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Former Resident Of Burkburnett Killed In Kansas

Eugene (Son) Hardin, 23, former resident of Burkburnett, and a grandnephew of the late J. G. Hardin, Wichita County philanthropist, was killed near Beloit, Kansas, Saturday in a tractor accident.

Hardin became entangled in a barbed wire attached to the tractor and his skull was fractured when he was jerked against the machine. He was killed instantly.

A graduate of the Moore, Oklahoma, High school and a student for two years in Baylor University at Waco, Hardin was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Egbert E. Hardin, who were prominent residents of Burkburnett for years, and now live in Moore.

He had just had a promotion in the federal rural electrification program and had been transferred from Norman, Oklahoma, to the Kansas field.

He was born in Burkburnett and lived here until 1921 when his parents moved to Wichita, Falls. The family is well known in this community and has many friends who were shocked and grieved to learn of the young man's tragic death.

A short funeral service was held here at the local cemetery where the body was interred. Arrangements were under the direction of Owens-Brumley Funeral home. Rev. Miles B. Hays officiated.

Survivors include the widow, two sisters, Mrs. Edna Phillips of Lawrence, Kansas, and Mrs. Ruth Wilson of Oklahoma City, the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Egbert E. Hardin of Moore, Oklahoma, and an aunt, Mrs. D. L. Fritz of Wichita Falls.

Auction School Land June 24th

Approximately 26,000 acres of University of Texas land in four West Texas counties will be offered for mineral lease in public auction in Austin June 24 by the board for lease of University lands, it was announced this week.

The 152 quarter-section tracts offered by the board include 13 in Crane County, 72 in Reagan County, 22 in Crockett County, 35 in Andrews County and 10 in Reagan and Crockett. In addition the board has asked for bids on a 2,449 acre drilling block in Reagan County on which the minimum price will be \$5 an acre.

Old-Time Cowboys to Compete In Special Calf Roping Contest At Texas Cowboy Reunion, Stamford

Stamford, June 22—Some 200 top cowhands from Texas ranches will compete for \$2,300 in prizes in the rodeo contests during the ninth annual Texas Cowboy Reunion in Stamford July 4, 5 and 6. The rodeo is the central attraction in an elaborate program of entertainment for the three-day celebration which is expected to bring 75,000 visitors to Stamford.

R. M. Swenson, rodeo director, announced this week completion of arrangements for a line of rodeo stock calculated to give contestants plenty of difficulty. The Reunion's own string of bucking horses, which includes such well known outlaws as "Calamity Jane," "Dr. Blackwell" and "Pitchfork Bay," has been supplemented with 25 pitching steers leased from Homer Todd of Fort Smith, Ark. Todd supplied some of the stock which gave brone-riding contestants so much trouble last year.

The Reunion's own herd of 25 bucking Brahma steers has been increased to 40 by animals secured from J. P. McFarland of

Mike Anglin Announces For County Attorney

Mike Anglin, practicing attorney of Wichita Falls for ten years and former County Attorney, today announced as a candidate for that office. He was assistant district attorney for six years before being elected County Attorney at his previous term. In making his announcement Anglin said:

"Two years ago I was defeated for my second term as County Attorney by the present incumbent. It was a hard fought and closely contested race. The present incumbent defeated me on a reform platform and promised to eradicate all forms of vice in this county."

Promises
"He promised the people, and especially did he conduct his campaign through the churches, on the proposition that I had miserably failed in the enforcement of the laws and that he, like Moses of old, would lead the people out of the wilderness. He faithfully promised to eradicate all forms of gambling, liquor violations and vice."

Vindication
"I would not have considered making this race against the incumbent had it not been for the fact that many of my friends were induced to vote against me, and for him, because they believed he could and would fulfill those promises. They were influenced by his misrepresentations that I had failed in my official duties and by his fluent promises of reform. Now that the people have had the opportunity of comparing us both in harness I do not feel that I am unreasonable in seeking vindication of my name as a citizen and as a prosecutor. I say that because of the misrepresentations of two years ago and because of his utter failure to keep those promises."

Failed to Keep Promises
"The incumbent has not kept faith with the people that elected him. He has not even devoted his time to the office of County Attorney but maintains his office at 638 Harvey Snider Building where he looks after his private practice. He and his assistant have tried a total of 36 contested cases in County Court of which only 16 resulted in convictions and two of those were reversed and set aside. Of that pitiful total the incumbent himself only participated in 14 cases and the largest per cent of these

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Martin Speaks At Rally In Burkburnett

District Attorney Howard Martin, at a Martin-for-district attorney rally here Saturday night, reviewed the record he has made in the district attorney's office since he went into that office on Jan. 1, 1937.

