She Knows New Art—And Her Discovery Opens New Profession

NEW YORK, July 10—"Home harmony" is Virginia Hamill's motto.

It is not domestic peace, however, that is her primary concern. But the setting is conducive to it. For Virginia Hamill is New York's first ensemblist.

An ensemblist—it is a brand new profession—in a furniture and home-furnishings style, who works, not with the retailer to see that he buys the right things, but with different manufacturers to see that they produce rugs, lamps, furniture, wall paper, flat silver, crockery and so on, that people will ask for and can use together harmoniously.

By profession, Miss Hamill is an interior decorator and an artist. By nature she is an opportunist. By environment, a modern.

Graduated from the New York School of Fine and Applied Arts, Miss Hamill started her interior-decorating career with two other girls in a farm-barn studio in New Hampshire.

But one position after another sought her out. In turn she lectured at various universities and art schools. Then she began lectures on interior decorating in a department store. Two high-class establishments had her, in succession, as furniture stylist to advise their buyers' purchases. Then she branched an 100th anniversary exhibit for an elegant concern. Eying ahead for this, she showed her pioneer blood again by being the first to bring back modernistic things from the Paris Exhibition.

She became the one woman most sought by stores to arrange modernistic exhibits for them.

Used to Modernism
"Modernistic furnishings were not so new and bizarre to me as to most Americans, for there has been a modern movement in Europe for many years," Miss Hamill said in disclaiming the credit due her initiative in introducing a new era in decoration into this country.

"In buying modern pieces I realized the tremendous importance of having our manufactured things harmonize with the spirit of the age. That is why I went into the manufacturers' end of it."

"Recreation?" she queried. "I don't have any. I'm too busy. I seldom go to the theater, never read any novels, haven't time for golf, tennis or swimming. I guess going to Europe is my only recreation."

"My work takes me across the Atlantic from two to four times a year. En route, I forget everything. Do you know how? Well, I just collect all the detective stories I can lay hands on. They'll turn the trick of making you forget. That's my one diversion."

She'd Help "Clinging Vine" Finds Own Level

Freda Kirchwey, managing editor of The Nation, is the kind of feminist who believes in giving the "clinging vines" a hand.

"It is becoming more and more infrequent for men to object openly when their wives work outside the home," Miss Kirchwey said. "This is no longer associated in people's minds with the trick of making a woman's earning power on the man's part. Consequently he suffers no humiliation, or loss of social prestige."

"Still, in these days of working wives and mothers, a type of man exists who feels strong and self-confident only when he knows that one person in the world is totally dependent upon him and looks up to him as a person of superior intelligence and ability."

"This type of man may comfort himself with the thought that the corresponding type of woman also persists—the woman who shrinks from the harsh demands of self-support and outside achievement, and who enjoys feeling that a man is willing to carry these burdens for her."

"Perhaps, in these institutionalized days, it would be possible to establish a bureau at which men who need to support a wife, and women who need to be supported, would be required to register—for their mutual comfort and satisfaction and for the protection of the rest of the population!"

"Then the stronger and more adequate men and women could go their way in the world with less danger of stubbing their emotional toes and finding themselves in the painful throes of an unsuccessful marriage."

COMMANDMENTS ARE APPLIED TO MODERN AFFAIRS

Rev. W. R. White is preaching a series of sermons on the Ten Commandments as applied to practical problems of modern life in the revival services being held each night at the First Baptist church tabernacle. Last night a large audience listened to eloquent appeal to worship God and leave off the many things that came between one and God.

The first group of commandments, Dr. White said, deal with man's relation to God and the second group deal with man's relation to man. The speaker said that when God was explained away that more problems, mysteries and uncertainties were created than existed with reference to God. Without God who created man and the universe, he said, existence becomes a riddle and a maze through which no man can see reality. God, he continued, is the only fundamental thing in the universe and the only man can understand the universe. "You may leave God out of your life, but you'll pay an awful price," Dr. White said.

The third and fourth commandments will be the basis of the sermon tonight, the subject being "The Spirit of Worship and the Time of Worship."

PIRATES BEAT GIANTS TO AID DRIVE OF CARDS

GRIMES TAKES THIRD WIN OFF EX-TEAMMATES

REDS TROUCE PHILS AND DRAW NEAR TO GIANTS IN RACE

Perhaps the Pittsburgh Pirates are not going anywhere in particular this year but they seem determined to win the National League championship in the west.

Bowling over the New York Giants Monday for the third time in a row, the Corsairs earned a vote of thanks from the St. Louis Cardinals and had the strategic advantage of having one less defeat than the league-leader. Today the shoe was on the other foot. The Cards have dropped 29 decisions, the Giants 30.

