CISCO GAS RATE ORDERED UNCHANGED

President Invokes Special Powers to Quell Coast Strike

BOARD OF THREE IS DUE TO BE NAMED

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 27 — President Roosevelt today invoked special labor arbitration powers in an effort to end the Pacific coast longshoremen strike.

The action forecast new national conciliation machinery to pacify industrial unrest rising for years in all parts of the country.

The new arbitration setup to be announced today or tomorrow is expected to apply to the deadlocked steel companies and their workers and similar stubborn labor relations. The plan will carry into practice the special labor dispute legislation passed in the closing days of congress.

The longshoremen's strike, the president, acting under authority of legislation, named a three-man board to arbitrate as reports of a seriously tense situation came in.

An executive order was seen as a sign for future industrial peace.

The outline is broadly similar to that in the automobile strike spring.

The reorganization of the president is expected to name a key arbitration board of three members from the present personnel of the labor board. This board will be empowered to settle all disagreements.

FORMER PASTOR DENIES HE HAD WED PLAINIFF

SAN ANTONIO, June 27 — The Rev. Wm. D. Welburn today denied from the witness stand that he was the husband of Mrs. Wineta Long Welburn, who seeks a divorce from him, or that he was the father of her son born last November.

The former pastor of the Government Hill Methodist church also denied the plaintiff's statement that he filed notice of intent to marry her at Boerne, Texas, last July 21.

The alleged marriage was at Boerne four days later according to Mrs. Welburn.

The minister testified the attractive brunet "chased him" and on several occasions before members of his congregation demanded that he marry her.

The witness said that on the Saturday he was supposed to have filed the notice at Boerne he spent the morning calling on members of his congregation and the afternoon preparing the next day's sermon.

No action was taken on another relief director at the morning session. There was considerable surprise when the commission began hearing delegations instead of taking up the directorship.

It had been expected a movement would be made to re-instate former Director Adam Johnson who was removed recently in favor of Miss Marie Dresden.

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 27 — Department of justice agents today captured Albert W. Reilly, John Dillinger gangster, at an apartment here.

Reilly, who allegedly took Dillinger to a St. Paul doctor for treatment of wounds, surrendered without a struggle. He was in bed when federal agents rapped on the door. He made no effort to escape.

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The veniremen, numbering 75, were being questioned by state's attorneys about their views on the infliction of the death penalty.

COMM'N TAKES NO ACTION ON RELIEF CHANGE

AUSTIN, June 27 — Texas relief commissioners today rescinded a recent order that no person on county or private charitable support in 1930 should be put on the state relief rolls.

An old statute makes it the duty of the county to care of such persons.

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EQUALIZATION BOARD NAMED BY COMM'N

The city commission last night named C. M. Nichols, D. A. Williams and F. M. Hooks as a board of equalization to adjust municipal renditions this year.

The commission also discussed with P. W. Campbell and T. J. McCarter, of the West Texas Utilities company, proposals for installing reserve pumping equipment at the Lake Cisco plant. The commission is understood to be considering a project for replacing present power units with Diesel engine equipment.

Inadequacy of the present single pump at the lake to supply the heavy summer demand for water caused the city to take steps to augment the available capacity, through purchase of a 500-gallon pump from the Humble Oil and Refining company a short while ago.

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CONTRACT FOR ROAD SIGNS IS LET BY C OF C

The chamber of commerce board of directors last night awarded a contract to the Goen Sign company, Breckenridge, for three six by sixteen-foot pictorial signs and 50 small signs to be placed along highways leading into Cisco to advertise Lake Cisco. Cost of the signs to the chamber will be \$16 per month for 12 months, a total of \$192.

One of the large signs is to be erected at Metcalf Gap, east of Cisco; another on Highway No. 1 three miles west of Abilene and a third at the junction of Highway No. 1 and 23 in Cisco, Third street and D avenue, in such a position that motorists coming from either direction may see it plainly and be directed to the lake.

The latter sign is to be erected immediately.

50 Small Signs

The 50 small signs are to be placed at approximate intervals of 10 miles on all cardinal highways for distances of 150 miles in both directions on Highway No. 1 and of 50 miles on each of the other highways.

The board of directors heard an explanation of the organization and purposes of the proposed federal savings and loan association for Cisco by C. Gordon Jones, representing the government in the organization, and approved the project. The association would apply investments of local citizens together with government furnished capital to loans on Cisco homes. It would be governed by a board of local business men.

The directors occupied considerable time in discussion of plans for the Fourth of July picnic and political carnival at Lake Cisco. The general program committee is to meet this afternoon at the chamber's offices to arrange the program for the event.

Work, Noted Bridge Expert, Dies Today

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 27 — Milton C. Work, celebrated master of whist and auction and contract bridge, died in a hospital here today. He had been ill a week of heart disease. He was 69.

Work was America's oldest bridge expert both in age and length of tenure in the public eye. He began his experting back in 1881 with whist then the game of society and the upper crust generally. He survived as an expert when whist was modified into auction bridge and when auction merged into contract.

