Three Charged In Buckman Drug Burglary

Three Paris residents were charged Tuesday in the court of Red River Justice of the Peace Bill McDonough with burglary in connection with the entry of Buckman Drug Store early Tuesday morning.

Charged were Charles Steven Vaughan, 18, his wife, Jeri Ann Vaughan, 17, of Paris, and

Daniel Moore Fletcher, 17, of 3001 Albert Lane in Paris. The three were placed under

\$5,000 bond. The Vaughan couple made bond and were released, while Fletcher re-

mained in Red River County jail. Red River County Deputy

Sheriff Carl Wolfe said that the couple was observed by local boys dropping off Fletcher near the store, and then the boys heard the burglar alarm go off. Wolfe said the local boys called Clarksville for a sheriff's unit, and observed one person leaving the store with a sack, and watched where the person hid the sack. Wolfe arrested the couple in the car before they could pick up Fletcher, and he escaped on foot.

Wolfe, reserve deputy Mark Whitehouse and Bill Buckman searched for Fletcher on foot, finding him about 4:30 a.m. two miles north of Bogata on Highway 271 near the Octavias Westbrook home.

Wolfe said the assistance of the local boys was invaluable, and that help in where to search for Fletcher was obtained from passing truckers.

A barbecue dinner will be catered by Ernie's of Greenville at 6:00 p.m., followed by the FFA Sweetheart Contest.

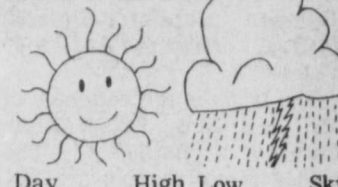
Prairiland FFA Sweetheart, Tina Gibson, will compete in the contest.

Health Clinic

Set At Clarksville

The Texas State Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.

The clinics will be conducted in the office of the Chamber of Commerce, Clarksville, Texas.

The next clinic will be held February 7, 1978.

Clinic hours will be from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all children, preschool and school age, beginning at two (2) months of age. This clinic is intended primarily for those children who do not have a family physician. Immunizations to be offered include Measles, Rubella, Oral Polio, and Diphtheria, Pertussis, Tetanus (DPT). All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record if it is available.

The Public Health Region 7 Immunization Staff is being assisted by the Red River County Hospital Auxiliary in conducting these clinics.

Chamber Dinner Set March 3

A revitalization of the Bogata Area Chamber of Commerce is planned with the kickoff to be a dinner at 7:30 p.m. March 3.

The Chamber, which was initiated in the Bogata area two years ago, has been inactive with the large exception of the annual Frontier Day Celebration under the direction of Jim Wood and Rev. David Griffin.

Membership dues paid at that time have been stretched to cover the expenses of the Frontier Day Celebration, plus repairs were made to the Bogata Community Center.

At a meeting Friday in Bogata of interested businessmen, Wood said that approximately \$200 is needed to finance Frontier Day each year, and the funds need to be made

available now, when the planning of the event begins. More than six months of planning goes into the Frontier Day events, Wood added.

Plans were made to contact those who supported the Chamber in 1975 and ask for renewed membership. Members may expect that the dues will be used to finance Frontier Day events. A great deal of the expense is financed by the sale of turtles for turtle races, and the barbecue, Wood said.

Chamber officers will be nominated by a committee and presented for election at the Chamber dinner on March 3, with the floor still being held open for nominations before the election.

New Milk Imports Presents Danger

The Agriculture Department is considering changing the federal regulations making it easier to import milk and milk products from countries where foot-and-mouth disease is always present. Foot-and-mouth disease is a highly communicable livestock virus disease and is found in nearly all of Western Europe. These countries could become a source of most imported dairy products. Livestock in the United States are free of the disease, after very expensive eradication programs and would have not resistance to an outbreak.

