## Special Attractions Make Rodeo Biggest And Best

The WBAP Stagecoach, the Hella Temple Shriners Mustang Patrol, the Clown Patrol and the Black Horse Patrol are the leading attractions to the Bogata Rodeo and Frontier Days set for June 22, 23 and 24 in Bogata.

The special attractions promise to make this the biggest year yet for the Bogata Rodeo, which has long been famous in Northeast Texas and Southern Oklahoma as the biggest and the best. The Rodeo will begin with the traditional Rodeo Parade at 5:00 p.m. Thursday, June 22, followed by a barbecue supper catered at the Rodeo Grounds. Performance time is 8:30 p.m. for each of the three night events. Tickets to the barbecue supper are available from downtown merchants.

The Friday and Saturday night performances will feature drills and horsemanship by the Black Horse Patrol. Added to special attractions, Bogata's own George Marshall, Jr., and Stanley Hart will be featured as rodeo clowns and bullfighters.

The second annual Frontier

Day will begin at 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning, with egg throwing, turtle racing, goat milking and beard growing. A special attraction, the WBAP Stagecoach, will be in Bogata all day Saturday to ride and to be in the Rodeo.

A live country band will play at each performance, and there will be many other special attractions that will require attendance at the rodeo to see.

Perhaps the reason that the Bogata Rodeo is so large is that one of the nation's largest rodeo producers, Wing Ranch Rodeo Company, is located just east of Bogata, and is owned and operated by Jerald Smith. Smith will furnish part of his

large string of stock for the Bogata Rodeo to add to the excitement of the event. Smith has been Producer of the Year in the International Rodeo Association, as well as serving on the Board of Governors of the IRA.

Events will be bareback riding, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, barrel racing, team roping and bull riding. A calf scramble will be featured nightly.

The sponsor of the Rodeo is the Bogata Rodeo Association, an organization with members from many segments of the community.

## Gilmer Firm To Operate Ambulance Service

The Board, appointed by Clarksville Mayor John Morris in search of a solution to the current Red River County ambulance problem, decided

Monday night to grant Loyd's Ambulance Service, presently serving Wood, Upshur and Camp Counties, the service in Red River County. The firm,

based in Gilmer expects to have at least one ambulance operating in Red River County within a two weeks time. Elvin Loyd, owner of the

service, has been an ambulance driver since 1948, has operated Loyd's Ambulance Service in Upshur County for four years, Camp County for

three years and Wood County, one year. Elementary plans for the service in Red River County are subscriptions of \$25 per family, or \$15 per individual. Ambulance service for members will be available up to a 50 mile radius, with service over 50 miles being \$.50 per mile. Non-member service will be available for a base of \$50, plus \$1 per mile.

A business office will be operated in Clarksville from 8 to 5, with attendants on duty. After 5 p.m., the ambulances and attendants will return to the home office in Gilmer. Loyd stated that he needed 1250 subscriptions per each ambulance on call in Red River County, and felt that two ambulances could be made available, if subscriptions were received as expected. Should subscriptions be received in a short time, Loyd stated that he would try to bring in an old ambulance or rent the present County vehicles until such time as a new ambulance could be obtained. It was pointed out, however, that it would take up to two full months before the operation could be put into 100 percent effect.

The Board also considered proposals from the Jordan

Ambulance Service in Bossier City, La., but it felt that their service would prove to be too impersonal to a small community such as Red River County, in comparison with Bossier City.

A proposal from Gary Gray and Gary Porterfield, present county attendants, was also considered. The proposed that they take over the service, requesting 1200 subscriptions at \$30, but suggested they would like to keep the present county equipment. The Board did not

know if this would be feasible or possible to obtain. It was also felt by the Board that a local service was more desirable, but that no one who had submitted a proposal had the actual business experience necessary for running such a service.

Loyd expected to have the subscriptions going by Monday, June 19. The address for subscriptions to the ambulance service is Loyd's Ambulance Service, P.O. Box 1264, Clarksville, Texas 75426.

