Austin. — Ben Ramsey's appointment as Railroad Commissioner—after a decade in which his name has been synonymous with the Lieutenant Governorship—carries with it several major political implications.

First, it's a pretty safe bet that the quiet-spoken East Texan will not be in the field of contenders for the Governor's chair. Pre-campaign speculation has had Ramsey in practically every gubernatorial race in recent years.

Second, it leaves the 1962 race for the Lieutenant Governorship wide open. At least a half-dozen likely prospects already have been mentioned.

Third, it puts Sen. Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi automatically in charge of the Lieutenant Governor's duties. He was elected by his colleagues as President Pro Tempore of the Senate shortly before Gov. Price Daniel's announcement of Ramsey's appointment.

ANOTHER SPECIAL SESSION ASSURED — At the close of the called special session which voted a teachers' pay raise averaging \$810 per year, Governor Daniel announced he will call another session sometime before the end of the year, to act on several matters.

He said he will submit such subjects as loan shark control legislation, a law to include banks in the recently-passed abandoned property act, juvenile delinquency legislation, and controls over municipal annexation.

The short session, in addition to the teachers' pay raise, also provided additional money for the operation and maintenance of school buses and for administration.

A law requiring runoffs in congressional elections when one candidate doesn't receive a majority was passed in the dying moments of the session.

Although the major objectives of the Texas State Teachers Association have been reached, there are more to come.

These include a sick leave plan for teachers; provision for assistant superintendent units for large school systems; using average daily attendance, instead of scholastic census, as the factor for determining distribution of the State's available school funds

to local districts; more driver education teachers; compulsory attendance for all children, six through 16, for the whole school year; and creation of regional film libraries.

Incidentally, the \$810 teacher pay raise doesn't necessarily mean every teacher in the state will get such a raise. Some districts already are paying their teachers more than the state minimum. In such cases it's up to the districts to decide whether a raise is in order.

SALES TAX EXPLAINED — Prime targets of the state's new two per cent sales tax, which becomes effective September 1, are furniture, household and kitchen appliances, clothing with some exceptions, household supplies, toys, restaurant meals and gas and electric utility bills.

But these are not all by any means, as you'll soon discover. However, groceries, housing, medical and dental bills, insurance, and telephone service will not be covered by the new levy.

One break for the taxpayer came with the new tax bill. The three per cent tax which was on television sets, radios and air conditioners will be reduced to two per cent. Cosmetics tax will be lowered from 2.2 per cent to two per cent.

It should be some consolation, at least, to know that all sales taxes under the new law are consumer taxes and thus deductible from the federal income tax.

DANIEL ACCEDES TO SALES TAX — Governor Daniel filed the sales tax bill with the Secretary of State, unsigned. This permitted it to become law without his signature.

He said to veto it at this time, when appropriations must be met Sept. 1, "would be disastrous to the State of Texas, its school children, state institutions, old age pensioners, and other programs which are dependent upon adequate revenue and appropriations."

"It is with considerable regret," he said, "that I feel compelled to permit this type of bill to become law. Among other inequities it contains a limited type of general sales tax which I have opposed for 22 years."

There is no time to "re-fight" the tax battle, he added.

SCHOOL BUS PRICES FIXED? — An anti-trust suit has been filed by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson against 16 persons and firms. Suit alleges that bids on school buses sold to the state have been rigged.

Wilson said something like 5,100 buses costing \$23,000,000 are involved. Allegation is that those named agreed to "fix, maintain and increase the price at which school buses are sold in the State of Texas."

Suit asks penalties up to \$3,600,000 for price-fixing acts covering a period from January 1, 1955 to August 16, 1961.

DO'S AND DON'TS WITH STATE MONEY — The Legislature says it's all right for the Governor to transfer funds from other appropriations into the Civil Defense and Disaster Relief appropriation if the President proclaims the national safety is in danger.

It also says he can purchase a \$10,000 limousine for official use—but Governor Daniel quickly announced he would not do so "as long as the state deficit continues."

Legislature says it's NOT all right for state money to be spent on embossed or engraved printing or stationery, except for the offices of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, members of the Legislature, and for degrees and diplomas from state institutions of higher learning.

SHORT SNOOTS — There will be no more game wardens in Texas after September 1. Thereafter they will be called "conservation officers." "Actually," says Howard Dodgen, secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, "they spend more time on prevention of violations than in actually making arrests."

Paris Jr. College Opens Sept. 5th For Fall Term

Paris Junior College will open its doors to students for the thirty-eighth year on September 5. Pre-registration gets underway August 28 and will continue until September 5. On September 5, all new students are required to be at the college at 9 a. m. for a full day's orientation. Night classes at the college will hold registration Wednesday evening, September 6 at 7 p. m.

