for 3 minutes, stirring. Add 1 bay leaf. Gradually add 2 cups chicken stock. Stir until sauce thickens. Cook for 30 minutes longer over low heat.

Add: 1/2 cup cooked chicken  
1/4 cup light cream  
1/2 cup pineapples (or canned crushed, if fresh is not available)  
Cool. Cut 3 small pineapples in half lengthwise. Cut out fruit, leaving 1/4 inch thick shell. Fill shells with mixture. Top with shredded coconut.

When ready to serve, arrange on baking dish and bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes or until heated thoroughly. Makes 6 servings.

## Bell-Law-Gal-Pen Chicken With Water Chestnuts and Pineapple

4 pound chicken  
Boil in water to cover with bouquet garni of celery, onion, bay leaf, etc. Bone chicken, shred and save stock. Remove fat, if any.

In a pre-heated frying pan, add peanut oil, water chestnuts and pineapple cut in chunks. Brown, then add stock and soy sauce. Thicken with cornstarch. Pour over shredded chicken in casserole, blend, leave in a moderate oven. If sauce thickens

### Vinyls In Washer Can Prove Tricky

DEAR POLLY — Our bed headboard is covered with a rayon velvet fabric. My husband accidentally laid his wet hair against it which left a dull smeary look. Is there anything that can be done to restore the original look of this velvet?

DEAR POLLY — My Pet Peeve is the fact that manufacturers of kitchen shears insist on painting the handles red. I have tried to remove it but was not too successful and the paint flecks off in tiny specks that get into food. I find this is particularly annoying when cutting cream candy and think it is such an amusing thing to do and do not find any brand that does not do it. — Mrs. M. B.

DEAR POLLY — and Mrs. M. St. O who wanted to know how to wash a vinyl tablecloth so it comes out unwrinkled. Wash on "delicate" cycle and with something else in the washer to balance the load. Take from washer and put in dryer and let tumble until warm and supple. Then remove, put directly on the table while material is warm. It can be smoothed on wrinkle free. I know the heat in the cloth does not harm a laminated plastic table top but doubtless a wood table top would have to be protected. If the fringe is still slightly damp it will dry nicely just hanging from the edge of the table. — MARIE.

DEAR POLLY — Like Marie and others who wrote in I have dried plastic articles on low heat but such articles must be closely watched. Makers of washers advise against this and say to only dry on "air" setting with no heat and to put a couple

of dry bath towels in with the cloth. Shake out excess moisture before putting in the dryer. If heat is used for drying remember to keep a close eye on the item. — POLLY.

DEAR POLLY — If your wire coat hangers have any rust spots on them protect your clothes by putting clear nail polish over the rusted spots. Also putting clear nail polish on the eyelets of shoes will prevent those black marks on the tongue and shoe laces which result from the metal rubbing on them.

Paint the size numbers, marked on the inside of shoes, with clear nail polish. The will be legible for future reference. — KATHY MARIE.

# JUST IN CASE— Draft Lottery Is Conducted

WASHINGTON (AP) — No. 1 in Wednesday's standby draft lottery, held for men turning 19 this year, was assigned to those with a Feb. 26 birthday and No. 2 to those with a Jan. 5 birthday.

At the other end, 365 was assigned to those with an April 20 birthday. If the draft is resumed next year in an emergency, men in this year's lottery would be the first inducted, starting with No. 1.

However Selective Service is reclassifying only those with numbers 1 through 95 according to their civilian status to provide a "readily inductible" pool. And even those men will not be given physical or mental exams.

Those with numbers above 95 will probably not be contacted by their draft boards, barring an emergency, although all draft-eligible men are liable for the draft until age 26. The prime group this year consists of men with numbers 1 through 95 in last year's lottery. They will drop into a less vulnerable classification next year.

The lottery began with John D. Dewhurst, deputy director of Selective Service, saying there is no intention to try to restore authority to induct men. That authority expired last June 30. The purpose behind the lottery, he said, is "insurance — plain and simple."

Police identified the victim as Ann Reeves, 42, and Steve Owens, 22. Capt. Robert Cochran said Owens and his wife Donna, 21, separated about 10 days ago in Dallas and she and the couple's son, 4, had been staying with her mother since.

## Winds, Rain Lash North Louisiana

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP) — One man was killed and at least three persons were injured when strong winds and heavy rains swept across Louisiana late Wednesday and early today.

Portions of the state were under a tornado watch or warning for hours. Chubby McFerrin, in his 50s, was killed when a building collapsed in the Ebarb community near Zwolle.

# Mitchell-Stans Trial Postponed; Juror Becomes Ill

NEW YORK (AP) — Because of the illness of a juror, the criminal conspiracy trial of former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell and ex-Commerce Secretary Maurice H. Stans was recessed today until Monday.

