Dugger Test Well Will Core Paluxy And Make Picture

Test well on the Dugger ranch, a mile east of Fulbright, was 2150 feet deep at 1 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, and the drill was expected to encounter the Walnut or upper Paluxy sand Wednesday night, Hal Millsap, president of the Millsap Oil & Gas Co., told this newspaper.

Drilling was slow in a hard formation at 2150 feet, and that this test was running 140 feet higher than the log of the test on the Cliff Adams farm a mile south, drilled several years ago, Millsap stated.

"A core will be taken Wednesday night and a Schlumberger picture made of the well Thursday to determine what has been encountered to the present depth," he added.

There was a slight show with plenty of rainbows on the slush pit Monday afternoon at 1380 foot depth, Millsap stated.

This test is about three and a half miles south of the E. E. Morris producer of the Bagwell area.

Surface casing was set last Friday for the new oil test on the Raymond Dugger farm, a mile east of Fulbright, and drilling began Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Vick Drilling Co. of Winnsboro is drilling for Millsap Oil Company at Siloam Springs, Ark. A 2,200-acre lease has been secured by the company. Acreage assembled by Dugger was given by land owners for the test.

Officials said drillers will try for a Paluxy test expected at about 2,500 feet and a Travis Peak test due at around 3,500 feet.

Millsap Oil Company also has holdings in Arkansas, Oklahoma and Kansas.

The well site is 640 feet north of the B. Gooch survey, 690 feet east of the Center land in the Graham survey. Permit calls for 3500 feet or to the Paluxy depth. This is about three and a half miles south of the E. E. Morris producer in Red River County.

New location in this I&L field is I&L Development Company, Dallas, No. 2 Troy H. Selby, a 10-foot project, 330 from the north and 784 from the west lines of a 160-acre lease in the John Guest survey.

After three surveys, Benton decided that neighboring service station encroached two inches over his property line.

He filed suit and received a settlement of \$2,165.65.

Fire Insurance Ratings For This Area Are Given

Board of Insurance Commissioners, Austin, have released figures for fire record ratings in this area. The maximum credit is 25 per cent.

The new rate does not apply to policies in effect before April 1, 1956, nor to property outside of city limits.

Advice from the Board shows key rate and records of towns in this area. The key rate is listed first then the rating:

Talco—55, 20% credit.
Deport—58, 10% charge.
Bogata—55, 15% charge.
Mt. Pleasant—38, 5% credit.
Detroit—95, 15% charge.
Blossom—90, 5% credit.
Clarksburg—32, 0 neutral.
DeKalb—51, 5% credit.
Annona—75, 15% credit.
Honey Grove—39, 10% credit.
Mt. Vernon—37, 15% credit.
Key rate for Talco this year is 55 cents with a 20% credit. In 1955 the key rate was 53 cents and a 25% credit.

Key rate for Bogata was the same for both years at 55 cents, with a 15% charge this year while only 10% charge in 1955.

The key rate for Deport is 58 cents this year as compared to 53 cents in 1955, with the charge being increased this year to 10% compared to 5% charge last year.

Loving Returns From Far East

Returned from active military service with the United States Air Forces in the Far East is Lt. Solon O. Loving Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. S. O. Loving of Talco. Loving, a graduate of East Texas State College, received a commission in the United States Air Force Reserve at Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada on July 17, 1953, and entered active military service on March 1, 1954. After completing technical training at Scott Air Force Base, Illinois, he was assigned to the Far Eastern Air Forces and assumed duty as a Special Security Officer in the vicinity of Seoul, Korea.

Assigned to Special Security Service, Loving was later attached to Headquarters Far Eastern Air Forces in Japan. In this capacity, he performed duty in Formosa, the Philippine Islands and Okinawa. Travel also included visits to India, Thailand and the British Crown Colony of Hong Kong. Returning from the Far East as a first lieutenant, he will continue service in the Air Force ready reserve after separation from active military duty.

Contracts Let On Access Roads

Washington.—A contract for constructing access roads at the Texarkana Reservoir in Bowie and Cass Counties has been awarded to Bruce Kennedy Sand and Gravel Company of Texarkana, the Army Corps of Engineers informed Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson Thursday.

Kennedy was the successful bidder in offering to build eight access roads totalling 7.81 miles, together with parking areas, launching ramps and drainage structures, in the vicinity of Redwater, Maud, Munz and Douglass-

Bowman - Skelton Sell Lumber Yard To Whitten & Sons

Whitten Lumber Co. has purchased the buildings and stock of building materials of the B & S Lumber Co. on FM 71 in East Talco, owned and operated by Andy Bowman and Dean Skelton, Will Whitten stated Tuesday.

Office and building materials of Whitten Lumber Co. will be moved to the new location next week. The mill will be kept in its present location on U. S. Highway 271, south of Talco, according to Whitten.

"The new location will enable us to carry a large stock of building materials and supplies, have better fire protection and to buy fire insurance. We expect to have a formal announcement concerning it in next week's paper," he added.

Now Make Charge Fire Dept. Runs Out-of-Town

Some towns have recognized that it costs considerable money for a fire department to make runs outside of their city limits, and are making charges for such runs.

In Titus County the county pays the city of Mt. Pleasant \$100 a month for fire department service and assumes liability for the trucks on such calls.

Detroit's City Council has just passed an ordinance providing for a charge of a dollar per mile traveled and \$10 per hour, or fraction thereof, within a radius of five miles of Detroit's city limits. Evidently they will not go further than five miles.

Spring and Clean Up Time are Here

Austin.—Spring and clean up time are with us, and Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health, urges all good citizens of the State to join in an effort to make each community a better and safer place in which to live.

