Mrs. Carolyn Haley of New Home has been named to replace Mrs. Linda Huffaker who recently resigned as County Extension Agent (Home Economics) in Lynn County. Her appointment will become effective April 23 following one month of training in Terry County.

The announcement is being made jointly by Mrs. Catherine B. Crawford, District Extension Agent, and the Lynn County Commissioner's Court.

Mrs. Haley will conduct Extension educational programs in home economics for youth and adults, while working with County Extension Agent Bill Griffin.

Mrs. Haley, a native of San Antonio, graduated from high school as valedictorian of her class. She was also named outstanding senior girl and FFA sweetheart.

Mrs. Haley is a 1971 graduate of Texas Tech University and holds a B.S. degree in home economics.

While in college she was a member of Phi Upsilon Omicron, a national home economics honorary, Phi Kappa Phi, a national honorary fraternity, and was on the Dean's honor list for three years. She was recently employed as a teacher in the Baptist Bible School in Lubbock.

Mrs. Haley was an outstanding Bexar County 4-H Club member. She attended the 1964 National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago where she was awarded a \$400 scholarship in the Santa Fe Awards Program.

The couple and their two sons will reside in Lynn County.

Mrs. Popnoe's Brother Dies

Services for Chester Eads, 63, were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday in Snyder. Burial was in Camp Springs Cemetery.

Eads, a Scurry County resident most of his life, died

Sunday in a Rotan hospital. Survivors include his wife, Opal, a sister, Mrs. Clara Popnoe of O'Donnell; and a brother, Joe Eads of Snyder.

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APPEALS COURT

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals has ruled in favor of a Dawson County man, Antonio S. Vela, on an appealed revocation case while affirming the revocation of probation for Hilario Vela Quintanilla.

The two men filed their appeals after the 106th District Court had revoked probation sentences stemming from earlier cases. Both have been free on appeal bonds of \$2,000 each while their cases have been appealed to the Criminal Appeals Court.

On April 30, 1968, both men had entered pleas of guilty to charges of arson and waived jury trials. Both were convicted by District Judge Truett Smith and sentenced to five year terms, both also probated. Among the conditions of probation were that the men would commit no offense against the laws of this state or the United States.

On June 8, 1972, the State filed a motion to revoke the probations of both men, alleging that on May 28, 1972, the two men were involved in committing the offenses of burglary and felony theft of a pickup truck against A.S. Kirbie in Lynn County. Hearings were held on June 19, 1972, and at the conclusion, the court found that the two men did commit the offenses and their terms of probation were revoked, although the court did reduce the terms to four years imprisonment as over one third of the five year term was already past.

In handing down the judgments, the Appeals Court noted that the evidence against Quintanilla was sufficient for the revocation of probation. However, it was noted that in the case against Vela there was no evidence introduced during the revocation hearing that there was any agreement or conspiracy with Quintanilla on having a part in stealing the pickup or burglarizing the home. It was also noted that no one identified him as being on the Kirbie premises and that no stolen property was found in his possession nor was there evidence introduced that he has committed any acts to assist, aid or accompany Quintanilla in the theft or burglary.

In reversing Vela's revocation, it was cited that, "The mere presence of the accused at the scene of a crime does not of itself justify drawing an inference that he participated therein ..."

PAINFUL, BUT

The National Association of Counties has predicted the federal spending cutbacks "can be a fiscal, economic and political disaster." The only disaster is that local levels of government will have to figure out ways to raise taxes to pay for the social services that the people of the states and localities demand. Control of taxing and spending would then move

closer to the people, and that's where it ought to be anyway. None of us are used to this. The change, like anything else good for us, probably will be painful. Yet federal spending has to be controlled. If established trends in the cost and growth of the federal bureaucracy and federal social programs is continued, there will be ... a fiscal, economic and political disaster" of such proportions as to stagger the imaginations of most of us.

A BALLOON

Minimum wage legislation might be compared with a balloon. The more you inflate it, the higher it goes until it bursts.

Understandably, this remains a popular Congressional subject. Upping wages is a sure-fire vote getter in spite of the fact that it turns out to be a fiscal mirage!

When the base wage is increased by government mandate, the entire wage structure is disturbed. It sets up a demand for increases all along the line, irrespective of other considerations such as international competition, productivity growth and higher prices in the marketplace.

Increasing the wage base also reduces the opportunity for the less-skilled and others to enter the job market. They cannot compete with the more experienced talent which is available at higher and higher base wages.

