Sinking Survivors All Accounted For

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—An American skipper and his 22 foreign crewmen were picked up safely Saturday, nearly 12 hours after their small Lebanese freighter sank in the Atlantic Ocean. The 23 survivors of the Ethel C., all reported uninjured, were headed toward Norfolk aboard Coast Guard vessels. Pending the crews' arrival ashore, there was no explanation of what caused the vessel to sink. The 329-foot vessel radiated shortly after 1 a. m. she was taking water faster than the pumps could handle it and the crew was abandoning ship. She gave her position as 19 miles east of Cape Charles. From that time the ship and its crew were unreported until a Navy search plane spotted the boat in the Coast Guard vessels reached the scene soon after and rescued the men aboard. The boat was carrying 23 men and 22 women, including a British subject, the captain's wife.

Easter Eases Texas Political Warfare

Political warfare softened in Texas Saturday for the Easter weekend. Most candidates will attend church services in their hometowns Sunday before resuming their campaigns to stir what is generally regarded this year as a lethargic electorate. The Texas Election Bureau estimated more voters are eligible to cast ballots in the May 7 Democratic primary than ever before. The reform voting strength of 2,701,631 persons is nearly 70,000 above the previous high set in 1956. But most reports indicate little interest has been shown in the statewide races. Supporters of Sen. Lyndon Johnson, unopposed for reelection, hope for a heavy turnout in the primaries as a corresponding heavy attendance can be made in the precinct conventions when the polls close. In a speech at Dayton, Gov. Price Daniel asked voters to support the election of lawmakers who will act to retire the state's multi-million dollar deficit as an emergency matter. He said that "is the only way for quick restoration of a balanced budget and the state's young program in this state." 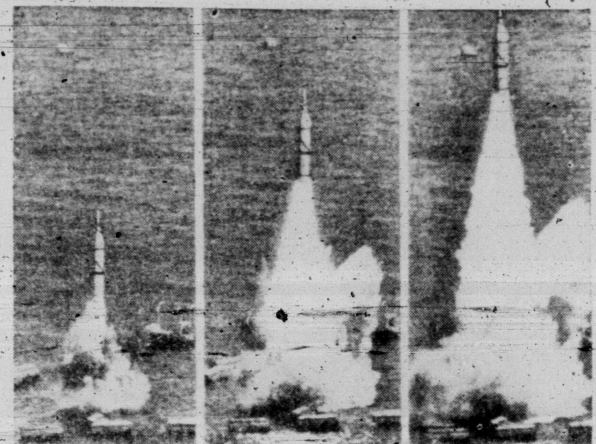

ST. CLAIR, Mo. (AP) — An alert motorist put officers on the trail of a pair of armed desperados and a bloodhound tracked down the pair Friday night while a helicopter kept them spotted from the air.

### Heavens Full Of Orbiting Satellites

WASHINGTON (AP)—The "skies" are buzzing with new American space travelers. In five weeks, the United States has launched three satellites and a probe successfully.

The lineup:

Pioneer V, a beachball-size sphere launched March 11, now orbiting the sun, checking conditions between the paths traveled by the earth and Venus.

Tiros 1, a weather observer launched April 1, now orbiting the earth, taking pictures of the planet and its cloud cover from 450 miles away.

Transit-B, a navigation satellite launched April 13, now orbiting the earth, radiating data intended to help submarines, ships and planes fix their positions precisely.

Discoverer XI, a satellite launched from California Friday, now moving around the earth in a polar orbit.

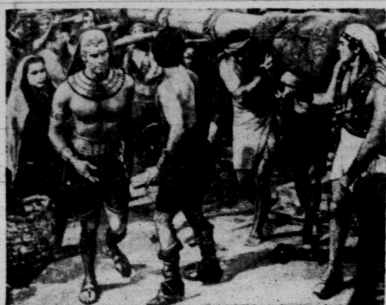

## Weather Is Highlighted By Violence

Earlier, weather prospects were warm and damp with scattered showers in the eastern third of the country and clear to partly cloudy and cooler in the western two-thirds.

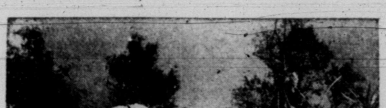
A second twister was sighted Friday night near Columbia, in central Missouri, but apparently did not touch ground.

## Bendix' Daughter Gets Hefty Again

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Remember William Bendix' daughter who underwent a radical stomach operation that dropped her weight from 207 pounds to 118 in a year — a loss of 89 pounds?

Bendix, relaxing in his dressing room between scenes of "Overland Trail," told a reporter that his daughter has since eaten herself back to 250 pounds.

"You can't blame the doctor or the operation," says Bendix. "Lorraine, like most heavy people, just loves to eat. She'll eat 10 meals a day — even steals food from her own refrigerator."

Lorraine herself once said that she ate around the clock, mostly starches and sweets. Then her blood pressure got so high that doctors feared for her life. Her height is 5 feet 2.

In 1956, she was three pounds shy of 300. Her doctor advised a new operation that caused food to bypass the digestive process. "I figured my life was at stake so I underwent the operation," said Lorraine.

In May, 1957, Lorraine, then 27, had another operation to reduce her digestive tract to normal. For awhile her father reports, she stayed slim, but the love of food got the better of her.

Bendix reports that he and his daughter received thousands of letters from all over the world about the operation.

