Chamber Of Commerce To Sponsor Drug Abuse Seminar

Do you know what "speed", "Bennies", "drivers" or "crossroads" are? How about "yellow jackets", "blue heavens" or "barbs"? These are different "street names" for drugs that are present in Bogata, Texas this very minute, according to Red River County Sheriff Avret Vaughan.

These are drugs that are sold here to our children and most of us don't even know what they look like. Most of us would not recognize 90 percent of the drugs that are available to our

children, nor do we know what effect they have on the users, Sheriff Vaughan said. We might recognize marijuana if we saw it but would we recognize it if we smelled it? Do we or our children know how serious an offense can be if even though we were not using the drug and someone in our car or at our party was caught with it?

There are thousands of unanswered problems regarding drugs that will be answered on Friday night,

April 7, beginning at 7 p.m. when the Bogata Area Chamber of Commerce sponsors a Drug Abuse Seminar. The seminar will be free of charge and is being conducted by Red River County Sheriff Avret Vaughan and his staff, along with officers of the Narcotics Division of Texas Department of Public Safety.

This seminar will be held in the First Baptist Church with the intention of having every interested parent, grandparent and child, interested in learn-

ing about the Drug Abuse Program to be present. Much time and effort by the Chamber and by Sheriff Vaughan and his staff have been put forth for the public to become better informed.

Please tell your family, your friends and your business associates to make an all out effort to be on hand Friday, April 7 at 7 p.m. at the First Baptist Church for this informative meeting, Sheriff Vaughan asked. No longer can we look at California, Dallas or

Paris for their problem. We have all we can handle right here in Bogata. We need to be better informed as to how serious this business really is. If you are a parent, you owe it to your child to be present at this meeting, Vaughan said.

Cancer Drive Plans Finalized

Plans for the American Cancer Society's 1978 educational and fund raising crusade in Red River County are being finalized. The drive, which is headed by Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Wren and Mrs. Imogene Wooley, begins April 4 with the Clarksville business drive, which is headed by Mrs. Jim (Linda) Clark, beginning one week earlier on March 27.

Precinct chairmen, who are Mrs. Louise Lennon, Mackey Guest, Claire Jessee and Sara Harvey are now securing area chairmen and block volunteers. Crusade volunteers, as well as the general public, are interested in what happens to the money collected every year by the 2,300,000 volunteers who ring doorbells and ask Americans to give generously to help wipe out cancer in your life time.

In the combined budget of the ACS for 1976-77, life-saving programs of research, education and service received 78.7 cents of each dollar spent or more than \$99 million. Cancer research projects were supported with nearly \$38 million or 30.2 percent of the budget.

Public Education received \$20.9 million or 16.7 percent. These programs inform the public about cancer prevention and symptoms and encourage periodic health checkups which can discover cancer at an early and often curable stage. Information about cancer's seven Warning Signals, as well as safeguards against known hazards such as cigarette smoking and over exposure to the sun are essential parts of the program.

We provide physicians, dentists, nurses and other allied health personnel with the latest information on cancer diagnosis and treatment, so more than \$13 million or 10.6 percent was spent on Professional Education.

