High School Band To Present Program

Hart High School history will mark the 1970-71 school year as a milestone year -- the year that brought the organization of a school band.

Begun as a project by the Lions Club, the band account includes receipts of \$2,056.40. Lions raised a total of \$1,850. Other proceeds included \$51.40 from Chi Psi Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi; \$55 from the Zealot Club and \$100 from Xi Mu Iota.

Expenditures for the band have totaled \$2,306.90. This was for the purchase of band instruments and band stands. Director is Rodger Edwards.

Twenty-six are enrolled in the high school band with 21 members in the junior high band.

The high school band instrumentation includes clarinets, David Bass, Cathie Warren and Shirley Flippo and cornets, Brent Lemons, Mike Booe, Dirk Rambo, Sonny Mancias, Anselmo Alcocer and Mike Loyd.

Leslie Davis and Isabel Guitierrez play alto saxophones, Landra Bruington plays tenor sax and Pete Niabes plays baritone saxophone.

Jean Foster, Brenda Cheves, Sandra Bruington and Charles Alford play flutes; Thomas Cunningham and Duane Clevenger, baritones; Jerry Mc Adams, French horn; Darrel Six, James Warren, Leslie Chambers, Dwight Peterson, drums and James Taylor and Leslie Preston, sousaphones.

Junior high band students and their instruments are clarinets, Karen Foster, Carol Armstrong, Cindy Hill, Carla Rambo, Jan Loyd, Dana Mc

Lain, Mary Lou Mancias and Sherri Daubert; cornets, John Rodgers, Blair Morrison and Theron Hawkins; saxophones, John Robledo and Pete Tenorio.

Flutes, Teri King, Vivian Davis, Beth Hacker and Vickie Martinez; sousaphones, Freddy Mancias and Leon Follis; drums, Marlan Hart and trombone, Lynn Myers.

Edwards explained the band had been playing together for about 15 weeks now and have demonstrated remarkable progress.

"They have surpassed all my expectations," he said.

Students who play clarinets, cornets, trombones, flutes, saxophones and drums furnish their own instruments. The school furnishes the more expensive instruments such as the sousaphones, baritones, French horns and bari-sax. Ten dollar rental fees are charged for the school owned instruments to help pay for upkeep and repairs.

The high school band will present a short program Wednesday, Dec. 16 at 2:15 p. m. in the high school. The public is invited.

Burrus was preceded in death by his only brother, Paul, and a sister, Edna.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Tom Neil Burrus of Dumas and three grandchildren.

SENSING THE NEWS

Here in the nation's largest city to address the emergency leadership conference sponsored by The Center of American Living Inc., I had the privilege of sharing the platform with the Rev. Morton A. Hill, S.J., a battler for decency who deserves the thanks of all respectable citizens.

Father Hill is one of the three members of the presidential Commission on Obscenity and Pornography who dissented from the majority findings. The views of Father Hill and his two colleagues, who filed a minority report, should be widely known. In order to help achieve this important goal, I am devoting this column to excerpts from Father Hill's speech. The following are among his most telling comments to the leadership conference organized by Lady Natalie Douglas-Hamilton, who heads The Center of American Living:

'There's a wild storm of smut buffeting our country today. It's drowning out good media; it's choking our culture; it's corrupting our morals.'

'The purveyors of filth are more brazen than ever. Smut peddlers, confident that highly paid legal counsel will see them through anything, are transporting their trash across state lines, are importing it, are

sending it through the mails. Commercial films are projecting the anti-hero image to our young people. He's an unloving non-achiever, non-creator; a violent, oversexed or perverted drug user. Underground newspapers--there are some 200 of them in the country--are serving up a potpourri of sex, drugs and rebellion.

'And then a presidential Commission on Obscenity and Pornography, after two years and \$2 million of your tax money comes up and says in effect: 'Leave it there. It's all revved up. Let it take off. Let's repeal all obscenity laws....' This is what's known as the Danish solution and it is what 12 Americans on the Commission voted for.

Although the President rejected the majority report and the Senate rejected and censured it, we have not seen the last of the publicity it will get. It is possible that the big brain-wash has not even begun.

'The Commission did not do its job. It was mandated by Congress to make recommendations that would effectively and constitutionally regulate the traffic in obscenity and pornography. Obviously, the Commission did not carry out this mandate.

The Commission began in slant and bias to prove a pre-

conceived theory, and it never changed or altered course.

'The New York State Investigation Commission presented evidence (in a study of its own) that organized crime is involved in the smut industry; it presented overwhelming evidence. It named reputed members of crime families who were involved. It named corporations owned and operated by reputed members of crime families. It concluded, in fact, that the smut industry is infested with racketeers. But the Presidential Commission could find 'no concrete evidence'.

The address made by Father Hill deserves to be publicized nationwide. Indeed public officials and community leaders need to familiarize themselves with the entire Hill-Link-Keating minority report which

makes clear the menace posed by the smut peddlers.