UNION LEADER IS ABDUCTED AT HARRIMAN

HARRIMAN, Tenn., June 27 — Fred Held, vice president of the American Federation of Hosiery Workers, was abducted today by six carloads of men who headed into an adjoining county with him.

The incident focused attention on a protracted Blue Eagle war at Harriman Hosiery mills which closed down Monday, affecting nearly 700 men.

There had been heated disputes between workers, the management and the NRA.

Full Guard of State Will Be Mobilized

HARRISBURG, Pa., June 27 — The war problem in which the 12,000 national guardsmen of Pennsylvania will participate during the annual encampment July 14 to 28 will, it is believed by military authorities, be the first ever attempted by the full national guard personnel of a state.

Moreover, the fortnight training period will mark the first simultaneous mobilization of all the units of this state since the World War. The Pennsylvania guardsmen, comprising the entire 28th Division, will pass in review during the camp period for the first time since 1928.

The war problem will consist in attacking and destroying a mythical army approaching Indian Gap, where 6,000 of the guardsmen will be stationed during the training period. The remaining 6,000 will be at Mt. Gretna, 20 miles away; at Colebrook, near Mt. Gretna, and at Middletown airport, near Harrisburg.

Approximately \$750,000 has been spent since last year for 37 permanent buildings and other improvements at Indian Gap to equip the site for military reservation.

The four artillery regiments will train for the first time this summer as motorized units.

Serum Renders Bite Of Rattler Harmless

SMILEY, June 27. — The once deadly rattlesnake is getting pretty innocuous. Development of serum with which to treat snake bites has made the latter hardly more annoying than a bee sting. Alva Lloyd Bell, 12, was struck in the chest by a big rattler. A doctor treated him and the next day Alva Lloyd was about his boy's business as though nothing had happened.

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COMM'N RULES AGAINST CUT TO 50 CENTS

AUSTIN, June 27 — Cisco residents will continue to pay a gas rate of 75 cents a thousand cubic feet with 10 per cent discount for payment of bills in 10 days, under an order issued today by the States Railroad commission.

The rate has been in dispute since October 26, 1931. At that time the city by ordinance ordered a reduction to 50 cents. Community Natural Gas company appealed to the state railroad commission and on May 1, 1932, submitted to the city a proposed sliding scale rate.

In issuing the order today the commission said: "In the present unsettled and distressed condition of our country and of this particular municipality, the commission finds no reason why a rate which prior to and since acquisition of the property by the Community Natural Gas company has prevailed and which has not heretofore been complained of by the company, should not, for the distressed period at least, be continued."

The case was argued before Commissioner E. O. Thompson at Austin last week and taken under advisement.

RULING AFFECTS TWO CASES

The Texas Railroad commission order at Austin today keeping unchanged at 67 1/2 cents net the domestic gas rate charged by the Community Natural Gas company in Cisco, is, in effect, a ruling against both the gas company and the city, it was explained here.

The order was issued by the commission to dispose of two cases, which were consolidated upon the request of the city attorneys and the agreement of the gas company. The city had passed an ordinance reducing the maximum domestic rate from the 67 1/2 cents net to 50 cents net, and the gas company appealed to the commission for an order prohibiting enforcement of that maximum.

In an application filed later, the Community sought authority to establish a "step" rate schedule beginning at \$1.50 for the first 1,000 and progressing to 30 cents per 1,000 after the 5,000 feet had been consumed. The city attacked this proposed schedule and when hearings were held here last year, the two cases were consolidated and testimony taken upon both at the same time.

The order, City Atty. Grantham explained, does not affect the ordinance recently passed, fixing a minimum rate of 60 cents per 1,000 cubic feet for domestic gas.

Gov't Wheat Loans Are Now Available

Crop production loans on wheat acreage are now available, it was announced today at the chamber of commerce. Loans of \$1 per acre to buy seed and \$1 per acre to buy feed or fuel are available, said J. E. Spencer.

BARGAIN TIME TO BUY OR BUILD HOME

A tremendous housing program enacted by the congress before adjournment and signed by the president of the United States is on the way. Bernard L. Johnson of Chicago is the editor of the American Builder magazine. He addressed the national realtors convention in session in the city of Minneapolis. He declared a saving of 41 per cent in the cost of a home "is the tempting bait offered the present day home buyers." There are reasons why. Home buyers and builders are getting a better break. Improved lots are away down. Their original developers and owners in many cases have been wiped out. Present buyers, Editor Johnson stressed, can take advantage of their loss by acquiring good home building sites today at a fraction of their former expense, "which bulk as large as 20 to 25 per cent in the heyday of speculative home cost. Moreover, he said, promotion and sales building, is today practically eliminated."

Speaking of the president's plan for encouraging home building, the editor of the American Builder asserted new financing procedures are being set up that will cut home costs tremendously. He reminded his audience the president is out for five per cent money for home buyers on mortgages "to run not three years or five years, but 18 and 20 years." Moreover, he said second mortgages with their high interest and premium charges would no longer be needed; that all financing will be on one long term mortgage with no renewal charges; that the net rate to the home owner will be 5 per cent and lastly, the simple change of interest from 6 per cent to 5 per cent means a saving of 18 1-2 per cent on the monthly payments to pay off completely in 18 years. He advised all builders of homes to make sure that the house structurally is well built and this applies to the smallest house as well as to the largest.