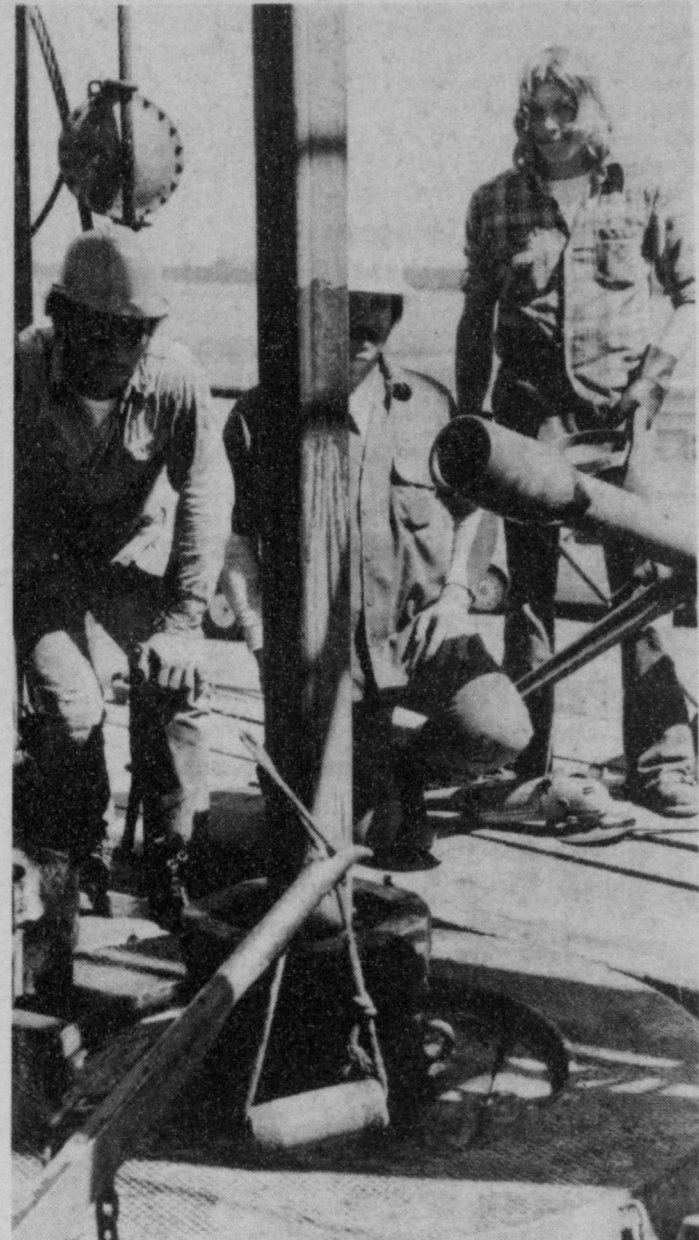
Services to cancer patients including rehabilitation programs received \$15.6 million or 12.4 percent, while Community Services including cancer detection programs, mass screening, and cancer registries received \$11.1 million or 8 percent. A free screening clinic is being considered for Red River County this summer.

In the face of spiraling costs, administrative outlays were contained within low limits and kept to \$12.1 million or 9.8 percent while fund raising costs were kept to \$14.4 million or 11.5 percent.

Despite aggravated costs of just about everything in the area of health services and management, the Society has continued to mount more and better programs because of the dedicated volunteers who are in the vanguard of efforts to wipe out cancer in your lifetime.

Cities Receive Sales Tax Checks

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said his office Wednesday mailed checks totaling \$69.2 million to 915 Texas cities as their March share of the one percent city sales tax.

The March rebates are 17.4 percent larger than those for the same month last year and raise the year-to-date total to \$101.5 million, up from \$89.4 million for the first three months of 1977.

"This increase, which represents increased retail sales, is just another indicator of the bullishness of the Texas economy," Bullock said.

The City of Bogata received the largest check locally, \$3,250 for an increase of 41 percent over the same period last year.

Talco has received a check for \$2,973.77 for this year, an 11 percent increase.

Blossom also shows a 41 percent increase for the period.

In communications received from the Texas Education Agency, the Talco-Bogata Schools will be required to make up the seven student days missed due to weather conditions.