With the facts developed by Father Hill and other dissenters there is a foundation for an organized, continuous and reasoned community voice against the traffic in pornography--a traffic in which syndicate crime plays a key role.

Father Hill's organization, Morality In Media Inc., 1256 Lexington Ave., New York, N.Y. 10028, can provide concerned citizens with whatever information they need to combat smut peddlers in their communities.

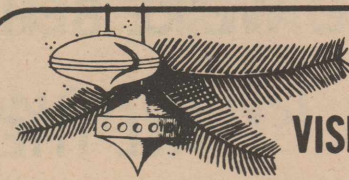
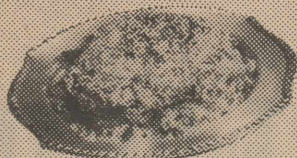
RICE WITH QUAIL OR DOVE CASSEROLE

Mrs. S. M. Smith, 1300 Runnels, Big Spring

- 5 cups cooked rice (as directed on package)
- 4 sticks celery diced
- 4 diced pimentos
- 2 cans mushroom soup (undiluted)
- 1 small onion—grated
- 1 cup grated cheese
- 1 green pepper cut very fine
- 4 or 5 cups cooked quail or dove (cut in cubes)

Place 6 or 7 birds in a baking pan. Cover with water, add 2 sticks of butter, salt, pepper, 1 bay leaf, a sprinkle of rosemary. Cover. Place in oven and bake at 350 degrees for about an hour and a half or until tender. Cool and cube. Place in buttered casserole—rice, quail, pepper, onion, and pimento. Pour two cans of undiluted mushroom soup over mixture. Top with grated cheese. Cook in uncovered dish for about 45 minutes at 300 degrees. Serves 12 people. (chicken or turkey may be used)

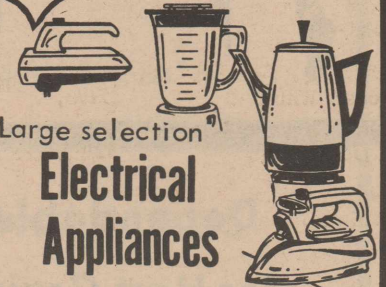

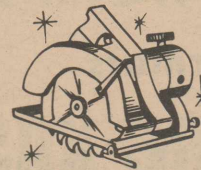

There is happiness in making ornaments and decorations, in decking walls with holly, mantels with fragrant pine, and green boughs with bright shining balls. The fun grows as the family together sets the friendly candle in the window, places the wreath on the door to shout to all the world a jolly Christmas greeting. All these are merely symbols, but they tell the yuletide spirit we feel. Truly, home is the most wonderful place in the world and can be most meaningful as we celebrate this joyous time of the year.

Now is the time to gather around the stove and begin that holiday baking and freezing. The entire family can assist with making fudge, cookies,

cakes and even preparing them for the freezer.

POUND FRUIT CAKE

1 lb. butter
2 1/2 c. sugar
6 eggs, well beaten and added to creamed butter and sugar
4 c. sifted flour

Take out 1 cup of flour for fruit mixture. Sift remaining 3 cups with 2 teaspoons baking powder. Add to butter, sugar and egg mixture.

Add:

1/2 lb. candied cherrie
1/2 lb. candied pineapple
1/2 lb. pecans

Dredge fruits and nuts with 1 cup flour prior to adding to cake mixture. Add 1 ounce pure lemon extract. Bake in tube pan 2 1/2 to 3 hours in 325 degree oven.

DATE ROLL

1/2 lb. graham cracker
1 lb. dates
1/2 lb. marshmallow
1 c. chopped nuts
1 c. whipping cream
1 tsp. vanilla
1/4 tsp. salt

Mix well and shape into roll. Store in refrigerator and slice as needed.

CRANBERRY BREAD

2 c. flour
1/2 tsp salt
1 1/2 tsp soda
1 c. sugar
2 T. shortening, melted
1 beaten egg
1 c. nuts
1 c. raw cranberries
Juice and grated rind of 1 orange
Boiling water to make 3/4 c. of liquid including orange juice

Sift together flour, salt and soda. Add sugar, shortening and liquid. Fold in egg, nuts, and cranberries. Bake 1 hour in greased loaf pan at 350 degrees. Set bread aside for 24 hours. Slice thin and serve with butter or cream cheese.

Financial Facts

How does the International Monetary Fund operate? Each country was to pay into the fund, part in gold and

part in its own currency. The quota was based on its pre-war trade and other considerations.

Any country whose payment accounts were in deficit (imports exceeding exports) could obtain temporary credit up to an amount dependent on its quota. This was made possible by the fund's power to sell to any member, in exchange for its own currency, the currency of any other member.

Creditor countries had the duty of doing all they could to bring their payments accounts into balance.

The IMF has had only qualified success. Where it failed, the failure has been ascribed to the inability of member countries to control their domestic price and

credit systems after World War II and during the Korean War.