One benefit of cleaning up is the elimination of fire hazards, which cause a heavy toll of life and property. This can be done by keeping premises free from inflammable rubbish.

Flies also breed in trash and filth and spread disease. Each resident should have a metal garbage can with a tight-fitting lid. The three known methods of getting rid of flies are screening, keeping premises clean and the use of insecticides.

The rat is a menace to public health and is capable of spreading several diseases. He is fond of making his home in dead spaces or holes around porches and walks. Rats cause trouble by eating and contaminating large quantities of grain and other foods, destroying property and are sometimes the cause of fires.

Young Talco Boy Is Shot in Arm By Playmate

Little Cecil Wayne Faulkner, 6-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Faulkner of near Talco, was given emergency treatment at Titus Memorial Hospital Friday morning for a gunshot wound in the arm, reportedly inflicted by a 7-year-old playmate, Skippy Ray Randle.

The wound was not considered serious and the boy was discharged after first aid was given, hospital attendants said.

According to reports the boys thought they were playing with a cap pistol after they had found a .25 caliber gun. The pistol discharged accidentally.

Construction New Kelsey Lake Is Now Underway

Construction of a new lake on the Joe Kelsey place west of Deport got under way Thursday when contractor John D. Wright of Talco moved machinery to the site and began work.

Bulldozers, scrapers and other dirt moving equipment are being used to construct the earthen dam, which is scheduled to be approximately 660 feet long, 148 feet wide at the base, 12 feet wide at the top and about 20 feet high. This will make the lake about seven surface acres and watershed to cover more than 60 acres. Construction, if weather conditions permit, is expected to be completed in about two weeks.

City of Deport has secured the water rights for a period of 50 years. This will greatly increase Deport's water source, approximately doubling the present supply. Facilities to carry the water to Deport's treating plant at the city lake will be installed at the Kelsey lake by the city, according to Mayor J. B. Griffin. Site of the lake is about a quarter of a mile southeast of Deport's city lake.

Tax Evasion Case Of Auto Dealer Set for Monday

An income tax evasion case involving a 55-year-old Clarksville, Red River County, automobile dealer, will go before U. S. Judge T. Whitfield Davidson in Dallas Monday.

The government charges that W. A. Dobson evaded taxes of \$34,455 covering a 5-year period. A grand jury indictment returned Feb. 11, 1955, charged that Dobson, from 1948 to 1952, filed earnings of \$181,003 and paid taxes of \$54,429 when he should have reported earnings of \$248,696 and paid taxes of \$88,884.

Dobson has been free on \$500 bond since the indictment was returned and he was given a hearing before a U. S. Commissioner.

BIDS OPENED BY TELEPHONE CO. FOR 170 MILES LINES, 3 PLANTS

Bids for construction of what is known as an outside plant, consisting of 170 miles of telephone poles, line wire and cable for the Northeast Texas Telephone Co. were opened at Bogata Thursday morning.

The firm of Thompson, Haight and Keister of Oklahoma City was the low bidder, their price being \$160,000. Other bidders prices ranged up to \$175,000.

This 170 miles of lines will serve rural subscribers out of the offices of the telephone company at Bogata, Deport, Birthright and Detroit.

At two o'clock Thursday afternoon bids were opened for construction of three dial telephone

buildings to house the automatic dialing plants. They will be constructed at Bogata, Deport and Detroit.

Anticipated bids on a new building for the firm were withheld until additional contractors could participate.

Guy Smelser, president of Northeast Texas Telephone Co., explained that the majority of the new lines from this particular bid would be put up in the vicinity of Milton, Minter, Melita, Manchester, Cunningham, Birthright, Kanawha and Kiomatia.

Contract for constructing of dialing plants was let last October by Northeast Texas Telephone Co. at a cost of \$51,000.

Dolato Named Ass't Forester

College Station.—Max Clarence Dolato has been employed as assistant forester in District 1 of the Texas Forest Service at Linden.

Dolato holds a degree in forestry from the Montana State University. To date he has been employed as a cartographer in Pennsylvania. He served in the United States Marines from 1944 to 1946. He is a member of the Society for American Foresters.

As assistant to District Forester L. E. Horsman, Dolato will work with woodland owners in the ten Northeast Texas counties including, Bowie, Red River, Marion, Titus, Morris, Camp, Franklin, Upshur and Harrison. He will advise woodland owners on methods of cutting timber, control of undesirable hardwoods, planting of seedlings and other phases of forest management.

Dolato fills the position created by the resignation of Robert C. Edington. Edington had been with the Texas Forest Service since 1953.

Ask Two Permits Drill Oil Tests Bagwell Area

Permit request has been made by Sher-Tex Drilling Company, Sherman, for No. 1 W. W. Copeland, a proposed 3,500-foot test in the Bagwell area. It is shown to fall 330 from the south and west lines of a 36.18-acre tract in the A. C. Curley survey.

Another filing was by Roy McKinney Trustees, Dallas, for No. 1-A J. T. Riddle, a 2,000-foot job four miles north of Bagwell on a 254-acre tract in the P. D. Midkiff survey. Still carried as active in this survey is McKinney No. 1 Riddle, which was drilled to 1,591 and cased to 1,588 feet.

Machinery for the oil test well on the O. E. Westbrook place northwest of Deport was being moved in Wednesday afternoon, according to D. W. Shelton. Drilling is expected to get underway the latter part of the week.

Independent Drilling Co., of Dallas, is the drilling contractor. Slush pit was completed two weeks ago. The test well is 1800 feet from the east and 832 feet from the north line on the Westbrook tract, north of Highland Cemetery.

This is the third test Shelton has made in that vicinity. The first on the Zuma Lawler tract and the second on the Sam J. Read place.