Beard Growing Contest To Begin April 1

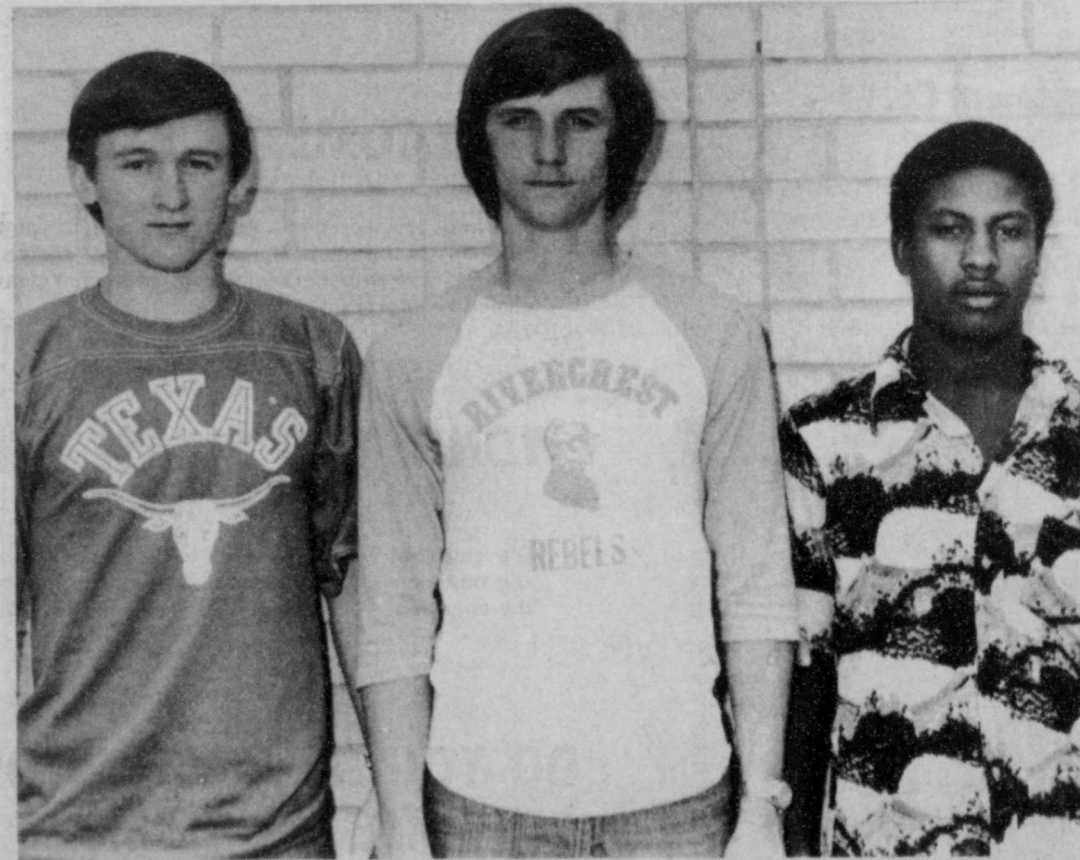

It was darkest because of the hideous sins committed against an innocent person. This day was darkened further by nature's revolt against man's mistreatment of the Creator, as