Speaking at the corner of Avenue C and Main street, Martin told his listeners that during the past 18 months he has tried 325 cases in the district and has secured 323 convictions. He asserted that no indictments had been quashed since he was district attorney, no new trials have been granted by the trial courts, and that not a single conviction has been reversed by the court of appeals.

Since becoming district attorney, he has secured 78 convictions in drunk driving cases, he declared.

"I regard this offense as one which challenges the best thought and effort of all the law-enforcement agencies in the state of Texas, because of the useless taking of human life and destruction of property," he stated.

Defending the fact that many of the convictions were through pleas of guilty, Martin said that he regarded that as the highest evidence of efficiency in his office. He pointed out that the average cost of a contested felony case was about \$150, and that a plea of guilty cost about \$20, and that through securing pleas of guilty he had saved approximately \$40,000 in taxes. Furthermore, he asserted, the pleas of guilty were evidence of efficiency in that a defendant never pleads guilty unless the evidence secured by the state is very strong against him.

13th District Meet American Legion Is Well Attended

Seymour to Get Next District Meeting Which Will Be Held In November

The 13th district American Legion meeting closed Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock with the next meeting place being Seymour, Graham and Seymour asked for the next meeting but Graham withdrew in favor of Seymour. The next convention will be held some time in November.

Craig Lane, of Fort Worth, state vice commander and commander of the 4th division, and E. P. Engelking, of Electra, state judge advocate of the American Legion, featured speakers on the banquet program at noon warned the legionnaires against bringing the organization into political campaigns.

The two speakers said the individual members of the organization had the right and it was their duty to take an active interest in civic and political affairs, but the organization as a whole should refrain from supporting the candidacy of any person. The speakers said the influence of the Legion would be harmed by participation in heated and bitter campaigns.

Progress Made

Lane also spoke of the legislative program of the Legion in national government. He pointed at the progress made in rehabilitation of ex-service men.

The program at noon Sunday was the climax of a two-day meeting which attracted several hundred Legionnaires from the 13th district. The meeting opened Saturday with an informal series of entertainments and conferences.

Sunday morning the Legionnaires met at the Rotary hall for a conference of post officers. At 9:30 the Legion and auxiliary members of the district held a joint business session. At 10:45 Rev. H. M. Cowling, pastor of the First Methodist church, spoke at the memorial service.

Commander Fred Brookman of the Burkburnett post presided at the noon banquet. The invocation was given by Rev. Cowling. Jim Boyd of Burkburnett gave the welcome address. Engelking of Electra gave the response.

Auxiliary Meets

In the afternoon the auxiliary met in the Lions club hall under the direction of Mrs. Zed Terry of Abilene, president. The Legionnaires held a closed business session with Victor Noble, Wichita Falls, district commander, in the chair.

The Electra Sons of Legion drum and bugle corp entertained the Legionnaires at several times during the day. The band was directed by W. H. (Bobby) Burns of Electra.

Delegates from Burkburnett, Iowa Park, and Wichita Falls have conferred with State Commissioners and there are indications that the road will be constructed. A report on the Board's final decision is expected soon.

Youth Charged In Assault Case

A complaint charging assault with intent to commit robbery was filed against Warren Peacock, 17, of Ellaville, in Wichita Falls Thursday afternoon of last week in connection with an attack made upon T. O. Crawford, Lubbock mattress salesman, at Burkburnett last Sunday night.

The youth was arrested early Monday morning by Deputy Sheriff Roy Blanset and Police Chief Bill Stapp at Burkburnett. He had been held in the Wichita county jail since that time and Thursday afternoon was questioned by W. W. Ballard, assistant district attorney.

Ballard said Peacock Sunday afternoon resigned a post he had held one week as Crawford's chauffeur. That night, while asleep, Crawford was struck on the head with a brick. He awakened and shouted for help and the assailant fled.

He's an exaggerated character

at the wheel. The other 97 per cent were "experienced" drivers, like "Ozzie," who knew just what to do with their hands and feet but who didn't use their heads.