Federal Judge Lee P. Garlanti announced that Violet Humbert had been taken ill early this morning and was hospitalized. He said by agreement of the prosecutor and defense lawyers, the trial was recessed until after the weekend.

If Mrs. Humbert is unable to continue, there are six alternate jurors available. The nature of Mrs. Humbert's illness was not revealed.

The announcement came as the government was prepared to call John W. Dean III, ousted White House counsel, as its next witness. Dean was reported to be in the building, but he never appeared in court.

Groundwork for Dean's appearance was laid by former Securities and Exchange Commission chairman William J. Casey's testimony Wednesday that Dean made at least four telephone calls, evincing White House interest in a securities fraud case against financier Robert L. Vesco.

Dean was ousted as President Nixon's counsel last April 30 after he admitted a part in the cover-up of the Watergate break-in. Mitchell and Stans are accused of seeking to head off an SEC complaint against Vesco, in return for the latter's secret \$200,000 cash contribution to President Nixon's 1972 re-election campaign.

Government interrogation of Casey focused almost entirely on Mitchell, with scant mention of Stans. However, at its conclusion, Stans' attorney, Walter Bonner, asked: "Isn't it a fact, Mr. Casey, that Maurice Stans never, never asked you to fix this complaint?"

"Yes, that is a fact," replied Casey, 61, who is now president of the Export-Import Bank. A perjury count in the indictment is based on Mitchell's denial before a grand jury that

he ever talked to Dean about the Vesco case. Casey testified he received a telephone call from Dean about the case after he had left the SEC and continued:

"The conversation was in the nature of a complaint that the staff or somebody had leaked a deposition to a newspaper reporter before the deposition had been filed in court. He commented that the staff of the commission was reaching beyond the proper scope of the investigation. I said I didn't know anything about it."

"Was there any reference in your conversation with Dean as to why he was calling?" Casey was asked.

"He said he had received a complaint from Mr. Mitchell," the witness replied. At one point in cross-examination, Casey was asked by the defense: "Did Mr. Mitchell ever ask you to fix that case?"

"Nobody asked me to fix the case," the witness replied.

## Patman Assails Excessive Interest Rates On Homes

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — U.S. Rep. Wright Patman, D-Tex., has charged that high interest rates are keeping Americans from becoming homeowners.

In a speech before the national convention of Galley of Homes Inc. in San Antonio Wednesday night Patman said, "It is doubtful that half the population can buy homes at 9 percent interest rates."

"With today's interest rates, you have to pay for three homes to get title to one," the Texas Democrat said. Patman, chairman of the powerful House Banking and Currency Committee, blamed the Federal Reserve Board for the high rates. He accused the board of fighting inflation with inflation.

He declared that a recession "is already here and has all the indications of a real depression if we don't do something about high interest rates."

Later, Patman told delegates that he supports Texas U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen for the 1976 Democratic party presidential nomination.

## Rusk Says Nixon Shouldn't Resign

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Former U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk says he doesn't think President Nixon should resign.

"I don't think much of the idea that we should remove a president from office by clamoring for his resignation. We have constitutionally guaranteed methods for such action," Rusk, now a professor at the University of Georgia in Athens, said here Wednesday at a forum on international law.

## UT Decision To Eliminate Daily Texan Funding Hit

AUSTIN (AP)—Shouting "Get Erwin out," several hundred University of Texas students marched to the Capitol Wednesday to gripe to the legislators about a decision by the board of regents.

Regents had voted Friday to eliminate mandatory funding of the Daily Texan and student government as part of the student services fee paid at registration time.

Frank Erwin Jr., one of the regents, had complained repeatedly about the Texan and student government leaders.

Sen. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, said that if given a chance, he would block Erwin's reappointment to the board if the governor tries to give Erwin another six-year term.

He said he was sure the governor, whomever he or she might be, would clear such an appointment with him as a traditional "senatorial courtesy."

"If he checks with me about Erwin, at this time I would not be inclined to approve the appointment," Doggett told reporters.

Guards locked the Capitol's north doors when the students arrived but opened them after the youths said they merely wanted to talk with their legislators as individuals.

Some sent in notes to the constitutional convention asking their lawmakers to meet with them in the lobby. Others went into the convention gallery.

A number of legislators came out to talk with small groups of students, who wanted them to pressure the regents to restore mandatory funding for the Texan and student government.

"The effort from now on is to have Erwin removed in January," said student body president Sandy Kress.

## Nixon Reports Lift From Brief Visit To Texas

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon is back from a buoying two-day trip to Texas, where he met with Republican leaders, awarded medals to Skylab astronauts and inspected preparations for a joint U.S.-Soviet space mission.

The President also caught the public's eye when he dropped into a Houston drugstore for a cup of coffee — leaving the waitress a Texas-sized \$1 tip — and hopped out of his limousine to sign autographs for school children.

"It always gives you a lift to come to Texas," Nixon told newsmen during his visit Wednesday to the Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center. "There's a lot of drive, a lot of spirit, a can-do attitude and that's what the country needs."