"The doctor also heard of which thought it too daring an operation for weight reduction. Now they'll say it was a failure because Lorraine is getting back up there but that's not the doctor's fault."

Bendix, who is no Tony Curtis around the waistline, sympathizes with his daughter. "I love to eat," she says. "I love the smell of cooking. It's one of the great joys of life. It's too bad it has to be so unhealthy."

# Moslem Held Key Opening Sepulchre

 JERUSALEM (AP)—A Moslem unlocked the door of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre today to open the way for Christians of many cultures and sects to celebrate the resurrection of Christ. Since the time of Saladin, the key to the church has been in Moslem hands to avoid friction among Christian communities who have traditional rights here.

Shortly after the door was unlocked, bearded Latin Patriarch Alberto Gori—whose predecessors crowned the crusader kings of Jerusalem—led a procession to the church.

Beside the Stone of Unction, where Jesus' body was anointed for burial, the patriarch blessed the holy fire symbolic of the resurrection.

This was the first of the resurrection services to be held this weekend in Jerusalem. Sunday Protestants will hold an Easter sunrise service beside the Garden Tomb—the empty tomb hewn out of rock much like the one in which Jesus was buried.

Tonight beneath a full moon, Ethiopians on the roof of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre will conduct the "search for the body of Christ."

Ethiopian monks stood on the roof today reading the Easter drama from ancient Ethiopic scriptures. This evening they will gather in full vestments, carrying red umbrellas, leather drums and banners, and symbolically mourn for the lost body of Christ.

When the Scripture reads: "He is not here, for He is risen," they will break into rejoicing.

Inside the church thousands of Oriental Christians gathered around the traditional Holy Sepulchre this morning for the service of the holy fire, which for centuries was considered a miraculous event.

County Agricultural Agent, Billy Roach, says it is very important that each cattle producer be present if at all possible, so that each one will be acquainted with the program and how it will be administered if the group decides to enter the Brucellosis program. There will be a petition available at the meeting for signatures should the cattle producers wish to start a control program at this time.

The surge in car sales was especially encouraging to business as a whole, which has been watching the trend as a barometer of the economic climate.

Dealers sold 160,420 cars in the first 10 days of April, a gain of 11 per cent over a year ago.

Prospects for continuation of the sales boom appear good and are backed by a public interest in the U.S. compact as each manufacturer bows in this field," said Ward's Automotive Reports.

Output this week was estimated at 143,000, compared with 133,299 last week and 136,101 in the comparable week a year ago. The popular compact accounted for 40,000 of the total, a new weekly high.

Stock sales on the New York Stock Exchange this week amounted to 10,451,000 shares compared with 14,638,070 the previous week and 17,826,640 a year ago. Bond sales amounted to \$29,902,200, par value compared with \$28,414,750 the previous week and \$32,342,500 a year ago.

## Chinese Cargo Ship Collides With Barge

HOUSTON (AP)—A Nationalist Chinese cargo ship and a barge collided in the Houston Ship Channel early Saturday. There were no injuries.

Coast Guard officials at Galveston said the SS Hai Ching was not damaged. Two commercial tugs from Galveston were sent to tow in the barge. The tug Ray, which was towing the barge, was not involved. No one was on the barge at the time.

The Hai Ching called Friday from Houston with general cargo. The Coast Guard began an investigation to determine the cause of the collision that occurred near Red Fish reef about midway between Houston and Galveston.

## Drilling Is Down From '59

AUSTIN (AP)—The Railroad Commission said Saturday Texas drillers brought in 195 oil and 35 gas wells during the week but the 1960 total continues well behind last year's pace.

Some 2,813 oil and 523 gas wells have been brought in this year. This date a year ago there were 3,447 new oil and 582 gas wells.

Wildcaters struck oil in eight drillings on unproven territory and hit a gas well. Drillers plugged 139 wells, including 100 dry holes. The daily allowable increased 6,339 to 2,804,069 barrels. The total number of wells increased by 131 to 194,679.

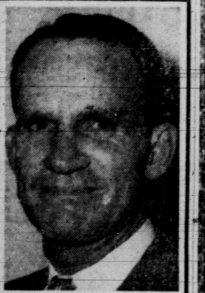
## Wolfhound Leader Undergoing Treatment

