Perryton Public Schools Will Open September 7

Four County Texas Farm Bureau Meet September 4

Arnold and Haggard are Speakers

Perryton Meeting to Conclude Series of District Conferences

Farmers from Hansford, Hempstead, Lipscomb and Ochiltree counties will meet at the courthouse in Perryton, Friday afternoon, Sept. 4, at 2:30 o'clock, for a conference at which consideration of agriculture's status in a world at war will be the main topic. The meeting is sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation.

W. M. Deck, prominent Ochiltree county farmer-stockman and vice-president of the Texas Farm Bureau, will preside at the conference. The Perryton meeting will close a series of similar meetings held in all parts of the Panhandle. Previous meetings were at Childress, Monday; Pampa, Tuesday; Hereford, Wednesday; and at Dumas, today.

In the past, it has been the custom to hold a big annual district meeting in Amarillo, but due to the war situation, sub-district meetings with four to five counties meeting together were held this year.

Perryton Equity Poultry Clinic September 11-12

If you attended the Perryton Equity Exchange first poultry clinic you will realize the value of such a clinic to the poultry raisers of this area. This is an educational clinic that is staged free of charge for the sole purpose of encouraging better and more profitable flocks in this area.

The services of Gordon Beall and Otto Russell, the same men who conducted the 1941 clinic, have been retained. These men know their poultry how to post them and diagnose any case that is brought before them. Poultry raisers that attend the clinic are asked to bring birds from their flock to the Equity Exchange where they are killed and each particular case is diagnosed and instructions as to proper kind of medicine and treatment are given.

The clinic will be two days, Friday and Saturday, September 11-12 at the Equity warehouse adjacent to the office in Perryton. The Equity goes to quite an outlay of time and money to put on this clinic and they hope that every poultry raiser in this area will take advantage of this free school.

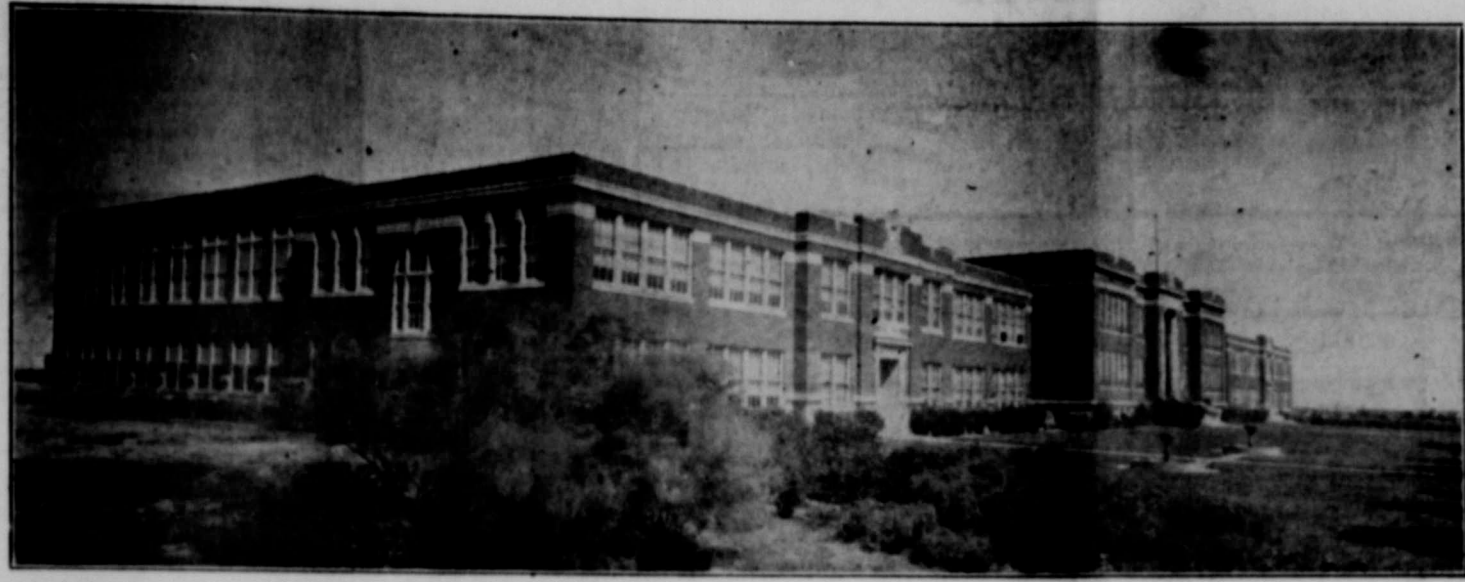
Perryton American Legion and Auxiliary Start 1943 Membership Campaigns