Let's be realistic. The creation of a higher wage base has not assisted those it is designed to help -- and more often has in fact tended to limit the creation of job opportunities for them.

Congress is considering many bills to raise the minimum wage. The danger of inflating the balloon is real! And so is the danger of its explosion.

CHANGING SCENE

Farm product price rises may mean higher food prices for consumers. They also have another meaning. They are an indication of an assured, abundant food supply in the future.

A business columnist reports that, "The demand for tractors and other types of farm machinery surged when farm prices rose..." resulting in a shortage of some types of farm implements. A major farm implement manufacturer has warned his company's dealers to catch up with changing farm methods. He suggested they, "Look at helicopters. A customer with a breakdown on a \$20,000 tractor or combine isn't going to wait two weeks for you to fix his equipment." He also added that, "the time was not far off, because of the shortage of farm labor, that the farmer would have 80 percent of his investment in capital (including labor-saving machinery) and 20 per cent in labor."

If price rises are necessary to keep the American farmer supplied with the tools of his business and on course toward ever-greater productivity, consumers must accept them or face the dual evil of scarcity plus higher prices -- which is the lot of most nations today.

LEFTIES ARISE

All sorts of organizations and their manifold crusades to achieve perfect justice have made their appearance. Now comes the one that must surely lead the parade. It is called "LATER" -- Left-Handed Alliance Toward Equal Rights. LATER's demands include: "1. All high schools and colleges will be required to offer courses in Left-handed Studies with special emphasis on noted Left Handers such as Caesar Michaelangelo, Charlemagne ... Babe Ruth, etc. 2. All advertising must have at least 10 per cent of the models portraying Lefts. 3. The word Left will always be capitalized ... 4. Ads for scissors, telephones, trumpets and other blatantly right-handed devices will be banned. 5. All mechanical and electrical devices such as automobiles, vending machines, business machines, doors, musical instruments, tools and others designed to be operated solely by predominantly with the right hand will have to be re-designed to be, as a minimum, easily operated with either hand ..."

Nixon, with the number one plate of the first series of handmade glass plates designed to commemorate the Nation's Two Hundredth Birthday!

At the same time Mrs. Haughan said, "In an effort to instill a pride of country and a rekindling of the wondrous 'Spirit of '76' the GFWC has commissioned the hands of a Master American Craftsman to sculpture in glass a series of four exquisite collectors plates, which will in their entirety depict a complete and moving 'Portrait of Liberty'."

These beautiful handmade commemorative plates are being designed and produced for the GFWC by the prestigious Fenton Art Glass Company of Williamstown, West Virginia, and a new design will be released each year for four consecutive years (1973, 1974, 1975, 1976). They will be sold by Clubwomen throughout America and local Women's Clubs affiliated with the GFWC will be the "exclusive agents" to sell the plates. The first plate in each of these successive years will again be presented to the First Lady in order for her to complete the White House collection, Mrs. Haughan assured.

On July 4th, 1976, a final ceremony will take place at Independence Hall, presided over by the Presidents of the

GFWC for the years of 1973 through 1976. At this ceremony all the moulds for these plates will be publicly destroyed, thereby creating a limited edition. This means that not only will these plates become treasured heirlooms with great personal value, but also their market value is sure to increase.

Each plate in this four-part "Portrait of Liberty" features in relief in handmade glass an actual historic scene depicting one of the four major movements of the American Revolution.

"The Seeds are Sown" on plate number one. Patrick Henry is shown addressing the Virginia Convention. It was here in 1775 that he issued the ultimate challenge which is inscribed on the rim of this first plate - "Give me Liberty, or Give me Death."

"Independence is Declared" on plate number two. Thomas Jefferson with the aid of Benjamin Franklin and John Adams is shown drafting the Declaration of Independence. This document which was to become one of the profound statements of democratic principles ever written, set forth man's most basic rights which are inscribed on the rim of the second plate - "Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness."

"A Test of Courage" is portrayed on plate number three, which features a scene at Valley Forge during the Revolutionary War. General George Washington is pictured in a prayer in a manner which seems to Exemplify the real strength of his courageous troops. That strength is inscribed on the rim of the third plate - "In God We Trust."

"Liberty is Proclaimed," on plate number four. The

final piece of this "Portrait of Liberty" features three unidentified Americans ringing the Liberty Bell, one of the most cherished and revered symbols of American freedom. On the rim of this last plate appears the same famous proclamation which is inscribed on the Bell itself.

