## Lions Club Livestock Auction Will Be Staged Here Monday March 17

### Proceeds Will Be Used To Buy Children's Glasses

Committees Still Working To Secure Livestock As Gifts From Citizens Here

The Lions Club officials announce this week that the date set for the livestock sale, the proceeds of which is to go for the purpose of buying glasses for needy children, has been set for March 17 at the Auction Barn.

According to G. M. Roberts of the Elementary School, tests have shown that 35 per cent of all children enrolled have serious eye defects. Some of these do not need glasses, but a majority do. The county case worker states that 1-3 of the children in the county come from homes where the income is insufficient to provide glasses. It is a known fact that in order to do any real good toward the correction of these defects the doctor must be able to start with the child at the age of 6 or 7. There are cases where benefits can be derived at a later age but not as a general rule.

The Lions Club is concerned about this condition and believe that they are sponsoring projects which will do untold good.

Each Lion member has agreed to secure the donation of one animal for the auction. Any livestock is acceptable. Horses, cows, sheep, hogs, chickens, etc., will be gladly received. Provisions have been made for the care of these animals until the time of the auction in case the contributor cannot keep them. Any person having a contribution can call Guy Weekes, Bill Boyd, or Mayor W. L. Marr, who head the committees in charge and the contribution will be taken care of.

Lions believe that no finer work could be done than to restore the sight of some child who otherwise would live a handicapped life.

Post Commander Urges All Ex-Service Men To Register Whether They Are Members Or Not

National Commander Milo J. Warner has fixed Saturday, February 22, the 29th anniversary of the birth of George Washington, Father of our Country, as national defense registration day for all members of the American Legion and other World War veterans as may desire to participate.

The Allen-Houston post in this city will undertake to register Legionnaires and unaffiliated World War veterans in this community and surrounding area.

"This is a summons for possible important service to God and Country whom we served as young men in 1917-18." Adjutant Daniel O. Blackmon of the local post said. "I feel certain every Legionnaire and other World War veterans will welcome this opportunity of perhaps doing another bit for their country."

"We do not expect to be called on for active military service as most of us are beyond that age. But there are many home duties to be performed."

"We want you to consider this registration seriously," Mr. Blackmon continued, "and show your patriotism. You will not obligate your self no more than any other citizen. Next Call Will Be Made In March, But This County Will Not Have To Furnish Any Men

Twelve more Dawson County men have been called by Uncle Sam to serve in the army for a year. They will leave Lamesa on the morning of Friday, February 28th, and will go to Fort Bliss, according to information released from the local board this week.

A total of nine men were needed to fill the quota for this call, while three are replacements, and one named as an alternate to insure a total of twelve.

The next call for men will be made on March 14th, but Dawson County will not be required to furnish any men at that time, according to L. E. Eager, secretary of the local board.

## What About Dollar Day?

(An Editorial) Interest among the merchants of Lamesa in the regular First Monday Dollar Day is on the increase, according to the number who have talked with Courier representatives on ways it could be made more effective.

Several have offered the suggestion that the merchants of the town should confine the bargains to only the one day, First Monday, rather than to include the week end before as well.

Still others have offered the suggestion that to make the affair more successful from every standpoint, that the Chamber of Commerce, or some other civic organization sponsor the movement, with the hope that in this way, it could be made more town-wide in its scope, with every line of business and as many firms as possible represented, so as to increase the incentive for the people of the territory to come to Lamesa on that day.

First Monday Dollar Days, and their success, are largely dependent upon the effort expended to make them successful. Several neighboring towns have been conducting these monthly Dollar Days over a period of years and have built them to one of the largest business days in the month. Their idea has been to get every firm in the town, regardless of whether they could offer a special for a dollar or not, to offer some special inducement for this one day only. The success of their movement would indicate that this is along the right route.

