CALIFORNIA ARMEN STILL ALOFT

INTERNATIONAL PROTESTS MADE ON TARIFF BILL

OPPOSITION TO BILL IS FROM ABROAD

FLOOD OF NOTES ARE MADE PUBLIC; TO TAKE ACTION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 10.—A flood of protests against the pending tariff bill sent by foreign trade associations, including one by Spain threatening to denounce the existing Modus Vivendi of most favored trade relations with the United States, were made public today by the Senate Finance committee.

The notes, couched in both emphatic and mild terms and expressing opinions on behalf of governments of Europe, South and Central America, and individual industries of those countries, were made public without comment. They will be considered by the committee in revision of the house tariff bill.

Twenty-five governments and colonies represented in the mass of memoranda were England, Australia, India, British West Indies, Bahamas, Bermuda, Island of Dominica, Irish Republic, Mexico, Austria, Turkey, Free State, France, Italy, Spain, Norway, Greece, Netherlands, Denmark, Switzerland, Persia, Uruguay, and Honduras.

The not from Austria declared "imports from the United States by far exceed the exports from Austria to the United States," and the trade balance between the two countries in 1928 was \$16,420,000 in favor of this country.

Bill is Menacing

SOLONS HAVE MONEY BILLS

HOUSE IS CONSIDERING SCHOOL FUNDS FOR NEXT TWO YEARS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, July 10.—Consideration by the senate of the reparational bill and by the house of the senate measure providing for support of state schools during 1930-31 were on the legislative program today.

Working at an almost unprecedented clip, the senate yesterday passed finally its rural aid, judiciary, educational and eleemosynary measures, leaving only the departmental bill and minor money measures for its membership to tackle. Total amount of the bills represented about \$37,000,000.

Pruning Likely
Having failed to make a material slash on any of the bills except the \$500,000 decrease for rural aid, there was a strong indication the pruning hook would be applied to the departmental appropriations.

A warm house fight on the educational bill was anticipated. New buildings costing approximately \$950,000 remained in the measure, which the house will consider, despite an attempt by Senator W. D. McFarlane, of Graham, to eliminate the items. A similar gesture was expected on the house floor.

WILLIS MAY BE AMBASSADOR

TURKEY POST LIKELY TO BE GIVEN WILLIS

AUTOMOBILE MAGNATE MENTIONED AS MAN FOR POSITION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 10.—The post of ambassador to Turkey, where the market for American automobiles is complicated by severe Italian competition, is expected by a number of Washington observers to be offered to John N. Willis, veteran Ohio automobile manufacturer.

Contrary to the report circulated in Wall Street after it was learned Willis was disposing of his industrial holdings that he was being considered for appointment to the diplomatic post at Paris, made vacant by the death of another Ohioan, Myron T. Herrick, the White House has disclosed the president has no other assignment in mind for the manufacturer.

What that assignment might be was not made known, but the president's choice for the Paris post is believed to have settled fairly definitely on Senator Edge of New Jersey. Furthermore, an offer of the Turkey post to Willis is regarded as fitting not only into the competitive trade situation there but into the impression here that Joseph C. Grew, the present ambassador, is to be transferred to a Latin-American capital.

ANOTHER BOAT DIVES NEAR SHIP AND TRIES TAPS

PEMBROKE, Wales, July 10.—The British submarine L-69 today dived in the vicinity of the stricken H-47 and tried to communicate with the 21 men trapped within her, but without avail.

The L-69 tried to communicate with the H-47 by sound telegraph, using a bell with morse code, but there have been no answering signals.

Diver Bell, reputed to be the most experienced in the navy, was taken from the cruiser Renown and equipped with a special German diving suit in which he will try to locate the missing men.

It was considered doubtful, however, that he would be able to descend to the 330 feet depth in which the H-47 lies.

SCHOOL BOND PASS EASILY

CITIZENS POLL 7 TO 1 MAJORITY FOR NEW HIGH SCHOOL

Lubbock approved the issuance of \$650,000 bonds for erection of a new high school and purchase of sites for proposed grammar school structures by a 7 to 1 victory at the polls Tuesday.

The exact count was 497 for and 69 against.

