AHS Girls Team To Defend Title In H-SU Tournament

Coach Pete Wilson's Abernathy team will be after its fourth consecutive championship in the 10th annual Hardin-Simmons University invitational high school girls' basketball tournament there this week.

The three-day tournament gets underway Thursday morning and continues through Saturday night. All games will be played in Rose Field House on the H-SU campus and admission for each session is \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for students.

Abernathy, annually one of the outstanding girls' teams in the state, heads a list of 16 teams invited to the meet under the direction of Otho Polk of the H-SU physical education department. Newcomers to the meet this year are Lueders, Paint Creek and Sanda replacing Merkel, Clyde and Baird.

Also in the tourney are Winters, Eula, Hawley, Hamlin, Roby, Anson, Duncanville, Trent, Avoca, Coleman and Old Glory. All former champions are returning. Roby won the 1952 initial championship while Eula took championships in 1953 and 1954. Hawley won three straight titles from 1955 through 1957 before Abernathy started its string of victories.

The first round of play starts Thursday at 10 a. m. with Winters meeting Eula and then Hamlin goes against Roby at 12:30. Anson faces Lueders at 1:45. Duncanville meets Paint Creek at 3 p. m. Trent plays Avoca at 6:15. Coleman takes on Sanda at 7:30 and Abernathy battles Old Glory at 8:45 p. m.

If the AHS girls win Thursday night, they will play the winner of the Coleman-Sanda game at 5 p. m. Friday. If they lose Thursday's match, they are scheduled to play the loser of the above mentioned game, at 10 a. m. Friday.

If the local feds win Thursday and Friday's tilts, they will play at 12:15 p. m. Saturday. If they lose Thursday and win Friday, they will play at 9:45 a. m. Saturday.

1960 Building Activity Tops Million-Dollar Mark Here

Building activity in Abernathy during 1960 shows an expenditure of about \$1,170,634.00. Major part of this amount was for construction of school facilities. . . . between \$600 and \$700 thousand dollars.

Total of building permits issued by the city, not including school building activities, was \$504,311.00, reported Paul Noland, city manager. Accounting for most of this was commercial construction, including grain storage facilities at elevators in Abernathy.

City building permits to January 30 totaled \$73,500.00, to get 1961 off to a good start. Most of this is for residential construction. Noland said.

Old Grade School Building To Be Razed, Piecemeal

Herb Hall Enterprises, a Lubbock salvage contractor was awarded a contract at a special called meeting of the Abernathy School Board January 16, to tear down the old red elementary school building, announced school superintendent, Noel Johnson. The Lubbock firm was awarded the contract on the low bid of \$4,500.00. Superintendent Johnson said.

This is the same salvage firm which recently razed the old Abernathy Motor Company building at the corner of Main Street and Avenue C. The school building will be taken down in the same manner, piecemeal. Ball and chain will not be used.

City attorney James A. Joy was present at the special Board meeting, and later drew up the contract, which was signed last week.

The salvage firm will build a barricade, to extend beyond the

roof lines of the new Junior High building to protect it from damage on the east side of the old building, and will build a barricade fence on all other sides to prevent danger to children who might otherwise enter the area. The fence will be locked, and any unauthorized person or persons

SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

The changes in the Social Security Act made by the Amendments of 1960, reduced the amount of work needed to get benefits, reports John G. Hutton, District

Manager of the Lubbock social security office. "There has always been a minimum and a maximum of amount of work needed, depending upon when the worker reached retirement age, died or became disabled," said Mr. Hutton, "and these limits have not been changed. Everyone needs at least 1 1/2 years of work but never more

than 10 years of work."

"Under the new law," he continued, "many people can become insured quickly. Also many older people who did not work for the length of time required under the old law will now be eligible for payments. Anyone who was told

in the past that he did not have enough work under social security to qualify should get in touch with the Social Security Office now to see if he is eligible under the change in the law." As an example, anyone who reaches retirement at 65 for men

and 62 for women) this year will need to have no more than 3 1/4 years of work. Also, the survivors of workers who died after June, 1954, and were not eligible for benefits previously may now qualify in many cases.

Mr. Hutton urges prompt inquiry regarding the changes in the law so that benefits may be paid as quickly as possible. The Lubbock office is located at 1616 19th Street telephone POrter 3-0456. Informational leaflets covering the changes in the law are now available upon request.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security office will be in Plainview in the County Courtroom at 10:00 a. m. on each Tuesday and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security.