## House GOP Leader Trying To Head Off Confrontation Over Impeachment

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republican Leader John J. Rhodes is trying to head off a confrontation between the White House and Judiciary Committee over the impeachment inquiry.

Rhodes is urging both sides to soften their positions and seek a compromise settlement of their dispute over a committee request for tapes of 42 presidential conversations.

After meetings with White House lawyer James D. St. Clair and Republican members of the Judiciary Committee, Rhodes held a news conference Wednesday to urge that a third party be permitted to review the tapes and determine which would be relevant to the committee's impeachment inquiry.

Compromise Suggestion

He did not spell out his proposal but said it could be along the lines of the one made by President Nixon to special prosecutor Archibald Cox calling for Sen. John Stennis, D-Miss., to listen to tapes then in dispute between the White House and the Watergate grand jury. Cox's refusal to accept the proposal led to his firing.

Rhodes' suggestion seemed unlikely to fare much better. The White House has indicated no interest in it and the chairman and ranking Republican on the committee have flatly rejected it.

"The committee has a constitutional responsibility to conduct the inquiry," said Rep. Edward Hutchinson, R-Mich., the ranking GOP member. "And besides, I don't understand why someone else's judgment of relevancy should be any better than mine."

Committee "Unswerving"

Although Nixon has given no sign of yielding on the issue and committee counsel John Doar pledged Wednesday that the committee was "unswerving in its determination to get the material," the prospect of an immediate confrontation appeared dim.

Nixon has turned over 700 documents and 19 tapes he had previously given to the Watergate grand jury and Doar wants time for the inquiry staff to examine the material.

In addition, the committee expects to get the secret grand jury report dealing with Nixon that is now held by Judge John Sirica. Sirica's order turning the material over to the committee will take effect at 4 p.m.

## Boy Back In School; Restraining Order Issued By Judge

HOUSTON (AP)—Billy Epperson, 8, returned to school with his long hair today after U.S. District Judge Woodrow Seals issued a temporary restraining order against the Pasadena School District.

The district suspended Billy Feb. 23 when school officials ruled his over-the-ears hair style did not conform to its grooming code.

Judge Seals, who recalled that he wore his hair in a similar style as a child, said the school's grooming code was unreasonable as it applies to the Epperson case.

Seals set an April 15 trial date to rule on the constitutionality of the grooming code and on the school's motion to dismiss the case.

Billy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Epperson, urged school officials to make an exception to the hair grooming rule because of a birth defect.

The Eppersons said the longer hair style covered Billy's defect and prevented ridicule from other children. School officials refused.

