Ochiltree County Exceeds War Bond Quota for June

June Sales Were \$37,886 In County

Ochiltree County Keeps Up Record of Meeting Bond Quotas

Sales of War Bonds during the last few days of June put Ochiltree county over the quota for June War Bonds by a small margin, says County War Bond Chairman Carl Ellis. June sales were \$37,886.25. This was the issue price, not the maturity value. In addition to the above War Bond sales, bank purchases for several times this amount were made by Perryton banks.

The assigned June quota for this county was \$35,600. Thus Ochiltree keeps up the proud record of never failing to meet an assigned War Bond quota. Postmaster M. R. Coffey reports that sale of War Savings Stamps are good.

July ushers in the nation-wide campaign to buy War Bonds and Stamps to build the mystery ship "Shangri-La" to bomb Tokyo again. Every man, woman and child has a job to do, to help build the Shangri-La that will re-bomb the Japs. Do your part during July by buying War Stamps to fill your stamp album, buy an extra bond, and you will be buying your share of freedom.

Mrs. L. P. Brown Buried on Monday

Final rites for Mrs. L. P. Brown, one of the county's oldest pioneer women, were held at the Methodist church in this city Monday afternoon. The services were in charge of Rev. William E. Fisher, pastor of the Perryton church assisting. Burial was in the Ochiltree cemetery.

Palbearers were Judge Dave Shanks, C. E. Forbes, W. E. McMillen, A. D. Reed, H. I. Hudson, Delph Daniels, and R. L. Keith.

Mrs. Brown, who was almost 74 years of age, was born July 29, 1869, near Little Rock, Ark. She was married to L. P. Brown March 16, 1890.

In 1892 they emigrated to Knox county, Texas, coming on to Ochiltree county in 1898. For over forty years, they lived in the Black community in the southwest part of the county. Mrs. Brown passed away Sunday, June 27.

Seven children, all of whom were present at the funeral services, and the loving husband, are left to mourn the departure of this grand old pioneer mother.

Former Perryton Man Dies at Paris, Texas

William Huddleston, at one time, an employee of the W. C. Bryan & Son store of Perryton, dropped dead at Paris, Texas, Tuesday afternoon.

Huddleston was working as a civilian employee at a Paris army camp. He left Perryton about 1930. While here, he worked as a salesman in the now discontinued dry goods department of the Bryan store. He leaves a wife and several children. His age was about 50.

Mr. and Mrs. Dwight Sims of the Gray community left for Paris as soon as word of his death was received. The deceased was a brother of Mrs. Sims.

CCC Loan Rates on Wheat, Barley, Sorghums Higher than the Loan Rates Prevailing in 1942

Texas and Ochiltree county farmers will receive higher loan rates on wheat, barley and grain sorghums under this year's loan program than they did during 1942.

The loan rate here has been set at \$1.18 for elevator stored and \$1.25 for farm storage for No. 1 wheat. No. 2 wheat loan rate is \$1.17 for elevator and \$1.24 for farm stored.

The following increase in the loan rate is allowed for high protein: one cent for 14, two cents for 15, and three cents for 16 or over.

The terminal loan value, Galveston, for this year is \$1.43 for No. 1 winter wheat compared to \$1.34 for the 1942 program.

The 1943 rate for loan on farm stored barley is 75 cents for No. 1

Labor Supply Been Ample For Harvest

Farmers Will Need Labor for Plowing And Planting

County Agent E. W. Thomas reports that the labor supply and demand have just about balanced the past week. All farmers have been supplied with hands within a reasonable time and at no time have the laborers had to wait longer than a few hours for a job.

No difficulty in securing sufficient labor for finishing out harvest is anticipated.

Most farmers are behind with their plowing and a demand for hands to plow stubble will continue for some time.

The Labor Office on Main street will probably remain open to about the middle of July. There has been a surplus of trucks for hauling wheat, largely on account of the short crop. Sufficient extra combines have also come into the county to take care of the demand.

The crop is being harvested with much less difficulty than originally anticipated.

Post Office Sells 1,100 Car Stamps

Postmaster M. R. Coffey reports that his office has sold 1,100 of the \$5 auto use stamps at the close of business June 30. At this same time in 1942, the Perryton office had sold 1,341 stamps and the sales went to 1,832 by July 8.

Mr. Coffey states that the \$5.00 stamp will be on sale until the Federal government orders the sale of motor vehicles must carry the stamp and that it is a violation of the federal laws to operate any kind of a motor vehicle without the new stamp after July 1, 1943.

Four to Leave July 13 For Army; 1 Accepted For U. S. Navy

All of the five young men that left Perryton Monday for physical examination at Lubbock passed the tests and were accepted for entrance into the armed forces. They returned to Perryton Tuesday night.

Ernest Barclay was accepted by the United States Navy and given a seven day furlough. The others, Orrell Daniel, Dale Parvin, Glen Wagner and Ralph Blodgett, were sworn into the United States Army.

The four army men will leave July 13 for Fort Sill, Okla. for assignment.

Average Income Up, But—In July, 1940, the average American had an income of about \$47.92. Military expenditures in that month amounted to approximately \$150 per person. In April of this year, income per capita was 1.8 times what it was in the middle of 1940—\$85.03, but if the average American had been asked to pay April's war expenses on the spot, they would have taken \$53.52 of his new \$85.03 income.

\$100 Apiece for Poor Tires—One dollar apiece is the maximum price that OPA has set for low-quality used passenger car tires which now are permitted for the first time. Maximum additions to this price are provided when tires are given emergency repairs before being sold.