"Proclaim Liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants therein."

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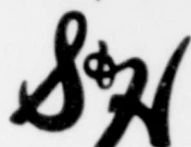

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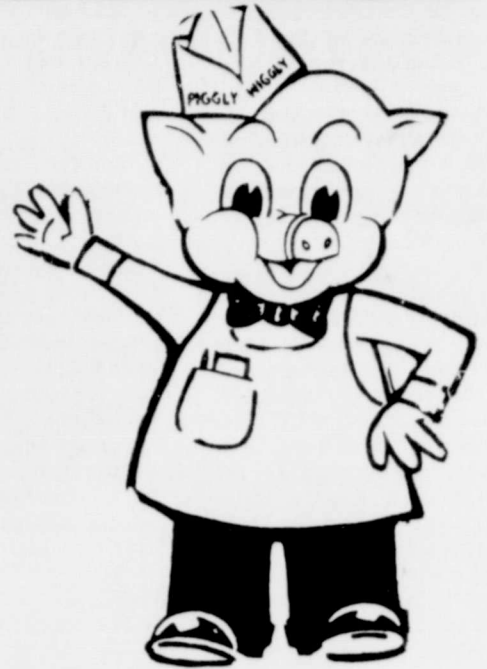

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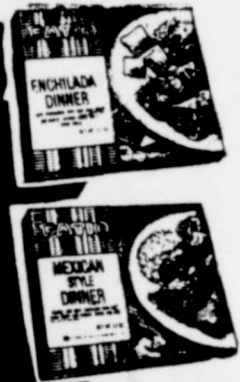

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Cotton Harvest Nears Completion

The South Plains cotton harvest neared completion as favorable weather enabled farmers to return to fields, according to W.K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the U.S.D.A. Estimates indicate that only about 5 percent of this season's crop remains in fields or in ricks. Most of the cotton remaining to be harvested is in the central and eastern counties of the South Plains.

Samples from 36,000 bales were tested and classed at the Lubbock office during the week ending Friday, March 16th. This brought the total classed for the season to 1,888,000 bales.

Grades of cotton were about the same as the previous week. Low Middling Light Spotted (52) was the predominant grade, making up 23 percent of all cotton classed. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) made up 20 percent, Strict Low Middling Spotted (43) 10 percent and Low Middling Spotted (53) 12 percent.

Average staple length also was about the same as the previous week. Staples were predominantly 30 to 32. Thirty-one percent had a staple length of 30, 32 percent stapled 31 and 19 percent was 32.

Micronaire readings were lower as the harvest neared

completion. Only 8 percent of all cotton classed at Lubbock had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 through 4.9, 7 percent "miked" 3.3 through 3.4, 25 percent was 3.0 through 3.2, 35 percent 2.7 through 2.9 and 25 percent was 2.6 and below.

The Agricultural Marketing Service of the U.S.D.A. reported active trading on the Lubbock market. Prices were \$2.50 to \$5.00 per bale higher. Prices ranged from \$2.50 per bale over the loan for low grade, Low micronaire cotton up to \$60.00 per bale over the loan for high grade, premium micronaire cotton.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 premium micronaire range were: Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) staple 30 - 27.30 cents per pound, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) staple 31 - 27.70, Strict Low Middling Spotted (43) staple 30 - 22.00, Strict Low Middling Spotted (43) staple 31 - 22.30, Strict Low Middling Tinged (44) staple 30 - 18.35 and Strict Low Middling Tinged (44) staple 31 - 18.45.

Cottonseed prices were steady and farmers received \$45 to \$56 per ton for their cottonseed at gins.



Byssinosis, the lung ailment being blamed on "cotton dust" in cotton processing plants, is now one of the more serious threats facing cotton consumption, according to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

Johnson made this statement in an address to the Western Cotton Production Conference held recently in Lubbock. He cited a recent meeting of textile mill owners and managers at which there was general agreement that in the immediate future byssinosis will have a greater impact on consumption of cotton by the American textile industry than any other single factor.

He pointed out that, although based on what the cotton industry considers incomplete and inconclusive evidence, "The Occupational Safety and Health Act has laid down a 'Threshold Limit Value' of one milligram per cubic meter as the maximum cotton dust that can be in the air to which workers are exposed, whether in a textile mill, a gin,

matress factory or a cotton waste processing plant."