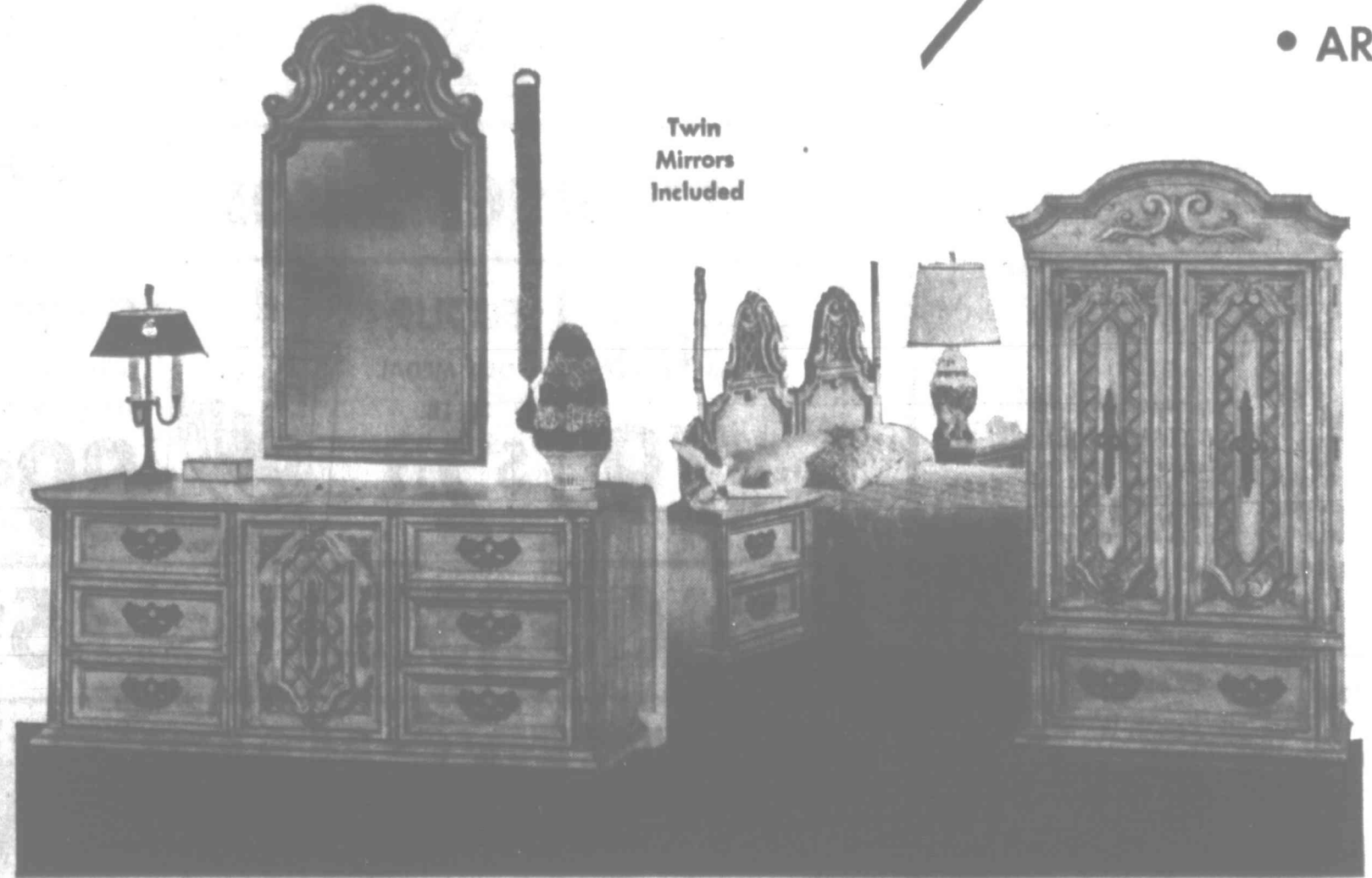

## Insurgents Attack, Overrun Cambodian Troops

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — Insurgent forces attacked government reinforcements advancing on the fallen provincial capital of Oudong and overrun part of the column, military sources reported today.

The sources said the Khmer Rouge rebels killed 13 government soldiers, wounded 40, shot down a helicopter and captured a 105mm gun during the all-day

battle Wednesday at Longvek, just north of Oudong.

The government parachuted food and ammunition to the remnants of the Oudong garrison holding out in a pagoda half a mile north of the town, but military sources said some of the supplies landed among the rebels.

More reinforcements boarded landing craft in Phnom Penh

for the 25-mile trip up the Tonle Sap river to Kompong Luong, three miles east of Oudong. Helicopters ferried several hundred troops into positions north of the town three days ago, and a coordinated drive from the east and north is planned.

Oudong, a provincial capital of 15,000 people, was captured by the rebels on Monday after four days of heavy assaults. It

is on Highway 5, the overland supply route between Phnom Penh and the rice fields of northwest Cambodia, but the Khmer Rouge have controlled the territory north and south of the town for months.

In Vientiane, the Laotian administrative capital, the extension of joint police supervision by the Vientiane government and the Communist Pathet Lao

continued. About 50 armed Pathet Lao police moved into the international airport, joining a government force of the same size.

Joint police patrols started operating in the streets of Vientiane Monday night as part of the preparations for formation of a coalition government uniting the Vientiane rightists and the Pathet Lao.

# Connecticut Firm Sells Luxury Coffins For Pets

MONROE, Conn. (AP) — "Our caskets are pine boxes, with satin-lined foam rubber mattresses, with lace satin blankets and lace covered satin pillows," says Isabelle Jennings.

"They serve as both casket and vault, are air tight and water tight and have bronze handles."

And some are only 10 inches long.

For more than a year, the Hughes and Chapman Monument Co. has been selling luxury caskets for pets. The 10-inch casket is designed for a bird.

"If your grandfather died, why would you purchase a casket? Because you love him," said Mrs. Jennings, company vice president. "Our caskets are for pets that are loved."

She said the firm has already sold 170 animal caskets for creatures ranging from caterpillars to dogs, at a cost ranging from \$11 to \$165.

"We're able to fulfill most requests, but once someone asked for a casket the size of a horse; we couldn't fill that one," Mrs. Jennings said during an interview Wednesday.

She said it's not just the rich who bury their pets in caskets. "It's people who love their pets and who don't want them just thrown into the ground."

"I think some people prefer an animal to people," said Mrs. Jennings. "At least an animal doesn't talk back and isn't as much of a headache."

"There was an elderly woman who bought a casket for her dog. It was a poodle. She said the dog was more faithful than both her husbands."

# ABC Requests Study By Research League

AUSTIN (AP)—The Alcoholic Beverage Commission wants the privately funded Texas Research League to study its operations, which have produced considerably fewer arrests and convictions in recent years.

ABC administrator O. N. Humphreys Jr. says he sees no question of conflict of interest even though all seven Texas breweries, which are regulated by ABC, are members of the league.