Editor Johnson is an optimist. It is his viewpoint that "the wise man who buys or builds at the bottom of the market gets the benefit from the steadily increasing values as the market prices advance; that many authorities agree that home properties have already touched bottom and are starting to advance, and that this gives the present home builder a prospective increase in the value of his property and emphasizes again that now is the bargain time to build." Civilization has ever been built on the home and around the home. The past may have been most depressing, but all that happened is dead as the dodo. It is the future that is appealing and the planners and the diggers will be the builders of the future as planners and diggers were the builders throughout the dead ages.

POLITICAL EVENTS MAY CAST SHADOWS

Minnesota for almost 50 years was a citadel of standard republicanism. Results of the state primary election held the other day are interesting. In Minnesota the non-partisans are known as the farm-labor party. Their organization ran first in the primaries—this by a large plurality. Democrats organized their party and placed a slate in the field. They ran second and the republican party slate offerings were the third on the list. Non-partisans renominated Gov. Olsen. He swept aside all opposition on his own reservation. They renominated United States Sen. Henrik Shipstead. He had a rival contender but won the renomination by a handsome majority. Shipstead was given his third term nomination. In all the line-ups in the senate the Minnesota farm-labor statesman voted for the Roosevelt recovery and relief measures. Now there will be three tickets in the field—farm-labor, democratic and republican.

NRA PUTTING A LIMIT ON MATCHES

A Washington correspondent of the A. P. is responsible for this: "NRA is putting a limit on the number of matches handed out with your cigars." The retailer may give not more than one pad of matches for each unit sold or five pads per box of 25 cigars or 10 pads per box of 50 cigars sold." This NRA merchandising plan provides for the retail sale of cigars at prices not less than those declared by the manufacturer for each of his products. It further prescribes maximum discounts.

FINANCIAL AID FOR SMALL INDUSTRIES

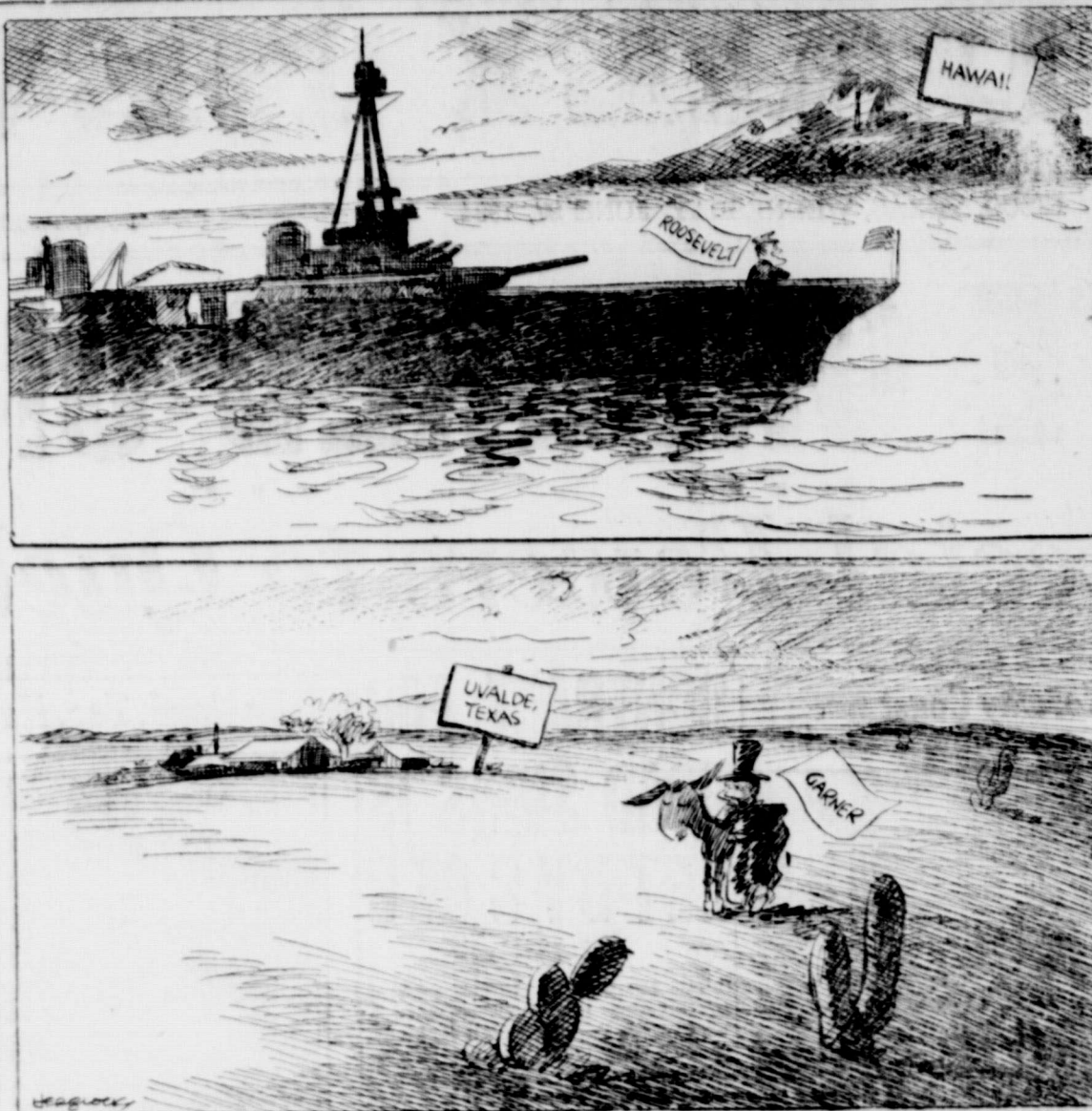
President Roosevelt very promptly signed the industrial loan bill. Now it is said loans on adequate securities totaling at least a half billion dollars can be made in the next six months "to stimulate business enterprises." At least, this is the viewpoint of the officials of the R. F. C. and the Federal Reserve board. They stress, "because of a limitation restricting loans to \$500,000 each," loans are expected to be confined largely to the smaller industries.