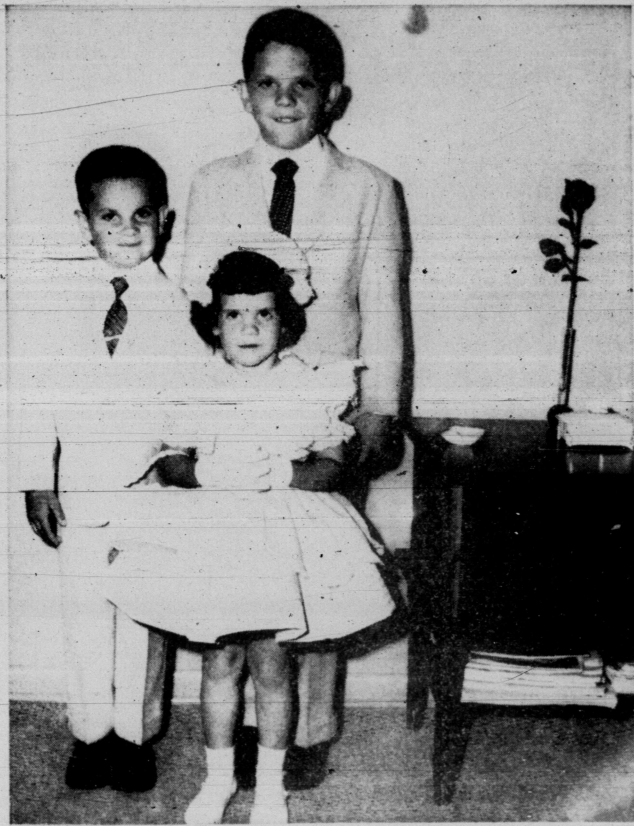

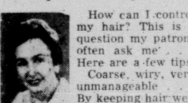

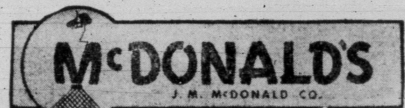

## Country Club Watchman's Slaying Still A Mystery

DALLAS, AP — A night watchman's pistol was too heavy. A man and a woman swimming nude in a country club pool. A flashing glance of a friend's face. All these things puzzled officers and still puzzle them more than a year after MRS. FRANKIE WILLIE BOY STOREY, 30, was found slain at the Casa View Country Club in nearby Mesquite.

Other workers found the night watchman living face down within 10 feet of the club's front door Feb. 8, 1959.

The nightwatchman apparently had just purchased a package of cigarettes from a vending machine alongside the entrance wall when his killer slipped up behind him and felled him with a series of vicious blows on his head.

"Police found the cigarettes under his body, the package unopened."

Officers speculated that he had come upon burglars who slipped into the clubhouse building by a window.

That speculation came from the fact that the clubhouse had been ransacked and an unsuccessful attempt made to hammer open a safe.

"I believe it was someone he knew," his sister Mrs. T. W. Houser said a year later. "Why would professional burglars kill a little man like Willie? He wasn't even carrying a gun."

Storey, she said, stood 5 feet 7 inches and weighed less than 130 pounds. He had been having stomach trouble," she recalled, pointing out the fact that he probably wouldn't have tried to do battle with an assailant.

"He often said he wouldn't carry

his pistol because it was too heavy. Mrs. Houser recalled she quoted her brother as saying only a few days before his death: "No use carrying a gun anyway. Nobody would want to hurt me."

Mesquite Police Chief Tex Morris remembers well the pistol Storey carried. The police chief gave the nightwatchman the weapon after burglars were reported in the area weeks earlier.

Chief Morris, who along with Sheriff Bill Decker and former Texas Ranger Capt. Jay Banks has questioned more than 200 suspects about the killing, said Storey left his gun and holster in an office desk drawer the morning he was slain.

But Mrs. Houser said it might not have made much difference even if he had been carrying his gun.

"He trusted everybody and never hurt anybody," she said.

He didn't have any enemies," she recalled, "except for one boy who Willie responsible for sending him to prison." Mrs. Houser said the youth was sent to prison for stealing a car.

Lawmen said the youth had been cleared of any connection and was one of more than 100 suspects freed of guilty knowledge by the detector tests.

But Mrs. Houser did come up with one interesting observation.

"Willie told us about teasing a couple who used to go swimming in the night in the pool after hours," she recalled. "He said he had told the man he might tell the man's wife. The man's wife was not his swimming partner."

The swimmer was cleared of implication.

Chief Morris recounts that some-

one tried to chisel around the edges of the safe in an attempt to lift it out of its concrete bed. The safe held about \$500. He speculated that the chiseling device may have been the weapon that killed Storey. The weapon was never found.

Storey's billfold was not touched by the killer. "It probably didn't have much money in it, but it seems like they would check to see," his sister said.

Meanwhile, enforcement agencies are continuing to try to solve the case. The Rangers reportedly are looking into a new lead that might shed light on the case.

## Original Boy Scout Rector Of Church

WICHITA FALLS, AP — One of the original Boy Scouts is rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd here.

He is Dr. Claude A. Beesley, who has been connected in one way or another with Scouting for 52 years.

The Scouting movement began in England in 1908 when Lord Robert Baden-Powell, a general in the Boer War, wrote an article about the siege of Mafeking.

Dr. Beesley recalls that the article told how the general trained young men to carry messages in the besieged city. Baden-Powell thought that something like this program should be available in peacetime.

The offspring of this article was a contest sponsored by the magazine, Boy's Life. Dr. Beesley said several boys were selected and went to Brownsea Island and formed a model scout camp. Baden-Powell was scoutmaster and the boys formed one patrol. When they returned from the camp, they were sort of missionaries for scouting.

One of the boys at the camp was from Kettering. Dr. Beesley a home town. The future rector joined the movement immediately.

Since then, Dr. Beesley has worked as a scout scoutmaster, committee man and in other related jobs.

The rector recalls that Scouting came to America in 1910 after an American visited England. He met a Scout and was impressed with his courteous. He came back and got the organization going in the U.S.

"In the beginning, scouts were not well received by the public," the rector relates. "The people who criticized most were parents and farmers. My parents said I was too old a boy to be playing soldier. The farmers said the scouts were tearing down the fences and tramping the wheat fields. This was not true."

Dr. Beesley began studying for the ministry in 1912, but his studies were interrupted by World War I. He moved to Canada, and was a private in the Canadian Army and was taken prisoner. He was a prisoner three years and eight months.

After the war he returned to Canada then in 1923 moved to Dallas as assistant rector of the Church of the Incarnation.

Shortly thereafter he came to Wichita Falls.

