Commissioners Call Election on Parking Meters

Bulldogs Looked Good Fighting Hard Battle

Petitions bearing sufficient number of names to warrant calling an election on the question of parking meters remaining in Ranger were left at the Police Station shortly after the City Hall office closed Friday afternoon, by P. T. Smith, local business man.

The petitions were presented under the direction of an initiating, or referring committee composed of the following citizens of Ranger: A. H. Powell, P. T. Smith, A. E. Crawley, Frank Penn and Jack Donahoe.

While there were a number of irregularities noted by the Commission, they ordered that an election be held October 20, 1958, so that the electorate may make a decision on the question.

Pending the holding of the election the Commission ordered the meters removed from the posts so that a traffic study could be made of present day traffic patterns. It is known by the Commission that in the nine years since meters were installed, the parking pattern has changed to some extent, and the Commission felt that this would be an ideal time to make such a study. Also as mentioned above, the meters have been in service nine years, with very little maintenance on them, so the Commission gave instructions that the meters be cleaned and placed in good condition.

While the Commission is of the opinion that permanent removal of the meters would hurt the City, they are entirely willing for the citizens to express their preference through an election.

Parents may contact Mrs. Newnam at 544 for information concerning class hours for pre-school, beginners—first through the sixth grade, and intermediates.

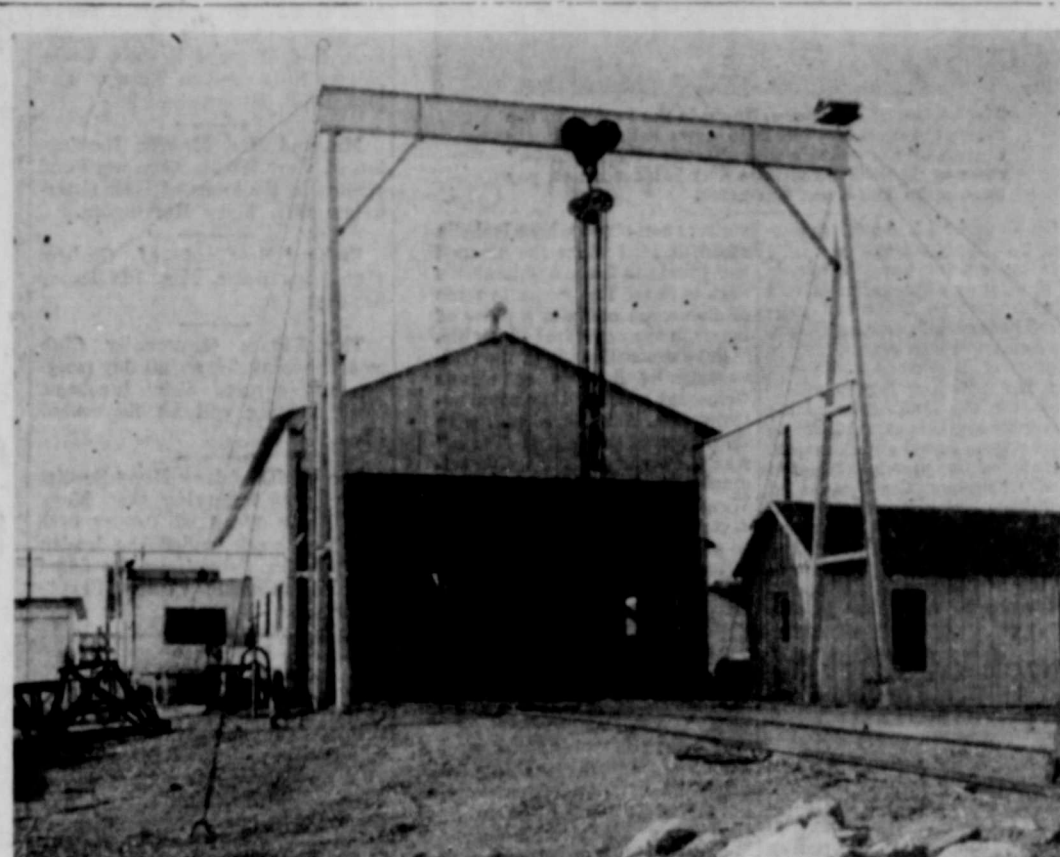
FFA Elects New Officers

Community Chest Agencies Will Make Requests

Directors and officers of Ranger's Community Chest will hear budget requests from the seven participating agencies Monday night at 7 in the Chamber of Commerce office.