## Beef Import Quota Triggers Reaction

The Carter Administration's decision to suspend beef import quota limits triggered strong reaction from the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. The Fort Worth based group represents 14,000 cow-calf producers in Texas

and surrounding states.

In a telegram sent Thursday to Robert S. Strauss, Carter's ambassador for trade negotiations, the Cattle Raisers called the move by Carter "intensely disappointing."

Copies of the telegram, signed by John B. Armstrong, TSCRA president, and other officers, were sent to Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland, Texas Senator Lloyd Bentsen and Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe.

In the telegram, Armstrong reminds Strauss that the consumer price index has increased 43 percent and per capita disposable income has gone up 55 percent since 1973, the last time live cattle prices reached the levels they are at today. He added, "Throughout this period, we cattlemen have been subsidizing consumers with the best food bargains in the marketplace, while we have taken the worst financial bloodbath in this century."

The TSCRA officers called on Strauss to meet two requests in an effort to repair the severely damaged confidence cattlemen have in the future.

The cattlemen want President Carter to withdraw opposition to the Bentsen Bill, which would automatically provide for decreased imports

during periods of domestic oversupply and increased

imports in periods of short supply. The bill, a major overhaul of the Beef Import Act of 1964, has the support of cattlemen nationwide.

They also ask that Strauss make every effort to open up the market for American beef in Japan, a nation "with a very favorable trade balance and the highest beef market in the world."

Armstrong, in a telephone interview from his South Texas ranch, said that most cow-calf producers in Texas do not sell their calves until the fall of the year and, as a result, have not enjoyed any significant profits from the increased beef prices of recent weeks.

Carter's move will let in 200 million pounds of foreign beef, but according to U.S. Department of Agriculture analysts, the price of hamburger to consumers will be reduced only three cents a pound.

"The impact of this political move on prices will be small, but the psychological damage to cattle producers will be considerable," Armstrong said.

4. Approved a special Board meeting for Tuesday, June 13 at 7:30 p.m. to further interview principal applicants and take care of other personnel matters.

5. Changed the regular July 4th meeting to July 6th due to the holiday.

6. Approval was given to the various financial reports.

In final action, approval was given for the tax office to subscribe to a Printed Motor Vehicle License Directory for use in this office.