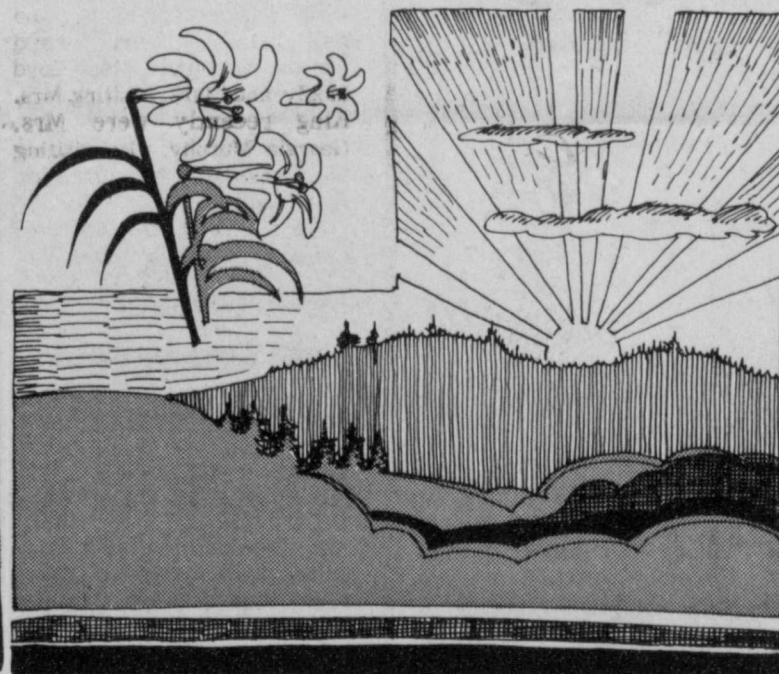
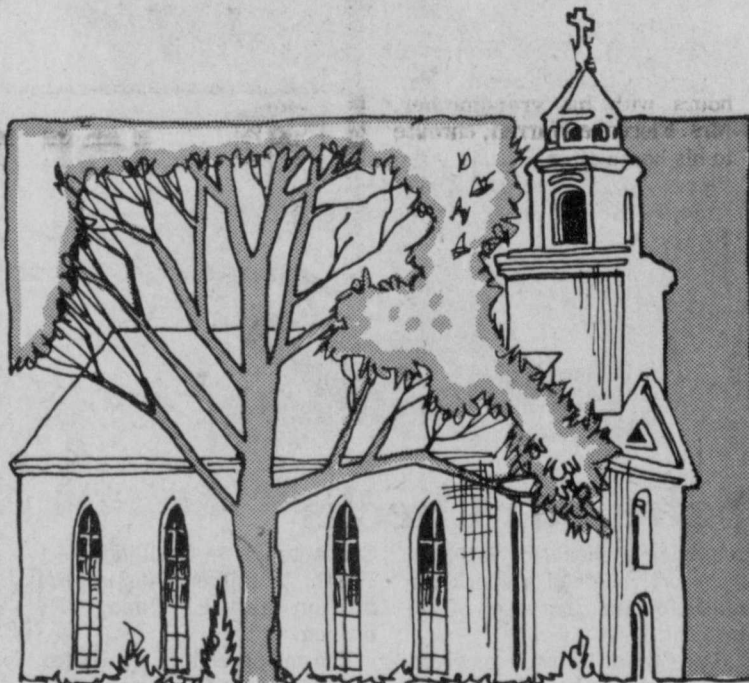
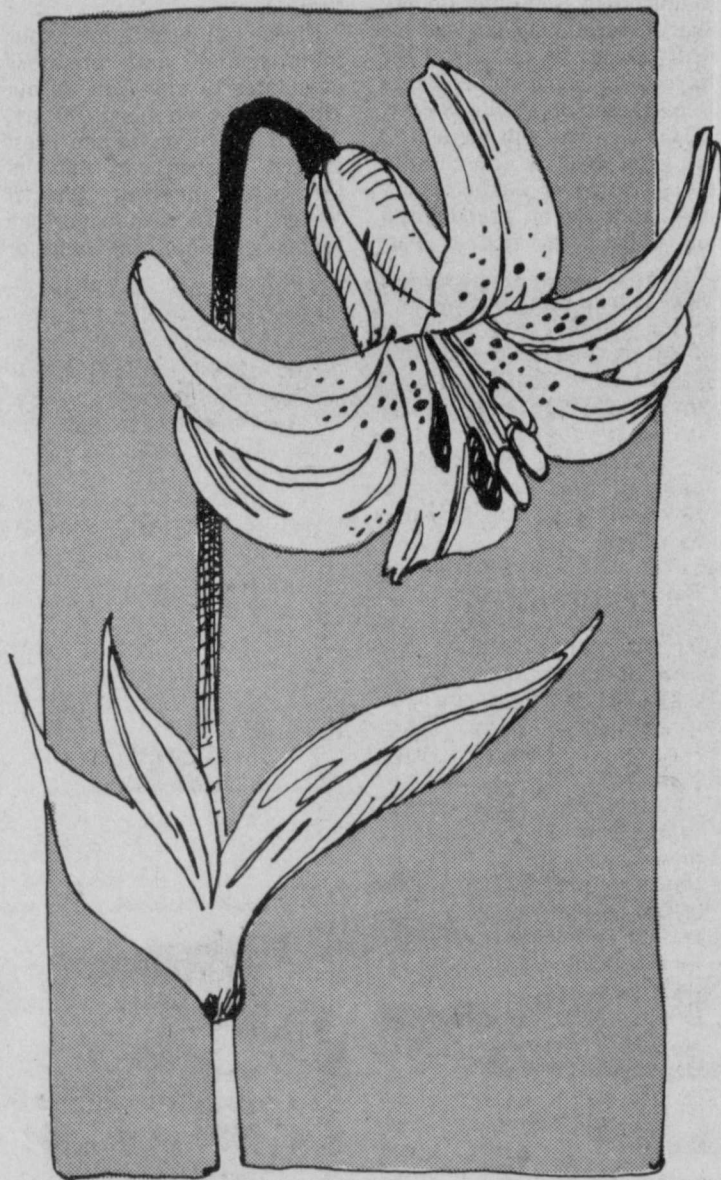