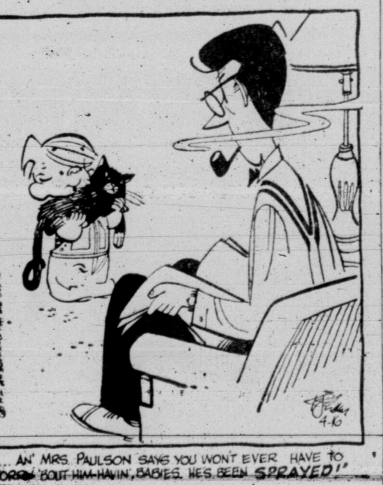

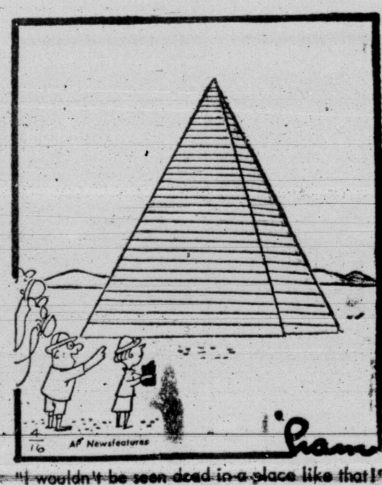

### Let Caterpillars Get the DDT's To Save Greenery

Parliament, both pests can be mopped up in the bud with one application of an insecticide. DDT if your landscape has one or more of the following favorite host-trees: ash, birch, maple, apple, cherry, plum and pear—don't lose time in laying down the poison barrage. Prompt sprays measures will destroy the caterpillars before they can do serious damage.

Caterpillars are also called "measuring worms" or "inch worms" because of the peculiar looping action by which they pull their bodies.

The caterpillar is about one inch long, is of brownish color above and greenish below. Three narrow white stripes and three yellow stripes mark the body.

### James-Style Robbery Is All Fouled Up

SELSA, Mo. (AP)—Frank and Jesse James must have turned over in their graves. A bunch of amateur "outlaws" celebrating the last run of Gulf, Mobile & Ohio's train No. 9, tried to "hold it up" James style at this Kansas City way station Thursday night. Talk about fouled-up holdups: By placing a tie across the tracks too soon the amateurs almost derailed a freight train which preceded the passenger; there were so many passengers aboard the three-car No. 9 that "Jesse" and "Frank" couldn't get on "rob" them, and had to order their victims outside; in fact, the train was so crowded, the conductor never did get all the tickets punched; there was trouble in the dark telling the "outlaw" passengers from the spectators; so the "outlaws" wound up "robbing" everyone in sight. When "Frank" portrayed by Gordon Vandevener, hollered, "Let's split up and meet back at the rendezvous," the 15 members of the Jackson County sheriff's posse galloped off into the night through a tangle of automobiles and a mob onlookers.

The 9-car freight, running 30 minutes ahead of No. 9 which was en route from Bloomington, Ill. to Kansas City, struck the tie and ground it under its wheels. Crewmen said the tie would have derailed the lighter passenger train had it arrived first. After the freight pulled out No. 9's headlight appeared and it chugged to a stop. Firing their blanks, the "James boys" rode in. Selsa, then Glendale, was the site of the first train robbery by the James gang.

### Import Hike For Oil Stirs Protests

WASHINGTON (AP)—The recently ordered increase in the import quota for residual oil—used primarily for commercial and industrial fuel—has stirred protests in some quarters. Stephen Dunn, president of the National Coal Assn., said coal producers were shocked and disappointed. He said they couldn't understand how the government could take such action without holding hearings and without consulting those whose interests are so vitally affected.

Alvin Hopf, president of the Independent Petroleum Assn. of America, said all available statistics show there is no over-all shortage of residual oil. He said a heavier flow of residual oil imports would endanger the long range stability of the entire oil import program. The increased quota was ordered by the Interior Department a week ago. The order boosted the import quota by 132,000 barrels daily for the April-June 30 quarter.

Dunn called the action "hasty and ill-advised" and said it "substantiates the coal industry's contention that there should be an immediate and impartial study of the nation's total fuel requirements." He also said "apparently a limited number of the large international oil companies persuaded officials of the government to change their previously expressed position." He quoted Elmer Bennett, undersecretary of the interior, as saying recently that the department had no information which would appear to warrant upward adjustment in the residual allocation for the next six months.

### Soviet Car Shipment Due

NEW YORK (AP)—The first volume shipment of Soviet-built automobiles will arrive in the United States next month, importer Robert J. Castle of Syracuse, N.Y., said today.

The car is the four-cylinder Moskvich which will carry a New York port of entry price of \$1,500. Delivered in New York, the car, slightly larger than most European imports but a shade smaller than domestic compacts, will cost about \$1,620 including taxes. The Moskvich is one of the 311 models from 36 manufacturers which will be displayed at the International Auto Show opening here Saturday. Its styling is somewhat similar to the Fords of the early '50s and the show models come complete with the Soviet red star as a radiator ornament.

"I had quite an argument with the Russians to persuade them to take the red star off the models they ship me for sale," Castle said. "I finally told them we didn't put the American flag on our Fords." Another new foreign car was introduced here Thursday: the Toyota Tiara from Japan. Toyopet has been in the American market for two years with a larger car but the Tiara is sized and specced with Volkswagen and Renault.

