# Palestinians walk out of peace talks

JERUSALEM (AP) — Deepening a sense of crisis in Israeli-Palestinian peace talks, Palestinian negotiators unexpectedly walked out of talks in Jerusalem Monday night.

The walkout came hours after U.S. mediator Dennis Ross announced that he was returning to Washington.

Israelis and Palestinians blamed each other for an impasse after two weeks of talks.

It was not clear when the Palestin-

ians intended to return to the negotiating table. Moshe Fogel, a spokesman for Israel's government, told *The Associated Press* that "in principle" the negotiations would continue Tuesday. He said the Palestinians seemed angry, "but we believe these are delaying tactics."

The latest round of talks began in response to a plea from President Clinton following a week of violence in which Palestinian police and Israeli

soldiers opened fire on one another, killing 79 people. At a summit in Washington, Clinton persuaded the two sides to negotiate non-stop until they reached agreement.

But since then, the Palestinians have walked out of talks several times to consult with Arafat, each time returning to the table. It was unclear whether Monday's walkout was more serious.

Ross said there had been progress

in the latest round — just not enough. Israel, on the other hand, claimed that only details remained unresolved and accused Palestinians of stalling. The Palestinians said both were overestimating the progress.

The talks continued after Ross announced his departure. But Palestinian negotiators "got up and walked out" from a session discussing security in the West Bank town of Hebron after Israeli troops pull out, according

to Moshe Fogel, a spokesman for Israel's government.

A Palestinian official said on condition of anonymity that the chief Palestinian negotiator, Saeb Erekat, went to the nearby autonomous West Bank city of Bethlehem to report to Yasser Arafat on the new disagreements.

Fogel said the Palestinians walked out after the Israelis refused to renegotiate aspects of the agreement that had been worked out in recent nego-

tiations. A separate committee working on civilian aspects of the new Hebron arrangement was still meeting, he said.

Erekat had suggested earlier that Ross' assessment of progress was overly optimistic.

"Mr. Ross has been talking about progress since the first day he got here," he told *The AP*. "Maybe in his way Mr. Ross sees progress, but in our way we do not see any progress."

## Tech launches quest for dean

Texas Tech officials began searching for a new dean for the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center School of Medicine this week.

TTUHSC President David R. Smith announced the formation of a search committee Friday.

Smith said he will serve as interim dean until a replacement is found.

All applications for the position must be received by Dec. 1.

Dr. Eugene Dabezies, chairman of orthopaedics at TTUHSC, will serve as chairman of the 13-member committee.

Dr. E. Jay Wheeler, associate dean for strategic planning and program development, will serve as committee secretary. The search committee is composed of doctors from not only the Lubbock campus, but also from Odessa, Amarillo and El Paso health sciences center campuses.

"Right now we are just beginning to collect applications," Dabezies said.

"This will be a nationwide search."

TTUHSC officials recently placed advertisements in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, academic journals and at least four other journals around the country, Dabezies said.

Although the search will have a national scope, Chancellor John T. Montford said qualified applicants from within the school will not be overlooked.

"This will be a large-scale search for the dean," Montford said.

"We always have to look both inside the school and elsewhere when looking to fill a position."

One of the chief qualifications the committee will look for in a new dean will be previous teaching experience in a medical center, said Dr. Alfred Karickhoff, committee member and regional chairman of pediatrics at TTUHSC in Odessa.

"We are looking for an individual who has quality academic credentials, people management skills and business skills as they relate to medicine in 1996," Karickhoff said.

In addition to classroom experience, the committee will

look at many other considerations.

"We have a changing picture, and we are looking for a person with credentials in a major medical

school," Dabezies said. "They should also have experience in managed health care and educational research. Basically we just need an experienced person who can deal with all this job deals with. It is a tough job."

After reviewing the resumes of all applicants, the committee will interview a short list of the most qualified candidates.

Then the committee will give its work to Smith who will look at the recommendations and submit a name to the board of regents for final approval.

Montford will have no direct involvement in the decision and said he has faith that the committee and Smith will choose a person who is qualified for the job.

"Our job is to make his (Smith's) job easier," Dabezies said. "He is going to help us get some names, and we will work with those names along with the other applications we get."

## Let it snow, let it snow

### Unexpected flurries fall over Tech, Lubbock

Mother Nature gave Texas Tech and the Lubbock area a small taste of winter as snow fell throughout the city Monday.

"We are forecasting 1-3 inches of snow, and it looks like the low will be around 30 degrees depending on how cloudy and windy it gets," said Greg Shelton, a meteorologist for the

National Weather Service in Lubbock.

Any snow falling Monday night should stick to trees and grassy areas but probably will not stick to the roadways because it has been so warm, Shelton said.

"The average freeze for Lubbock is October 31, and the snow is a little unusual," he said.

The cold front hit Lubbock Monday morning, but the temperatures should be back in the 70s later in the week, Shelton said.

Tech's ground maintenance department is prepared for the inclement weather, said Dewey Shroyer, director of grounds maintenance.

"We won't start sanding until it starts freezing, and we are not anticipating a freeze," Shroyer said.

The ground temperature is warm enough to prevent the snow from sticking, even though there may be spot freezes on bridges and overpasses, he said. The grounds maintenance department is in the process of replacing mums with pansies and will replace the flowers affected by the freeze.