Burgie Grimes was the thorn in McCarty's side Monday. The spitballer, traded to the Pirates for Vic Aldridge, has faced his former teammates three times this year and beaten them every time. The score of his latest victory was 3 to 0.

Grimes never was in danger after Lloyd Waner hit a home run with one on in the fifth to give Bush's men a 3 to 1 lead.

Two homers, accounting for five runs, featured the Cardinals' 8 to 3 triumph over the Braves. Jim Bottomley hit his 19th of the year with two on and George Harper followed one man on the bases when he poked one out for the circuit.

Reds Troupe Phillies
The Cincinnati Reds, holding the third run in the standing, drew up to within eight percentage points of the Giants with their third straight decision over the Phillies, 5 to 4. The Phils outlasted the Reds, but Ray Kops blew down when danger threatened.

WOMAN OFFERS PLEA FOR SEAT IN U. S. SENATE

MRS. CUNNINGHAM SAYS
PEOPLE TIRED OF
"STRADDLE" ISSUES

Offering herself as "a woman tired for a man's job," and declaring that she is making the race strictly on merits with a platform of clearly defined issues, Mrs. Minnie Fisher Cunningham, of New Waverly, opened her South Plains campaign for the United States senate seat held by Earl B. Mayfield, here Monday afternoon.

She asserted that "the people of Texas are tired of candidates for public office standing on both sides of important questions in order to get votes," and then proceeded to clearly define points in her platform affecting unqualified support of the prohibition law, farm relief, freight rate adjustment, flood control, tax reduction, open forum of government, and a carefully constructed foreign policy.

"I'm strictly for prohibition," Mrs. Cunningham said, "and believe that it can be enforced. I remember the evils of the open saloon days and will do all in my power to see that they do not come back." Questioned a few minutes later, Mrs. Cunningham stated that she thought that the prohibition question would be a paramount problem during the next congress.

She's For Farm Relief
She expressed herself as strongly in favor of farm relief but stated that she thought the Democratic agricultural plank was too indefinite and not specific enough. "I'm glad that the McNary-Haugen bill was defeated," she said, "for I fear that a great hardship would have been worked off on the cotton states through the bill."

Treating the reduction of freight rates, Mrs. Cunningham stated that it was largely the tariff which made the freight rates so high, some of them running as high as 97 per cent. "I believe that the power industry should be developed throughout the country with an attempt to put the actions of the great power trusts which are networking the nation today. The greatest lobby in Washington today is the electric power group," she said.

Raps Secrecy
"The United States government is our business and should be transacted in the open so that we can see its workings," she said as she struck a blow at secrecy in government, mentioning especially the executive sessions of the United States Senate.

Touching upon the foreign policy of the United States, she declared that a "policy which shall interpret the friendships of the American people toward other nations" should be adopted and that the present policies especially the one toward Nicaragua should be mended. "I believe in an agency for peace," she said, "and believe that the League of Nations was destined to be this great agency."

Says Her Lot is Hard
The people of the state are not favorable toward a woman candidate for an office, Mrs. Cunningham said, especially one for a United States Senator. She is receiving, however, she said, marvelous receptions at the places where she is speaking. The rural communities are a little more prone to give a woman more credit, she said, due to the fact that the farmers recognize her ability to share her part of the economic burden more than the city man does.

Mrs. Cunningham left here soon after her address for Plainview where she appeared in another program there last night. She expects to cover the state, she said yesterday, speaking at practically every place that her opponents do.

MAROONED MEN ARE PARTIALLY INSANE, CLAIM

ITALIA CREW SUFFERS
WITH FEVER; LITTLE
HOPE IS HELD

(By Associated Press)
STOCKHOLM, July 10.—The five survivors of the Italia are ill with fever and most of them show signs of partial insanity, according to word received from the Swedish rescue ship Quest today.

Little hope is held for their immediate rescue. Their morale is low. Lieutenant Einar-Paul Lundborg, who was marooned on the ice near Foyn Island with them for 13 days, said his stay was terrifying. They had very little food and what he got was rather unappetizing. They were provisioned before he was rescued, however.

Suffering from Fever
Lundborg asserted all the survivors were suffering from fever and most of them showed signs of mental aberration. Giuseppe Biagi, radio operator, was suffering from fever for the last two days before Lundborg was rescued but nevertheless he arose at least twice daily to operate the wireless.

Since Lundborg was rescued last Friday there has been no radio con-

tact with the marooned men, advices from the Quest said.

Other details coming from Spitzbergen conflict with reports of the disaster given out by General Umberto Nobile. All telegrams from the base ship, Citta Di Milano, where Nobile is, are being censored. Nobody is allowed to telegraph in any language except Italian and all telegrams to Rome are controlled by Nobile himself.

It was learned, however, that Nobile now says the radio was all right from the first minute after the dirigible crashed on May 23. Nobody can explain how the Citta Di Milano and other stations were unable to pick it up until June 9, when when the base ship first announced that it had established communication with the survivors.