The league recently was criticized by Rep. Luther Jones, D-El Paso, for a plan to study school property taxation that Jones said favored the major contributors to the league—the big oil companies.

After the commission called for the study Wednesday, Humphreys said: "We're behind 15 to 18 months in our audits, and we have 3,500 accounts to be audited."

He said in answer to a question that the drop in arrests and convictions over the last three years probably was around 50 per cent. "I know it's been a considerable drop," he said.

That might be a result, he suggested, to fewer violations, which in turn resulted from an increase from 10,000 to between 12,000 and 15,000 inspections a month.

When it was called to his attention that Schlitz, Budweiser, Lone Star, Pearl, Falstaff, Miller and Shiner all are members of the league, Humphreys said: "I didn't know that."

But he couldn't think of a way this could lead to a conflict of interest.

"If these people are in fact funding this thing (the league), I would think they would want a more efficient operation" in the ABC, he said.

Pressed on conflict of interest, he said: "You've asked me a question I can't answer."

ABC representatives were scheduled to meet today with Jim McGrew, director of the league.

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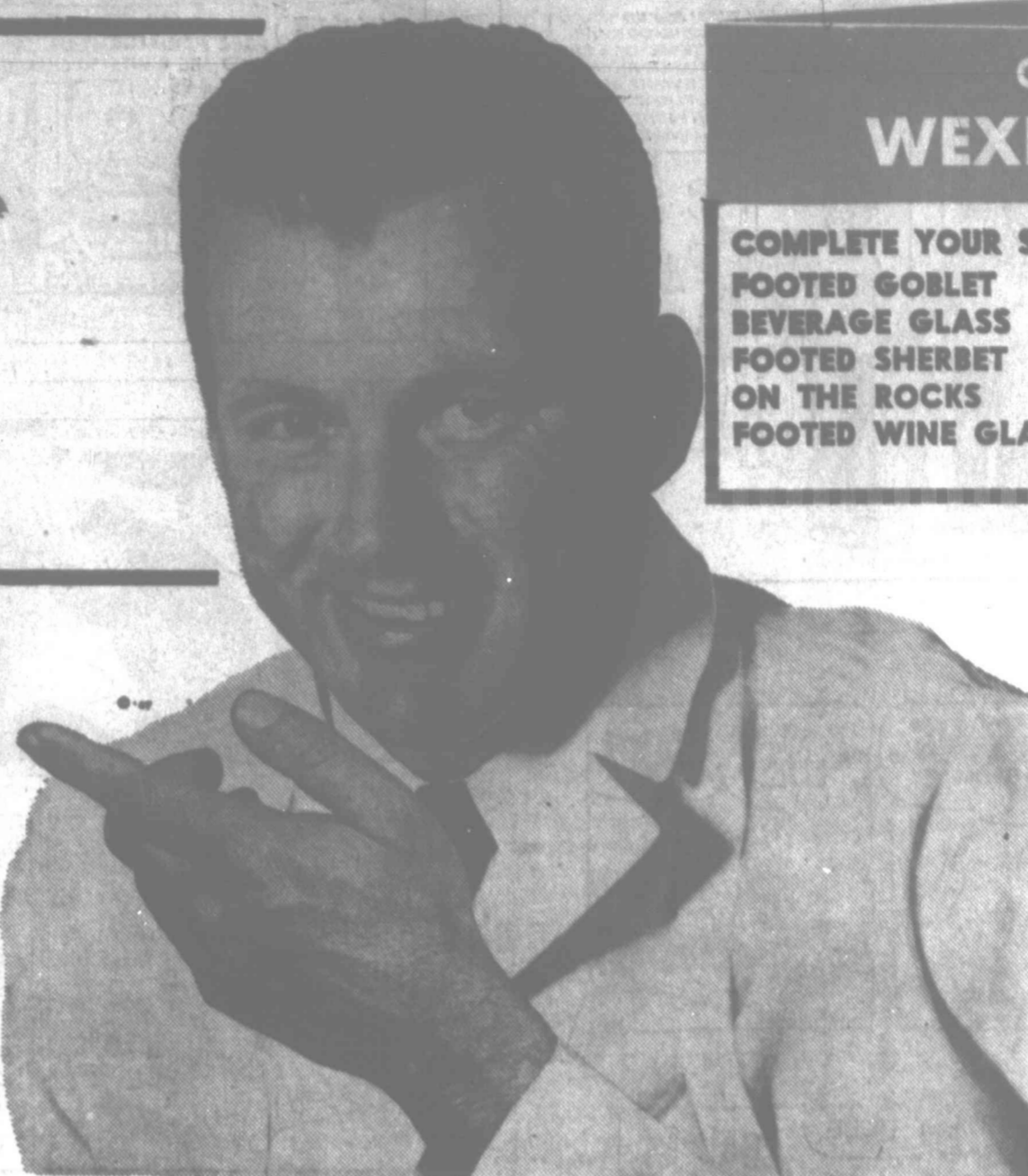
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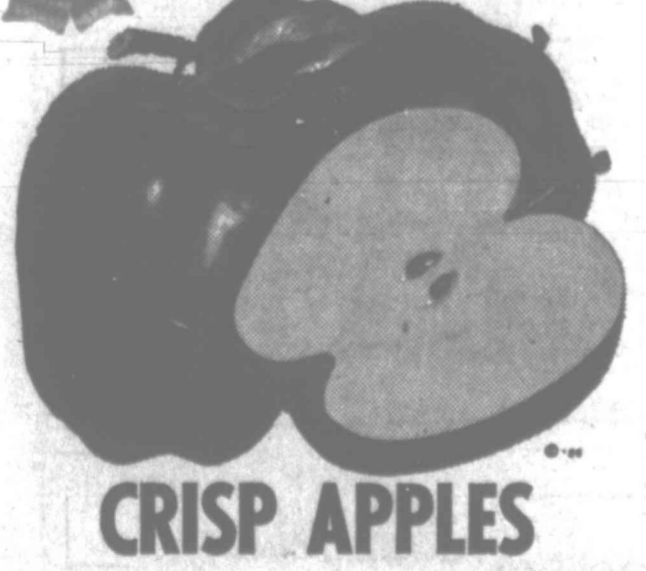
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# Connally Makes Political Hay In North Carolina