Solar Home Open Sunday In Blossom

A local contractor, Jerry Gillie, has built a home to sell on Moore Street in Blossom which utilizes solar energy for heating, and the home will be open to the public this Sunday, March 26, from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m.

The three bedroom, two bath brick home is conventional in its brick veneer appearance, but the difference between this home and the others in Lamar County is beneath the surface, in the walls, ceiling, and in a small A-frame structure in the yard.

The shell of the house is encased in styrofoam sheets, backed with additional fiber-glass insulation. Even the doors of the home were specially built to conserve the energy taken from the sun and converted into heat.

The solar heating unit is available for between \$3,600 and \$4,600 and was developed by the International Solarthermics Corporation, a research and engineering firm in Nederland, Colorado. Built in the shape of an A-frame about the size of a tool shed, the unit absorbs energy from the sun, which is trapped and converted to heat. The heat is stored

within the unit and distributed through the existing forced air heating system of the house. A conventional electric powered heating unit becomes, in effect, the auxiliary or back-up furnace, automatically put on line only in the colder months or after periods of prolonged cloudiness.

The high cost of many solar heating units has made the idea impractical for many home owners until now, but this unit is inexpensive, easy to install or build in, and it works. The unit itself seems almost unscientific

in its simplicity. It utilizes ordinary glass, ordinary construction materials, and a storage "battery" consisting of 13 tons of ordinary river rock.

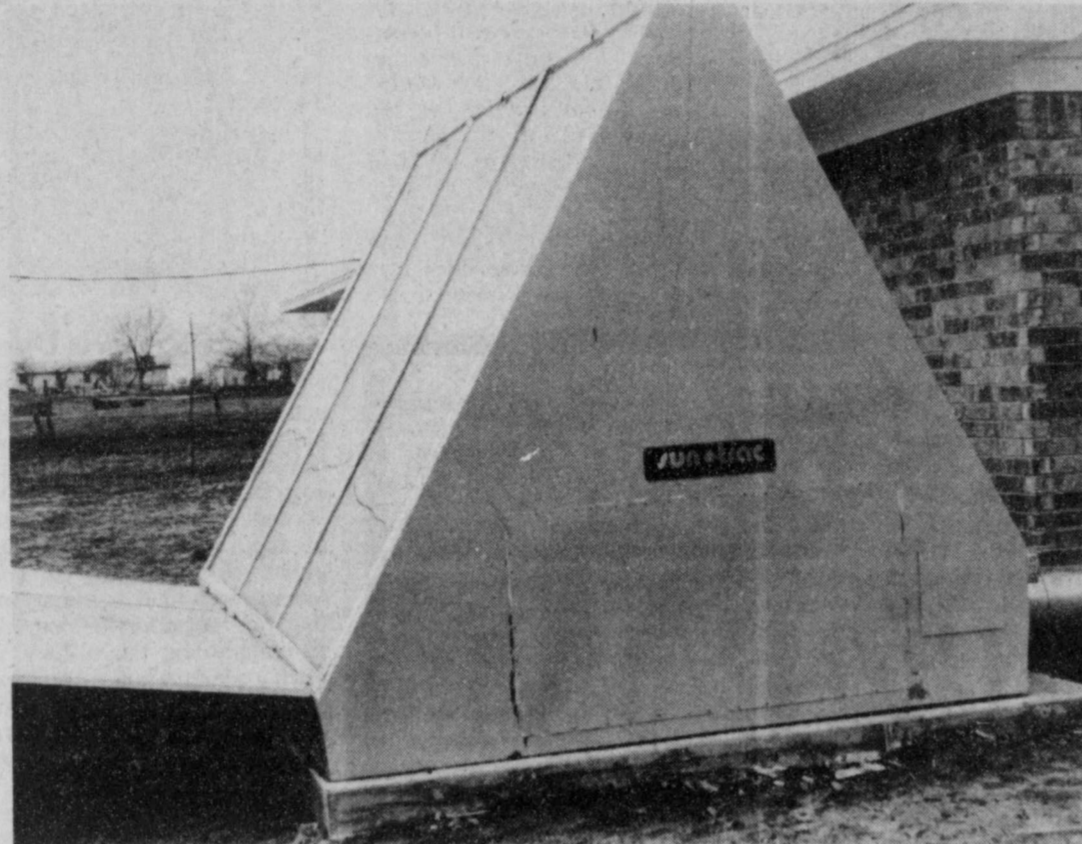
The air is circulated by a small General Electric motor between the collection and storage areas. A second blower moves heated air from the storage area to the house and through the existing ductwork of the home's forced air heating system.