Held At Haven

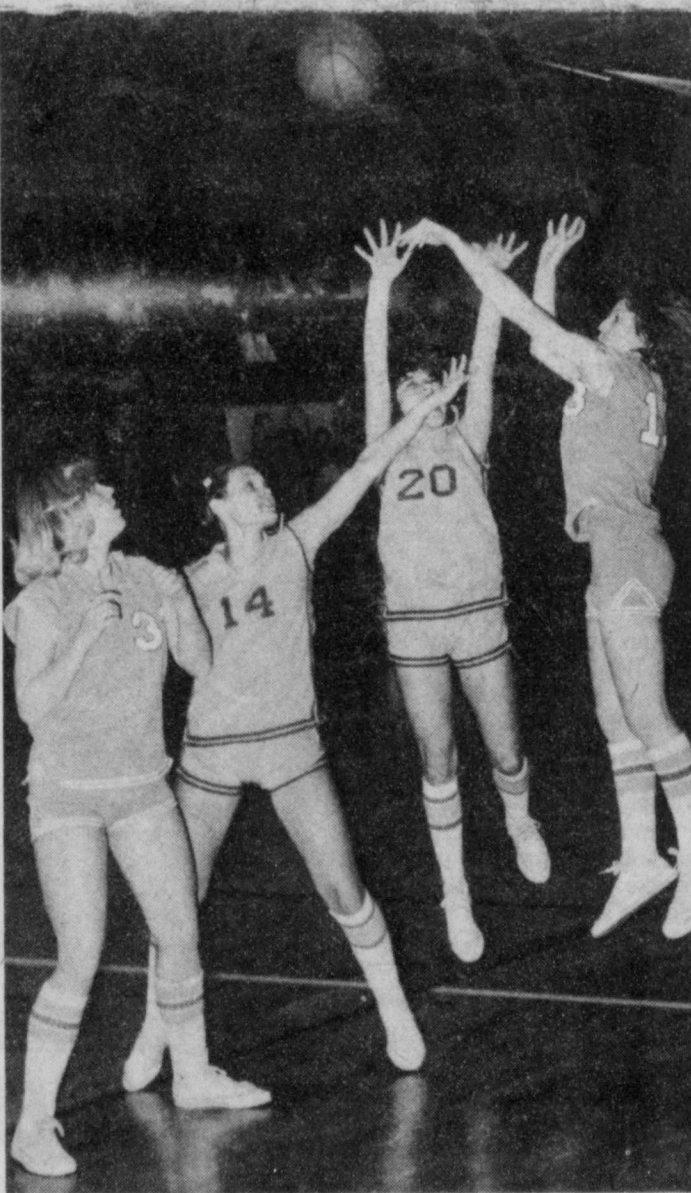

Janis Hankins who served as a missionary to the American Indians for 1½ years told of her experiences on the mission field as she showed the interesting slides. It proved a very educational and enjoyable evening for everyone.

Associated Milk Producers recently announced "it would be disastrous if the cattle in this country became infected. There would be increased risk of the disease being carried into this country through human error despite some proposed safeguards." Dairy Farmer Co-ops and National Milk Producers Federation plan on submitting analyses relevant to the suggested methods of controlling the imported products. "All cloven-hoofed animals are subjected to infection, so that the risk of devastating infection to beef, dairy, sheep, goats and swine is enormous," Elkin said. Consumers also would suffer tremendous injury if domestic livestock should be infected. It could reduce meat and milk production by 25 percent.

Public comments on the proposal may be submitted through Feb. 13 to the Deputy Administrator for Veterinary Services, USDA, Hyattsville, Md., 20782.

Baptist Minister Found Guilty

David Norwood, 29, a Baptist minister from Paris, was found guilty Tuesday of burglary of a habitation in Judge Henry Braswell's District Court. Norwood was sentenced to five years, probated, on Wednesday morning.

Norwood was arrested Monday, Oct. 10, by Deport City Marshall Bud Nobles at the north end of the driveway of the Glen Renfro home on Highway 271. Nobles commented Tuesday, after the trial was over, that he was not the first one on the scene, as a call for help on the CB from Jerry Loven, who discovered the burglary, resulted in the appearance of a number of Deport residents armed with shotguns and rifles.

Renfro, a pastor of the Cunningham Baptist Church, said that Norwood had preached at his church in Cunningham.

Loven, who is Renfro's son-in-law, went to the Renfro home shortly after 2 p.m. Oct. 10, to wash up after answering a fire call with the Deport Volunteer Fire Department, and discovered a blue-green Datsun parked in the backyard. Loven drove his pickup around the east side of the house looking at the windows, and as he passed the northeast bedroom window he saw a subject peering out of the window.

Loven called on his CB for assistance and was answered first by Frank Malone of Pattonville, and then by a number of other Deport residents.

Renfro, whose home is in full view of the highway, but still isolated from the standpoint of having neighbors, has lost thousands of dollars in personal belongings to burglars over the past year.