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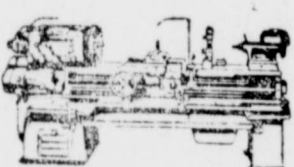
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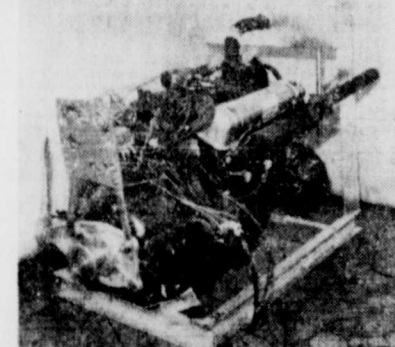

Hale County 4-H Cotton Awards Program Held

Hale County 4-H Club Cotton Awards Program was held Wednesday night, January 18 at the Alcor Restaurant. Approximately 50 people attended this awards program including the County Farm Bureau officials who sponsored the program for the 4-H boys in this year's production contest.

Also in attendance were some of the cotton ginners throughout the county where the boys ginned their cotton, 4-H adult leaders in the crops program, the boys who were to receive their awards and their parents.

Morris Thomas, of Abernathy, president of the Hale County Farm Bureau, served as master of ceremonies. B. F. Yeates, Ass't. County Agricultural Agent, introduced the speaker who was Bill Gunter, area agronomist for the Extension Service.

Mr. Gunter talked to the boys principally for about 30 minutes on the value of cotton to the area, the important changes that have come about in producing cotton in the last decade.

Mr. Gunter told the group that the first cotton contest he ever attended as a club boy in Cochran County, the top yield was 250 pounds of lint cotton per acre, emphasizing the advancement in

the methods of production and the technology connected with it.

Mr. Gunter also told the boys that by the time they were farmers and were back on the farm and doing the farming in the county, they would have to be sharper than any farmer has ever been in history. He told them it would take the sharpest minds of today directed into the fields of agriculture, to make the farmers of the future, emphasizing that agriculture needs our most brilliant potential leaders.

Oliver Harmel, secretary of the Hale County Farm Bureau, presented the awards in the contest. Twenty-four boys were entered in the contest which was divided into a junior and senior division. The top yield in the senior division was 1180 pounds. John Houchin was followed in the junior division by Randy Gardner who was second with 1073 pounds and Dan Houchin with 970 pounds. These first three boys all received trophies. Others in the junior division receiving loving cups were as follows: Wayne Ballard, 829; Larry Gallimore, 701; Phil Boh-

ner, 676; Loyd Hancock, 621; Dennis Helber, 549; Butch Finkner, 547 and Larry Karth, 270.

Following Jim Brashear in the senior division, was Rudolph Baumgardner who placed second with 936 pounds of lint and Bob Thomas, third with 935 pounds. These first three boys all received trophies. Others in the senior division receiving loving cups were as follows: Jesse Holloway, 815; Pat and Terry Scarborough, 687; Gary Houchin, 556; Dale McEachern, 506.

For Jim Brashear, the county champion, whose parents are Mr. and Mrs. True Rosser, this was his first entry in the contest. The cotton was planted April 18, had 60 pounds fertilizer added. The cotton was planted on turned down onion ground as well as having a lot of shredded weeds turned into this soil. The cotton was sprayed one time early for insects about the middle of May. It was watered twice, once on May 10 and once on June 14. The cotton was defoliated and all was harvested with a cotton stripper.

Jim says that the most important thing he has learned from his 4-H crop project is not to put things off and that if you are going to do something, it is just as easy to do it right as it is to do it half way.

Jim's record will be entered in the district contest to compete for district honors.

entering the enclosed area will be trespassing. This is a precautionary measure.