Jap Prisoners Die—More than 300 U. S. war casualties are the result of unhealthful conditions in Japanese prison camps, according to messages received thru the International Red Cross from Japan. Disease is stated in each case as the cause of death.

Spring Wool Clip Goes To Market

Almost 170,000 Pounds of Wool from Ochiltree Producers

Shearing of Ochiltree County sheep with the exception of one small flock was completed last week and practically all of the wool has been shipped out. Approximately 170,000 pounds of wool is being marketed by 27 growers from about 14,000 head of sheep.

An advance of 25 cents per pound was paid the growers in most cases by the handlers. The wool will be delivered to primary wool handlers in concentration points such as Kansas City where it will be appraised by government appraisers and purchased by the U. S. government at specified ceiling prices.

Under the wool purchase plan all 1943 wool produced in the country will be taken over by the government and sold to the woolen mills.

Another Week of Dry Weather Will See End of 1943 Wheat Harvest; Yield Lowest in Years

With many acres of wheat abandoned that will not be cut, it now appears that of the acreage cut, the wheat in the Perryton area will average from eight to 10 bushels per acre. If rains do not interfere, practically every acre should be cut by the middle of next week.

From the best reports obtainable, grain dealers and wheat producers from every section of this community, it appears that at least 60 per cent of the wheat has been harvested. Estimates of the total yield for the area indicate that about 2,500,000 bushels will be raised. Ochiltree county will produce close to 2,000,000 bushels.

Wheat storage is a serious problem. While there seems to be plenty of storage space at terminal elevators, local grain dealers are unable to get cars to ship out wheat. Some Perryton elevators are filled to capacity and unable to buy or take wheat for storage.

The 1943 crop continues to run high in quality, most of it testing 60 or better. Very little wheat is being sold, most of it going under government loan with the anticipation that cash wheat prices will go considerably above the loan rate before many months.

But we guess that is to be expected. Most of the men called into Washington to head the big set-ups are "big shots" in their own right.

Rationing at a Glance

War Ration Book No. 1—Used for sugar, coffee and shoes. War Ration Book No. 2—Blue stamps used for rationed processed foods. Red stamps used for meats, edible fats and oils, cheese, and canned fish.

Mileage Ration Books—Books A, B, and C used for passenger car gasoline; E and H books for non-highway uses; D, for motorcycles; T for trucks and commercial vehicles.

SUGAR—Stamp No. 13 valid for five pounds until midnight Aug. 15. CANNING SUGAR—Stamps 15 and 16 in Ration Book One valid for 5 pounds of sugar each through Oct. 31, 1943. Those needing additional sugar for canning may apply to local rationing boards.

COFFEE—Stamp No. 24 in Book No. 1 for those 14 or older on the date the book was issued; valid for 1 pound of coffee through June 30, Stamp No. 21 valid for 1 pound from July 1 through July 21, Stamp No. 22 valid for 1 pound from July 22 through August 11.

SHOES—Stamp No. 18 in Book 1 good for 1 pair of shoes through Oct. 31.

MEATS, EDIBLE FATS AND OILS, (including butter), CHEESES, CANNED FISH—Each holder of Book 2 allowed 16 points per week. Red Stamps J, K, L, M and N expire June 30. Red Stamps P, Q, R and S (16 points each) expire July 31 and become valid as follows: P, June 27; Q, July 4; R, July 11; and S, July 18.

PROCESSED FOODS—Blue K, L and M stamps (48 points) valid through July 7. Blue stamps, N, P, and Q valid from July 1 through August 7.

Mileage Rationing—New Automobiles—Any one gainfully employed or doing voluntary work for the war effort or the public welfare is eligible to obtain a rationing certificate for the purchase of cars with a list price of over \$1,500, or convertibles, regardless of price. The applicant must show need for a car to get to or do his work and must show that his present car is not adequate.

TIRE INSPECTION—All "A" book holders must have second official tire inspections by Sept. 30, 1943. Subsequent inspections for "A" book holders will be once every six months. "B" book holders must have second official tire inspection by June 30, 1943. "C" book holders must have second official tire inspection by May 31, 1943. Next official tire inspection for "T" book holders must be made within 60 days of last inspection.

Tires—if official tire inspector recommends a tire replacement, apply to local ration board for tire ration certificate. Tires will be rationed to all on the basis of the inspections and county quotas available with most essential mileage to come first. Recaps can now be secured without rationing certificates.

Other Rationing—Eligible purchasers needing new automobiles, bicycles, typewriters, rubber footwear and other commodities (except farm machinery and pressure cookers) on which sales might be restricted should see their local ration board. Persons interested in securing farm machinery and pressure cookers should see their county USDA War Board.

Culling Rules Given by Agent

Now is a good time to start culling those hens in the laying house that are doing a sit-down strike, says Sadie Seward, Home Demonstration Agent. You should be able to remove about ten per cent of the loafers now.

It's not hard to do the job and won't take much time. If you have Leghorns, the job is very easy; if some of the other breeds like Barred Rocks or Reds, it is a little difficult but not impossible. Here's how you can do it fast and fairly accurate and at the same time not upset production.

Pen the birds in the house and get a good catching hook. Walk around among them quietly. When you see one with a shriveled comb pick her up and examine her. Cull her if she's a low producer. Otherwise turn her out so you won't have to handle her again. Those which are molting should be culled. If you spot one with yellow pigment in the beak and shanks pick her up, too. Chances are she is a loafer. Look for these with saggy abdomens. This is a good indication of an egg breakdown. If you see a few pale, and weak looking hens, get them out. While you are looking the flock over keep a sharp outlook for any birds showing grey eyes. It is a wise practice to sell these.

Feed is too expensive and scarce to waste on a hen that won't pay for her keep. Culling makes more housing room and culled hens will bring a good price on the market.