Monday's cold, wet weather should not cause an increase in colds or flus among Tech students, said Jo Henderson, health education coordinator for Student Health Services.

"The cold doesn't have anything to do with it," Henderson said. "It's the time of year — this stuff comes up."

There are things students can do during this time of year to decrease their chances of getting sick, she said.

Students should get lots of

rest, avoid stress, wash their hands often, avoid crowds, eat a healthy and balanced diet and keep their hands away from mouth, nose and eyes, she said. Students also should use disposable tissues instead of handkerchiefs, limit alcohol intake and consider having a flu shot.

Monday's snow also did not affect the Lubbock area cotton crop or pasture grass.

"The cotton crop has done all it's going to do," said Richard Zartman, Tech professor of plant and soil sciences.

Saturday morning's 37-degree temperatures brought an end to the cotton's growth, Zartman said.

Once the temperature dropped below 60 degrees,

the grasses stopped growing, so Monday's snow had no effect on the pastures.

The only possible problem with the snow could occur if the snow is really wet and the wind blows some cotton out of the boll, he said.

The cold weather probably will not have a severe effect on Lubbock area cattle but could if the weather stays like this for a few days, said Andy Herring, Tech animal science professor.

"The problem is a lot of cattle don't have their winter haircoat," Herring said.

The lack of extra hair makes the cattle more susceptible to cold weather, he said. Herring said he will put out extra hay to make sure cattle have enough food in their stomachs to keep them warm.

## Gay policy survives first challenge

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton's "don't ask, don't tell" policy on gays in the military survived its first Supreme Court test Monday as the court rejected the appeal of a former Navy officer dismissed for declaring his homosexuality.

The justices rejected former Lt. Paul Thomasson's

argument that the policy is unlawful discrimination and a violation of homosexual service members' free-speech rights.

Thomasson was forced to leave the Navy last year after writing a letter to his commander that said, "I am gay."

The court's action was not a ruling on the issue's merits and does not preclude the justices

from fully reviewing the policy in a future case. But the court let stand a lower court's decision that upheld the rule barring openly homosexual people from serving in the military. The Clinton administration said the government has a legitimate interest in prohibiting homosexual acts in the military.

## Young people not interested in election, issues

WEST HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (AP) — Young people chat and sip gourmet coffee, drawn to an outdoor mall by a "Rock the Vote" benefit concert. But even here, cynicism and apathy about politics abound.

"There's not an issue in this election that directly pertains to me," said Bjami Brown, 26, a Los Angeles publicist.

Twenty-five years after 18- to

20-year-olds won the right to vote, young people remain the least likely group to cast ballots.

In 1992, 43 percent of Americans aged 18 to 24 voted, compared with 70 percent of those aged 45-64.

Bibi Bielat, 26, a music tour manager from Thousand Oaks, exemplifies the problem. "Politics is a dud topic," says Bielat.

It's just that attitude being

targeted by youth advocacy groups that are developing an array of new means to cajole young people to the polls.

Young people can obtain voter registration materials and information about candidates and issues through the World Wide Web.

A low-tech effort asks more politically active senior citizens to "adopt" their grandchildren

by urging them to vote.

This will also be the first presidential election in which the "motor voter" law is felt. The law requires all states to offer voter registration through state agencies such as motor vehicle offices. About 12 million people will have registered under motor voter by Election Day, according to Human SERVE, a national voter registration group.

## Our Point

### Montford should follow records laws

Texas Tech Chancellor John T. Montford should know the law. After 14 years in the Texas Senate, he helped make it.

And now he's showing complete disregard for one of the very laws he supported as an elected state government official.

Montford obviously should have a pretty good idea of what the Texas Open Records Law is about. It means that all documents, writings, letters, memoranda or other written, printed, typed, copied or developed materials pertaining to a government body that contain public information are open to everyone — from resident to reporter.

Prior to coming to Tech, Montford served as a state senator and supervised the State Affairs Committee that handled changes to Open Records Laws. During the 69th Legislature in May 1985, Montford took a vested interest in open records and proceeded to author an application to the law concerning information collected and maintained by a prosecutor's office.

Thus, Montford does know what this law is all about. And because Texas Tech is a state-funded institution of higher education, this university is susceptible to the Open Records Law in every sense of its definition. Montford should know that.

There are exceptions to the law, but information regarding personnel salaries on the Texas Tech campus is deemed public information. An open records letter should not be required to obtain such information. Montford should know this, too.

But, it seems he's forgotten.

Monday, *The University Daily* filed an open records letter with Pat Campbell, Tech's legal counsel, in order to obtain information regarding administrative salaries, the number of new administrative positions that came on the heels of Montford's August arrival and the source of funding for administrative salaries.

All of the information should be easily accessed under the law, but *The UD* has been unable to obtain accurate, complete information regarding salaries and new personnel positions through repeated interviews and requests for interviews.

The reasons for withholding the information are uncertain, but open records requests on this campus obviously are necessary to learn even basic administrative information.

And it's so hypocritical for this university's leader, who once helped create state law, to deny access to public information that's made public under state law.

Montford ought to know this.