Howard Lane, eastern distributor for Toyopet, said volume shipments of the Tiara will begin in August. Original name of Tacoma, Wash. Municipal airport.

### Farmers Making Progress, But Some Areas Need Rain

COLLEGE STATION (AP)—Texas farmers made progress with plowing and re-planting as open weather held on for another week. But by mid-week, the need for moisture had become an important factor in planting, said Director John Hutchinson of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Except the Panhandle and favored areas along the Gulf Coast and in East Texas, rains were needed, district agents reported to Hutchinson, to insure stands of cotton and grain sorghums and to push the growth of crops now up to a stand.

Range, vegetation, because of rapid growth, also needed moisture. Cattle showed improvement as grazing improved and feedings declined. Cotton and grain sorghum planting became more general. Small grains made rapid growth with heading reported in the Rolling Plains. Prospects for a fruit crop were good. Watermelons were up an earlier producing counties. The southwestern and western counties in deep South Texas are still very dry. Lack of rain is delaying dryland farming in these counties; cattle are losing weight and stock water is low in Maverick and Webb counties. In other counties, livestock range from fair to good in condition.

Heavy planting of corn and sorghum continued in the upper coastal counties and rice and cotton planting increased. Some fields remained too wet for work. Early corn and sorghums are up. Pastures are improving swiftly and cattle show gains. Some good stands of corn and sorghums are reported from South Central Texas. It is too dry for cotton planting. Watermelons are up.

### Nabbed For Bomb Crack

CHICAGO (AP)—A 53-year-old engineer was arrested by FBI agents Thursday night after he told an airline clerk at Midway Airport he had a bomb in a paper bag. Robert Carey Clark of Raytown, Mo., was charged by the FBI with making a false bomb report at an airport. He was held in jail. Conviction carries a maximum penalty of a \$1,000 fine and one year in prison.

Police said the bag contained a toupee. Police said Clark told them he made the remark as a joke after a reservation clerk had asked him if he had any luggage. Federal authorities have ordered a crackdown on travelers who jokingly report bombs in their luggage. The FBI said a half dozen persons have been arrested throughout the country in the last week for creating a bomb scare at airports.

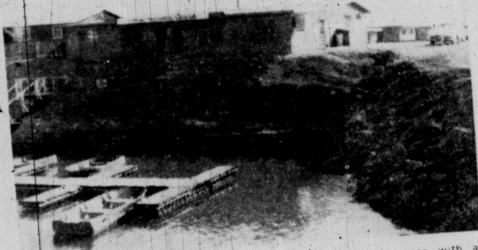

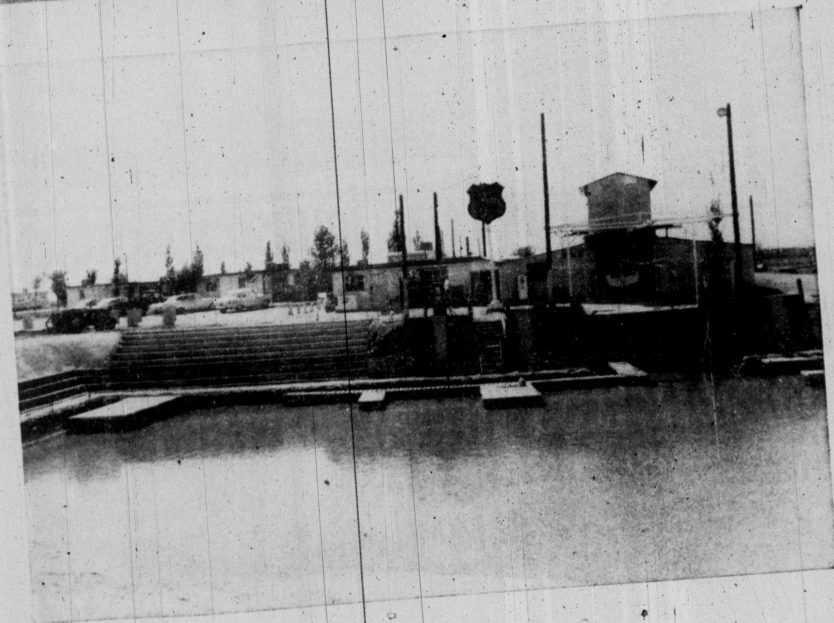
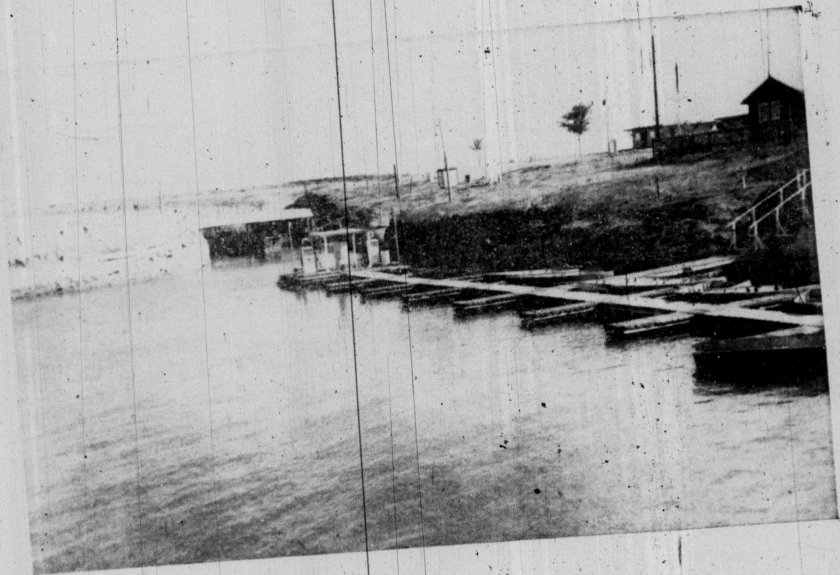

## Boat Trailer Has Important Role

The boat trailer is playing a big and increasingly important part in making outboard boating America's most popular recreation.