While the newspapers in Lamesa have attempted to get townwide support of these monthly affairs, some have responded nobly, while a few have felt that it was merely a newspaper promotion. While it is true that the newspaper carries some extra business as the result of a First Monday Dollar Day, it is also a fact that the newspaper is interested in seeing the trade that is rightfully Lamesa's, stay in Lamesa and not go to some neighboring town. ## Revenue Bonds To Finance Larger Water System

City Commission Explains Issue And Tells Of Ways Money Is To Be Used

Members of the City Commission this week issued a statement in regard to the proposed \$75,000 Revenue Bond issue to be voted on by the people of Lamesa in a special election next Monday. Their statement is given below:

Some of the residents of Lamesa may recall that in 1924 a disastrous fire swept the business district of the City, destroying store after store and leaving the city's business life seriously crippled. The fire department of Lubbock, and other nearby cities that had fire departments at that time, came in to help, but in spite of the fact that the water storage of the Santa Fe Railroad was used and exhausted, there was not enough water available to fight the fire.

The next year after the fire, in February of 1925, at which time the population of the city was 2,500, bids were taken and a contract was let for the improvement of the distribution system at which time many feet of new 8" and 6" cast iron pipe mains were installed, and a new well constructed west of the City.

Two or three years later improvements were made to the pumping plant, at which time additional wells were put down in the draw west of (Continued on Back Page)

## SHUMAKE HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUB REPORT

When we take time to sit down and figure out just how much of our life we spend in bed, we begin to realize just how important our beds really are. Some one has said that the average person spends at least twenty years of his life in bed. If this is true, surely we should give a lot of thought to our beds. Sleep is essential and every one knows what good sound, restful sleep can do for our minds and bodies.

When the Shumake Home Demonstration Club met Tuesday, Feb. 11, in the home of Mrs. J. B. Speck, Miss Phenix gave a demonstration on qualifications of a good bed. Good springs with plenty of slats were stressed by Miss Phenix. Since it is easier to keep a mattress clean than it is to clean a mattress after it has been soiled, three things were demonstrated as a help in keeping them clean. 1. Spring cover. 2. Mattress cover. 3. Mattress pad. Inexpensive material, sacks, or other materials one may have on hand may be used. The directions for making each are very simple.

The following is a suggestion for getting rid of bedbugs. One ounce of Corrosive sublimate from the drugstore for about a quarter. Mix this with one pint of warm water. Then apply it with a feather or a hand syringe to the cracks and seams where bedbugs would be likely to hide. Do this every three or four days for two or three weeks, and your mattress will be free of bedbugs.

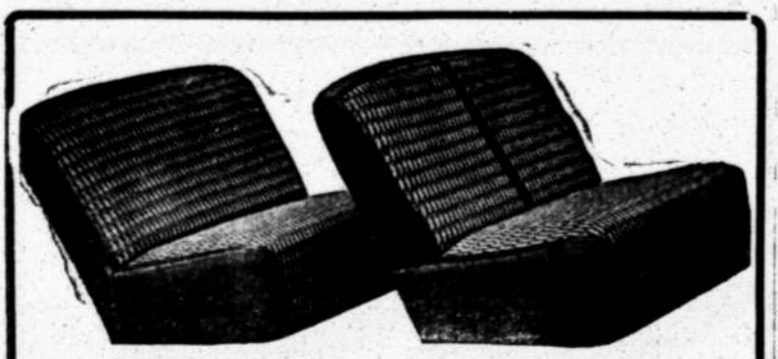

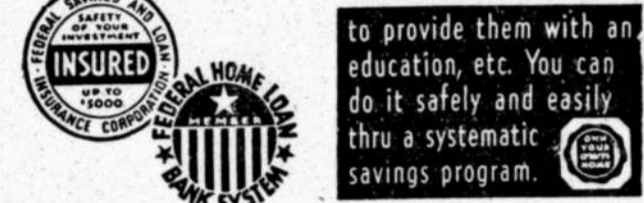

### Cedar Lake Test Is Shut Down

Failure one mile south of production on the east side of the Cedar Lake area in Northeastern Gaines County appeared Thursday in the San Andres Production Company No. 1-A Johnson, section 6, block C-30, psi survey, which has been shut down for orders at 5,000 feet, in lime.