Truck drivers and women drivers are anathema to "Ozzie." We may all be impatient with them

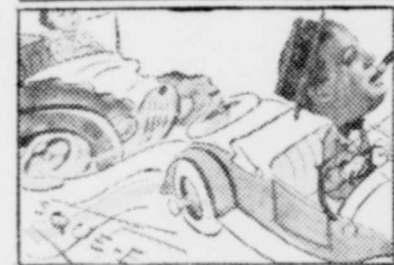


and no one will like to think of himself as an "Ozzie." But if we're honest with ourselves we may have to admit that the label fits us at times.

Perhaps "Ozzie's" worst fault is his cock-sureness. "It's these beginners that cause all the trouble," you're likely to hear him say.

He would be surprised to learn that only three per cent of drivers in fatal accidents last year had less than one year's experience

at times, but the fact of the matter is that eight out of ten vehicles involved in fatal accidents are passenger cars, and 94.4 per cent of drivers involved in fatal accidents are males. The ego of all

WANTED. This man responsible for death of 40,300 persons on highways last year. If you should see him, while looking in the mirror, authorities urge you to reform at once.

"Ozzies" should be deflated when they read these figures.

There's another mistake which "Ozzies" are likely to make. They feel that when visibility is good and the road surface is dry they don't have to be careful. Most of us have learned to fear snow, rain and fog. Driving under such conditions is like groping in the dark, and we are cautious. And when the road surface is slippery we tread lightly on the accelerator, knowing that speed at such a time may be fatal.



The accident totals show this to be true, for only 17 per cent of all fatal accidents occur during fog, snow and rain; less than 22 per cent occur on wet, snowy or icy roads.

What we must all learn is that a little less speed even under the best conditions is advisable.

The Goops probably had as much to do with improving the table manners and drawing room manners of the present generation of adults as any other single factor. It is to be hoped that "Ozzie" may have an equally beneficial influence on our highway manners.

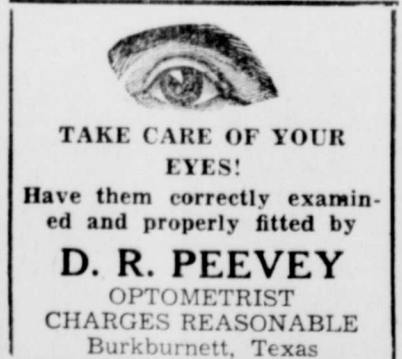
Old-Age Fund Gets \$294,748.00 From Liquor Tax

Funds for old-age assistance were scheduled to be increased \$294,748.35 by proration of liquor revenues for May.

The available school fund was to get \$88,276.99 as its share of the same revenues, and \$264.83 was to go to the general revenue fund.

With prorrations from May revenues, the total amount of liquor revenue distributed to State funds since the Liquor Control Board was organized in November, 1935, will be \$14,226,433.52.

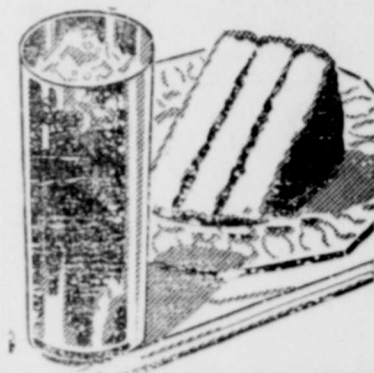

NEIGHBORING WITH LITTLE CHILDREN

Neighboring is getting to be a lost art in city life. Today we live in a few rooms in some huge apartment house, and seldom do we know our next-door neighbor. This has an unfortunate effect upon our children. Country life offers opportunities to "drop in," to do little things for others; there we have certain implied obligations that are delightful. Community life in the suburbs of large cities also offers ways of being friendly. But why can't we who live in apartments do something to bring into our children's lives the spirit of an ideal country village where neighboring is a lovely thing that keeps the heart glowing?

Gardens help in their season.

If there is no ground to spare outside, then inside, or if there is no sunshine inside, then perhaps room for at least a small box can be found on the roof. In any case a basket of fresh growing pansies may be bought, picked by the children and shared with their friends. If there is room, a "friendship garden" out of which come flowers and vegetables, not to be used at home but to be given to acquaintances, is an unfeigned help to neighboring.

Another, is to let the children assist in making cookies. It is such fun for them to give some to the mail carrier, to take a bag to the traffic policeman at the corner and to pack a tin box for Father to take to his office and

pass around to his associates.