More Wheat Available for Texas Feeders

COLLEGE STATION, June 28.—Texas producers have been assured more feed wheat through the additional 50,000,000 bushel appropriation which was approved by Congress last week.

Announcing the program in Texas P. C. Colgin, commodity loan specialist for the state AAA, explained that the price for the remainder of June would be \$1.05 per bushel.

Under the 50,000,000 bushel appropriation, livestock producers, dairymen, poultrymen and other feeders are allowed a quantity of wheat, which together with the quantity on hand will not exceed a three months' supply. Local feed mixes and dealers will be limited to a two month's supply, which includes the quantity on hand unsold when orders are placed.

Colgin pointed out that feed wheat may be ordered direct from the Commodity Credit Corporation, Kansas City, or through county AAA committees. Many producers, he continued, buy their supplies through local trade channels.

Last week's 50,000,000 bushel allotment brings to 275,000,000 bushels the amount approved by Congress for feeding purposes. The first appropriation of 125,000,000 bushels was made in 1942 and was followed by an additional 100,000,000 bushels several weeks ago.

Feed wheat has been bought so rapidly during the past few weeks that general discontinuance of sales was necessary several days ago in order to reserve a small quantity for emergency feed in flood and critical drought areas. Last week's new appropriation, however, should provide sufficient supplies for present needs, Colgin said.

Ulmer Says Legislature's Action Disappointed Taxpayers of Texas

M. C. Ulmer, Midland banker who, as mayor, saw his city's tax rate reduced by a total of 60 cents, says Texas taxpayers are disappointed and dismayed at refusal of the 48th Legislature to pass Rep. Joe Humphreys House Bill No. 7, the fiscal control measure. Ulmer is president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, pioneer advocate of modernizing and simplifying the state's budget procedure.

The Humphrey bill, narrowly killed by the recent legislature, called for centralized planning, management and accounting and for creation of the post of state budget director working under the Board of Control and closely answerable to the governor and legislature.

In a discussion of the bill in the May issue of West Texas Today, the magazine of the WTCC, Ulmer asserted that "this bill would have consolidated the state funds; would have controlled expenditures before they were made; would have enabled increasing or decreasing appropriations in accordance with current needs; and would have returned to the state budget director working under the Board of Control and closely answerable to the governor and legislature."

"Spenders Opposed Bill"

"All this fiscal control with teeth in it was a red flag to the departmental spenders who fought this legislation. They waved the red flag, saying that the fiscal control bill was vicious, was taking power away from the legislature, was creating a bureaucracy and was organizing a big political machine. The answer of taxpayers who supported the Humphrey bill is that it was not vicious, because it promoted the general welfare, government economy and efficiency. It did not take power away from the legislature, but instead increased its power over management and expenditure of money. It did not create a bureaucracy and political machine, because it created no new office or department and

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Open House Pampa Air Field Sunday

PAMPA, TEXAS, June 29—Young men of the Panhandle area will be afforded an opportunity to see an Army air field in action this Sunday, July 4th, when Pampa Army Air Field's personnel will present a special "Open House" program.

Designed primarily for youths of the surrounding communities, who are approaching their 18th year—the age when they are eligible to start Aviation Cadet training—the "Open House" activity will give youths between the ages of 17 and 26 a chance to visit the Cadet area, the Link Trainer buildings, and the flight line and see a military and aerial review put on by the Cadets now receiving their advanced training at this school. In addition, they will see the Cessna and Curtiss training planes used at this base, as well as primary, basic and combat ships. Famous combat planes, such as the B-26 Marauder and the B-24 Consolidated Liberator, will also be on exhibition.

Young men who want to attend the "Open House" will be met at the Pampa Post Office building at 12:00 noon Sunday, July 4th, and transported to the field, 16 miles east of Pampa, in government trucks and jeeps. Those who are unable to be at the Post Office may drive directly to the field, and, if parents are accompanying them, they, too, will be admitted to the field to witness the day's events.

At 1 p. m., visitors will be permitted to roam the Cadet area, visit barracks, classrooms and the mess hall. Cadets in training will be present to talk with youths and to explain their various activities.

At 2:00 p. m., visitors will proceed to the Link-Trainer buildings to be given demonstrations in those unique "blind flying" machines, miniature planes that have all the characteristics of real airplanes, except that they are stationary.

At 3:00 p. m., a military review will be presented on the ramp by the current Cadet classes, followed by an aerial review, presented by Cadets on their regular Sunday afternoon training schedule.

At 4:00 p. m., visitors will be taken to the newly opened "War Room" at the Cadet ground school, where they will be addressed by Colonel Daniel S. Campbell, commanding officer at PAAP. At the conclusion of his talk, refreshments will be served at the cadet mess hall to bring the afternoon's activities to a close.

The "Open House" program is designed to acquaint youths with a "one-day's view" of what goes on at an Aviation Cadet flying school in an effort to show them some of the advantages offered by the Army Air Forces.

Under a current Air Force arrangement, youths who are 17 years of age and who have not yet reached their 18th birthday may enlist as Aviation Cadets. If accepted, they will be placed in the Aviation Cadet Reserve, subject to call to active duty some time after they reach their 18th birthday. Special Air Corps Reserve wings, which may be worn with civilian dress, will be issued to 17-year olds who qualify for Cadet training and are enlisted in the Reserve.

utilized the present board of Control and the governor's office to discharge its objectives.