The test topped the solid lime low structurally at 4,520 feet, and was cored from 4,770 feet to 4,790 feet recovering 10 feet of lime with a trace of porosity carrying a sulphur odor. Slight stain was recovered in samples from 4,830 feet to 4,860 feet and 4,880 feet to 4,890 feet, while the test drilled soft from 4,915 feet to 4,917 feet. It then was cored from 4,917 feet to 4,917 feet, recovering five feet of lime and anhydrite, carrying a sulphur odor.

### Information On Cotton Stamp Plan Is Not Yet Available At ACA Office

The Dawson County AAA office has been getting many inquiries relative to the Supplemental Cotton Program recently announced by the Secretary of Agriculture. The regulations for this program are now being drafted and until the regulations are available, no detailed information can be given. All the information that we now have is given below in a quotation by R. M. Evans, Administrator of the AAA.

Mr. Evans says: "Any farmer, whether he receives cotton stamps or not, will be permitted to reduce planting by any amount in 1941 and still receive full conservation and parity payments, and such underplantings will not affect his cotton allotment in 1942 and subsequent years. In addition to the reduction for which farmers may receive stamps, it is expected that as much additional acreage may also be taken out of production because of this provision. The supplemental plan gives farmers an opportunity to help improve the whole cotton situation, but it does not reduce the cotton acreage allotment in subsequent years. It is also an aid to soil conservation. The land farmers take out of cotton will be available for planting to soil-conserving and food and feed crops.

"The cotton stamps which farmers will receive as compensation for participating in this program will be good for the purchase of cotton goods. The stamps will be identical with the stamps now used under the Cotton Stamp Plan which is already in operation under the direction of the Surplus Marketing Administration. The same general regulations which govern the use of the stamps under the Cotton Stamp Plan will govern the use of the special cotton stamps issued to farmers under the new program. They will be exchanged at retail stores for any cotton goods, made entirely of cotton, grown and manufactured in the United States.

"For planting less than the acreage allotment in 1941, or the measured acreage of 1940, whichever is less, stamps will be issued at the rate of 10 cents a pound times the normal yield of the underplanted acreage in 1941, but not exceed 25 per family in the case of sharecrop-

Social Security Cards Not For Identification

Instances of alleged counterfeit social security account cards being used for identification in cashing checks brought from the Social Security Board today a caution that cards issued by the Board are for identification purposes under the Social Security Act.

Possession of an account card, according to Robert M. Mayo, manager of the Big Spring, Texas, office of the Social Security Board, holds no significance for other identification purposes or for the financial responsibility of the individual.

Mayne emphasized that under the circumstances in which account cards are designed to be used, it is against the employee's interests to use a card other than his own. Account numbers are being used by the Board in administering the Federal old-age and survivors insurance system and by the States in administering their unemployment compensation laws.

For purposes of the Federal old-age and survivors insurance system, employers must know each of the employees' account numbers in reporting the amount of wages paid employees. These wages are credited to the individual employee's social security account. The amount of old-age and survivors insurance is based on the total amount of wages paid the individual employee in covered employment until he reaches 65 and retires, or until he dies.

Employees in industry and commerce who do not have account numbers were urged by Mayo to apply immediately at their nearest Social Security Board field offices for them. Duplicate account cards may be obtained in the same way by employees who have lost their cards.

Nazi Shells Go 135 Miles, But That's About All

WASHINGTON — British artillery experts admit Germany has the greatest cannon ever forged, except for one little defect—it can't hit what it's shooting at.

This super-colossal Big Bertha hurls an 11-inch shell 135 miles. The projectile travels 37 miles into the stratosphere on its thunder-making journey. It has the longest gun barrel ever cast—120 feet.

