MOTHER'S DAY

To those who can read "the handwriting on the wall," it looks as if the long-neglected mothers of this country are going to receive a little more attention. We have long erected public monuments to our great men but have dropped even a flower on the resting place of the noble mothers who raised the gifted men and to whom most of the credit for the greatness belongs. In many states dependent mothers with children are given a pension, and the inauguration of "Mother's Day" has set all to thinking more of the debt we owe the noble mothers of our land.

On May 11, 1912, Mother's Day was celebrated all over this broad land and will hereafter be celebrated with as much regularity as Christmas. To Miss Anna Jarvis, of Philadelphia, Pa., we are indebted for this day which is set apart for the purpose of at least thinking of our mothers.

A reporter once called on Miss Jarvis to get a history of her life and what she said will certainly interest the readers of this department.

"Please," she urged, smiling an apology, "I had so much rather talk about mother's day than about myself." The flush of innate shyness rose to the lines of her pale hair and her trusting eyes turned involuntarily to a portrait above the hearth.

"That is my mother" said Miss Jarvis, simply.

"She was mother to eleven children, I was her baby. It is seven years since we lost her. This was her sitting room; these are her things."

The big home-like room flooded with sunlight, was crowded with womanly possessions, deep chairs by the open fire, luxuriant plants in the generous window garden, a huge Canton jar of poupourri, low tables and baskets for unending needlework and books, books, books, everywhere.

"People think that the loss of a mother falls heaviest on children," said Mrs. Jarvis gently, "but, really, it is only the grown daughters and sons who understand."

"This Mother's Day movement—making the second Sunday in May sacred to mothers—has nothing behind it but my belief of men and women as sons and daughters. Eventually it will create an all-nations brotherhood that will stand for the protection of the mother and children—the unmarried mother, the mother who works, the mother who is widowed—for, indeed, the preservation of the home itself!"

"The white carnation was chosen as the memory flower because it grows everywhere and its whiteness and its whiteness symbolizes the purity of a mother's love, its endurance, her fidelity."

"Through all ages and all centuries the world is indebted to motherhood, for mother love is as old as the world and as young as the youngest born. It is the greatest force for good on this earth. Even a bad father's influence is so discounted by a good mother's that nine times in ten, the children come out all right. And most people had good mothers—indeed, most of us had the best mother that ever lived!"

"I contend that Mother's Day should be the greatest of all holidays, because you cannot perpetuate anything without mothers."

Very tenderly, as one who touches sacred things, the "mother of Mother's Day" brought from her desk packet after packet of letters.

"They come in hundreds," she explained.

"Here is one from a convict in Honolulu, where they celebrate Mother's Day in prison. He says that the memory service inspired him to write to the mother he had forgotten for eighteen years. This is from Kentucky where a girl about to be married asked me to decorate her mother's grave with white carnations on her wedding day."

"Mothers whose grown children have become careless, mothers whose hearts broke slowly, waiting for the word that did not come, have written me messages of blessing for Mother's Day."

"Read this, if you can. It came from a woman in Wyoming, whose only son, a lad at college, wrote home every week. On the night of

THE MEMORIAL HIGHWAY PERRYTON TO CANADA

Following is a list of the good road boosters from Perryton who made the trip to Scott City, Kansas last week to attend the meeting of the Memorial Highway Association: Judge J. M. Grigsby, W. B. About one hundred good roads boosters from Kansas, Nebraska, and Texas met at Scott City Wednesday to consider the proposed automobile highway across the U.S. from a point on the border of Canada to the Gulf of Mexico. Liberal was represented by sixteen business men, Perryton, Texas by a line number, Judge Hoover of Canadian Texas, and a representative from Spearman, Texas, were in attendance. Also boosters were present from Colby, Oakley and Atwood, Kansas and Stratton, Big Springs, Wauneta and other points in the State of Nebraska.