The Ochiltree County Red Cross Chapter has launched a drive to secure \$500 or more to defray the expense of making and equipping 400 kit bags for service men. The chapter was assigned the quota of 400 kits by the national organization.

Chapter Chairman Dave Shanks states that letters will be mailed to every person in Ochiltree soliciting voluntary donations, and it is hoped that the goal can be reached without personal solicitations. Clubs, churches, civic organizations and special groups are asked to make donations to the fund. Lists of all donors will be published and the amount of their subscription entered on the permanent Red Cross member file cards.

Donations can be mailed to the Ochiltree County Red Cross Chapter, Perryton, or they will be accepted by Mrs. G. L. Kengle, chairman of the special Kit Bag committee; Chapter Chairman Shanks at his office in the courthouse; Treasurer Moina Caldwell at the First National Bank; or Secretary Myrtle Mae Conley at the Ochiltree County Herald.

The kit bags will be made in the Red Cross rooms under the direction of Mrs. J. F. Cox, chapter production chairman.

The kit bags are to be furnished to every man in the armed forces as they embark for foreign service. The first shipment will be made from the local chapter rooms on Oct. 1 and the entire 400 kit bags must be completed and shipped by Dec. 1.

The first estimate on the cost of the kits was \$150 but by purchase of cigarettes and playing cards through the national Red Cross with all taxes deducted, and by the remainder of the items being furnished by Perryton merchants at wholesale cost, it is now thought that the bags can be completed for about \$100 each.

In each kit will be the following items: soap and metal soap box, deck of playing cards, pack of cigarettes, shoe polishing cloth, pencil. See No. 4, Back Page

Ochiltree Again Over Bond Quota

August Quota was \$26,100. August Sales were \$42,250

Ochiltree county again exceeds assigned quota of War Bonds and Stamps. That is getting to be a habit with Ochiltree county folks. The quota assigned the county for the month of August was \$26,100. Carl Ellis, county chairman of bond and stamp sales, reports that total bond sales were \$42,250, maturity value, issue price, \$32,937.50. Added to the above figure is stamp sales of \$925.65.

Texas has failed to sell its assigned quota for the months of June, July and August. Many counties in the Panhandle, especially counties that have big war projects, are behind in war bond sales. Ochiltree county has never failed to make and exceed by thousands of dollars, its quota.

Ochiltree county has been assigned a quota of \$26,100 for the month of September.

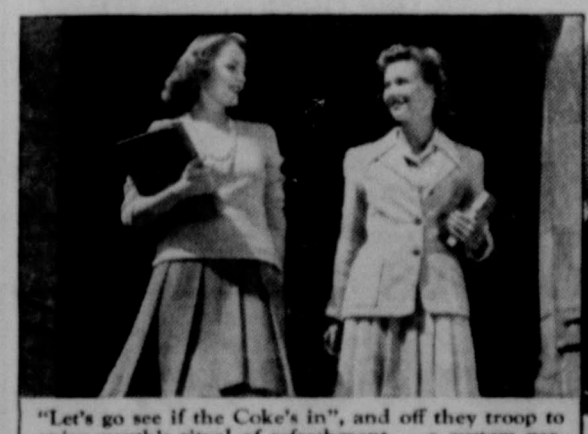

Our Defenders Speak!

The Herald asks that men and women from this community serving in the armed forces write letters to this department for publication. Letters to relatives that would be of interest to the public will be published under this heading.