Representatives are expected to be present from the Boy Scouts of America, Red Cross, Child Welfare, Salvation Army, Camp Fire Girls, Library and Teen Town—to frame their requests.

Named as representative in the Sept. 3 meeting were R. F. Wehl, Boy Scouts; Mrs. H. C. Croon, Red Cross; Mrs. P. M. Kuykendall, Salvation Army; Mrs. Glenn Covington, Camp Fire Girls; Al Larson, Ranger Community Library; and David Pickrell, Teen Town.

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Total Teen Town Attendance 5,394

Teen Town Directors approved the fall schedule, in a recent meeting, and reviewed rising attendance reports from Teen Town.

The board found that Teen Town is growing, with an average summer attendance of 751 per month. They expressed the view that they are very pleased with the operations of the organization. During the first five months of 1958, a total of 3,042 teenagers attended Teen Town for an average of 609 per month. During the summer months, the total attendance was 2,352.

Over 80 persons attended Teen Town Thursday night, and board members are expecting an average attendance of 100 a night this fall. In the fall schedule, Teen Town will be open on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights at 7. When a football game is played away from home, Teen Town will be closed (as in the past), but when the game is played here it will be open after the game.

An effort is being made by the Mother's Club to secure someone to manage the club on Friday and Saturday nights.

In other action, the board discussed the budget to be presented before directors of Ranger's Community Chest Monday night, at which time other participating agencies will form their request. Teen Town's budget for the coming year will be announced later.

Rangers Meet Dragons In Paris Saturday, 8 p.m.

Looking impressive this week the Rangers have been working hard in preparation for the game Saturday night against the Paris Junior College Dragons, slated in Paris.

Kick-off time is 8 p.m. The Rangers downed the boys from Tarleton State College 24 to 18 in a scrimmage Thursday afternoon. Tarleton is rated fourth in the Pioneer Conference.

George Boynton, left halfback who is a returning letterman and one of the captains, scored two times in the scrimmage, chalking up 12 points. Marvin "Buttons" Crawford, right half-back, made another tally. And "Red" Cantrell, right end, intercepted a pass to score for the Rangers.

Tarleton made two of their scores against Ranger's second unit, playing good defensive ball at the time.

With plenty of team spirit and a heavy line, the Rangers will take the field all "fired-up" to meet the Dragons, who are rated a three-

The Rangers will stick to the "T" formations, playing the split touchdown favorite.

Working out Thursday night under the lights, the Rangers showed plenty of power and team spirit. By hard playing and team work, they can upset the highly-regarded Dragons.

The opening game will mark the local first season to play in the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference. It will be a non-conference game, however.

Rangerites taking the trip to support the Rangers will have a choice of several routes. Most, however, will take Highway 80 to Dallas and then turn off on U. S. Highway 67 through Greenville and Commerce to Paris—a distance of about 222 miles.

Paris is 102 miles northeast of Dallas.

It will be the first time that Head Coach David Slaughter and Assistant Jim Puryear, both hail-

ing from Carrollton, will lead the Rangers into action. They will be up against a team coached by Boyd Converse.

Only reported injury, encountered by the Rangers, has been Jim Clark, a returning letterman from New Castle who is one of the captains. Clark fractured his cheek bone in workouts earlier.

The Rangers will be eyeing Cameron Agriculture College of Oklahoma, rated No. 1 in the North by sports writers and No. 2 in the nation, next week. Cameron looked strong downing the Cico team 44-0. The game is slated in Cameron, Okla., next Friday at 8 p.m.

For most Rangerites, cheering the locals, the highlight of the game came when Charles Wolford, Bulldog quarterback, ran the ball over from the one-yard line to set up the 22-22 tie in the fourth quarter, made possible when Joe Bradford carried for the extra two points. Just two plays earlier, Richard Rohie, left guard, had recovered a Mountaineer fumble.

After that, time started running out for the Bulldogs and the Mineral Wells drive downfield—after the kick-off—was good for a final eight points, to decide the game. Ranger had the ball only once, after that, but lost their chances when Jerry Anderson's pass was intercepted by Clyde Copeland, Mineral Wells halfback.