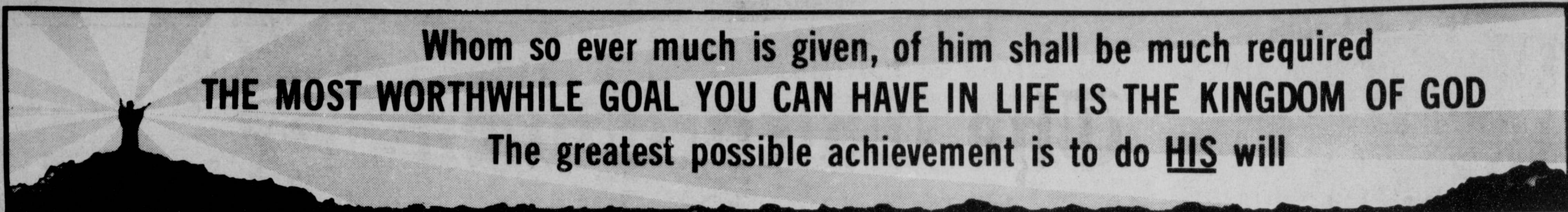

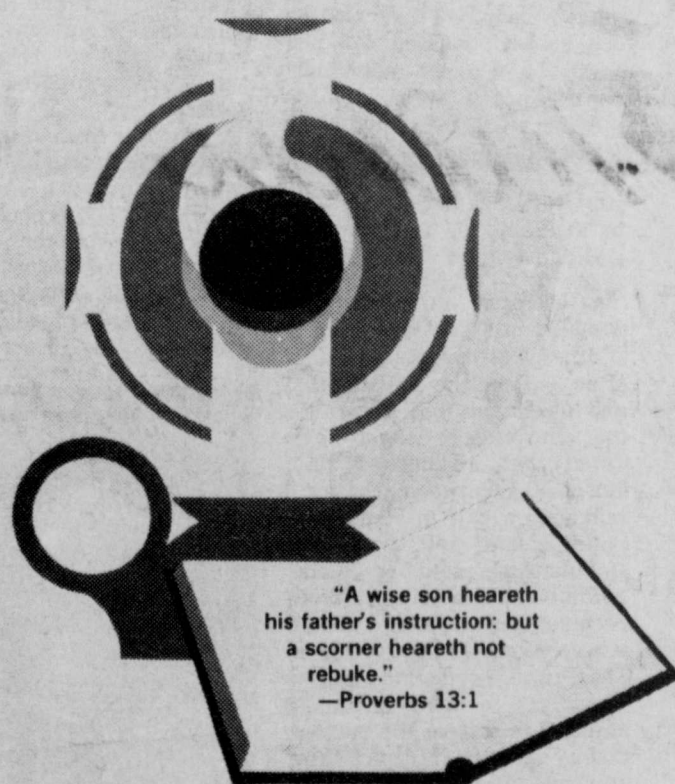

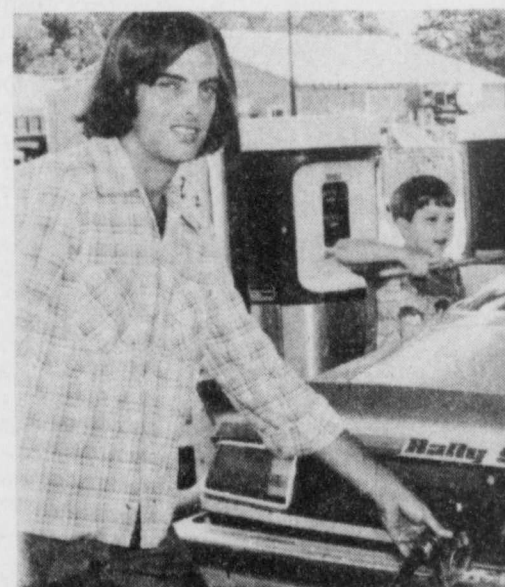

### Houston Livestock Show And Rodeo Becomes Nation's Largest Donor Of Agricultural Scholarships

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo today became the largest donor of agricultural scholarships in the United States.

### Fiddler's Contest

Set June 23

An old-time fiddler's contest will be a special feature of Annual Red River Valley Exposition and Fair this year.

The contest is scheduled to start at 7:30 p.m. Friday, June 23 in the coliseum on the fairgrounds in Paris.

The contest is free to the public.

Fiddlers will compete in two age divisions, Junior (0-32) and Senior (33 and over). Four prizes will be awarded to winning fiddlers in each division: first, \$75; second, \$65; third, \$55; fourth, \$45.

The Red River Valley Champion Fiddler will be determined by a playoff between the first and second place winners from each division. The champion fiddler will take home an extra \$50.

Additional \$10 prizes will be awarded to the youngest fiddler and the oldest fiddler in the contest.

Richard Harrison of Kilgore is the contest director. He is the son of Mrs. A.M. (Jeannette) Harrison of Paris. Harrison is also director of the National Collegiate Fiddlers' Festival in Commerce and the Annual East Texas Jamboree Old Time Fiddlers Contest in Gilmer.

Harrison said he is expecting some of the top fiddlers from the North Texas area to compete in the contest.

## County Will Be Stocked With Eastern Turkeys

Wild turkeys thrived in East Texas during the 1800's, but poor land management practices and conservation measures virtually eliminated their populations at the turn of the century.

Many areas of East Texas still offer suitable habitat conditions, and through restocking efforts by the Parks and Wildlife Department, wild turkey populations are being established once again.

At 24 locations scattered throughout East Texas, the department is involved in releasing eastern turkeys. Each site is generally stocked for three consecutive years in areas where landowners sign agreements to protect them from hunting.

"Ideally, adult, wild-trapped birds are best for restocking," said Horace Gore, P&WD upland game program leader. "Because adult eastern turkeys are unavailable, the department is embarking on ways to get wild, stock poult into the wild."

Most poult are released without hens to protect them when they are three months old. If they are kept longer and released at an older age, they lose a "wildness" which helps them survive.