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Former Texas Gov. John B. Connally, who only last year switched from the Democratic to the Republican party and is now considered a potential 1976 presidential candidate, apparently has made a good impression on North Carolina Republicans.

Connally was in Raleigh Wednesday on a trip that gave him exposure to the state's Republicans. He spoke at the annual dinner of the North Carolina Citizens Association, which largely represents the state's banking and business establishment.

Before that he was guest of honor at a \$100-per-ticket reception attended by about 200 Republicans at the governor's mansion.

"I think Gov. Connally would find a lot of support in North Carolina," said Gov. Jim Holsinger, also a Republican, at a news conference which was tied in with the reception.

"You just find yourself liking the guy," Holsinger said it is still too early, however, to endorse anyone for the Republican presidential nomination.

Connally predicted that because of lack of evidence the House will not impeach President Nixon, and that Nixon will not resign.

Connally, who also has served as U.S. secretary of the Treasury and the Navy, urged Republicans not to be discouraged by "dark clouds and turmoil" in Washington. He advised them to become instead

more deeply involved in politics.

He criticized claims that the U.S. economy is floundering, but acknowledged that there is an "uneasiness."

Connally, a longtime friend of the oil industry in Texas, said the government should not try to legislate the long-term price

of crude oil. Price restrictions would discourage production increases, he said.

Connally said he thought \$6 to \$7 per barrel was an ample price for American crude oil. But he said that since the Arab nations would be setting world crude oil prices for the foreseeable future, he would favor

short-term government ceilings on the price of domestic crude. He said he didn't know where the short-term ceilings should be set.

# Hearst To Push For SLA Tv Time

HILLSBOROUGH, Calif. (AP) — Newspaper magnate Randolph A. Hearst says he will keep trying to get two imprisoned Symbionese Liberation Army members on nationwide television.

And he has advised his kidnaped daughter: "Patty, again, just hang in there. We're doing everything we can."

The SLA, which claims responsibility for kidnaping the 20-year-old coed Feb. 4, has threatened to break off all communications unless Joseph Remiro, 27, and Russell Little, 24, appear on national television.

The men want to make a statement they claim could lead to Miss Hearst's freedom.

One judge rejected the proposal Tuesday and a second judge on Wednesday postponed a ruling until next Monday. Approval of both judges is required since Little and Remiro face charges in two counties.

They are charged in Alameda County with the Nov. 6 cyanide-bullet assassination of Oakland Schools Supt. Marcus Foster and in Contra Costa County with the attempted murder of a Concord policeman on Jan. 10.

"I'm going to keep asking the people that have the authority to let them do it," Hearst said Wednesday. "If they say no, they say no. But I'm going to keep asking."

Attorneys for Little and Remiro also promised to press the request of their clients.

Hearst told newsmen at his Hillsborough mansion, "I'm trying to do everything I can to facilitate the demands of the SLA."

He announced that his \$2 million People In Need food giveaway is being revamped to provide high quality food demanded by the SLA. He said he hopes to resume handouts Monday.

So far, 120,000 bags of groceries have been distributed.

Hearst said the abduction of his daughter had made him more conscious of the injustices in American society. Chicano, black and Indian children "don't start out on an equal footing" with white middle class children.

The FBI has described the SLA as a terrorist organization with some 25 members.

# Little Old Ladies Phrase Is Passe, Coed, 95, Claims

SCHENECTADY, N.Y. (AP) — Alice Scutter says the phrase "little old ladies" is passe.