I recall a mother who said in my hearing, "Each month we are going to remember somebody's birthday." As the family was small, this meant including neighbors. Sometimes in May the children made several May Day baskets for shut-ins. At Thanksgiving they expected to share their good things for others besides the family. It was genuine pleasure for them to make their own valentines and send them off to distant relatives and nearby acquaintances.

Letters are always delightful, even though the ones who receive them may live in the next apartment. When people are obligated to remain at home the ring of the postman is always an event, whether they are five years old or seventy-five.

The telephone is another means of conveying happy greetings. "Shall I call Mrs. Rice and wish her a happy day?" I once heard a little child who was enjoying the art of telephoning say to her mother. How much oftener this might be done if we only realized the joy it would bring.

Often on New Year's Day at our home we call up friends of all ages and wish them a Happy New Year. When children see and hear their parents doing things of this kind, they usually wish to do the same, and so it becomes a character-building project without any planning. It has long been our custom to prepare a list every month of those we think would be made happier by hearing from us. Our little girls see to it that at least a card or telephone message is sent to each one on the list.

"Bobby's aunt is getting well, and I'm going to send her a card and tell her I'm glad," announced a little boy one day. "But do you know her?" his mother asked. "No, but Bobby does," was the quick reply, and he sent the card.

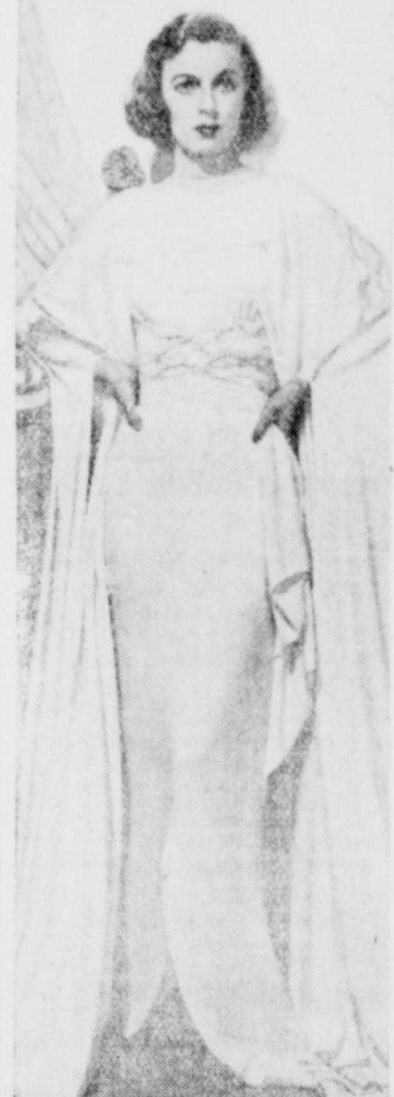

J. C. Adams came to Burkburnett from Fort Worth June 1, 1919. He was hired by M. C. Anderson, an old friend of his, to manage the Corner Drug Store, and served in that capacity until January 13, 1920, on which date he purchased the Rexall Drug Store from a man named Clark, who had owned the store since before the boom.

While Mr. Adams' store is not the oldest store in town, counting the number of years without a change of ownership, it is the oldest store in town according to time of establishment. The definite date of its founding is not known, but ads for the Rexall Drug Store appear in files of the Burkburnett Star as far back as 1913.

The store has been moved only once since Mr. Adams bought it. That was in July, 1928, when it was moved one door west.

Mr. Adams says of his business, "Our store has been owned and operated by the same person for nineteen years. We've never gone bankrupt and we've never had a fire."

For years, Adams' Drug Store was the place where we bought our phonographs, Victrolas, and our phonograph records. Those of

us who remember those days do so with a touch of nostalgia. When the phonograph gave way to radio, Adams' Drug Store anticipated the trend and purchased the first stock of radios ever offered for sale in this town.

Today, the store is equipped with the latest things in furnishings and stock. It carries a complete line of all the merchandise one expects to find in a modern drug store. They serve fountain drinks and sandwiches; operate a newsstand and Mr. Adams himself is a registered pharmacist. He has a staff of seven employees.

Threshing hands are getting \$2.00 per day and board. A day's work constitutes from before sunrise till after sundown.