"The spenders' arguments are wholly unfounded. They were smoke-screen arguments instead of arguments on the issues involved. These were: poor management vs. good management; extravagance vs. thrift; spending vs. economizing; government for the benefit of the departments and bureaus vs. government for the benefit of the taxpayers and the general welfare; and insolvency vs. solvency. Let those, we ask, who opposed this bill show why it would not improve management; why it would not promote thrift; why it would not help the taxpayer; and why it would not increase the solvency of the state. No, the spenders cannot show or prove this, and the issue is clear cut, namely, lipservice economy vs. real economy."

"Cart Before the Horse"

Calling attention to the legislature's passage of Sen. Weaver Moore's bill for post auditing of state expenditures, Ulmer said that pre-auditing, as provided for in the Humphrey bill, is far more important than post-auditing. He said the latter function merely scrutinizes the expenditures after they are made while pre-auditing controls them before they are made.

He said "although post-auditing is necessary in complete fiscal control, it nevertheless is getting the cart before the horse to pay a man \$7,500 a year to tell you, figuratively speaking, that the money is stolen, after it is stolen, rather than pay a budget director \$6,000 a year to keep the money from being stolen."

Ulmer concluded: "The people at home are getting tired of hearing about the 100 or more duplicating and uncorrelated state departments at every election time, and then having nothing done about it. Furthermore, the taxpayers are getting sick of the thousands on the state payroll securing their positions through favoritism and political pressure, rather than merit. All these things are fiscal control and the issues will not be dead in the state until something has been done about them."—From the Midland Reporter-Telegram of June 10, 1943.

Butter Price Roll Back

COLLEGE STATION, June 28—Texas farmers selling butterfat should continue to receive as high a price as they did before the "roll back" which went into effect June 10, the state USDA war board has announced.

To assure that no "roll back" in producer prices are being made, creameries to which the subsidy program applies will be required to certify that farmer prices have not been reduced, it was pointed out.

Under the "roll back" program, the Reconstruction Finance Corporation is financing a subsidy to minimize any loss which might occur to trade inventories.

"With the five cents per pound subsidy being paid to all creameries by the Government, they now are receiving as much as they were before the 'roll back' and will be expected to continue paying the going price to farmers," the board said.

Farmers who sell butterfat to creameries and buy back butter for their own needs should receive the reduction in price because the creamery will receive subsidy payments on the butterfat sold.

The majority of Texas producers will not be eligible for the subsidy and payment since they do not produce as much as 1,000 pounds of butter per month, the minimum under the program. Large dairy farmers who produce more than 1,000 pounds of butter in one month during the calendar year will be eligible for the "roll back" during the months when production exceeds the 1,000 pound requirement.

Explaining how the subsidy will affect assemblers and co-operatives, the board said that "the five cents roll back will be paid to any person who manufactures butter regardless of where the milk or cream is obtained."

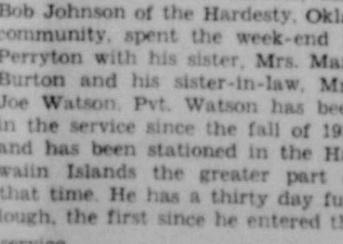

What's the Black Market?

COLLEGE STATION—The Black Market, a wartime fungus, has been defined as the sum total of a large number of relatively small-scale violations of ceiling prices or ration points), rather than large-scale violations by gangsters and law-breaking slaughters, packers, or others.

A Black Market can start from various sources and causes. But, says a joint summarization by the Office of War Information, U. S. Department of Agriculture and Office of Price Administration, it can and most often does, start with certain consumers. These are persons who demand or accept articles of food without giving up the proper number of ration stamps in return; or who buy at exorbitant or above-ceiling prices; or who accept meat at a reduced point value without corresponding reduction in price; or who buy from farmers without giving ration stamps; or who accept stamps from friends.

Government authorities remind that fixed dollars and cents top consumer prices for individual cuts of beef, veal, lamb and mutton became effective in all retail stores on May 17. Similar top legal prices for pork have been in effect since April 1. Departure from ceiling prices through patronizing a Black Market cheats patriotic citizens. It leaves a smaller share for law-abiding workers and their families, and causes a substantial loss in strategic byproducts such as hides, adrenalin, insulin, gelatin for films, fertilizers, bone meal for livestock and other materials necessary to winning the war.

The full cooperation of consumers is sought by the Government in its program to wipe out Black Markets. They can help by always giving up the proper number of ration points, never paying above-ceiling prices for meat, and never accepting unused stamps from friends. Farmers who sell meat direct to retailers and consumers can render equal cooperation by collecting ration stamps and always observing ceiling prices.

Worley Says No Furloughs for Harvest Work

The Agricultural Appropriations bill for 1944 has passed both House and Senate. It is now in conference committee, a group appointed by both Houses to iron out differences on various changes affecting the bill which were made in the Senate. This bill is of great interest and importance to farmers and ranchers of the Texas Panhandle and the nation and it is expected the differences between the two Houses will be settled soon and the measure sent to the President for his approval.

The farm labor shortage continues to occupy an important position in current affairs and various communities have written in asking if soldiers from nearby camps could be released for a period to help on

the farms.

I talked to officials in the War Department again concerning the matter and they state that no change has been made in the ruling and sent me a copy of the official order which follows:

"IV—Use of Army personnel in harvesting crops. 1. Commanding officers of all posts, camps, stations, divisions, and lower separate units are authorized under the conditions set forth in paragraph 2 to—

a. Permit soldiers to engage in farm work in nearby communities during normal off-duty periods.

b. Grant passes to soldiers in order to permit them to engage in farm work in nearby communities.

2. Authorization granted in paragraph 1 is contingent upon the existence of the following conditions:

a. In the opinion of the commander concerned, an emergency exists in the nearby farm community due to shortage of available farm labor.

b. The soldier concerned desires permission or a pass in order to engage in farm work.

c. Such action will not interfere with the customary employment and regular engagement in farm work of local civilians.

d. Such action will not interfere seriously with training.