He shouldn't force the student media, or any media for that matter, to jump through hoops to get what should be readily available to them.

It's the law.

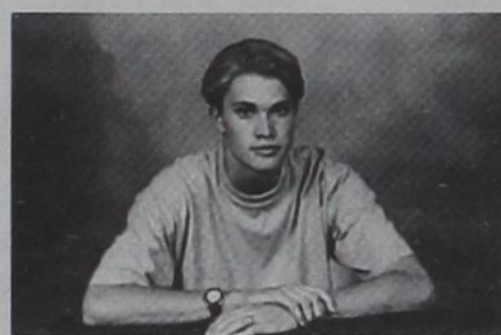

#### Austin American-Statesman on lawsuit reform overkill:

Texans for Lawsuit Reform, an organization representing major corporate interests in Texas, has hired a firm to discredit public-interest and consumer groups that oppose legislation limiting lawsuits.

Which groups so worry big business interests that they must be targeted? Why it's the powers at Citizen Action, Consumers Union, Public Citizen, Greenpeace, the Sierra Club and the Audubon Society.

That isn't a list likely to frighten the chemical, oil, insurance and other big-business interests that lobby so forcefully in the Texas Capitol. In fact, it is a bit like the neighborhood bully seeking out the smallest kids on the block to whip up on just for the heck of it.

Lawsuit reform is a legitimate area of interest for business and consumers to debate. But attempting to take the public interest out of the discussion appears so ruthless it could backfire.

#### Fort Worth Star-Telegram on Social Security:

It was almost overlooked in the excitement, but there really was a notable and important issue addressed — sort of — in last week's presidential debate.

Both major-party candidates had been using a sort of "Get Out of Jail Free" card on the subject of Social Security. They had passed on it. No one had even claimed that the other fellow was against Social Security, because it would have opened the subject to debate in an election year.

But a member of the audience asked a question, and it turned out that President Clinton and Republican candidate Bob Dole are pretty much on the same page. Clinton, correctly, pointed out that Social Security and Medicare (Medicare has been a topic for vivid disagreement and name-calling) are very different subjects, requiring different solutions. Then he said that an "adjustment" for Social Security might best be done by a bipartisan commission, as it was in 1983. He even gave Dole credit for his role on that commission.

Dole appeared to agree.

A commission, he pointed out, would take most of the politics out of the issue.

It was the only answer that either man could give, because it is obvious that real changes in COLAs, retirement age, how funds are invested, etc. — more than an "adjustment" — is needed to preserve Social Security for future generations — will have to have the "cover" of a bipartisan commission recommendation, just as in 1983.

But at least Social Security, so vital for so many Americans, is now out in the open. Maybe soon, after the election, some of Washington's cooler heads can actually sit down and start talking about giving it longer life.

# Fire officials question safety procedures at UT science lab

AUSTIN (AP) — The safety of chemical storage practices at the University of Texas' Welch Hall is being questioned by fire officials in the wake of the chemistry building's fifth fire in 2 1/2 years.

Saturday's fire ignited in a fifth-floor laboratory when a postdoctoral researcher began to dispose of sodium used in an experiment, university officials said. In its pure form, sodium is a highly active metal that reacts violently with water to produce highly inflammable hydrogen gas.

"Chemical fires are the most dangerous because you just can't tell what will happen," said Austin Fire Department specialist Jim Abbott. "Chemicals can kill you now, three months from now or 15 years from now."

"They can mix with each other and reignite. They can explode. Anything can occur when you've got these materials piled on top of each other like they are in there."

As a state institution, UT does not have to comply with city fire codes and is not required to comply with the city fire department's recommendations on fire safety. The Austin Fire Department helped in the cleanup.

"However, at this time, the Austin Fire Department is not satisfied that the University of Texas has done everything possible to ensure the safety of the students in this building during

the time that these chemistry lab experiments are being done," said Gary Warren, the city's fire marshal and assistant fire chief.

Saturday's six-alarm fire caused an estimated \$300,000 in damage.

No one was injured, but 90 firefighters — about half the city's force — were called to the scene to contain and extinguish the fire.

Ron Buys, hazardous materials engineer for the Austin Fire Department, said that in some labs, "a lot of bottles and chemicals" are being stored in the open when storage in non-combustible cabinets would be safer.

In the past, firefighters have seen chemicals stored on the floor, Buys said.

UT and city fire officials have met

several times in two years about how chemicals are stored and handled in the building's 100 laboratories, he said.

University officials agreed there are problems in one of the nation's largest university chemistry departments.

"That's what we're working on now," said Billy Shugart, a UT fire safety technician.

He said UT is trying to upgrade the parts of Welch Hall that don't have sprinkler systems.

But UT officials said hazardous chemicals are a necessary hazard at a top-rank university and always will be on hand.

"You can't have first-rate science

without dealing in reactive agents," said Marye Anne Fox, UT vice president for research. "And whenever you use reactive agents, there is always going to be some risk."

Sunday, crews from EnTech Environmental Service entered the building wearing oxygen tanks, face masks, and chemical-retardant overalls to clean up debris and chemicals they say can form deadly combinations of toxic vapors.

Officials for the private firm, hired by the university, said cleanup is expected to last through Tuesday.