The salvage firm will have control of that area and all materials taken from the existing building. It was stated by school officials that the firm will have available lumber, brick, and a few old desks for sale to local and area people. 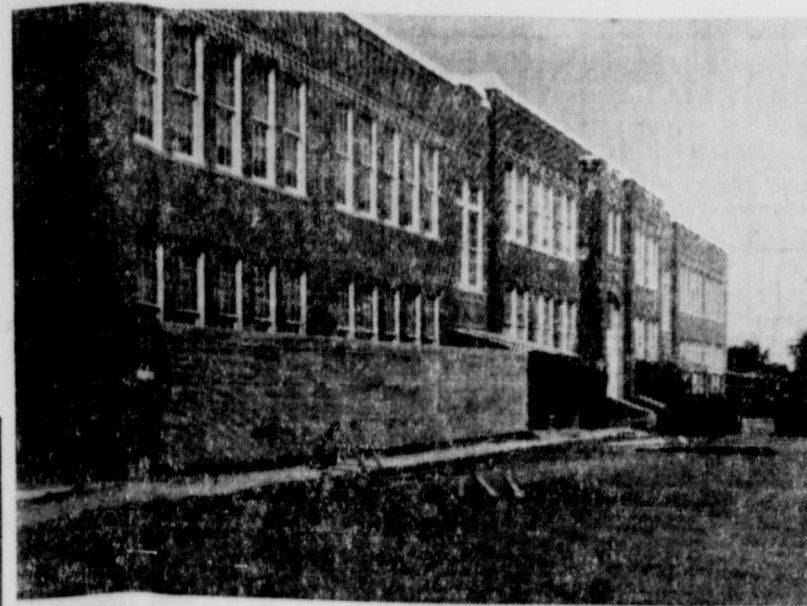

and salvaged materials will be sold and disposed of by the Herb Hall Enterprises. Persons wishing to purchase any of the materials should contact that firm. The firm will have stock lots where materials can be inspected prior to purchases being made.

The salvage firm is to remove all existing structures, including foundations, to a depth of two feet below natural grade, and is to fill and compact the excavated area. The contractor cited in his bid that the job could be done in 60 working days, with no work to be done on the Sabbath.

The old gym will not be demolished, with remodeling work presently being done under the

"new building" contract. The dressing rooms under the bleachers are being completely remodeled, and the old cafeteria is being converted into new dressing rooms and a warehouse area. The old gym will be in first class shape when the work is completed.

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NEWS from the High Plains
Research Foundation

"Two separate variety tests at the High Plains Research Foundation give indications that higher castorbean yields may be possible in the future," Dr. Earl H. Collister said when he released the Foundation's 1960 castorbean research reports.

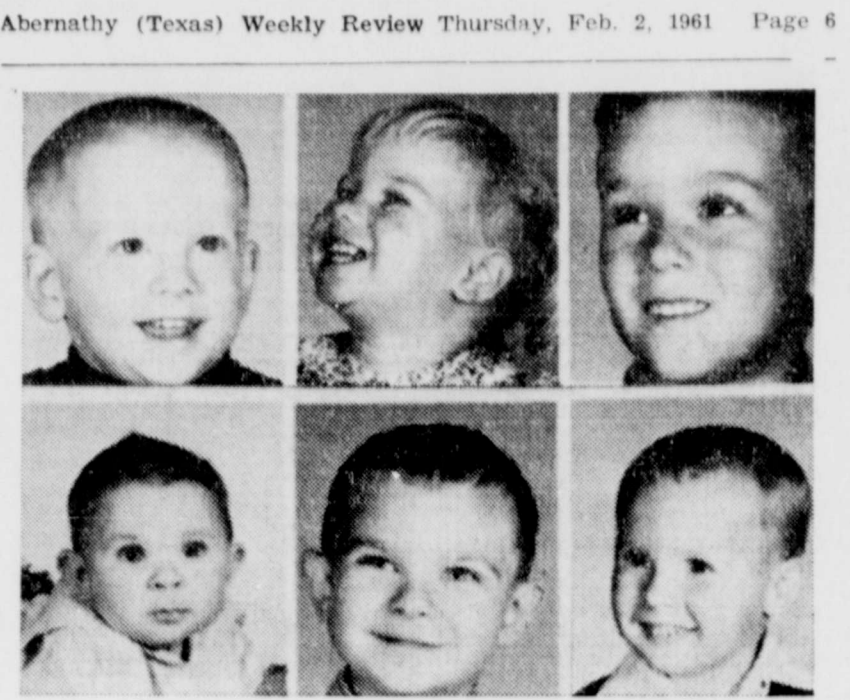
A total of twenty-three hybrids and varieties were tested at Halfway, three times as many as were tested in 1959. Seed for six entries tested were furnished by the Baker Castor Oil Company. This included five varieties and one hybrid. Seed for seventeen were supplied by the Agricultural Research Service of the USDA. This test included four varieties and thirteen experimental.