Polls opened at 8 o'clock yesterday morning and until noon barely 100 votes had been cast, while at mid-afternoon only 175 had voted. About 400 votes were cast within the last three hours.

Site Is Selected
Site for the proposed new structure is bordered by Avenues T and U and Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets. The new building will provide for the accommodation of 1,800 new students and will have provisions for future additions for 1,500 and possibly 1,800 students.

Merce Ortego, Mexican, held for investigation in connection with the death Monday night about 9:30 o'clock of Juan Sagure, three-year-old Mexican boy, was released this morning from Lubbock county jail following an examining trial in Justice of Peace J. R. Scott's court.

"Evidence proved that the case was an unavoidable accident," said County Attorney Vaughn Wilson. The Sagure child died shortly after being struck by an automobile driven by Ortego. The accident occurred in "Little Juarez," Lubbock Mexican colony.

Southern Cross Ends Flight To England

CROYDON, Eng., July 10.—Captain Albin Ahrensberg, Swedish flier, hopped off from Reykjavik for Sydney, N. S. W., and England, arrived at the Croydon air field this afternoon from Rome.

Unofficial figures showed Captain Ahrensberg had established a new record for a flight between Australia and England.

The Southern Cross left the Australian continent at Derby on the morning of June 27 and by arriving this afternoon accomplished the journey in 12 1/2 days against the former record established by Bert Hinkler of 15 days one hour and 7 minutes.

Oklahoma U. Co-Ed Is Held For Theft

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 10.—Alma Lee Couch, University of Oklahoma co-ed, today was at liberty on bond following her arrest in connection with the theft of \$2,000 in jewels from an Oklahoma City home last April.

Miss Couch, who graduated from the university in 1926, and who returned to school this summer to teach advanced work, was arrested after the missing gems were found in a public check stand here.

FLIGHT IS SUCCESSFUL OVER OCEAN BUT GAS RUNS SHORT

(Special To The Journal)
SATAMBER, Spain, July 10.—Undaunted by fatigue and illness, the American aviators, Captain Lewis A. Yancey and Roger Q. Williams, set out to finish today what they could not quite conclude yesterday—their flight from Old Orchard, Me., to Rome.

Lifting their plane from the abandoned airfield at Albericia, near here, at 11:20 a. m., (5:20 a. m. E. S. T.) they dipped once in salute and headed due east along the 850-mile route to the Italian capital. They hoped to take less than ten hours for the trip, arriving at Ciampino airfield, south of the city, before dark.

Tired and weary
They were two tired and weary aviators, during their long flight from Old Orchard to Albericia, which ended in a landing forced by lack of fuel at 9:30 p. m. yesterday (3:30 p. m. E. S. T.). The nervous tension kept them going.

But once here the reception spared the last of their strength, and it was difficult to get either Williams or Yancey from bed this morning.

After finally getting up the two aviators had breakfast, and looked over hundreds of cablegrams of felicitation before leaving for the abandoned air field at Albericia, five kilometers distant.

Travelled 3,400 Miles
They estimated their trip yesterday at having entailed 3,400 miles during 31 hours and 42 minutes flying time.

The aviators were acclaimed by thousands when they arrived at the air field this morning. Beautiful serenades which a few weeks ago greeted the French "Yellow Bird" aviators when they landed, three times at a real Spanish farewell. Civil Governor Salguero and the English consul gave the official "adieu."

They saw their plane loaded only with 75 gallons of gasoline and had it filled with an additional 75 gallons, providing the 150 gallons they deemed necessary for the flight to

SIXTY HURT IN WRECK OF FAST TRAIN

SEVERAL MAY DIE; TRAGEDIES TAKE MANY LIVES

ROCKY MOUNT, N. C., July 10.—From 40 to 60 persons were injured, some seriously, when five cars on fast northbound train number 84 on the Atlantic coast line railroad were derailed two miles north of Enfield, N. C., today.

Five persons said to be seriously injured were brought to the Atlantic coast line hospital here.

Hospital authorities said at noon they were preparing for more. L. W. Ransome, grocer at Enfield, said approximately 60 injured persons were taken from the wreck but none was dead. Two women were most seriously injured.

Most of the injured were being taken to Rock Mount hospital, he said.

The wreck occurred on a sharp curve near the city limits of Enfield, five Pullman cars "went into the swamp" Ransome said.