The thrasher men are charging this year for threshing, so Hawkeye has been informed, 10c for wheat and 5c for oats and \$1.50 per acre where your wheat or oats are combined. The price of wheat on the market is only 54c per bushel and oats are 15c per bushel. high position and influence in the House. His wide acquaintance with Members helps him amazingly in doing this.

Appropriations Committee
"Early last year, upon the death of the Honorable J. P. Buchanan, Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, the House Ways and Means Committee, which is the Committee

that selects the Members of all other committees of the House, informed the Texas Delegation that they would elect in Mr. Buchanan's place the Member from Texas recommended by them. I was unanimously endorsed for the vacancy on the Appropriations Committee by the Texas Delegation, and was endorsed by the Ways and Means Committee to be placed on the Appropriations Committee, where I have served since that time. I was then selected to serve on the Agricultural and Permanent Appropriations sub-committees of the Appropriations Committee. I am proud of the confidence thus shown in me, and the opportunity for service in your behalf that it has given me.

The Pledge

"Members of Congress are your public servants and should be guided by the Democratic Platform, which says: 'We believe that a party platform is a covenant with the people to be faithfully kept by the party when entrusted with power, and that the people are entitled to know in plain words the terms of the

contract to which they are asked to subscribe."

The President Speaks

Two years ago, at the repeated demands of the opposition, the President in his Madison Square Garden speech clearly set forth his interpretations of our platform when he said: 'Our vision for the future contains more than promises.'

"This is our answer to those who, silent about their own plans, ask us to state our objectives."

"Of course, we will continue to seek to improve working conditions for the workers of America—to reduce hours overlong, to increase wages that spell starvation, to end the labor of children, to wipe out sweatshops. Of course we will continue every effort to end monopoly in business, to support collective bargaining, to stop unfair competition, to abolish dishonorable trade practices. For all these we have only just begun to fight."

"Of course, we will continue to work for cheaper electricity in the homes and on the farms of America, for better and cheaper transportation, for low interest rates, for sounder home financing, for better banking, for the regulation of security issues for reciprocal trade among nations, for the wiping out of slums. For all these we have just begun to fight."

"Of course, we will continue our efforts in behalf of the farmers of America. With their continued co-operation we will do all in our power to end the piling up of huge surpluses which spell ruinous prices for their crops. We will persist in successful action for better land use, for reforestation, for the conservation of water all the way from its source to the sea, for drought and flood control, for better marketing facilities for farm commodities, for a definite reduction of farm tenancy, for encouragement of farmer co-operatives, for crop insurance, and a stable food supply. For all these we have just begun to fight."

My Record of Service

"My record of service, rendered in your behalf, is my platform upon which I ask your support, and you will find the Democratic platform as above interpreted by the President, was and is the 'beacon light' upon which I have actively fought to carry out the pledges thus made. A review of my platform two years ago and the record made, clearly shows

that I have kept faith with you 100 per cent. The best evidence that I have voted for the best interests of the masses of the people is that not one single vote I have cast the past two years has been challenged by any opponent, to the present time. 3. Agriculture—Cost of Production. A simple agricultural bill to put a floor under the price of farm commodities, and gambling and speculation, and effectively assure the farmer cost of production plus a reasonable profit.

4. Expansion of Industrial Production; Monopoly Control. Legislation to bring about, through the co-operation of government, business, and labor, a co-ordinated expansion of industrial production and an effective control over both monopoly price increases and monopolistic curtailment of production of needed goods and services.

5. Revision of Our Tax Laws, eliminating exemptions and loopholes and raising our revenue based upon ability to pay.

6. Public Works; Employment; Housing; Natural Resources. A long-range flexible program of public works, set up by Congressional enactment, made self-liquidating to the largest possible extent, capable of expansion and contraction in accordance with the needs of our people for employment and of our business for assistance in stabilizing its market, and aimed primarily to meet such outstanding national needs as slum elimination and low-cost housing and the need for conservation and development of natural resources.

7. Taxing Profits Out of War, and limiting profits to 10 per cent on all government war material in peace time.

8. Preserve American Liberties For All. Preservation of American democracy and civil liberties as set out in the Bill of Rights. The preservation of these rights should extend to all persons everywhere in the Nation, conservative, liberal, or otherwise, and of whatever race, creed, or color.

"I have been glad to co-operate with every portion of my district in securing whatever relief has been requested and the many projects such as schools, gymnasiums, road improvements, municipal light plants, rural electrification, and all other kinds of relief and services furnished by the government, too numerous to mention, as shown by an itemized statement sent in the speech recently mailed each voter in the district."