It is made unlawful for anyone to give or receive a fee or bonus for obtaining a loan. In other words, the political pull of "the middleman" has been doomed by the national lawmakers with the approval of the president.

FAT REWARD FOR PUBLIC ENEMY DILLINGER

Atty. Gen. Homer S. Cummings and his staff are compiling a list of "the public enemies of the United States." Of course, the list will carry the names of notorious desperadoes—including kidnapers, murderers, bank robbers and assassins. It is said that John Dillinger heads the list and will receive the No. 1 designation. This is not all the attention he will receive. Posting of a \$25,000 reward for the capture of Dillinger will be the beginning of the fireworks. It is a mistake to say that there is "honor among thieves." A reward of \$25,000 is about the fattest offering ever made for the capture of a ruffian, high or low, in the history of the department of justice. Money is a very loud talker.

If there is any one man in public life that Herbert Hoover detests, it is Hiram Johnson. It will be a bitter pill for the former president and his close friends should the McAdoo slate for senator and governor go over in the primary election and in November win the ballots of a majority of the voters of the Golden Coast state.

A remarkable man this democratic senator from the Pacific coast country. Born in Georgia, he made history in Tennessee, moved to New York, became a builder of tubes and tunnels, married the daughter of Woodrow Wilson, became secretary of the treasury and after the coming of Warren G. Harding moved to

UNDER THE DOME AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, June 27 — Big hats, boots and spurs, cartridge-filled belts and prominently displayed pistols are no longer in style with Texas rangers.

Such paraphernalia may be all right for some jobs, but a ranger so attired now is the butt of his companions' jokes. "Show 'off' rangers," Capt. Dennis E. Hamer, commander of headquarters company, calls the booted and spurred ones. Hamer wears low shoes, business suits, "boiled shirt" and a small headpiece.

Boots still are worn by many rangers, but with trousers outside. Handle-bar moustaches have disappeared, too. And regulations require that guns be worn under the coat.

Highway officials are wondering what the state method of levying a gasoline tax is going to do to Texas' share in federal road appropriations. Federal requirements prohibit diversion of any state road tax to other purposes. The gasoline tax is levied

as an occupation tax, and as such part of its goes to support of schools. The constitution gives schools a share in all occupation taxes. By changing the gasoline tax to an excise tax, the constitutional provision can be dodged.

Stephen F. Austin and Sam Houston had a bath this week. Not the men themselves, but the marble statues of them by Elizabeth Ney which stand in the south entrance of the state capitol. After the capitol walls received their annual coat of fresh white paint, the statues looked smutty by contrast. They were scrubbed with brushes.

A boy's fishing had a big part in the drive made by agents of the state comptroller against bogus cigarette stamps.

Magnitude of counterfeiting operations was not realized by officers until Cohen Richardson, fishing in the Leon river four miles south of Gatesville May 28, hooked what he thought was a monster fish.

The "fish" proved to be a gunny sack filled with counterfeit stamps. There were 1,350,000 stamps in two packages. The stamps represented \$40,500 in cigarette taxes.

Richardson turned his find over to Tax Collector Dave Culberson of Coryell county. Culberson notified the state comptroller. How the stamps got in the stream is still a mystery. Officers believe they were dumped from a bridge when men delivering them thought they were about to be caught.

First campaign expense accounts will be required this week from state-wide candidates.

When they total up and find out how much they have spent already, tightening of the candidates' purse strings may be expected. A limit of \$8,000 is set on expenditures for the first primary and \$10,000 for both primaries if the candidate gets into the run-off election.

Practically 10 times that amount

is spent in the campaigns. The law is so poorly drawn that its enforcement never has been attempted. Individuals may spend what they like in behalf of candidates.

Machinery for levying the new state taxes will be thrown in gear early next month. By July 15, county tax assessors are to file with the state comptroller their estimates of the county tax valuations. The state automatic tax board is to meet July 20 to compute the tax rate. Usually the meeting recesses from July 25 until later, but this year there is the prospect of any tax rate less than the constitutional maximum of 77 cents being levied, so there may be no wait.