He was working beneath the rear of the truck when the chain broke. His spinal column was broken near the chest region, and he also sustained six fractured ribs.

The body was taken to Post shortly before noon for funeral arrangements. Survivors are the widow and several children.

PLOT CHARGED TO PRINCE

CAROL NAMED IN PLOT ON GOVERNMENT

EXILED PRINCE CITED IN DOCUMENTS IN RUMANIAN PLOT

(By Associated Press)
BUCHAREST, Rumania, July 10.—Documents allegedly confiscated by the government in its roundup of military conspirators against the present regime have definitely implicated the exiled Prince Carol in a projected coup d'etat.

The documents compromised proclamations to the people and to the army, all bearing the signature, "In the name of his majesty, King Carol II." It was said it appeared the exiled prince was fully aware of the preparations for the plot and gave his consent to it.

Arrests Made
Several more arrests were made today and it was said the investigation was proceeding along lines which might implicate various important political personages.

Premier Iuliu Maniu sent a messenger to Queen Marie requesting her to shorten her sojourn at Bled where she attended her daughter, the queen of Yugoslavia, at her recent accouchement.

AIRPORT REPORT UP ON THURSDAY

A report of site inspections for the new proposed \$75,000 Lubbock airport, bonds for which were voted last April, will be made before the city commission tomorrow afternoon, George E. Benson, chairman of a committee appointed for the site selection, announced today.

"Every possible location for the airport has been given careful consideration by the committee," said Mr. Benson. "We want to make a selection which will offer the greatest future for Lubbock's aviation possibilities."

Mr. Benson, in company with T. B. Duggan, another member of the committee, inspected the proposed sites from the air this morning in a Travelair plane, piloted by Jim Kelly, of the "Fort Worth" endurance flight fame.

PAIR DETERMINED TO OUTDO PLANE'S MOTOR

CULVER CITY, Calif., July 10.—(AP)—Having set a new world's record for endurance flight, L. W. Mendell and R. B. Reinhart continued circling above Culver City, in the biplane Angeleno today, determined to stay aloft until their motor fails.

When the fliers would come down remained a question. Originally they hoped to remain up 400 hours. Airport officials conceded them a chance of stretching the time to 200 hours or more when they passed the former record of 174 hours 59 seconds, established in Cleveland, four days ago, without showing any marked signs of physical exhaustion.

To Stay With Air
Before taking on a full night's supply of fuel last night the pilots dropped a note reiterating they would continue the record smashing flight until their engine falls apart.

A. E. Moxham, chief engineer of the enterprise, declared then that "A true endurance test, to determine how long the motor would run," was the object of the continued flight.

