There is one week set aside each year that is designated National Newspaper Week. This year National Newspaper Week is October 15 to October 21.

The Mitchell County News is observing National Newspaper Week by extending an invitation to all to call at our plant and see how a newspaper is made.

It takes quite a bit of doing to publish a newspaper. First a reporter must get the facts then write them into a story. Next the editor takes all the stories, runs some as they are turned in and revises others. The editor takes words—more than 50,000 of them—each week and turns them into a newspaper.

The next step is for the stories to go to the Linotype operator who sets the story into lines and casts them into slugs ready to be assembled and placed in forms and placed upon the press to be printed. Placing the stories in the forms is called "make-up" in newspaper language.

After the news is all set into lines, cuts are cast and sawed and the advertisements are all set into type and placed in the forms the forms are locked and put on the press where the completed newspaper is made.

It takes a lot of words to make a newspaper as well as a lot of work on the part of several people.

Advertisements in the newspaper are important to the newspaper and to the readers of it. It is more important to the merchants who depend upon the newspaper to spread the news of their stores. Without advertising a newspaper cannot exist. Nor can a merchant who does not advertise remain in business for long in this day of strong competition from other towns.

Though the editor owns the plant that turns out the papers a newspaper belongs to the people of the community. The editor swells with pride when he hears someone say "The Mitchell County News is our newspaper."

Its Easy To Check Social Security Record

While the Social Security Administration has the responsibility for maintaining approximately 126 million earnings records, Mr. Hudson, Field Representative of the Abilene district office pointed out today that it is the responsibility of each individual social security card holder to check his record periodically to make sure it is correct.

Mr. Hudson also stated that everyone should check his social security record at least once every three or four years. In most instances the Social Security records become final and not open to adjustment after three years, three months and fifteen days from the end of the taxable year for which the earnings were reported. There is another point to be considered too—the sooner an error is found, the easier it can be corrected. This applies to everyone whether he is working in his own business or for someone else as an employee.

Mr. Hudson says that the manner of checking a particular record is simple. Just ask your social security office for postcard form 7004, fill in the blanks and drop it in a mail box. The form is a self-addressed postcard. In about two weeks you will receive a statement showing the total earnings credited to your social security account. It will also show a yearly breakdown of your credited earnings for each of the past three full calendar years. If, after receiving this statement, an error is noted, get in touch with your social security representative. He will be glad to help correct your account.

Mr. Hudson stresses the fact that your social security benefits will depend on this record of your earnings. Social security is a valuable insurance for you and your family, so don't delay. Get form 7004 from your local social security office today, or from Mr. Hudson when he is next in your town, and check your social security record. He will be in Loraine on October 28th at the Lions Club building.

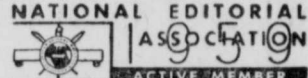

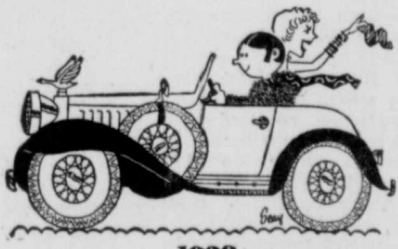


GLEANERS MEET IN ABILENE TUESDAY