Most classes in the building were expected to go on Monday as scheduled, officials announced.

## Woman accused of murder may receive new trial site

KERRVILLE (AP) — A Rowlett homemaker accused of stabbing to death her two young sons got a new high-powered defense lawyer Monday who wants to move the capital murder trial back to Dallas. The latest legal twist in the case of 26-year-old Darlie Routier came as jury selection got under way in Kerr County.

"We'll find out tomorrow whether or not we're going back to Dallas," defense attorney Doug Mulder said.

He declined to discuss his reasons for wanting the trial relocated, noting the gag order imposed by state District Judge Mark Tolle.

Defense attorneys said they expect Tolle to hold a hearing Tues-

day on the request to move the trial again. The trial came to this Hill Country community after Routier's previous lawyers sought to have it moved from Dallas because of pre-trial publicity.

Routier is accused in the June 6 stabbing deaths of her sons Damon, 5, and Devon, 6. She claims an intruder killed them as they slept in the living room of the family's suburban home and that the attacker slashed her neck and shoulder before fleeing through the garage.

But police say Routier wounded herself to cover the crime and that there was no intruder.

Investigators reported finding no blood in the garage, on the garage window or in the backyard.

## Man sentenced to 16 years in death of fetus

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) — A drunken driver was sentenced to 16 years in prison Monday in the death of a baby who was delivered prematurely after an auto accident.

The infant's grandmother whispered "Oh God" as the punishment was read, while the child's mother and father embraced quietly.

Frank Flores Cuellar, 50, had faced anywhere from probation to 20 years in prison for intoxication manslaughter in the death of Krystal Zuniga, who was delivered shortly after the accident and later died.

The case, one of the first in Texas to test whether a person may be prosecuted for harming a fetus, has been monitored by both sides of the abortion debate because it touches on the question of when life begins.

However, Krystal's relatives said that question was answered by the

jury's verdict and sentence.

"She wasn't a fetus — she had a heartbeat," said the baby's grandmother, Rebecca Coronado, who was in the car when the accident occurred.

Krystal's mother, Jeannie Coronado, declined comment. Speaking on her behalf, Rebecca Coronado said knowing Cuellar will be behind bars would help her daughter deal with her loss.

"He's not going to be out on the street, we stopped him," she said. "We lost (Krystal), but I know we won at the end."

Defense attorney Anne Marshall vowed to appeal, however, saying Cuellar should not have been prosecuted because Krystal was not yet born at the time of the accident.

She cited the state's legal meaning of person, defined as an individual who "has been born and is alive."

"When is a crime committed? It is committed when the prohibited behavior is committed," she said. "I'm very confident we'll get a reversal on appeal."

A state appeals court considered a similar case in 1994, overturning the conviction of a Walker County woman charged with reckless injury to a child for smoking crack while pregnant.

In that case, the court said the Legislature specifically limited the application of laws to conduct that injures a human being who has been born.

Nevertheless, District Attorney Carlos Valdez said he was certain the verdict would stand if the law is interpreted correctly.

"I'm going to ask the court to just strictly construe the statute," he said. "If you read something into it, you may come up with a different result."

Cuellar was intoxicated at more

than twice the legal limit when he crashed his truck into a car driven by Jeannie Coronado as she returned from a late-night trip to the grocery store June 15.

Coronado, 7 1/2 months pregnant, gave birth to Krystal by emergency Caesarean section. Weighing just 4 pounds and having suffered extensive brain damage, the baby died 44 hours later.

After his sentence was read, Cuellar — a laborer with no high school education and three previous drunken driving convictions — apologized for his actions, saying, "I didn't intend for any of this to happen."

The seven-woman, five-man jury took one hour last week to convict Cuellar but deliberated six hours over his punishment. Cuellar still faces trial on two related charges for minor injuries suffered by Coronado.

## Dole pushes tax-cut plan

DETROIT (AP) — Bob Dole offered his tax-cut plan Monday as the solution for a sluggish economy, but the difficulty of his sale was underscored when Republican governors gave an upbeat assessment of the country's financial health.

"The economy has never been better," Ohio Gov. George Voinovich said at campaign gathering designed to promote Dole's candidacy. "But let me tell you, it's the governors of this country who have made the difference."

Taking a similar tack, Michigan Gov. John Engler conceded that the economic picture has brightened in his state but asked, "Who's really responsible? Here, it's been our strategy to pass 21 (state) tax cuts to offset Clinton's tax increase."

Iowa's Terry Branstad said Clinton was "fooling" people into giving him credit.

Dole, trailing Clinton throughout the Midwest battleground states with just 15 days left until the election, set aside his challenge of the president's ethics to promote his centerpiece plan to balance the budget, cut income taxes by 15 percent and halve capital gains taxes.

"It's about growth, it's about jobs, it's about opportunity, it's about the private sector," Dole told an assembly of eight GOP governors and private business leaders at the Detroit Diesel Corp.

The GOP presidential hopeful criticized Clinton's economic growth rate of about 2.5 percent per year.

"You don't create more jobs, more opportunity with 2.5 percent," he said.

Under Clinton, the economy has grown at an annual average rate of 2.7 percent, about twice that of the Bush years but below the 3.0 percent pace during the Reagan presidency, according to the Commerce Department.