According to reports received from New Zealand, the Norwegian factory ship C. A. Larsen made 75,000 barrels of whale oil, representing a catch of 786 whales, and valued at approximately \$3,500,000 in the United States. 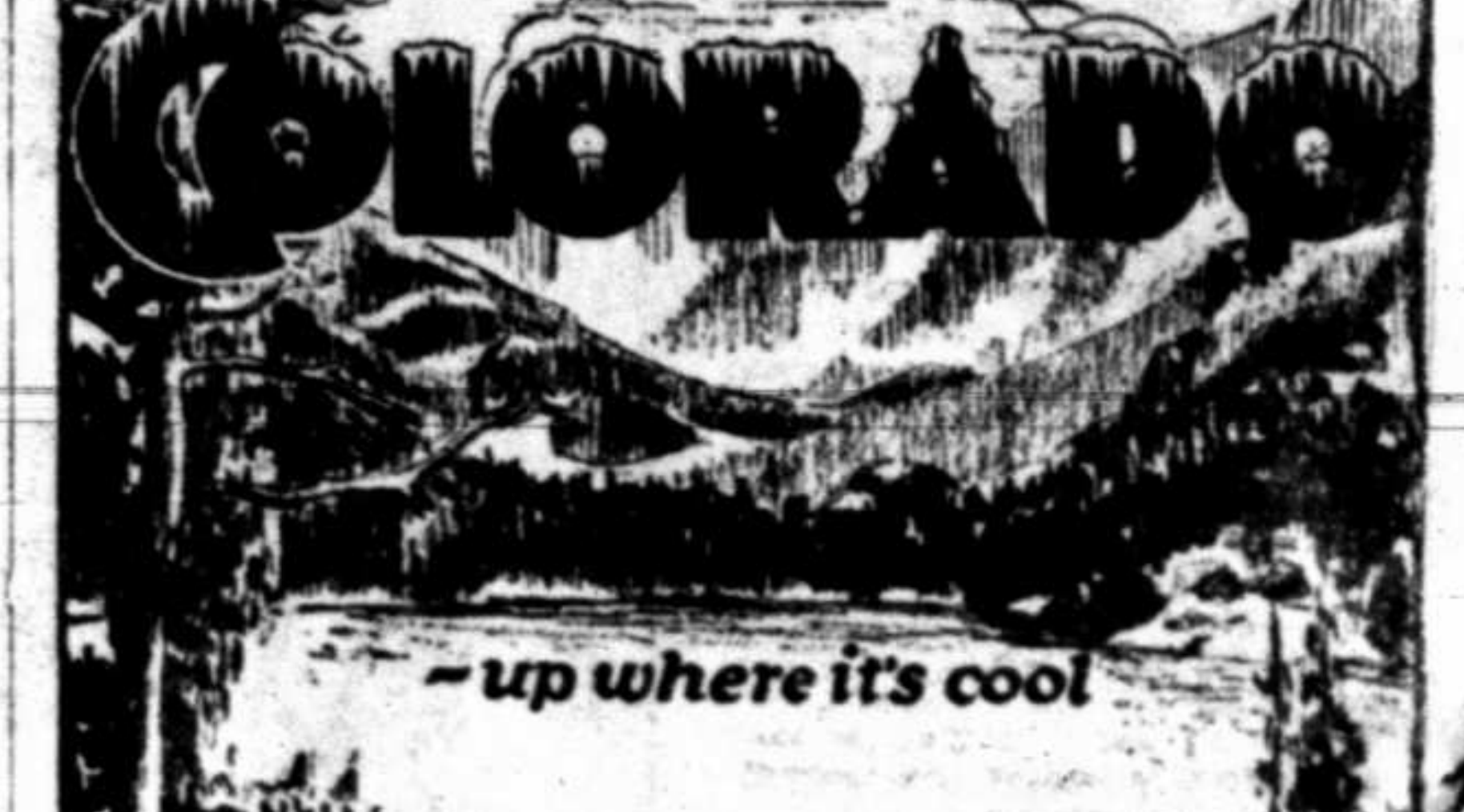

TWO GAMES ARE CLIPPED FROM LEAD OF ATHLETICS

HIGHER ALTITUDE
Rogers Hornsby, the highest paid baseball player in the National League, is gradually climbing up to the position where he belongs in the league ratings. For half a season, the Rajah has been down the line with an average around the .325 mark, but in the last two weeks, has begun to swing his war club with his old-time power that indicates that he is again headed for the top rung of the senior circuit batting line.

They Hornsby is without a doubt the most natural hitter in the majors. Today's averages show him to be slugging at a .365 clip with only two leaders ahead of him.

It is generally agreed that Manager McCarthy improved the Cub attack when he shifted around his heavy artillery. Cuyler had been batting third, Hornsby fourth and Wilson fifth, but now Cuyler has been moved down to fifth with Hornsby and Wilson elevated to third and fourth respectively. The Rajah's slugging of late, however, might justify his removal to the fourth hole again.

These who have been waiting for the Athletics to crack under the strain are finding it rather tedious. Because the Yankees gave up a 12-2 game lead during the latter part of the 1928 campaign is no reason for the Mackmen to do the same. The Athletics are a younger team than the world champions and will be hard to stop once their confidence has been stimulated. There is the usual kind of logic that reasons that the unusual thing that happens once a year will happen the next year. Since the Braves of 1914 made their dash from the cellar to the championship, there has not been a case where a bunch of tail-end misfits that happened to win a couple of games in June were not picked as potential pennant possibilities. Each season you will read this whenever one of these happens to win a game or two. They are going to be "The Braves all over again," but that 3,000 to 1 bet of June in 1914 has never been cashed.