The department's wildlife division in cooperation with Texas A&M University developed a unique method of releasing younger poult with Rio Grande hens last year, and it was tried experimentally at the Engeling Wildlife Management Area near Palestine.

Basically, the idea allows poult to be released at a younger age to preserve that "wildness" and at the same time, they have the benefit of a protective hen.

An area in Red River County where landowners agreed to protect turkeys will be the first non-department owned land stocked by this new method. Present plans call for 100 poult reared at the department's Management & Research Station in Tyler, and 10 Rio Grande hens trapped in Central Texas.

"We selected Red River County because the habitat is good, and there are no other wild turkeys there," Gore said. "Follow-up tracking surveys will be easier to monitor without other turkeys present."

While releasing poult with "foster parents" may sound like a simple procedure, the process is rather complex. Biologists are anxious to

determine if the extra steps increase the survival and wild quality of the birds.

First, eggs are hatched in incubators and within hours, several poult are placed with domestic turkeys for "imprinting." That is the term used to describe an irreversible behavior pattern in which poult establish an identity.

This step is critical, said Gore, because turkey poult will adopt the personalities of ducks if they are placed with ducks soon after hatching.

After one week when the poult become stronger, they are taken from domestic turkey hens at the M&R Station and carried to secluded pens at the Engeling Wildlife Management Area.

There, they receive new "stepmothers"—wild-trapped Rio Grande hens. But to make Rio Grande hens accept unfamiliar poult, biologists sedate them orally with grain alcohol and inject them with a protein hormone which induces a broody behavior. "When the hen recovers from the effects of the alcohol, she discovers the young poult and thinks they are hers," explained Gore.

Last year, hen and poult were allowed three weeks in a pen to become adjusted to each other, and contact with humans was minimal.

"One morning, they found the cage door open," Gore said, "and quietly walked outside. During the next several months, they stayed together as a group."

For the Red River County stocking this year, young poult will again be placed with Rio Grande hens at the Engeling Wildlife Management area for several weeks. Then they will be transported to another pen in Red River County and quietly released the following day.

Before placing the hens inside the pens, biologists will attach radio transmitters to their backs. Throughout the summer field biologists will track the turkeys by electronic telemetry and monitor the survival of poult.

The first group will be released in mid-June and will contain three hens and approximately 30 poult. Additional releases will be made throughout the summer as the other 70 poult become available from the Management & Research Station.

To maintain a true bloodline of eastern turkeys and to recover the radio transmitters, biologists will remove the hens from the poult in the fall. "The young turkeys will be approximately three months old and will no longer depend on the hens for protection," he said.

Of the 100 poult which will be released this summer, Gore hopes enough will survive to establish a reproducing population. If so, limited spring turkeys hunts could be a reality in Red River County within the next 10 years.