Safe and carefree trailing of a boat, whether for a short trip or a joint haul across the country, depends much on selecting the right trailer and loading it correctly.

The trailer should fit the boat with frame and springs heavy enough for the weight they will carry. This means, not just the weight of the boat, but the combined weight of the trailer, motor, boat and all contents.

The trailer should support the hull along most of its length, preferably along the keel, with enough additional padded contact blocks to hold the boat steady and guard against racking the frames or seams.

All equipment aboard should be

light and license plate at the rear of the trailer.

When the outfit has been secured and is ready to roll, take a few practice spins before any long trips are undertaken.

The most important thing to remember is that the car and trailer are about 20 feet longer than the car alone, and weigh considerably more. Corners should be taken as sharply and it takes longer to stop and to accelerate.

Up to 2000 pounds of combined weight can be towed by most ordinary cars without undue strain on brakes or transmission. For heavier loads the trailer should be equipped with separate electric brakes.

A second trailer hitch on the front of the car simplifies launching and hauling out. The driver can see what he is doing and the car's rear wheels remain on firm ground even though the front wheels may be almost in the water.

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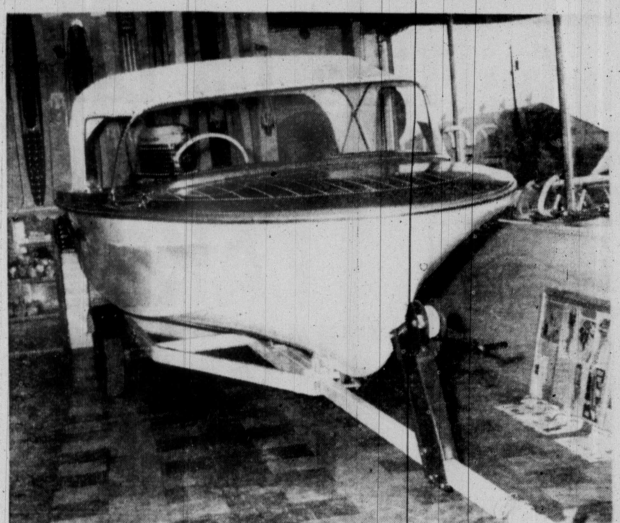

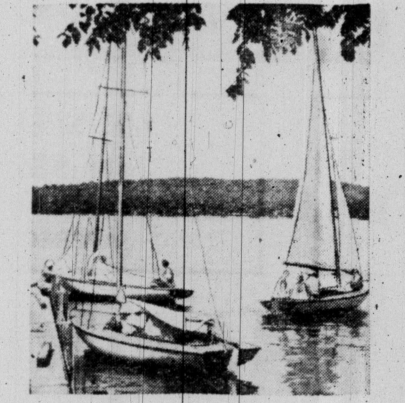

**SK. DIVING** is gaining in popularity every day, adding to the demand for outboard motors. The sport has among its enthusiasts those who enjoy it for study of marine life, searching for treasure or spear fishing.

## Diving Devotees Increase Rapidly

There are more than half a million amateur skin and "lung" divers in this country — plus an equal number who participate occasionally in this fast-growing water sport.

Equipped with fins, masks and snorkels, or underwater breathing equipment, the skin divers spear fish, study marine life, explore wrecks of sunken ships, and photograph the beautiful sights to be seen only from beneath the surface of the water.

For shallow diving or spearfishing, when to 10 or 15 feet, all that is needed is a tight-fitting face mask with a glass window, flippers to help the diver control his movements under water and a breathing tube to breathe while floating.

It is not necessary to be a crack swimmer. With some practice, the beginner will learn to hold his breath for a minute or more while he swims down. To stay under longer or for a diving deeper than 15 feet, a "lung" or self-contained breathing apparatus is required. For diving with the "lung," an adjustable weight belt is needed to adjust to body buoyancy. This belt, as well as the "lung" should be held on by quick release type buckles.

Strongly recommended additional items include a strong sheath knife, a depth gauge and water-

proof watch, protective garments for wear in cold water, and an inner tube or float, with an anchor line and weight.

The standard tank used with a "lung" holds enough air for about one hour under water near the surface. Most sports diving is at 30 or 40 feet or less. At such depths marine and fish life is more abundant; the water is warmer, there is usually enough light for good visibility and the diver does not need to worry about decompression problems.

Skin diving is a strenuous sport and calls for considerable exertion under water. But experts say that anyone who is in good health need not hesitate to try it.

Just be sure to observe the safety rules. Here are just a few: Have complete physical check up before diving with a "lung." Never dive alone—use the "buddy system." Know where your body is at all times. Master diving with fins, mask and snorkel before attempting "lung" diving. Familiarize yourself with all equipment. Practice with it in shallow water. Use only quick release buckles. Practice getting out of them quickly.

When using underwater breathing equipment, breathe slowly. Never hold your breath when surfacing from any depth.