The average yield of the six was 2,001 pounds per acre and the average of the seventeen hybrids and varieties tested was 2,186 pounds per acre. The highest

The high yields of varieties available for planting were: Baker 102-2,301 pounds per acre; Dawn 2,228 pounds; Baker 148-2,186 pounds; Baker 296-2,145 pounds; and RA 348-2,690 pounds. Seed for the last named variety may be released in 1961.

All twenty-three varieties were planted May 17 at a seeding rate of 10 pounds of viable seed per acre. A preplant irrigation of four inches was applied to all plots on May 6. During the growing season 3 1/2 inches was applied to each plot on July 29, August 11, August 26, and September 6. Rainfall received from May 1 to November 1 was 31.05 inches.

All plots were sidedressed with 120 pounds of nitrogen per acre on July 28. All plots were rotary hoed twice, cultivated once, and flame cultivated two times during the growing season. All plots were harvested on December 1 and 2. Capsules were threshed by the

Baker Castor Oil Company, Plainview, Texas.
The research plot on castorbeans released this week shows data on vigor, bloom date, stand, lodging, plant height, shattering, number and length of spikes, and seed per acre.
Research work done in Throckmorton County by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station showed that evaporation retardation by chemical means offers a promising method of conserving surface-stored water.

BENEFITS WIDESPREAD FROM THE SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

College Station—Currently over 13.5 million youngsters are participating in the National School Lunch Program, reports the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The program was established in 1946 and each year this expanding market for farm food products has increased, officials said.

During the school year ending last June, some 12.8 million children were served 2,142,000,000 lunches. Most of the food, approximately 80 percent, was purchased locally by the more than 62,000 public and nonprofit private schools participating in the program. These local purchases amounted to an estimated \$540 million.

In addition, school lunch menus last year included approximately \$58 million worth of nutritious foods purchased for participating schools by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service to supplement local purchases. Among the popular lunch items were frozen turkeys, frozen ground beef, frozen ground pork, canned pork and gravy and a variety of canned fruits and vegetables.

National School Lunch Program schools also share in the distribution of surplus commodities acquired by USDA in price-support and surplus-removal programs, also available to non-participating schools. In fiscal 1960, slightly more than \$70 million worth of surplus foods including butter, cheese, nonfat dry milk, honey, flour, cornmeal, peanut butter, rice, dried whole eggs and sweet potatoes were distributed.

The program is administered cooperatively by Federal, State and local officials. Federal funds are allocated to the States, and must be matched from sources within the States, including children's payments, at the rate of at least \$3 for each Federal dollar in operation, this matching requirement has been exceeded consistently in the 14-year history of the program, and currently is running generally about 7 to 1. The Federal cash apportioned among the States for the present fiscal year totals \$93.6 million.

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Hale Men Attend Southern Weed Control Conference

The 1961 Southern Weed Control Conference was conducted in Saint Petersburg, Florida, on January 18, 19, and 20. Representatives from the Hale County Noxious Weed Control District attending included Archie Martin, J. J. Heigl, M. D. Burris, and E. O. Snelling. Others attending from the South Plains were Billy McAnally of the Swisher County Noxious Weed Control District, Douglas Degge of the Floyd County Noxious Weed District, and Dr. A. F. Wiese of the Bushland Experiment Station.

The meeting was divided into various sections including Weed Control in Agronomic Crops, Horticultural Crops, Forest and Rangelands, and Extension, Teaching and Regulatory Aspects of Weed Control. In the Extension section an address was presented by Douglas Degge, Floyd County Weed Supervisor, on the subject "Weed Control Districts, A New Tool for Weed Control Regulation." The address concerned the operations and success attained by the Weed Control Districts of Texas located in Hale, Floyd and Swisher counties. The talk was accompanied by a colored movie as a visual aid which was produced in Plainview and Floydada by the Weed District Supervisors.

Addresses presented in the Agronomic Crops section by South Plains personnel included "Substituted Benzonic and Phenylacetic acids for Field Bindweed Control" by Dr. A. F. Wiese, associate agronomist of the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station at Bushland, Texas. The talk concerned research data compiled by Wiese through experiments using relatively new herbicides for the

control of field bindweed in the Panhandle of Texas.