County attorney Tom Wells was the prosecutor in the case.

Burglars Enter Deport Times

Burglars made away with 65 cents from the cash drawer, \$6 left laying on a desk and two tape recorders from The Deport Times early Tuesday morning.

The burglary was discovered Tuesday at approximately 8:30 a.m. by Patti Thomas of

Blossom, an employee of The Times.

The burglars pulled an air conditioner from a window at the rear of the building to gain entry, ransacked the office and prized open the front door from the inside to get out.

Department Sponsors Training In M-44

Training in the proper use of the M-44 Sodium cyanide device for the control of coyotes will be sponsored Feb. 8 in Sulphur Springs and Clarksville by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA), Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Training will begin at 1:00 p.m. at the Hopkins County Courthouse and at 7:00 p.m. at

the Red River County Courthouse.

Included in the sessions will be the safe handling of the capsules and device, proper use of antidote kit, proper placement of the device, and necessary recordkeeping.

Any individual buying and/or using the M-44 device in Texas must be certified by TDA as required by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

Lamar County Deputy Sheriff John Williams said he patrolled Deport from 10:30 p.m. Monday until early Tuesday morning, and at approximately 1:00 a.m. walked Main Street and checked all the doors. Williams speculated that the burglars were in the building at that time, and that they broke out the front door when Williams drove his patrol car down the alley behind The Times office.

Williams said he noticed the air conditioner on the ground, but thought that it had been there for quite a while, and drove away.

Most of the loss came from the damage to the air conditioner and to the front door. The office safe was banged up, but not opened.

"The safe is primarily for fire safety," publisher Bob Wright said Tuesday, "as we keep little cash on hand over night."

Miss Thomas found the front door open when she came to work and went next door to City Drug Store for assistance.

Gary Morgan and Deport Community Public Service manager Joe Fonville entered and checked the building while the incident was reported to the Lamar County Sheriff's Department.

Apparently the burglars were wearing gloves when they entered the building as no fingerprints were found in the investigation.

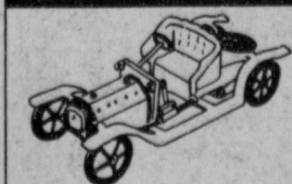

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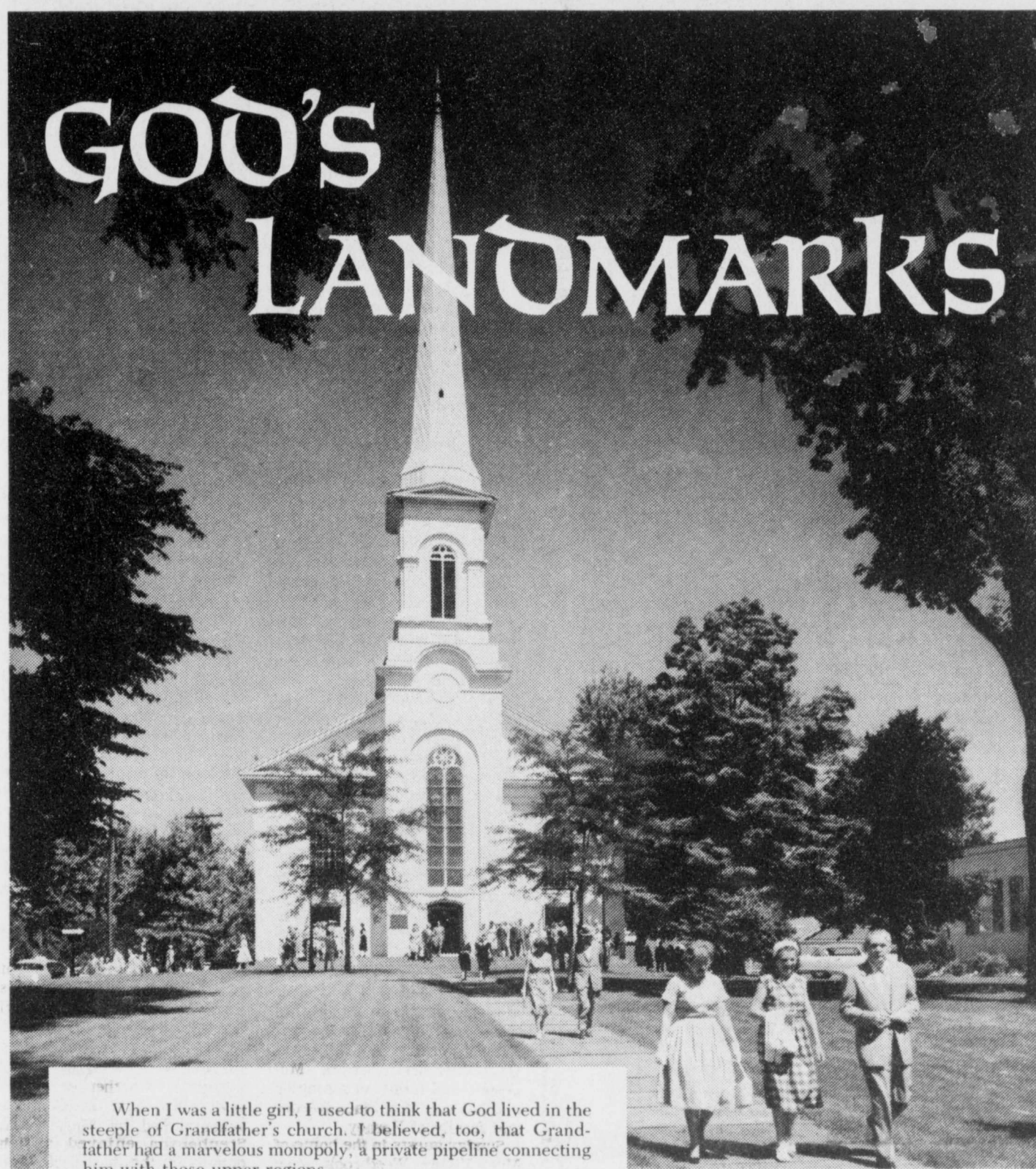
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When I was a little girl, I used to think that God lived in the steeple of Grandfather's church. I believed, too, that Grandfather had a marvelous monopoly, a private pipeline connecting him with those upper regions.

