## Stock Show Opens Wednesday

### League Approves Transfer Of Lamesa And Big Spring Ball Clubs At Meet Sunday

Action taken at the annual spring meeting of the West Texas-New Mexico baseball moguls at Clovis, N. M., put the official seal of approval on the transfer of the Lamesa franchise to Big Spring and the move of Tink Riviere and Jodie Tate with their franchise to Lamesa, to assure this section of the country of organized baseball for at least another season. The moving of the Pampa franchise to Albuquerque also received the league's sanction.

According to Riviere the annual meeting showed the finest spirit and most optimistic attitude of any since the league was organized several years ago.

Other features of the meeting was the designation of eight Red Cross days, one for each town in the league, when all receipts would be turned over to the Red Cross, and the decision to award Defense Bonds for participation in the All-Star game instead of the usual rings, watches or jackets. The rule applying to rookies was also cleared up when it was voted that each club must have at least four rookies, not more than three class men, with the other eight to be men of limited experience.

In regards to the Lamesa situation, both Mr. Riviere and Jodie Tate expressed the feeling that it was like coming home to be back in Lamesa, "the biggest little baseball town in the United States," as they put it. They are highly optimistic over the prospects for the year and freely predict that it will be one of the most successful baseball seasons ever experienced.

Tom Greenwade, a scout for the Brooklyn organization, is due to be in Lamesa within the next week and will give the local management a look-in on the players and material to be sent to the Lamesa club. Tate will probably go to Santa Barbara, California, the latter part of the month, to look over the players first hand, and bring them back to Lamesa to start local workouts around the first of April.

### Transportation Clubs Suggested By Defense Head

Forming of "transportation clubs" by civilian workers has been suggested by Joseph B. Eastman, Director of Defense Transportation, in Washington as a means of remedying the transportation shortage foreseen as a result of auto and tire rationing.

"So far as passenger automobiles remain available for transportation in the war effort, as in moving workers to and from defense plants and civilian jobs, they must be used to capacity in both directions," Mr. Eastman declared.

It was also suggested by local rationing officials that residents of rural communities take turn about using their cars to come to town, so as to save their tires as much as possible. It was also stated that all persons having horse drawn vehicles that can readily be placed in use, to do this and thus save their cars and tires for any emergency that might arise.

### Elmer Cope Gets Car Stolen

Like the case of the "nearly" stolen automobile tires last week, Elmer Cope almost had his automobile stolen Sunday night.

Upon arising Monday morning Elmer found his car missing and promptly notified police officials. A few minutes later the car was found on the front lawn of Mrs. G. W. Simpson in south Lamesa, where the thief had abandoned it. Nothing in the way of accessories was missing from the car, and the key was still in it.

Mr. Stangel is a graduate of Texas A. & M. College and was an instructor in that institution prior to the opening of Tech, he having assumed his position there on the first day of Tech's opening. Mr. Stangel is considered to be one of the two leading judges of livestock in the entire Southwest, and his service are much sought after. Dawson County is indeed fortunate in being able to secure Mr. Stangel, as this makes three out of the last four shows that he has judged for this county.

Mr. Stangel was superintendent of the entire livestock show for the Texas Centennial in 1936 and 1937. He has judged in every big show in the Southwest for the past twenty years.

 men will be required to complete 26 hours of intensive training to prepare him for the duties he may be called upon to perform.  
 No black-outs have been planned for Lamesa in the immediate future. Trial black-outs are to be had only after the personnel has been adequately trained to properly handle the situation and when such arrangements are in accord with state officials. Local people will be given warning as to approximate time of any trial black-outs and will be given specific instructions as to what to do. At present, the organization is being set up so as to be in position to go into quick action should an emergency arise.

In picking Air Raid Wardens, attempts have been made to pick men above the draft age so that the organization can remain more or less permanent and not be disturbed by calls of the army service.

## District Agent Gives Report Of Year's Work

A progressive trend toward conservation of feed for home use in Extension District 2 was shown by a 24 percent increase in construction and filling of silos in 1941. This percentage represented an increase of 1,324 over the number available in 1940, according to K. J. Edwards, district agent. With the exception of 390, all of the 6,762 containers, new and old, housing approximately 1,200,000 tons of silage stored in the district in 1941, were of the trench type. Among the counties, Hockley led in number with 1,050.

Despite this conspicuous development, Edwards says that unusually wet weather and shortage of farm labor reduced the number of silos which otherwise might have been dug and filled. But he attributes to the aggressive Food and Feed for Freedom campaign conducted by county agricultural agents the notable increase in silo construction.

Reviewing the record of the year, the district agent says that boys' 4-H Club enrollment reached an all-time high of 2,745, 80 per cent of whom completed their work. Work and completions was had in

all of the 20 counties in the district. There were 10 judging and 25 demonstration teams trained, the latter portaying the Food and Feed for Freedom program with patriotic illustrations. Hale County boys used rats in their "Value of milk as a food" demonstration.

Eighteen regional 4-H livestock shows were held during the year, with 1,902 beef and dairy animals, and sheep and swine exhibited. Twenty-five boys' 4-H achievement days were attended by 4,756 persons, and five boys, the most in any extension district, won sponsored trips to Chicago.

Lamb County produced the state Rural Electrification Administration winner who received an expenses-paid trip to the International Livestock Show, Chicago. Lubbock had the first prize winner for the state in the home beautification contest.

Approximately 700 calves and 600 lambs are being fed now by club boys in the district, Edwards says.

A district-wide 4-H cooperative livestock show was held at Plainview in April. After the 251 hogs were sold locally, the remaining exhibits comprising 289 calves and 355 lambs were taken to Kansas City by special train and sold on the market for about \$35,000.

Certified seed wheat associations raising the approved varieties were set up in Swisher and Hale counties during the year. Dairy herd improvement work was continued suc-

cessfully with three groups operating, the Swisher County association being outstanding in quantity production. At the end of the year there were 27 freezer locker food plants in the district.

The district agent lists a total of 158 one-variety cotton communities, with one or more in each of the district's 20 counties. The 16,141 farmers comprising the communities planted 1,160,121, or approximately eleven-twelfths of the cotton acreage represented, to approved varieties.

About 14 counties of district 2 now have Rural Electrification Administration facilities or are in the process of getting it.

Continued From Front Page) losses already.

A special Dutch communique said that nearly all the Japanese lighters engaged in landing troops and tanks from 20 transports yesterday near Rembang, easternmost of the three invasion points, were sunk in swooping attacks by Dutch fighting planes.

A tank was fired while being unloaded and fell into the sea. Others, landed, were set afire. The suggestion was that the Dutch were using a sort of incendiary bomb, perhaps gasoline filled missiles.

A Reuters dispatch from Bandung, reporting British troops in action against the foe, said there

was reason to believe that Allied forces had knifed through the supply line of a Japanese column which had driven 40 miles inland to capture Soebang.

"Japanese troop casualties may be recorded in the thousands and their losses in tanks, armored cars,

and artillery in the hundreds," wrote the Reuters correspondent. "But still they come."

"If the Allied forces in Java had been about twice as strong, the Japanese attack would almost have certainly been doomed to failure."