These technical data on the Nazi long ranger were published in a British artillery journal, but nobody lost any sleep. What artillerymen call "inherent error" makes the big gun about as valuable as a bean hooter from a military standpoint.

Inherent error boiled down, is the half-a-hundred reasons a perfectly aimed gun doesn't hit its target. Inherent errors multiply as distance to target increases.

Muzzle droop, vibration, worn rifling, non-uniform powder—these are a few inherent errors, multiplied in the Big Bertha.

The terrific speed of the projectile—5,905 feet per second in the long ranger—heats up a gun barrel. The heated metal tends to droop out of line. The longer the barrel, the more the droop.

The Nazis have tried to correct this droop with outside trusses like bridge girders, but even an infinitesimal droop means the big gun will pitch a curve.

Vibration is set up when the propelling charge is set off. The tremor travels up the gun barrel, making it rotate ever so slightly. It's impossible to gauge exactly where the gun muzzle will be in its vibration-orbit when the shell leaves it.

Bug Carries Equine Sleeping Sickness In West

Dr. C. H. Kitzelman of Kansas State College reported recently to the American Association of Economic Entomologists that a blood-sucking insect that feeds on horses mules and other animals in the west carries equine encephalomyelitis, or horse sleeping sickness.

The office of information to the United States Department of Agriculture quotes Dr. Kitzelman that this constitutes the first case in which neurotrophic virus had been isolated from an insect in nature.

In experiments, Dr. Kitzelman said, numbers of the insect had been captured in pastures where horses had died of the sleeping sickness were ground up and filtered germ-free extract from their bodies was injected into guinea pigs.

The virus alone caused the disease in other guinea pigs was isolated from their bodies. The insect is known in Kansas as the "Mexican bedbug."

Cotton Coats For Sheared Sheep

The office of information of the United States Department of Agriculture says that Dr. Robert H. Burns of the Wyoming Experiment Station, in cooperation with the New Orleans regional laboratory, is experimenting with the idea of clothing sheep in cotton "coats" after shearing. The purpose would be to protect the animals from exposure after shearing.

Last year, Dr. Burns tried out 72 of the "coats" and this year ordered 500 more. This new use of cotton might mean a potential consumption of 50,000 bales of the staple yearly.

Texas School Children Better Fed In December

A quarter of a million children in Texas were better fed in December because of the school lunch program. Free surplus food, furnished by the Surplus Marketing Administration helped feed 260,348 children in 3,627 schools, according to a report compiled by the SMA.

Schools in 212 Texas counties operated under the program during the month, leaving only 42 counties in the state which failed to participate. Aid of the Texas Extension Service and other interested groups and agencies in Texas has been enlisted in acquainting people of these 42 counties with the benefits of the program.

Participation in the program is much higher than the peak reached during the 1939-40 school year. Welfare agencies, public officials, and teachers say the program is improving school attendance, causing increased weight and improved health of the children, higher scholastic attainment, better classroom and playground attitudes, better eating habits and increased interest of local patrons in school activities.

Farmers, too, benefitted from the program by the consumption of 2,946,367 pounds of surplus food, including: 160,391 pounds of eggs, 93,503 pounds of wheat cereal, 99,814 pounds of corn grits, 84,893 pounds of corn meal, 89,283 pounds of Graham flour, 230,228 pounds of wheat flour, 79,593 pounds of rice, 355,578 pounds of fresh apples, 20,696 pounds of canned peaches, 29,026 pounds of dried peaches, 253,442 pounds of fresh pears, 88,508 pounds of dried prunes, 8,627 pounds of onions, 8,483 pounds of black eyed peas, 472,468 pounds of Irish potatoes, 102,528 pounds of salt pork, 43,720 pounds of smoked bacon, 18,586 pounds of smoked ham, and 125,280 pounds of lard.