The state intangible tax board expects to complete its shearings in July and report a valuation for common carrier pipe lines, which for the first time will be placed under an intangible assets tax.

The state board of education will meet early in August to set a school year appointment. A continuation of the present \$16 per scholastic is likely. Chairman J. W. E. Beck of the senate investigating committee says if scholastic censures and abuses were checked the appointment could be \$20 per pupil.

WILLED NURSE FORTUNE
LIMA, O., June 27 — Elizabeth Kerwin, former Lima nurse, who left here during the World war and was overseas service, has been bequeathed \$150,000 cash by the late Maj. Gen. Fred C. 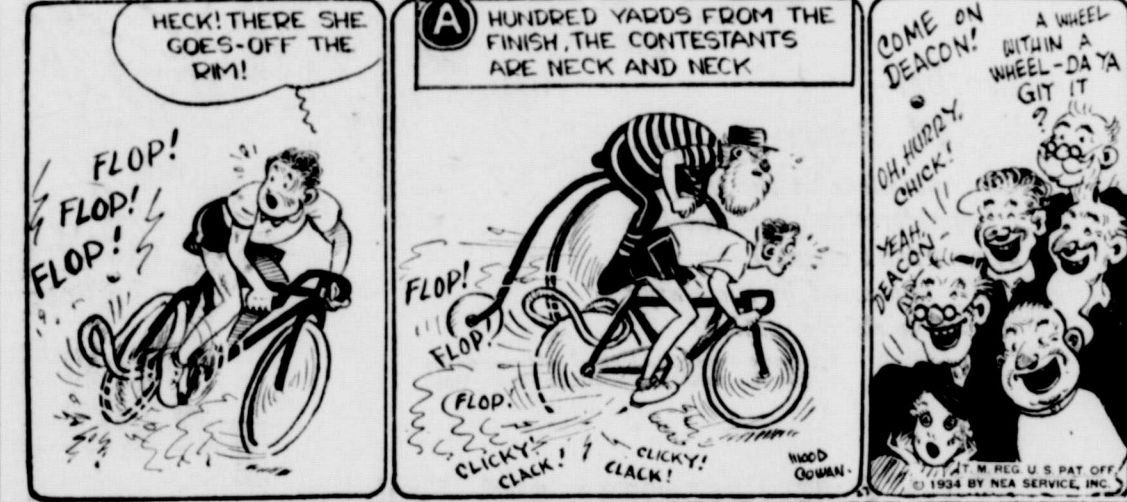
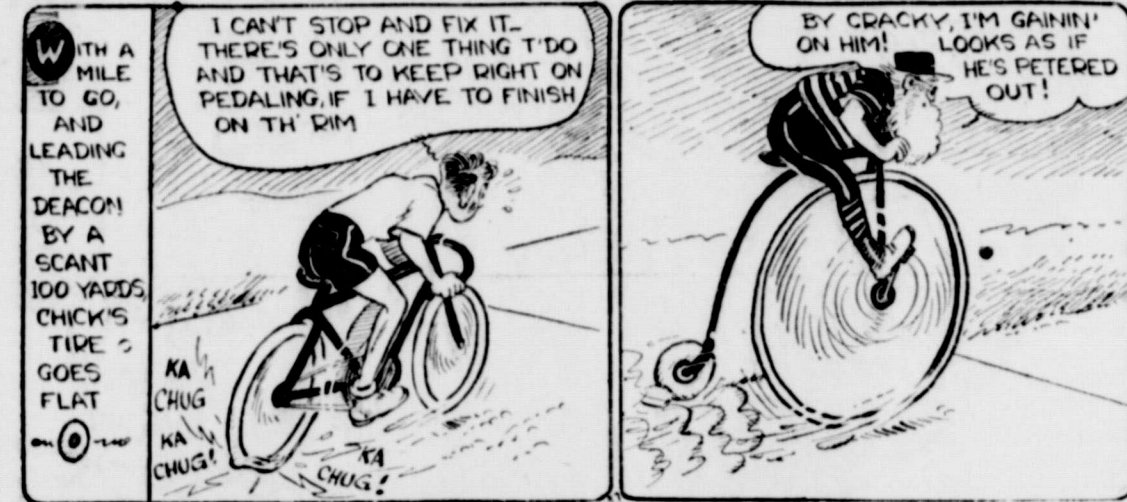

AN ORDINANCE
ORDINANCE fixing and adopting minimum rates which may or shall be charged and collected for gas sold and delivered within the limits of the City of Cisco, Texas, and making it unlawful for any person, public utility, association of persons, partnership, private corporation or municipal corporation to fix, charge or collect for gas sold and delivered at a rate below the minimum prescribed in schedule of such rates; fixing the minimum amounts for monthly bills to be charged and collected consumers irrespective of the amount of gas used; permitting consumers other than users of gas for domestic purposes, to select the schedule of rates to be charged for gas consumed during a twelve months period of time and permitting such consumers to change schedule of rates at the end of such twelve months period; fixing a fine and penalty as against any person, agent, or employee who violates the provisions of this ordinance; providing that any person, public utility, association of persons, partnership or corporation, which violates any provision of this ordinance shall render the franchise under which it operates subject to forfeiture; providing that this ordinance shall repeal any and all previous ordinances or parts thereof in conflict therewith; and providing that if any section, article or provision is held to be void or unconstitutional by any court, that such decision shall not affect the validity of any remaining part, unless the part held void and unconstitutional is indispensable to the operation of the remaining parts, and further providing that the Board of Commissioners of the City of Cisco declare that they would have passed only the valid portions of this ordinance and would have omitted the invalid parts thereof if they had only been advised concerning the same prior to the passage thereof.