Dole's running mate, Jack Kemp, joined the GOP nominee in Detroit to push the ticket's economic plan. He said Clinton and other Democrats were criticizing the GOP tax-cut plan in order to "drive a wedge" between labor and employers.

As if to undercut Dole's economic claims, Clinton himself followed Dole into Detroit on Monday afternoon to attend the ground-breaking of a \$1.6-billion airport expansion.

Vice President Al Gore, meanwhile, criticized Dole's economic plan, telling students in Las Vegas that Dole's "risky tax scheme" reminded him of the tricks he'd seen in a show by magicians Siegfried and Roy.

## Our Point

### Montford should follow records laws

Texas Tech Chancellor John T. Montford should know the law. After 14 years in the Texas Senate, he helped make it.

And now he's showing complete disregard for one of the very laws he supported as an elected state government official.

Montford obviously should have a pretty good idea of what the Texas Open Records Law is about. It means that all documents, writings, letters, memoranda or other written, printed, typed, copied or developed materials pertaining to a government body that contain public information are open to everyone — from resident to reporter.

Prior to coming to Tech, Montford served as a state senator and supervised the State Affairs Committee that handled changes to Open Records Laws. During the 69th Legislature in May 1985, Montford took a vested interest in open records and proceeded to author an application to the law concerning information collected and maintained by a prosecutor's office.

Thus, Montford does know what this law is all about. And because Texas Tech is a state-funded institution of higher education, this university is susceptible to the Open Records Law in every sense of its definition. Montford should know that.

There are exceptions to the law, but information regarding personnel salaries on the Texas Tech campus is deemed public information. An open records letter should not be required to obtain such information. Montford should know this, too.

But, it seems he's forgotten.

Monday, *The University Daily* filed an open records letter with Pat Campbell, Tech's legal counsel, in order to obtain information regarding administrative salaries, the number of new administrative positions that came on the heels of Montford's August arrival and the source of funding for administrative salaries.

All of the information should be easily accessed under the law, but *The UD* has been unable to obtain accurate, complete information regarding salaries and new personnel positions through repeated interviews and requests for interviews.

The reasons for withholding the information are uncertain, but open records requests on this campus obviously are necessary to learn even basic administrative information.

And it's so hypocritical for this university's leader, who once helped create state law, to deny access to public information that's made public under state law.

Montford ought to know this.

He shouldn't force the student media, or any media for that matter, to jump through hoops to get what should be readily available to them.

It's the law.

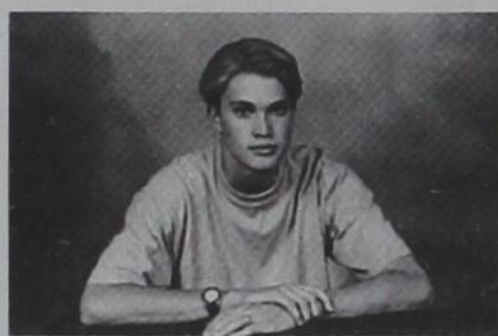

#### Austin American-Statesman on lawsuit reform overkill:

Texans for Lawsuit Reform, an organization representing major corporate interests in Texas, has hired a firm to discredit public-interest and consumer groups that oppose legislation limiting lawsuits.

Which groups so worry big business interests that they must be targeted? Why it's the powers at Citizen Action, Consumers Union, Public Citizen, Greenpeace, the Sierra Club and the Audubon Society.

That isn't a list likely to frighten the chemical, oil, insurance and other big-business interests that lobby so forcefully in the Texas Capitol. In fact, it is a bit like the neighborhood bully seeking out the smallest kids on the block to whip up on just for the heck of it.

Lawsuit reform is a legitimate area of interest for business and consumers to debate. But attempting to take the public interest out of the discussion appears so ruthless it could backfire.

#### Fort Worth Star-Telegram on Social Security:

It was almost overlooked in the excitement, but there really was a notable and important issue addressed — sort of — in last week's presidential debate.

Both major-party candidates had been using a sort of "Get Out of Jail Free" card on the subject of Social Security. They had passed on it. No one had even claimed that the other fellow was against Social Security, because it would have opened the subject to debate in an election year.

But a member of the audience asked a question, and it turned out that President Clinton and Republican candidate Bob Dole are pretty much on the same page. Clinton, correctly, pointed out that Social Security and Medicare (Medicare has been a topic for vivid disagreement and name-calling) are very different subjects, requiring different solutions. Then he said that an "adjustment" for Social Security might best be done by a bipartisan commission, as it was in 1983. He even gave Dole credit for his role on that commission.

Dole appeared to agree.

A commission, he pointed out, would take most of the politics out of the issue.

It was the only answer that either man could give, because it is obvious that real changes in COLAs, retirement age, how funds are invested, etc. — more than an "adjustment" — is needed to preserve Social Security for future generations — will have to have the "cover" of a bipartisan commission recommendation, just as in 1983.

But at least Social Security, so vital for so many Americans, is now out in the open. Maybe soon, after the election, some of Washington's cooler heads can actually sit down and start talking about giving it longer life.

# Fire officials question safety procedures at UT science lab

AUSTIN (AP) — The safety of chemical storage practices at the University of Texas' Welch Hall is being questioned by fire officials in the wake of the chemistry building's fifth fire in 2 1/2 years.