Propaganda Activities In South America Don't Suffer For Lack Of Notice

WASHINGTON — No laboratory ever kept his eye glued on the microscopic gyrations of an algae with greater intensity than that with which Washington officialdom watches what goes on in the way of propaganda in South and Central America.

Authoritative reports in diplomatic circles here say some of the republic south of the Rio Grande are up on their hind legs, fighting mad, about anti-American material. If you want to keep up with this situation, pay particular attention for a while to what effect, if any, the new wave of Spanish Falangist activities will have in the 19 Spanish-speaking republics (in Brazil, they speak Portuguese, you know).

Under orders from Madrid, officials here say, Spanish Falangists have spread out like a duck-pond during a cloudburst in several countries. This wouldn't be such a worrisome note in the official eye here if there weren't also signs, they say, that the Falangists will act as "fronts" for Nazis and Fascists.

Under a decree issued by General Franco, chief of the Spanish state, a "Hispanic council" has been set up, officials say, with the object of recreating Spain's ancient glory and establishing Madrid as "the axis of the Spanish speaking world."

A new decree, copies of which have just been received here, designates Serrano Suner, foreign minister, chief of the Falange and outspoken advocate of close cooperation with the Axis powers, as head of that council.

Members of this "Hispanic council," in addition to high ranking officials in Spain, include the Spanish ambassadors to Argentina, Cuba, Chile, Mexico and Peru and the Spanish consul general in Manila.

The decree specifies that "headquarters for the American branch" will be established in one of the chief cities of South and Central America. So far, it is not reported here what city will be selected.

These same officials here say that the Americas, south of the border, are considered fertile ground for Falangist spade work, because so many of their citizens were born in Spain or are only a generation or two removed from there and are presumed to be sympathetic to

STUDENT BORROWERS MAKE GOOD RISKS
ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—Student borrowers make good risks, the University of Michigan reports. During a 43-year period, only three-fourths of one per cent of money loaned by the student loan fund was charged off as a loss. The majority of final failures to pay were due to death or to permanent disabilities, the president's 1939-40 report says. Since the fund was established at the university in 1897, a total of \$1,811,271 has been loaned to students.

New Life Returns To Old New Salem, In 'Depression' Since Abe Lincoln Left

Lincoln's Birthday, 1941, Finds Reconstruction Well Along

NEW SALEM, Ill. — Abraham Lincoln and prosperity walked out of New Salem at about the same time—more than 100 years ago.

Lincoln went to Springfield to continue the public career which led to the presidency. New Salem went into a slump within two years after Lincoln left. On Lincoln's birthday, 1941, there remains only one of the original buildings that stood here when the young Lincoln clerked in the Offutt store and met and courted Ann Rutledge.

Lincoln lives only in memory and legend, but the town, which died before he had reached the peak of his career, is coming back. Reconstruction of New Salem, started by the state in 1932, has brought back 13 cabins, six shops, and the Rutledge tavern, where "Honest Abe" boarded and stayed up late at night entertaining fellow boarders with his endless store of yarns.

The only one of the 30 original buildings that remains is the On-stooper cooper hop, where Abe and his friend, Isaac Onstot, studied Blackstone, Shakespeare and Burns by the light of the fire kindled with the cooper's shavings.

Under construction now is the saw and grist mill, which was originally built by James Rutledge and John Cameron, co-founders of the village.

This summer the state will begin reconstruction of the Mentor Graham school house which served also as a church. Plans for operating the Hill carding mill by ox power will be carried out. Well over \$500,000 is being expended by the state and the national park service in the restoration.

The site of New Salem park was originally acquired by William Randolph Hearst, who later transferred it to the Chautauqua Association. In 1918, however, with the consent of Hearst, it was turned over to the state.

The buildings are furnished with authentic relics, including the surveying instruments, saddles and mattock, and letters of Lincoln, the Rutledge family Bible, a wooden clock sold in the Berry-Lincoln store, and a side saddle used by Ann Rutledge.