According to the developer, the unit will satisfy up to 90 percent of the heating

requirements for an average home in the Sun Belt across the central part of the United States, and may require supplemental heating from the house furnace only in the colder and cloudier months.

Lukenbach To Annex San Antonio

Carl Albert Lukenbach today announced at a news conference that Lukenbach intends to annex San Antonio as the next step in its revenue producing program.

Lukenbach, speaking to a group of San Antonio city officials and news reporters at Durty Nelly's Saloon in the Hilton Inn, said "We're hurting for funds. We've got Lukenbach Beer (c) about ready to sell, but until we do we've got to get some money somewhere."

Earlier this month, a Lukenbach Beer (c) official announced that Lukenbach needed a new pump and would have to annex Houston to raise the money. "Now," Luken-

bach said, "the septic tank's gone bad."

He added that, "We've either got to have the tank fixed, or tie in with the San Antonio sewer system. We think it'll be cheaper to annex San Antonio and use the tax money to fix the tank. Otherwise, we'd have to dig this big ditch all the way to San Antonio, and nobody in Lukenbach wants to work that hard."

Lukenbach was introduced by Earl Littman, president of the Houston advertising agency - Goodwin, Dannenbaum, Littman and Wingfield. Littman's firm owns the rights to Lukenbach Beer (c), and is negotiating with a San Antonio brewery for introduction of the beer this spring.

Bob Sandlin Lake Filling

A new East Texas reservoir in Titus and Camp Counties will soon provide an excellent sports fishery because of extensive shoreline development and abundant cover and bottom structure in the lake basin.

Bob Sandlin Lake, a 10,000-acre reservoir, began filling with water the latter part of 1977 when the dam was completed.

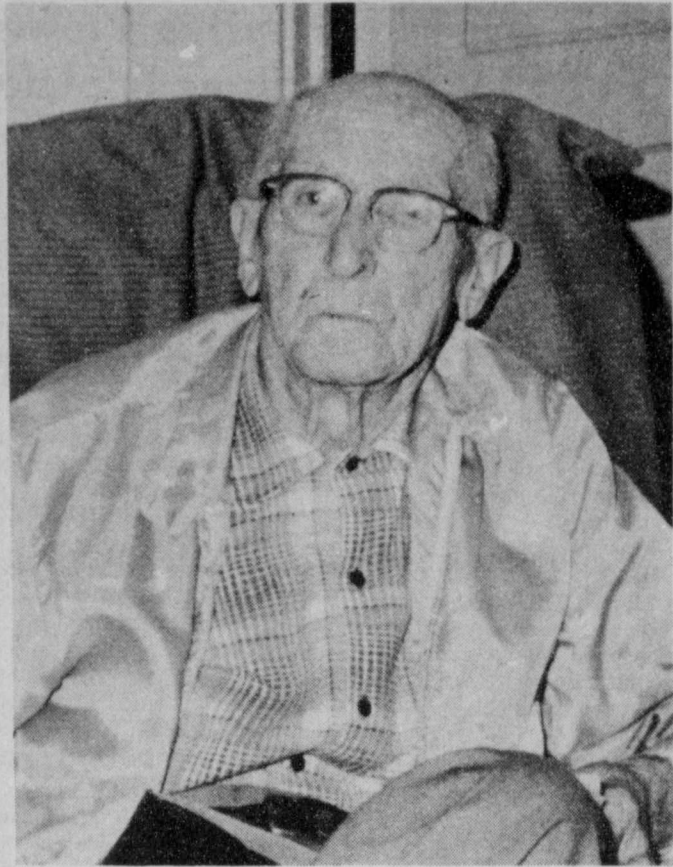
While the lake was partially filled, the Parks and Wildlife Department stocked Florida bass and channel catfish.