College officials are preparing for a large increase in enrollment this year. All indications point in that direction. Last year's enrollment was approximately 575 students from eight states and 35 counties.

The physical plant of the college has had a thorough going-over this summer. Many repairs and a great amount of painting has been done.

The physical plant is in tip-top condition to accept both new and former students. The total acreage of the campus and the college farm has increased to 347 acres.

Primary purpose of the school is to give two years of college training to students who plan to continue their work for academic professional degrees in institutions of higher learning.

PJC's secondary purpose is accomplished by providing courses for those who want training in professional fields such as watch making, watch repair, jewelry-craft, upholstery, shop mechanics and vocational and practical agriculture.

Paris Junior College attributes its success to two things — small well-supervised classes, and its modern, and completely equipped one and one-half million dollar plant.

Scholastic credits at PJC are accepted in any college or university in the United States. The college is a member in good standing of the Texas Education Agency, the Texas Association of Colleges and Universities, and the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the highest affiliation possible for a junior college.

Headed by Dr. C. Charles Clark, who is serving his first year as administrative head of the college boasts a large and well qualified faculty.

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Predict Traffic Toll 30 Deaths In Texas Labor Day

Austin. — Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today announced the official prediction that 30 persons in Texas will be killed in traffic accidents during the Labor Day week end.

In making the prediction, Garrison warned motorists that records show this three-day period to be one of the most dangerous times of the year on the highways.

The highest Labor Day holiday toll since World War II was in 1951 when 46 persons were killed in 33 accidents. The lowest was in 1949—23 killed in 19 accidents. Figures prove most fatal accidents are caused by traffic law violations.

The DPS, in an effort to focus public attention on the hazards of holiday traffic and to compile data which will be helpful in improving the state's traffic management program, will conduct "Operation Motorcade," from 12:01 a. m. Saturday, September 2 through 11:59 p. m. Monday, September 4.

During the 72-hour period, the safety agency will tabulate all traffic deaths in the state and issue bulletins at 10:00 a. m., 3:00 p. m. and 9:00 p. m. each day.

"Driving is always a full-time job, and driver concentration and alertness are especially essential during holiday periods because crowded highways increase driving hazards," Garrison said.

"An all-out effort will be made by DPS enforcement personnel to remove traffic violators from the highways. The Texas Highway Patrol force will be augmented by some 150 patrolmen from the other uniformed services of the Department of Public Safety. All available radar units will be in operation.

"But law enforcement officers can do only so much. Texas highways will be as safe as Texas drivers want them to be. And what they want will be reflected in the way they drive.

"This Labor Day week end we are asking each driver to cooperate in making Texas highways safe and obeying the traffic laws and by staying alert while driving."

Garrison suggested several ways drivers can cut down the holiday traffic death toll:

1. Allow sufficient time for travel.
2. Obey the traffic laws; they are designed to facilitate smooth traffic flow and to save lives.
3. Anticipate dangerous situations. Don't depend on another driver to prevent an accident—be prepared to do it yourself.
4. Stay alert. Anything that impairs your driving skill or distracts your attention while driving might prove fatal.

New Hunting And Fishing Licenses Needed Sept. 1st

All persons who hunt outside their home counties are required to have the new licenses. A new fishing license is also necessary for those who fish outside the county of their residence or use any kind of winding device.

Persons under 17 and over 65 years of age are not required to have licenses.

Hunting licenses are \$3.15 and fishing licenses \$2.15.