When I told him, Grandfather hugged me close and chuckled. "Child," he said, "You can't shut God up in a church or in one man's heart. He's everywhere—in whispering winds, the wild goose's call, in winter's purple clouds and scarlet leaves of fall. Wherever you see beauty—you see God."

Not long ago I went back to that little town and visited the church. It looked just the same. The white spire gleamed in the sun, piercing the blue summer sky. 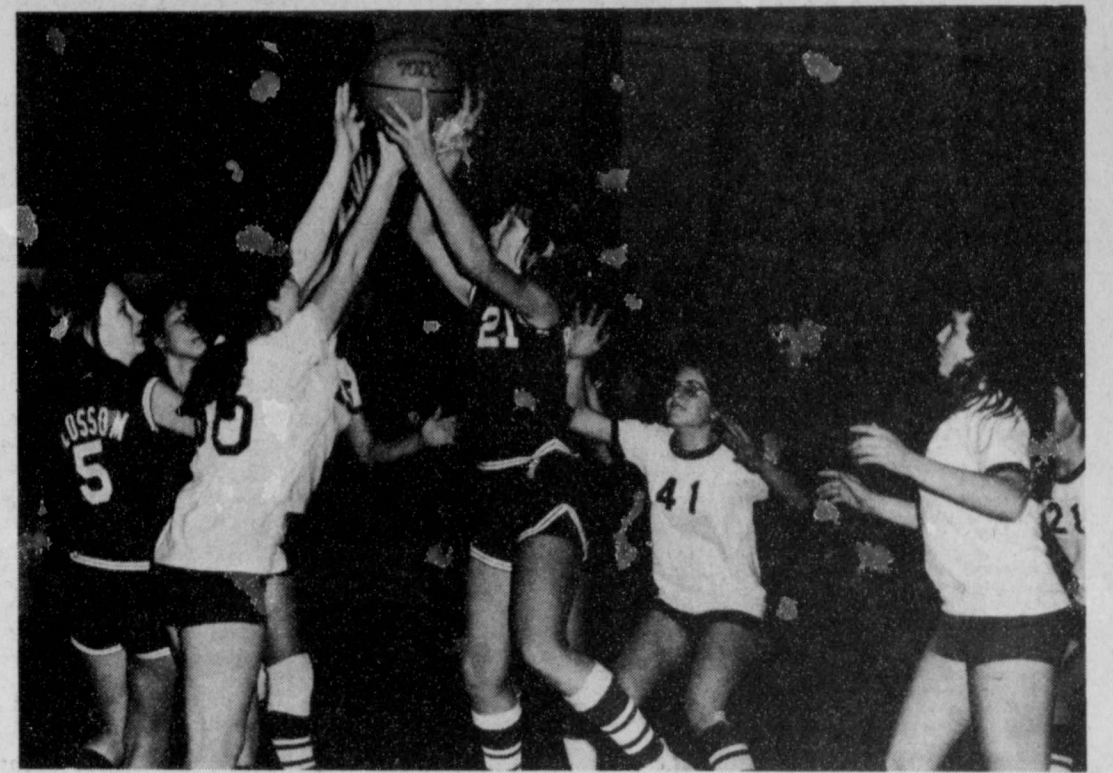