Another 150,000 fingerling-size channel cats will be released this year, said Joe Toole, P&WD fisheries biologist of Marshall.

In addition to stocking the reservoir, Toole will conduct an extensive management survey this year which will examine fish populations, water quality, habitat needs and access and facility development.

"Field collections will include gill net surveys, cove rotenone samplings, seining, water quality analyses and electrofishing," said Toole.

The controlling agency of the lake is the Titus County Water District. Bob Sandlin Reservoir is located on Big Cypress Bayou, and Highway 21 crosses the middle of the lake, Toole said.

Acreage Reports Due At ASCS

All farmers in Lamar County with wheat, oats, or barley planted for harvest in 1978 need to come to the ASCS office as soon as possible and report this acreage. This report needs to be filed whether or not you intend to participate in the farm program. It is important that you report for the purpose of maintaining the history of having planted program crops on your farm and could be to your advantage in the years ahead to have reported these crops in 1978.

At the time you report, you may file an intention to participate in the farm program on your wheat or barley, if you wish to do so. If you decide to participate, you will need to show us where you will designate your set-aside acreage.

Many of you have been asking what kind of a cover you are going to have to establish on set-aside land if you participate in the farm program. A cover will have to be established but the point is this, you may not have to plant one. Most of the so-called "clean" land has enough Johnsongrass on it that will come up volunteer to qualify as a cover. If you do decide to sow a cover crop, you may use a clover or some other type of soil-building crop. You may want to plant a sweet sudan of some variety and use

it for grazing after September 30. If you want to get out with the cheapest seed available, you may want to consider a very thin stand of milo and shred it one time to keep it from heading out. If you have wheat on an area now and it is not doing too well, you may shred it to keep it from heading and use the stubble as a cover.

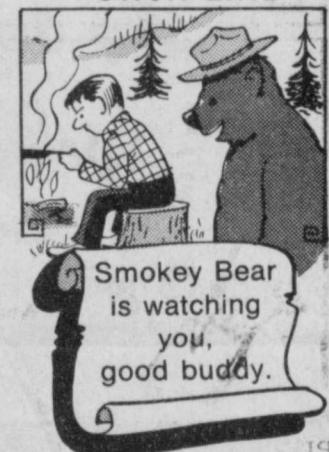
The main points to remember about set-aside are these: 1) Do not harvest from the area; 2) Do not graze between April 1 and September 30; 3) Control noxious weeds; 4) Maintain some type of conserving cover.

We have considered the type of cover, now let us consider what type of tillage you can do on set-aside land. You may plow set-aside land as long as you leave enough crop residue on top of the ground to prevent erosion. This means you can use chisel plows or sweep type plows on set-aside land legally. Just do not clean-till the land until about August 1 and then only if you are preparing for a 1979 wheat or oat crop.

The County Committee has set April 1 through September 30 as the time which set-aside land may NOT be grazed. A violation of this could subject you to a loss of program benefits. ASCS personnel will be making spot-checks of designated set-aside land to determine compliance.