Lubbock football fans are likely to be given an opportunity to see a number of the Class B football teams of the South Plains in action here during the South Plains Fair which opens in late September. Since the rabbit races of last year did not turn out so well, fair officials have turned back to high school football for their athletic entertainment. According to present plans, six games will be played during the course of the week's attraction.

Speaking of football, it won't be long until the entire coaching fraternity in Lubbock will be off for the coaching schools where all the big yards are spun. Last year the coaches attending a certain school in Texas listened to one that went something like this: Two rivals were battling for supremacy of their district on Thanksgiving Day before the largest crowd that ever witnessed a football game at Tickleville. Fighting desperately for the advantage, the two teams had entered the last quarter with the board still scoreless. The quarterback for Junction falls on his face and begins ejaculating in the unknown tongue. Whereupon the water boy dashes upon the field and splashing aqua pura in all directions. After a few dashes of water on his upturned countenance, the injured warrior gives three short prances around a few strides and announces he is ready. As the retreating water boy neared the sidelines, Junction's quarterback calls for a kick. A long spiral goes sailing down the field and lands directly in the water bucket. Tickleville's safety man ambled over in the general direction of the soaked water boy, glances at the soaked pigskin and as the entire crowd gazes on in amazement dashes for his goal line with the only touchdown of the game. "Covering himself with glory and gaining mention for all-time," the moral of the story was: Don't give up the ship.