Nadler said he is working on a salary-commission basis. He didn't say how much the salary is.

"I took the job partly because it means getting out and seeing people and partly because I can use the money," he said.

## Mrs. Aadland Scolds Police After Arrest

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "I haven't done nothing—I'll sue for false arrest," declared the angry mother of 17-year-old Beverly Aadland as she was led off to jail on charges of contributing to her daughter's delinquency.

Police found Florence Aadland expecting them when they arrived Thursday at the apartment she shared with Beverly, last mistress of the late Errol Flynn.

It was the apartment in which William Stanciu, handsome aspiring actor, was fatally shot last Saturday, Beverly told detectives that Stanciu was accidentally hit while they struggled nude on a bed for his revolver.

Beverly has been in juvenile custody since the shooting. The district attorney issued a complaint against her ex-showgirl mother after viewing pictures of a wild party at the Aadland apartment.

Before going to jail Mrs. Aadland leveled this parting shot at reporters who had waited at the apartment.

"And quit saying I'm 53, because I'm not. I'm only 46."

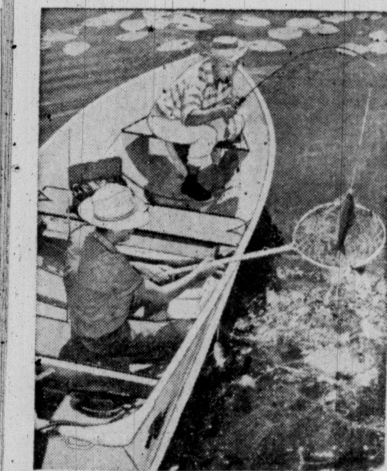

## Radioactive Truck Stolen

AUSTIN (AP) — A white and tan panel truck containing radioactive material was stolen April 2 and no trace has been found since then, the Department of Public Safety said Thursday.

The DPS asked Texans to watch for the 1957 Chevrolet, license IW 4221, which was stolen in Gainesville. It contained a four-pound radioactive device used in underground exploration for oil. The radium beryllium is "something not to be handled carelessly," said Herbert Bevis, State Health Department radiation authority. He said as long as it remains in the red-colored spherical-shaped lead container there is little danger.

But he said "Any prolonged exposure to the unshielded source could produce serious effects."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans for Democratic Action, a liberal political organization, says it has weighed Lyndon Johnson in the balance and had found the Texas senator "wanting."

The organization said the voting record of the Senate, majority leader stamps him as the most conservative of the candidates for the Democratic presidential nomination.

The organization is not expected to endorse any candidates for the Democratic nomination. Two of its vice chairmen, Sens. Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota and Wayne Morse of Oregon, are candidates for the top spot. ADA said Johnson as a young congressman was "much more inclined to follow the leadership of President Franklin D. Roosevelt and the New Deal than he is now to align himself with liberal dissent to the policies of the Eisenhower administration."

Mrs. Todd, a dancing instructor, and her husband had brought Ralph, one of her pupils, to Odessa for a TV talent show.

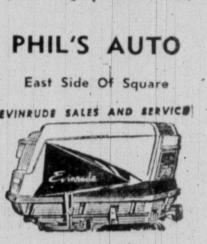
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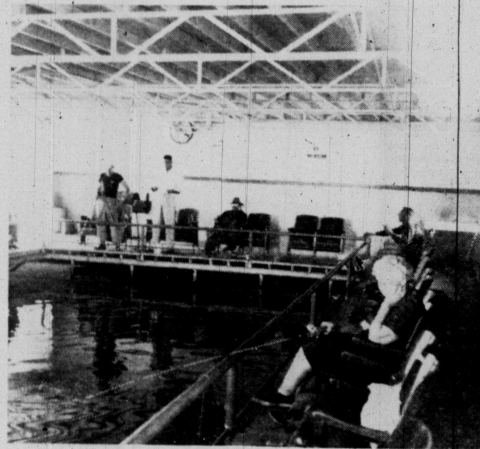
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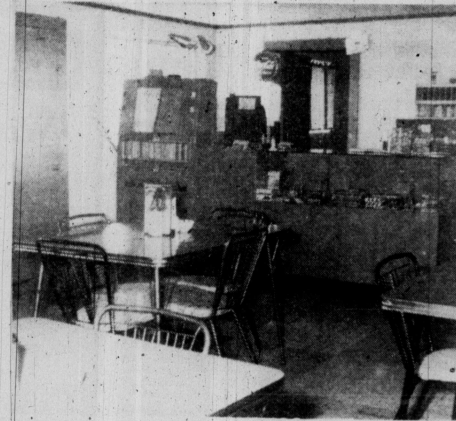
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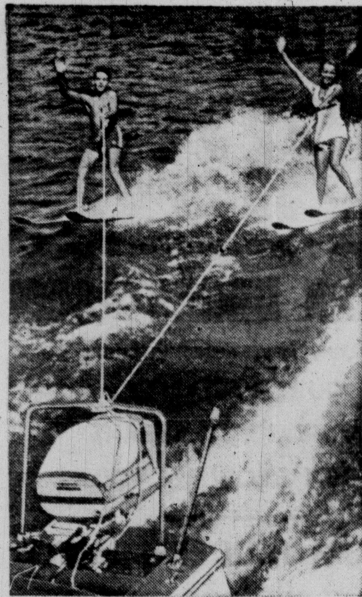

**THE BIGGER OUTBOARD MOTORS** are largely responsible for the growing popularity of water skiing. It's an exciting, new and exhilarating sport easily learned by people of all ages. The special ski hitch shown keeps the two ropes clear of the motor and the wake.