"Since I have had the honor to represent you, more than 56 million dollars in federal funds has been expended up until January 1, 1938, in the Thirteenth Congressional District. I have supported each project and all legislation that brought all this money into the Thirteenth District."

"Recently, I secured the approval of the Wise-Montague land use project under which the government will purchase 45 thousand acres of land, which will mean an expenditure in this area of more than 250 thousand dollars, and employment for many of our people."

"I appreciate more than words can express the confidence you have always shown in me, and have tried to show that appreciation by the kind and character of service rendered in battling for your rights, whether on the floor of the House or in the Committee, or in the office looking after your every interest."

Scurrilous Attack

"While I have remained at my post of duty looking after your in-

terests I find that one of my opponents, while handing out his empty promises with one hand, in which he promises 'not to blame others for things they haven't done,' with the other hand he has been spreading a three page, legal sized, mimeographed pamphlet entitled 'McFarlane Data' which purports to be quoted from a Washington reporter for the Chicago Tribune. This unsigned, scurrilous, and maliciously libelous statement, circulated by this opponent and purporting to quote from a reporter of the Chicago Tribune has been completely repudiated and denied by this reporter as being without any foundation in fact and completely false. I have a letter from this newspaper reporter completely repudiating the purported statement in which he says that these statements 'are statements made without any foundation in fact so far as I know of my own personal knowledge, and so far as I know of my own personal knowledge these statements cannot be sustained in fact.' I will be glad to show anyone who meets me this reporter's letter."

"In conclusion, fellow citizens, I want to express to you my heartfelt gratitude for the opportunities for service that you have given me, the honors that you have bestowed upon me and to assure you that I will in the future, as in the past, when re-elected to this high office, continue the battle for equal rights and opportunities for all and special privileges for none."

Fruit Growers Organize to Sell Grapefruit Juice

Weslaco, Texas, June 21—Rio Grande Valley grapefruit juice will go into market baskets all over the nation this summer in a campaign in which growers have just been joined by food merchants who serve twelve million customers every day.

The Texas Grapefruit Growers Stabilization Committee, organized recently to move a bumper "pack" of grapefruit juice from Valley warehouses to the nation's breakfast table, received an im-

mediate enlistment of stores from Maine to California and from Minnesota to the Gulf. Their trained sales forces will be an army of 150,000, on detail to keep grapefruit juice "in the public eye." Store displays and advertising will make a summer-time special of Texas grapefruit juice. It will be featured during three special weeks beginning Thursday, July 14, August 4 and August 25th.

The growers' first move in going to market with their juice was a resolution asking the help of chain stores in introducing Texas grapefruit juice in a nationwide sales campaign. The resolution was addressed to Albert L. Walters, secretary of the Texas Chain Stores Committee, and through that state organization to the National Association of Food Chains.

Telegraphic response came to R. W. Lindsay of Mission, chairman of the growers' committee, and Glenn G. White, of Weslaco, secretary, from John A. Logan, executive vice-president of the food chains association. "The

food chains recognize the mutual benefits of the grapefruit juice promotion and their own fruit juice promotion established between prominent growers in agriculture and chain food stores. 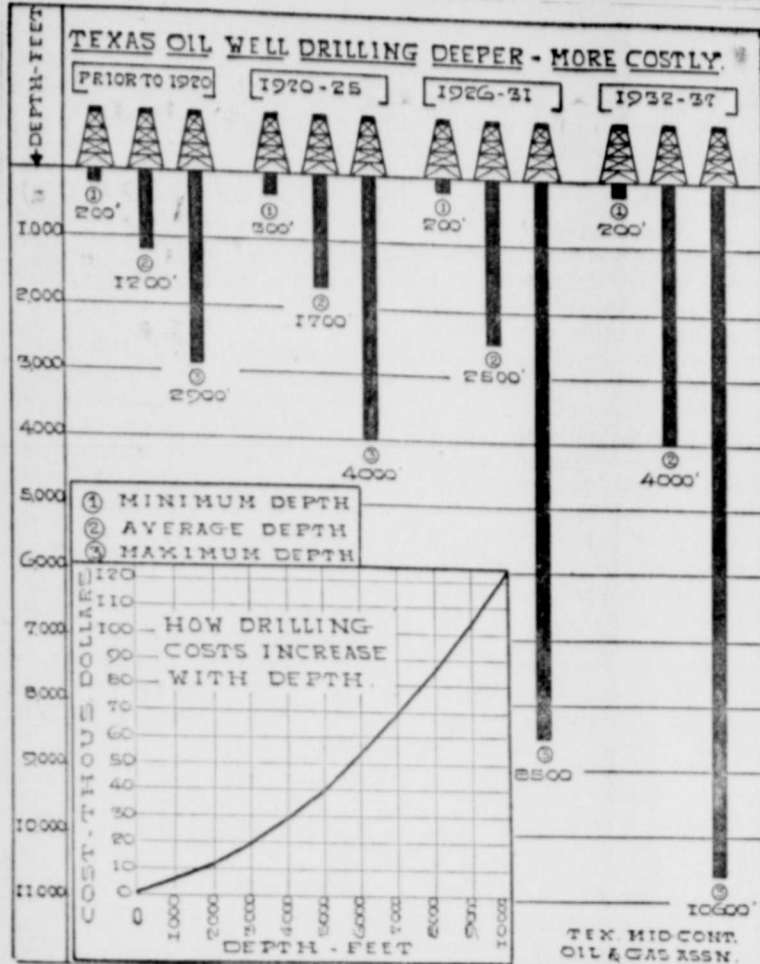