Mysterious Statement
General Nobile's mysterious statement about the unexpected fall of the dirigible and that the crew was not prepared appeared to conflict with fact that there were 50 pounds of provisions in the navigating cabin for six persons. This was held to indicate that measures had been taken for a forced landing, otherwise the stores would have been kept in the dirigible's interior.

Dr. Finn Malmgren and the two men who started afoot for land with him had fifty pounds of stores when they started on May 30. They had no weapons and it was thought that they had perished.

Hope for rescue of the five marooned men appeared today to lie in the Russian ice breaker Krasin. This vessel found progress through the ice field slow and today was 25 nautical miles away from the men. Eventually says Captain Tornberg, head of the Swedish rescue mission, if ice conditions im-

prove, the ship can reach the refugees.

Air Rescue Hopes
Prospect of rescue by air was believed to be dwindling. The Swedish leader recommended that the larger Swedish Junkers plane be sent home.

A landing on the ice with a small sport plane is possible only when the temperature is below freezing, he thinks, even then it is attended by great risks. At present the temperature, because of the cloudiness, is above the freezing point.

The six men carried away in the balloon part of the Italia probably were killed by the explosion which was observed by the marooned men after the crash on the ice, he said.

Light Rain Falls
Over South Plains

Breaking a drought of more than 20 days, rain again descended upon portions of the South Plains Monday afternoon. A deep blue eastern sky gave promise of additional moisture which will be of much benefit to the crops.

Lubbock's last rain came on June 24 to 26, only scattering showers falling at this time. The last effective rain was on June 11. Don L. Jones, superintendent of the state experiment station, said this afternoon.

Mr. Jones stated that he thought the shower Monday was fairly local but predicted greater precipitation.

LITIGANTS PLAN HARD BATTLE IN TABERNACLE ROW

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, July 10.—Both sides in the dispute over erection of a fundamentalist Baptist tabernacle here are lining up their forces in preparation for legal arguments tomorrow, when a hearing will be held in Judge Towne Young's court to determine if the injunction restraining work on the rambling shed shall be made permanent.

Since the structure as it now stands has been condemned by the city building inspector and the original permit revoked, it was predicted that tomorrow's fight would result in a verdict for the property owners who have protested building of the tabernacle on a prominent residential corner.

Henry G. Wills, attorney for the church group, spent yesterday in Austin in an unsuccessful attempt to obtain the release of the Rev. J. Earl Anderson, jailed pastor of the fundamentalist Baptist congregation, on a writ of habeas corpus. Judge Young, who had the pastor incarcerated in default of \$1,000 bond for failing to observe his injunction to cease work on the tabernacle, had not indicated whether the minister would be permitted to participate in tomorrow's argument in his court.

NIGHT LIFE IN GOTHAM CLUBS MENACE, CLAIM

VICE CONDITIONS ARE HELD WORST IN LONG TIME BY PROBERS

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 10.—Night clubs of New York are denounced as a menace to morality in the annual report of the committee of fourteen made public today. The night club hostess is termed the American counterpart of the Geisha girl. Because of such clubs, speak-easies and dance halls the committee regards vice conditions in New York as the worst in 20 years.

The committee formed in 1908 to combat commercialized vice in a civilian organization. Among its members are many well known New Yorkers. John D. Rockefeller, Jr., was the heaviest contributor in the year ending December 1, giving \$3,000.

Most Serious Aspect
The most serious aspect of the situation, the committee finds, is the class of young men and women attracted to night clubs and speak-easies, a class who never would have visited the old places of commercialized vice.

"Some of these clubs are cloaked with an apparent respectability which is likely to throw the unsophisticated off their guard," says the report. "They provide for the young man and woman the lure of stinging and dancing, coupled with alcohol and a free and easy atmosphere—and they are open all night."

The night club hostess, the committee says, is the American counterpart of the Geisha girl, and "is the successor of the old time ruseur who worked in bars on a commission basis many years ago."

"She is employed for the main purpose of increasing the sales of liquor, other drinks and food; incidentally she is to provide entertainment for the men customers. Her sex appeal largely accounts for her success."

Only Six "Respectable"
Of 157 night clubs and speak-easies investigated during 1927 the committee found only six "respectable" with six more "suspicious but no evidence obtained." In 13 others girls were not admitted. Advertisements of clubs, the report says, have attracted "not only local girls into this occupation but also girls from outside places in various parts of the United States."

"The closest dance hall, or the dance studio, where private lessons are given, although not as dangerous as the night clubs and speak-easies, is a 'growing and serious menace,' the committee finds."

Face powder, rouge, lip sticks and other aids to beauty to the weight of over 170 tons were brought from Germany for sale in Great Britain last year.