The Board of Commissioners of the City of Cisco, Texas, hereby declares that it would have passed those parts of this ordinance which are valid and omitted any parts which may be unconstitutional or void if it had known or been advised that such parts were unconstitutional or void at the time of the passage of this ordinance.

SISTER MARY'S RECIPES

SALAD meals are the order of summer days because they may be at the same time hearty and light.

The combination of meat and vegetables in hearty salads is fine for summer because it helps to effect a balanced diet. Fruits also may be combined with meats or fish with good results. The vegetable or fruit acts as a filler for the salad and supplies mineral content and ballast in the diet.

The following salad can be varied in several ways, as for instance, Nest cubes of veal and matchlike pieces of carrots substituted for the beans and tongue.

Summer Salad

One and one-half cups cold cooked beans, 1 cup cold cooked ham, 1 cup cold cooked tongue. Drain and separate into rings. Cut ham and tongue in pieces the same size as the beans. Mix and add 2 tablespoons vinegar or lemon juice and 4 tablespoons salad oil beaten with 1-2 teaspoon salt and 1-8 teaspoon pepper. Cover and let stand over for an hour or longer. When ready to serve drain from dressing. Wash pepper and cut in rings, removing seeds and white pith. Peel onion and cut in slices. Let stand in iced salt water for ten minutes. Drain and separate into rings. Alternate slices of onion and green pepper one above another on a leaf of lettuce. Fill this little pepper and onion cup with the salad mixture and mask with mayonnaise.

Liver and Cabbage Salad

Liver and cabbage salad is unusual and delicious. You will need one cup diced cooked liver, 2 tablespoons minced cooked bacon, 1 cup diced celery, 2 cups shredded crisp cabbage, French dressing, mayonnaise, curly endive.

LUNCHEON: Summer salad, toasted muffins, strawberry tapioca pudding, milk, tea.
DINNER: Breaded veal cutlets, creamed carrots, stuffed tomato salad, cherry and rice pudding, milk, coffee.

Marinate liver and bacon in French dressing for one hour. A few drops of onion juice may be added to the dressing if wanted. Add celery and cabbage and mix lightly. Serve on a bed of curly endive and top with mayonnaise.

Sweetbread Salad

Sweetbread salad can take the place of chicken salad for party affairs and is easier and quicker to prepare unless you use canned chicken. The sweetbreads are soaked in cold salted water for one hour, simmered in salted acidulated water for twenty minutes and then blanched in cold water. Remove all membrane and connecting tissue and cut in neat dice.

Two cups prepared sweetbreads, 2 cups shredded celery, 1-2 cup blanched and coarsely shredded almonds, 1 cup peeled and seeded white grapes, French dressing, mayonnaise, lettuce hearts.

Marinate sweetbreads in French dressing made with a combination of lemon juice and tarragon vinegar. Let stand on ice one hour or longer. When ready to serve drain from dressing and combine with prepared materials. Add mayonnaise to make moist and serve in nests of lettuce hearts. Garnish with thin slices of pimento-stuffed olives.

HOOKS AND SLIDES

It is fitting that Charles Leonard Gehringer, a native son, should lead the Detroit Tigers out of the morass of the second division.

There are not enough home town boys with home town clubs. There perhaps are fewer than a score who come under this classification, even though you include adjacent territory.

I can name only 10 of them—Columbia Lou Gehrig and Fordham Johnny Murphy of the Yankees; Joe Voshick of the Indians; Jimmy Wilson, catcher-manager, and Chick Fullis, of the Phillies, who is a resident of Girardville, Pa.; Tony Cuccinelli, of the Dodgers; Larry Dinton, of the Reds; Bill Walker, of the Cardinals; Shanty Hogan, of the Braves, and Hal Schumacher, of the Giants, who registers from Delafield, in upstate New York, which is close enough.

I took much of the story book stuff we like to find in sports was taken out of both clubs when the Glants swapped flashy Frankie Frisch to the Cards for Rogers Hornsby during the winter of 1926. Frisch, Fordham University's most famous athletic product, was—and still is—a New Yorker through and through. He performed the remarkable feat of jumping from the campus to a pennant-seeking outfit, and supplanting such a renowned second baseman as Larry Doyle.

St. Louis Loved the Rajah, Faults and All

HORNBSBY was—and still is—as close to a 100 per cent St. Louisan as a chap born on the plains of west Texas possibly could be. Until the Rajah was traded as a reward for guiding the Red Birds' to their first flag and world title in the 39 years that they had been in the National League, everything that meant anything to him started and finished in the Mound City, which was—and still is—his home. He had become an immortal there, six of his seven batting championships having been won in Cardinal livery.

