Tornado Alert; Wheeler Gets Rain

The tornado siren was sounded for Wheeler resident to take shelter the first time this year Tuesday at 1:30 a.m. The siren was sounded when the members of the fire department spotted a suspicious looking cloud estimated to be located at Prime Feeders, six miles west of Wheeler.

The clouds Tuesday morning produced only rain. Wheeler has officially received 10.05 inches of rain for the year; 3.02 inches has fallen in May.

Wheeler received 2.59 inches of moisture in April.

The 10.05 "for 1975 compares with 10.54" for the same period in 1974. The records show only 2.01" of moisture was received in Wheeler in May, 1974.

TORNADO ALERT: With the issuing of a Tornado Watch for the Wheeler Area, members of the Wheeler Fire Department report for duty to stand guard and report any threatening clouds approaching Wheeler for the duration of the watch.

Should a funnel be cited approaching Wheeler, the siren will be sounded for citizens to take shelter. Two (2) thirty second blasts of the fire siren are sounded for the citizens to take shelter immediately.

Citizens are urged to locate a shelter before it becomes necessary, when the siren is sounded you do not have time to locate protection.

No all-clear will be sounded, it is up to the individual to determine when it is safe.

On occasion, the fire siren sounds during the tornado alert to call firemen to a fire; a series of 11 blasts 5-10 seconds in length.

Amarillo Weather bureau calls either the Sheriff's Office or the Funeral Home to notify the city of approaching weather.

For citizens who have barometers set for this altitude, a reading of 29.30 indicates it is time to take shelter.

When the signal was sounded Monday, the fire siren was flooded with calls. The firemen are busy watching the clouds and will not sound the siren unless danger threatens. It is necessary to keep the line open for a fire or other storm reports.

Cowbelles Corner

The "Beef Business Bulletin" quotes Mr. Thomas J. Cavanaugh, who testified in behalf of ANCA, Public Lands Council, and National Wool Growers before the Senate Interior Subcommittee on Environment and Land Resources, as saying that the Senate Use Bill (S-984) "could lead to federal intrusion" in substance of state planning. "The bill would require state centralization, in essence leaving local communities with little or no authority." (Beef Business Bulletin)

The Senate Land Use Bill (S-984) is almost identical to the Udall Land Use Bill (HR-3510), which will soon come up for House vote.

Mr. David A. Witts testified before the Subcommittee on Environment, House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee in behalf of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. His testimony concerns H. R. 3510 and is reported in the May, 1975 issue of "The Cattleman" magazine on page 29. A most important point made by Mr. Witts is, "This bill is more than a clash between environmental purists and economic realists, between seduction and coercion. It is a frontal assault on private property rights and the free enterprise system. It opens the door to taking property without compensation through condemnation by proclamation. The word 'compensation' does not even appear in the act."

Mr. Witts is an attorney in Dallas who also serves as consultant to the Texas Department of Agriculture for international affairs, chairman of the Texas Legislative Livestock Brand Laws Study Committee, a member of the Texas House of Representatives Agricultural Export Committee and the State Fair of Texas Livestock and Agriculture Committee.

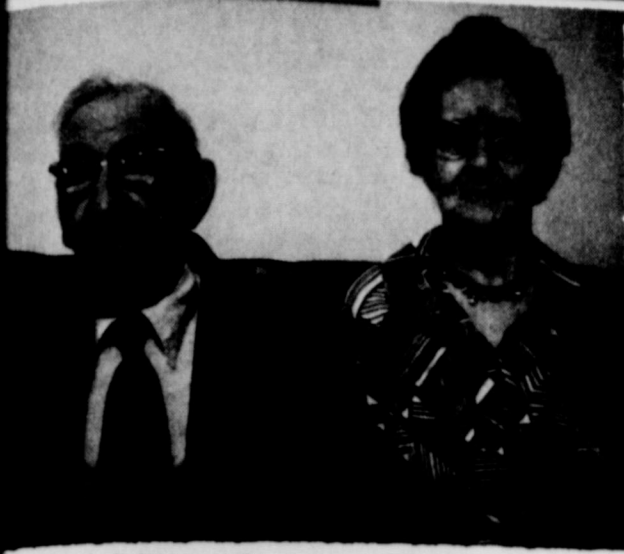
Mobeetie Eighth Grade Graduation
