Winnsboro Wins Over Talco Friday Score of 26 to 6

Winnsboro Red Raiders took to the air at Trojan stadium Friday night to score a 26-6 victory over a determined Trojan eleven before an estimated 500 fans, the second loss for the Trojans this year.

After the Trojans pushed them around the first quarter the Raiders came back in the second to pull a one point lead. Continued in the third and fourth to completely overrun the Trojans. Freddy Rogers engineered the Trojan tally by passing to "Dizzy" Howard 15 yards early in the first. The Red Men were playing under the abilities of Joe Tibbs, who had a hand in every play that counted for points.

The Red Men set most of their plays up on recovered fumbles. Their first tally came after a fumble by the Trojans on their 50 yard line. Their second tally was result of a blocked punt on the Trojan 10. Their third and fourth on receiving punts.

The Trojans were well ahead in the first half of the ball game, but seemed to lose their standing in the third quarter. Talco piled up an impressive margin of yards gained rushing and first downs, but as the second half progressed the Raiders overtook and passed the Trojans.

Long passes of the Raiders proved fatal to the Trojans. Winnsboro's first tally in the second half came when a long pass put them on the 2; their next tally was set up by a series of passes and their last came on a 50-yard pass.

Dewey "Dizzy" Howard and Freddy Rogers seemed an old combination pair from last year. It was as striking as the combination, Jones and Cox, who counted for many Trojan tallies last year. Edward Frye seemed to come back into the spirit of things; "Stump" Jones was back into the game with the same fire as ever. The Trojan backfield was playing heads-up ball behind "Willie" Williams and Robbie McCuller. The line was holding very good considering the odds.

Marriage License Law Changes Oct. 5

Effective Oct. 5, both applicants for a marriage license, man and woman, must have complete medical examination before the license is issued.

Heretofore the only requirement was that the man have a physical examination. A recent bill authorized in the State House of Representatives brings about the changes.

The new law specifically states that the medical examinations must include a standard serological test for syphilis and that the test must be performed in a laboratory approved for that purpose by the State Health Department.

Imports Blamed For Tax Needs

The state's financial woes would be solved if Texas oil were used in place of that imported from foreign countries, Rep. Doyle Willis of Fort Worth said here Tuesday.

Willis said that if Texas production were increased 600,000 barrels of oil daily, it would increase tax revenue enough to remove need for a new tax next January. He said several thousand people could also be given employment from the increase.

Willis said Texas citizens should protest to Washington against importing the foreign oil.

Kansas City. — Lightning saved a man from being electrocuted. Claude R. Stutzman, circulation manager of the Kansas City Kansas, drove into his garage late at night. It was raining hard and water covered the floor.

But a bolt of lightning cut off electrical power in the area. Stutzman got up with his only injury a burned hand.

13-Man Crew Of B-29 Lost In Hill Crash

Searchers sifted through ashes of a crashed B-29 Air Force bomber Tuesday in the search for the last of thirteen bodies of the crew near Talihina, Ok.

The plane crashed and burst into flames near the Southeastern Oklahoma town Monday night. Twelve bodies have been recovered from the charred bomber, which was on a nonstop navigational training flight from Smoky Hill Base, Salinas, Kans.

Flames from burning gasoline made it impossible for rescuers to get near the wreckage for many hours.

Another Producer Lakeview Pool

The Lakeview pool southwest of the Talco field apparently has another Paluxy sand producer in sight. Byars & Peveo No. 1-B Talley, S. J. survey, has set casing on bottom at 4,420 feet. Extent of shows are unreported.

Coast's Well is Reported Flowing

Rig was moved off Saturday in preparation for completion as a likely flowing well at Morris Coast's Paluxy sand discovery ten miles east of the Talco field.

His No. 1 Pewitt, Banks survey was being unofficially estimated in the neighborhood of 300 barrels daily of about 33-gravity oil. The well was swabbed in from perforations at 4,507-32 and 4,527-41 feet.

Coast & Harrell, contractors, are moving the rig to Hunt County to dig Coast's No. 1 W. A. Carter, W. R. Steel survey, Paluxy venture four miles southwest of Lone Oak.

Bagwell Well Pumping 25-50 Barrels Oil

Oil reportedly being pumped from the Stratton No. 1 Mrs. Clara B. Evans near Bagwell, at an estimated 50 barrels a day early Monday. Word received from the site indicated that this rate was not expected to be maintained, but that 15 to 25 barrels production might result.

On pump Sunday morning, the flow of water, which had followed swabbing operations, changed to oil about 10:30 a. m. This continued at an estimated rate of six to ten barrels during the day.

The oil was reported without water and said to be 35 to 40 gravity.

One visitor to the well Monday reported the pump filled a 5 gallon can in one minute, 15 seconds.

At the No. 1 Thomas Allen, about 1,000 feet southwest of the Evans hole, a casing swab run showed oil and water.

A new rig has been moved to a site about 50 yards north of the Evans test, but this had not been spudded in.

What's Cooking?