Dallas, Texas, June 23—The average depth from which oil is produced in Texas today is three and one-third times greater than the experience recorded prior to 1920, according to a survey just completed by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

Today, according to the survey, Texas oil is produced from wells having an average depth of 4,000 feet, with a maximum producing depth of 10,600 feet. Prior to 1920 the average depth of producing oil wells in Texas was only 1,200 feet, with a maximum producing depth of 2,900 feet. Since 1926, the average depth of Texas oil wells has shown an increase of 1,500 feet, while the maximum depths recorded during this period have shown an increase of 2,100 feet.

The extent to which depth affects drilling and completion costs is shown by the fact that the cost per thousand feet of hole ranges from \$6,000 for the first thousand feet to \$20,000 per thousand feet when the depth reaches 11,000 feet. Thus, while a thousand foot well may cost \$6,000, this does not mean that an 11,000 foot well would cost \$66,000, but actually entails a cost of \$143,000 because of ascending ratios of cost to depth of hole recorded by actual experience. In a 4,000 foot well, where the first thousand feet of hole costs \$6,000, the last thousand feet costs \$10,000, making the total cost of such a well about \$29,000.

This is due to the fact that greater depths involve not only more time for drilling and more equipment, but heavier and more expensive equipment which is necessary to stand the stress and strain of penetrating deep subsurface formations. Deep drilling involves great hazards, among which is the breakage and loss of drilling equipment, entailing tedious and expensive delays and frequently results in the complete loss of a prospective well. One "fishing" job, to recover broken equipment from a deep well often costs as much as the total cost of the hole.

The deepest producing wells in Texas today are located in Brazoria County, in the Gulf Coast, where oil is being produced from a depth of 10,600 feet. Wells ranging in depth from 7,000 to over 9,000 feet are common today in the Gulf Coast oil fields. Deep wells are being drilled today in practically all sections of the State, with the average trend of all drilling showing a constantly greater depth at a constantly increased cost to the oil industry.

4-H Clubsters Should Get The Particulars Livestock Awards

Around 1000 4-H Clubsters will receive awards this autumn starting with county prizes in the ninth annual National 4-H Meat Animal Project Contest, conducted by the Extension Services of the various states. Particulars may be obtained of Local Club Leaders.

A watch fob with gold emblem of achievement will be awarded in every county of the United States to the Clubster whose record in livestock projects is designated as outstanding by the County agent.

Records of county champions in this state will be judged for state

honors in the State Club Leader's office previous to November 1st. The winner will compete with other state champions in his extension division for a Chicago trip. Three of the highest rating trip winners will be awarded cash college scholarships of \$300, \$200 and \$100. No fee or obligation of any kind is required of contestants except that they be bona fide 4-H club members carrying on livestock projects.

In nine years 240 boys have won gold watches as state prizes, 31 boys and one girl have received trips to the National 4-H Club Congress and International Live Stock Exposition and \$4800 in college scholarships have gone to national winners.

These awards are annually accepted by the State Extension Service from Thos. E. Wilson, as

valued incentives to boys to master problems of successful production, marketing, and exhibition, and develop superior herds and flocks to help them through college or start farming for themselves.