Cancer Society Waiting To Help

When someone discovers he has cancer, the family is upset and often confused about where to turn. The American Cancer Society, with its more than 2,250,000 volunteers, is waiting to help.

Locally, the society has two priorities. First, an education program is aimed at getting information to the public, hopefully in time to prevent cancer from fully developing.

Literature of the society says that 60 percent of all cancers in women and 40 percent of all cancers in men develop in areas of the body that can be easily examined.

While over 200,000 Americans are being saved annually from cancer, doctors say that another 100,000 might be saved if properly treated in time.

The second priority of the

society is to provide services for cancer patients.

Mrs. John Kocurek, new service-rehabilitation chairman for the Red River County Unit of the American Cancer Society, lists three areas in which the Red River Co. Unit can help.

1. Information and counseling-The Service Committee is presently compiling a list of all the local agencies which can provide any services to cancer patients.

2. Loan and gift service-Items available through the Society include dressings, powder, tape, bed pans, urinals, alcohol, hospital gowns, and nylon comfort pillows. Equipment for loan includes hospital beds and mattresses, hospital bedside rails, wheelchairs, walkers,

crutches, and bedside commodes.

3. Transportation-This is a service for any patients in Red River County who need a ride to the doctor or to their radiation treatment.

"We need volunteers, especially for this transportation aspect," Mrs. Kocurek said.

All the services, whether expendable items provided by the American Cancer Society or the volunteer-supportive, are available to any cancer patient.

According to Mrs. Kocurek, all the society needs in order to provide unlimited services to the patient is his doctor's permission.

As the saying goes, help is just a phone call away.

If a seller tells you an item is gold, look for the stamped mark — 14K or 18K — of the chemical element "Au" known as gold. If it's real, the mark will be there. The amount of gold in jewelry is measured in the U.S. by parts of gold. Pure gold is 24 karat; 18K and 14K are commonly used in jewelry. In the metric system, 58.5 per cent equals 14K gold.

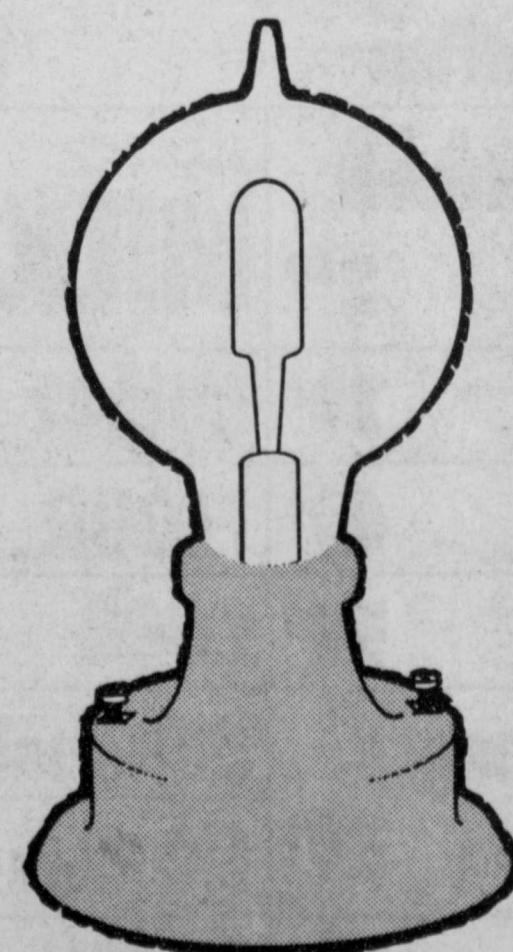
