F. F. A. NEWS

Now is the time to watch for cotton insects and to check fields closely for possible outbreaks. Reports from certain areas show an increase in the buildup of bollworms and fleahoppers.

The pattern that the cotton plant follows in its growth habits is shown below. Variety differences and varying climatic conditions, under which cotton is grown in Texas account for the upper and lower time limits. This information applies only to cotton crops which are developing normally and are not beset by outside influences, such as insects, diseases, drought or nutrient deficiency.

Soil Stamps Will Be Available August 27

Persons wanting "first day covers" containing the world's first soil conservation stamp should send self-addressed envelopes to the Postmaster, Rapid City, South Dakota, within the next few days.

The 4-cent 3-color postage stamp in the commemorative series goes on sale in Rapid City August 26 at the annual meeting of the Soil Conservation Society of America.

The Mitchell County Soil Conservation District plans to purchase the first sheets of the commemorative stamp at Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook.

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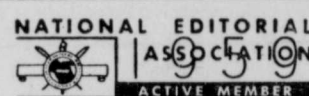

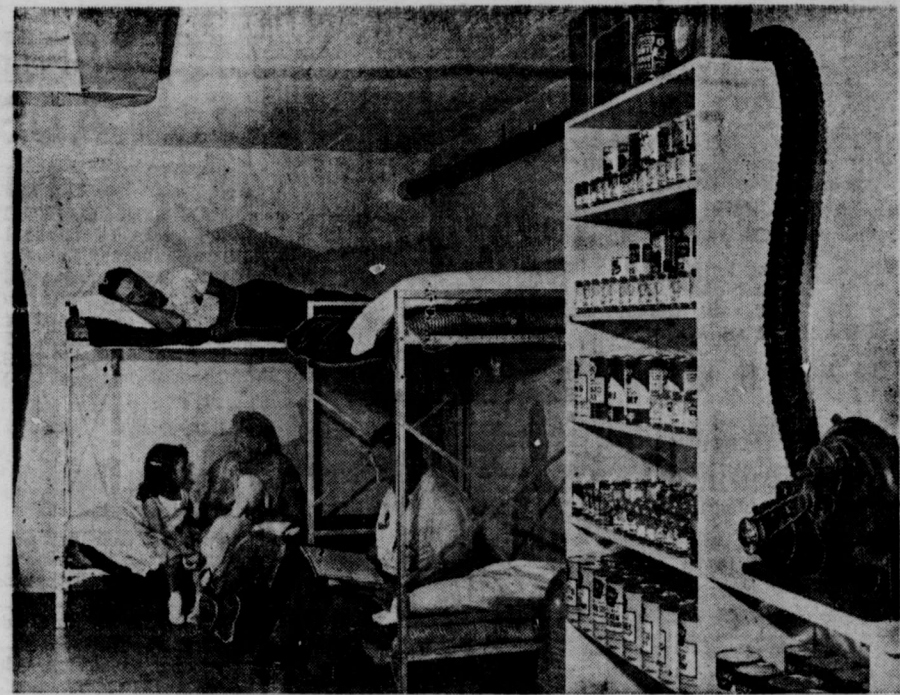

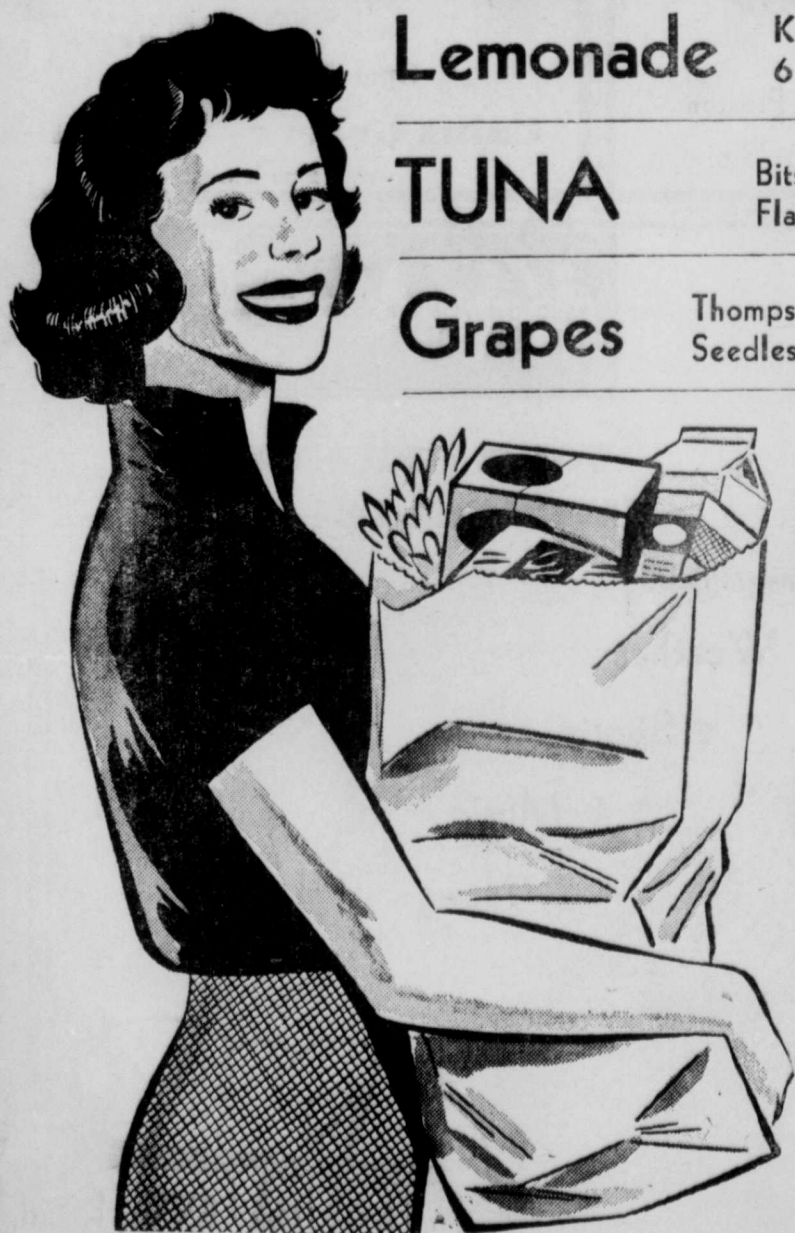