Constitution Week Will Be Observed Here

Mayor W. F. Creager has proclaimed the week beginning next Wednesday as Constitution Week, set aside for local observation of the anniversary of the adoption of the U. S. Constitution.

The week will extend from Sept. 17 through Sept. 23, and all local citizens are urged, in the proclamation, to pay special attention to the Federal Constitution and to the advantages of American citizenship.

Mrs. Alex Spears, Constitution chairman of the Charles Crawford Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, urges the merchants, bankers, and others to have patriotic displays during the week. Merchants are encouraged to display flags.

A copy of the proclamation follows:

WHEREAS, September 17, 1958 marks another anniversary of the adoption of the Constitution of the United States of America by the Constitutional Convention; and

WHEREAS, The Constitution gives us the foundation for a free, prosperous and independent life for every citizen, but each generation, in time, must work for and claim it, otherwise, through carelessness or indifference, the rights and liberties we enjoy may vanish; and

WHEREAS, The independence granted to the American people to enjoy such freedom and liberty, unknown to any other country, should be celebrated by appropriate ceremonies and activities during Constitution Week, September 17-23, as designated by proclamation of the President of the United States in accordance with Public Law No. 915;

NOW THEREFORE, I, W. F. Creager, by virtue of the authority vested in me as Mayor of the City of Ranger, in the state of Texas, do hereby declare the week of September 17-23, 1958 as CONSTITUTION WEEK in the City of Ranger, and urge all other citizens to pay special attention to our Federal Constitution and the advantages of American citizenship during that week.

Combine sugar and cream. Add remaining ingredients and cook over medium heat, stirring frequently as mixture thickens, constantly as it darkens. Cook to 230 degrees or when a little dropped in cold water forms a very soft ball. Add 1/4 cup chopped nut meats. Serve warm on ice cream, cream puffs, warm cake squares, etc. Can be made ahead and kept refrigerated. Reheat over hot water. Makes about 2 1/2 cups sauce.

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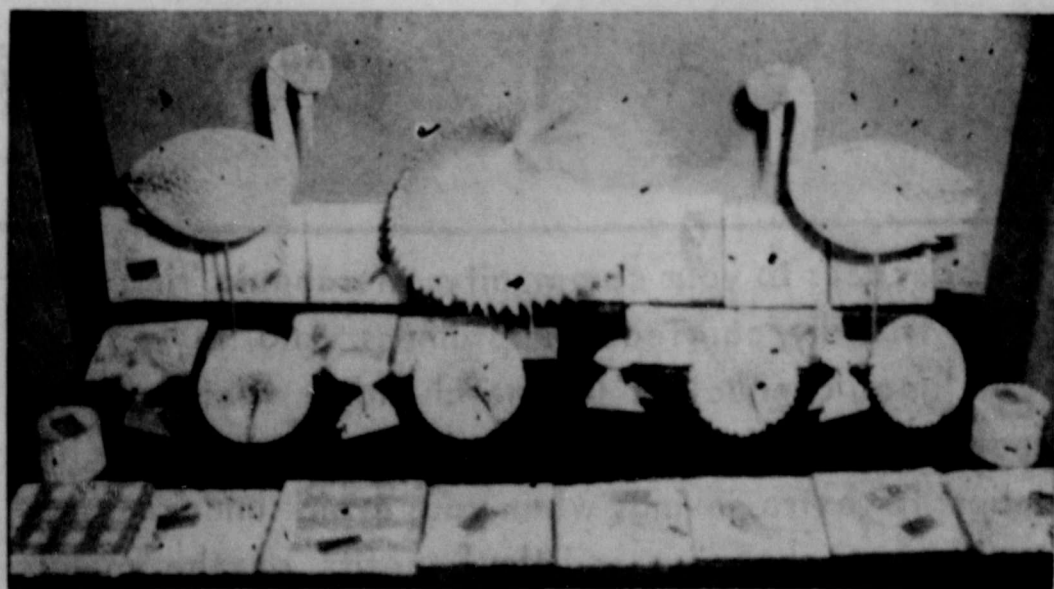

Women's Army Corps Offers Executive Jobs

Women presently employed in business and professional fields may qualify for an interesting executive career as a commissioned officer in the Women's Army Corps, SFC G. H. Barnes announced today.

Experience in a particular field is not a prerequisite for assignment to most of the career positions open to WAC officers. Executive level assignments are available in such fields as personnel, intelligence, communications and public relations.