An address presented by Archie Martin, Hale County Weed Supervisor, was entitled "Drift and Toxicity Problems Associated with Using Chlorinated Benzoic Acids." It consisted of results obtained in drift and toxicity studies performed in Hale County jointly by Martin and Dr. Wiese for the past two years. The tests were indicative of which hormone type herbicides could be used for weed control without damaging the susceptible crops which may be growing near the areas of application.

Overall, the Southern Weed Conference was highly informative and worthwhile to those attending. The proceedings there left no doubt as to the tremendous progress that has been made towards the control of weeds in various crops and areas during the past few years. It also challenged the Texas group to continue to maintain the modern, effective weed control programs through the Noxious Weed Control Districts.

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LAW GROWS

You want the law to grow to meet new challenges, but you do not want it to change completely. The law is like a boy; it must grow up to meet the changing world, but you do not want it to change overnight.

When you buy or sell a house, you want the law to stand firm. You do not want your deed upset by some new law overnight. When you make a will you would like its terms carried out long after you are gone. In short, you do not want your law to upset your plans. So you want a stable law.

Yet the law cannot foresee all the changes that are to come, and it must be able to grow and meet new circumstances. Sometimes old rules, in terms of modern life, are too harsh and should be changed. It is a good thing that our laws can change by court decision, legislation or by constitutional amendment.

Take an interesting case: until recently a farmer believed he owned his property rights straight up

as high as he wanted to claim them—to the sky even. But, meantime, the airplane flew these skies. If your ownership went to the sky you could stop anybody's flying over your property. Or you could charge him a toll. But if landowners got a toll on airplane fare, travel would soon become too costly.

How do we change a system of laws to keep the essential use of our property and yet make people enjoy airplane travel, and travel. You could not tell briefly how this was done. But, within the past few years, we have carved out a whole new body of law by court decision and by law making. We have met the problem without impairing unduly the older property rights of holders.

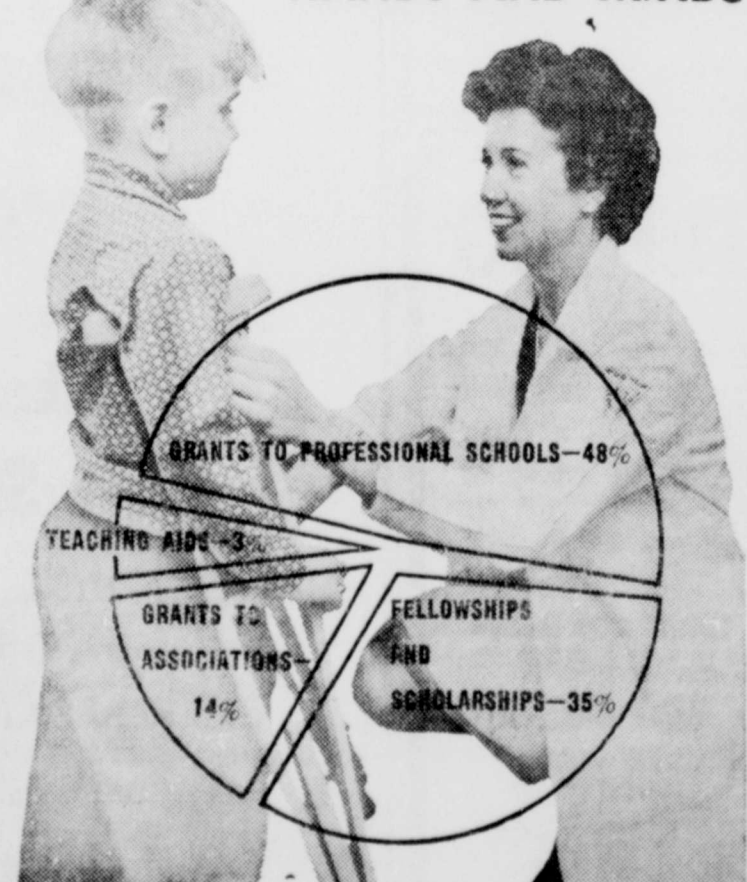


Chart illustrates how the Professional Education Department of The National Foundation allocates the funds it receives from contributions to the March of Dimes in a typical year.

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