Women folk who have heard their squirrel hunting husbands talk about the fine squirrel stew they cook on their hunts, and want to show them up with a real Brunswick, here is the recipe:

1 small can corn (6 ears)
1 pint lima beans
4 potatoes, 1 onion
1 quart tomatoes
3 teaspoons sugar
½ lb. butter
1 tablespoon salt
1 teaspoon pepper
Cut two or three squirrels into pieces. To four quarts boiling water add salt, minced onion, beans, corn, potatoes, squirrels and pod of hot pepper. Cover and simmer for two hours. Add sugar and tomatoes. Simmer an additional hour. Add butter. Simmer ten minutes, bring to boil, and remove from fire. Add additional salt and pepper to taste.

Oklahoma's stalwart dries kept John Barleycorn stalled at the border again Tuesday as they piled up a tremendous lead in the state's sixth prohibition election since she was born "bone dry." Interest in the liquor issue drew possibly the largest vote of any such election in Oklahoma history.

Embezzlement Charges Are Filed Against Four Paris Bank Employees

Embezzlement charges were filed Monday against four employees of the trust department of the First National Bank of Paris. They were charged with embezzling \$20,000 in a complaint filed Monday before the United States Commissioner at Paris.

Those charged in the complaint, filed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, are Morris Fleming, vice-president and trust officer, Alfred Kidd, William H. Snow and Ann Marshall.

The complaint was filed under direction of Warren Moore, Tyler, United States District Attorney of the Eastern District of Texas, with Mrs. Clara Faust, United States Commissioner.

The four persons charged in the complaint were taken into custody by U. S. Marshal Adolph Fischer and were arraigned before Mrs. Faust. After entering pleas of not guilty and waiving examining trial, they were released on bond. Bonds for Fleming, Kidd and Snow were set at \$5,000 each. Mrs. Marshall was released on \$1,000 bond.

Bonds for the four charged were signed by J. A. McGill, Jess Alford, B. B. Harlan and H. L. Baker.

The bonds are returnable at the next term of federal court in Paris on January 2, 1950. Judge

Randolph Bryant of Sherman is judge of the Eastern District of Texas.

Filing of the complaint followed several weeks of investigation by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents, according to District Attorney Moore. Mr. Moore said the investigation was requested by him after a recent examination of the trust department of the First National Bank by national bank examiners.

Maury Robinson, president of the First National Bank, said that no loss will be sustained by the bank, or by any depositor or trustholder. He said all employees of the bank are fully covered by bond.

Fleming, 64 years old, had been trust officer of the bank since the department was set up by the bank about 1930. It now is one of the largest trust departments in Texas.

District Attorney Moore said an investigation was made after he received a report from Robert H. Bradley, a national bank examiner.

"I am hopeful that I can present this case to the grand jury meeting in Tyler on Oct. 3," Moore said.

"The investigation will be continued," he said, "It will be complete."

New-Type Plane Makes Amateur Flying Easy

Cambridge, Mass.—Two college professors believe they have developed the perfect "flying flivver" for private use.

Their "heliplane" will fly as slow as twenty-seven miles an hour and can land on a tennis court.

The plane's name was chosen because it has the appearance of a conventional plane with the advantages of a helicopter.

The inventors, Otto O. Koppen of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Lynn Bollinger of Harvard Business School, said the plane's ability to fly at a slow speed largely eliminates the danger of stalling—a principal hazard in private flying.

The heliplane, which can fly with a maximum speed of 112 miles an hour, will clear a 5-story building only 100 yards from a take-off point.

The plane's large wing spread and oversize propeller enable it to stay aloft and descend at slow speeds.

Squirrel Season Opens Saturday

Squirrel season opens Saturday, but there are so many special laws covering the sport hunters are warned to be wary.

The general law opens the season during the months of October, November and December and sets a bag limit of ten per day and twenty squirrels in possession.

There are, however, more than eighty counties which have different open seasons, or none at all. Others vary the bag and possession limit.

In Delta, Franklin and Hopkins Counties not more than eight per day or in possession are allowed.

In Lamar and Red River, daily bag or possession limit not restricted.

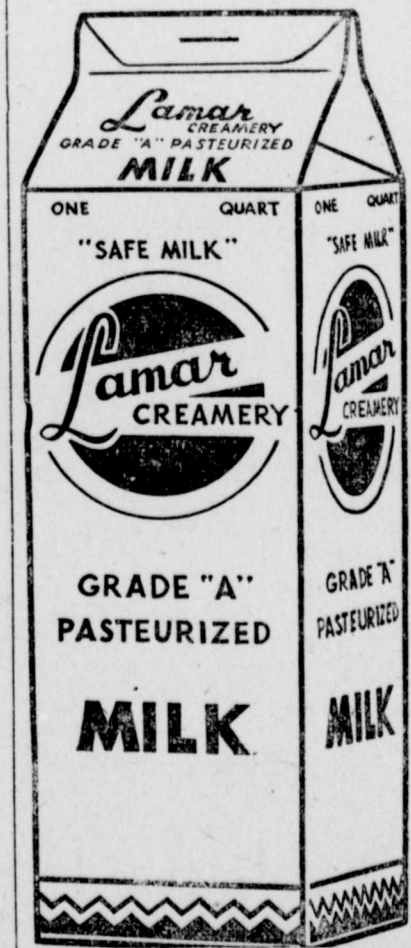
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