3. Soldiers will not be granted

furloughs for the purpose of engaging in farm work. 4. The performance of farm work by soldiers during off-duty periods or while on pass will not involve expense to the Government. The pay for services rendered by the individual and all other conditions of his employment will be left to the determination of the individual soldier and his farm employer so far as the Army is concerned."

NEWS IN THE WORLD OF RELIGION By W.W. REID

"If we are intent upon establishing in this world a future where men can live in peace and enjoy the benefits of civilization," says Wendell L. Wilkie, "we wish once more to be able to plan our lives without an overhanging burden of fear, we cannot rely merely upon governmental forms or world councils, or the intricacies of diplomacy. A world of peace and well-being to survive must rest upon and be suffused with those age-old principles which churches have been teaching through the centuries. It must find its inspiration in the leadership of a multitude of people who to Cain's ancient question, 'Am I my brother's keeper?' have the courage to answer, 'Yes!'"

A recent survey of the Roman Catholic population in the United States, Alaska, and Hawaii shows a grand total of 22,945,247, according to the Church's official directory. This represents an increase of 369,005 over last year's figures. The number of Roman Catholic archbishops in the United States is twenty-one, two of whom are cardinals; and there are 129 bishops. The total number of priests is 36,970. More than 2,000,000 boys and girls are attending 7,647 elementary parochial schools; while church high schools, colleges and universities enroll almost half a million.

This story comes from Goiaz, trading town in Brazil. Months ago, missionaries traveling through here, while waiting for their muleteer, handed out copies of the Gospel to curious townspeople. On the invitation of one of the businessmen, they returned four months later, and gave a week to lectures, services, and talks with the people. Still later, a Christian friend taught the townspeople several hymns, and from then on the villagers themselves conducted services every night, reading from the New Testament, and singing the few hymns they had learned. When the missionaries returned to Goiaz to establish a Christian group, they found that a tavern keeper, because of his interest in the Gospel, had closed up his business, torn down the shelves and built them into benches, and turned the former barroom into a preaching hall.

The fifth annual "Churchman Award," given by that Protestant

Episcopal magazine to the person adjudged making an outstanding contribution in "the promotion of goodwill and better understanding among all peoples" was presented this year to Madame Chiang Kai-shek of China. The presentation address was made by Dr. Joseph Fort Newton of Philadelphia. Madame Chiang is the first woman to receive the award.

Dr. Howard Chandler Robbins, of Washington, D. C., former dean of St. John's Cathedral in New York, and Dr. Henry Sloane Coffin, newly-elected moderator of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., are co-chairmen of the Religious Committee for Russian War Relief in which ten major Protestant churches of America participate. This church committee is cooperating in the drive to have 5,000,000 Americans write letters of friendship to individual citizens of Russia; in a drive for garments to clothe 40,000-50,000 Russian refugees evacuated from areas seized by the Nazis; and to give direct relief through milk sent to children, seed to replant the scorched earth, and medical supplies for the wounded and sick.

According to the committee on world literacy and Christian literature of the Foreign Missions Conference of North America, a census was taken of the needs of a large number of Indian village people who had just been taught to read and a series of leaflets were issued to give them information on these subjects. The titles of pamphlets give something of a passing picture of life in such a village: "A Model Wedding," "When to Marry," "Rats," "Songs," "Court Trials," "Prayer," "Cooperative Banks," "Tch," "Village Industries," "Better Prices," "Water Supply," "Better Roads," "Cattle Diseases," "Improved Homes," "Harvest," "Seeds," "Markets," "Bible," "Communal Relations," "Worship."

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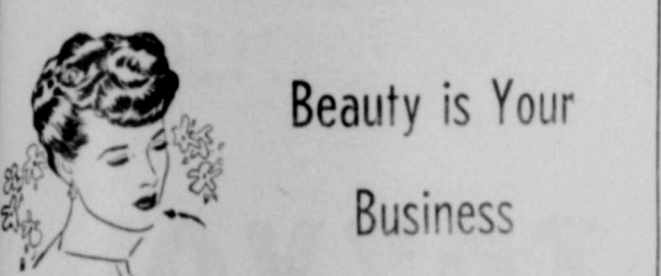

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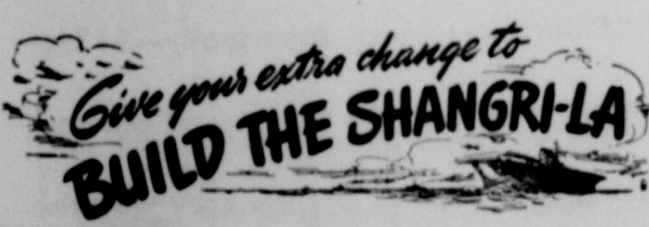

"Substitutes for God" Exod. 20:3

Did Israel with all her idolatry break the first commandment any more than men do today by substituting something for God? In general, mankind is as guilty as Israel was, and like punishment will follow. What are some substitutes?

Nature worship; the lowest form of worship. African fetishism. Has modern civilization risen above this theory? On a bright summer Lord's Day morning, how many people will arise early and travel many times farther than to Church, even in these days of scarcity, so that they may get away from the study of God's Word during the morning services? Or they claim to be too busy. Worshiping nature in fields or streams or mountains may have some value, but there are six other days of the week in which to do this. To break one commandment in order to try to observe another is of no value.

Another substitute is the "Reign of Law." The deistic theory of God. A substitute for the worship of the Lord concerning whom it is said, "Behold he that keepeth Israel doth neither slumber nor sleep."