Somewhere in England Monday eve, Aug. 17, 1942 Hello All:

Well, looks like I'm behind on my letter writing again. Got four letters from Perryton in today's mail, two each from you and Mrs. Myers. Sure was glad to get each of them, and was glad to get the air mail stamps.

Today has been a beautiful day here in England. Seems that the sunshine is rationed also over here, but today the sun shone very bright all day. Mamma, you know how chilly you can get sitting in the shade somewhere up in the mountains—well that's exactly the way it is here. Today the radio section was having a class and we walked up on the side of a hill and sat in a clump of trees. It felt nice for a few minutes after the walk, but in half an hour after you had time to cool off we had all moved out in the sun. Beats all I ever saw.

Was off from last Saturday noon until reveille Monday so took off and went to a small town about ten miles away. We are only allowed to go twenty-five miles off the post with a pass and only a certain percent can get passes at one time. But so long as you stay within a twenty-five mile radius, no pass is needed. There are several small towns in that radius, so I went out for the week-end.

What quaint little towns they have over here! You know those old pictures that you used to hang on the wall. Well, they must have been English because these little villages look for the world like them. You never see a frame building here. All are either brick or natural rock and some are so old that the rocks in them are covered with a kind of moss.

Most of the cars are Austins and come running right down the wrong side of the road. Cars are quite scarce, most of the traffic being army vehicles. There's lots of bicycles, but still more walking. These people are great walkers anyway. I think all their wagons have shafts and only use one horse but that one horse is usually big enough to make two of our horses. I never saw such large Percherons in my life. A big part of their wagons are two-wheel carts.

One thing that you can't help noticing here is the slow speed at which people move about. I realize that most of their young people are in the Armed Forces, but even if they weren't I think the story

would be the same. They never seem to get excited and rush around. I think they get agitated at us for always being in a hurry. I noticed a line yesterday trying to get tickets for a show, and the Americans just about had the Englishmen crowded out of the picture.

They are just now showing "Gone With the Wind" over here. Most of their pictures seem to come from the States, although they do have their own vaudeville. There's a British vaudeville here on the post but I haven't seen it yet.

There's a woman army stationed here, also a (censored) American nurses that came over with us. It is very simple to get a date here when the girls are off duty, and they are usually off at the same time we are. These English women are just like the Lord made them, absolutely no cosmetics of any kind, and silk stockings are unheard of. Of course, they have to wear their regular uniforms off duty just the same as we do. Their uniforms are of a blue-grey colored wool with shirt to match and ties of black. Their uniforms look very nice all except the little monkey cap they wear.

Most of these little towns have seen (censored) but I think right now its more or less at a standstill.

Well, I don't know much more to write just now so I guess I'd better close now and get a letter started to Mrs. M. Tell old Sug that I'll write him some of these days. And that these Englishmen are going to make a tea drinker out of me whether I like it or not. They are gradually cutting down on our coffee and increasing the tea. These Dog Faces sure make fun of it, but just the same they keep putting it to us. Well, will close for now. Tell everyone I'm o. k. and feeling fine. As ever,

Let it not be said that Ochiltree county failed in any way a single one of the boys who are giving their all in the army, navy and marine corps.

Government now calls for filling of ceiling prices by more business firms. We think it's about time for the government to put a ceiling on the amount of publicity propaganda copy that floods newspaper desks every day.

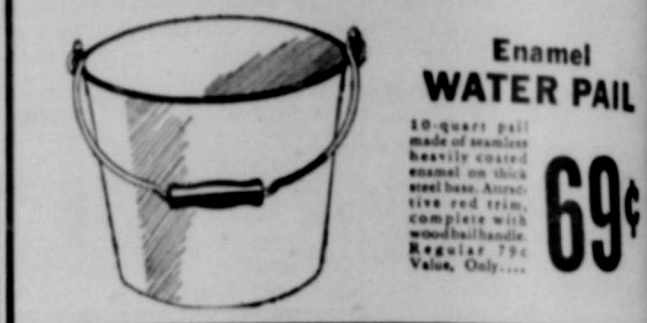