## Popularity Rising For Water Skiing

Water skiing, with its exhilarating combination of speed, spray, water and sun, is lots of fun. Thousands of people are taking up skiing, making it the country's fastest growing water sport.

Almost anyone who can swim can learn to ski well enough to enjoy the sport. People of both sexes and all ages have no difficulty in picking up the few simple techniques that enable them to share in the thrills of water skiing. Almost any kind of boat can be used, provided it is suitable for the motor that powers it. Motors of 10 HP can tow a skier weighing up to about 110 pounds, and 25 HP or more is usually needed to get a 170-pound man up.

The skis are equipped with adjustable foot bindings made of rubber that slip off easily. There is no record of anyone being seriously injured in the usual types of water skiing.

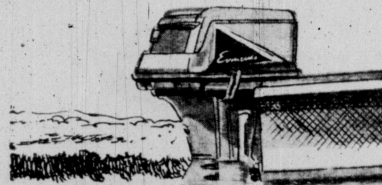
The best place to learn the technique of getting up on top of the water on skis is on dry land. The trick is to keep the knees bent, arms straight, and weight balanced over the feet, while allowing the rope to pull you upright.

The movement is similar to getting up evenly from a low chair and should be repeated until it becomes easy and natural.

Then try the same thing in about 3 feet of water. The important thing here is not to pull up on the tow bar but to keep the arms straight and let the boat do the pulling.

Skis are steered somewhat like roller skates, by leaning the body in the direction of the turn. When the new skier has learned to turn from side to side inside the boat's wake, he is ready to try crossing the wake. To do this, he pulls to the opposite side and turns sharply toward the mound of water at nearly a right angle, with his knees relaxed and bent to absorb the shock, his weight slightly forward.

Most beginners master the technique of starting, turning, crossing the wake and stopping with only an hour or two of practice. Then they are ready to join in the fun of wonderful water skiing.

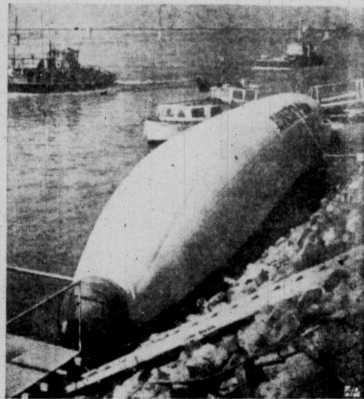

Many times anglers can successfully retrieve a fouled lure through use of a "desnagger." There are patented ones on the market, but every angler can make their own efficient gadget. One of the best and simplest to use can be constructed as follows:

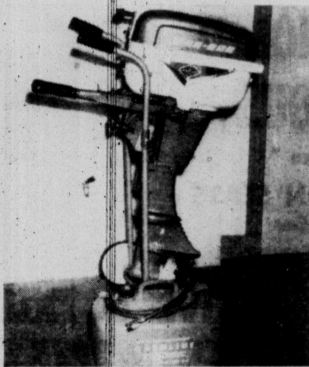
Obtain or hammer out a piece of sheet lead about two or three inches wide and six to nine long. Roll it up in spirals leaving ample room between each layer to pass a line. Make a hole in the tab or outside end. Fasten to it a heavy fishing line or stout cord.

### Tip For Better Fishing

On big streams, when heavy rains spoil fishing in most of the waters try trolling or casting in the sluggish stretches.

There, the big fellows, under cover of the murky water, come out of hiding and often feed recklessly on food that is washed in.

Fish close to the bottom at such times because that is where the food will be and also the feeding is usually on natural or artificial.

In other case and especially with natural baits, put a small spinner ahead. The flash will attract fish. But watch this: don't trail or retrieve on a level keel. Trolling, drop the rod frequently to let bait or lure hit bottom. Casting, stop reeling or drop the rod tip periodically to achieve the same thing.

### Tip For Better Fishing

Here's a good gimmick. When using fairly large plugs or lures, in either fresh or salt water, rig on a separate leader, a hook baited with small pork rind strip. It should come about six inches ahead of the terminal lure. Make the leader fastening through the same swivel eye as the longer leader.

When trolled or retrieved the rig gives the appearance of a larger fish pursuing a smaller one. That's a combination that often arouses "bunkers," who decide to take part in the act. They may hit the pork rind but usually it's the big plug or lure.

fish feedings is easily understood. The belief that fish do not strike during the day when a full moon is at its brightest during the nights, revolves around the fact that fish can see to feed at night and therefore aren't hungry during the daylight hours. Conversely, if the nights are dark the fish tend to do most of their feeding during the daylight hours. Thus, the day fishing during a dark moon phase should be the most profitable for the fisherman. This moon theory is presented for each day on good fishing calendars.

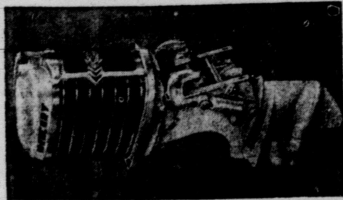
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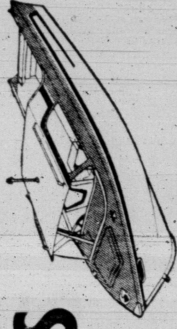
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