Maximum age for applicants is 32 years. Other qualifications include a college degree. This requirement may be waived for

women who have completed at least two years of college and have sufficient leadership and supervisory experience in civilian life.

Qualified women receive a direct commission, and then attend a five month orientation course at Fort McClellan, Alabama, before their initial duty assignment. Members of the Women's Army Corps can look forward to travel and adventure with each assignment, for they serve throughout the United States and as many overseas installations.

SFC Barnes explained that women who meet the qualifications will find this is an excellent opportunity to begin a new vocation which is both interesting and rewarding.

FHA Program of Long Term Loans Is Gaining Favor

Local banks and other private lenders are increasing their stake in the Farmers Home Administration's program of long-term loans to qualified farmers to buy or improve family-type farms or establish good soil and water conservation practices. H. P. Cole, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor, pointed out this week.

His agency is authorized to insure farm real estate loans that are made from funds advanced by banks, insurance companies, or other institutions having money to invest. Since the recent change in the money market, activity by investors has greatly increased. During the past six months, the national monthly volume of new insured loan business has risen from approximately \$1,250,000 to \$5,000,000 a month.

For either a direct or insured loan the farmer pays 4 1/2 percent interest. If the loan is insured, the lender or investor gets a clear 3 1/2 percent and the Government guarantees payment of both principal and interest.

"The full guarantee and the money market change have put many local banks in position to contribute to a stronger agriculture by helping farmers otherwise unable to buy or improve their farms," Cole said.

After a five-year period the private lender may sell the insured note to the Government for the amount of principal and interest due, or may hold until the note is fully repaid. In case of default, the Government stands ready to take the note over with no loss to the investor. The Farmers Home Administration takes care of all collection and servicing details.

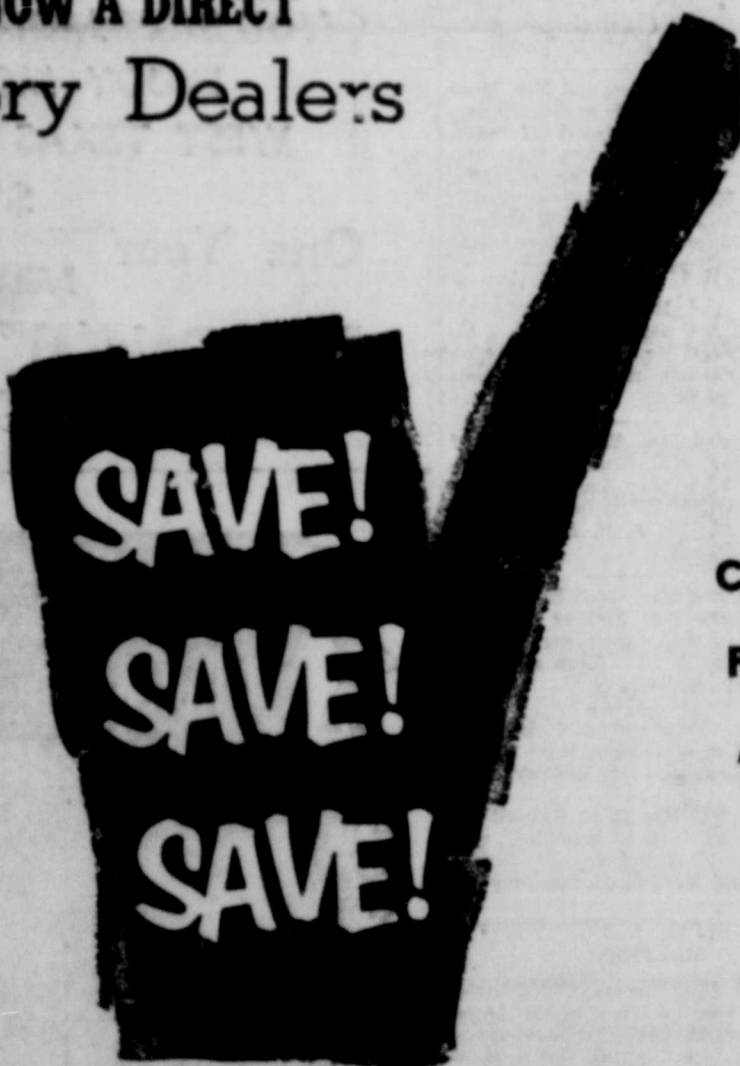
