Castor Bean Seed Now Available

Castor bean seed have become available to farmers in Mitchell County and the county PMA has been asked to determine if there is a possibility of obtaining some acreage in the county for this year. About 800 acres in the county are necessary to put the program in operation. Planting date for castor beans is about the same as cotton.

The seed will cost \$15 per hundred pounds, enough to plant 10 or 12 acres. Detailed information is available on planting, cultivating and harvesting of castor beans.

Social Security Cards Important

Mr. E. Glen McNatt, Field Representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be at the Chamber of Commerce in Colorado City at 10:00 a. m. on Wednesday June 18. Persons wishing to file retirement claims or survivor's claims under the Social Security Act are invited to call at that time.

McNatt, in a statement made today, called attention to the importance of the social security card and stated that it is each worker's responsibility to keep possession of his card. Getting a duplicate is simple but it takes about a week or ten days to verify the number and issue a duplicate. If the job seeker has lost his card, he may miss a chance to go to work during this week or ten days.

Over 100 million cards have been issued nationally since social security began 15 years ago. Another 5 million will be issued this year, including those going to self-employed persons and persons in other recently covered groups.

Young people starting on their careers or vacation jobs will need cards soon. Mr. McNatt suggests that these young folk might follow the example set by workers now reaching retirement age. They have carried cards for about 15 years, and many of them still have their original cards. They recognized that their cards had a definite value to them, and now in their older years it is paying off.

Applications for social security cards may be obtained at the local Post office. Complete applications should be mailed to the Social Security Administration, Post Office Building, Abilene, Texas.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q I understand I need my original discharge papers to apply for a GI home loan, but I have lost them. What can I do?

A Ask your branch of service for authenticated substitute evidence in place of your original discharge papers.

Q I've been taking a correspondence course under the GI Bill, and now I'd like to switch to a classroom course in the same subject. May I do so, even though the July 1951 cut off date has passed?

A No. Under VA regulations, you are not permitted to change from correspondence to classroom training after the cut-off date. But you may take advanced training in the same subject by correspondence, if you have enough entitlement and file a proper application.

Q I know a veteran who broke two appointments in a row for VA outpatient treatment. He didn't give any advance notice; just failed to show up. Is it possible for him to get a third appointment?

A If he had no reasonable excuse for breaking the appointment with out notice, VA deems that he has refused Government treatment. No further treatment will be given, unless he makes a formal application and satisfactorily evinces a willingness to cooperate by keeping his appointments.

Q I'm training under Public Law 16, and I've just had some large medical expenses, which my subsistence payments won't cover. Is there any source where I can borrow money for a short time?

A Yes. Under the law, VA may lend you up to a \$100 from a revolving fund. No interest will be charged but the money must be paid back.

UNDULANT FEVER SEASON
AUSTIN—This is the season when an increase of undulant fever may be expected, according to Dr. George W. Cox, the State Health Officer.

An undulant fever patient suffers from chilly sensations, or severe shaking chills, sweats, and high fever.

The patient loses weight and becomes weak. If the illness is of mild type the patient may find it hard to remain in bed, but if he tries to keep on with his work, he finds he has not sufficient energy.

Symptoms often continue for a number of weeks before recovery occurs. Fortunately undulant fever has a low death rate. Body temperature may reach a higher mark each day than the day before for some time, and then gradually return to normal over a period of several days. Fever may be absent for some days and come back again in the same way as before, registering higher each day and then gradually going lower. The patient's temperature chart will resemble an appearance of smooth waves or undulations. The appearance of

as temperature curve in typical cases has placed this disease the same undulant fever.

Undulant fever is one of the infectious diseases known to be transmitted from animals to humans. In hogs and cows, the germ produces a great economic loss because it causes a contagious abortion. When this germ invades the human body, the resulting disease is undulant fever. Prevention is dependent upon 1. eradication of the disease in farm animals, 2. careful pasteurization of dairy products, and 3. avoidance, in so far as possible, of direct contact with infected animals.

Newsman To Meet At Houston

LONE STAR Agriculture
Released by The Texas Department of Agriculture

TEXAS HERBICIDE REGULATIONS

Reports of crop damages resulting from careless or misuse of hormone type herbicides are beginning to trickle into the offices of the Texas Department of Agriculture at Austin. These reports are expected to increase daily unless farmers and ranchers exercise normal precautions in chemical applications as the season advances.

Herbicides 2, 4-D, and 2, 4, 5-T are excellent for the control of weeds, mesquite and bushy growths. They are not "poisons," as many believe. Instead these hormone chemicals energize plants causing them to literally "grow themselves to death."

Most broad-leaf plants are susceptible to this growing action. Rice, flax, grain sorghums and grasses are not affected, however, and for that reason, 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T are good solutions to use on these crops to keep down weed infestations.

But many crops, such as cotton, can be severely damaged by hormone herbicides if adjacent fields are sprayed carelessly. Herbicides should never be applied, either from ground or air equipment, during a high wind which would cause droplets to drift from pastures into crop fields. Another common mistake is the use of too much pressure in the equipment which creates a fine spray susceptible to long drifts. Heavier drops are most effective and are more apt to settle in areas where they are intended.

Damage from herbicides is usually easy to recognize. It causes mutations in the plant, sometimes making the leaves grow in odd shapes and to curl at the edges. Unless the accidental dosage is too great, however, the farmer may still make his crop, even though the yield might not be as much as before damage occurred.

One of the duties of the Texas Department of Agriculture is to inspect all ground and air equipment used in application of her-

bicides to see that it comes up to the specifications of Texas Herbicide Regulations. The department also issues permits to those farmers, ranchers and commercial spraying companies who wish to apply herbicides to the land.

All dealers are required to keep sales records, and all spraying companies or individuals must keep records of date of herbicide applications for two years.

These regulations apply in cases where more than 20 acres are to be sprayed. A fee of 10 cents per acre is charged for permits. For plots less than 20 and more than 5 acres, no permit is required but written notice must be given the department that chemicals are to be applied. For less than 5 acres, no permit or notice

is required.

A few counties in West and South Texas are exempt from the Texas Herbicide Regulations. A request for information on exempt counties and regulations should be addressed to John C. White, Commissioner, Texas Department of Agriculture, Austin, Texas.
