Judge C. D. Russell will likely designate the week of January 17 as criminal week, and it is expected that Mrs. Newton's case will be called sometime that week.

Sgt. Harper Killed In Car Accident

Sgt. Buster Harper, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harper of near Sudan, was killed late Tuesday, December 21, at Pyote, Texas, in an automobile accident, according to a telegram received by his parents the following morning.

Sgt. Harper had been in foreign service, and was enroute home on furlough when the accident happened. The Commanding Officer of the Pyote Airfield is believed to have wired the parents. Sgt. Harper was due home in a day or so when the tragic happening took place.

Relatives from Sudan are reported to have left immediately for Pyote to bring the remains to Sudan for burial.

A brother, S-Sgt. Jack Harper, of the Greenville Army Flying Field, Greenville, Miss., and several brothers-in-law in the Service were notified; and it was understood that funeral arrangements were being held up pending word from them.

Moisture Measures Third Of An Inch; Beneficial To Area

Coldest Temperature For Past Week Is 14 Degrees At 9 A. M. Tues.

A beneficial snow, which furnished splendid moisture over this entire area, began falling early Monday morning, and according to the West Texas Cottonseed Company's report, measured four inches on the level. However, it soon began melting, and by Wednesday evening most of it had melted, making it very sloppy underfoot. The moisture from the snow was reported at .33 of an inch.

Reports indicate the snow general over the South Plains, Panhandle and Eastern New Mexico.

Railroad dispatches said the snow measured four inches from Amarillo to Tahoka, and all the way from Childress to Belin, N. M., and into the New Mexico mountains.

Of admitted benefit to small grains and the ranges, the ground covering nevertheless was interfering with traffic on the highways. Suggest Suspension Of Pork Rationing

Complete suspension of pork rationing for perhaps 10 days or two weeks, to permit housewives to buy up a current surplus, was proposed Tuesday by a congressional group headed by Senator Reed (R-Kan.).

Reed said packing houses are glutted with pork and that a rationing holiday is needed if a shortage in storage space is to be relieved and waste prevented. He described the OPA's recently announced five points per person pork ration bonus as "wholly inadequate."

The plan for temporary suspension of rationing on all pork products was drafted for presentation to Office of Price Administration (OPA) and War Food Administration (WFA) officials at a conference Tuesday afternoon. Reed said it had the backing of several mid-western senators and representatives among them Senators Capper (R-Kan.) and Gillette (D-La.).

Soil Conservation—

With American farmers being called upon to produce record yields of food for our own country and its fighting men, for our Allies, and for our share in feeding liberated peoples, the Soil Conservation Service is conducting a nationwide survey of the nation's land resources.

Food production capacity in the United States may be interpreted in several ways, depending upon the point of view—long time or short time. The Soil Conservation Service is endeavoring to answer the question both ways, insofar as the question can be answered by a study of the nation's land resources.

Taking the short time point of view, a food production increase of 20 per cent is possible in the immediate future—without increasing by one acre the amount of crop land now in use, the survey indicates. An average increase of 20 per cent already has been obtained on land where this work has been done.

From the long-time point of view, preliminary data indicate tremendous possibilities for expansion. But right now in the midst of global war, Americans are primarily interested in how much they will have to eat next year, the year after that, and perhaps during the next five or ten years.

Crop land resources are most important in figuring food production possibilities because it is with crops that a maximum number of people can be fed.

There are now approximately six millions farms in the United States. The equivalent—in food production—of more than a million farms could be added to the nation's food productive capacity by the application of standard conservation practices to all cultivated land needing such treatment.

The nation-wide survey by the Soil Conservation Service shows, for example, that more than 100 million acres need terracing. Nearly 122 million acres demand contour planting. Strip cropping should be practised on upward of 90 million acres. Cover crops should be laid across 33 million acres. Irrigation water should be applied to nearly 11

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million acres, and pond management should be practised on 720 thousand acres. Four hundred million of grass land desperately need proper stocking and grazing management.

Looking ahead, 20, 30, 50 years, or more, the food production potentialities in the United States are even greater than for the immediate future, the Soil Conservation Service finds. It would be possible to add more than 100 million more acres to this crop land, Dr. H. H. Bennett, chief of the Soil Conservation Service, believes. However, he adds that a considerable portion of this 100 million acres is pasture land needed for milk production and should not be put in crops unless absolutely necessary.

The nation has 1,893,000,000 acres of land, a billion acres or 56 per cent of which are in farms. Land in farms includes all land under control of the operator and considered a part of his farm—crop land, pastures, wood land.

The 44 per cent of land not in farms includes such items as national forests, game preserves, municipalities, state lands, school lands, parks, timber holdings of corporations or individuals, and railroad lands.

From the land in farms, biggest potentialities for increases in production are to be found in 358 million acres now in crop land and suitable to cultivation and in 132 million acres of grass land physically suitable for cultivation. Thirty-four million acres of wood land are also physically suitable for cultivation.