Air travelers from the east to the 1939 World's Fair of the West at San Francisco will follow the identical trail of the earliest pioneer travelers, which was adopted by United Air Lines as the straightest and shortest route.

Methods of farming in various parts of the world will be demonstrated as a part of the food and agricultural exhibit at the 1939 World's Fair of the West on Treasure Island.

cases were cases of drunkenness appealed from the Wichita Falls City Court. He has actually spent less time in the court room trying cases for the State of Texas than he spent on the trial of ONE SUIT IN HIS PRIVATE PRACTICE on his own behalf. Is that the record of an able and conscientious prosecutor? Is that man and his assistant worth over SEVEN THOUSAND DOLLARS PER YEAR IN SALARIES TO THE TAXPAYERS OF THIS COUNTY?

"Honky Tonks" The records reveal that I am the only County Attorney that ever closed the night clubs and road houses in this county. During my term of office, each of them that was operating was enjoined as a nuisance and padlocked under the then existing law. Among them was the swanky Belvedere. Today, the roadhouses, night clubs and honky tonks are flourishing on every highway in the county. It has reached the point that we are afraid to drive on the highways near Wichita Falls at night for fear a drunken driver will speed from out a honky tonk at the side of the road and knock us off the highway. That is a condition that can and must be stopped. Beer and intoxicating liquors being openly sold to your boys and girls, and to persons already visibly intoxicated, in violation of law, by the "honky tonks and blind tigers." Either of those offenses is sufficient to cancel the license of the dealer but not one license has been cancelled by the County Attorney. It makes no difference whether you are "wet" or "dry", the danger is there and it is all under the jurisdiction of the County Attorney. There is more drunkenness and drunk driving than ever before in the history of the county, yet not one effort has the county attorney made to regulate these "honky tonks" and beer joints that violate the law. The law provides for a hearing before your County Judge on application for any license to sell beer and that such license shall be refused upon recommendation of the County Attorney on the grounds that the applicant will not conduct a place not conducive for the morals, peace or safety of the community. There are 220 licenses granted in this county, many of them to ex-bootleggers, to all manner and kind of "honky tonks" and yet not one license has the county attorney contested. In order for a license to sell beer after midnight or on Sundays, the dealer must make a sworn statement that more commodities for human consumption other than beer are sold during the prohibited hours. Upon such statement being made a supplemental license is granted, and there are many supplemental licenses granted in this county to joints that could not even sell a hamburger for they do not have a hot plate on which to cook one. Yet not one of these supplemental licenses have been contested or even investigated by the County Attorney's office, and as a result such places are openly operating in violation of law; selling beer to minors and others at all hours of night and on Sunday, and those places are the festering sores from which your children and mine must be protected.

Failed In Duty The present incumbent draws \$395.00 per month from the tax payers of this county. He is furnished an assistant at \$200 per month and all expenses of the office are paid by the county. If the incumbent can only find time from his private practice to participate in the trial of 14 cases in 18 months, and cannot find the time to faithfully discharge his duties with reference to the liquor law, gambling laws and other violations, then I believe he should be relieved of his public duties and returned to his private practice.

"You know my record of the past. It shows that I worked. Compare it with the record of the 'Man of Promises' and you will find I kept faith with the people. If you so believe, then I only ask vindication of my name and professional ability and for my second term in the office that was taken by the incumbent who won it by promises, none of which were kept."

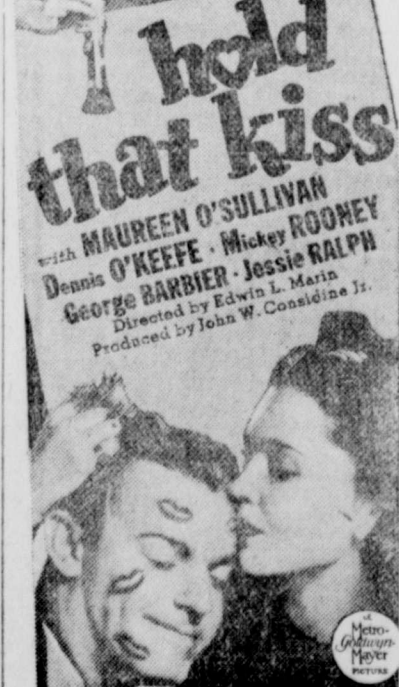