Saturday's fire ignited in a fifth-floor laboratory when a postdoctoral researcher began to dispose of sodium used in an experiment, university officials said. In its pure form, sodium is a highly active metal that reacts violently with water to produce highly inflammable hydrogen gas.

"Chemical fires are the most dangerous because you just can't tell what will happen," said Austin Fire Department specialist Jim Abbott. "Chemicals can kill you now, three months from now or 15 years from now."

"They can mix with each other and reignite. They can explode. Anything can occur when you've got these materials piled on top of each other like they are in there."

As a state institution, UT does not have to comply with city fire codes and is not required to comply with the city fire department's recommendations on fire safety. The Austin Fire Department helped in the cleanup.

"However, at this time, the Austin Fire Department is not satisfied that the University of Texas has done everything possible to ensure the safety of the students in this building during the time that these chemistry lab experiments are being done," said Gary Warren, the city's fire marshal and assistant fire chief.

Saturday's six-alarm fire caused an estimated \$300,000 in damage.

No one was injured, but 90 firefighters — about half the city's force — were called to the scene to contain and extinguish the fire.

Ron Buys, hazardous materials engineer for the Austin Fire Department, said that in some labs, "a lot of bottles and chemicals" are being stored in the open when storage in non-combustible cabinets would be safer.

In the past, firefighters have seen chemicals stored on the floor, Buys said.

UT and city fire officials have met several times in two years about how chemicals are stored and handled in the building's 100 laboratories, he said.

University officials agreed there are problems in one of the nation's largest university chemistry departments.

"That's what we're working on now," said Billy Shugart, a UT fire safety technician.

He said UT is trying to upgrade the parts of Welch Hall that don't have sprinkler systems.

But UT officials said hazardous chemicals are a necessary hazard at a top-rank university and always will be on hand.

"You can't have first-rate science without dealing in reactive agents," said Marye Anne Fox, UT vice president for research. "And whenever you use reactive agents, there is always going to be some risk."

Sunday, crews from EnTech Environmental Service entered the building wearing oxygen tanks, face masks, and chemical-retardant overalls to clean up debris and chemicals they say can form deadly combinations of toxic vapors.

Officials for the private firm, hired by the university, said cleanup is expected to last through Tuesday.

Most classes in the building were expected to go on Monday as scheduled, officials announced.

## Woman accused of murder may receive new trial site

KERRVILLE (AP) — A Rowlett homemaker accused of stabbing to death her two young sons got a new high-powered defense lawyer Monday who wants to move the capital murder trial back to Dallas. The latest legal twist in the case of 26-year-old Darlie Routier came as jury selection got under way in Kerr County.

"We'll find out tomorrow whether or not we're going back to Dallas," defense attorney Doug Mulder said.

He declined to discuss his reasons for wanting the trial relocated, noting the gag order imposed by state District Judge Mark Tolle.

Defense attorneys said they expect Tolle to hold a hearing Tuesday on the request to move the trial again. The trial came to this Hill Country community after Routier's previous lawyers sought to have it moved from Dallas because of pre-trial publicity.

Routier is accused in the June 6 stabbing deaths of her sons Damon, 5, and Devon, 6. She claims an intruder killed them as they slept in the living room of the family's suburban home and that the attacker slashed her neck and shoulder before fleeing through the garage.

But police say Routier wounded herself to cover the crime and that there was no intruder.

Investigators reported finding no blood in the garage, on the garage window or in the backyard.

## Man sentenced to 16 years in death of fetus

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) — A drunken driver was sentenced to 16 years in prison Monday in the death of a baby who was delivered prematurely after an auto accident.

The infant's grandmother whispered "Oh God" as the punishment was read, while the child's mother and father embraced quietly.

Frank Flores Cuellar, 50, had faced anywhere from probation to 20 years in prison for intoxication manslaughter in the death of Krystal Zuniga, who was delivered shortly after the accident and later died.

The case, one of the first in Texas to test whether a person may be prosecuted for harming a fetus, has been monitored by both sides of the abortion debate because it touches on the question of when life begins.

However, Krystal's relatives said that question was answered by the jury's verdict and sentence.

"She wasn't a fetus — she had a heartbeat," said the baby's grandmother, Rebecca Coronado, who was in the car when the accident occurred.

Krystal's mother, Jeannie Coronado, declined comment. Speaking on her behalf, Rebecca Coronado said knowing Cuellar will be behind bars would help her daughter deal with her loss.

"He's not going to be out on the street, we stopped him," she said. "We lost (Krystal), but I know we won at the end."

Defense attorney Anne Marshall vowed to appeal, however, saying Cuellar should not have been prosecuted because Krystal was not yet born at the time of the accident.

She cited the state's legal meaning of person, defined as an individual who "has been born and is alive."

"When is a crime committed? It is committed when the prohibited behavior is committed," she said. "I'm very confident we'll get a reversal on appeal."

A state appeals court considered a similar case in 1994, overturning the conviction of a Walker County woman charged with reckless injury to a child for smoking crack while pregnant.

In that case, the court said the Legislature specifically limited the application of laws to conduct that injures a human being who has been born.