There are those who have placed the acquisition of wealth above the things of God and His Kingdom. "The Almighty Dollar" is their God. No wonder they have not time for the "assembling of themselves to-

Sentiment in some instances, becomes the basis for a theology which leaves God out of account. Today we could call it "Chauvinistic patriotism."

Worldly pleasure comes in for a very large share of our energy, demanding much of our time. God is forgotten. We have not time to study and learn how to apply the principles of Christ to everyday problems. No wonder 14 men rule the world and pit nation against nation for their own selfish interests. People are too busy pleasure seeking to pay any attention till

the deluge comes. This practice becomes idolatry.

Many worship art instead of God, as literature, music, painting, etc. Art has her place, but only as the hand-maiden of religion.

Perhaps the most subtle form of idolatry, (and if there is any difference in sins; perhaps the most displeasing to God) is seen when men substitute their own wills for the will of the infinite. How about a finite being, a mere human, to say Christ did not mean what He said; that a human whose wis-

dom, if any, is so limited, should attempt for a moment to place his feeble will and ideas over against the mind of the Almighty?

How may we know when we have made a substitution for Jehovah?

If there is some object in nature, some trend of thought, some occupation, some cause, which attracts more of our attention, which demands more of our time and thought than we give to the Kingdom of Christ and His work and righteousness, then we may well know that we, too, have become

idolatrous and have substituted something else in the place of God should occupy. "We are ye idolatrous and wicked nation!"

Think who God is. Perhaps true nature as revealed by Christ. How can anyone plan or purpose or act in the place of God and His purposes?

Let us make God and His the center of our thoughts, lives, and we shall never substitute.

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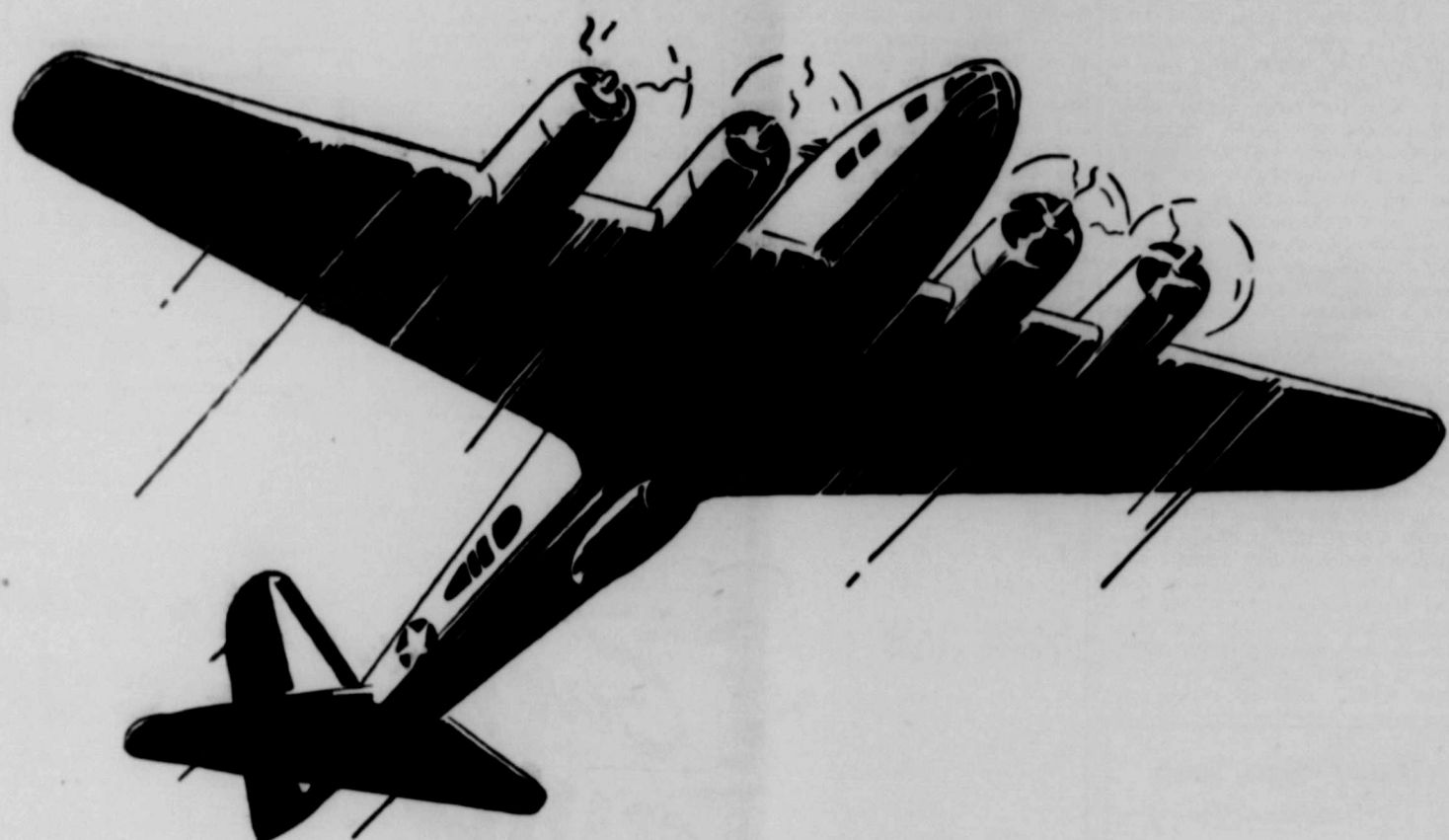

Our Defenders Speak!