An informal meeting was held at Scott City in the morning and in the afternoon the real business session was held. Realizing that the Kansas Nebraska highway from Oskosh, Nebraska, to Liberal which was organized some time ago, had been outgrown, a new association was formed with the same officers, Mr. Martin of Stratton, Nebraska, being president and J. E. Bute Jr. of the same place, secretary. Four more directors were added to the list of seven already elected, Lee Larabee of this city being chosen as one of the number.

It is planned to call the new and to make it a memorial to veterans of all wars. Arrangements are now being made for the route to be laid out from Canada to Perryton, Texas, and before the summer is over in all probability it will be routed clear to the Gulf, possibly following the D-C-D from Perryton south.

The need for such a highway is apparent. A north and south trail runs across the eastern part of the United States and along the Pacific Coast but there is no central highway. This will be the first national highway north and south through the central part of the United States and what will be of great advantage, it connects with thirteen national east and west highways. On the route are the Black Hills of South Dakota, which are famous as summer resorts. With a good highway through, the drive from Liberal there could be made in two or three days.

Within two or three weeks it is planned to have a couple of carloads of officers of the association and representatives make a trip to the Canadian border to lay out the route of the highway. The fact that Liberal is on the proposed route means a big thing for our city. Once established, a large number of tourists from all parts of the country would travel over the highway annually.

Wednesday evening the Women's Civic Club of Scott City served a banquet in the domestic science department of the high school, which banquet has been pronounced one of the most successful at any of the similar highway meetings and Liberal men were enthusiastic in their praises of the courtesies extended. They report Scott City as very much alive and say that a real booster spirit prevails there.

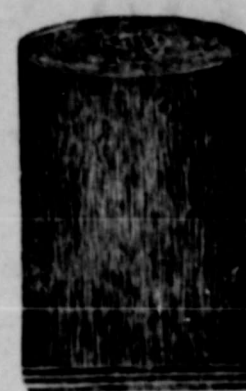
SUNDAY SCHOOL ORGANIZED AT OCHILTREE

OIL FIELD NEWS

W. E. Lilly, W. H. Stevens, Geo. Lilly and Thos. Thompson made a circuit of the Panhandle oil fields last week leaving here Friday morning and returning Sunday evening. They visited ten different wells. Staid all night at Plemons the first night, then went over to the Gulf No. 3 on the Dial Ranch 4 miles west of Plemons on the north side of the River and found they had an oil well, don't know how much but lots of it on the slush pool, they said they had 300 feet of oil in the hole at a depth of 3050 ft. Oh I forgot to say that they were Drilling at the Snorty Gopher and the Coble Heywood did not learn the Depth. Then we crossed the river at Plemons "with out help" and went to the Smith Capers where everything looked just like a real oil field. Oil all over the Derick and on the men and excitement running high, and Scouts sitting all around watching the work and the cars coming and going all the time, it was a real Busy Place.

They were splicing a cable while we were there so we left them and drove over to Gulf No. 1 which claims to be the biggest gas well in the world, making 270 million feet, and is furnishing gas to several other rigs to fire their Boilers. From there we went to Humble No. 1 which was shut down and abandoned as there was no one there, the whole crew had moved 4 miles south to Humble No. 2 where they were trying to straighten out a crooked hole.

We then went to Gulf No. 4 on the Wynn 7 miles east of Panhandle and they were working night and day at 300 feet, we left there and went to the Tipton Stone No. 1 on the Mc Connell Lease just 10 miles west of Pampa, they are also drilling night and day at about 400 feet. Mr. Lilly's "Dingle Bob" said this was going to be the best well of any we visited and it also said that Pampa was built right over the mother pool of the Amarillos Gas fields that the pool was 26 miles long and 10 miles wide and at a depth of 2380 feet. Hope it has the right dope.

We had a very pleasant trip. I am sure there will be a great oil field soon in the Territory we covered and that it will extend clear to Perryton some day.