"You used to think of old women as those who sat around with caties and shawls and had squeaky voices," said the 95-year-old Mrs. Scutter, who is enrolled for a creative writing course at Schenectady County Community College.

"But all my friends, even those up there in years, are people who are interested in what is going on in the world today."

College officials believe Mrs. Scutter, a New York City native, is probably the country's oldest student.

"If she's not actually the oldest, she's sure in the running," said John Walker, director of continuing education. "They did some double-takes when they saw the date of birth on her application."

Mrs. Scutter, who has already written her memoirs and published a book of poetry, says she enrolled in the class because "it sounded interesting."

"I just really wanted to compare notes with other people who write," she explained during an interview in her Victorian-style living room Wednesday.

Mrs. Scutter's three-hour class at the college meets once a week.

"She's very knowledgeable and most sincere in her classroom discussion," said her instructor, Nancy Thornton.

The last formal education Mrs. Scutter received was a class in canning at Connecticut State College during World War II.

Mrs. Scutter, who uses a hearing aid because of slight deafness, says she disapproves of men and women living together in college dormitories and is against streaking. And she remembers when it was illegal for a woman to be seen in trousers.

Mrs. Scutter, the widow of a General Electric Co. executive, added:

"When I was young, we had dances, we sang and we could take a ride on an open trolley car. Then we'd go somewhere and get an ice cream soda and go home. It wasn't sophisticated, but it was fun."

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# Mansfield Criticizes Nixon's Military Aid Policies

HOUSTON (AP) — Senate majority leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., has criticized the Nixon administration for providing military arms to allies and for keeping large numbers of troops overseas. Mansfield told the final session of the National Association of Broadcasters Wednesday the United States sells \$5.4 billion in military equipment annually to other nations and gives away \$4 billion more each year. He said the sale and giveaway programs encourage military coups in underdeveloped countries. He said arms sales and stationing troops abroad add to domestic inflation, deplete stockpiles and divert the government's attention from domestic needs. The United States has 300 major overseas military bases and 1,000 minor bases, Mansfield said. More than 300,000 American servicemen and their dependents are in Western Europe and 45,000 are stationed in Korea, he said. In another closing activity at the convention, Oklahoma City television station WKY-TV won the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences 1973 national award for community service. The award-winning program was a documentary on blacks in Oklahoma entitled "Through the Looking Glass Darkly." Station manager Norman P. Bagwell said the documentary was created to make clear the accomplishments of black Oklahomans. The WKY program was one of 12 finalists selected from stations throughout the country. Other finalists were: "From Hurt!" WNB-TV, New York; "The Frightening Feeling You're going to Die," WCVB-TV, Needham, Mass.; "A Matter of Life and Debt," KOOL-TV, Phoenix, Ariz.; "What Happens to Me?" KPEC-TV, educational station, Tacoma, Wash.; "The Nine-Year Old in Norfolk Prison," WITC-TV, Hartford, Conn., and "The Elders," KDIN, educational station, Des Moines, Iowa. # Common Cause Accuses Democrats Of Stalling Electoral Reform

WASHINGTON (AP) — Common Cause, the self-styled citizens' lobby, said today that Democratic congressional candidates received more than \$1 million from special interest groups in 1972 and accused the Democrats of stalling electoral reform.

The foot-dragging charge was contained in a full-page advertisement in today's editions of The Washington Post, appearing on the same day the party holds its annual fund-raising dinner.

The figures on 1972 Democratic receipts from special interest groups were contained in a report to be published by Common Cause next week on the role of special interest money during the presidential year campaigns.

Common Cause said various political committees gave Democratic House candidates a total of \$667,226 while senatorial candidates received \$550,947.

The largest single donor on the list was the National Committee for the Re-Election of a Democratic Congress, a quasi-official fund-raising committee headed by Robert Strauss, who later became chairman of the party.


The Strauss committee was listed as having raised \$376,507 for House candidates and \$260,802 for senatorial hopefuls under the party banner.

The largest giver among business and professional ranks was the Committee for Thorough Agricultural Political Education, the political wing of the Associated Milk Producers Inc. It gave \$87,500 for Democratic House campaigners and \$72,000 for senatorial candidates.

Common Cause has been active in electoral reform and is a chief advocate of public financing for federal elections.

It was a Common Cause lawsuit that forced President Nixon's re-election committee to disclose the sources of his early campaign receipts, including money that figured in the Watergate scandal.

## Nixon's Answers Remain Same On Resigning And Tapes Issues

WASHINGTON (AP) — Any political campaign has its set piece. The Speech a candidate delivers day after day to stress his major themes. President Nixon's campaign to rebuild public confidence and block impeachment is no exception.

Nixon's forum has been the nationally broadcast and televised question-and-answer session. He has held four of them in less than a month. Two were White House news conferences, two on the road. He says there are likely to be more.