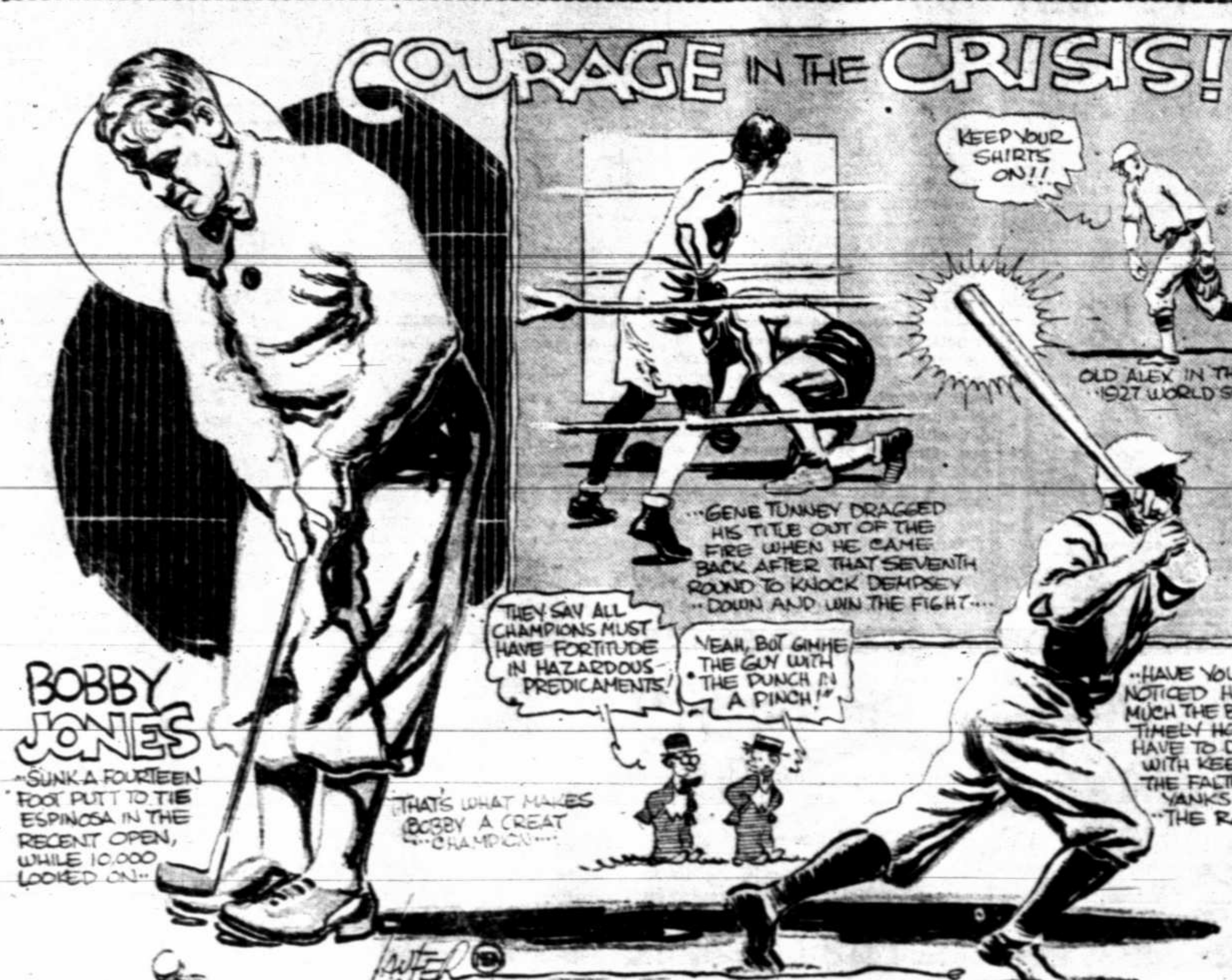
Morse Breaks Finger

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TWO LARGE TEETH ARE FOUND IN POST CANYON BY BOY SCOUTS OF AREA CAMP

A touch of exploration has entered into the boy scout encampment at Post with the discovery recently of two teeth, each measuring from 12 to 14 inches in length, six inches wide and perhaps five inches in thickness, and a thigh bone the size of a man, in a deep canyon about one-fourth of a mile from the camp.

These were found by J. R. Mitchell, scout master, and the Levelland troop of scouts.

The fossil discovered is supposedly a mastodon. The mammoth teeth were taken, after some excavation had been done, but digging was

stopped around the thigh bone because of fear that this might be injured by inexperienced excavators.

Two Buffalo Heads Found
In addition to these unique discoveries, two buffalo heads were found, one in an excellent state of preservation. These were found by Mike Crenshaw and "Possum" Blackwell, Lubbock scouts, and by Stanley Gunn and "Shorty" Griner of this city. These scouts all are members of troop number 4.

According to K. N. Clapp, scout commissioner, experts will be called to the scene of the fossil discovery and careful excavating will be done

in an effort to get the remaining bones out in good shape.

First Found
This is the first fossil bones ever to be discovered in the vicinity of Post and searching parties will no doubt be occupied in endeavoring to uncover more of them.

Another unusual incident to life at the camp was the killing of four foot rattlesnake by members of troop number seven. This was found a good distance from the camp site and is the first rattler to show itself near the camp this year. A number of tarantulas have been caught on the grounds, and placed in a glass container. These, the scout commissioner states, are harmless and to prove it he picks them up in his hand.

DISEASES IN WHEAT NOTED

BOWER REPORTS TWO MENACES TO CROP OF PLAINS

The cooperation of two diseases have affected 25 per cent of the wheat in the Panhandle area of the 1929 crop, according to H. J. Bower, agronomist at Texas Technological college. Both diseases have been prevalent for some time. One is the common covered smut, sometimes called stinking smut, or burnt and can easily be controlled by the simple process of mixing 2 or 3 tablespoonfuls of Copper Carbonate dust with 1 bushel of seed wheat.

The other has been identified by both the Texas and Kansas Agriculture Experiment stations as one of the forms of root rot called Helminthosporium, a peculiar growth of brown lesion at the base of the stem. Dr. Hurley Fellows, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, states that this is a rather new disease, but is scattered over the great plains area from the Panhandle of Texas to the Judith Basin of Montana. It is thought that by later seeding of wheat free of this fungus disease in a well prepared seed bed, elimination of this trouble to a great extent will be seen.

Growers lax The seasonal variations in the degree of loss by the effect of smut in different years, causes the wheat grower to become lax in treating his seed wheat. The time of year, moisture and temperature of the soil at the time of seeding have a controlling influence on the extent of infection by the germination of the smut spores while the wheat seedling is sending forth its plumule and primary root. However, with the simple treatment of the copper carbonate dust, mixing thoroughly so that the dust comes in contact with the bush end of the kernel, absolute assurance is given against this big loss that causes so much grief to the buyer when he is forced to make his customary dosage.

THIRTY REPORTED KILLED IN LANDSLIDE

TOKYO, July 10 (AP)—Thirty deaths were reported today from Kagoshima prefecture where there was a landslide during the night which precipitated an entire fishing village into the sea. It was due to excess rains.