There was real romance in Hornsby's return to his old stomping ground at the start of the 1933 whirligig. With all his faults—his arrogance, domineering attitude, lack of tact and gambling habits, to list a few—St. Louis loved him still.

They can say all they please about Sam Brendon, president of the Cardinals, but his taking Hornsby back, after the Rajah had been given the run-around in New York, Boston, and Chicago, was a mighty fine gesture. Brendon found a place for Hornsby despite his Achilles' tendon and the fact that he was nearing the end of the pike.

Batting Leader Gehringer No Spring Daisy

AND when the opposition, the Browns, needed a manager in August, Branch Rickey, the brains of the Cardinals, to whom he reported as a recruit, recommended the Rajah and Philip de Catesby Ball welcomed Hornsby with open arms. St. Louis looked after its own. It is too bad that Ball, who hung on through so many lean years, could not have lived to see his faith in Hornsby rewarded this season.

Getting back to Gehringer and his threat to bring the American League cloning crown to Detroit for the first time since 1927, when happy Harry Heilmann showed the way with .339, the hustling second baseman in no sense can be regarded as a spring daisy. Gehringer scarcely can be expected to maintain his current .400 clip, but his major league average since Ty Cobb assigned him to Frank O'Rourke's position early in 1926 is .316.

WASHINGTON—Little bugs are flying through the office window and getting on my neck. "Can't you get them off?" "Well, not insignificant, anyway."

When the little bugs get on the necks of the New Dealers, it certainly doesn't help the country. Not that the little bugs bite. But no man can concentrate and do his best work when he has to keep brushing them off his neck.

It is also sharply to the point that the little bugs are harbingers of summer, and summer, in Washington, means many waves of blazing heat.

The president is always happy when he hears about the little bugs, because heat is his strongest ally when he wants to get rid of Congress. The president himself sits in the air-cooled White House and doesn't have to go out.

Congress has air-cooling, too, but it has to go outdoors sooner or later.

So the hotter it gets, the faster Congress works to clean up and get away.

Drys Start Drive On Race Gambling

HOUSTON, June 27 — Operators of horse and dog racing tracks, liquor and gambling dens are wondering what effect activities of the newly organized Texas Drys will have on their business.

The new body uniting under one banner the state Anti-Saloon league, the W. C. T. U. and the United Forces for Prohibition, announced a determined drive against such forms of business.

At a recent state-wide meeting here, attended by hundreds of Texas ministers and lay leaders, phases of political and public life regarded as inimical to society were condemned and a campaign against them initiated.

The delegates heard statements from several business leaders to the effect that race track gambling is not only harmful to public morals but also hurts business.

The Texas Drys was organized on the principle that the "whole moral life of the nation is declining in quality and that one need only to look about to be convinced."

The fight against the evils listed will be directed by a special committee appointed from the ranks and officers of the various organizations included. The latter will continue to function in their separate fields.

CORN CROP IS IN DESPERATE NEED OF RAIN

COLLEGE STATION, June 27 — The Texas corn crop is desperately in need of rain by the first of July according to crop specialists at Texas A. & M. college.

Unless adequate moisture is forthcoming by that time, they said, the crop will have passed the stage where rain will increase the yield of grain.

Texas farmers planted about 5,250,000 acres of corn during the spring for feed and forage for livestock, but this huge investment is declining each day that dry weather continues.

Suggestions for salvaging the drought-damaged crop and for replacing corn with later feed crops were offered. Where corn has made a good stalk growth but only a small amount of grain, the crop should be cut soon to utilize the full feed value of the whole plant.

Where there is enough corn acreage to justify, the greatest value can be obtained from the dried crop by putting it in a silo. If ensilage cutters are not available, the corn may be cut with a mow binder, sled cutter or by hand and put in a trench silo.

Need Twice as Much
Dried up crops put in silos need at least twice as much water applied as normal green crops. There is little danger of getting too much much water on a crop put in a trench silo, the specialists said.

If the corn acreage and the number of livestock do not warrant expense of making silage, the corn should be cut and shocked without delay to get the full feed value.

Grain sorghums, cowpeas and sudan grass were suggested as replacement crops if corn fails provided rain comes within "a reasonable time." For Central and South Texas heaviest, sorghum, spur feterita and Blackhawk were suggested as the best varieties. Sorghum and sudan were suggested for eastern and southeastern parts of the state.

If these substitute crops are planted between now and August 1, or even by Sept. 1, they may be expected to produce fair crops under favorable conditions.

Any crop except corn and grain sorghums may be planted for roughage or silage on acres contracted to the federal government on reduction contracts into wheat and corn-bog programs. If other land is not available the same may be done on farms where cotton land has been rented to the government.

TREATMENT IS AID TO NORMAL CHILD GROWTH

In a report to the American Journal of Diseases of Children, two California physicians, Drs. E. Keet Shelton and Lyman A. Cavanaugh of Santa Barbara, related how five dwarfed children, treated with a growth hormone developed by Dr. Herbert M. Evans of the University of California, are developing at a rate exceeding normal.

