Housing Needs In C-City To Be Studied By Group

Proposed Projects To Tax Existing Facilities?

Housing situation in Colorado City is due for a "take the long look" study here Thursday. Adequate housing for expected workers — both temporary and permanent — for a number of proposed projects, in and near Colorado City, is to be the number one topic for a called session of citizens interested in housing facilities available in town.

Chairman of the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce Housing Committee, S. A. Palmer, has called a meeting of that group for noon Thursday, June 4, in Villa Inn.

Business session for Housing Committee members will follow luncheon (Dutch treat) with Gus D. Chesney, Chamber of Commerce president, joining Housing Committee members.

Committeemen, in addition to Palmer are Tandy Curlee, director representative, Bob Kimmel, Virgil Stone, Bob Ratliff and Jimmie Harrison.

Seven proposed projects vital to the housing situation in Colorado City will be discussed by Chesney and studied by Housing Committeemen.

Those seven projects start with activity concerning the Colorado River Lake, long-proposed new lake for this area — possibly in Mitchell County or in Coke County.

Second proposed project is the 600 ft. extension and 600 ft. overrun to be constructed at Webb Air Force Base auxiliary field near Colorado City. Tentative date for that construction is early spring.

Third project on the agenda is the possible location of cottonseed-degreasing equipment in Colorado City. Under consideration as a possible site is the 40-acre industrial site recently purchased from the city by Industrial Team Ins., non-profit corporation geared toward attracting new industry here. Degraining project would mean an investment of \$100,000 or possible more.

Extension of Sun's pipeline near Silver, to cost more than \$234,000, is fourth matter for consideration of housing facilities in town.

Fifth and largest project on the agenda is the expansion of Morgan Creek Power Plant, Lake Colorado City, to cost Texas Electric Service Co. owners, a total of \$30 million.

Construction work set to start in September should bring about 200 men and their families to Colorado City during the construction period.

A proposed gas injection project in western Mitchell County concludes the projects program at this date.

Summer School To Enroll Monday

Summer school sessions for Colorado High School students will begin with registration Monday from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m. in the office of the principal, Floyd Morris.

Requests of students registering for courses will determine the curriculum. American History, World History and civics usually prove summer favorites as new subjects for students enrolling, said Frank W. Wilson, superintendent.

Make-up courses will also be offered in English grades 9-12. Tuition for 1/2 credit will be \$15. For a full credit the tuition will be \$30. A maximum of 1 1/2 credits can be taken by any student.

Classes will meet for intensive study, six days each, from 7 a. m. until 10 a. m. and from 10 a. m. until 1 p. m. Each class lasts three hours and students are advised by teachers and principal to enroll on time and to attend every session for the full benefit of summer study and summer school credits.

One day's attendance in summer school is more important to a student interested than one day of the longer school term," said Wilson in announcing the summer schedule.

For the 1/2 credit a student will be required to attend the six-day classes for a period of four weeks. Whole credits can be earned by attending summer school for eight weeks.

First semester is set to end June 26. Second semester will be completed July 25.

Republicans to Vote At City Hall June 6

Republican Party members of this county will cast ballots at Colorado City City Hall Saturday, June 6, second primary election day.

Don Butler, Mitchell County Republican chairman, has announced the one county-wide balloting box with polls open from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m.

Republicans of all Texas are set to vote for their choice in a warm race between Jack Cox and George Bush, both contenders for nomination as Republican candidate for the United States Senate.

Winner of that two-man race will face Senator Ralph Yarborough, Democratic Party candidate for reelection to the seat he holds in the National Senate, in the November General Election.

Absentee ballots may be obtained at the office of the Mitchell County clerk, Courthouse, and will be valid through Tuesday, June 2, Butler said.

Republican chairman Butler also announced that only citizens who voted in the first Republican Primary election May 2, or citizens who did not vote at all will be eligible to cast a vote in this Republican Primary.

Any voter who cast a ballot in the Democratic Primary held May 2 can not take part in the Republican Party's second Primary.

Mitchell Demos Consolidate Boxes

Mitchell County Democrats will vote in four consolidated balloting boxes for the second primary election to be held Saturday, June 6.

Executive committee of the party in this county met Thursday afternoon and unanimously decided to have just four boxes instead of the nine scattered boxes used for first primary voting.

Democratic Party members are urged by Larry Ratliff, Mitchell County Democratic Chairman, to note the change in location of some polls and to remember consolidation planned for boxes.

Westbrook box, located at Westbrook Rural High School, will be for voters who usually vote in Westbrook, in Carr and in Cuthbert.

Loraine Democrats and Lander voters will cast their ballots for this election only at Ratliff points out at the Lions Club building in Loraine.

Buford and all voting Democrats in the town of Colorado City will vote in Civic House. Colorado Citizens are particularly requested to remember the change in polls for all voters, including all Demos in precinct who customarily vote in the Courthouse.

Rev. Bartlett returned to the pulpit here May 17 after three weeks spent as one of the 160 members of evangelistic teams who took part in the Missouri Crusade to Australia. In 1958 he preached in a Baptist Crusade to Alaska and in 1962 toured South America extensively as evangelists in the Baptist Crusade to South America's countries.

Final rites for William Joseph Drennan, 61, were conducted Saturday afternoon in First Methodist Church at Hermleigh with the Rev. Robert Ritchey, Baptist minister of San Angelo, as officiant.

Drennan died suddenly at his home, 709 East 6th, some time late Wednesday. His body was discovered in bed shortly after noon Thursday. Death was ruled due to natural causes, probably from a heart attack.

Born in Grimes County March 27, 1903, he was married to the former Sadie Wilcox in Hermleigh June 15, 1924. He was a welder and a machanic but more recently had been ranching. The family had lived in Robert Lee for four years before moving to Colorado City in 1962. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

SCS Manager Speaks To 4-H Club

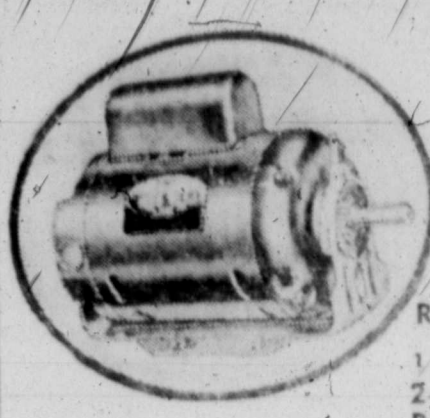