Because of the inaccessibility of the region, confirmation and exact details of the disaster could not be obtained immediately.

It appeared, however, that continuous rain storms for several days loosened high ground above the village of Uchinohara causing a great avalanche of earth and rocks to hurtle down the mountain side carrying all before it into the sea.

BROKER DECLARES COTTON CLASS LOW

DALLAS, July 10 (AP)—If Texas cotton continues to deteriorate during the next ten years as it has in the past 10, there will be no such thing as the cotton business in this state, M. H. Reed, cotton broker of Austin, told winners from the eleventh, twelfth and twenty-third districts of the Texas Cotton Ginners association here today. He urged the ginners to co-operate with the farmers in restoring the staple in Texas.

Other speakers included T. W. Davidson, Dallas, former lieutenant governor, C. D. Simmons, Austin, associate professor of business statistics at the University of Texas, T. J. Harrell, Fort Worth, president of the Texas Cottonseed Crushers association, and W. E. Green, San Antonio.

PROLONGED LIFE, GOAL FOR AGES, IS NO NEARER TODAY, FISHBAIN CLAIMS

(By Associated Press) PORTLAND, Ore., July 10.—Prolonged life, goal of scientists and dreamers for ages, is no nearer today than it was when the quest began, Dr. Morris Fishbain, secretary of the American Medical association and editor of "Hygeia" said here today. Dr. Fishbain spoke at the association's convention.

"The mysterious secret of life, that unknown living force which causes man to survive for three score years and ten, more or less, has been the object of intensive search from almost the beginning of time," the noted physician said.

"Throughout the ages men have craved and sought some miracle that would add them in living beyond the allotted span, always searching from some elixir of life that would afford them years eternal."

Despite all this, said Fishbain, and despite the advance in knowledge and improvement in facilities for experiment, "we are no nearer the coveted prize than man's earliest ancestor."

NEGRO PRESS BLAMED FOR RACE RACKET

NEGROES REFUSING TO RIDE IN SECTIONS IN DALLAS CARS

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, July 10.—Northern negro newspapers advocating social and political equality of the negro and white races were blamed today by William McCraw, district attorney for Dallas county, for the recent trouble here over the Jim Crow laws.

The attorney said the papers have persistently denounced the laws, saying they were unconstitutional, and have urged their readers to disregard them.

In warning the negroes to comply with the laws, especially the one compelling them to ride in their section of street cars, McCraw pointed out the decision of the United States supreme court regarding the validity of the laws.

The trouble here was climaxed this week when a street car motor-man was injured seriously after he had requested a negro to move into her section of the car.

ROAD PLANS TOLD ROTARY

CONDYR TALKS ON BUSINESS PLANS FOR BONDS MADE

A talk on "Present Business Conditions and Outlook for the Future," by Prof. B. F. Condyr, of Texas Technological college faculty, and an announcement as to Lubbock county's prospects for paved roads, by Charles F. O'Neill, featured the regular weekly noon luncheon meeting of the Rotary club, at the Hotel Lubbock today.

Prof. Condyr reviewed the past several months of so-called "wild speculation" on the New York stock exchange, and its effect upon general conditions in this country.

O'Neill's announcement was that the State Highway department has promised to send an engineer here, probably next week, to go over this country's road problem in detail, prior to calling an election for voting bonds to pay for paving. The engineer will, after making a survey of the county, recommend what highways are to be paved, the distances, type of paving to be used, the cost, and the amount of funds needed for Lubbock county to vote as their part of this total cost.

An election will likely be called for some time in September, if present plans are carried out, O'Neill said.

WICHITA, Kan., July 10 (AP)—Acceptance of the Santa Fe wage scale by engineer and yardmen of the Orient division of the railroad has been announced by union officials here.

The Santa Fe scale means increases of from 25 to 70 cents per hundred miles on a daily basis, it was announced.

The new scale will become effective August 1 for employees of both the Kansas-Oklahoma and Texas divisions.

MELBOURNE, (AP)—R. J. Matheson, a witness for the locomotive engineers union, occupied the chair in the Australian Industrial Arbitration court for 32 days and gave 2,000 pages of testimony.