Reaction of the five youngsters to the treatment was hailed as further proof and verification of Dr. Evans'

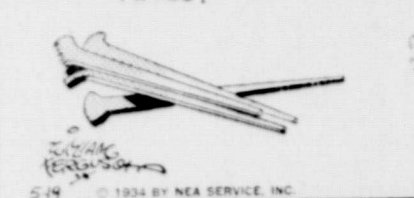

discovery, hailed as a sensation by the medical world when it was announced recently.

The agent, an extract of the pituitary gland, was administered three girls, ranging in age from 12 to 14 years, and two boys, 11 and 13 years old.

Four of the children were treated over a two-year period. They grew at rate exceeding their development during the previous four years and somewhat above normal children of the same age.

For 23 months, the injections were withheld from the fifth youngster. His growth continued below normal. Then the treatment was applied and the child grew an inch and a half in six weeks.

Sixth Case
A sixth case, in which other methods of promoting growth were employed, yielded less satisfactory results.

The Evans hormone, doctors said, not only spurred development of the children, but resulted also in changes in configuration and facial expression.

Whereas medical circles hailed the treatment as a great success in treatment of children, they do not believe it can be applied successfully to adults.

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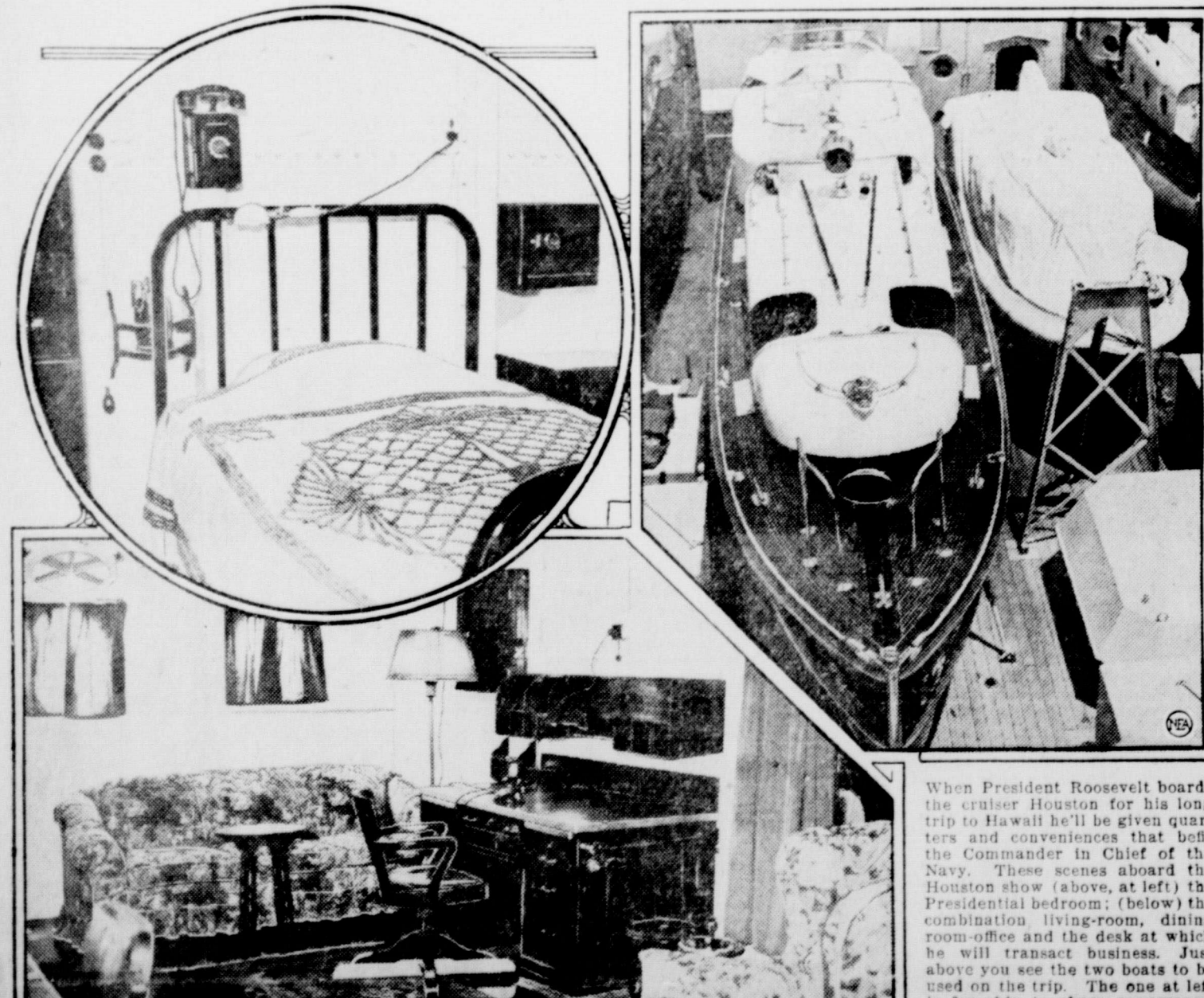
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Where President Will Sleep and Work on Cruise to Hawaii