"This 524 million acres that could be put into crops should not all be put into crops because in doing so we could plow up too much pasture or clear up too many needed woodlots," Dr. Bennett explained.

"The area that could be most advantageously used for crops," he said, "including land now in crops and land feasible for crop use, amounts to around 460 million acres. From the standpoint of practicability and safety for the land itself, that acreage can be used for cultivated crops, including grain and rotational grasses and legumes—and this does not include any land devoted to permanent pasture."

"Well, here I am in camp today so I thought that I would write you a line or two. I can't tell you where I am, but I can tell you that I have been where there was a little action and am back here at a rest camp. We get three days liberty and one day on duty. I am on K.P. today. Boy, do we get plenty of milk and ice cream here, and it is sure good. The people here seem friendly enough. They speak English, although they do not have the same kind of money. They use pounds and shillings here, and they drive on the left-hand side of the street. It doesn't seem much different from the States, though. It sure seems good to be where there is civilization. We live about seven miles from town but there is a "tram" goes about every ten minutes, so we can get to town easy.
"I will try to tell you a little about what I have seen. I saw a little action while I was going to Island X on the ship. The Japs sent in torpedo planes, but they were all shot down before they dropped any bombs, but while we were at the Island we had a lot of bombings. The Japs kept us in the fox holes a whole lot but we ran as safe here as you are at home, so don't worry about me. I weighed yesterday. I weigh 14 stones and 12 pounds. If you don't know what that means it is 194 pounds. I am already putting on weight here we get fed so good. Well, I guess that I had better close so I can go to work. I will try to write often to let you hear from me.

"P.S. I got that letter the other day from the pastor of the Church."

Returned Service Man Visits In C. C. Thompson Home

Construction To Start Soon On Levelland Church

Approval has been received at Levelland from the WPB of the plans to rebuild the First Baptist Church of Levelland which was almost completely destroyed by fire September 5. The new building will be built of brick and will afford an auditorium seating above 1,000, the adult department of the Sunday school, baptistry, dressing rooms, with rest rooms; church office, nursery and cradle roll rooms, and the primary department. The former educational building, 40 by 100 feet, will be restored and a new building 62 by 130 feet will be constructed on the west, facing south.

The former educational building restored will house the intermediate young people, beginners, junior A and B departments of the Sunday School. The church tower provides for all stair cases between the buildings, also for an adult class room and space for installation of chimes.

Rev. A. A. Brian, pastor of the church, formerly of Littlefield, has announced that actual construction will commence shortly after Jan. 1, 1944. Haynes and Ctrange of Lubbock are the architects and bids for contracts will be let in a few days. The building fund of the church has \$45,000. All over \$9,000 has been raised since September 5.

Since the old building was destroyed by fire, services have been held in the Junior High School building. Rev. Brian stated that attendance and interests have held up remarkably well despite uprooting from their home. The church has a membership of 1165, a Sunday school of 800 enrollment with 400 to 500 attendance each Sunday. From a membership of 23 in 1924, the church has grown to its present enrollment. Rating second in mission causes and baptisms in District 9, the church is known as one of the most progressive in this section. The pastor has been with the church for the past several years.

Draft-Age Farmers Released for Temporary War Jobs

State Headquarters for Selective Service permits draft-age farmers in this area to accept war jobs during slack seasons without affecting their deferment classifications.

Because men are urgently needed in vital war industries in this area, farmers and farm laborers may accept temporary jobs in essential industries under the following conditions as cited in a Headquarters memorandum of Dec. 6th to all local boards, WMC Area No. 6:

- (A) They remain in their seasonal occupations for a period of not less than 8 months of the year;
- (B) They become engaged during the off-

season for farming operations in some occupation in war production or in support of the war effort; and

- (C) Upon the reopening of the season in which they may pursue their normal seasonal occupation they return to the seasonal occupations that constituted the basis for their original deferment and resume their status as necessary men therein.

Income Tax Forms To Be Mailed Shortly After Jan. 1

The Treasury Department, which likes its customers to be prepared for what's coming, has announced the news that the new federal income tax forms will go into the mails shortly after January 1.

These forms, of course, have to do only with 1943 income and do not have to wait for the further complications of the new tax bill now taking shape.

The returns will carry a reminder to the taxpayers that they have probably paid a substantial part of their 1943 tax bill already through withholding or through direct payments and that filling the March 15 returns will enable both the taxpayers and the government to know where he stands.

In the main, returns will have to be filed next March by:

Any single person whose total income in 1943 was \$500 or more;

Every husband or wife whose individual income was more than \$624; Every husband and wife whose combined incomes were \$1,200 or more;

Every individual who paid or owed a tax on 1942 income.

Servicemen on overseas duty may hold up on filing returns until they come back to this country.