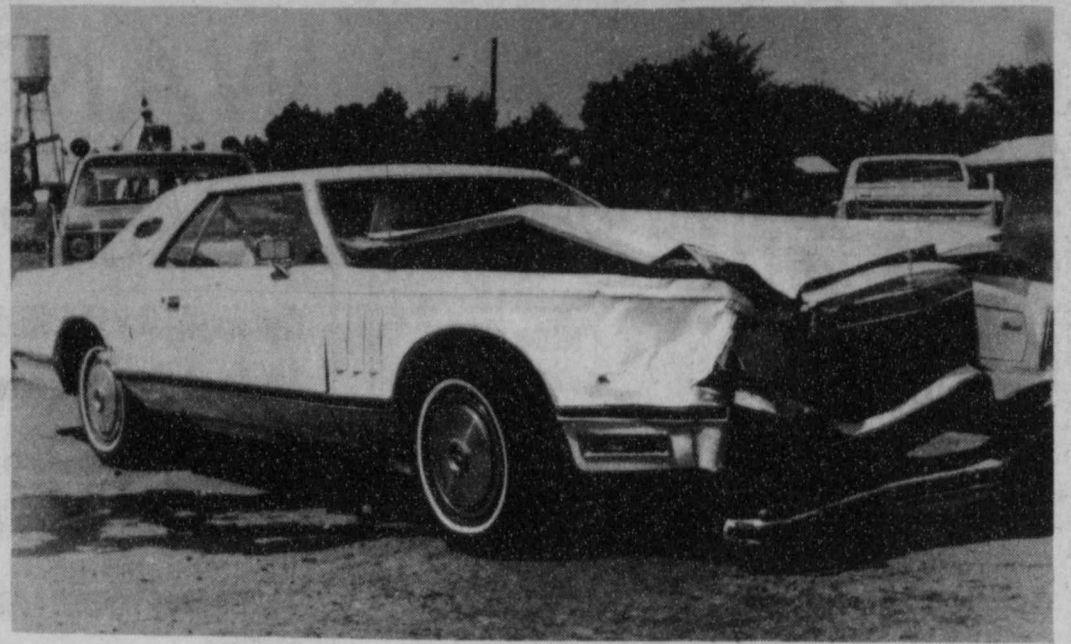

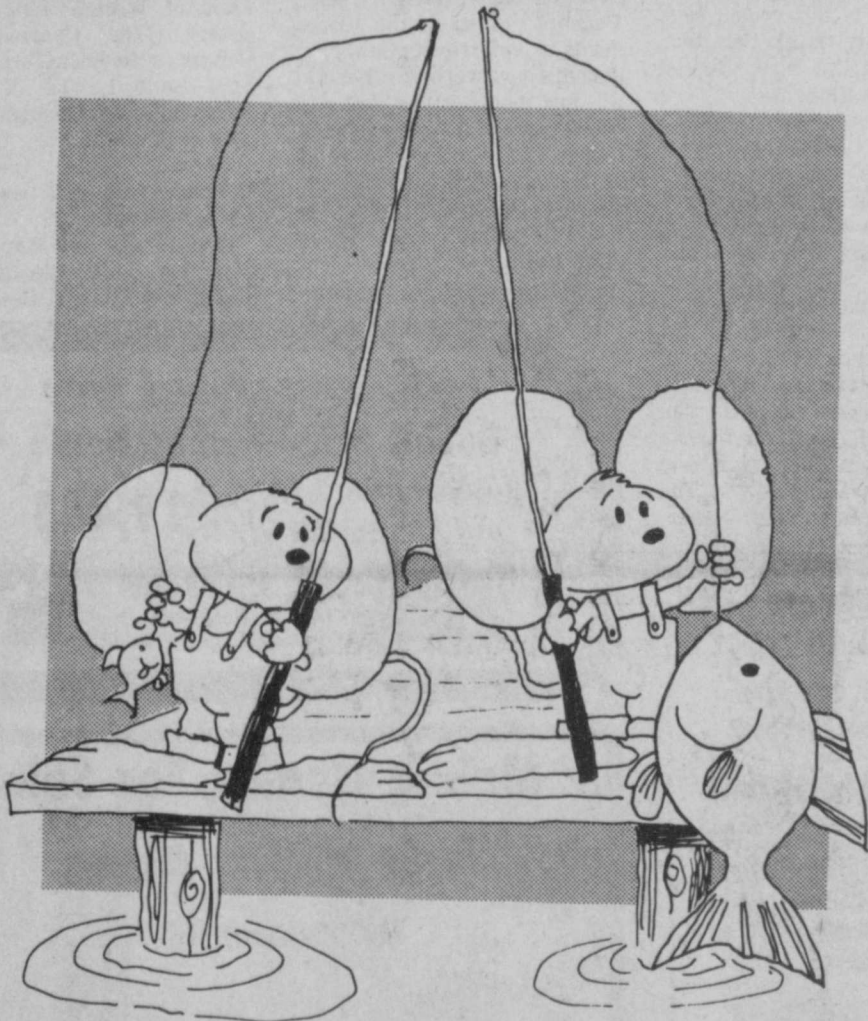

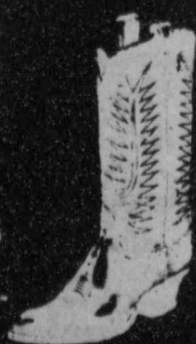