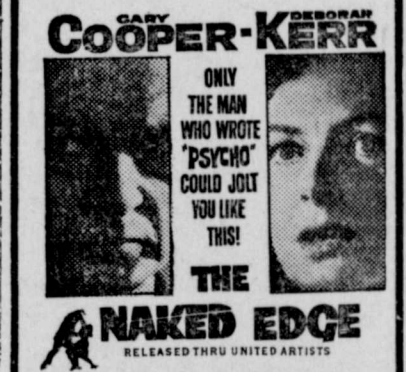

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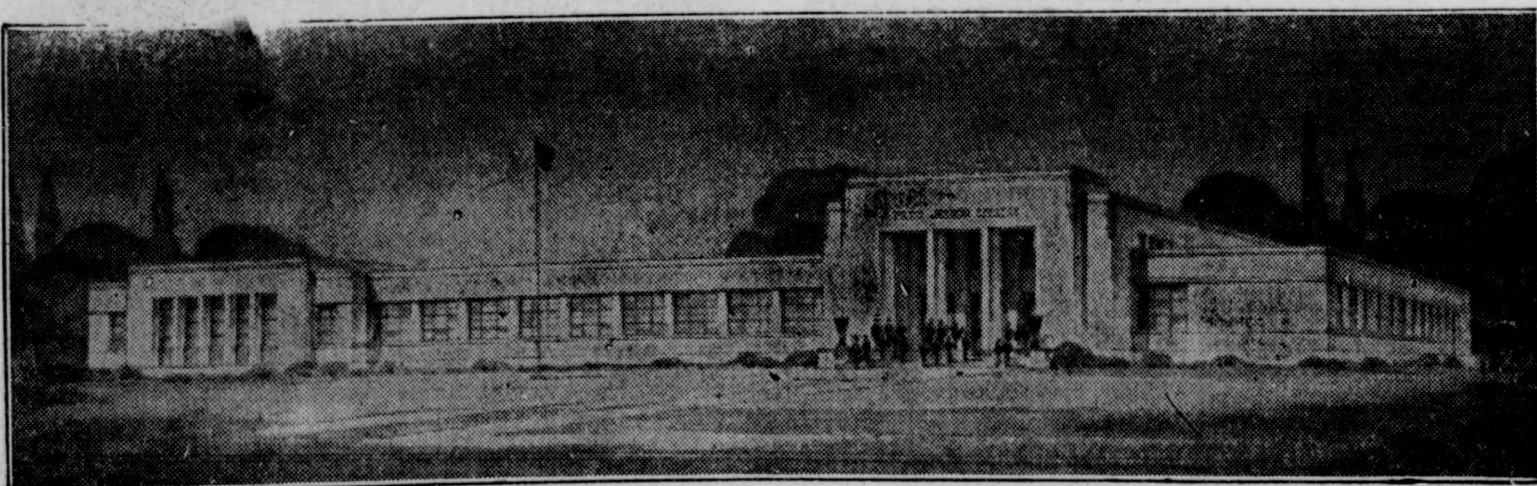

During World War II these countries remained loyal to our side. If Mexico or one of the other Latin American countries had defected to the Germans or the Japanese, we would have been vulnerable. Among the nations of the world, we have a good reputation for never breaking an agreement and also for never coveting a foot of land belonging to any other country. We have definite commitments to the Latin American countries that must be carefully considered.

North American Protestant churches now maintain 27,219 missionaries overseas, nearly double 10 years ago, at a cost of \$170-million a year, up 32% the last four years.

Jet-jackers must be discouraged by adequate penalties, but use of pistols in pressurized cabins would be a cure more dangerous than the disease, pilots say. New York Mayorality Election.
The Kennedy Administration faces its first possible defeat in New York City election, as a result of party strife in that area. The primary will be held September 7 and the final election November 7. A Republican victory for this, the Nation's second most demanding executive post, would substantially aid Governor Rockefeller's '64 chances.

The New Agricultural Bill of 1961 (H. R. 8230) has passed the Congress and been signed into law. Its objectives are to reduce burdensome surpluses and provide a better income for farmers. The law will reverse the Benson farm policy which tried to cure the farm recession by putting the farmers on a "survival of the fittest" basis.

The Small Business Administration has licensed 336 Small Business Investment Companies under the Johnson-Patman Act of 1958. One of the most recent Small Business Investment Companies licensed is the \$2-million Gulf-Southwest Capital Corporation, Neils Esperson Building, Houston. It will begin operations with initial capital of \$2-

090,129, all private funds, and plans to supply equity capital and long-term loan funds to businesses in diversified industries. No Federal funds are involved.

Chin Up. It is never too early, but it can be too late to watch your physical fitness. The President's expert on youth fitness, Coach "Bud" Wilkinson, of Oklahoma, advises that we have a great number of physically undeveloped in this country. Tests reveal a continuing deterioration in the fitness of our children and young adults. Schools and parents must pay more attention to the physical development of the children. Every child needs "15 minutes of vigorous activity every day."

Recovery Progresses. The sharp business recovery in evidence since the first of the year is reflected in consumer markets, as department store sales in July met their second best month in history. The outlook appears favorable for the rest of the summer and on into the fall and winter.

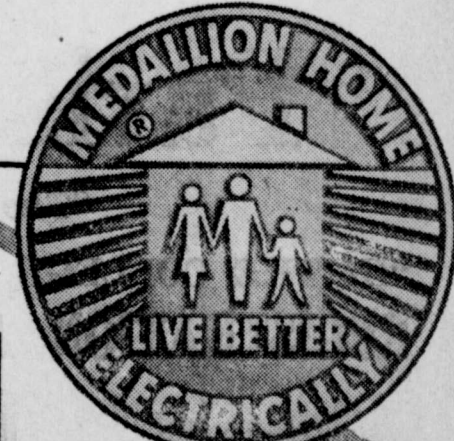