Johnson went on to say that "cotton dust" is a nebulous term and that cotton dust per se may or may not have anything to do with byssinosis. It is much more likely, he said, that the disease is caused by some specific substance in cotton dust - a substance which probably can be removed or de-activated once it has been positively identified and once it is known just what part of cotton trash or cotton dust is the carrier.

Adequate methods for detecting and measuring byssinosis or for distinguishing it from chronic bronchitis, emphysema and other pulmonary disorders have not been developed, nor has the specific chemical compound or compounds that cause byssinosis been positively identified.

"Nevertheless, as of now the Federal Standards apply to all cotton dust," Johnson cautioned, "and complying with the 1 milligram per cubic meter standard for the textile in-

dustry and for other plants is at best an economic impracticality and for many will prove to be impossible."

Unfavorable publicity and increasing harassment from public, state and federal agencies already has caused some plants to shift from cotton to other fibers. Others reportedly are considering a change unless the problem is alleviated in the near future, he stated.

"Therefore it is imperative that we -- those of us in the cotton industry itself -- seek and find another solution," Johnson continued. "We especially need more short-term research aimed at solutions that can be applied quickly. And we need research to positively identify the causative agent or agents involved with byssinosis."

A significant amount of solution-seeking activity already is underway. The National Cotton Council is addressing the legislative and regulatory aspects of the problem through a Byssinosis Committee, of which Johnson is a member. Cotton Incorporated, the producer-funded dollar-a-bale program, is allocating \$888,000 per year to various byssinosis research projects, one of which involves steaming cotton in the ginning process and is being done at the Enochs Cooperative Gin in Bailey County. And the Textile Research Center at Texas Tech is conducting studies under the direction of Dr. P.W. Wakelyn who is fast becoming one of the recognized authorities on the subject.

Johnson concluded his discourse by saying "Through such collective actions we can weather the byssinosis storm just as we have weathered many storms in the past, and I can assure you that within the bounds of reason and of financial capability, no avenue to a solution will be overlooked."

Swine Short Course April 2-3

Approximately 250 Texas swine producers and others interested in dynamic, rapidly

changing swine industry are expected to attend the Twenty-Second Annual Swine Short Course at the Ramada Inn, College Station, Texas, on April 2-3. National and state authorities will discuss subjects pertaining to all phases of swine production, according to Mr. Bill Griffin, County Extension Agent, Lynn County.

Individuals from Lynn County who are interested in pork production should make plans now to attend this meeting and hear subjects discussed pertaining to modern production methods, nutrition, and the effect of the environment and its control on production. Those attending the meeting will have an opportunity to meet with

the speakers between the sessions to discuss specific production problems.

Proceedings of the short course will be available to those who attend at the close of the program on Tuesday.

Junior division winners will go on to compete in the State 4-H Roundup at College Station in June. Winners of that contest are then eligible for scholarships and trips to either the National 4-H Congress at Chicago the following winter, or the National 4-H Conference in Washington, D.C. the next spring.

For the district contest, which is to be on the Texas Tech campus, menus and recipes will be scored for both junior and senior divisions, with nutrition analysis added to the senior contest.

"Food for all Seasons" is the theme of the show which will feature exhibits of foods in the ballroom of the University Center beginning at 9:30 a.m. Judging will take place at 10:30, and awards will be presented that afternoon at 1:30.

Girls competing in the district contest are winners of county competition.

"Our 4-Hers try to build leadership capabilities by entering many such events," says Jana. "Many of the seniors are former junior leaders who have built on their experiences. They have learned the disciplines of failure in losing and the thrill of accomplishment in winning. Competition brings out some of the characteristics which make a leader, and we hope this district show will offer that kind of development."

ther bureau except to report a tornado.

Once a tornado warning is sounded, seek shelter as soon as possible. A cellar, basement, cave or underground excavation provides the best protection from a tornado. The most dangerous places during a tornado are near windows, in or near parked cars, and in auditoriums, gymnasiums, house trailers and tall office buildings.

If driving in a car, move at right angles to the path of the storm. If there is time to escape and no underground shelter is available, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch.

If you're in a home or other building without a cellar or basement, seek cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Open doors and windows on the sides of the building away from the tornado to help equalize air pressure and reduce damage to the building.

Schools, factories and large office buildings should have an emergency plan for all personnel. Such a plan is vital to reduce excitement and panic as well as to provide a safe refuge for people during severe weather conditions.

Remember that tornadoes occur with little warning, especially those after dark. So keep informed on weather conditions and have a plan of action ready. Your life may depend on it!