Whatever the questions put to the President, his two key answers have been the same:

**Won't Resign**  
—He will not resign, contending that to do so would destroy the presidency itself.

—He will not agree to turn over additional White House tape recordings and documents sought by House impeachment investigators, on grounds this would break the confidentiality essential to any president.

He has, at the same time, repeated his demands for a swift end to Watergate investigations, declaring anew that one year is enough, that dragging it out drags down America.

The words have changed somewhat; the tone became tougher at his session with the National Association of Broadcasters in Houston Tuesday night.

Nixon suggested, for example, that the House Judiciary Committee may be going beyond the limits of the Constitution in seeking additional White House documents.

"... I am suggesting that the House follow the Constitution," he said. "If they do, I will."

**No Direct Answer**  
Nixon did not answer directly the question of whether he would comply should the House committee issue a subpoena for specific items. But he implied that he would not, contending that the principle of presidential confidentiality applies to impeachment as to any other investigation.

That is an argument he used earlier in his unsuccessful effort to withhold White House tape recordings from the Watergate grand jury on grounds of executive privilege.

The tone and substance of the questions varied, from those of business executives in Chicago to those put by newsmen in Houston and Washington. But they produced the same information.

On resignation, and on the

question of yielding up additional documents, Nixon said repeatedly that he was defending in another campaign, needless his office, guarding the prerogatives of the White House. But he is in one now. This time it is not for votes in an election; it is for public support had paid too little personal attention to the re-election campaign.

# Butz Says Rural America Still Supports President

By DON KENDALL

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz says rural people still support President Nixon and predict they will support Republicans next fall, partly because farmers have prospered under his administration.

Butz tried Wednesday to calm a wave of protest generated by a comment Nixon made in Texas that "farmers never had it so good" as they have it now.

The comment by Nixon, made Tuesday night in Houston, drew fire from farm belt members of Congress, farm group representatives and individuals. Most referred to hard times livestock and dairy producers are having because prices they get are so low in relation to expenses.

Butz conceded, however, there are "soft spots" in the farm economy, including those mentioned by cattle, hog and dairy producers. But generally, he said, farm income is high and probably will be down only "a couple billion" dollars from last year's record of \$25 billion.

Farm people, he said, have "a fundamental faith" in America and do not want to see the presidency or the American system harmed. He estimated at least 50 per cent still support Nixon politically, indicating "some erosion" from the 71 per cent farm vote captured in the 1972 presidential election.

Butz said he based his estimates on many trips to rural areas and personal visits with farm people. He said most he has contacted since becoming secretary in December 1971 have been "basically conservative and Republican."

Probably more than 71 per cent of farm people do not want Nixon to resign because of Watergate as Sen. James L. Buckley, Con.-R.N.Y., asked Tuesday, he said.

"I know our farm people recognize we couldn't have had this farm prosperity without the backing of the President," Butz said. "They tie me to the President and they tie him to me."

## Park Referendum and Producer Board Election

# Survey Reveals Resistance To Rising Electric Rates

Some Americans are paying up to 50 per cent more per month for electricity this year than they did last, an Associated Press survey shows.  
Consumers are beginning to organize to fight the rate hikes.

A spot check of monthly electric bills this year and last showed that most increases have been about \$1 or \$2, generally about 10 per cent, with the highest reported boost coming in Jacksonville, Fla., where the average tab went from

\$17.90 last year to \$27.70 this year.  
Utility companies say the increases are due primarily to the rising cost of fuel. They noted that imported crude oil has jumped fourfold since Jan. 1, 1973. Most of these increases are passed on to the consumer

automatically, with no review by state or local authorities.  
Areas like the Northeast which depend heavily on imported oil have been the hardest hit. In the Northwest, where water is a major source of electricity, the price hike has been less severe. Other operating

costs like labor also are generally higher in the East and traditionally have made electric bills more costly.  
The AP check showed that the price of a kilowatt hour of electricity ranges from just over a penny in Nevada and

Oregon to seven cents in New York City.  
All-electric homeowners have been especially hard hit. Such a homeowner in New York's Orange County, for example, has seen his monthly bill jump from \$101.67 in March 1973 to \$205.60 this year for 5,000 kilo-

watt hours of electricity. In some cases, electric bills are topping mortgage payments.  
Most of the consumer outcry has come in the form of protests at public hearings. A Public Service Commission hearing in New York City was disrupted by customers' com-

plainting about Consolidated Edison Co.'s request for a permanent rate hike of almost 23 per cent.

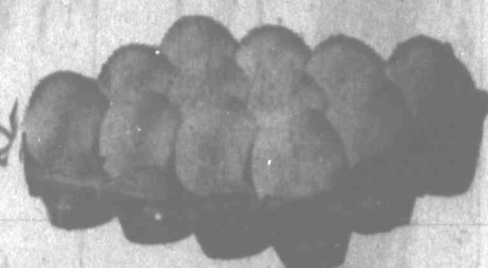