Nevertheless, District Attorney Carlos Valdez said he was certain the verdict would stand if the law is interpreted correctly.

"I'm going to ask the court to just strictly construe the statute," he said. "If you read something into it, you may come up with a different result."

Cuellar was intoxicated at more than twice the legal limit when he crashed his truck into a car driven by Jeannie Coronado as she returned from a late-night trip to the grocery store June 15.

Coronado, 7 1/2 months pregnant, gave birth to Krystal by emergency Caesarean section. Weighing just 4 pounds and having suffered extensive brain damage, the baby died 44 hours later.

After his sentence was read, Cuellar — a laborer with no high school education and three previous drunken driving convictions — apologized for his actions, saying, "I didn't intend for any of this to happen."

The seven-woman, five-man jury took one hour last week to convict Cuellar but deliberated six hours over his punishment. Cuellar still faces trial on two related charges for minor injuries suffered by Coronado.

## Dole pushes tax-cut plan

DETROIT (AP) — Bob Dole offered his tax-cut plan Monday as the solution for a sluggish economy, but the difficulty of his sale was underscored when Republican governors gave an upbeat assessment of the country's financial health.

"The economy has never been better," Ohio Gov. George Voinovich said at campaign gathering designed to promote Dole's candidacy. "But let me tell you, it's the governors of this country who have made the difference."

Taking a similar tack, Michigan Gov. John Engler conceded that the economic picture has brightened in his state but asked, "Who's really responsible? Here, it's been our strategy to pass 21 (state) tax cuts to offset Clinton's tax increase."

Iowa's Terry Branstad said Clinton was "fooling" people into giving him credit.

Dole, trailing Clinton throughout the Midwest battleground states with just 15 days left until the election, set aside his challenge of the president's ethics to promote his centerpiece plan to balance the budget, cut income taxes by 15 percent and halve capital gains taxes.

"It's about growth, it's about jobs, it's about opportunity, it's about the private sector," Dole told an assembly of eight GOP governors and private business leaders at the Detroit Diesel Corp.

The GOP presidential hopeful criticized Clinton's economic growth rate of about 2.5 percent per year.

"You don't create more jobs, more opportunity with 2.5 percent," he said.

Under Clinton, the economy has grown at an annual average rate of 2.7 percent, about twice that of the Bush years but below the 3.0 percent pace during the Reagan presidency, according to the Commerce Department.

Dole's running mate, Jack Kemp, joined the GOP nominee in Detroit to push the ticket's economic plan. He said Clinton and other Democrats were criticizing the GOP tax-cut plan in order to "drive a wedge" between labor and employers.

As if to undercut Dole's economic claims, Clinton himself followed Dole into Detroit on Monday afternoon to attend the ground-breaking of a \$1.6-billion airport expansion.

Vice President Al Gore, meanwhile, criticized Dole's economic plan, telling students in Las Vegas that Dole's "risky tax scheme" reminded him of the tricks he'd seen in a show by magicians Siegfried and Roy.

# Doctor studies moose-related deaths

LEBANON, N.H. (AP) — Dr. John Sutton brakes for moose. But he's fascinated by people who don't.

The surgeon and chief of trauma at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center has carved a niche for himself by analyzing the injuries people receive when their cars and trucks collide with a moose.

Sutton's colleagues call him "Dr. Moose." It's no laughing matter for victims of moose collisions.

It took almost a month for doctors to remove all the glass from Audrey Carr's eyes after her car hit a moose last spring in rural Dorchester. Her husband, who was driving, was cut on the arms and chest.

The steering wheel was crushed

and the windshield shattered.

"The moose just about took the roof off the car," said Carr, who was knocked unconscious. "It caused \$9,000 worth of damage to the car."

Sutton found that 23 people were

hospitalized at Dartmouth-Hitchcock, Maine Medical Center and Eastern Maine Medical Center over 4 1/2 years for injuries suffered in moose-vehicle accidents, and two of them died of head injuries. Seventy percent of those who were not killed suffered head or facial injuries, and 26 percent had severe spine injuries.

Sutton said most moose-vehicle accidents demolish the car and kill the moose. Moose have no natural predators in northern New England and don't run from a car's headlights. They can also grow nearly 6 feet high and weigh more than 1,200 pounds.

Sutton found that cars often hit the moose under the belly, lifting it off its feet and onto the passenger cab, which

is crushed by the impact. His advice: When a collision with a moose looks inevitable, aim for the hindquarters.

In New Hampshire, where yellow "Brake for Moose" signs dot highways, Sutton estimated that 200 to 250 moose-vehicle collisions occur every year. He put the number at 650 or more in Maine. Vermont doesn't track the number of moose-auto collisions, but estimated more than 80 moose died in such accidents last year, up from zero in 1980.

In rural northern New England, "the likelihood of hospitals here to be taking care of someone who has hit a moose is greater than someone who's been shot or stabbed," said Sutton, who blames the increase in part on greater human traffic in rural areas.

"Everyone seems to have a moose story," said Sutton, who himself nearly hit a moose 20 years ago.

"A moose ran out of the woods," he recalled. "We swerved, and the moose ran alongside us for about 20 yards, so it was a near miss."