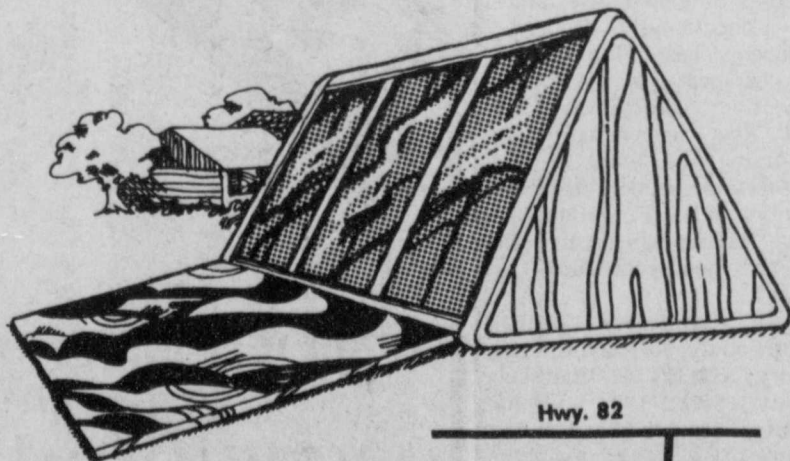

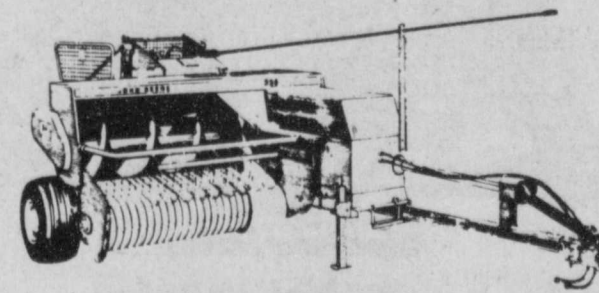

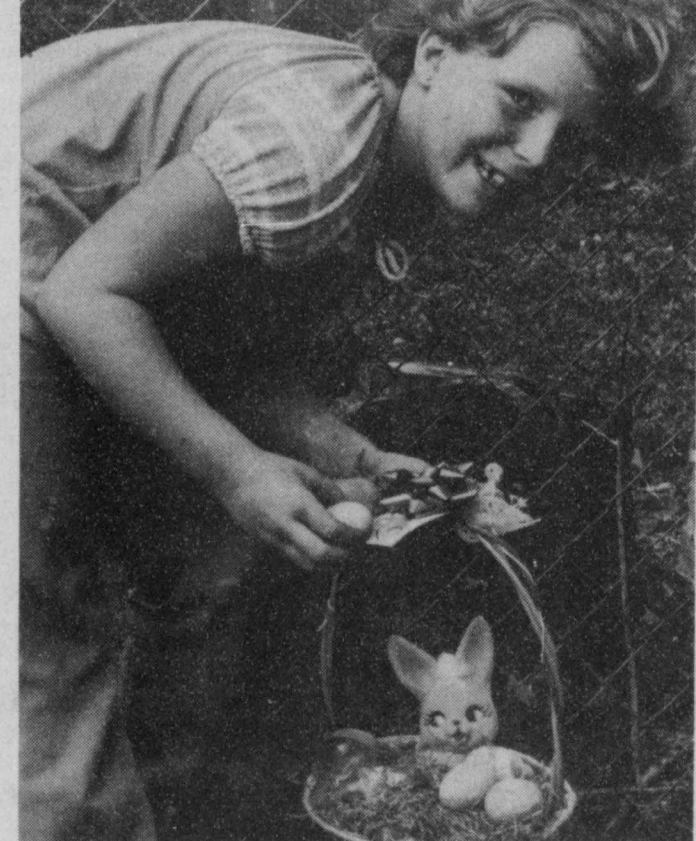

General Telephone Company of the Southwest has filed tariffs with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to implement the Federal Communications Commission's telephone equipment registration program (FCC Docket 19528). The tariffs have an effective date of April 15, 1978. The proposed changes will reduce rates for extension telephones and 25 foot long cords; will restructure one-time charges for service connection, moves and changes, increasing some and reducing others; and will offer reduced monthly rates for one-party business and residence customers who provide their own primary telephone instrument.