The Herald asks that men and women from this community serving in the armed forces write letters to this department for publication. Letters to relatives that would be of interest to the public will be published under this heading.

Editors Note: The following letter was written to Ben Graham of this community by 1st Lt. John V. Osborne, formerly a prominent attorney of Pampa, Texas.

Somewhere in China June 5, 1943

Dear Ben:

Recently I ran across a little biographical bulletin which gave you a pretty good idea of farming as it is done in the Orient. I am enclosing it herewith (provided the censor doesn't take it out), since it occurs to me that you might be interested in it, and whether you are interested or not, it should make you feel a little better satisfied with farming in the U. S. You are first going to find it hard to believe that over 699 people make their living on 142 acres of land, but from all I have seen, that is a condition that prevails throughout China. At least its true everywhere that I have been. The farms here are usually about 40 feet wide and not more than a hundred feet long, and the whole damn family works on it at the same time. And they raise big families. The little tracts are not separated by fences, but by ridges of dirt just wide enough for a foot-path, and about a foot or eighteen inches high. They walk to and from their fields along the top of these little ridges, so as not to trample the crops. Every bit of their work is done by hand. Have not seen a horse, oxen, or any kind of power machinery at work in any of the fields. They dig up the land with hoes or forks instead of plows, and when harvest time comes, they pull up the grain by the roots, shake off the dirt and carry the whole thing to the village with them, where they thresh the grain by hand, and use the straw for all kinds of purposes. Its incredible how primitive their methods are. As for livestock, we seldom see anything except water buffalo, which they use to pull two wheel carts, or little horses, about the size of Shetland ponies. Have not seen a horse in China that would weigh 600 pounds. They have a few pigs, but they certainly are runty little devils. Suppose that is the reason we have not had a bite of bacon since we have been here. Our principal meat is water buffalo, and I think they use it only after the animal is too old to work. Consequently we live largely on eggs, potatoes, etc. There isn't a milk cow in a thousand miles of this place, and if there was we couldn't take a chance on drinking the milk. All our water has to be boiled. Think they must dip it out of the sewer, strain it and boil it. At least I would think so if there was a sewer, but there isn't any.

Our beds are typical Chinese jobs—a kind of box, with a wooden floor set up on legs about four inches above the floor. They never use springs, and think we are sissies when we lay an extra blanket in the bottom of the box.

Our days usually last from six in the morning until about ten at night, though sometimes I have to get up at four and don't get to bed until midnight. In some respects it gets pretty tiresome, but in other ways, we are having lots of fun. There are a good many things to break the monotony, as you may have read in the papers. You can probably learn a lot more about what is going on over here from the newspapers than I could tell you.

This letter is being written on Chinese paper, with an old English typewriter, so it has a peculiar look and will be hard to read, but I'm sure you can come nearer reading it than you could my handwriting.

By the time you receive this, you will probably be in the midst of harvest, and perhaps doing all the work yourself. Hope you have a good crop and manage to get it harvested, so we won't have to keep eating rice and barley bread over here.

Will be glad to hear from you, or from any of the others who find time to write.

Dear Mr. Stewart:

Not much to write, only that we have won our first victory. If victories can be won, I don't think they are won, rather they are bought and paid for, sometimes very dearly. Anyway we have this one in hand.

Have been celebrating for the past week, not much duty and plenty of dances, beer, wine, etc. These French gals nearly took us in after the Tunis battle, threw our cars full of poppies, and other flowers, I even had one go so far as to kiss me.

All and all I think we did do a nice job here, but its just the beginning from the looks of things.

Have had a barrel of fun in the last few days. Only wish I could bump into some of the guys from home. The weather here is getting rather warm, but we do most of our duties in the a. m. and then go swimming etc. in the p. m. Just had a nice dip in the blue Mediterranean.

You can't imagine how much you long for mail from home until you're in a place like this. I believe the mail is as valuable as ammunition.

Well Van the last few days of the battle here were a shade rough, but we have a bunch of guys that were fortified with those good old American bowels, so you know the rest.

Well Mr. Stewart I must close now and go on with the celebration. I think I've got another pass coming up, so "Au revoir."

Soldiers' Dependents Get Checks
Family allowances and voluntary allotments of pay are now in force for about four and a half million soldiers who have more than seven and on-half million dependents. More than 20 million family allowances and allotment-of-pay checks have been mailed to the wives, children, and other dependents, relatives of Army men in one year.

100,000 Dehydrators
A plan for making 100,000 domestic food dehydrators before September 1 has been approved by WPB. These dehydrators are urgently needed, says the War Food Administration, in time to preserve farm and victory garden fruits and vegetables. A home food dehydrator removes moisture from raw food, thereby preserving its flavor and food value for later use.

Baby Carriage Quota Decreased
Baby carriages to be made in the current quarter have been decreased to 288,369 compared to the original schedule of 317,772. However, strollers, walkers, and silkies have been increased from 163,500 to 233,500. The demand for baby carriages in 1943 is expected to be 800,000.

Prosecute Gas Ration Violators
Criminal prosecutions for violation of gasoline rationing regulations instituted by OPA through April 30, 1943, totaled 509. Ninety-three cases involved operations of

gasoline stations. The remaining 416 were actions against individuals owners and filling station attendants to criminal "rings" engaged in systematic theft and sale of stolen gasoline ration books and coupons.

Loans Insured by FHA
More than \$6,800,000,000 in loans by private lending institutions financing the construction, purchase, or repair of approximately 5,400,000 homes, have been insured by the Federal Housing Administration since its establishment on June 27, 1934. It was announced as the FHA marked its ninth anniversary.