He now drives a Volvo, and his wife has a Saab, two automobiles he lauds for their moose-resistant construction.

Sutton said he hopes his work will help emergency rooms deal better with the moose-related injuries.



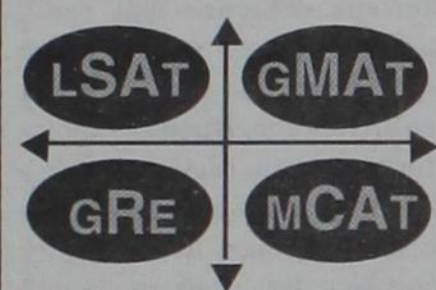

## Maddux returns spotlight to Braves' starting rotation

NEW YORK (AP) — The way Greg Maddux was pitching, one run would have been plenty.

The Atlanta Braves didn't need to go on another rampage, relying instead on Maddux's eight shutout innings to beat the New York Yankees 4-0 Monday night for a 2-0 lead in the World Series.

Fred McGriff drove in three runs as the Braves won their fifth straight game in the postseason, a span in which they've outscored opponents 48-2. On this night, though, Maddux put the focus right back on Atlanta's awesome starters.

The win moved the defending champions halfway toward another title, and sent the Series to Atlanta for the next three games — if all three are necessary.

Because of an earlier rainout, there will be no travel day. Instead, Game 3 will be Tuesday night, with 1995 World Series MVP Tom Glavine starting for the Braves against David Cone.

Maddux made it look easy, allowing six hits, permitting only two runners past first base and walking none. The lone time the Yankees put two runners on base in an inning, the four-time Cy Young winner induced Wade Boggs to bounce into a double play and got Bernie Williams to ground out to end the sixth.

Bullpen stopper Mark Wohlers struck out the side in the ninth for the Braves, allowing a two-out single to Cecil Fielder.

With nothing to cheer for, frustrated Yankees fans took to running on the field in the later innings. In fact, five of them touched second base, more people than the Yankees' offense put there.

The most action Maddux had on the mound came while showing off his seventh straight Gold Glove. He fielded five grounders, and also twice covered first base for putouts.

Maddux struck out two in improving to 7-4 lifetime in the postseason, including a 3-1 mark this year.

He also inflicted a bit of damage on the Yankees, hitting Derek Jeter on the left wrist with a pitch — the mishap caused a bruise that forced Jeter to wear an icepack between innings.

The shutout lowered the Braves' staff ERA to 1.43 in 12 games this postseason. It also made Atlanta just the 12th team in 92 World Series to win the first two games on the road.

Maddux and the Braves also settled the Yankees to their sixth straight loss in the Series. New York lost its last four in 1981 to Los Angeles, and fell 12-1 in the opener against Atlanta.

The Yankees will be at a deficit in Atlanta, too, when they lose the designated hitter.

Yankees starter Jimmy Key, who beat Atlanta twice while with Toronto in the 1992 Series, never settled into a rhythm.

He did not retire three straight batters until the fifth.

## Women's golf team reflects on fall season

Parker has been a consistent player

## Texas A&M game key to Red Raider's title run

In order to stay in the Big 12 Conference South Division title race, Texas Tech must right its ship for the next two games. Following a 24-10 loss to No. 5 Nebraska Saturday, the Red Raiders face longtime rivals Texas A&M and Texas in their next two games.

The Red Raiders (4-3 overall, 3-2 Big 12) stand one back in the loss column to Texas and Oklahoma in the South Division. The Longhorns and Sooners both stand 2-1 in the Big 12 and play the Red Raiders later in the year.

For now, Tech's goal is to forget about the Nebraska loss and prepare to face the Aggies at Kyle Field in College Station. Tech coach Spike Dykes said he believes the Red Raiders are mature enough to do so.

"This team really has its heads screwed on straight," Dykes said. "They understand what it is going to take to get to the Big 12 title game. And it has never been hard to get this team ready to play Texas A&M."

The Aggies have had an uncharacteristic season by their standards. After losing no more than three games in a season since 1989, Texas A&M stands at 3-4 on the season. The Aggies also have lost three of their last five home games dating back to a 16-6 loss to Texas last year. Going into that game, A&M had won 31 consecutive games at Kyle Field. Dykes sees Kyle Field as one of the nation's special atmospheres.

"It's a good place to play," he said. "It is truly a great atmosphere. No other place in the nation has crowd noise like that."

One reason for the Aggies' troubles has been turnovers. The Aggies have turned the ball over 23 times in seven games, while suc-

cess, at least in terms of victories. The Red Raiders last won in College Station 12 seasons ago. Texas A&M had won the last five meetings between the two schools before Tech pulled off a 14-7 upset of the then-No. 9 Aggies last year in Lubbock.

Dykes knows the frustrations the Red Raiders have had at Kyle Field. "The last few times we have been there, we lost close games," Dykes said. "We lost by six two years ago, by two in '92, and by four six years ago. And each of those years we finished second behind them in the conference."

Tech offensive lineman Chris Whitney knows that in order for the Red Raiders to reach the Big 12 title game, a win this week is a must.

"We don't have much of a choice but to win this game," Whitney said. "Our goal is to meet Nebraska again in the title game, and in order for us to do that we have to win the rest of our games."