Living Costs Rise
A rise of 1.7 per cent in food prices increased the total cost of living for non-rural workers by 0.8 per cent in the month ended May 15. Nevertheless, the cost of items marking up nearly 60 per cent of the family budget remained practically unchanged. This increase of 0.8 per cent compared with a rise of 1.5 per cent in the month ending March 15 and 1.1 per cent in the month ending April 15.

Wage Earner with Family to Benefit. Analysis Of New Federal Withholding Tax Law Reveals

Frank Scofield, Collector of Internal Revenue First Texas District and War Bond Administrator for Texas, gives the following statement relative to the withholding tax.

We have just put Uncle Sam's new withholding tax under the microscope and find that it isn't as frightening as we first thought. In fact, the next tax which goes into effect July 1 is rather painless when it is brought into proper focus. It has more balm than bite.

For instance, our examination of the withholding bracket shows that a man with wife and two children who earns \$40 a week will be nicked for only 80 cents a week. This is 50 cents per week less than he is now paying out of his wages for the 5 per cent Victory tax—and his entire federal income tax is all paid up.

If the same family earns \$50 a week, the withholding tax will be \$2.80 a week. There is no mathematical nightmare about this.

When Mr. Taxpayer realizes that the withholding tax includes the Victory tax he is now paying, he should breathe with considerable relief. In many cases, the new income tax deduction from his pay will be less than it is now.

Let's examine the status of a married man with two children now earning \$25 a week. He will pay 40 cents a week as compared with 70 cents now going to Victory tax.

If the same worker makes \$30 a week, his new deduction will be 50 cents against 90 cents now coming out of his pay.

If he earns \$35 weekly, he will pay 70 cents where he is now shelling out \$1.10.

Of course, when the man of the house with two children reaches \$45 a week it starts to become a different story. His tax will be increased 20 cents a week—from \$1.60 to \$1.80.

The increases come rather rapidly from there on.

The same wage-earner earning \$60 a week will see his tax jump from \$2.10 to \$4.80 a week.

And so it goes on up to a \$100-a-week salary where the Victory tax is now \$4.10 per week but the new withholding tax will be \$12.80 a week out of the pay envelope.

When Mr. Taxpayer gets into the so-called upper wage brackets, the withholding tax does not cover the total tax. Taxes began to accumulate against him for the annual settlement.

But from our analysis of the set-up it looks as if all wage-earners pay less to the extent of the difference between a 3 per cent and a 5 per cent Victory tax.

And the harassed taxpayer should not forget the 75 per cent skip-a-year forgiveness on either his 1942 or 1943 income tax.

The accompanying withholding tax table shows the comparative Victory Tax in the last column.

We do not expect any falling off in either over-the-counter sales or in plants where payroll deductions for war bonds are in operation.

The new tax is not a flat 20 per cent tax, but 20 per cent on that portion of income in excess of allowable exemptions. The 20 per cent includes 17 per cent for income taxes and 3 per cent for Victory taxes.

Withholding Deductions
In this table rates may be a little more than those of the revenue office tables where the rates run on averages between brackets.

Care of Eggs in Hot Summer Days

COLLEGE STATION—Blood rings, or heat damage, to fertile eggs are causing Texas egg producers substantial loss daily. This was reflected in a series of egg grading schools conducted recently in scattered sections of Texas by George P. McCarthy, poultry husbandman for the A. and M. College Extension Service. If losses corresponding to this sampling prevail throughout the state the supply of one of our important food items is being curtailed, McCarthy says.

Heat sets up germination and renders a fertile egg inedible. But this may be prevented by disposing of all male birds during the summer and thereby producing only infertile eggs. Eggs are highly perishable and cannot be subjected to heat without destroying quality.

When laid, the temperature of an egg is about equal to that of the hen's body—104 to 107 degrees Fahrenheit. Therefore, proper cooling is essential. During the summer, eggs should be gathered two or three times daily and placed in a wire basket for cooling. Producers can use cellars or home-made cooling devices. An inexpensive and serviceable cooler may be made by covering the sides and ends of a frame with coarse burlap sacking, and keeping the cloth moist by putting one end of it in a pan of water placed on top of the frame. The eggs are kept in wire baskets within this frame until cooled, and then placed in a standard egg case which also is kept in the cooler.

Plans for this type of cooler may be obtained from county Extension agents or by writing to the Extension Service at College Station.

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Victory Pair Nominated

COLLEGE STATION—An elderly Hopkins County couple, Mr. and Mrs. O. P. Kent of Brinker, are deserving of the title "Victory Pair" in recognition of their contribution to the war, believes Tressie N. Youngblood, their county home demonstration agent.

"Having made a great sacrifice graciously by sending a son to the Army and a daughter into a vital war industry," the Kents have turned their attention to increased production of food, she says. They have had to achieve their goals without any extra help and have an amazing record for a couple advanced in years.

The Kents feed and milk 10 cows which bring them a monthly income of \$132. Their poultry flock consists of 70 layers and 70 young chickens, and sales of poultry products bring in about \$9 a week. Although a large portion of the feed for poultry and livestock is raised on the Kents' small farm, their monthly feed bill runs about \$30. They have five acres of grain sorghum, 16 acres of corn and peas, and one acre of peanuts.

The family's one and one-half acre garden includes large plots of tomatoes and white potatoes. Earlier in the spring the Kents canned 55 No. 2 cans of spinach from their garden. They also had 50 containers of food left from their 1942 canning. Mr. and Mrs. Kent have met the meat shortage by canning 13 pints of home-raised turkey and by feeding two hogs to slaughter in the fall.

Mrs. Kent also finds time to assist her fellow home demonstration club women in the Brinker school lunch and canning program.

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
